





Calverley Church.

DURING the period which elapsed from the middle of the 17th, almost to the middle of the present century, there is not much to be gleaned relating to Calverley Church, from anything but the churchwardens' accounts, and documents relating to tithes. There was very little church-building done anywhere during that time, and the few specimens of sacred architecture belonging to the period, which we possess, do not make us long for more.

For some time, the standard of natural taste—in matters architectural especially—had been much debased, and our beautiful Gothic buildings had consequently been sorely neglected. During the five previous centuries, Englishmen had been the means of erecting and enlarging a vast number of churches, the glory of which has never since been equalled. Afterwards, the rule would seem to have been rather to mar as much as possible, the studious and graceful work of early church builders, than to carry it on. In the churchwardens' accounts, we repeatedly find mention of sums paid for such tasteless acts as plastering and white-washing the walls, which were meant to be left bare ; covering up with hideous ceilings the grand old open oak roofs, painting the oak wood-work, stripping the lead from the roofs ; erecting galleries ; blocking up arches ; and, under the pretext of “ beautifying,” altogether destroying the graceful and elaborate features of our churches.

The old church at Calverley did not escape. Instances of this will be seen further on. Perhaps one or two may be pointed out here. In 1773, the nave roof was altered, and it was most probably at this date that it was lowered several

feet below its original pitch, (to which it is now restored,) and slated, in lieu of the old lead covering. No mention is made of how the money which the alteration cost was raised—the lead would amply repay that. The ceilings are often mentioned in the church accounts. About the same time as the roof was tampered with, the church was under-drawn, plastered, and whitewashed, at a cost of £8. In 1870, the nave pillars were found to have been whitewashed, plastered, then whitewashed again, painted like marble, coloured yellow, then drab, and lastly, (though built of stone,) painted “stone-colour”! The ancient oak font-cover had been painted to imitate oak. The stone-work did not escape. The tracery of the clerestory windows had been roughly hewn away, and several other atrocities committed.

The Vicar of Calverley in 1650, was Richard Waugh. It seems that his reputation was satisfactory to the Commissioners appointed by the Commonwealth Government, as, in the report made by them, he is described as “an able, constant preacher,” a character which stands in bold contrast to those given of some of the clergymen of the day. An abstract of the report is now in the British Museum (*Lansdowne MSS.* 459, &c.). It was taken about 1654, in order to make way for giving effect to an Act passed for ejecting so-called “scandalous, ignorant, and insufficient” ministers. The following is an extract of the part relating to Calverley parish :—

The following letter from Richard Waugh to Henry Calverley, lord of the manor of Calverley, is of great interest. The spelling is printed as in the original, but the punctuation is inserted.

"For the Right Worshipfull Henery Calverley, Esq., this.

Sr.,

My service remembered, &c.—I have written 3 or 4 letters, sent you by severall carriers, but received no answeare. It may be they miscarried. Therefore, now haveing opportunity to send by your son, I am bold to certify you that seing Edw. Harrison flitts* out of Calverley, a frend of myne desires to be your tenant in Calverley at 10*l.* or 16*l.* p. ann.. he is an excellent blacksmith, versed in horse-shoeing, & locks making, and hath an estate of 200*l.* in money and goods, as he informs me. I desire you to entertain him; he is able to pay his rent, and fyne also, if you please soe to let your land. Here are great braggs concerning a new lord of Pudsey, but made in cupps: I hope you will not pull that flower out of your garland, haveing means and ways to raise 1200*l.* by woods and.....or fines in letting your lands: or if you resolved to part with it, yet not for 1200*l.* You may have 600*l.* more for it. I heard Lumley say he durst undertake it. Pardon my boldness. I hope you will not let Dickson† goe away with the profits of the lands, but make the best of an ill match. I was with Collonell Ashton the elder, & Sr. Jo. Kay, who both of them remembered you in a cupp of wine. They were sorry you did not compound sooner, especially Sir Jo. Kay, seeing (said he) he must nedē be one of us against his will. Mr. Charles Fairfax continues Collonell. I pray God, whilst he has not..... . beene fighting which.....he not lost some litle of that litle goodness he had, he has gott pride and..... 2 that Richard 2 daughters (?) & its reported, though my Lord Savil be Baron of Pontefract, yet Mr. Ch. shall have K. Charles his parke there. Your frends are in health, and all do wish the continuance of yours. And I myself complain of the want of your presence, & my losse by your too long absence. Sectaries increase dayly; never more preaching, nor lesse practiceinge. Many of the ministers Mrs differ not in opinion from a pore (?) cavalier priest, especially in the slaughter of our never to be forgotten pious K. Charles; but they that tyed his hands are in noe better condition than his condemners & executioners. It seems jealousys are not dead, but burning, because of quartering soldiers here in market townes; supposed to be a way to prevent insurrections, but *quæ supra nos; nihil ad nos.* Thus, with my hearty prayers for the continuance of God's special blessing and mercys upon the head of your selfe and yours, I comend you to God's grace, and remaine

Yours to be commanded ever, in what I can pleasure you.

this 24th of June (1649 or 1650. S.M.) Ric. Waugh."

† Nathan Dixon was tenant of Calverley under the Committee for Compounding for Sequestered Estates, and he received the rents in this capacity in 1649. See Add. MS. 27, 411, arts. 98 and 99.

The letter seems to have been written to Henry Calverley when he was in London, trying to come to a settlement with the Commissioners of Sequestered Estates. He had been forced to pay a very large fine as a composition to save his lands, or rather some of them. It is said he had to sell Seacroft to help himself out of his difficulties, but I have seen no documentary evidence of it. This was in consequence of his loyalty to the king during the late civil wars.*

The "new Lord of Pudsey," concerning whom there were such "great braggs," was most probably Tempest Milner, to whom Henry Calverley sold Pudsey in 1649, but re-purchased it. He again sold it to Robert Milner, Tempest's brother, in 1663.

Richard Waugh was followed in the vicarage by Benjamin Sandall, a native of Idle, in Calverley parish, who was appointed by Charles II.

During the next two years, the churchwardens' expenditure rose from its usual average of £5 or £6, to £10 11s. 4d., and £17 5s. 11d., respectively. Probably this was owing to alterations and repairs necessitated by the neglect and ill-usage of the fabric† during the Commonwealth, and by setting up the King's Arms, renewing the Communiou rails, purchasing a new Bible and the Book of Common Prayer; which the Archdeacon would order, unless his commands had been anticipated.

The parliamentary soldiers are said to have made the

† The monuments and tombstones, dating from the 16th century backwards, generally had brass plates let into them recording the name of the deceased. Often they had engraved upon them figures representing the deceased, sometimes with his family, and over all would be some such device or ejaculation, as "*Orate pro anima*," "*R. I. P.*" &c. When the Puritans were in the ascendant, these were among the things which they destroyed. One of the chief of these vandals, Wm. Dowsing, "by virtue of a pretended commission," went about the country, (i.e. Norfolk, Suffolk, and Cambridgeshire,) says a contemporary account, "like a bedlam, breaking glasse windows, having battered and broken down all our painted glasse, not only in our Chappells but (contrary to order) in our Public Schools, College Halls, Libraries, and Chambers, mistaking, perhaps, the liberal arts for Saints."—*Querela Cantabrigiensis*, quoted in Burn's *Hist. Par. Reg.*, 2d. ed., p. 101.

churches serve them as lodging-houses and stables ; and it is quite within the limits of possibility that they did so at Calverley ; for we have proof in an old MS. account, preserved in the British Museum (see *Additional Notes*, p. 199), that bodies of troops, under the command of Lord Fairfax, Colonel Cromwell, Lord Balcarries, &c., were billeted at Calverley, some of which were too numerous to be accommodated by the ordinary resources of the village at that time. What more natural than that they should shelter in the church !

