I, Elizabeth D Fulghum of said State and county, being of advanced age and knowing that I must shortly depart from this world, I deem it right and proper both as respects myself and my family, that I should make a disposition of the property, with which a kind Providence has blessed me.

I therefore make this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking and annulling all others heretofore made by me.

Item first:
I desire and direct, that my body be buried in a decent and christianlike manner, suitable to my circumstances and condition, my soul, I trust, shall return to rest with God, who gave it, as I hope for eternal salvation, through the blessed word and Saviour Jesus Christ, whose religion I have professed and as I humbly trust, have enjoyed for a number of years.

Item second:
I desire and direct, that all my just debts be paid without delay by my executors herein named

Item third:
I desire and direct, that one hundred and fifty Dollars be taken from my estate and used in having erected at the grave of my dear husband John D Fulghum in the Bethlehem Cemetery in said county one slate a good monument or tomb stone, in that amount of money will, notwithstanding the style and height, I submit to the judgment of my executors.

I give and devise to my beloved daughter Adeline F Fulghum and Emma A. burnning my lot in the town of Middleville in said Co. no reversion

with all the rights, members and abutments to said lot of land in any wise belonging, with its following directions. The lot to be bequeathed to my daughter Anna named for their home, but if either of them find it to be her interest, not to reside on the lot, the one so desiring shall have no power or authority to sell or rent her interest, but the full control shall be in the one residing on the lot. If both of them should find it to their interest, to reside elsewhere, then by mutual consent they may rent the lot, but in no case sell. If one of them should die, the property shall remain in the hands of the other until she also shall die, then the property shall be sold and the monies thus divided among their respective legal heirs.

Item fifth:

I give and bequeath to my beloved daughter Amarintha E. Deal wife of H. S. Deal Fifty Dollars for her own use.

Item sixth:

The rest of my property, both real and personal wherever and whatsoever it may be, I desire and direct that it be equally divided between my legal heirs.

Item seventh:

I constitute and appoint my beloved sons W. H. and G. D. Duggan Executors to this my last Will and Testament, this May 22nd, 1885.
