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PREFACE.
STATE HOUSE, BOSTON

In collecting the information for the Register for 1862, circulars have been sent to our regular correspondents in every town in the State, from nearly every one of whom answers have been promptly received.

Many other communications have also been received, both from public institutions and private individuals, with regard to changes to be made.

It will be seen that some of the information usually given in the book has been condensed, and some unimportant matters omitted. This has been done to give space, within reasonable limits of the book, for the very full account of what is now, and has been for the past year, engrossing the public attention more than any other subject—perhaps more than all others. We scarcely need say that we refer to the rebellion, which is now fast being suppressed, and the active part which Massachusetts is taking in that suppression.

The great amount of information which we are giving in these pages will hardly be appreciated as it should be, we fear, unless we call attention to the fact that nearly all the book is set in a much smaller type than usual, giving a great amount of reading to a very small space. This is particularly true with regard to the Military Department.

In our historical matter we have endeavored to be accurate, but to give a picture of the times, rather than statistical information. In the regimental narratives we present the most accurate history published, of each of the three months' regiments, and each company, from their leaving Massachusetts until their return; and the outlines of the history of each of the Massachusetts regiments now in the field, from their formation until the first of January.

In compiling the military information, we have been aided by several gentlemen connected with that branch of the public service, and in preparing the lists of members of the companies have had free access to the rolls in the office of the Adjutant General.

To prepare entirely accurate lists of names from those rolls was found to be impossible; and this is not at all surprising, when we consider that they were made up from reports of the several hundred different companies now in the field, prepared by persons, some of whom, of course, were unused to such business, and do not realize the importance of having names and residences full and correct, and written very plainly. Soldiers are, naturally and properly, thinking more of what shall be done to perfect themselves and their comrades in the art of war, than in accurately recording their names.

To perfect the information, as far as possible, without too much delay, we sent printed lists to the orderly of each company, — except some of the most distant, whom we could not, possibly, have obtained returns from in season, — and from nearly all, replies have been received, enabling us to make very many important corrections, and also to note many changes that have occurred since the regiments left the State, such as killed, wounded, prisoners and missing in battle, promoted, discharged, &c., &c.

As the result of the great amount of labor and care which has been bestowed on this work, the publishers feel warranted in saying that it is, doubtless, by far the fullest and most accurate account of the Massachusetts military now in the field that has yet been offered to the public.

The publishers renew their thanks to those who have assisted in the compilation of the work, and would suggest that any person discovering an error in the book will confer a favor by notifying them of it, that it may be corrected in future editions.

Compensation of the Executive and the Legislature.

The salary of the Governor is \$3,500; of the Lieutenant-Governor, \$200 for the regular annual session of the Council; and for attendance at any subsequent session, \$6 per day, and mileage at the same rate as members of the Council and Legislature. The pay of the Councilors is \$300 for the regular annual session of their board, and \$3 per day for any subsequent session, and \$1 for every five miles' travel from their respective places of abode, once at each session.

The salaries of the Secretary, Treasurer, Auditor, and Attorney-General are severally \$2,000; and of the Adjutant-General, \$1,800.

The pay of Senators and Representatives is \$300 for the regular annual session, and \$1 for every five miles' travel from their respective places of abode, once in each session. The President of the Senate and Speaker of the House receive each \$600 for the session.

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CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICTS.

District 6.

District 7.

District 8.

STATE NORMAL SCHOOLS.

ESTABLISHED BY LAW, 1838.

The State Normal Schools are designed for those *only* who purpose to teach, and especially for those who purpose to teach in the Common Schools. Of those who avail themselves of the advantages of these Schools, and who afterwards become teachers in the Common Schools of Massachusetts, no tuition fee is required.

There are at present four in this Commonwealth, as follows:

STATE NORMAL SCHOOL, FRAMINGHAM.

FOR FEMALES ONLY.

George N. Bigelow, *Principal*.

Originally established at Lexington, July 3, 1839. Transferred in May, 1844, to West Newton; from thence, in 1853, to Framingham.

Those who enter this school, male pupils must be at least 17, and females at least 16, years of age.

STATE NORMAL SCHOOL AT WESTFIELD.

This school first went into operation at Barre, September 4, 1830. In 1841 it was suspended, and in September, 1844, was re-commenced at Westfield.

SALEM STATE NORMAL SCHOOL.

FOR FEMALES ONLY.

THE
REBELLION OF 1861,
AND
MASSACHUSETTS MILITARY RECORD.

HISTORICAL.

Puritanism versus Chivalry.

In the time of Elizabeth, the great defender of Protestantism against Catholic ambition, the middling merchants of the English cities, and the small proprietors in the country, in their religious movements separated from the Church of England. In their modes of worship they appealed less to the senses and more to the understanding; they sought the spirit rather than the forms of Christianity—a purer faith, a simpler worship, and a more liberal system of church government. From this they took the name of Puritans.

Opposed to them were the Nobility, the Court, the Prelacy, and all those who claimed the patronage of the state and the leadership of social circles and of great enterprises—the great conservatives of the empire. These religious differences entered into politics. They gave direction to the policies of the state. They finally broke out into open war, into revolution. The first party took the name of Roundhead, the other that of Cavalier; and the two parties are known to-day under the name of Whig and Tory. That war ended in the death of Charles I., and the elevation of Cromwell as Dictator over the Commonwealth. These two religious-political powers, with their diverse constitutional structures of intellect, sent their several representatives to this country. The Cavalier element settled at Jamestown in 1607, and the Puritan at Plymouth in 1620. The first came under the patronage of the state, as visionary adventurers in quest of new fields of gain; the second came as a sect proscribed and persecuted by government, to establish liberal institutions and religious liberty.

The Cavaliers.

The Cavaliers sought wealth and political power. Their religion and their state, their social and educational institutions, were patterned upon those of England. They carried their settlements, their principles, and their love of lofty cheer, into Kentucky, and into Southern States. Loving wealth, ease, social distinctions, and political power, they naturally fell into the manner and the state of the great proprietor. Their characteristics followed their enterprise. The same year that the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth, they adopted a system of servile labor; a system in harmony with their ideas of the political and social relation; a system which soon came to be considered as the basis of their monied prosperity. It has grown with their growth, and strengthened with their strength, until Virginia has given tone, character and institutions to fifteen sovereign States and to ten millions of people. She has been the mother of Presidents, as well as of States, and has achieved grand results in the career of empire.

The Puritans.

The Puritans, rigid, self-denying, industrious and enterprising, settled in a wilderness, combatted resolutely a barren soil and an inhospitable climate, put their own hands to the plough, built school houses and churches, opened roads through the forests and upon the seas, pushed forward through the Middle and Western States, carrying their ideas, virtues, enterprises and general prosperity with them; increased their wealth and numbers, enlarged the territory of their influence into a great empire, declared always for free labor, for the dignity of labor, for religious and political liberty, until, by the superior innovating vigor of the Puritan intellect, though Virginia was settled first, they became the controlling intellectual power of the country. These elements culminated in all their glory in the government and institutions of Massachusetts. In her career of empire, she extended her ideas, institutions and characteristics over nineteen States and twenty millions of people.

From these two diverging streams of colonization have arisen two systems of labor, two tendencies in political development, two states of social and religious culture. These powers have always been more or less in contention with each other, which contentions were plainly seen during the Colonial period, the Revolutionary and Constitutional periods, and have now broken out in open hostility in what may be termed the period of the Rebellion.

Massachusetts and Virginia.

Though pursuing different paths to greatness, Massachusetts and Virginia have stood side by side in all the great contests of the nation. The oppressions of England weighed heavily upon both colonies. This became a bond of sympathy, and they cordially combined to avert a common danger. The Revolution was commenced in Massachusetts, under the patriots Adams, Hancock and Otis. She was the first to spring to the rescue, the first to spend her treasure, and pour out her blood for the defeat of a common enemy. Virginia, if not as prompt and efficient in furnishing substantial means, produced the "man for the hour," which gave her a leading influence in the revolutionary struggle. After the successful close of the greatest revolution of history, the Constitution was adopted upon principles first practically enunciated under Puritan influences in Massachusetts, first foreshadowed in design in the confederation for defence between the colonies of Massachusetts Bay, Plymouth, Connecticut, and New Haven. The North has always attempted to abide by the spirit of that Constitution, and history will aver that she has attempted most faithfully to carry out the glorious doctrines of the Declaration of Independence in the spirit of Jefferson of Virginia, and the Fathers of the Republic.

From the close of the Revolution, more than ever before, Massachusetts led Virginia, in art, education, manufactures, commerce, and in all the essentials of substantial wealth. In the great political discussions of 1820, these two antagonistic elements fought a hard battle for the maintenance of their peculiar ideas, and Liberty hoped that she had gained a permanent advantage in the Missouri Compromise. The North, in her expanding trade and commerce, sought the aid of a national bank, a careful regulation of the currency system of the country, and a protective tariff for her industry. To the latter, the South objected, and South Carolina raised the standard of nullification — a heresy that had the destruction of the Union as a logical result; but the quick thought and iron will of Jackson terrified the monster into submission by the utterance of those memorable words, "The Federal Union, it must be preserved."

Their Contest.

At this time the results of free thought, justice, religion, sound popular education, industry and enterprise had grown to great stature in the North — they could not be quiet. The South began to fear and protest against encroachments upon their interests. Earnest men and women, actuated by the same zeal that moved Knox, Hampden and Pym against church and state in England, talked, wrote, voted, and acted within what they deemed constitutional limits, to rid themselves of all responsibility for the greatest of our national misfortunes. The aristocracy, more than the people of the South, finding itself likely to be outstripped in all the essentials of national power, made demands upon the government, which demands were belligerent in tone, and threatened the destruction of the Union if they were not conceded. To quiet them, a large share of the government patronage and political power was given to them. For the sake of peace, compromises were entered into. They demanded the rendition bill of 1850; it was granted. They desired the repeal of the Missouri Compromise; it was repealed. Successive national congresses were elected, and committees were formed in both branches favorable to the Virginian rather than to the Massachusetts Idea. Presidents were elected, who, for the sake of peace, were compelled to look with more favor upon them than their just rights and real importance demanded. These aristocrats, not the people, plotted, counter-plotted to maintain the balance of power, hoping to keep it by political manoeuvres, when it could be retained only by educational institutions, wealth, trade, commerce, manufactures, and the consequent increase of population. These agitations of sentiment and opinion soon extended themselves more decidedly into politics; Massachusetts always taking the lead, with Virginia and South Carolina, two States pledged to the same Idea, in the opposition. In 1856, the Republican party, a party embodying the Idea of Massachusetts, consummated a sufficient working power to hope to elect a Republican President. His election was confidently predicted. The South was alarmed, and, as she had often done, boldly threatened the dismemberment of the Union. The Republicans were defeated, and a Democratic President quieted agitation in a measure; but all action did not cease. The moral principle deemed to be involved on the one side, and the personal and pecuniary interests on the other, stimulated the opposing elements to continued activity. Massachusetts and Virginia, as the exponents of the democratic and aristocratic principles, were pitted against each other in open contest in Kansas and Nebraska. The election of 1860 approached. It had been for some time evident that, by the disintegration of old parties upon the new issues which had arisen, Massachusetts would soon elect her President. The North had long been consolidating upon her Idea. The South had long been protesting. The two sections seemed to be withdrawing from former intimate relations, and congregating around their two different centres. The central ideas of each were deeper than any "peculiar institution" entertained by either. Their peculiar institutions were only accessories, adjuncts, logical results of their dif-

ferent ideas; and these ideas had their origin far back in English history, and have grown into greater distinctness and division here because of the latitude given to each in widely separated geographical positions. In 1860, Lincoln was elected President; the first President that had been elected purely upon the principles that based the conflicts between the people of England and James II. and Charles I.; the principles of universal liberty, equality, toleration, self-government, against their unjust and demoralizing opposites.

In Great Britain, from Elizabeth Tudor to Victoria, the Cavalier or Tory element has held the reins and the patronage of the government, save during the Commonwealth under Cromwell, when the Puritans had the power. Still, that aristocracy has suffered a gradual and continual encroachment from the democracy, in proportion as education and morality have increased among the middle masses of the people; and one by one the great prerogatives of the Court and Crown have been torn away and made to subserve the interests of the people. Now, true to their ancient instincts and hereditary policy, under the Tory lead of the Earl of Derby, and Earl Russell, and Palmerston, they hold the official action of the government, and subject the movement of the press to the decided advantage of the Aristocracy first established at Jamestown, and to the decided prejudice of the Democracy first founded at Plymouth. Under the lead of Bright, Cobden, and Brougham in England, of far-sighted and patriotic statesmen in the United States, Democracy can only hope for peace and the triumph of its principles in the control and the sovereignty of the two great Saxon constitutional governments of history.

Development of the Conspiracy.

This is a rebellion of the politicians and aristocracy in the slave interest, and not of the people. There are two classes in the South, the slaveholding aristocracy, and the people. The poor whites have but little political significance. The aristocracy maintain the traditional memories of Virginia; political power is their ambition; they have the wealth, education, social culture, and the habit of public life to help them in retaining their long-held political ascendancy. They have become attached to this ascendancy, and will not yield it without a struggle. The masses of the people are beginning to know their political significance, and in the end will overturn the aristocracy. The open war between the Puritan and Cavalier, between Massachusetts and Virginia, between the great Aristocracy and the great Democracy of the Union, has commenced. In the Presidential election of 1860, the Aristocracy met with a Waterloo defeat, and, to recover their old ascendancy, organized Rebellion and commenced civil war. It is the progress of this Rebellion that we would outline.

The Conspiracy in 1832.

It actually commenced in 1832-3, in South Carolina. She claimed that Jefferson maintained the right of a State to judge of the constitutionality of a law, and to nullify the law if unconstitutional. In her opposition to the tariff of '28 South Carolina based her action upon this principle. She alleged that this tariff increased the cost of living in the South, and aided the domestic manufacturers of the North. Hayne took up her cause in the Senate, and was defeated by the irresistible logic of Webster. South Carolina called a convention of delegates to consider the crisis; Virginia, by a vote of one hundred and fifty-four to sixty-eight, passed a vote of nullification; Alabama and Georgia heartily seconded South Carolina; but North Carolina stood firm for the Union. The nullification convention of the States met, Hayne was chosen chairman, the tariffs of '28 and '32 were denounced as unconstitutional; it was voted that no appeal to the Supreme Court of the United States should be listened to; and that attempts to enforce the laws should be resisted by force. The Governor of South Carolina prepared to enforce resistance. Mr. Calhoun, Vice-President of the United States, resigned. But President Jackson declared nullification to be revolution, and that the Union should be preserved. He prepared to enforce his decrees by arms — the nullifiers saw the hopelessness of their cause, and concluded to submit, and, as far as possible, undo the work which they had done. The decision of the President saved the Union.