We have seen how the Puritans made a pretty clean sweep of the stained glass and similar “abominations” throughout the country. We must now speak of a system which it is to be hoped the ecclesiologists of the present day may be equally successful in demolishing—that is the *pew* system. Many people will remember the day, quite recent, when a great variety of pews existed in Calverley Church. Though we did not possess a “conservatory pew,” that is, one with a glazed roof, as there used to be in some churches ; yet we had several specimens of the “family pew,” one of which bore undoubted testimony, in the shape of a soot-grimed wall (under the plaster) of having once possessed a stove or fireplace. We had some “high” pews with brass rods and crimson curtains, where many a novel has been read during service time. But this is all altered, so far as our church is concerned. There are now none but open seats ; one place is as good as another, and there can be no emulation for the “chief seats in the synagogue.” There is hardly any doubt that seats have been used in English churches since the earliest Christian days, the Anglo-Saxons in their illuminated MSS., sometimes representing congregations seated on low moveable stools. Then, right away to the seventeenth century a chain of evidence exists shewing that seats, at first moveable, and then fixed, were used in churches, but it is not until we come to the latter part of the 15th century that “pews,” in our sense of the term, are to be found.* But

* The earliest reference to pew-rents that I have seen is in a privately printed pamphlet, “A Caxton Memorial ; Extracts from the Churchwardens’ Accounts of the Parish of St. Margaret, Westminster,” &c. Mr. T. C. Noble there says that pew-rents were in existence at St. Margaret’s in 1478, in which year twenty were collected, and in 1480, forty-three.

now we come to the beginning of it. First, in many places, we find a pew appropriated to the lord of the manor, or the patron, a person who was always treated with great consideration in the matter of church accommodation. Coincident with the rise of Puritanism, the evil began rapidly to spread ; pews and galleries were erected, all rule and order in church arrangement were utterly lost sight of, and every man, who could, did what was right in his own eyes, each seized upon that portion of the church which seemed most convenient to him, “squeezing the poor man into a corner, or out of the church altogether.” The first of these appropriations that we have record of in Calverley was in 1606, and was “sett fforthe” by the then churchwardens as stated on p. 169, vol. 1. There were several re-allotments after that, which will be found in the “Register of Seats,” vol. 1, pp. 169—181. The one possessing most interest is the allotment of the seats in the chancel in 1628. Previous to this date it would seem that the chancel was free of seats. These “new seats” were in existence before 1670 ; plain, roughly-made, oak benches, which would have been unsightly objects in the restored church. Mr. Graunt, the vicar who erected them, called them “closets ;” and “like a prudent man, he repaid himself by their sale—a truly illegal act.”

The next alteration in the matter of sittings was in 1663. The register of allotments after this “repayring” mentions “ye old booke of churchwardens accounts, anno Dom. 1585.” Who does not wish that this “old booke” still existed ? It would doubtless have thrown a good deal of light on the state of the parish at the period immediately succeeding the Reformation.

Benjamin Sandall, a native of the parish, knew of the endless bickerings and troubles there had been about the continual alterations and re-allotments of the pews, so when he had got comfortably settled in the vicarage, one of his first acts was to register the seats according to the then disposition of them, and to let it be known that that was to be the only allotment he should allow, and that so “they should continue for his time without alteration.” The rest of the “register of seats” only records the changing of hands of single pews, and this only up to 1735.

Mr. Sandall's successor to the living was Samuel Ferrand, who became vicar on the 7th December, 1688. He was presented by King James the Second on that date, his appointment being one of that monarch's last acts before he quitted the realm (11th Dec., 1688). Mr. Ferrand was a member of the Ferrand family of St. Ives, near Bingley. His father, Benjamin Ferrand, Esq., who died Feb., 1699, married (18th Dec., 1645,) Martha the daughter of Edward Brokesbank, Esq., of Wilsden. He had, besides Samuel, three sons and four daughters. His eldest son, Robert, had two sons, the second of whom (Bradgate Ferrand, A.M., of Trinity College, Cambridge,) was vicar of Bradford. Our vicar was afterwards rector of Todwick, and vicar of Rotherham.* He had been baptized at Bingley, 24th Feb., 1644. He married, firstly in 1687, Anne Marsh, and secondly Dobson. By his first wife he had six sons—Benjamin, (who was in holy orders), Philip, James, Robert, Edward, and Fytch William Ferrand. The last-named son lived at St. James', Clerkenwell, and died 1st Nov., 1759, leaving a son Benjamin.

The rectorial or great tithes were at this time still in the hands of the Saviles. On p. 25 of vol. 1, it is conjectured that William Vernon and Christopher Naylor were trustees for Sir George Savile in the purchase of Calverley Rectory, and this turns out to have been the case. Through the kindness of S. J. Chadwick, Esq., I am able to give a copy of certain "Interrogatories" respecting the purchase.

Exchequer. 2 R. Miscellaneous. Charles 1st. p. 537.

"Interrogatories to be administered to witnesses to be produced on the parte and behalf of Christopher Nailer, gent., defendant, at the suite of the Kinge's most excellent Majestie, which now is plaintife, by information exhibited by his Highness Attorney Generall."

The 6th and last paragraph.

"Item, did not the said Sir George Savile in his life tyme deale with the late Right honorable Lodovike Duke of Lennox for the purchase of the Rectories of Wakefield Dewesburie Calverley Collingham and Bardsey & of the moiety of the Rectorie of Otley in the said county of Yorke in fee farme from our late soureigne Lord Kinge James ? How manie yeares value accordinge to the severall particulars thereof did he the said Sir George Savile give and pay to the said

*Foster's *Yorkshire Pedigrees*.

Late Duke of Lennox for the said premisses as you know or have crediblie heard? And was not the letters patents thereof thereupon taken and had from his late Majestie in the names of the said Willm Vernon and Christofer Nailor as Patentees in trust and confidence to and for the use of the said Sir George Savile & his heires and assignes and at the nomination of the said Duke? Declare your whole knowledge herein.

Fran. Nevile.
Greg[ory] Armitage."

But the Saviles were evidently Lessees of this Rectory before the reign of King James, as the following extract from the Calendar of Depositions by Commission will shew. (38th Rep. Dep. K. Pub. Rec. p. 260.)

Hilary Term. 31 Eliz. 1588. Commission 18 Nov. Interrogatories and Depositions. 8 Jan. at Bradfurth. No. 23. Plaintiff, George Savile. Defendant, Edw. Owldfeilde. Rectory or Parsonage of Calverley, and the towns villages or hamlets of Rodley, Priesthorpe, Farsley, Woodall, Bolton, & Wadlands, in Calverley parish. Whether the parsonage is parcel of the late dissolved chapel of St. Sepulchre, near York Cathedral. Tithes. (The names and possessions of Wm. Wade, Richard Welfitt, and Edward Chippendale, are mentioned.)

It has been stated (p. 25-6, vol. 1) that in 1692, Walter Calverley, Esq., commenced to buy the great tithes, so far as his lands in Calverley were concerned. This was probably led up to by an action which Elizabeth Ubaldino, Countess Dowager of Montfeltre, daughter of Henry Savile, Esq., of Bowling, brought against Walter Calverley, (4 Jas. II. 1688). She set forth that since 25th March, 1672, she had been seized in fee of and in the Rectory Improperiate of Calverley church and parish, and of all tithes both great and small, arising within Calverley. It appears that Walter Calverley occupied and possessed 100 acres of arable, 20 acres of meadow, and a quantity of pasture grounds in the parish, and that during the said years he "cut great quantities of grass, and made the same into hay." He also had great quantities of wheat and other corn cut, reaped, and "inned" (housed) in the same years. He also "did keep and depasture divers milch cows and sheep, and did yearly sheare the said sheep, the tithes of which were of considerable value." The plaintiff complained that defend-

ant refused to set forth his tithes, or permit plaintiff to receive them in kind, he believing that a modus was customarily paid for them, of 1s. 6d. for every "day's work with the plough," when the corn was reaped and inned. That at that time, and for time out of mind, such a modus had been paid to the Vicar of Calverley, as composition for tithe hay upon defendant's lands within the Rectory of Calverley. That the small tithes had been paid or satisfaction given for them to the Vicar of Calverley. That the defendant had always been ready and willing to pay the modus, but it had been refused. That, about 20 years before, the plaintiff, and Ann Savile, her sister, brought an action against defendant for tithes in kind of corn and hay, at York Assizes, but a verdict was given for defendant.

