

Wiley H. Dean's Will

State of Georgia, White County

In the name of God Amen

I Wiley H. Dean of said State and county knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die herein it right and proper both as respects myself and family that I should make a disposition of the estate with which a hand Providence has blessed me, I therefore make this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking and annulling all others heretofore made by me.

Item first. I desire and direct that my body be buried in a decent and Christian like manner suitable to my circumstances and condition My soul I trust shall return to rest with God who gave it, & I hope for eternal salvation the blessed Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Item Second. I desire and direct that all my just debts be paid without delay, my Executor being advised as I am unwilling my creditors should be the objects of their rights especially as there is no necessity for delay.

Item Third. I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Anna for and during the natural life or widowhood all of my property both real and personal whatsoever and whatsoever it may be for the purpose of maintenance and education my children under the direction and supervision of my Executor and should my wife marry & wish her to have the use of the tract of land so long as she lives, and it has truth to be sold and the proceeds equally divided among my children and at her marriage all of the property to be sold (except the land) and the proceeds of such sale to be equally divided between my wife and children.

And I hereby appoint James H. Dean my Executor to this my last will and testament who witness whereof I the said Wiley H. Dean to this my will consisting of the foregoing three pages of paper have set my hand and seal this 12th day of February 1863.

was about to leave his home for the Army
that he was in his usual good health and
was under no bias or influence in the course of
mind - that the same was done calmly and
with good mind, and that the same was done
on the day it purports to be in its date