But the feeling of envy and hatred toward the North was not dead. Free labor, capital, and ideas, were gaining an ascendancy in the Union that was dangerous to Southern principles. The balance of power must be retained. From 1832 to 1850 the two sections kept alive a bitter sectional contest. The Southern leaders looked about them, and found in Mexico a means to help them to retain the balance of power. For a frivolous pretext war was made upon her, and Texas, with a large portion of Mexican territory, became a part of the United States. Slave States were provided for from this territory, and this accomplished one more result for the Southern aristocracy.

As another act in the great programme, the Fugitive Slave bill of 1850 was passed. In this the South was again triumphant, and the North indignant. The people, questioning the constitutional provisions for the rendition of fugitives, declared that they would not become the slave-catchers of the South. They carried their opposition into the press, the pulpit, the courts, the streets. Notwithstanding this, their reverence for law was such, that in many instances the provisions of the law were permitted to be executed. The discussions of agitators upon this law widened the breach between the North and the South.

The progress of the rebellion again appeared in Congress in 1854. Douglass introduced a bill providing that any State applying for admission to the Federal Union might come in with or without slavery, as her constitution might provide; also that the people of the territories might legislate for themselves, taking away the power of Congress to legislate for them. These were the State and Squatter Sovereignty doctrines.

It was a virtual abrogation of the Missouri Compromise. The bill passed — the North was alarmed. The battle was commenced in Kansas and Nebraska. The South poured in her armed men, the North her men armed with the rifle and the plough; and, between them, Kansas became a field of blood.

This prepared the way for the Presidential election of 1856. Both parties seized upon the anti-slavery sentiment, and moulded it to party purposes. But the anti-slavery party had become so strong that the election of Fremont was confidently predicted. Alarmed at this prospect, the South openly declared that she should oppose the Government in that event, and prevent the inauguration of the President though constitutionally elected. Fremont was defeated. The election of one more favorable to Southern interests averted for a time the calamity of civil war. Though the election of Buchanan quieted public agitation upon the "irrepressible conflict," the moral principle and pecuniary interest deemed to be involved on the one side and the other kept up the controversy, yet it was more confined and subdued.

The Presidential election of 1860 approached. The democratic convention was held at Charleston. The ultra Southerners took an extreme position upon the slavery question. The moderate democrats of the North could not sustain them. The party split, and the ultraists nominated Breckenridge, and the seceding faction nominated Douglass as candidates for the Presidency. The Republican convention nominated Lincoln, of Illinois; and the constitutional Union men, Bell, of Tennessee. The campaign was exciting, one full of party animosity, and hard fought. In the result, Lincoln had one hundred and eighty, Douglass twelve, Bell thirty-nine, and Breckenridge seventy-two of the votes of the Electoral College. The Republican candidate was declared elected President of the United States. The South, all the time protesting, declared secession to be her policy, forgetting the duty of the minority to yield; and, aided by those in the confidence of the government, she commenced plotting for rebellion and civil war.

The Conspiracy in 1860.

The work of disintegration soon commenced, South Carolina taking the initiatory. November 5, 1860, her Governor issued a secession message, and counselled the Legislature to consider the crisis, and prepare to defy the power of the United States. December 20th her convention unanimously passed an ordinance of secession. The fire, once lighted, spread rapidly throughout the Cotton States. January 9th Mississippi followed in her footsteps; on the 11th, Alabama; the 12th, Florida; the 19th, Georgia; the 28th, Louisiana; and February 1st, Texas, — all passed ordinances of secession; thus dissolving their political connection with the United States of America.

November 9th and 11th, the senators and representatives of South Carolina in Congress withdrew, and on January 21st those of Mississippi, Georgia, and Florida resigned their seats; and on February 5th all those of Louisiana, save Bouligny, withdrew.

The process of dissolution was not confined to the secession of States and the withdrawal of members from Congress. Members of the Cabinet residing in the Southern States considered their allegiance to their States superior to that to the United States. December 10th, Cobb, of Georgia, Secretary of the Treasury, and the 29th, Floyd, of Virginia, Secretary of War, resigned their places in the Cabinet. Through their unparalleled treachery to the Government that had given them the highest confidence, they had so crippled the forces of the Union, in the robbing of money and arms, that the interests of secession were assisted nearly into an equality of power with the rest of the Union.

The work thus commenced was not to be half-way — the position taken was to be sustained by arms. In December, South Carolina's Legislature authorized the seizure of all arsenals, arms, and forts within her limits. January 3d, Governor Brown, of Georgia, ordered the seizure of Forts Pulaski and Jackson, at Savannah; on the 4th the authorities of Alabama seized Fort Morgan; on the 10th the authorities of Mississippi seized the forts and other United States property within her limits; on the 12th the Navy Yard and property at Pensacola were taken; on the 28th the rebels of Louisiana took the United States revenue cutter, and other property, and the money in the mint at New Orleans; and, to complete this list of plundering, General Twiggs of Texas surrendered the United States forces and property in his hands into the power of the rebels. The forts seized were armed and manned, the arsenals were robbed, the militia of the cotton States was called out, and every material preparation made to withstand any attempt of the Union for self-preservation. Legislatures were convened, minute men organized, mass meetings held, the suspension of banks was legalized, millions were voted to carry out the nefarious designs of the secessionists; Southern rights associations were organized, Northern men were daily arrested, Union men were awed into silence, the levying of executions issuing from the United States courts was prevented by Legislatures, religious conferences passed resolutions favoring secession, and Palmetto and State flags were flying everywhere, and everywhere the Stars and Stripes were hauled down and trailed in the dust. The news of secession was hailed with acclamations of delight; and, to close this saturnalia, two hundred and sixteen of the patients in the United States Hospital at New Orleans were removed to make room for the secession troops of Louisiana. Theft was honored, robbery justified, and inhumanity to the sick became a public virtue; law, order, peace, brotherly love patriotism, and respect for historical memories, all declined to their confounding contraries.

Among the leading men, the Governor of Florida, Governor Moore of Alabama, Letcher of Virginia, and Moore of Louisiana, Cobb, Johnson, and Floyd, in the Cabinet, senators Clingman of North Carolina and Toombs of Georgia, the Governors

of Georgia, Tennessee, South Carolina, and Kentucky, and Barnwell, Orr, and Adams, the three South Carolina commissioners to Washington, and Ex-Governor Moorehead, of Kentucky, Davis, Beauregard, and a host of others, leading men, all honorable men in the South, men nourished into growth and power by the Union, now turned their faces and their swords against that Union, to destroy it.

Not all, however, was rotten in Denmark. Governor Hicks of Maryland refused to convene the Legislature, and so, also, did Governor Houston of Texas. Andrew Johnson of Tennessee raised his voice against the madness of secession, and Crittenden of Kentucky used his character and eloquence to withstand the tide; and seven in the Florida convention, seventeen in the Louisiana, and thirty-nine in the Alabama convention, voted against the ordinance of secession. Crittenden, in the Senate, introduced compromise measures, but they failed to meet with general approval. Boteler, in the House, introduced a resolution calling for a Peace Convention of all the States; it was called, but the efforts of that convention proved a failure.

The secessionists would not be conciliated; they would have disunion; and in spite of all the efforts of eminent men, the patriotic appeals of a large class of conservatives distinguished for the moderation of their temper and the dignity of their character, and the wise deliberations of peace conventions, seven States and four millions of people were drawn into the whirlpool of secession. Congress met, and adjourned again, unable to do anything save leave the fate of the Union in the hands of the incoming Administration.

President Lincoln's Inaugural.

The fourth of March approached, the day that was to see the departure of an old, and the advent of a new Administration in the midst of pending serious national calamities. The opinions of the incoming Executive were looked for with the most intense interest,—as was his progress watched from Springfield, Illinois, to Washington. In Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, he had intimation of a plot for his assassination while passing through Baltimore. At the earnest solicitation of his friends, he made a hurried departure from Philadelphia, and a disguised passage through Baltimore, thus cheating the minions of secession in that city of a coveted opportunity to make themselves infamous. He arrived in Washington Feb. 23d. Upon the 4th of March, A. D. 1861, Abraham Lincoln, of Illinois, was duly sworn in as President of the United States, for four years from that date. The ceremony was solemn and impressive in the extreme. Rumors of revolt, of assassination, of a destruction of the Capital on that day, were rife, which put the Executive authorities upon their guard. General Scott, the great soldier and the firm and faithful patriot, so organized his forces and disposed them throughout the city, and in the vicinity of the capital, that assassination was improbable. Thus the barbarism of those in the interest of secession compelled the capital of the Great Republic to assume the appearance of a feudal city a thousand years before, when fear and the sword ruled, instead of justice and moral dignity of character. The ceremonies were completed without disaster or crime, and his inaugural was delivered from the balcony of the Capitol. Every man North and South looked for each word with deepest interest, for in that they saw would be foreshadowed the new policies that were to deal with and master the fierce political and revolutionary elements of the day. We will state his most important positions.

His Position.

He said, at the outset, "I have no purpose, directly or indirectly, to interfere with the institution of slavery in the States where it exists," and affirmed the right of each State to control its own domestic institutions according to its own judgment. He reassured the people that the prosperity, peace, and security of no section was to be endangered by the incoming Administration, and assured all the States of protection under the Constitution. The obligation to abide by the Constitution in the rendition of fugitives was strongly asserted, and amendments to the laws under which they were to be rendered up were suggested. The disruption of the Union was formidably attempted, but he held that the Union was perpetual, and that the Constitution contained no provision for its own termination, and that it was impossible to destroy the Union, save by some action not contemplated in the Constitution. The Union was held as older than the Constitution;—as formed by the Articles of Association of 1774, nearly matured in the Declaration of Independence in 1776, further matured in the Articles of Confederation of 1778, and finally perpetually completed in the adoption of the Constitution in 1787. Therefore it follows that any resolves or ordinances to the effect of dissolution are void; any acts of violence, in any State, against the authority of the United States, are insurrectionary or revolutionary. In his view, he considered the Union unbroken, and said, "I shall take care, as the Constitution itself enjoins me, that the laws of the Union shall be faithfully executed in all the States; and this I shall do, unless my rightful masters, the American people, shall withhold the requisition, or in some authoritative manner direct the contrary." He trusted that this would not be regarded as a menace, but only as a declared purpose of the Union to maintain itself. He said that in doing this "there should be no bloodshed, unless it was forced upon the national authority." He asserted that the power given to him "should be used to hold, occupy, and possess the property and places belonging to the government, and collect the duties and imposts;" that beyond this there should be "no invasion, no using of force against or among the people anywhere." Obnoxious officers were not to be forced upon the people; the mails were to be furnished to all parts of the Union,

unless repelled; and this course was to be pursued, unless experience showed that a modification would be proper. He said nothing to those seeking to destroy the Union, but appealed strongly to the patriotism of those who loved the Union. No instance was recollected in which a plain provision of the Constitution had been denied. It would justify revolution for a majority to refuse a minority any of its rights, but the majority or the minority must acquiesce in the constitutional decisions of the other. In his opinion, "Plainly, the central idea of secession is the essence of anarchy;" also, a majority held in check by Constitutional provisions was the only true sovereign of a free people. He doubted the justice of having the policy of the Government irrevocably fixed by the decisions of the Supreme Court, and believed the substantial cause of difference between the two sections was, that one side believed that slavery was right, and ought to be extended, and the other that it was wrong, and ought not to be extended. Physically speaking, we cannot separate; and he significantly asked, "Can aliens make treaties easier than friends can make laws?" He would recommend no amendment to the Constitution, but if the people desired it, would favor rather than oppose a fair opportunity for the people to act upon one; and he had no objection to an express and irrevocable amendment that Congress should not meddle with the domestic institutions of the States. "In your hands," said he, "my dissatisfied fellow-countrymen, and not in mine, is the momentous issue of civil war. The Government will not assail you; you can have no conflict without yourselves being the aggressors. You have no oath registered in heaven to destroy the government; while I shall have the most solemn one to 'preserve, protect, and defend it.'"

Thus he assumed his positions within the Constitution and the laws, and for the lawful continuance of their sovereignty in all the States of the Union. No friend of the Union could complain at his distinct statements, and his logical views of the difficulties of the hour. The friends of the Union had hoped that he, though alleged to be elected by a sectional party, would abandon all sectionalism in his sentiments, if he entertained any, and see nothing but his whole country, the preservation of the peace, the protection of all men in their legal rights. In this Inaugural, they saw that they were not disappointed. Not possessing the polish of literary culture, it had a plain, business-like directness in exact harmony with the parliamentary spirit of the age, which seeks the accomplishment of practical results, rather than well turned phrases and high-toned eloquence in a state document. His commencement was the omen of a successful Administration.

Fort Sumter.

Throughout the North the Inaugural was received with decided approbation. The clouds seemed to break away from the future, for the Government was seen to have a policy, a decision of character not so easily discovered in the Administration just resigning its power. In the South, among the Secessionists, the Inaugural was denounced as a declaration of war, and anathema and derision were showered upon the head of him who was faithfully seeking to lead a divided nation to peace. The public sentiment of the North commenced concentrating around the President, to sustain the flag of the Union wherever it was insulted or torn down. Loyalty was the sentiment and the word of the North. The Executive, thus backed by the people, commenced the most cautious movements to avoid an open rupture, yet to maintain the dignity of the laws. But the Secessionists, crying out against the tyranny and the sectionalism of the North, secretly laid their plans to force the Government to consent to peaceable secession or to open war.

The Congress of the Confederate States passed their Army bill, to organize a material force with which to maintain their hostile position. Their action did not pause with resolves, — they put their thoughts into deeds, and compelled the friends of the Union to believe that there was no alternative but a civil war or a dissolution of the Union. March 18th, by a general order, General Bragg cut off the supply of fuel, water, and provisions, to the armed vessels of the United States in Pensacola harbor. On the 12th, the Confederate Commissioners, believing that they could coerce the North into a peaceable negotiation for a dissolution of the Union, presumed to address a note to Secretary Seward, in which they expressed a desire to open a negotiation for a peaceful separation of the States. Mr. Seward very properly replied to them that he should refuse to recognize them as agents, or hold official or diplomatic intercourse with them.

