In the name of God Amen

I Thomas H Brown of the County and State aforesaid, being low in health but of sound and disposing mind and memory, do make and ordain the following to be my last Will and Testament, as follows to wit.

Item 1<sup>o</sup> I give bequeath and divide unto my brother Evans H Brown all of my right title and interest in the undivided tract of land in said County in the acton of William Swamp abjoining lands of the estate of John Hillville and others wherein my Father Waudley Brown died, the interest in said Land I hold may be seen by refferrence to the last Will and testament of the said Waudley Brown Also my Horse and Buggy to my said Brother Evans H. Brown and his heirs forever

Item 2<sup>o</sup> I give bequeath and divide to my two youngest Brothers George and Alexander Brown all of my interest in and to eleven negro Slaves to wit Sarah a Woman, Hannah a Woman, George a Woman and her infant child Mitchell, Virginia a girl Jack a boy. Sam a boy, Dayman a boy, Melia a Boy, and Laura a girl. My interest in the said negroes being one third of which negroes are now in the hands and possession of Brown & Brown as executors of myself and two youngest Brothers named in this Item, To them the said George and Alexander Brown their heirs and assigns forever

I Joseph Warren of the said State and County being of advanced age and knowing that I must shortly depart this life, deem it right and proper both as respects my family and myself, that I should make a disposition of the property with which a kind Providence has blessed me. Do therefore make this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all others heretofore made by me.

1<sup>st</sup> I desire and direct that my body be buried in a decent and Christian like manner suitable to my circumstances and condition in life. My soul I trust shall return to rest with God who gave it.

2<sup>nd</sup> I desire and direct that all my just debts be paid without delay by my executors hereinafter appointed

3<sup>rd</sup> I desire and direct that in case my beloved and afflicted wife Carter should be living when I depart this life that all my estate remain undivided during her natural life, and that my executors hereinafter appointed see that she is decently supported from the proceeds of the same, and

in decease to be distributed as follows  
4<sup>th</sup> I desire and direct that my three Slaves, Mr. Charlotte Scotty and  
Gunny, with their increase with all the notes, accounts, and money found  
in my possession except ten dollars be equally divided among my  
beloved Sons viz John Emmet Harrison Lewis Jenkins Harrison  
Davy Washington Harrison Joseph Daniel Harrison, James  
Madison Harrison Leaborn Uriah Harrison Benjamin Thomas  
Harrison to them and their issue, And if any of my beloved  
Sons above named, should die without issue, that his part of said  
estate be equally divided among the remaining Sons.

5<sup>th</sup> I give and bequeath to my beloved Daughter, Nancy Jones,  
New Ven. dollars,

6<sup>th</sup> I hereby Constitute and appoint my beloved Sons Lewis  
Jenkins Harrison and Davy Washington Harrison Executors of  
this my last Will and testament this 10<sup>th</sup> February 1858,