The cause was heard at Serjeants' Inn, on Friday, 14th July, 2 Jas. II. It was ordered by the court that the defendant should pay plaintiff tithe in kind for his lands in Calverley, for the years claimed. That £100 should be paid for the first fourteen years of the sixteen set forth, being the value agreed on by defendant in letters which were read; and 4s. for tithe hay. This was finally confirmed in Trinity term, 3 W. and M. (1692) by the Right Hon. Sir Robert Atkyne, &c.

Sir Walter Calverley, in his *Memorandum Book*, (Add. MS. 27,418) says, "15 July, 1692. Mr. Richardson of Bradford, delivered me a copy of the Decree and other processes of the Exchequer at suite of the Countis of Mounty-feltry." On the 12th of December following, the "Articles of Agreement betwixte Mr. Savile and his sisters" were drawn up, and they "signed for the purchase of Calverley tithes and all arrears, in consideration whereof, I am to give them 1 guiney in hand and to pay 615*l* before sealing the deed." He went to London to meet Mr. Savile, and to settle the matter, but found it a not very straightforward business. Mr. Savile appears to have made many excuses in order to defer bringing things to a point, and several days were lost by useless delay. Then Mr. Savile declared he had not sold the tithes of Mr. Calverley's uncle's lands in the Manor of Calverley, and refused to give up the writings relating to the tithes. He also said he had not sold Mr. Calverley any

small tithes, nor any other tithes but those on his own lands. To which was answered that if Mr. Savile had any tithes in Calverley Manor which were not on Mr. Calverley's lands, or his uncle's, they should be excepted. After other delays, fully particularized in the *Memorandum Book*, it was agreed to have the articles drawn up, and that they should remain in the hands of Lord Halifax, copies being retained by the purchaser. The writings were executed on the 20th of June, 1694, "from Henry Savile and Anne Savile, and also from Mrs. Mynne," to Walter Calverley, Esq. They were sealed at Mr. Smith's chambers, an old lawyer in the Middle Temple. The witnesses to the deeds were Mr. Richard Husband, Zechariah Scott (servant to one Mr. Smith in Fanchurch Street, who received the money from Mrs. Mynn), Gervase Clough (clerk to Mr. Smith), and Samuel Hemingway.* About the 1st August, 1694, the deeds were lodged in the hands of Lord Halifax, after being copied.

The oldest Terrier belonging to the church bears date 26 Sept., 1716. It shows that the Vicar is entitled to the small tithes—lamb and wool, pigs and geese, payable in kind. The second terrier, dated 10 Aug., 1727, also gives him all the small tithes. The next (13 Sept., 1743) agrees with them, and gives particulars. The following is a copy of it :—

1743.

"A true terrier of all the messuages, tenements, edifices, dues, and offerings belonging to the parish church of Calverley, in the county and diocese of York, taken and made, and exhibited at Wakefield, at the Court of Corrections, held there the 13th of September, in the year of our Lord, 1743.

Imprimis. There is a Vicarage house, belonging to which there is a barn, a garden, and an orchard.

Tythes. Every house pays 2½d., every communicant 2d., a cow 1½d., bees 1d., a foal 4d., a plough 1d., lamb and wool 1s., pigs and geese in kind, turnips and potatoes and rapes, 5s. per acre, eggs 1d.

Surplice Dues. A marriage by banns 2s., by license 5s., a churcning 1s., a funeral in the churchyard 1s., in the church 5s., chancel 13s. 4d. For laying a stone down 2s. 6d. in either church or churchyard.

There is an annuity of 40s. arising out of four houses called Park Houses, in the township of Leeds."

The next terrier is dated 1748. It is substantially the same as the 1743 one, but goes more into detail in reference to the tithes. The fifth (11th May, 1764) states that the vicarage house was built of stone (excepting a small portion which was of lath and plaster), covered with slate, and containing on the lower floor a kitchen and pantry, with a small vaulted cellar below the latter, and a hall, all floored with stone, a parlour and bed-chamber, floored with deal, and ceiled, and a lumber room. None of the rooms were wainscotted. There were a stable with loft, and a chaise-house attached. The glebe consisted of a small garden east of the house, an area or yard, a small orchard and a little garden on the west, the churchyard (including church and school house built in the S.E. corner), with two elm trees in it. The furniture of the church included a communion table with blue cloth cover, two silver communion cups, one inscribed "I. H. S. Coverley Church 1757." and the other *sans* inscription, one pewter flagon, and one pewter paten.

The 1770 terrier is like the last, except that it mentions, among the church furniture, a flagon of silver inscribed on the side, "I. H. S. We have Redemption through his Blood. Ephes. chap. 1st ver. 7th," and on the bottom, "D. D. W. B. 1765," and a paten of silver inscribed, "The gift of W. Bewicke, vicar of this church, 1767."

The next terrier is dated 2nd June, 1777, and states that the vicarage garden had been enlarged by the gift of a piece of ground by the Rev. Wilson Bewicke, D.D. The rest of the details are as in the previous one, as are those of the next two, which are dated respectively, 2 June, 1781, and 1 June, 1786. The 1809 (June) terrier mentions the addition to the glebe of an enclosure on Coal-hill, containing 3 roods 9 perches. The school-house still stood in the S.E. corner of the churchyard. The churchyard had been enlarged by the gift of 1 rood of land on the east side, from Thos. Thornhill, Esq., lord of the manor.* The church furniture is the same, with the exception that a new eight-day clock† and six bells

are mentioned. "A compleat Bone House, with a Door and Locke, to preserve the Bones of the Deceased until a proper opportunity for committing them to the earth again," had been lately erected by the parishioners, at the north-west corner of the steeple. The 1817 and 1825 terriers are similar, excepting that the fees had in some cases been altered.

Up to the year 1733, the churchwardens' accounts (which commence in 1637) exhibit nothing noteworthy, except perhaps the names of those who held the office. They are simply total sums of receipts and payments, without details of any kind, and are each year witnessed, or "passed," by about half-a-dozen of the "principal inhabitants." Under date 26th July, 1733, and from that time onward, however we come across a few curious particulars. The work of examining them has been rendered easier by Mr. William Thornton, clerk to the Calverley Local Board. He has taken the trouble to sort the whole of our old town's papers, and to mount the earlier accounts in strongly-bound volumes. The papers will now be in a much more likely way for being preserved, besides being so much readier for reference than hitherto; although former custodians of them have not been as careless of their charge as was generally the case. Most of them had been folded, docketed, and tied in bundles.

By looking over the churchwardens' accounts, which are generally dull enough, and sometimes even repellent, we may catch occasional glimpses of the days of our great-great-grandfathers, which are not altogether devoid of interest, or unworthy of note. The extracts will not be all interesting to everybody; some of them may be scarcely worth reading by those who do not live in the place, and whose forefathers have not lived in the parish. There is nothing about them but what may be found in the accounts of hundreds of parishes besides Calverley; and Antiquaries may ask, "What is the use of continually repeating examples such as these, of which we have abundance already printed?" To this I would beg to answer, that this sketch is written more for the use of those immediately interested in their native place, than for those who have made minute points of history, whether general or parochial, their particular study. They who have no opportunity of reading the

churchwardens' accounts of their own or of any other parish, are likely to be more vividly impressed by a fact connected with their own district, than by any general statement of what took place elsewhere.

The extracts most interesting are as follows :—

The entries relative to the new door for the Bell-chamber need no comment. It may be added that the worthy churchman who found solder and work benevolently returned his charge of 1d. "as his offering to the Treasury of the Temple." The *moss* and *mossing* entries are relics of the old practice of stuffing holes in the church (and less sacred) roofs with that humble material, in order to keep out the bad weather. "Letters of request" were common enough in those days, and down to the reign of King George the Third. If a man suffered loss from "God's Visitation," he straightway endeavoured to procure from the Magistrates assembled in Quarter Session a recommendation to the Bishop of the Diocese for a "Brief," or "Letter of Request," to be read during Divine service. Having once obtained this, it was not necessary for him to perambulate the country in order to collect, from public and private charity, sufficient to cover his loss. There were persons who farmed these briefs, and realized large sums, giving the sufferer by fire "a sum down on the nail," and carrying about perhaps a dozen of these Episcopal Licenses to receive the alms of the charitable and well-disposed persons of their diocese. Many thousands of these have been printed, and there is a reference to them in nearly every parish register or churchwardens' accounts. Every member of the congregation gave

what he thought fit, and sometimes the churchwardens supplemented the amount gathered, by a gift, in their corporate capacity, out of the town stock.