At Savannah, Ga., on the 21st, was the first great announcement of the principles upon which the Southern Confederacy was to be founded. Mr. Alexander H. Stevens, the Vice-President of the Confederate States, in a speech upon the subject, said of his government, "*Its foundations are laid, its corner stone rests, upon the great truth that the negro is not equal to the white man; that slavery, subordination to the superior race, is his natural and normal condition. This, our new government, is the first in the history of the world, based upon this great physical, philosophical and moral truth.*" This announcement, made with barefaced honesty, went through the country, and deeply stirred the moral sensibilities of the people. Men could not believe that the days of a Nero and a Caligula had come again.

Then followed quickly those acts that brought the agitations of the hour to an issue. The Secessionists would not tolerate neutrality — they compelled men to declare their faith. Fort Sumter had long been besieged, and was in a suffering condition. It became the duty of the Government to send it supplies, and it informed the authorities at Charleston that those supplies should be sent peaceably if possible, but forcibly if

they must. They had formed a cordon of fire around the fort, and watched every sail that approached it with a determination for its destruction. An unarmed schooner was fired into; and the *Star of the West*, loaded with Government supplies for the fort, was also fired into by the surrounding batteries, and compelled to retire. These were the first guns of South Carolina directed against the Union. By her treason, a starving and beleaguered garrison, which had been placed in her harbor for her defence, was to be cut off from existence.

The drama now rapidly commenced to thicken. April 8th, Beauregard informed Walker, the Confederate Secretary of War, that President Lincoln intended to provision Fort Sumter peaceably, or by force; to which Walker replied on the 10th, that he should demand its immediate evacuation, and if refused, that he should reduce it. The 11th, Beauregard communicated this to Anderson, and stated that the command and property should be respected, and the flag saluted on being taken down. Major Anderson replied that his sense of honor, and his obligation to his Government, prevented his complying with the demand, and also stated verbally to the bearer, that he should be starved out in a few days if he was not battered to pieces. Walker then inquired at what time he would evacuate, and Anderson replied on the 15th, if he did not receive supplies or controlling instructions from the Government. This was not satisfactory to the rebel statesman. On the 12th, he was informed that fire would be opened upon him in one hour.

The Battle.

At 4, A. M., nineteen batteries commenced pouring their iron hail into the fort. This opened the battle that was to determine the last great issue between the Ancient Barbarism and the Modern Civilization.

To the surprise of Major Anderson, a masked battery of 33 heavy guns opened and crashed their shot against the walls of the fort. The Major was calm, and equal to the occasion. He leisurely breakfasted his men at half-past six, while shot and shell were flying thick around them. He then divided his command into three reliefs, disposed them, and opened fire upon Cumming's Point, Fort Moultrie, and Sullivan's Island. The floating battery of the rebels, with its slant roof of heavy iron, proved a more effectual resistance to cannon shot than was anticipated, and was but little injured. Fort Moultrie did not stand our heavy and well-aimed guns as well. The fire of the rebels was so terrific, that it was impossible to use the parapet guns. A man, however, was kept on the lookout, and cried "shot," or "shell," so that before the missile reached the fort, the men had time to rush to shelter. This saved life. The rebel fire continued. After two days' firing at the flagstaff, a portion was shot away. The officers' quarters were destroyed. The barracks caught fire several times on the first day and were extinguished; but the second day, taking fire, they could not be put out. The walls were soon greatly weakened by the tons of iron hailed against them, the main gates were destroyed, and to complete the work of destruction, the fort took fire on all sides. Through fear that it would communicate with the powder magazine, ninety-six barrels of powder were thrown into the sea. The cartridges soon gave out, and sheets, shirts, and blankets were used in making them, until these gave out also, and there was absolutely nothing with which to continue fighting. The men suffered all things but death. The last biscuit had been eaten 36 hours before; the fire increased to such a heat that the men had to lay upon the ground with their handkerchiefs to their mouths to keep from suffocation; and this would have been no prevention if it had not been for an eddy of wind that fortunately passed through the fort.

Thus matters stood in a most critical and desperate condition, until the close of the 13th. Senator Wigfall then made his appearance at one of the embrasures, and said that he came from Beauregard, and urged them to suspend fire and surrender. At his request, a white flag was displayed from the embrasure; but, instead of respecting it, as is done by the rules of war among civilized nations, rebel shot was directed at it. The soldier holding it came down; and Wigfall himself then took it, but was compelled to retreat also, and no one else was found who would take the perilous responsibility. To his request for evacuation, Major Anderson replied that he would evacuate on the terms already stated, and none other. Wigfall then retired. Others soon came, who said that Wigfall was not authorized by Beauregard. The brave Major Anderson finding that further resistance was madness, agreed upon the same terms of evacuation which he before prescribed. These were that they might march out with all the company and side arms and individual property, at their own time, in their own way, and that they should salute the flag upon taking it down. Then preparations for the evacuation were made, the flag was saluted with fifty guns as it was lowered, and the men marched out playing Yankee Doodle and Hail to the Chief. The only men killed on our side were two, at the firing of the last gun in the salute; and they were buried at the foot of the flagstaff, with the honors of war.

Thus fell Fort Sumter at the hands of South Carolina; the first State to forget the memory of her fathers, the first to repudiate and put from her the fruits of the glorious battle-fields of the Revolution, the first to make war upon that Constitution that Jefferson and Hamilton framed, and that Washington prepared the way for with his sword. With treason in her heart, with suicide in her brain, and 5000 men and 19 heavy batteries in her hand, she attacked a small fort and sixty starved men, and went into ecstasies of delight at her victory. She will yet find that it was not a victory, but a terrible defeat, for in her attack upon Sumter she attacked the moral dignity and fastness of modern civilization, and this cannot yield to South Carolina.

The President's Proclamations.

The news of the fall of Sumter went like a thunderbolt through the land. The martial spirit of the people was aroused. These guns were not heard clashing their iron hail against the walls of that fort alone. The people heard them breaking their force against the temple which their fathers had builded, and shattering it to atoms. They felt that law, order, peace, the foundations of the Republic, had been outraged, and that there was no release from the obligation to rise up, and, as one man, rush to the annihilation of the powers of the Rebellion. Never British blood nor Celtic ire leaped quicker at an outrage offered to their nation's honor, than did the American spring to redeem his flag from this deep disgrace.

Before, the President had hesitated to precipitate events, for fear that he might add one straw to the lighting of the fires of civil war among thirty millions of people. He would rather err on the side of mercy; he would rather be slow to anger; slow to hurl the North and the South, those two gigantic powers, against each other in mortal conflict. Hence the myrmidons of secession were allowed to build their batteries, point their guns, and threaten to belch their fires upon the cherished institutions of the Union, as long as a hope was left that they might repent of their haste, and withdraw from their work of ruin. But now the last ray of hope was fled. The President of the United States had nothing to do but to strike in return. Justice, mercy, duty to millions, urged him to strike, and he no longer hesitated. He immediately called his counsellors together. They heard the cry of the people, and that it was to arms. As their official Executive, he saw there was no cause, no time for deliberation. Immediately the proclamation went forth, on the 15th of April, the day after Sumter fell, for 75,000 men to execute the laws of the land. As the laws of the Union were obstructed in South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Florida, Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas, by combinations too powerful to be suppressed by the ordinary means, he thought fit to call forth the militia of the several States to the number of 75,000, to execute the laws. He appealed to all loyal people to aid in maintaining the nation's honor, the perpetuity of popular government, and to redress the wrongs already long enough endured.

And here comes a part of the Proclamation that should be read by all men in the South; that should be fastened upon their doorposts, so that they could not fail to understand it, and show that this is a war not against the legal rights of any man, — that it is to protect all men, and the peace of the country.

"I deem it proper," he said, *"to say that the first service assigned to the forces hereby called forth, will probably be to repossess the forts, places, and property which have been seized from the Union; and in every event, the utmost care will be observed, consistently with the objects aforesaid, to avoid any devastation, any destruction of, or interference with, property, or any disturbance of peaceful citizens in any part of the country."*

He commanded the persons composing these combinations to retire peaceably to their respective abodes within twenty days from date.

He also summoned both Senators and Representatives to assemble in their respective Chambers at noon, on July 4th, and there determine such measures as the public safety and interest might demand.

On the 19th of April, he issued another Proclamation, declaring the ports of the States of South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Florida, Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas — the ports of all the States that had seceded — in a state of blockade.

On the 27th of April, he issued another Proclamation, declaring the ports of Virginia and North Carolina under blockade, they having seceded since the date of the preceding Proclamation.

On the 3d of May, he deemed it necessary to issue another Proclamation, calling for 42,000 volunteers to serve for three years, unless they were sooner discharged. He also directed that the regular army be increased by 22,714 men; and also called for the enlistment of 18,000 seamen for the naval service.

On the 10th of May, he declared, by Proclamation, martial law upon the islands of Key West, the Tortugas, and Santa Rosa, and Florida.

On the 12th of August, he also issued another Proclamation, appointing the last Thursday in September as a day of humiliation and prayer and fasting, for all the people of the nation.

And on the 16th of August, he issued his last Proclamation, declaring the seceded States in a state of insurrection, and interdicted all commercial intercourse with them.

Immediately upon the first Proclamation, the Secretary of War issued a call to the Governors of the several States for three months' men, to be detailed from the militia of the State, for each man to take the oath of allegiance to the Government, and to be mustered into the service of the United States as soon as possible.

The national Executive had done his duty. He had not precipitated war upon the country; war had been forced upon him; and now, as Commander-in-Chief, he could fight, and feel the power of justice was in his sword. It only remained for the people to respond to his call, and by their acts show to him, and to all the world, whether or not it was so easy to break in two the Great Republic.

Response of the People.

The Fiery Cross had gone forth; the summons to twenty-five millions had been sounded, and on the instant, we saw a "noble and puissant nation rousing herself like a strong man from sleep, and shaking her invincible locks." Time enough had been spent in urging measures of conciliation. Force was now the only appeal. The North-

ern Giant, calm in his haste, buckled on the Vulcanian panoply of war, and began to show stern front to Hydra-headed Rebellion. The people felt the magnitude of their task, and showed themselves equal to its undertaking.

Secessia received the Proclamation with storms of denunciation; she rushed like a headless and infuriated mob to any and all points where she could steal, capture, and destroy, to thwart the action of the President.

Citizens, but not governments, in the Southern border States, hesitated to take the fearful plunge. The Executives of every State South, save that of Delaware and Maryland, threw their swords into the Southern balance.

The madness of the Secessionists became a frenzy to grasp the material and the advantages of war. They declared to all the South that they had been attacked, that the war was to be a war for their subjugation, that it was the ambition of the North to rule by the sword, and to make war upon their institutions. They only asked to be let alone, and there would be no war. Certainly there can be no fighting if we do not oppose the assassin aiming at our life.

With this logic in their mouths, the Government was denounced, and the Union was to be overthrown. Governor Magoffin, of Kentucky, positively refused to furnish men "to aid," as he said, "in subduing the sister Southern States." Governor Harris, of Tennessee, would not furnish men for the Union, but, if necessary, 50,000 against it. Governor Jackson, of Missouri, and Ellis, of North Carolina, followed in the footsteps of Magoffin and Harris. Governor Letcher, of Virginia, forgetting and trampling under his feet the memories of Henry and Madison, Jefferson and Washington, replied to the Secretary of War, and told him that he derided the useless purpose of subjugating the South, and that Virginia would not furnish troops for that purpose, but would send troops to oppose it with determination.

Immediately upon the passage of the ordinance of secession in secret session by a vote of 60 to 59, he recognized the Southern Confederacy by proclamation, ordered the sinking of vessels at the entrance of Norfolk harbor, and issued a proclamation for the militia of the State to hold itself in readiness to answer an immediate call for action. He struck for Harper's Ferry, with its 15,000 stand of arms and machinery, but the gallant Lieutenant Jones snatched them from his grasp, by their sudden destruction. He attempted to seize the Gosport navy yard, but that was destroyed, and the ships of war Pennsylvania, Delaware, Columbus, Merrimac, Raritan, Columbia, Germantown, Plymouth, Dolphin, and United States, were scuttled and set on fire, and the Cumberland was towed out. Governor Hicks, of Maryland, Unionist, refusing to convene the Maryland Legislature, gave the President notice that no more troops could go through Baltimore without fighting their way. Of all the Southern States, Governor Burton, of Delaware, on the 26th of April, called for Union troops. Davis, the dictator, replied to the proclamation by calling for 32,000 men from the seceded States, and issuing his Letters of Marque and Reprisal to prey upon Northern commerce, thus adding barbarism to treason.

The North, too, sprang to its feet. Governors convened legislatures, and not a single Executive became false to his allegiance to the Constitution of the United States. The Banks everywhere offered their capital for furnishing supplies, arming and equipping troops, and forwarding them immediately to the seat of war. The banks of Boston voted a loan of ten per cent. of their capital; and the legislature of New York voted 30,000 men and 3,000,000 of money for the same patriotic purpose. Prominent men everywhere, those distinguished for their integrity and influence, by letter and by public speech, joined their voices in encouraging the people to do the great work before them. Meetings were held in every town and city, resolves passed, money raised, and men enlisted. In the principal cities exasperated people, no longer willing to suffer patiently with those whose principles struck at the heart of law, visited men, and newspaper offices, suspected of sympathy with secession, compelled them to disavow their sentiments, and raise the stars and stripes. The Flag of the Union never before received such homage. Its folds appeared upon every housetop in the Northern States, and men looked upon them with a new honor, love and reverence. Union badges, the red, white, and blue, were worn by everybody, so that all men declared their principles to all men upon the street. Everywhere, partisan feeling was laid aside; the people knew no Democrat, no Republican, no Abolitionist; all men moved to the step and the music of the Union. New York, the metropolis in which secession dreamed that she saw sufficient corruption to aid her treason, would listen to nothing but sentiments of loyalty, and pledged her millions, at the hands of her merchant princes, to crush secession at its birth. Rhode Island, though the smallest of the States, was not behind the old Bay State, and the Empire State, in the promptitude of her reply to the call of the President, and in her action, gave herself a glorious record upon the page of history. Military companies sprang up ready armed, like Minerva from the head of Jupiter, from Maine to Minnesota, from the Northern lakes to Mason and Dixon's line, and begged to be sent to the scene of action. The Germans, Irish, Scotch, and English—men who had fled from the Old World's oppressions and luxuries—flew to arms to defend their adopted country. In secession they saw only an oligarchy and a tyrant, who would, in America, enact another thousand years of Europe, with its age of bitterness for man, and only its few years of glory. Not only partisan and sectional strife were forgotten, but Protestant and Catholic, who had been at battle since the days of Luther, forgot their religious differences, joined hands, sent their prayers to one God of battles, and asked Him to crown their united purpose with victory.

