I do therefore make this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking and annulling all others by me heretofore made.

Item 1st I desire and direct that my body be buried in a decent christian like manner, suitable to my circumstances and condition in life. My soul I trust shall return to rest with God who gives life, as I hope for salvation through the merits and atonement of the blessed Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Item 2^d I desire and direct, that all my just debts be paid without delay by my executors hereinafter named and appointed.

Item 3^d I give bequeath and devise to my eldest wife, Sarah of my estate both real and personal during her natural life, unless she intermarries then at her death or intermarriage, then I direct that said real estate both real and personal, be equally divided amongst my children.

I hereby constitute and appoint my two eldest sons, to wit: John E. Harrison and William H. Harrison my Executors of this my last Will and Testament.
