

J. S. Hopper, Atlantian On Transport Sunk by Submarines, Is Saved

J. S. Hopper, twenty-three years old, an Atlanta boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Hopper, of 25 Highland View, who was on the transport President Lincoln, which was torpedoed several days ago while on its way back to America, is safe somewhere in England. News of his rescue was received by his parents here in a telegram from the naval department Tuesday night, although no information was given as to the whereabouts of the young man.

Mr. Hopper enlisted in the navy two years ago this month and was classed as a first class fireman. It was his sixth trip across the Atlantic and during his

service he had several exciting trips. Recently he was presented a gold stripe for six months' service in the war zone.

Mr. Hopper was aboard the President Lincoln when it was attacked by a submarine 800 miles off the coast of England Friday. Before entering the service he was a mechanic employed in Atlanta. He has a large number of friends in this city. Besides his mother and father he has three sisters, Mrs. J. L. Folsom, Mrs. A. L. Steel and Miss Grace Hopper, all of Atlanta. There was great rejoicing at the Hopper homestead Tuesday night following the receipt of the telegram.
