The Last Will & Testament of Robert Beall, deceased.

Georgia, In the name of God. Amen.
 Whereas Robert Beall of the County of Wilkes, after sundry
 years in this, and of sound mind & memory (that he is thoroughly conscious
 the same) do make & publish his my last Will & Testament.
 First. To God I commend my soul, & commend my body, and my
 body to the earth, in decent burials, nothing doubting it will in the last
 day be raised an immortal one, and be reunited with myself.
 Second. I desire, that all my just debts be paid, out of the money upon
 hand. Third. I give, sell and bequeath to my beloved wife, Robert
 Beall, during her life time, or widowhood, the Tract of land where-
 on I now live, containing two hundred and sixty seven & a half acres
 more or less, adjoining the lands of Elijah Spivey, Sophaniel Beall
 and others, on the waters of Long Creek, with the improvements, and
 appurtenances thereto belonging, with her Negroes, to wit, Sally a
 Woman, Nancy, a Mulatto woman, about forty three years of age, Maria
 Ann, a Black Woman, about twenty six years of age, Maria
 a Man, and June a Woman, all my stock, Consisting of twenty five
 Mules (one) Work Steers, one horse, cattle, about fifty or fifty five
 House furniture of all kinds, Beds, Bedsteads, side boards, Tables,
 Chairs &c. &c. Kitchen Furniture, Plantation Tools, and all the inventory
 on hand at the time of my death, provided the children may, all con-
 cerning her, free from charge, until they marry, and the money
 on hand, and debts due me.
 Fourth. I give, sell, bequeath, and devise, with the rest
 of the children which my daughter Eliza Beall may have (if any, plant
 with law, and if not, then to the three already named) I give, and
 bequeath four Negroes, Mariah, a woman, about thirteen years of age,
 Alfred a Boy, about thirteen years of age, Susan, a girl, about three
 years of age, and Abby, a girl about two weeks old, three of which
 are children of Eliza Beall, with three hundred and
 twenty five dollars, well and lawfully sold of all the estate herein before
 unpaid her death, provided all the bequest or legacy herein made

shall remain in the possession and service of my said daughter
Elizabeth, first, during her natural life.

Fifth. I give, sell and bequeath to my daughter Caroline Beall
three Negroes, to wit: Mary, a woman about twenty one years of age,
Obed, a Boy, about nine years of age, and Abigail, a girl, about
two months old. These hundred and twenty five dollars in cash to be
delivered to her at her Marriage, or coming to the age of twenty one
years, to have and to hold forever.

Sixth. To my daughter Mary Beall, I give, sell & bequeath three
Negroes, to wit: Mary, a girl about fourteen years of age, Paul's
a Boy, about nine years of age, and Abel, a boy, about three years
of age; with three hundred and twenty five dollars in cash, to be
delivered at the age of twenty one years, or when she marries, to
have and to hold forever.

Seventh. I give, sell and bequeath to my daughter Lisette Beall
three Negroes, to wit: Maria, the daughter of Yellow Hammer, about eleven
years of age, Peter, her brother, and Lina, a girl, about seven
years of age, with three hundred and twenty five dollars in cash, to be
delivered to her at the age of twenty one years, or when she marries,
to have and to hold forever.

Eighth. To my daughter Caroline Beall, I give, sell & bequeath
three Negroes, to wit: Jack, a boy about twelve years old, Peggy, about
nine years old, and Susan, about six years old, with three hundred
and twenty five dollars in cash, to be delivered to her when she marries,
or coming to the age of twenty one years, to have and to hold forever.

Ninth. And to Sarah Beall, I give, sell & bequeath
three Negroes, to wit: James, twelve years of age, Maria, daughter
of Mary, about four years of age, and Paul's, a boy, about three
years of age, with three hundred and twenty five dollars in cash, to be
delivered at the age of twenty one years, or when she marries, to have
and to hold forever.

Tenth. We give equal liberty to give to each of my children such
things which articles as may hereafter come to my daughter
Elizabeth, to have and to hold in the hands of her executors.

Eleventh. The mortgage of female servants, herein given, given
with the original written - & the wife will keep in her possession
and service each & every, till the time appointed for distribution
for the mutual benefit of herself and the family remaining with her
from charge.

Twelfth. At the death or marriage of my said daughter Elizabeth,
that all the estate that I have, whether of land, Negroes

Shells, Rights or Credits, be equally divided among my children,
share and share alike, as set forth in the fourth and last
article. I nominate and appoint my wife Elizabeth Beall, execu-
trix, and Eliza, her executor of this my last will and testament,
lawfully working all other Wills by me made, Hoping they may through
a love of Justice, and veneration to my memory, impartially execute
each item of the same.

In testimony of all the foregoing, I have hereunto set my hand &
seal, the Twentieth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thou-
sand eight hundred and twenty two, in the presence of these good
witnesses, who I have requested to sign the same in testimony
hereby done
