I, Jane D Summer being of sound and disposing mind and memory and considering the uncertainty of this world do make and declare this my last will and Testament in manner and form following

Item 1 I give, bequeath and devise to my grand daughters Nancy Jordan and Martha J Jordan to be equally divided between them, all my household and kitchen furniture except one bed, and all my personal property except what horses, mules, cows and hogs, I may be possessed of at the time of my death.

Item 2 I devise that as soon after my death as is practicable and proper, that the place upon which I now reside containing two hundred and fifteen acres more or less, as well as the live stock I may own at the time of my death be sold and all my just debts be paid.

Item 3 To my grand children Robert Jackson Summer, John Thomas Summer William Summer and Georgie Ann Tate, children of my deceased son William H Summer, I give each Three Dollars.

Item 4 To my grand daughter Susan Della Summer the child of my deceased son William H Summer, I give the sum of Twenty Five Dollars.

Item 5 To my son James Alexander Summer I give one bed, which will be my own designated. It is not delivered to him until my death.

Item 6th After the above mentioned amounts have been paid, it is my will that the remainder of the money arising from the sale of my property as before mentioned be divided into seven equal parts or annuities.

Item 7th To the children of my deceased son Benjamin D. Summer I give one part, to be equally divided among them. Their names are, Robert, Ann Eliza Smith, Alexander and John Gordon.

Item 8th To the children of my deceased daughter Martha Ann Gordon I give one part to be equally divided among them. Their names are, Sallie Smith, Susan Jane Trindle, Emma Gordon, John Gordon, Annie G. Gordon, Nancy Gordon, Ann Lindsey and Martha Lindsey.

Item 9th To James Alexander Summer, J. R. Summer, Eliza Griffin, Mary Trice and Susan Griffin, my children now in life, I give each one part or one seventh of my property after the smaller bequests mentioned in the first five items of this will have been paid.

Item 10th I hereby constitute and appoint my son J. R. Summer Executor of this and last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all others heretofore made by me.
