[PRIVATE—No. 311.]

An act for the relief of Mary Newton.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Interior be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to place on the pension-roll the name of Mrs. Mary Newton, the daughter and only surviving heir of John Jordan, of the Continental Line, in the war of the Revolution, and to pay her at the rate of twelve dollars per month from and after the passage of this act.

Approved, March 2, 1880.

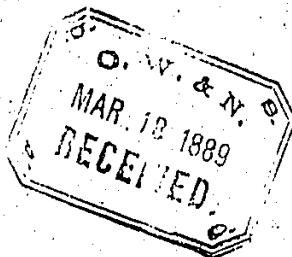

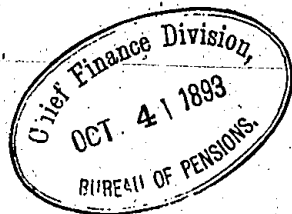

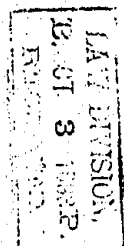

on this third day of October eighteen hundred & forty six personally appeared before the honorable the Judge of the Superior Court held in & for the County of Washington aforesaid. Winifred Jordan a resident of said County, aged eighty four years. who being first duly sworn according to law, doth upon her oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed the seventh day of July in the year 1838 intitled an act granting half pay & pensions to certain widows. Saith that she is the widow of John Jordan deceased, who was rather under the middle stature as to height short & square built. of a complexion red hair eyes blue by some might be called gray would have been if he had lived to this time about eighty ~~eighty~~ years of age, that she was married to said John at the house of George Jordan, her father in law in the state of North Carolina, Northampton County, by Samuel Smith a Justice of the peace about three years after the surrender of Cornwallis on the first Sunday in February and as well as she now can recollect in the year 1784 seventeen hundred & eighty four, that said John was following overseing, & the first year they lived with John Smith in Grunwell County state of Virginia, then with Simon Turner then with Henry Bayley, then settled off to themselves, from there moved to Washington County state of Georgia, when she now lives & when said John died on the seventh day of August eighteen hundred and

twenty eight that she is still a widow never having married since the death of said John.

As to the intestment & services of said John she only knows from rumor at the time of his intestment he being a family connection it was spoken of in the connection & what he has told her of the matter, which is in part as follows... He said he intested as a private in the Continental Service, in Grenville County state of Virginia, was under Captain Francis Moore, & Col Eldred. She does not recollect if these were the first officers he was under but he spoke of them as favorite officers. She does not recollect what was the time he intested for, whether he intested for three years or for a longer time & served three years, but as he was a regular soldier these facts will be found on the records at the War Department, & will be more satisfactory. He said he was with the army to the south in Florida was taken or surrendered to the British at the fall of Savannah in Georgia, that he was put on board a prison ship for three months & seven days, was exchanged & permitted to pass through his native county, Grenville Virginia on his way to join the army, that he was at the taking of Com wallen, and soon after that event was discharged & returned home to Amy Hargis in his native state & county had a small farm. She says that her memory is weak from old age & she may have related the facts rather in an irregular manner but as the records of her husband's army will show most of the material facts. Her husband stated to her that the papers which he got from his officers when he left the service he had put in the hands of some one who she does not now recollect to obtain for him his lands &c and that he had not got either land or papers back, Her husband never applied for a pension, she further says that she has no

record of her marriage nor is there any to her knowledge
and no record was kept in the County when she was mar-
ried as appears by a certificate of the Clerk of that County
accompanying this application.

Ferrigan has made the foregoing extract of the marriage of "John Jordan and Winifred his wife", deponent father and mother, the said Winifred being the parent applicant for a pension as widow of said John Jordan; is, to the deponent's knowledge the family Register of the said John Jordan deceased.

He further deposes, that said register has been suppressed, for the last twelve months to be lost, but within the last month, and since the application of said Winifred to the department for her pension, the said register has been recovered, the same having been in the possession of one Mrs Mary Newton young and daughter of said John deceased, and residing at Athens in this State some eighty miles or more from the former residence of said John deceased, where deponent and his mother the said Winifred now reside and have since in the

We the undersigned Justices of the Superior Court for said County do hereby certify that satisfactory evidence has been exhibited to us that John Jordan died in August A.D. 1828 leaving a widow Winifred Jordan, who survived him and remained his widow up to the time of her death which occurred on the Sixth day of July 1847 and that she died leaving only five children, Lemit, Green Jordan, Burwell Jordan, John Jordan Patience Saffold, formerly Patience Jordan and Mary Newton formerly Mary Jordan Given under our hands and private seals this the 25th day of March 1852

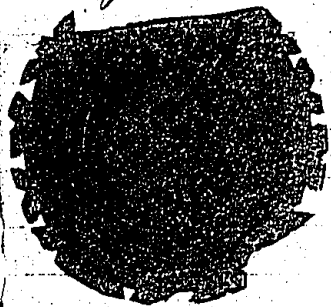

John Jordan died in Washington County, Georgia, August 17, 1838 and his wife Winifred survived him, the date of her death is not stated.

The daughter Mrs. Mary Newton was allowed pension by a special act of Congress, dated March 2, 1889, on account of her father's services as a soldier of the Revolution.

It is stated that he enlisted in Greenville County, Virginia, served as a Private, that a part of his service was under Captain Francis Moore and Colonel Elbert. Also that he was captured at the surrender of Savannah and was exchanged after an imprisonment of three months and seventeen days and that he was at the surrender of Cornwallis. The date of his enlistment and discharge are not stated.