Thus, in the North, the State authorities and the people "collected their scattered elements of strength, and awakened their dormant thunders," to hurl destruction upon Secession; upon those seeking to encompass the ruin of the best government on earth, or of history. Governors and legislatures, without one word or thought of treason, or of sympathy with those who had been, for two centuries, their Southern brethren, now that the hour of compromise and of patience had gone, and the hour of war had come, sprang forth to seize every advantage that nature and prosperity had placed in their hands, to sustain what the South would destroy. The moral grandeur of the spectacle was sublime in the extreme. Neither Greece at Thermopylæ, nor Rome with an Attila at her gates, stood clothed with mightier habiliments of moral power. Before the authorized national Executive had spoken the behest of law, the people stood with folded arms, waiting and hoping that the South would return to her reason; stood calm, and saw their forts and arsenals stolen, seized, dismantled, and turned against them, — saw frowning batteries ready to storm iron hail upon their garrisons and beloved flag, which, in all its history, had never been humbled; yet moved not to defence, and spoke words of conciliation and candor. But when the law said war, war it was. This patience of the people; this respect of the people for law; this sudden and united uprising of the people in solid Macedonian phalanx, gave the lie to the political philosophy of a Palmerston and a Derby, to the carping critics and admirers of an effeminate European aristocracy, who had no faith in the moral dignity of man, no faith in self-government, no faith in the American democracy. The highest results of civilization in the British Empire, the uprising of her people against the tyranny of a Stuart or a Guelph, can show no higher deed. *Democracy, for all the ages, was vindicated.*

Continuance of the Rebellion.

We have sketched the opening of the war, the Proclamation of the President, and the response of the people; now we propose a brief sketch of the rebellion.

April 23, John Bell, of Tennessee, cast his lot with rebellion. He, with many others, was borne down by the tempest of popular treason. Everywhere in the North, and in the South, on the last of April, all was confusion and disorder. The Governors of the Southern States were using their executive functions to aid the advances of rebellion; the armed mobs, and those who had the name of troops, were seizing and destroying, and appropriating to their own purposes bonds and monies of the United States in the collectors' offices, steamers and vessels belonging to Northern men, forts and arms. Numerous Southerners, in Washington, refused to take the oath of allegiance, and resigned their positions.

May saw the continuance of disorder. The bill to hold a State convention passed the legislature of North Carolina, when secession became evident for that State also. The Connecticut legislature, actuated by a different principle, voted \$2,000,000 to sustain the government. May sixth, Virginia, the mother of Presidents, was admitted to the Southern Confederacy; the Arkansas convention voted, 69 to 1, to secede; the rebel Congress made public the War and Privateering Act; and the Kentucky legislature met to drag that old State out of the Union, if possible; and on the next day the Governor of Tennessee announced a military league between that State and the Southern Confederacy. Between this time and the 24th, the same activity exhibited itself in all the States, North and South; troops rushing to Washington from the North, and rebels arming and organizing in all the South. The most noticeable fact of these days was the attempt of the rebels to take Kentucky out of the Union, under the lead of her traitor Governor Magoffin. On the twentieth, when he found it impossible to coerce her into disunion, he issued his proclamation of Neutrality — thus giving a quasi assistance to rebellion, and resistance to the North.

On the 24th occurred the general advance of the Union forces across the Potomac into Virginia, for the purpose of occupying Arlington Heights, which commanded the City of Washington, and erecting defences against the approach of the rebels in that direction. Upon their advance, the rebels evacuated Alexandria, which was immediately occupied by our forces under Col. Ellsworth. At this time occurred the death of Ellsworth, who was shot by the traitor Jackson, the landlord of the Marshall House.

Ellsworth.

Colonel Ephraim Elmer Ellsworth was born at Mechanicsville, a small town in Saratoga County, N. Y., on the banks of the Hudson, April 23, 1837. His father's fortunes were completely wrecked in the financial disasters of that period, and he was never able to retrieve them. Young Ellsworth was thrown on his own resources. After various employments in Troy and New York, and pursuing studies at a great sacrifice that peculiarly fitted him to enter West Point, and after ineffectual attempts to enter that place, and his failure for the want of political influence, he removed to Chicago, and there successfully engaged in business as a patent agent. Fraud deprived him of much of the fruit of his industry. Not losing heart, he resolved upon the study of law, and coined something by copying in those hours that others were devoting to relaxation. But war was his predilection; and he perfected himself in the exercise of the swordsman, marksman and the gymnast. He looked upon these for higher purposes than those of the duelist; he sought to improve by popularizing the light-infantry drill of the militia. For this purpose he studied the light-infantry drill of France, as exercised in Africa, Russia and Italy. He devoted himself to a thorough study of the French Manual, translated under the direction of Hardee. Having made

himself its master, he gathered around him a number of young men of temperate habits and athletic bodies, and thus organized the United States Zouave Cadets, of Chicago, — the first American Zouave company. Tobacco and intoxicating liquors were not to be used by any member of his company, upon pain of expulsion. He discarded the old uniform, and adopted one that gave perfect freedom to the limbs and body. He drilled his company for about a year, and also gave his attention to similar organizations in Springfield and Rockford. At the United States Agricultural Fair he won the colors, only to keep them until some other company could show a superior ability.

In July, 1860, they came East, and everywhere attracted enthusiastic crowds. In New York they filled the Academy of Music, and the streets, to suffocation. All men who saw him, and his influence over his men, felt that he had a wonderful genius for command.

In the Presidential election he advanced the cause of Lincoln by his popularity and his appeals. He formed a volunteer regiment on his return from the East, and tendered its services to the Governor, conscious that he saw war in the future. He exerted himself to influence the Legislature of Illinois to pass a military bill for putting that State upon a better footing to meet any emergency of war, but failed to effect his object. He was known to the President elect, and at his request accompanied him to Washington to receive a lieutenant's commission as preliminary to his entrance to the War Department, where he hoped to create the Militia Bureau of which he had long been preparing a plan.

The war broke out — the call was made for volunteers — Ellsworth, disgusted with the political corruption of Washington, hastened to New York, to raise a Zouave regiment of the firemen of that city, whose metal he well knew. He had an interview with the Chief of the Fire Department; the Chief issued the call, and in two days twelve hundred names were enrolled. Ten companies were accepted, and proceeded to Fort Hamilton to drill. He was now in his element. His regiment became the pet of New York. They received their stand of colors before leaving the city. On the second of May, less than three weeks after he had left Washington, alone, without authority, with nothing but his own will, he was again in that city at the head of a splendid regiment, created from the citizens by his own energy. He worked on, drilling and controlling his regiment, a task most difficult to perform, but one to which he was entirely equal. May 22 the order came to march to Alexandria. He went there with his regiment. Finding that no resistance would be offered, he gave the necessary orders to have the railroad communication interrupted, and proceeded in person with a small detachment to seize the telegraph. Catching sight of a secession flag, over the Marshall House, he entered, and asked what flag that was. The man replied that he knew nothing of it; that he was only a lodger. Ellsworth proceeded to the roof, cut down the flag, and, on his way down, Jackson sprang forward from a corner, and aimed a double-barreled fowling piece at Ellsworth's breast. Private Brownell, in front, tried to strike it up, but the assassin discharged the piece, driving into his very heart a gold circlet on which were these words, "Non nobis sed pro patria." Brownell immediately slew the assassin. Ellsworth's remains were taken to the East Room of the White House, at the request of the President. He and his Cabinet accompanied them to the depot on their way to New York. At New York they were laid in state in the Governor's room. A funeral procession of great length accompanied his remains to the river; and at the home of his childhood, amid the fury of a storm, they were committed to the earth.

We can give no more enduring comment upon the character of this man, than appears by quoting the last letter which he wrote to his parents the night before moving to Alexandria: —

HEAD QUARTERS FIRST ZOUAVES, CAMP LINCOLN,
Washington, May 23.

MY DEAR FATHER AND MOTHER:

The regiment is ordered to move across the river to night. We have no means of knowing what reception we are to meet with. I am inclined to the opinion that our entrance into Alexandria will be hotly contested, as I am just informed a large force have arrived there to-day. Should that happen, my dear parents, it may be my lot to be injured in some manner.

Whatever may happen, cherish the consolation that I was engaged in the performance of a sacred duty; and to-night, thinking over the probabilities of the morrow, and the occurrences of the past, I am perfectly content to accept whatever my fortune may be, confident that He who notheth even the fall of a sparrow will have some purpose even in the fate of one like me.

My darling and ever loved parents, good-by. God bless, protect and care for you.

ELMER.

This advance of the Union troops into Virginia was the vanguard of the Northern army. It was saluted as an invasion by Virginia, in her deep degeneracy. In the estimation of many, the ermine of the Supreme Court of the United States was also tarnished by treason, in the attempt of the Chief Justice to put the military authorities in such an exigency under the hand of that court, in the Meryman case. On the 27th of May, Jefferson Davis, with his rebel Congress, reached Richmond, Virginia, and the blockade of the Mississippi was commenced; and May 31, General Lyon took command, in the place of General Harney, at St. Louis. Thus, the end of May saw no abatement in the designs of the rebels.

The next battle of any importance was fought at Philippi, Virginia, by Col. Kelly,

with a loss of 16 killed and ten prisoners to the enemy, and the Union men lost only two killed, and Col. Kelly wounded.

June 1st occurred the battle of Big Bethel, near Fortress Monroe, an unfortunate attempt being made to surprise the enemy. Our forces were repulsed with 14 killed and 45 wounded. Among the number killed were Lieutenant Greble and Major Winthrop, the next signal martyrs of the war.

Greble.

John Lunt Greble was born in Philadelphia, on the 19th of January, 1834. He was of honorable German parentage, whose ancestors distinguished themselves in the Revolution, at Monmouth and Princeton. As a boy, he was studious, yet had the qualities of firmness and courage strongly developed. In 1850 he received an appointment as cadet at West Point, and on the 1st of July, 1854, graduated with high honors in his class. He immediately entered the army, received a commission as brevet second lieutenant in the Second Artillery, and was stationed at Newport barracks. In September he was made second lieutenant, and went to Tampa, Florida. He was engaged here two years, and took active part in the Indian troubles caused by Billy Bowlegs. After going home sick, in 1856 he returned with recruits, and resumed active service, and discharged, for a time, the duties of quartermaster and commissary. In December, 1856, he was appointed acting assistant professor of Ethics at the military academy, and held that position until Oct. 1860, having, in the mean time, been promoted to a first lieutenancy. As professor, he was required to give instruction in History, Rhetoric, Elocution, International and Constitutional Law, the Constitution of the United States, and Logic. In October, 1860, as he repeatedly solicited active service, he was ordered to Fortress Monroe. On May 26th he was sent to Newport News, as Master of Ordnance. Here the three thousand volunteers looked to him for real instruction. He superintended the works here mentioned, and also gave them instruction in the handling of artillery. Col. Phelps, commandant at Newport News, was ordered to march at midnight, and attack and surprise the rebels at Little Bethel. Greble was detailed by him to command the artillery. He obeyed with alacrity, but remarked to a brother officer that the expedition was ill-advised; that no good could come of it, and that he feared that he would not come off the field alive. At midnight he left Newport News with two six-pounders, with only two mules to draw the one, and 100 men the other. Two miles in the advance, with one gun and 11 artillerymen, he heard firing in the rear. He returned to the point, and found his other gun firing into a Brooklyn regiment. This notified the enemy of his approach, when they retired to their works at Camp Creek. In sight of the enemy's works, he planted his gun, opened fire, and steadily advanced to within 100 yards of the works. When urged to retire, or dodge the balls, he refused, and kept up his fire for two hours, silencing all the enemy's guns, but one, by the accuracy of his aim. They made a sortie; he drove them back with his grape. The officers near him urged him to dodge or retreat, when he replied, "I never dodge; and when I hear the notes of the bugle calling a retreat, I will retreat, and not before." Only five of his men remained; and, as it was evident that no command existed on the field, he gave the order to limber up the gun, and take it away, when a ball struck him in the temple, and he fell, exclaiming, "Oh, my God!" Philadelphia did him honor in her last attentions to his remains.

Winthrop.

Major Theodore Winthrop was born in New Haven, on the 22d of September, 1828. He was grave, delicate, precocious. At 16 he entered Yale; became the idol of his college friends; studied for the Clark scholarship, and won it; studied for the Berkeleyian scholarship, but another being judged equal, they drew lots; the other won, and then divided the honor. Greek and mental philosophy were his favorite studies. He had a right to be called a scholar by nature. His mother was a great-granddaughter of President Edwards; and, among his relatives on his mother's side, he counted six presidents of colleges. But for failing health, he would have studied for a professorship or the ministry. He graduated in 1848, when 20 years old. He travelled for his health; went to England; spent some time at Oxford; walked through Scotland; went to France and Germany; explored Switzerland on foot, and did a great deal of walking in Italy and Greece. Becoming acquainted with Mr. W. H. Aspinwall in Italy, he became tutor to his son on his return; and then returned and spent six months more in Italy with him. After a short time he entered Mr. Aspinwall's counting-room. Subsequently he was engaged by the Pacific Steam-Ship Company, and went to Panama. He was gone two years; and, in the mean time, travelled through California, Oregon, went to Vancouver's Island, Puget Sound, and the Hudson Bay Company's station there. After another expedition, he returned home, studied law, and was admitted to the bar. He entered Fremont's political campaign, and did heroic labor for him in the dark places of Pennsylvania. The following year he went to St. Louis to practise law, but his health was not equal to the climate. He returned to New York, and could not be a lawyer. His brain was full of other fancies. He became a constant visitor to Church's studio; presided at the development of that great picture the Heart of the Andes. He was a writer,—a man of ideas. His pen was always by him, always prolific. His first public article was the description of the N. Y. 7th, in its march to Washington, and published in the June, '61, number of the Atlantic. The war, the proclamation came. He marched with the Seventh N. Y., as all supposed to battle. At Fortress Monroe he was made acting military secretary

and aid by General Butler. On the disastrous 10th of June, bravely facing the foe, and encouraging his men, at Big Bethel, he fell.

