By Last Night's Mail.

We have it from an authentic source, that Commodore DECATUR is appointed to command the first squadron now fitting out at New-York, and destined for the Mediterranean. This squadron is to consist of five frigates, and will be accompanied by the squadron of small vessels originally intended to be under the command of Captain PORTER.—The Commodore will display his broad pendant on board the Guerriere.

United States' Creditors.