In addition to the accounts for 1737, the list of persons assessed for Church Rate for that year is preserved. The account and the rate are both written in a beautiful hand by a practised scribe. As it doubtless is a complete list of the farmers then living in the township, I print it in full, in the *Additional Notes*.

The following extracts from the accounts for the same year give the only record we have of one of those abominable "reparations" which from time to time helped to disfigure the old church.

In the 1740-1 account we come across the entry—"Paid John Gott for putting up slates in the Quear (*choir, chancel*) 2d." This John Gott was the ancestor of the wealthy Leeds family of that name. He was at this time the leading mason and builder in the district, and his operations were not confined to his own township; many of the county bridges then built were his work.

Almost every year new bell ropes had to be bought. This is a curious circumstance, and it looks at first sight as if the rope-makers of last century were very inferior workmen. Not so, however. The worthy men who served the office of churchwarden considered the "old" bell-ropes as the perquisites of that office, and acted accordingly.

In 1745, the year in which "Bonnie Prince Charlie" came over, the bells were taken down and re-cast by Edward Sellar, of Toft Green, York. The cost of the bells was raised by a church-rate, with the exception of £20 given by Sir Walter Calverley, and £10 by the Vicar (the Rev. Samuel Dodgson). There had been three bells in the tower before this, probably the same as had called to matins and evensong through those centuries in which religion had had a stronger hold on the hearts of the people than at the time we are speaking of. These three old bells weighed 32cwt. 0qrs. 17lbs., and they were re-cast at a cost of £20 per ton, or £32 3s. 0d. 11cwt. 1qr. 2lbs. of new metal was required to make up the six bells at 14d. per lb. The cost of exchange of clappers was £2 10s., and of hanging the six bells £24. Total £132 17s., "which was paid to one Edw. Sellars, a Bell-founder in York, the 8th Nov., 1745." Sir Walter Calverley, besides giving £20, lent the churchwardens the remainder of the money, without interest. Thus says the *Memorandum Book* of Sir Walter: * but it does not tell us that "the wise men of Calverley had made no provision for hanging the bells," and that "Sir Walter therefore came to the rescue by lending £20 for the same, the churchwardens giving him satisfactory security for repayment." Such was the case, however. † In the year 1748, the bells had to be re-hung, "at a cost of twelve or thirteen pounds, paid to Harrison, of which sum Sir Wr. Calverley paid and gave in timber seven or eight pounds." (Add. MS. 27,418.)

In 1862 the bells were re-cast, the cost (£202) being raised by public subscription. Their number was augmented to eight. The inscriptions on them are as follows. † The maker's name and the date is on each.

1748 is the year in which we first come across the entry, repeated half-yearly, "Paid for ringing 5 and 8,"—five and eight o'clock are meant, of course. At this date, the wages for performing this useful service was five shillings half-yearly, the remuneration gradually increasing until, forty odd years ago, it had advanced to £1 half-yearly. The custom was occasionally called "ringing the curfew," and we are almost fain to think that it was the old Norman custom which had been kept up since the time of the Conqueror. Now-a-days, when each factory has its own bell, (whilom a "buzzer,") no successor is needed to the worthy functionary who was last wont to rise at half-past four every morning, winter and summer, to awake the slumbering farmers. Lonely and quiet must the old village have been, when he turned out, lantern in hand, to seek the steeple door. One dark morning, the curfew-ringer left home as usual to go to his task, but no five o'clock bell was heard, and his wife, becoming uneasy, sent messengers to the church to look for him. They brought him home bruised and battered. He had fallen through an opening in the floor down on the stone flags of the church beneath, and his injuries were such that he never regained his health.

But to return to 1745. I will give but three more extracts from the account for that year, the first two illustrating some of the duties devolving on the "Kirk-masters" of that day.

"Spent at a search about Disorderly People 1*s.*"

"John Rawson, for carrying Sarah Scott to Halifax, by order."

"July 17th, 1745. Memm. It is hereby agreed that all ensuing Churchwardens shall be allowed only 3 shillings each at the Visitations, and at the Sacrament at Michaelmas and Christmas 1 shilling each, at other times 2 shillings each, and in all other respects as usual.



“Disorderly People” were such as did not come to Church, walked in the Churchyard, or drank in the public houses during Divine Service; and also those who harboured vagrants and played at “pitch-and-toss,” and other unlawful games on the Lord’s Day.

The second entry tells us that the churchwardens had to do with the settlement of paupers before the passing of the Poor-Law Act. The last entry explains itself.

Many a smile is provoked when looking over the quaint entries, and by nothing oftener than by the curious notions which possessed the not very learned scribes in the matter of spelling. “Quear” is an *odd* rendering of “choir,” and so is “vesture” of “vestry.” “Gearth” is meant for “girth,” “corps,” for “corpse,” (“Paid for a gearth to let down the corps with, 2d.”) “Sest” means “assessed,” “sess,” “assessment.” “Soudering” is the operation now usually termed “soldering.” “Cloath” is good Yorkshire for “cloth.” “Melishah” is intended as a phonetic rendering of “militia,” as is “seeling” for “ceiling,” “kist” for the West-Riding pronunciation of “chest,”—a box. “Weirs” is construed into “wires” by reading the context. The verb “to write” is twisted into “to wright.” A “foumard” is, of course, a “foumart,” but “urchants” and “orchin” are at first sight nearly unrecognizable. They were “urchins,” i.e., hedgehogs. Many more specimens of faulty orthography might be instanced, but the above must suffice.

A rather prominent functionary of last century was the “dog-whipper.” To those who meet with this name for the first time, it will be a puzzle to guess what possible purpose a dog-whipper could serve in the church-economy of his day, and they will be ready to judge, from the extreme rarity of the visits of canine beings to our places of worship, that the office was a mere sinecure—a sort of “Chiltern Hundreds”—which office the ancient servants of the church would accept on being superannuated. This, however, we learn was not the case. It was a common custom for persons, especially farmers, to bring their dogs with them to church, or rather, to leave them in the churchyard, where they often proved the truth of Dr. Watts’ line—

It was in 1746 that the Churchwardens of Calverley decided to name and appoint a person to fill the office of "dog-whipper." They were the more moved thereunto, inasmuch as Sir Walter Calverley offered to give them cloth wherewith to make the new officer a suit of clothes, provided the parish would make them up, and continue to appoint a similar officer, and find him with a suit every two years. This was to be his wages and recompense ; and we find that the first worthy dog-whipper was Abraham Beecroft (1746). This very appropriate entry soon follows :—" Paid for a whip, 1s." The minute is solemnly signed by all the six churchwardens of the parish.

Under date 1757 is the following :—" For exchange for the Cup, £1 : 4 : 0." This refers to one of the silver communion chalices, still in existence. It bears the inscription "I. H. S. Coverley Church 1757," and weighs about 16 oz. There is also another weighing about 54 oz., with the inscriptions, "I. H. S. We have redemption through his Blood. Ephes. chap. 1st ver. 7," and "D. D. W. B. 1765." It was given by Dr. Bewicke, then Vicar, as was also one of the silver patens. The latter is inscribed—" The gift of W. Bewicke, Vicar of this Church, 1767." Another paten was given by Mrs. Rand at the restoration of the church in 1870.

No further alteration of any importance was made in the church until 1838, when a gallery (pulled down at the latest restoration) was built to accommodate the Sunday school children, who at this time numbered about 100. Before this date there was a gallery just large enough to hold the members of the choir and the instrumentalists. The new gallery rested on a beam supported at each end by the capitals of the westernmost pillars of the nave arcade. It was of deal, and its front was ornamented (?) by arched panels and pilasters. The nave arches on each side of it were walled up, and a doorway broken through the south nave wall to form the approach to the gallery.