His articles, published since his death in the *Atlantic Monthly*, and his two volumes, Cecil Dreeme and John Brent, place him high among the literary geniuses of this country.

June 11, occurred the brilliant victory of Col. Wallace at Romney, Virginia, where 500 rebels were surprised and routed. June 17, the rebels attacked a train filled with Union soldiers, by opening fire upon it from masked batteries. It was a barbarous work; eight of our soldiers were killed. And on the same day was fought the most brilliant battle of the war so far, the battle of Booneville, by General Lyon, where a largely superior force, under Price and Jackson, were completely routed. On the 20th of June General McClellan took command in western Virginia, and soon commenced the display of that consummate generalship that has already added so much glory to American arms. And so June passed by, with the assaults of the armed rebels in all quarters where they could gather in sufficient numbers, and in solid preparation by the Union forces for the great contest before them.

July 1st occurred the fight at Buckhannon, Va., where the rebels were routed with 23 killed and 200 prisoners; and on the 2d the battle at Martinsburgh, where the rebels were again routed. July 5, Col Siegel fought the battle of Carthage in Missouri, where the rebels lost 350 in killed and wounded; a battle that gave the stamp of superior strategy to the military genius of Siegel. July 11 occurred the battle of Rich Mountain in Western Virginia, where Col. Rosencranz defeated Col. Pegram, took all his camp equipage, many prisoners, and killed 60 of the enemy. July 13, at Carricksford, the rebel General Garnett was killed, and the rebels defeated, with heavy loss. This battle cleared them out of Western Virginia. July 18 was the first battle of Bull Run at Blackburn Ford, where our men were compelled to fall back. On the 21st was fought the great battle of Bull Run, with 18,000 men on our side, and 27,000 in action on their side. In a desperate conflict of ten hours we almost won the battle, when an unaccountable panic occurred, and sent our army, in complete rout, back to their fortifications on the Potomac. We lost 479 killed, 1611 wounded, and 1500 prisoners. The rebels lost 393 killed, and 1200 wounded. Among the killed in this action were Cameron and Slocum.

Slocum.

Colonel John S. Slocum was born in Richmond, Rhode Island, November 1, 1824. He learned books well at classical schools and at a commercial academy in Hartford. His mind was active, and he learned more than books. He turned much of his attention to manual exercises, and distinguished himself in them. During the Dorr rebellion, he rallied to the defence of the government. This decided his inclination and career to arms. When the Mexican war broke out, he hastened, unattended, to Washington, and, by his own personal exertions, made his way to the ear of the President, and obtained a commission as first lieutenant in the Eighteenth, under Colonel Ransom. At the battle of Contreras his meritorious conduct won him the brevet rank of captain.

At Chapultepec, his captain having been promoted, he commanded the company, and shared in all the glory of that day; this earned him the rank of captain. At the disbandment of his regiment, he retired to private life. In the meantime he was urged, by several companies, to take command, and teach the art of war. His military studies led him to attempt to introduce James' new projectile into Europe. In 1860 he was one of the Examining Board at West Point, and, as secretary, made the report of the visitors. At the breaking out of the Great Rebellion, the governor offered him a major's commission in the First Rhode Island, which was accepted without a moment's hesitation. When a second regiment was required, he was made colonel, and was authorized to raise it. He soon raised and had the regiment ready for war. His regiment opened the battle of Bull Run, and he fell at the head of his regiment at the moment the enemy were giving way before him. He was ever distinguished for his attention and kindness to the wants of his men, and for his heroism. In the language of another, "His monument will proudly bear the record, "Contreras, Churubusco, Chapultepec, Ludley Ford."

Cameron.

James Cameron was born at Maytown, Lancaster County, Pa., March 1, 1801. On his forty-seventh birth-day, he thus reviewed his own life: "This day, forty six years ago, a child was born in a beautiful obscure town, in the interior of Pennsylvania, whose Christian name was James. This child has passed through much of the thorny thickets of life. He was a cow-boy, a plough-boy, a cutler, a blacksmith, a turner, a tailor, a printer, a brewer, a contractor, an alderman, a superintendent of railroads, a lawyer, a prosecuting attorney, an aid to the governor, — in short, almost everything but a Christian." He worked steadily as a blacksmith until nineteen, then entered the printing office of his brother Simon at Harrisburgh. From this he wandered into conducting the *Lycoming Gazette* at Williamsport.

In 1827, he removed to Lancaster, and assumed the direction of the *Political Sentinel*. While conducting this paper, he studied law in the office of the President, James Buchanan. But the anti-masonic times caused him to sell out his paper, and become a contractor on the public works in Pennsylvania. During the Mexican war, he accompanied the volunteers of the State as sutler, and thus saw something

of army service. This turned his attention to military matters. The Seventy-Ninth Highland Regiment of New York, anxious to be led by the historic name of Cameron, tendered the command to him. The regiment soon removed to Camp Lochiel. He was at the battle of Bull Run. During the engagement he showed the bearing and the courage of the true soldier. He rode conspicuous at the head of his men, and with no disguise. In the demonstration at the Stone Bridge, Cameron, though sick and feeble, almost, indeed, dying, headed his regiment, and again and again led up his men with his "Scots, follow me!" ringing above the din of battle. Wade Hampton, who had fired rifle after rifle at him, finally reached his mark, and Cameron fell. His remains now repose on the battle-field, after fruitless attempts to recover them by the consent of the unchivalric and rebel Beauregard. The Union army will yet advance and take them.

August 1, McClellan, having taken command of the army of the Potomac, commenced the reorganization of the Union army. On the 2d the battle of Dug Spring was fought in Missouri. Here Lyon gallantly defeated McCulloch, and with a considerable loss. On the 10th of August was fought the battle of Wilson's Creek, when Lyon, having appealed in vain for reinforcements, was compelled to fight 23,000 rebels, under McCulloch, Rains, Price, and Jackson, with only 5,500 men. He defeated them with a loss to them of 421 killed, and 1,300 wounded, losing himself 269 killed, and 721 wounded. Lyon himself was killed while leading a charge.

Lyon.

Nathaniel Lyon was born in a secluded out-of-the-way spot, in the town of Ashford, Windham County, Connecticut, on the 14th of July, 1819. His ancestors saw war in the Revolution. He was a hero by inheritance. He chose the army. In 1837 he entered the military academy, and graduated in July, 1841, the eleventh in his class, and at once received his commission as second lieutenant in the Second Infantry. His first service and honors gained were in Florida. He was appointed first lieutenant in 1847, and he was joined to Colonel Riley's Brigade in Twigg's Division. He led his company, and captured a battery of three pieces from the enemy at Cerro Gordo. Honorable mention was made of him, and he was already singled out as one destined to fill a conspicuous place in the military annals of the country. He possessed a wiry and active person, endowed with great energy and perseverance, and was enthusiastically attached to his profession. At Contreras, Lyon and his regiment bore the palm amid the brave. Captain Wessells and Lieutenant Lyon, after in vain attempting to turn the enemy's cannon upon them, pressed upon them, and took two hundred prisoners and two pieces of artillery. Lyon, after this battle, was recommended to the special notice of Colonel Riley. At the entrance of the city of Mexico, he also took part in the engagement, and was slightly wounded by a spent ball. At the close of the war he received the head rank of captain, and was ordered with his company to Missouri, to proceed overland to California, but embarked and reached his destination by sea. He remained here several years in active service, and received his captain's commission in June, 1851.

In dealing with the Indians he showed great tact. On one occasion he was attacked by three, one of whom seized his sword, but he wrested it from him, ran him through, and put the other two to flight. From California he was removed to Fort Riley, in Kansas, espoused the Republican cause, and aided it by his pen in the Manhattan Express. Early in the year he was placed in command of the United States Arsenal at St. Louis. His arsenal became a stronghold. The police commissioners of St. Louis demanded that Lyon should confine himself to the arsenal. He made no reply. The camp of the rebels lay without the city. Lyon was thinking while they were talking. May 1st, he suddenly appeared surrounding their camp, sent a demand for unconditional surrender, and gave half an hour for reply. They surrendered. They soon attacked him on his return; and paid the penalty of the attack. He was made brigadier general of volunteers, then broke up the rebel force at Potosi, seized the lead works that were supplying the rebel army, and captured the steamer *J. C. Juan*. By the recall of Harney, he was left in command of the department. Governor Jackson and General Price tried to circumvent him, but he turned the tide against them. He pursued these men, and met them on the field at Boonville. By consummate generalship he completely overcame and routed them, when their tents, ammunition, and supplies fell into his hands. So complete a victory seemed to crush the hopes of secession, and secure the State for the Union. On the 2d of August he fought the battle of Dug Spring against Ben McCulloch with five times his force, and here again he showed superior strategy, and routed the enemy with a heavy loss. He appealed to Fremont for reinforcements, as McCulloch's army was continually increasing, but in vain. He was compelled to evacuate Springfield. His only alternative was to attack Price and McCulloch in their camp at Wilson's Creek, nine miles from Springfield. He had but five thousand five hundred to their twenty-three thousand. He resolved to surprise them if possible. The enemy learned of his approach, and prepared to meet him. The battle raged heavily. Lyon was thrice wounded in the action; refused to retire and have his wounds dressed. A fresh body came up. Lyon rode up to them, cool and undisturbed, and encouraged them to follow up with the bayonet. "Give us a leader," they cried, "and we will follow to death!" He replied, "I will lead you. Come on, brave men!" In the charge he fell dead, pierced through the stomach by a ball, and as he fell, he exclaimed to his body-servant, "Lehman, I am killed; take care of my body." But he fell in the moment of victory. The day was won. He was finally buried by the side of his parents

in Connecticut. All the states and cities through which his remains passed rose up and did him honor.

The great historian of the country says of him, "His military services were beyond all praise; his character, as described to me, was beautifully correct, and his sad death reflects infinite honor on his own memory."

August 13 a battle was fought near Grafton, Virginia, where the rebels were defeated with a loss of twenty-one killed. The 21st, a battle was fought at Bird's Point, with forty rebels killed, and seventeen taken.

September 1 there was a fight at Boon Court House, Virginia, with a rebel loss of thirty, and the village burned. On the 10th Floyd was defeated by Rosencranz at Carnifax Ferry. On the 12th was fought the battle of Cheat Mountain, where the rebels lost Colonel John O. Washington, the rebel proprietor of Mount Vernon. On the 20th Colonel Mulligan, at Lexington, surrendered to twenty-six thousand rebels under Price, after four days' fighting, with loss of two thousand five hundred men.

October 9 the attack was made upon Wilson's Zouaves at Santa Rosa Island by one thousand five hundred rebels, who were defeated and signally punished. The 21st occurred the great defeat at Edwards' Ferry on the Potomac, where one thousand five hundred of our men were attacked by double their number. Colonel Baker was among the slain.

Colonel Baker.

Edward Dickinson Baker was born in London, February 24, 1811. He was killed at Ball's Bluff, October 21, 1861. His years were a few months more than half a century. His father was a man of education and refinement, his mother a sister of Captain Thomas Dickinson of the British navy, an officer of distinction, who fought under Collingwood at Trafalgar. At five years of age he came with his parents to America. He lived ten years in Philadelphia. In 1825 his father moved west, and opened a successful school on the Lancasterian principle in Belleville, St. Clair County, Illinois. Here young Baker developed—a ravenous reader, a boy of fine conversation and manner, of a strong memory, and spent his days reading, drawing, learning, and enjoying society of the best kind in the State. From thence he went to Carrollton, in Green County, and studied law with Judge Caverly, and then practised for some time with indifferent success. Here he married a lady of high character, who still survives him on the shores of the Pacific. In 1835 he removed to Springfield, the capital of the State. In 1837 he was elected to fill a vacancy in the legislature. He paid little attention to legislative business; but if an opponent was to be demolished, or an obnoxious measure defeated, he was the champion called upon to do it. He was State senator from 1840 to 1844. All this time he was in assiduous practice of the law. In 1844 he was elected to Congress from the Sangamon District, and was serving there with distinction when the Mexican war broke out. Full of military fire, he left Washington, and raised the "Fourth Illinois" in Springfield, and embarked for the war. Arriving at Matamoras, he was sent to Washington as bearer of dispatches, made a splendid speech for the cause of the volunteers in his seat, and then resigned it. He rejoined his regiment in time to be in at the victory of Vera Cruz, and advanced with Scott's army into the interior.

At Cerro Gordo, Shields was disabled. Baker sprang to the head of his brigade, charged a masked battery, took it, and completed an utter rout of the Mexican army. He was succeeded in his congressional district by Abraham Lincoln. He left Springfield, and went to Galena, and in a few months went to Congress. Here he labored some time with industry and success. He declined a re-election, formed a business connection with the Panama Railroad Company, and went to trouble and sickness at the head of four hundred men into the hot breath of Panama. He slowly recovered from a terrible sickness. He returned, restless still. He went to California in 1852, and early became chief among the lawyers of that State. Here he made money, friends, and fame. Unhappy at the murder of his friend Broderick, he went to Oregon, and, entering into the election of 1859, headed the republican party of the State. He was proposed for the Senate, and was elected. This was the summit of his ambition. He went to Washington, and all along the route scattered his jewels of eloquence. He went to the Senate, and for once stood among his peers. Rebellion lifted her red hand, and the din of war called him to the field. His friend, the President, offered him a brigadier generalship. It was declined, and so was the commission of a major general. He was in for work, not fame. He commenced recruiting. Men flocked to fill his ranks. There was a charm in his name. He settled all his private affairs—the winds of eternity had whispered to him. He was at Ball's Bluff. He rode in front of his men with his left hand in his breast. He spoke cool, encouraging words to his men. They fought, he fought, with a terribly cool bravery. The battle was desperate. Though hopeless, they knew only to fight. A sudden flash from a near covert of the enemy, and Baker was dead.

