I, William L. Anderson of said State and County, being of sound and disposing mind and memory, do make this my last Will and Testament.

Item 1st I give, bequeath and devise to my daughter Martha E. L. Anderson the following property to wit: One hundred acres of land, known as the "Homestead" place. Also one mule and one hundred and fifty bushels of corn set aside for her and her mother free from all charge and limitation whatever to her own proper use, benefit and behoof.

Item 2nd I give, bequeath and devise to my daughter Mary Howard the following property to wit: Twenty acres of land, bounded on the south by Cochran, with an additional twenty acres of land at her house during her life and at her death to her body heirs, free from all charge or limitation to her own proper use, benefit and behoof.

Item 3rd I give, bequeath and devise to my son John L. Anderson, twenty acres of land, known as the "Homestead" place, with an additional twenty acres at his house to his own proper use, benefit and behoof.

Item 4th I give, bequeath and devise to my son Evans H. Anderson, eight acres more or less of land bounded on the north by C. L. Osline on the north west by C. L. Gilbert with an additional twenty acres of land with or at his house to his own proper use benefit and behoof.

Item 5th I give, bequeath and devise to my son W. L. Anderson, fifty three acres of land bounded on the south by Cochran, on the east by C. L. Evans with an additional two acres at his house to his own proper use, benefit and behoof.

Item 6th I give, bequeath and devise to my three grand children, James L. Anderson, Emma Anderson, and Anna Ann Anderson

the following property to wit: Fifty six acres of land, found on east of D. & Crane on the north by C. H. Johnson. The said land shall be equally divided and made until the youngest child shall become of age, it shall then be until that time three years until the said land be paid out to said children, as the trustee may see fit they need. And if any of the children shall become of age, the trustee cannot find them, the trustee shall not have money out of interest. And when these children become of age, that is when the youngest child shall come of age, the said land shall be sold, and the money shall be distributed equally between said children. And if said children should not live to become of age, the land and proceeds of said lands shall come back to my children.

Item 7. I hereby constitute and appoint my friend Jacob Jackson, trustee of these grant children.

Item 8. The Childrens shall come together and sell all outlying property, as they see fit, and have all debts, and if any money left from the sale of such property shall be paid to my children.

Item 9. I will give to my wife Martha Anderson, my wife, thirty dollars from the following farms: Ten dollars from J. J. Anderson, ten dollars from J. M. Anderson, and ten dollars from John Howard, as an additional support.

Item 10. I hereby constitute and appoint my sons W. J. Anderson, J. L. Anderson, son and W. H. Howard, trustees of this will and testament. This 22 day of July 1880.

The following Codril is added to this my will.

It is my intention as to the property given in the last item of my will, that my wife Martha Anderson shall have a life estate in the land given to my daughter Martha J. Anderson, namely, one hundred acres known as the home place, so as to secure a home in and around, and also as much of the household and kitchen furniture, utensils, and farmstock for our horse and provisions besides care out of my estate to feed her and my daughter and their stock for one year, also a cow and calf and as she may select, and one acre to each, my wife and my daughter as chosen to them in my life, and after the death of my wife to become the property of my said daughter Martha J. Anderson.