From 1838 to 1870 no material change was made in the west end of the church, and most of the parishioners are familiar with the appearance it then presented. Entering by the south door, you passed through an inner porch of wood,


and down a flight of stone steps to the floor of the church. To the left was a stone staircase, which partially obscured the west window of the south aisle, and in the gallery was the organ, almost blocking up the curious tower arch. Under the gallery, a doorway from the body of the church opened into the lowest story of the tower, a dark region where the heating apparatus stood, and where wood and coal were stored.

Shortly after the building of the gallery, a great part of the church was re-pewed with oak.

A few years later, a partial restoration of the church became necessary. It had fallen into such a dangerous state of dilapidation, that Divine service could not be performed in it without imminent peril to the congregation. Among other things, an entirely new chancel roof was needed, part of the old roof having actually fallen in. The north and south aisles required re-building, and other portions of the church called for renovation.*

This work was a great advance on what had been done for many generations, as it swept away numerous deformities which had been introduced, and restored some features of the church to a nearer resemblance to their ancient character. But as yet, public taste was not sufficiently cultivated to demand the total removal of plaster and paint, deal painted to imitate oak, and all the other paltry make-shifts of the last century. The next generation was to have the honour of doing these things. Nevertheless, the spirit which

* Before this date, there had been carved bosses on the crossings of the rafters in the north and south aisles, but they seem to have strayed away during the reparation. Some of them bore the Calverley arms carved in an abnormal manner, possibly through the carver having copied the shields from a seal on which the arms occur in the same way. The Calverley coat is *Sable, an inescutcheon between an orle of owls argent*. In the rendering of this in the bosses, and on the seal referred to, the artists placed the two middle owls in a position not agreeable to the rules of heraldry. I append a sketch of the seal as it occurs on some of the Calverley charters (*Titus*, 27, 28, 30, 33 and 34). Just over half-a-century ago, these shields and bosses were still in existence. Sir Walter Calverley Trevelyan saw them when on a visit to the village in A.D. 1828.



animated the projectors of the “restoration” of 1844 was evidently a right one. Though they did not accomplish much really artistic work, (and some of it was not done in a very substantial manner), yet the germ of a better and higher feeling for our old ecclesiastical architecture was springing up and shewing itself, and zealous efforts were made to adorn and beautify, in the correct sense of the word, the House of God, in which the parishioners and their ancestors had, for so many generations, met together for public worship.

At the re-opening services, which were held on Friday the 12th, and Sunday, the 14th of November, 1844, the following Clergy preached the sermons:—on Friday, the Reverend Hugh Stowell, Canon of Manchester, and the Rev. John Haigh, of Sheffield; on Sunday, the Venerable Charles Musgrave, D.D., Archdeacon of Craven and Vicar of Halifax, the Rev. W. Sinclair, of St. George’s, Leeds, and the Rev. Benjamin Powell, of St. George’s, Wigan. “As the time drew near,” says a contemporary newspaper, “a feverish anxiety prevailed throughout the village, under the apprehension of an unfavourable change in the weather. Happily the feared change did not take place. Though Friday morning was gloomy and showery, the day cleared up, and large congregations crowded the church, hundreds having to remain outside.” The prayers were read on the Friday afternoon by the Rev. Samuel Redhead, the Vicar, and in the evening by the Rev. Alfred Brown, formerly Curate of Calverley, then Incumbent of Cross Stone, and afterwards Vicar of Calverley. Little would the latter think on that Friday evening, that he was destined to be the chief means, in the course of another quarter of a century, of promoting a really thorough, almost a perfect, restoration of the ancient edifice in which his voice was then being heard! Little would he think that that same building was to be a lasting monument to his energy and perseverance for after generations to reverence and admire. Such, however, was to be the case. He succeeded his father-in-law in the vicarage, and before his death he had accomplished a work, in the almost complete re-building of the church, the like of which had not been done in the parish since the time when William Calverley, four centuries before, almost rebuilt the sacred edifice. The event in which he assisted

in those dark November days of 1844, and which was so interesting in the village annals, was only the precursor of those more important days, twenty-five years later, when, amid flowers and sunshine, the church again over-flowed with eager listeners, many of whom had come long distances over the dusty roads to see and contribute to that more perfect restoration then accomplished, and which, it is to be hoped, will never be spoiled by injudicious "beautifying."

For some years it had been seen by Mr. Brown and those most intimately connected with it, that the old church needed taking in hand, and thoroughly repairing,—in fact almost re-building. The thousands of storms it had weathered, the hundreds of frosty winters it had seen, and, more especially, the injudicious interference of man, had taken serious hold on the once substantial building. Even the last reparation the church had undergone, so lately as 1844, proved to be a source of danger to a portion of the structure. The new chancel roof, being badly designed, had pushed the walls considerably out of perpendicular. When the restoration was going on, each day's experience proved more and more how necessary was the work; the fabric having been so much injured by its repeated alterations and re-alterations, and by that most objectionable practice, (which had for many years been discontinued) the making of graves within the church. Some of the pillars were found, owing to these inter-mural interments, to be standing on mere columns of earth, of the same diameter as themselves. During the restoration, the rain got to the foundations of one of these pillars, and loosened the earth on which it stood, with the result that the base-stone, though a solid, hard mass of sandstone, was split quite asunder. This, among many other circumstances, made it appear almost miraculous that the building had not fallen to ruin.

A report was made on the state of the building, and plans for its restoration were drawn up, by the well-known Gothic architects, Messrs. T. H. and F. Healey, of Bradford, and the restoration was carried on under their supervision.

When the faculty had been obtained, a start was at once made, in April, 1869, by removing all the pews and the gallery from the church. Most of the woodwork was sold, the old oak being so hard and full of nails as to be useless,


and the money thus raised went to the building fund. There was very little ancient woodwork remaining, except the nave roof, the font cover, the communion table, and a few pews and benches of Jacobean and later dates, which had nothing about them valuable enough to make them worthy of preservation, unless we except the font cover, which, though of debased character, architecturally speaking, yet was of interest as shewing how the old mediaeval character still survived. There was no rood or chancel screen, nor any remains of one. The gallery was swept away. All the roofs, with their lath and plaster ceilings, were taken down. That over the nave was the only roof found to be made of ancient timber. As we have seen, it had been originally covered with lead, but this was removed during the last century, and the roof lowered in pitch. It was now restored to its original pitch. The old race-course, which is to be seen on the tower wall inside the church, and below the present roof-line, is a relic of the building as it was before the clerestory was added. The old roof-beams, where possible, were retained, and where defective were replaced by new English oak, the gift of one who took a special interest in that part of the church. It was then boarded, felted, and covered with grey slate. Entirely new roofs were put over the chancel and aisles, made of Memel timber.

The inner surface of the walls had all the plaster scraped off, and those of the nave were dressed over.* The royal arms, dating from the Georgian era, and painted on a framed canvas, stood over the chancel arch. They were relegated to an obscurity from which they have not emerged.

The most considerable undertaking was the re-building of the chancel from the foundations. This is almost an exact copy of the old, the masonry having been cleansed and repaired, and the interior lined with cleansed ashlar. It was in taking down the chancel that the ten old incised slabs† were discovered, some of them doing duty as window heads and sills, and others being worked into the base-course. When the plaster had been taken off the south wall of the chancel, the remaining arches of the sedilia and piscina were discovered. Two of them had been open before.

* Upon the taking off the plaster from the south nave wall, a circular-headed Norman window was found.—See Vol. i., p. 8.

They are of Early Decorated design, the sedilia consisting of the usual three openings, containing seats for the priest, deacon, and sub-deacon. The piscina was used as a water-drain for the rinsings of the chalice. The label moulds had been knocked off, and the whole disfigured. The "lepers' window*" was restored.

No aumbrie, hagioscope, or stoup, was discovered.

The chancel had been built about the middle of the fourteenth century, pretty nearly upon the foundations of an earlier, which probably was Early English, possibly Norman; the outside of the old just corresponding with the inside of the new. The old foundations still remained at the restoration. A careful search shewed that there had been no step from the nave to the chancel.

The chancel arch was re-built, and its span somewhat enlarged. On taking it down, it was discovered that the nave walls had at one time been partially in ruins, and the moss-grown stones were still *in situ*. Some of the stones forming the piers of this arch were parts of window heads of a peculiar pattern, having the appearance of Saxon work-

manship. Unfortunately, they were again built into the piers, so that it will probably be some centuries before the antiquary will see them again.