So lived and fell one of the restless and resistless geniuses and heroes of western life,—of American history. Uneducated in the rules of the schools, he was a polished orator; trained more to the life of western activities, he had the history of the scholar and the point of the rhetorician. Not labored, he was running over with the fluency of his thought and language. Apparently indolent in his habits, there was always a clean and beautiful finish in his performances. He was a man of "positive and aggressive character," but his soft persuasions were such that he could win golden opinions even among his most bitter political opponents. In the backwoods of the West he was

restless, energetic, powerful; in the fierce, hot life of California, he was to hold respect and esteem by skill with pistol and tongue, the only recognized representatives of manliness in those regions; and in the United States Senate, or in the mass-meeting of New York City, he could adopt the high range of sentiment, and cultivate all styles of expression and discussion that become the leaders in those positions. With books or bayonets, senators or gold-diggers, sentimentalists or unscrupulous politicians, he could meet each on his own footing, and convince him that he had a man before him, subtle, cool, energetic, persuasive. Baker will make Ball's Bluff immortal.

November 1, Lieutenant-General Scott resigned his command of the Union army, and McClellan took his place. The same day Floyd was again defeated by Rosencranz at Gauley Bridge. On the 8th was fought the battle of Belmont, where our forces were compelled to retire to their boats before large re-enforcements of the rebels. On the 15th, Captain Wilkes brought Mason and Slidell to New York, having taken them from a British steamer. At Mumfordsville, on Green River, Kentucky, on the 17th the rebels were defeated, with thirty-three killed and thirty-three wounded. On the 18th General Pope surprised a rebel camp, and took one thousand three hundred prisoners, including three colonels and seventeen captains, and all their camp stores and equipage. December 20 was fought the battle of Drainsville, where the rebels were again defeated with considerable loss.

This closed the year of 1861. Rebellion was assuming greater proportions every day, and so, too, were the means for defence. The North had but one will—the Union must be preserved. In that idea they did not falter.

Lander.

Among the greatest losses sustained by Massachusetts in this war, is the death of Brigadier-General Frederick William Lander of Salem, who was wounded at Ball's Bluff, and who died of a congestive fever aggravated by his wound, at Camp Chase, on the upper line of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad.

He was a son of Captain Edward Lander, and was born at Salem, Dec. 17, 1822. He chose the position of civil engineer early in life. He was educated at the Dummer Academy, Byfield, and completed his education as engineer at Partridge's Academy. He was always characterized by a great fondness for field sports, manly exercise, and adventure. He entered the service of the government some ten years since, and was one of the most active and energetic among those engaged in the exploration of the railroad routes to the Pacific. He had the command of an expedition in 1858, to open a wagon road to California across the plains. He made five explorations across the continent, as engineer, chief engineer, or superintendent. He was superintendent of the last surveys for the great wagon road, and he did his work with such celerity and efficiency, that he was highly complimented by the Secretary of the Interior in his official report. Of the appropriations made by Congress in two seasons alone for the construction of these roads, he brought back \$100,000 of unexpended funds. He was one honest employé of the government. His experience in these explorations made his judgment extremely valuable in regard to the routes for the Pacific Railroad, and Committees of both Houses of Congress had frequent recourse to his knowledge and judgment. At one time he organized a party, at his own expense, and surveyed a route from Washington Territory, through California, to the western part of Missouri. In some cases he had to fight the Indians, and rout them, to save his life, and proceed with his enterprises. In these expeditions he became acquainted with, and the personal friend of our commanding General, McClellan. His public services brought him in contact with most of the great men of the time, and he was honored by all.

On the breaking out of the rebellion he offered himself to his country. He was made brigadier-general of volunteers. He served with great efficiency as aid to General McClellan, in Western Virginia. On the 2d of June, in the command of the 9th Indiana and 14th Ohio Regiments, in conjunction with Col. Kelly with another detachment, they marched through a fearful storm, attacked and shelled out the rebels at Phillippi. On the 11th of July, at the battle of Rich Mountain, "Col. Lander," the official report said, "led the leaders into the fight." Upon the earnest solicitation of General McClellan, Governor Sprague, and Senator Carlisle, he was made a brigadier-general, and assigned an important station. During the disaster at Ball's Bluff he was at Washington, arranging for the opening of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad. As soon as he received intelligence of the action, he hastened to the spot, and on the 22d was wounded in the leg by a musket ball, in the skirmish which he had with the rebels opposite Edwards' Ferry. He took the field, after his confinement, too early, and over exposure and excitement speedily developed the disease that caused his death, which occurred March 2d, 1862.

His sister, the celebrated sculptress, makes her home in Italy, but is now a Florence Nightingale in the hospitals at Washington. He married Miss Davenport, a lady whose qualities of head and heart and whose dramatic genius are well known.

The most important feat performed by him was the opening of the railroad and telegraph to Hancock, Virginia, which he accomplished with two thousand men, in two columns, marching thirty-two miles in an incredibly short space of time. This act called out a war bulletin from Secretary Stanton, highly complimentary to his abilities.

At his death, the commanding general issued an order announcing his death, and paid him the highest encomiums of friendship and respect.

When his remains came to his home, they were honored by all the respect that his fellow-citizens and the State authorities could bestow.

He lived a life of heroism, and died honored, — a good destiny.

MASSACHUSETTS ACTION.

"I shall enter on no encomium of Massachusetts; she needs none. There she is. Behold her, and judge for yourselves. There is her history; the world knows it by heart. The past, at least, is secure. There is Boston, and Concord, and Lexington, and Bunker Hill; and there they will remain forever. And, sir, where American liberty first raised its voice, and where its youth was nurtured and sustained, there it still lives, in the strength of its manhood, and full of its original spirit. If discord and disunion shall rend it, if party strife and blind ambition shall pluck at and tear it, if folly and madness, if uneasiness under salutary and necessary restraint shall succeed in separating it from the Union, by which alone its existence is made sure, it will stand, in the end, by the side of that cradle in which its infancy was rocked; it will stretch forth its arm with whatever of vigor it may still retain over the friends who gather round; and it will fall at last, if fall it must, amidst the proudest monuments of its own glory, and on the very spot of its origin." — WEBSTER.

Thus spoke the great defender of the Constitution; and what he has spoken becomes history. The loyal millions of the North defend that Constitution, and that Union, with their arms, that the great debater defended with his unapproachable eloquence. States marshal themselves in a column of defence, and Massachusetts, true to her glorious old historic memories, leads the attack. She is the great American Pioneer of ideas; for these ideas she first led the attack upon the dogmas of priestcraft and kingcraft, which had so long shut the gates of mercy upon mankind; first led the attack upon taxation without representation — and why should she not be the first to lead the attack upon the treason of the Oligarchy?

And what is this question with which Massachusetts has to deal? It is a question between law and anarchy — between democracy and a dictator — between the Goth and the Roman. Massachusetts springs into the arena as one of the great arbiters, to strike the balance with the sword. When she strikes, it is not for the depression, but for the exaltation of the human race. So she has always struck; and history is full of the effectiveness of her blows.

The Mayflower brought here the germ of the future state. The fruit has not ripened to belie the golden merit of the germ. Carver and Bradford, signing that social compact in the cabin of the Mayflower, had no thought but that of justice, equity, equality, and the full development of the man, in an infant state, freed from the historical memories and feudal oppressions of England. They dreamed of a new empire, and in Massachusetts have their children seen the fruition of that dream.

Those honest men made religion the basis of their new state. In this we do not see a blind faith, but an intelligent worship under the supremacy of law, subjected to principles, and these principles the edict of God, written on the pages of the Bible, of nature, and in the heart of man. They signed that compact with conscientious motives, and we aver, against the assertions of all cavillers, that conscientious motives, from that day to this day, have been the guiding spirit of the development of this Massachusetts State. What she has believed right, she has done; what she has believed wrong, she has desisted from doing. Of her wisdom, at all times, we will not speak; we only exalt the unvarying integrity of her purpose. Not a savage fell slain by her sword, not a woman burned as a witch, not a bullet sped at Lexington or at Bunker Hill, but each act was done under obedience to that which was believed to be the Higher Power. Her wisdom may be impeached — her integrity, never. We do not forget her intolerance, the connection of church and state, nor negro slavery, nor Hartford Conventions. They are all blemishes; but they stand as evidence of want of wisdom, not want of integrity.

It is needless to point out the brilliant passages of her history; they are known. She was the first State planted and raised on this continent for higher motives than mere gain; the first to adopt the pure democracy in politics; the first to declare universal liberty, equality, and toleration; and in her government, schools, literature, mercantile integrity, industry, and in the innovating power of her ideas, she is the first of all the States. She has sent so much vigor, power, enterprise, and ambition to the great North-west, that she may look up to her, and call her Mother.

Hence she should have been the first to speed ruin to this rebellion, which struck at Plymouth Rock, at Bunker Hill, at Lexington, to destroy their sacred political significance forever. Not to have been in Baltimore, on the 19th of April, 1861, were worse than not to have been at Lexington, on the 19th of April, 1775. As her record in the establishment of independence was glorious, so is, and will be, her record in the second great war for independence. All her power, wealth, talent, genius, will come up to the labor, and she will do more than achieve, she will deserve success.

Legislative Action.

Four facts stood out prominently in the response of Massachusetts to the Proclamation of the President. First, the excellent system for the organization and discipline of the military force of the State; second, the ascertaining at head-quarters of the

number of officers and men who would respond instantly to any call of the President; third, the foresight that induced the Legislature, on the 3d of April, to pass a bill appropriating \$25,000, and authorizing the Adjutant-General to contract for overcoats, blankets, knapsacks, 200,000 ball cartridges, &c., for two thousand troops; and, fourth, the fact that the volunteer militia, for three months previous to the outbreak, in anticipation of trouble in the South, wisely prepared themselves for action. In this case, to be forewarned was to be forearmed. The results of this action only go to show the force of that aphorism, "In peace prepare for war."

The following resolves, contemplating the maintenance of the Union, were presented to the Legislature of Massachusetts, on the 18th of January, and free and full debate was invited upon them. They passed, however, with little or no debate, an indication that not partisanship, but true loyalty to the Constitution and the Union, inspired them. The following are the resolves:—

"Resolves tendering the aid of the Commonwealth to the President of the United States, in enforcing the laws and preserving the Union."

"Whereas, Several States of the Union have, through the action of their people and authorities, assumed the attitude of rebellion against the national government; and whereas, treason is still more extensively diffused; and whereas, the State of South Carolina, having first seized the post-office, custom house, moneys, arms, munitions of war and fortifications of the federal government, has, by firing upon a vessel in the service of the United States, committed an act of war; and whereas, the forts and property of the United States, in Georgia, Alabama, Louisiana, and Florida, have been seized with hostile and treasonable intention; and whereas, senators and representatives in Congress avow and sanction these acts of treason and rebellion: therefore,

"Resolved, That the Legislature of Massachusetts, now, as always, convinced of the inestimable value of the Union, and the necessity of preserving its blessings to ourselves and our posterity, regard with unmingled satisfaction the determination evinced in the recent firm and patriotic special message of the President of the United States, to amply and faithfully discharge his constitutional duty of enforcing the laws and preserving the integrity of the Union; and we proffer to him, through the Governor of the Commonwealth, such aid in men and money as he may require, to maintain the authority of the national government."

"Resolved, That the Union-loving and patriotic authorities, representatives, and citizens of those States whose loyalty is endangered or assailed by internal or external treason, who labor in behalf of the Federal Union with unflinching courage and patriotic devotion, will receive the enduring gratitude of the American people."

"Resolved, That the Governor be requested to forward, forthwith, copies of the foregoing resolutions to the President of the United States, and the Governors of the several States. [Approved January 23, 1861.]"

This was the first legislative action that was taken, in contemplation of such an issue as a great rebellion in the South. In these resolves the position of the State was defined. She was found to be true to the heritage of her fathers. She took a stand for law, and to maintain that Union inviolate that was threatened by treason, and under whose protecting ægis she had so long prospered in wealth, power, and peace. From that position she will never recede.

The State of Virginia issued a call to the other States, to meet her in convention, to see what measures of peace and conciliation could be suggested. Congress passed and promulgated a call in sympathy with that wish. The matter came up for consideration before the Legislature of Massachusetts, and the project was opposed as extra constitutional. There were those found who did not favor the convention. Others, again, argued that New York, Illinois, Ohio, and Rhode Island, which States would be represented, might, in that convention, make a new basis for a constitution, in derogation of the rights of Congress, and that the States absent might be considered as consenting by their silence. Others thought that Massachusetts already had her delegation in Congress, and that this was a sufficient representation upon all national questions. The question of sending delegates to this convention was finally considered on the 4th day of February. A call had been issued, signed by several of the most influential citizens of Boston and vicinity, for a meeting in Faneuil Hall the afternoon of the 4th. They saw and felt the necessity of an outward compliance, at least, with the call of Virginia, in order that Massachusetts should stand right on the record. Virginia alleged that she spoke in the spirit of peace; we could do no less than meet her in the same spirit. This was the feeling of the majority of the people. But those taking an ultra position upon the question of slavery opposed the appointing of the commissioners, and strenuously urged that opposition. They did not believe in the honesty of Virginia; they saw in her movement an attempt to coerce the North, by threats of dissolution of the Union, into extending further guaranties upon the question of slavery. Others replied that they owed little to courtesy, but much to the historical spirit of Massachusetts, and they did not think that she would be degraded by meeting Virginia upon her own ground. The discussion was warm in both branches of the Legislature. The spirit of conciliation prevailed, and the resolve passed the Senate.

"Resolve for the appointment of Commissioners to attend a Convention to be held in the City of Washington."

"Whereas, The Commonwealth of Massachusetts is desirous of a full and free conference with the general government, and with any or all of the other States of the Union

at any time and on every occasion when such conference may promote the welfare of the country; and

"Whereas, Questions of grave moment have arisen touching the powers of the government, and the relations between the different States of the Union; and

"Whereas, The State of Virginia has expressed a desire to meet her sister States in convention at Washington; therefore,

"Resolved, That the Governor of this Commonwealth, by and with the advice and consent of the Council, be and he hereby is authorized to appoint seven persons as commissioners, to proceed to Washington to confer with the general government, or with the separate States, or with any association of delegates from such States, and to report their doings to the Legislature at its present session; it being expressly declared that their acts shall be at all times under the control and subject to the approval or rejection of the Legislature. [Approved February 5, 1861.]"

