North Carolina -
County of Surry

On the 13th day of February
1828 Personally appears in open Court
William Algood resident of said
county aged sixty seven years who
being first duly sworn according to
Law doth on his oath ~~testify~~ make
the following Declaration in order to
obtain the provision made by the Acts
of Congress of the 18th March 1818 and
the 1st of May 1820. that he the said
William Algood Entered for the Term
of Three years on the 11th day of
November 1770 in the State of Virginia
in the Company commanded by Captain
Isaac Hicks in the regiment commanded
by Colo. Scriven. (who was a Native of
Georgia) he was enlisted for service in
the State of Georgia and directly marched
thence) on the Southern Continental
Establishment. that he continued to serve
in the said ~~Company~~ ~~unit~~ was marched
from Virginia to Savannah in the State

of Georgia. in about the month of May
1777. he was taken from the Company of Capt
Necks and put under the command of Capt
Elihu Nash - a Company of Light
Infantry. he remained ~~in~~ in the
said Company until the siege of Fort Mifflin
where he was under Major Lane and was
taken prisoner at the surrender of the
Fort - When as a prisoner he was marched
down to Lancaster and transferred to
the Wherry Prison Ship where he remained
nine months & five days - When he made
his escape at the time the siege of
Lancaster by Gen Lincoln & the Coast Defense
was going on - he found his regiment broken
up but continued with the army until
the retreat to Charleston. When he was
discharged he believed by Gen McIntosh
from the service - that he hereby relinquished
every claim whatever to a Pension except
the present - that his name is not on
the Roll of any State except that of
Georgia (except this that afterwards he
served in the Company of Captain ^{Michely} Rudolph
of the Infantry in the Legion commanded
by Col. Richard Lee in which which

Corps he served for eighteen months. When
he was discharged at Salisbury - he was in
the attack upon Georgetown on the 22^d Dec^r and
was at the taking of the Scotch Lake fort
on Panther near Nelsons Ferry - also at
Motts Hill near Col Thompson, on Congaree
and also at Friday, Ferry on Congaree
also at Golfing Port below Augusta on
Savannah River - also at Augusta. From
that we went to assist Gen Green at Rich-
mond - and he was also at the Battle of the
Catawba Springs - he made application
seven years since for a Pension but is
informed that the papers are lost -

And in pursuance of the Act of the 1st
May 1820 I do solemnly swear that I was
a resident Citizen of the United States on
the 18th day of March 1818 and that I
have not since that time in gift sale or
in any manner disposed of my property
or any part thereof with intent thereby
so to diminish it as to bring myself
within the provisions of an Act of Congress
entitled "an act to provide for certain
Persons engaged in the Land and Naval
Service of the United States in the Revolu-
tionary War passed on the 18th of March
1818 and that I have not nor has any

person in trust for me any property or
Security, contracts, or debts due to
me have I any income other than what
is contained in the Schedule hereto annexed
and by me subscribed. that since the
10thth March 1818 the following changes
have taken place in my property -

In the Jan 1818 he had ^{William's also} 10 tolerable horses
six head of cattle. Ten Hogs - some plain household
stuff - the Hogs he sold to John Edlin for
forty five dollars the other to David Baker for
thirty five - he has a wife aged 2 infirm
and four daughters who have been very
unhealthy - and the little property he had
then has gradually gone to pay the rent
of the place he lives on (for he owns no
land) and to pay doctor bills and other
unavoidable expenses - his property now
consists of

11 small Hogs. his few debts and 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ Bay Horses
a loom plates one of 10 bushels Corn -
a pot & 2 very domestic Earthen Ware and much enough
3 Hogs a stack fodder to last to June -
2 Ploughs = 40 Bushels of Rye which is now engaged
to Col. Spear for the Rent of the land last
Year - I am in debt about one Hundred
Dollars in all.

I have been sickly for some years and

am incapable of supporting myself and
will be rendered completely destitute unless
aided by my country or charity - his age
and infirm wife also living upon ^{his} little
means

certify that it appears to the satisfaction
of the Court that the said William Algood
did serve in the Revolutionary War as stated
in the preceding Declaration against the common
enemy for the Term of Nine Months under our
engagement on the Continental Establishment.

I also certify that the foregoing Oath and
the Schedule thereto annexed are truly copies
from the Record of said Court and I do further
certify that it is the opinion of the said Court
that the total amount of the value of the property
exhibited in the aforesaid Schedule is Twenty Dollars.

Court on the 13 day of February 1828.

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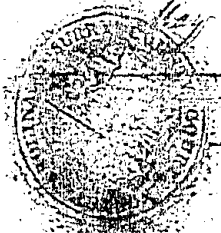

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War record of William Allgood who served from Virginia and later moved to Elbert County and other counties in Georgia and who, you state, served also in the War of 1812 from Elbert County, Georgia, with William Allgood, Jr. in the same organization.

Revolutionary War and War of 1812 data furnished by the Veterans Administration are obtained from claims for pension and bounty land which have been made to the United States based upon service in that war.

There is only one such Revolutionary War claim on file based upon service of a William Allgood. That soldier enlisted in Virginia, served in the Georgia troops and Continental line, in the Revolutionary War, but it is not shown that he served in the War of 1812. It may be that your records are confused. A search of the War of 1812 has been made and claims for bounty land found based upon service in that war of a William Allgood, Senior, and a William Allgood, Junior, who served in the same company, both too young to have served in the Revolutionary War. The records of all three soldiers are furnished you herewith, as the data may aid you materially in your research. It is not shown that any relationship existed between these three soldiers.

Your Allgood genealogical chart is returned herewith.