The tower arch is of a singular shape. Instead of its point being in the centre, it is ten inches to the right, imparting a one-sided appearance to the arch. The most probable reason for this, is, that it was pierced at the time the clerestory was added to the nave, as the present arch would be too high for the former church. A few minutes' examination of the joints of the stones forming the arch and wall will shew, by their irregularity, that the arch has been pierced in a wall already existing.

As before stated, the foundations of the nave arcade were found to be insecure, so the pillars were taken down one by one, and deeper and stronger foundations substituted.


The north and south aisles, which were of modern date, were taken down and extended laterally, to provide additional accommodation. The Calverley Chapel, which is at the east end of the north aisle,* and which possesses two lancet windows, is now used as an organ chamber and vestry. The east end of the south aisle was formerly the Wadlands Chapel, at one time the burial place of the Thornour family. No remains or accessories, which could be definitely ascribed to its original structure, were discovered, except a broken tombstone of limestone, with roll-mould edges, but without inscription. No piscina remained in either the Calverley or the Wadlands Chapels.

The present porch is new, all traces of the original having disappeared when a modern porch was substituted for it some years ago. The doorway into the church is original, and was simply repaired and rebuilt. The tracery and sills of the clerestory windows, and the west window of the tower, were repaired and restored, and the original level of the floor, which sloped from west to east as the church-yard does, was retained.

The font is of rather plain design, belonging to the late Decorated period, like most of the building. Before the restoration, it stood at the west end of the north aisle, and the tall crocketed cover had had a piece cut off to accommodate it to the height of the aisle. The font itself was turned upside down, the stem being slightly hollowed to form

* A tradition says that Walter Calverley, who figured in the "Yorkshire Tragedy," was, after a pretended burial at York, secretly conveyed to Calverley and buried there. It is a singular coincidence, that a body was found buried in the Calverley Chapel embedded in lime, from which a coffin had rotted away.

the bowl, and it was somewhat mutilated. After being dressed over, it was removed to the west end of the middle aisle, beneath the tower arch, the position it had formerly occupied.



In the roof directly over it remained the old lever by which the font-cover had been raised and lowered. The cover is of oak, and is beautiful in its outlines and most of its details. It is not very ancient; it may belong to the latter part of the sixteenth century, or, more likely, to the beginning of the seventeenth. It had been maltreated in other ways besides that mentioned above, and was now thoroughly cleaned from paint, repaired where defective, and hung by a strong chain.

The old oak communion table was provided with a new top and cleaned. The new communion rails were given by Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Gray, of Calverley. They also provided the commandment tablets. The latter were affected by the damp after a few years. Seeing this, the late Vicar suggested to Mr. Gray that a reredos with commandment tablets should be placed under the east window, of such a nature as

would preclude in after years the possibility of putting up anything which would not accord with the Protestant nature of the English Church worship. Mr. Gray at once responded to this, and offered to be at the expense of such a reredos. The design was prepared by Messrs. T. H. and F. Healey, and executed in oak, the carved panels and centre-piece by Messrs. Jackson and Graham, Oxford Street, London. The reredos consists of seven compartments. The central panel contains a copy in carved oak, and in high relief, of Leonardo da Vinci's picture of "The Last Supper." The artist has been very successful in copying the pose and expression of the figures, and has attained a very high standard of excellence. Over this central compartment, and the two next, is a open-work frieze of interlacing foliage. In the centre of this is the Paschal Lamb bearing a flag, and above this a crown. On each side of the Lamb, on labels, is the inscription, "Ecce Agnus Dei qui tollis peccata mundi." There are six tall crocketted finials along the frieze, and surmounting it; at each end is a pastoral staff. The compartments next that in the centre have each two panels of conventional foliage, fruits, and birds. The Lord's Prayer, the Ten Commandments, and the Apostles' Creed occupy the four extreme compartments, on deeply recessed panels. Over these is a frieze, or battlement, of less elaborate design than the central one. The lower panels have scroll-ornaments. The effect of the reredos as a whole is that of quiet, harmonious, beauty. It is a work of art of which Calverley is proud. The late Vicar took a great interest in it, and made many suggestions as to the design. The work was commenced some time before his death, but he did not live to see its completion. It was finished just before Easter, 1877.

To return to 1870. The oak pulpit was retained. It was erected in memory of the Reverend Samuel Redhead, Vicar of Calverley from 1822 to 1845, by Archdeacon Musgrave, and bears the following inscription: "In memoriam Samuelis Redhead, hujus ecclesiæ vicarii, d. d. Carolus Musgrave: S. T. P., Vicarius de Halifax, et Archdiaconus Cravenensis."

The lectern was given by the Rev. Canon Bailey, D.D. Like the rest of the woodwork of the church, it is of oak, and is beautifully carved. The whole of the sittings are

new. The choir-stalls have *fleur-de-lys* ends, and carved fronts. The organ was placed in the Calverley Chapel, and enclosed by a new oak screen of appropriate design.

There are seven stained-glass windows in the church. The north window of the chancel has for its subject "The Apostles' Creed." It bears the inscription—"In memory of Samuel Redhead, 23 years vicar of this parish, born December 24, 1778, died August 26, 1845. 1 Cor. ii. 2. And of Mary, his wife, born Sep. 24, 1787, died Sep. 8, 1860. 1 Thess. iv. 14." The window over the sedilia was given by the late Vicar and Mrs. Brown. Its subject is "Examples of Prayer." It is inscribed:—"Alfredus Brown, A.M., Parochiæ et parochialis ecclesiæ de Calverley vicarius, et Jane uxor ejus adhuc viventes, D.D. Anno sacro mdccclxx." That in the south aisle (illustrating the texts "Feed My Sheep," St. John xxi. 16, "There should be time no longer," Revelation x. 6, and "The Everlasting Gospel," Revelation xiv. 6,) has lately been placed there by subscription—"In loving memory of our pastor and friend, the Rev. Alfred Brown, M.A., Oxon., who fell asleep in Jesus, Dec. 26, 1876, after 31 years' faithful service as the Vicar of this parish." It bears also this inscription:—"They that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament, and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars for ever and ever."* The "Jesse" window in the chancel was inserted by Miss Paget, in grateful remembrance of the late Dr. Ramsbotham, of Leeds. Its inscription is:—"To the glory of God, and in memory of John Hodgson Ramsbotham, M.D., who was born June 20, 1809, and died August 5, 1868. St. John 3, ver. 16. L. P." All the above windows are by Messrs. Clayton and Bell. The west window, given by Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Gray, is by Powell, and consists of representations of the "Visit of the Shepherds," "The Resurrection," and "The Ascension." The middle south chancel window, by Mr. John Hardman, has for its subjects "Mary sitting at the feet of Jesus," and "Christ appearing to Mary." On a brass underneath is the inscription:—

* This window is only a small part of the memorial to Mr. Brown. A large and handsome new school has been built to his memory, by his parishioners and friends, at a total cost of upwards of £1800, including levelling the playground, and building boundary walls.

"To the glory of God, and in affectionate remembrance of Hannah, widow of John Sykes, Esq., of Leeds. Born at Calverley, December 7th, 1797, died at Aldborough April 9th, 1866 : This window was placed by her sons." The east window was restored at the expense of the family of the late William Horsfall, Esq. The appearance of the church would be greatly improved by the insertion of more stained glass.

The total cost of the restoration was upwards of £4,000, of which amount no less than £400 were subscribed by *bonâ fide* working men—a notable fact, and one worthy of imitation elsewhere.