The resolve was immediately approved by the Governor, and the following commissioners were appointed: — John B. Goodrich, of Stockbridge; Charles Allen, of Worcester; George S. Boutwell, of Groton; Francis B. Crowninshield, of Boston; Theophilus P. Chandler, of Brookline; John M. Forbes, of Milton; and Richard B. Waters, of Beverly.

These gentlemen were distinguished for their integrity and general ability; and in them the State felt that her principles would be faithfully represented. This convention, on February 27th, submitted to Congress its plan of pacification; but this plan failed to pacificate those who would not be pacified — those who were pledged to disunion and to war. Massachusetts, at least, had attempted conciliation.

On the 3d of April, 1861, the Legislature passed another resolve, authorizing the Adjutant-General to equip 2000 soldiers for active service. This resolution called out considerable ridicule from the opposition press; still, when the emergency came, the wisdom of the movement turned the ridicule to the other side. The following is a copy of the resolve:

"Resolve relating to the Equipment of Troops for Active Service."

"Resolved, That the adjutant and acting quartermaster-general be, and he is hereby authorized, under the direction of the governor and council, to provide, either by contract or otherwise, a sufficient number of overcoats, blankets, knapsacks, haversacks and other articles of equipment, camp utensils, and trenching tools, as may be required to equip two thousand troops for active service, and a sum not exceeding twenty-five thousand dollars is hereby appropriated for that purpose. [Approved April 3, 1861.]"

The Governor's Message to the Special Session, May 14, 1861.

The Governor, in April, immediately after the fall of Sumter, issued a proclamation calling together the members of the Legislature, to meet in their several chambers at noon of the 14th day of May. They met at the appointed time, in extra session. After convening, a joint committee from the two houses waited upon the Governor, and informed him that they were ready to listen to any communication that he had to make to them. The Governor met them, and in his characteristic style addressed them upon the momentous issues of the hour.

In his opinion, the occasion demands *action*, and not *speech*. A grand era has dawned, and nothing is perceived to discourage the American people. The federal government is compelled to assert its rightful authority by an appeal to the stout hearts and strong arms of loyal men. Massachusetts, by the unanimous acclaim of her people, has inspired all departments of her public service with a perfect devotion to the cause of the country, and it now remains only for the Legislature to carry out more perfectly the ideas of the people. This is no war of sections, no war of North on South; no war to avenge former wrongs, nor to perpetuate ancient griefs. It is the struggle of a people to vindicate their own rights, to retain and invigorate the institutions of their fathers. The guns pointed at Sumter announced to Major Anderson and his men their introduction into the noble army of heroes of American history.

The Proclamation of the President summoning the rebels to disperse, and the rally of the troops in Massachusetts, under all its circumstances of celerity of motion and brilliancy of results, is unexampled. The telegraphic message from Washington convinced him that no small dependence was placed upon Massachusetts to be early in the field, and no delay was permitted, for by 9 o'clock on the Sabbath morning following the Monday on which the first telegram was received, the whole number of regiments demanded from Massachusetts were already either in Washington, in Fortress Monroe, or on their way to the defence of the capital.

The war expenditures were unhesitatingly incurred. The Executive and his council understood and relied upon the temper of the people and the support of the Legislature. Not only had they supplied present, but had also anticipated coming wants in providing for military stores, clothing, equipments. All agents and departments of the service had sought economy no less than brilliancy and effectiveness in the sphere of gallant enterprise.

The disbursements in the military service, up to May 13th, were, for subsistence, \$40,222 24; clothing, \$90,823 22; equipments, \$30,565 78; transportation of troops, \$43,260 38; one half of steamer Cambridge, \$45,000 00; one half of steamer Pembroke, \$17,500; telegraphing, \$272 76; making an aggregate of \$267,645 18. To this amount may be added \$100,000 more to cover contracts for clothing and equipments contracted for, and also an amount for a contemplated purchase of arms in

Europe. The contracts in progress contemplated uniforms, &c. for new men. Nearly all these contracts and expenditures constituted a valid claim upon the federal government.

The Governor highly complimented private gentlemen, his military aids, and especially the council, which had been in session daily for the month previous. He also complimented the Quarter-Master General, who had rendered efficient service after his appointment to a new office, created for the occasion, under the constitution and the general statutes, so to relieve the Adjutant-General of a portion of his responsibilities. He recommended that an appropriation be made to cover expenses incurred, and others that might be made. On the 27th of April, he had commissioned and sent a citizen of Massachusetts to Europe to purchase the Minnie rifle, or other efficient arms as could be procured. For this purpose he had been furnished with a letter of credit to the amount of £50,000. The nautical school ship had also been fitted up, and presented by the collector of the port, with an aid to the revenue, with instruction to overhaul suspicious-looking vessels. A sense of insecurity along the coast, and the piratical demonstrations of Davis, induced them to purchase part of the steamers Cambridge and Pembroke for defence and transportation; the Cambridge, especially, had performed brilliant service in conveying troops to Fortress Monroe, and up the Potomac to Washington.

The next subject that engaged his attention was that of a State encampment. There were 129 newly enlisted companies in the active militia, induced to enlist by the prospect of being called immediately into the field. That these men might perfect themselves in their profession, so as to be of substantial service to the State, and that other citizens might be left to pursue, undisturbed, their various avocations in private life, and that the future might be efficiently provided against, and also in answer to the earnest solicitation of several citizens, he recommended the establishment of a State encampment. He made also several minor suggestions concerning the conduct of such an encampment, and gave the whole into the hands of the Legislature.

He also discouraged the practice of the towns in giving aid to the soldiers and companies forming in them. It not only became a desultory and inefficient method of rendering assistance, but also incapacitated the towns for rendering assistance to the families of the soldiers while they were away. The State was the proper authority to render any assistance necessary in forming the companies. He recommended the enrolling of the entire militia; also a popular loan to be effected by instalments as might be deemed expedient by the executive department; and the people of the State were exhorted to economy to provide against the necessities of the future.

In this address the Governor showed shrewdness and foresight in the various recommendations, and they generally met with the approval of the Legislature and the people.

Extra Session, May, 1862.

The Governor and Council, in prosecuting the preparations of the State to meet any emergency of war, made full use of the executive power in their hands. The necessities of the times, in their judgment, justified the use of that power. They relied fully upon the generosity and patriotism of the people to sustain them by any legislative action that was necessary to legalize all their acts. In this reliance they were not mistaken. When the Legislature came together in Extra Session, without opposition they commenced most appropriate legislation to support the previous action of the Executive powers. The act providing for the maintenance of the Union and the Constitution, legalizing the contracts, obligations and agreements made by the Governor and Council, providing for a Union Fund, and the issuing of Government Scrip, &c., is as follows:

An Act to provide for the Maintenance of the Union and Constitution.

Be it enacted, &c., as follows:

SECT. 1. The contracts, obligations and agreements heretofore made by the governor or the executive council, or any officer or person, with his or their sanction and authority, and all expenditures, payments, and disbursements made by the governor or the council, or under his or their authority and direction, for the furnishing of troops for the defence of the United States, or for arming, equipping and disciplining, and for the transportation and subsistence of the militia of this Commonwealth, or in any way connected therewith, are hereby ratified and confirmed, and all acts done by the governor and the council, or under his or their direction, are hereby approved, ratified and confirmed.

SECT. 2. The governor, with the advice of the council, is hereby vested with full power and authority to take such measures as may be deemed best to provide for the arming, equipping and disciplining, and for the transportation and subsistence of so much of the military force of this Commonwealth as may, in his judgment, be needed for defending, sustaining and maintaining in its full integrity the authority of the government of the United States, and the constitution and the laws thereof; and to this end he may, with the advice of the council, appoint and commission all needful officers and agents, and may fix their rank and pay.

SECT. 3. The governor and council are hereby authorized and empowered to negotiate, adjust and settle all questions, accounts, matters and things between this Commonwealth and the United States, in any way arising from or growing out of the

contracts and expenditures in the preceding sections mentioned, and out of the expenditures which may be made under the provisions of any act to provide for the public defence, or for the discipline and instruction of a military force.

SECT. 4. The governor, with the advice of the council, is hereby authorized to pay out of the fund created under this act, any of the troops of this Commonwealth which have been or may be mustered into the service of the United States during the whole or any part of the time of such service, and to make any arrangements for the reimbursement of such payments out of the treasury of the United States, as may be agreed upon between him and the federal government.

SECT. 5. For the purpose of meeting the expenses incurred and to be incurred under this act, and any act to provide for the public defence, or for the discipline and instruction of a military force, in the third section of this act mentioned, there shall be created a fund which shall be called the Union Fund; and the treasurer of the Commonwealth is hereby authorized to issue scrip or certificates of debt, in the name and on behalf of the Commonwealth, and under his signature and the seal of the Commonwealth, to an amount not exceeding three millions of dollars; and the proceeds of such scrip so issued shall be passed to the credit of said Union Fund, and the same is hereby appropriated for the purpose of paying all liabilities incurred or to be incurred under this act and the acts herein mentioned; and the governor is authorized, from time to time, to draw his warrant upon the treasurer for so much as may be needed.

SECT. 6. Such scrip or certificates of debt shall bear interest not exceeding six per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually, on the first days of January and July in each year, and may be issued at such times and in pieces of such amount as shall be fixed by the governor and council. All such scrip issued in pieces of five hundred dollars or over, shall have interest warrants attached thereto signed by the treasurer. Scrip for smaller sums shall be issued without such warrants, but bearing interest payable semi-annually on presentment to the treasurer. Such scrip or certificates of debt shall be redeemable in not less than ten nor more than thirty years from the first day of July, A. D. eighteen hundred and sixty-one, and not more than five hundred thousand dollars shall be redeemable in any one year; and the same shall be countersigned by the governor, and be deemed a pledge of the faith and credit of the Commonwealth; the treasurer may, from time to time, dispose of so much of the same as shall be required, under the direction of the governor and council, and for that purpose shall advertise for proposals for so much of the same as may be needed, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding six per cent. per annum.

SECT. 7. This act shall take effect upon its passage. [Approved May 21, 1861.]

In addition to the foregoing, they passed another, authorizing the treasurer and receiver-general of the Commonwealth to issue certificates of debt in the name of the Commonwealth, for such sum, not exceeding seven millions, as the governor and council may direct. It is as follows:

An Act in addition to an Act to provide for the Maintenance of the Union and the Constitution.

Whereas, The people of Massachusetts regard with like feelings of loyalty and affection the government of the United States, and that of their own Commonwealth, and deem it fit that the arms of each should be strengthened by all which the other can give;

And whereas, Some emergency may arise during the recess of the legislature, in which the aid of Massachusetts may be of service to the general government in its financial arrangements: therefore

Be it enacted, &c., as follows:

SECT. 1. The governor, with the advice of the council, at any time during the recess of the legislature, should such emergency arise, is hereby authorized to direct the treasurer and receiver-general of the Commonwealth to issue scrip or certificates of debt in the name and on behalf of the Commonwealth, and under his signature and the seal of the Commonwealth, for such sums, not exceeding in the aggregate the amount of seven millions of dollars, payable at such times and with such interest, not exceeding six per cent. per annum, as the governor, with the advice of the council, may direct. Said scrip or certificates of debt may be expressed in the currency of Great Britain or of the United States, and made payable in London or Boston, as the governor, with the advice of the council, shall direct; the interest shall be payable semi-annually, and interest-warrants, signed by the treasurer and receiver-general, shall be attached thereto. Said scrip shall be countersigned by the governor of the Commonwealth, and be deemed a pledge of the faith and credit of the Commonwealth for the redemption thereof.

SECT. 2. The scrip to be so issued may be sold in such manner as the governor shall direct, and the proceeds thereof loaned to the government of the United States, or expended in purchasing from the government of the United States its treasury notes, or other evidences of indebtedness, or said scrip may be delivered to the secretary of the treasury of the United States in exchange for obligations of the United States government of corresponding amount.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect upon its passage. [Approved May 21, 1861.]

In addition to the foregoing, they passed the following provisions for a Sinking Fund, direct Taxation, &c., in connection with the scrip authorized.

An Act to provide for a Sinking Fund.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :

SECT. 1. The treasurer and receiver-general shall, on the first day of January, in the year eighteen hundred and sixty-three, make a report to the legislature of the Commonwealth, of all scrip or certificates of debts issued pursuant to an act entitled "An Act to provide for the maintenance of the Union and the Constitution," and the act in addition thereto, passed at the present session of the legislature; he shall at the same time report the amount of all scrip or certificates of debt of the United States which shall have been received by this Commonwealth, from the United States, under the provisions of said acts or of either of them, and of the actual market value of said scrip or certificates of debt at the date of such report. All scrip or certificates of debt received under the provisions of said acts respectively, shall be pledged and held as a part of the sinking fund hereby created; and the principal of the same shall be applied for the redemption and payment of the scrip or certificates of debt issued under the act in pursuance of the provisions of which the same was received.

SECT. 2. There shall be raised by taxation, in each year, commencing with the year eighteen hundred and sixty-three, a sum equal to one-tenth part of the difference found by the report of the treasurer, as above provided, to exist between the amount of scrip or certificates of debt issued under said acts, and the actual market value of the amount of scrip or certificates of debt in the treasury of the Commonwealth, or stated in such report; and the sum so raised from year to year shall be pledged and held as a sinking fund, to be invested as the legislature shall direct, and applied for the redemption and payment of the scrip or certificates of debt issued by this Commonwealth, under the acts in the first section mentioned. [Approved May 21, 1861.]

We also find the following, enabling banks to purchase these government securities.

An Act to enable Banks to purchase Government Securities.

Be it enacted, &c., as follows :

SECT. 1. Loans directly made by any bank to the Commonwealth or to the United States, and notes or scrip of the Commonwealth or United States, held by any bank and directly purchased by such bank from the Commonwealth or United States, shall not be deemed debts due within the meaning of the twenty-fifth section of the fifty-seventh chapter of the General Statutes.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect upon its passage. [Approved May 21, 1861.]

In addition to this, they passed the following, providing for paying out of the Union Fund the troops of the Commonwealth which had been mustered into the service of the United States from the time of their reporting themselves under the order of the governor until they were mustered in.

An Act in further addition to An Act for the Maintenance of the Union and the Constitution.

