On this the 14th Day of May
1864 Personally appeared before me a Justice of the
Peace for Scott County Ky Peter Brumback a resi-
-dent of Scott County Ky of the age of Eighty years
who being duly sworn according to Law hath on
his oath made the following Declaration in order
to obtain the Bounty Land given to those who
entered for the term of serving the war & ended
till its close, that he entered in the Army of the
United States for the term of serving the war in 1799
on the grounds having previously served three years
in the State of Georgia under Col. Everts major
Stark & Capt. William Lane in which time he
entered that he entered for serving the war in the
third Regt of the Dragoons under the Command
of Col. Wm. Washington in the Tenth Regt. Comm.
by Capt. Parsons and served until the close of the war
under those officers whom he was discharged in Capt.
Mung at Winchester in Ind. by Virginia with
a regular discharge with by some accident ^{has} been
lost, that having escaped from the British by whom
he had been taken prisoner he met with Watson
the Regiment in North Carolina he entered as
above stated that after he entered he was under
the same officers, that he was at the Battle of
Cairo's Commanded by Col. Morgan then at Jefferson
County Pa. Gen. Green Commanded also at the Battle
of Antietam 2^d Battle of Gettysburg & the Battle
of the Wilderness & Springs all Commanded by Gen. Lee

Where Col Washington was taken Prisoner in the
Battle the Applicant was Wounded in the thigh
by a misdirected Ball that during this service he was
Marched through North & South Carolina & Georgia
Sworn to & Subscribed the day & year above mentioned

Shelby Circuit Court June Term 1820

On this 30th day of June 1820 personally appeared
in open Court being a Court of Record of Common
Law and Criminal Jurisdiction Peter Brumback
aged about Sixty six years resident in the said
County & State who being first duly sworn
according to Law doth on the oath declare that he
served in the revolutionary war as follows that he
enlisted in the service in the month of January
1777 for the term of three years, in the Company
commanded by Capt. William Lane and Regt.
commanded by Col. Elliot of the State of Virginia
line and the Continental establishment and was
discharged from service in Charleston in the State
of South Carolina in the year 1779 or 1780 that
he afterwards enlisted in Capt. M. M. M. M. M. M.
regiment of Light Dragoons for & during the war.

He further states that he made applica-
tions by his declaration for a pension dated the
thirtieth day of September 1818 and received
his pension Certificate dated 5 July 1819 No. 324
he further states that he is old and very infirm
being entirely unable to do hard labor he follows
the occupation of farming but is unable to attend
to it &c. &c. he has a wife who is old & helpless
and four children living with him two sons
and two daughters the sons one nine years
old, and one seven years of age, the daughters
one fourteen years of age, and the other twelve
years of age his children are helpless and not
able to render him any or very little aid in his

Occupation & And I do solemnly swear that, I was
a resident citizen of the United States on the 18th
day of March 1818. and that I have not since
disposed of my property or any part thereof with
intent thereby to diminish it or to bring
myself within the provisions of an act of
Congress entitled an act to provide for certain
persons engaged in the land and naval service
of the United States in the revolutionary war
passed 18th day of March 1818. and that I
have not now has any persons in trust for me
any property or securities contracts or debts
due to me nor have I any income other than
what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed.

In order to obtain the benefit
of the Third section of the Act of
Congress - passed 1st July 1834

That This declarant After first
being duly sworn - do make the following
Declaration - do state that she is Eighty
Two years of Age now in her 83rd year
and was born in Fairfax County State of
Virginia - and then Elizabeth Simpson and
some two or three years after the close of
the Revolution of the War with Great Britain
I married My Husband Peter Brumback
that is now dead - who departed this ^{4th} 6th of
April 1846 - who was a revolutioner Soldier
and pensioner at his death - whose name
will be found in the War Department
on the pension Roll - We Emigrated from
Virginia to Kentucky in the year 1804 and
settled in Lincoln County and State above said
then moved to Garrett County then then to
Nelson County then moved to Shelby City
then from Shelby to Campbell City and from
Campbell - to Boone County where we have
resided for the last 20 odd years - This affiant
further states - that she is the widow of Pe-
ter Brumback and ^{the} first and last Wife he
ever had and I have never married since the
death of my husband to no man - This affiant
further states that she has no knowledge of her
Husbands ever trading or conveying his
title of Bounty land to any person

This Plaintiff further prays for a Certificate and -
Grant for the same. This Affiant further
states she is mother of 12 Children - the oldest
about 42 or 43 years of age to the best of
her recollection - my Record is lost -
This Affiant further prays that she may
be granted a pension under the act of Congress
past 5th July 1836. - If not that you grant me
a pension under the act of 1832 granting
widows half pay for five years - she hereby
Relinquishes Every Claim What Ever to any
pension Except the present one - that her
name is not Enrolled on the pension Roll
in Any State or Territory - that she lives at
Remote distance from the County seat
and is not able to appear in open Court
This Affiant further saitheth not - sworn
to and subscribed this 20th of March 1848

of Camm's Parish now it there shall be no lawful cause to ob-
struct the said intended marriage then the above obligation to
be void else to remain in force and virtue.

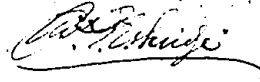

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War record of Peter Brumback.

The data furnished herein were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, W. 8400, based upon the Revolutionary War service of Peter Brumback.

The date and place of his birth are not stated, nor are the names of his parents shown.

Peter Brumback enlisted in January, 1777 and served as a private in Captain William Lane's company, Colonel Elbert's Georgia regiment; he was taken prisoner at Sunbury, Georgia, but made his escape from the British, and enlisted in 1779, at Hillsboro, North Carolina, served as a private in Captains John Linton's, Parsons' and Morrow's companies, Colonel William Washington's Regiment of Light Dragoons. He was in the battles of Reedy River, Camden, where wounded in his left arm, battles of Cowpens, Guilford Court House, where he received a gunshot wound in the groin, Siege of Ninety-Six, and battle of Eutaw Springs, where he was shot in the right thigh. He served until close of the war.

After the Revolution, Peter Brumback lived in Fairfax County, Virginia, in 1806 moved to Lincoln County, Kentucky, thence to Garrard County, to Nelson County, and then to Shelby County. He was allowed pen-

sion on his application executed, September 30, 1818, then a resident of Shelby County, Kentucky and gave his age, seventy years. In 1820, he gave his age, sixty-six years, still a resident of Shelby County; in 1834, he was living in Boone County, Kentucky and gave his age, eighty years.

The soldier, Peter Brumback, married in January, 1788, Elizabeth Simpson of Cameron Parish. The marriage bond was issued in Loudoun County, Virginia, January 10, 1788. He died April 6, 1848 in Boone County, Kentucky.

His widow, Elizabeth Brumback, was allowed pension on her application executed, March 20, 1848, while residing in Boone County, Kentucky, aged about eighty years. She was born in Fairfax County, Virginia, date not given, nor are the names of her parents stated.

In 1848, the widow stated that she was the mother of twelve children. In 1820, two daughters, aged fourteen years and twelve years, and two sons, aged nine years and seven years, were referred to; no names of children given.

George Simpson, brother of the widow, Elizabeth Brumback, was seventy-three years of age in 1848 and then a resident of Boone County, Kentucky.