The churchyard had quite a bad reputation in the district for its crop of nettles and weeds and its general untidiness; but all these blemishes were removed, and the surface of the earth was lowered near the church, the base of which it had covered up to the depth of a yard in some places, completely hiding the two base-moulds of the tower. The churchyard is now known as the prettiest, and neatest, for many miles around.*

Wednesday, the 3rd of August, 1870, was a great day in Calverley, and the proudest day in the lives of those who had been concerned in the restoration of the old church, and now attended the re-opening services. The following clergy officiated :—The Right Rev. Robert Bickersteth, D.D., Lord Bishop of Ripon, The Right Rev. Bishop Ryan, D.D., Vicar of Bradford, the Rev. Alfred Brown, Vicar, the Rev. E. B. Braithwaite, Curate of Calverley, the Rev. P. J. Manning, Incumbent of Farsley, and the Rev. H. J. Graham, of Pudsey. Other clergy present were, the Rev. Henry Harrison, of Idle, Rev. R. Keeling, of Windhill, Rev. Canon Mitton, Rev. Knight Gale, and Rev. R. H. Heap. The morning sermon was preached by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese. At the conclusion of his discourse, the Bishop said that he rejoiced with them all in the good work which had been brought to so happy a consummation, and with respect to which they were assembled. The work had been one begun

* This year (1882) an addition of an acre and a quarter has been made to it on the east side. The land has been given by W. C. C. Thornhill, Esq. Lord of the Manor, and the cost of building boundary walls, making paths, &c., is being met by the subscriptions of the congregation.

in faith ; there had been some trembling mixed with the faith ; but, for all that, there had been a confidence that in a work undertaken with a view to God's glory, His blessing would rest upon it, and eventually crown it with success. That faith had been rewarded, and they saw the ancient parish church of Calverley so beautifully restored, that it combined all the sacredness of the old with the freshness of the new. Whilst they rejoiced in the restoration of a church like that, surely it was not merely for the sake of the architecture, or because in its arrangements it presented what was pleasing to the eye and gratifying to the taste. They were not insensible to such things, but, after all, these were secondary. What they rejoiced in was this, that the restoration of an old parish church in the manner in which this had been done, was an evidence of a very essential part of religion, namely, reverence. We were so constituted that we were almost irresistibly influenced by things around us ; so that, if people worshipped in a building which was unsightly, or dilapidated, or decayed, it was hardly possible that the building should inspire them with any feeling of reverence ; whereas, when the building was the reverse of all that, the feeling of reverence arose naturally. But more than this, experience had proved that the restoration of an ancient parish church was very often instrumental in the revival of spiritual religion in the parish. God grant that might be the effect in this parish !” The Very Rev. Hugh Mc. Neile, D.D., Dean of Ripon, preached at the service in the evening. On the following Sunday, August 7th, the preachers were : in the morning, the Rev. Alfred Brown, M.A., Vicar of Calverley ; in the afternoon, the Right Rev. Bishop Ryan, D.D. ; and in the evening, the Rev. Canon Crosthwaite, M.A., Vicar of St. Andrew's, Leeds.

In conclusion, I can only reiterate the hope expressed before, that Calverley Church, after having passed through so many vicissitudes, and having at last been made, by restoration, a monument worthy of those artists of old, its ancient architects, and of its modern restorers, will never again have its quiet unobtrusive beauty marred by the spoiler's hand, but that every pains will be taken to preserve it, with affectionate care and pious reverence !

NOTES ON THE ANCESTRY OF LONGFELLOW.

There have lately been some letters on this subject in *Notes and Queries*, and, more especially, in the *Leeds Mercury Weekly Supplement*, but they did not get very far into the heart of it. None of the correspondents had searched the York Registry for Longfellow wills; so that what promised to be the most important evidence for connecting the various scraps of genealogy, was wanting. I have gone through the indexes in the Archbishop's Registry, and copied, I believe, all the Longfellow wills in them, but they only number about a dozen. This was disappointing, because, had two or three more members of the family, who lived about the middle of the 17th century, made wills, probably the descent would have been shown quite distinctly. As it is, about that time there appear the names of two Edward Longfellow, and of several Williams, which is somewhat confusing. Under these circumstances, I can only hope, that if I have gone wrong in my surmises, some one else will be fortunate enough to trace out the proper line. I feel somewhat diffident in printing the following notes, as they are so incomplete, but am induced to do so because some one else may possess the proofs necessary to form a perfect pedigree.

The earliest evidence relating to the family which I have as yet come across, is the will of James Langfellow, of Otley, which is dated 18 June, 1486, and was proved at York, 28 July, 1486. By it he gives his soul to God omnipotent, the blessed Virgin Mary, and All Saints, and wills that his body be buried in the monastery of St. John, of Helagh Park. He bequeaths 20*s.* to Otley Church, and 3*s.* 4*d.* for torches, &c. Alice his wife, and John Langfellow, executors. Witnesses:—John Redeman, Canon of Helagh, John Langfellow, and others.

The relationship of John Langfellow to James is not stated. Probably he was his brother. In 1522, one John Langfellowe was fined at Middleton, along with twenty-two other offenders, for carrying away the lord's wood. In 1524, he paid 4*d.* towards the expenses of the French wars. *Yorks. Arch. Jour.*, ii., 290.

In 1508, Peter Langfellow was instituted vicar of Huddersfield, and on 12 Aug., 1510, vicar of Calverley. He resigned Calverley vicarage before 9 Jan., 1526-7, on which date Thomas Moorten, his successor, was instituted. Peter accepted the living of Leathley, near Otley, where he died, and was succeeded by Richard Roundall, about 1530. A Peter Langefellowe, clerk, was one of the original trustees of Magnus's charity, at Newark-on-Trent, June 20, 1530. (Shilton's *History of Newark*, 1820, p. 284). Whether all these references to Peter Longfellow, indicate the same man or not, I have no evidence, but the probability is that they do. I have searched in vain, both in the Consistory Court and Registry at York, for his will.

Next follows the will of Richard Langfellow, of Otley, which is dated 1537. He wills that his body be buried under the rood loft, in his parish church of Otley, and that a through-stone be laid of him, with certain scripture engraved thereon. To the reparation of Otley bridge, he gives 40*s.*, and to a substantial cross to be set thereupon, with a little image of our Lady, 6*s.* 8*d.* To the four highways leading

to Otley, he gives 4*l.*; 6*s.* 4*d.* thereof to Farnley highway, if the said town will repair it before Michaelmas next. To a priest to say mass and other divine service for his soul, for his wifes' souls, and his children's souls, for the space of three years, 12*l.* To every 'one of his godchildren, 4*d.* To Elizabeth, his wife, 32*s.* of lands, &c., one tenement of the value of 20*s.*, and one other tenement in Bondgate, value 15*s.*, for life, if she remain a widow. If she marry, all this property to go to his heir, Anthony Mawde. Also to his said wife 40*l.* Richard Lindley and Christopher Cave, of Otley, to be his executors, and each to have 18*s.* 4*d.* Mr. Dynele, Mr. Vicar, of Huddersfield, and Anthony Mawde, supervisors. To the said Anthony, all his other goods. To 4 orders of Friars at York, to do mass and dirige for him, 6*s.* each. To the obit of his late wife deceased, 20*d.* To William Mawde, one ryall,* 2 lbs. of wax orels, 12*d.*, for keeping him and his wife and children in the beadroll. To Sir Richard Cawdry, his curate, 12*d.* His wife to cause one obit to be done yearly, with mass and dirige, of the said tenement in Bondgate. To 6 poor maidens in good name and fame, to buy a bed withal, 6*s.* 8*d.*, 6*s.* 8*d.* to be divided among the poor folk in *Leathley*, and 20*s.* among poor folk at the discretion of his executors and supervisors. Witnesses:—Sir Richard Cawdry, William Mawde, Nicholas Croft, William Fletcher. Proved 26 April, 1537.

This well-to-do^t inhabitant of Otley was, I conjecture from his connection with Leathley, a brother of the vicar above mentioned, and brother also to the William Longfellow next mentioned.

On 28 Oct., 1540, William Longfellow, of Leathley, made his will. He bequeaths his soul to Almighty God, the Virgin Mary, and all the holy company of heaven, and his body to be buried in the parish church of Lethley, to which church he gives 3*s.* 4*d.* To Sir Richard Langfellow he bequeaths six marks, to sing for his soul for year, the one half-year in the parish church of Lethley, and the other half-year in Calverley Church, if that he will; and if he will not, to take "a nother" priest, and pay him at every quarter. Also he makes Isabel, his wife, and John Teel the younger, his executors. To Percival Langfellow, his son, he bequeaths all his goods which he should have at Bagley (in Calverley Parish), that is to say, debts and other goods, and the debts which belongeth to Sir Peter Langfellow to be paid again for his part of the same goods. Also to John Teel the elder, and to Margaret, testator's daughter, some debts owing to him. To Isabel, his wife, and John Teal younger, his son (-in-law), the residue of his goods. Witnesses:—Thomas Rushworth, Percival Jenkinson, William Fentyman, Barnard Brodbelt, and Christopher Wharton. Proved 6 Mar., 1543-4, by Isabel Langfellow and John Teel.

