I Matthew Sulphurn of said State and County of Washington, being of advanced age of sound mind and memory deem it right and proper both as respects my family and myself, that I should make a disposition of the property, with which a kind Providence has blessed me. I do therefore hereby revoke all former wills by me at any time made and make, publish and declare the following to be my last will and testament.

Item 1st I will my soul to God the giver and my body to the grave in decent burial suitable to my circumstances and condition in life.

Item 2^d I will that all my just debts be paid without delay by my executors hereinafter named and appointed and the residue of my estate I bequeath to my daughter Emma & my wife of John May and my wife Sarah E. Sulphurn in the way and manner herein after mentioned.

3^d My daughter Emma & May who is now the wife of John May I have already given and turned over to her a plantation and tract of land containing in all six hundred and fifty acres. Two hundred acres of which I turned over to her as heir and legatee of the estate of her grandfather Lewis Fisher, the said two hundred acres being her full and complete share of said estate and the remaining two hundred and fifty acres being given out of my estate which I rate to her at the price and value of thirty five hundred Dollars the said land as given to my said daughter together with twenty Dollars more which I direct my executors to pay to her is to be her full entire and complete share of my estate.

4th The balance of my estate both real and personal or mixed of whatever kind and of rights and credits I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Sarah E. Sulphurn to her sole and separate use for and during the term of her natural life and at her death to her children, but in case that my said wife should die leaving no children then I direct that the estate be equally divided and one half go to the children of my said daughter and the other half to the children of William L. Fisher of the said state and county of Washington, that is what I mean by the estate as to be divided as above mentioned is the remainder or what may remain at the death of my said wife. She while living is not to be debared from living on the corpus of the estate as well as the rents and issues.

5th I hereby nominate and appoint my trusty and worthy nephews to wit William H. Sulphurn and Jacob A. Sulphurn Executors of my last Will and testament, hereby revoking all former wills by me at any time made.