The will of his son, Percival Langfellow, of Bagley, is dated 8 November, 1577. He desires his body to be buried in Calverley

churchyard. To Calverley Church he gives 12*d*. To John Charley and Andrew Charley, each one yowe (ewe). To Thomas Langfellow, his son, a cupboard, great chair, and pair of bedstocks. To Jenet Langfellow, his daughter, a brass pot, two pans, one "fryen-panne", a red quye, sideboard, "ambery" in the parlour, great ark, pewter, viz. :—five doublers and one carver, spit, candlestick, and chair. The residue of his goods to Isabel Langfellow and Elizabeth Langfellow, his daughters, who are appointed sole executors. William Webster, vicar of Calverley, and Thomas Langfellow, testator's son, supervisors. Witnesses :—William Webster, Nicholas Kawdrey (Cawdrey), John Gilltoun, Thomas Langfellow. Proved 21 Feb., 1577-8.

This Thomas Langfellow, of Bagley, had two sons, John, bapt. at Calverley, 19 July, 1578, and *Edward*, bapt. 4 March, 1582-3.

In 1621 appears in Guiseley parish one Edward Longfellow, who probably is the Edward mentioned in the last paragraph.* On Nov. 18, 1621, he had a d. *Giace* bap. at Guiseley, and in 1619 (Oct. 24), a WILLIAM LONGFELLEY had been bap. at the same place, but no parent's name is given. There are many entries of baptisms in the Guiseley registers about this date, which are made in a similarly careless manner. If we had the date of Edward's marriage, we should probably find that it was in or before 1619, when he would be thirty-five years of age, and we should almost be justified in assuming that he was the father of this William, because from this time forward he had other children at regular intervals — Elizabeth, bp. 13 June, 1624, Thomas, bp. 16 April, 1626. Grace Longfellow was married 27 Sept., 1653, at Calverley, to George Skirrow; and William Langfellow, her brother, as I take it, married, at the same place, Elizabeth Thornton, 10 Sept., 1646. William, of Horsforth, had a son WILLIAM, bap. 20 Oct., 1650,† a d. Sarah, bp. at Horsforth, 20 May, 1652, and a d. Lucy, bp. at Horsforth, 8 Mar., 1653-4. William, the elder, was living in 1687-8, when he was administrator of his son Nathan's goods. Nathan was buried at Guiseley, 3 Sept., 1687.

(1.) William L. who has children baptized from 1599 to 1610. He was buried in 1627.

(2 & 3.) William, his son, bp. 1601, and William, son of Richard, bp. 1602-3. These two were apparently buried, the one in 1638, and the other in 1647-8.

(4.) William, s. of Francis, bp. 1650, bur. 1654.

(5.) The only Ilkley William left, William, s. of John, was bp. 22 Feb., 1634-5, and it is hardly likely that he would be the father of the above William in 1650.

The first known American ancestor of the poet Longfellow was a William Longfellow, whose father, William Longfellow, is said to have lived at Horsforth,* and who settled at Newbury, Massachusetts, before 1676, on which date he married Anne Sewall, sister to Chief Justice Sewall. He came over into Yorkshire in 1687, "to obtain his patrimony," says a note to the letters in the "*New England Hist. and Gen. Reg.*" Now, William Longfellow, the elder, did not die until 1704, but his son Nathan, and brother to William the emigrant, died in 1687; so that, unless some other William is proved to be the father of the emigrant, it would seem to have been in connection with his brother's death that he came to England. Yet, according to the Law of Distribution, William would get no share whatever of his brother's estate, since their father administered to the intestate, and would take the whole of his estate, real and personal, as his heir at-law and next of kin. It is to be observed that Nathan must have had real or personal estate, or both, from some other source than his father. Supposing any copyhold land descended to him from his mother, or grandfather, and that he had a younger brother of the whole blood, that brother would succeed to the copyhold estate, and would have to be admitted tenant of the same. William was back in Newbury, Mass., in 1688, in which year he had, says the town rate, 2 houses, 6 plough-lands, 10 meadow lands, 1 horse, 10 sheep, and 2 hogs. With the present evidence, though not certain, it seems probable, that this William Longfellow is the same who was baptized at Guiseley in 1650. The emigrant would thus be 26 years old when he was married.

The rest of the poet's ancestry, from William forward, has been kindly communicated to me by the Rev. Robert Collyer, D.D., of New York.



* William Longfellow is said to have come over to Yorkshire in 1687, to obtain his patrimony—Note in *New England Historical and Genealogical Register*. I have not seen any record of the death of a William Longfellow in or about that year. The poet Longfellow always held that his English progenitor, who came to America, sprung from Horsforth; and that his father lived there is proved by a letter written by Samuel Sewall, of Boston, in 1680. "To his loving brother, Stephen Sewall, at Bishop Stoke, in Hampshire, England," and runs thus:—"Brother Longfellow's father, William Longfellow, lives at Horsforth, near Leeds, in Yorkshire. Tell him Bro. has a son William, a fine, likely child, and a very good piece of land, and greatly wants a little stock to manage it. And that father hath paid for him upwards of a hundred pounds to get him out of debt." This letter is printed in "*The New England Historical and Genealogical Register*." The two Williams, father and son, mentioned in the text above, are the only William Longfellows I have yet found any record of, as having lived in Horsforth, between 1600 and 1700.

Witnesses:—William Fletcher, Anthony Woodrove, Alvery Copley, gent., Robert Martin, and John Broke, vicar of Campsall. Proved 22 June, 1580.

The above John was buried at Ilkley, 23 Sept., 1611. The whole of the Longfellow entries in the Ilkley registers have been printed in *Miscellanea Genealogica et Heraldica*, vol. iii., pp. 116, 117, and 118, having been extracted by Mr. Hugh F. Boyd. In order to get together all the Longfellow notices possible, I re-print them here, with Dr. Howard's permission.

In 1700, 1731, 1732 (when he is called "senior"), 1737, and 1742, William Longfellow, of Riccall, occurs in the Court Rolls, making his mark ; and William Longfellow, "junior," in 1732 and 1740, writing a good hand. John Longfellow makes his mark in 1768, and William Longfellow was on the Jury of the Manor Court in 1825. John Longfellow carried money from Riccall to Fishlake, Oct. 6, 1712, from Mrs. Elizabeth Wormley to her uncle, Francis Simpson.

* A note at the bottom of the page calls him "Ultimus Longfellowum," Mr. Farrow has been closely connected with the place since 1850, and has reason to think that, during that time no descendants of the family have been living among them, and certainly none of that name.

The following Miscellaneous entries should be noted. Towards the Hearth Tax of Charles II., William Longfellow, of Horsforth, paid for 4 hearths, Thomas, his brother, of the same place, for 1, George L., of Ilkley, for 1, and Robert L., of Leeds, for 4.

At a sale of old oak furniture in Bradford, May, 1882, an oak chest from a farm-house at Ilkley was offered. It had these inscriptions:—"We once were two, but two made one, we no more two, through life be one," "Comfort ye one another," and "Jon. Longfellow and Mary Rogers was marryed ye tenth daye off April Anno Dm 1664."

At a sale of old oak in Leeds on the 20th April, 1883, was a dower-chest from Burley-in-Wharfedale, with these inscriptions—"Thomas Longfellow and Mary Bryantes was joined together in holie wedlocke on ye Feast of Saint Chad, 1645." "Whom God has joined together, let no man put asunder." "Peace and Grase ever be with ye." "We once were two, we two made one, we no more two, through life be one." "xxi. Cha. Rex. D.G."

In the Poll Book for 13 Jan., 1741, John Longfellow, of Leeds, and William Longfellow, of Riccal, are named.