Be it enacted, &c., as follows :

SECT. 1. The governor, with the advice of the council, is hereby authorized to pay out of the Union Fund any of the troops of this Commonwealth which have been mustered into the service of the United States during the time which elapsed from their reporting themselves for service, in pursuance of the order of the governor, and the time when they were actually mustered into the service of the United States; such pay shall be the same as that of the same troops in the service of the United States. He shall also have authority to pay such chaplains as have been or may be appointed to any of the regiments of the troops of Massachusetts which have been or may be mustered into the service of the United States, such pay to be the same allowed in the United States service.

SECT. 2. The governor and council shall have the same powers with regard to the expenditures provided in this act as are given them in the third section of the act to which this is in addition.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect upon its passage. [Approved May 22, 1861.]

According to the suggestion of the governor, the Legislature provided as follows for the instruction of the military force of the State:

An Act to provide for the Discipline and Instruction of a Military Force.

Be it enacted, &c., as follows :

SECT. 1. The governor, with the consent of the council, is authorized and empowered to establish one or more camps in suitable places within the Commonwealth, for the instruction and discipline of such military force as may be placed therein under the provisions of this act; and may procure suitable structures, tents, camp equipage, utensils, uniforms, arms, and equipments for the accommodation and use of not exceeding five regiments and one battery of artillery of six pieces; and may, from time to time, order into said camp or camps, to be kept therein for such period of time as he may deem expedient, any such companies or regiments now organized, or which shall be hereafter organized, not exceeding five regiments and one battery of artillery of six pieces, at any one time, as he may select, for the purpose of being instructed and disciplined.

SECT. 2. For the purpose of establishing such camp or camps, the governor, with the advice of the council, shall have power to contract for the use and occupation of the land needful therefor, with the owners thereof, at such a rate of rent or compensa-

tion as shall be agreed upon, and if a suitable site or sites cannot otherwise be obtained, the governor, with the consent of the council, may cause sufficient land for such camp or camps to be taken into the possession of the Commonwealth, and occupied for the purposes of a camp or camps, and may enter upon and occupy the same, either with or without the consent of the owner of the same, and the county commissioners of the county in which such lands shall be, shall fix and determine the value of the occupation of such lands per month, and at the end of each month of such occupation, the amount of such allowance shall be paid to the owners of such lands respectively. Notice shall be given by the county commissioners of the time and place, when and where they will proceed to adjust the said value, and from their judgment an appeal may be taken in the same manner as appeals from the judgment of said commissioners fixing damages for lands taken for highways.

SECT. 3. No such companies or regiments shall be placed in said camp or camps until all the members thereof shall have agreed by articles in writing that if they shall be detailed at any time, to be mustered into the service of the United States by the governor, upon the requisition of the president, they will enter into and remain in said service three years, unless sooner discharged by order of the president; or that if at any time the president of the United States shall call for volunteers for the service of the United States, and any portion of said volunteers are allotted to Massachusetts as her quota of the same, then that the governor may detail them, or any portion of them, that he may select to answer such call, and that they thereupon will enter and remain in such service for such time as said call may require, not exceeding three years, and that they will sign such papers and do such acts as may be necessary to make such enlistment effectual and binding; and that whilst in the service of the United States, they will be subject to all the laws of the United States, and all the rules and regulations of said service.

SECT. 4. The formation, organization, drill, and tactics, of the military force while in camp, by virtue of this act, shall in all respects conform to the provisions of the laws of the United States, or to any order which may be made by the commander-in-chief; and the men shall conform, so far as practicable, to the standard established for enlistment in the regular service of the United States; and the governor may make such changes in the men and officers in the several companies to be placed in camp, or detailed to be ordered into the service of the United States, as may be necessary to produce conformity to the regulations of the United States.

SECT. 5. The military force while in the camp or camps established by this act for discipline and instruction, shall be subject to the rules and articles for governing the militia in actual service.

SECT. 6. The governor, with the consent of the council, may appoint a suitable person, removable at his pleasure, to have the command of each camp established by virtue of this act, who shall be subordinate only to the commander-in-chief, with such rank and such powers and duties as the governor may, from time to time, prescribe; and such person so appointed for such command may, with the approval of the governor and council, appoint one or more suitable persons for the instruction, under his orders, of the officers and men in the camp under his command; and the officers and instructors who may be appointed under the provisions of this section shall be commissioned by the governor, with such rank and pay as shall be determined by the governor and council.

SECT. 7. The authority of the officer or officers in command of the camps respectively, may be extended by order of the commander-in-chief to a distance of one-fourth of a mile around such camps, and upon such external space no persons other than the owners of the same with their servants, for the purpose of occupying and improving the same in the same manner and way they occupied and improved the same at the time such camps shall be established, shall be allowed to enter, except under such rules as shall be established by the commanding officers of the camps respectively, with the approval of the governor, or by special permission of the officer in command for the time being, or some officer by him designated, and if any person shall so enter he may be immediately expelled.

SECT. 8. The privates while in said camp shall be entitled to the same pay, clothing, and subsistence as privates in the army of the United States; and the officers, except those whose pay is specially provided for in this act, shall receive such pay as shall be fixed by the governor and council, but in no case higher pay than that of a captain in the army of the United States. Such payment shall be made monthly, unless such troops or a portion of them shall be mustered into the army of the United States, in which case the portion so detailed shall be entitled to be paid up to the day when they are mustered into the service of the United States.

SECT. 9. The governor, with the consent of the council, may appoint, commission, and fix the pay of a suitable person, removable at pleasure, as paymaster for the camps established by virtue of this act, whose duty it shall be to receive from the treasurer, upon the order of the governor, and pay over, all moneys which shall become due to the officers, instructors, and men in such camp under the provisions of this act; and such paymaster, before entering upon the duties of his office, shall enter into bond to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, in such sum as the governor shall direct, with such sureties as he shall approve, to be evidenced by his indorsing approval on such bond, conditioned for the faithful application, according to law, of all moneys he shall receive by virtue of his office, and which bond shall be filed in the office of the treasurer; and in case of breach of conditions of said bond, such paymaster shall be prosecuted by the attorney-general, under the direction of the treasurer.

SECT. 10. The commanding officers of the several companies in camp shall make monthly returns of the service of the several members thereof to the commanding officers of their regiments, respectively, and such commanding officers shall make returns of their regiments to the commanding officer of said camps, respectively, which returns, with a return of the services of all officers and instructors in said camps respectively, shall be transmitted to the adjutant-general, and the governor shall draw his warrant monthly, upon the treasurer, in favor of the paymaster for the pay for the same, according to a pay-roll, which shall be furnished by the adjutant-general, based upon the returns made as above provided.

SECT. 11. Companies, battalions, and regiments of the volunteer militia, who shall volunteer to go into the service of the United States, shall, upon the expiration of such service, hold the position in the volunteer militia which they held when they volunteered into such service, unless otherwise provided by law.

SECT. 12. Any suitable person may be elected or appointed as an officer in the volunteer militia, and the fact that any such person elected or appointed is not a citizen of this Commonwealth shall not disqualify him from receiving his commission or warrant.

SECT. 13. If at any time any person shall be elected or appointed as a commissioned officer, who in the opinion of the commander-in-chief is unfit for actual service, the commander-in-chief shall withhold his commission, and order a new election or appointment.

SECT. 14. The commanding officer of any regiment or battalion in service without the Commonwealth may order an election of any commissioned officer to fill any vacancy which may occur in his regiment or battalion, or the companies attached thereto; and such officer may enter forthwith upon his duties.

SECT. 15. The commander-in-chief may appoint and commission, and determine the rank and compensation of a quartermaster-general, commissary-general, surgeon-general, and such other staff officers, in addition to those now by law existing, as in his judgment the exigencies of the service may require. These officers shall be removable at will, and the office may be suspended at any time by the commander-in-chief, who may likewise prescribe the duties of all such officers, and the limitations of their respective powers, anything in existing laws to the contrary notwithstanding. Any of the officers so appointed may, with the approval of the commander-in-chief, appoint such assistants as their departments shall require, who shall be commissioned and their compensation determined by the commander-in-chief.

SECT. 16. Whenever a requisition or call shall be made by the president of the United States for a portion of the militia of this Commonwealth, the governor may answer such requisition or call by detailing the whole or such part of the force disciplined under the provisions of this act as may be needed to satisfy such requisition or call, and the same may be marched without the limits of this Commonwealth.

SECT. 17. The governor, with the consent of the council, is hereby authorized to appoint and commission any officers, or employ the services of any men in addition to those now authorized by law, and determine the rank and compensation for the same, to carry into effect the provisions of this act, or to supply any emergency which may hereafter arise; and he is authorized to furnish such companies or regiments as may go into the service of the United States with such arms, ammunition, clothing, and supplies of any kind as he may deem necessary for their proper equipment, support, and comfort.

SECT. 18. The provisions of sections twenty-three, ninety-nine, one hundred, one hundred and one, one hundred and two, one hundred and three, one hundred and four, one hundred and five, one hundred and six, one hundred and seven, and one hundred and eight of chapter thirteen of the General Statutes, are hereby suspended, and shall not be enforced for one year from the passage of this act.

SECT. 19. Section twenty-three of chapter two of the General Statutes shall not apply to any officer to be appointed under the provisions of this act.

SECT. 20. When any requisition is received from the general government, the governor shall proceed to fill the same from troops which are or may have been in garrison or camp, until their numbers are exhausted, and may for that purpose reorganize any companies or regiments, so as to comply in all respects with the terms of such requisition, and may detail men or companies from companies or regiments to other companies or regiments, as the public interest may seem to require.

SECT. 21. This act shall take effect upon its passage. [Approved May 23, 1861.]

The families of those fighting the battles of their country were not forgotten. They were not to be left to suffer, or to the insufficient charities of neighborhoods and individuals. This act will be studied by the families of all the soldiers. We give it entire.

An Act in aid of the Families of Volunteers, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted, &c., as follows:

SECT. 1. Any town or city may raise money by taxation, and if necessary apply the same, under the direction of their selectmen or mayor and aldermen or city council, for the aid of the wife, and of the children under sixteen years of age, of any one of their inhabitants, who, as a member of the volunteer militia of this State, may have been mustered into or enlisted in the service of the United States, and for each parent, brother, or sister, or child, who at the time of his enlistment was dependent on him for support.

SECT. 2. Any city or town may by vote raise money to defray any expense already incurred, or to carry out and fulfil any contract heretofore made with, or in behalf of any of its inhabitants who may have enlisted as members of the volunteer militia, or who have been, or may be called into the service of the United States; but all contracts now subsisting between any town and city and any member of the volunteer militia as such, shall terminate in ninety days from the date of such contract, or the date of enlistment, if subsequent to such contract and previous to the passage of this act.

SECT. 3. No compensation, in addition to the regular pay of the army or navy of the United States, other than that mentioned in this act, shall be given by any town or city to any of their inhabitants, who, as volunteers, or otherwise, shall enlist in the service of the United States; but all contracts made with any members of the volunteer militia who have been mustered into the service of the United States for the term of three months, shall be valid during such term, and no pay shall hereafter be allowed by any town or city for the expense of drilling.

SECT. 4. Any city or town, when danger from attack from the sea is apprehended, is authorized to organize an armed police to guard against such an attack, and may provide, by taxation, to maintain the same. Such force may for this purpose act in any part of the county within which such city or town may be situated.

SECT. 5. Of the sum so paid or applied by any city or town for the support of the family of any inhabitant who may be actually engaged in the service of the United States, as provided in the first section, there shall be annually reimbursed from the state treasury to such town or city a sum not exceeding one dollar per week for the wife, and one dollar per week for each child or parent of such inhabitant, who, at the time of his being called into the service of the United States, was dependent upon him for support: *provided*, that the whole sum so reimbursed shall not exceed twelve dollars per month for all the persons named in this section so dependent upon any such inhabitant.

SECT. 6. No reimbursement shall be allowed from the state treasury to any town or city, as provided in the previous section, until a full report, certified and sworn to by a majority of the board of selectmen of any town, or of the mayor and a majority of the aldermen of any city, containing a statement of the inhabitants of such town or city whose families have been assisted, as provided in the first section, and of the persons who have been assisted, and the relations which such persons severally bear to such inhabitants, and the sums paid to each person, has been made to the auditor of the Commonwealth, and carefully examined and approved by him.

SECT. 7. A statement certified and sworn to by a majority of the board of selectmen of any town, or of the mayor and a majority of the aldermen of any city, shall be made to the auditor of the Commonwealth on or before the fifth day of January in each year, of the full amount due such city or town for aid furnished in accordance with this act.

SECT. 8. This act shall take effect upon its passage. [*Approved May 23, 1861.*]

The foregoing is the substance of the legislative action at the extra session, upon the momentous issue of the hour. For once in the history of Massachusetts legislation, party spirit and party lines were laid aside. Men forgot their variances and mere party interests in the great and common danger. The sound of the cannon of Sumter aroused all the nobler passions of their natures, and legislators thought of and legislated for their country. The necessity for action was not questioned. They did not ask, shall we have a war? shall we assist this domestic contest? is the safety of the Union worth the sacrifice of war? can we succeed if war is attempted? It was enough that the Union was threatened, that is worth all of life, and of fortune and of honor to preserve; there can be no question between action and inaction. The Governor and the Legislature knew that they could rely upon the firm support of the people in all constitutional measures, hence legislated fearlessly. Relying upon these, they sent commissioners to the Peace Convention; empowered the Governor and Council to pledge the faith of the State for money; to organize camps of instruction at great expense, that men might be carefully trained for the duties of war; legalized acts that had been done without full statute authority to do them, because they were demanded by the hour; provided for taking United States scrip for their own, thus giving the faith of Massachusetts to help the finances of the Union; and provided ample aid for the families of volunteers. The Governor's message, recommendations, and the action of the Legislature were both alike honorable to the State, and placed her in a position of efficiency and honor.

The Jackson Club.

On the evening of April 15th, the Jackson Club, a Democratic organization, held a meeting at its head-quarters. They discussed the present political aspect of the time. Supposed to sympathize with the South, with those who were in rebellion against the government, in political principle, they soon showed that they were capable of rising above party, and standing upon the plane of their country. They did not assemble as a political party, but as citizens who were loyal to the Union, to meet startling facts, to sustain the sacred flag, to put themselves on the record for, and not against the government. The hopes of the world were centred in this republic, and now is not the time to permit it to be destroyed. The resolutions passed had the Jacksonian ring in them. They looked upon the present crisis as one in which the existence of the government was at stake; upon this civil war as forced upon the North. They resolved to stand by the Union, to sustain the President and his administration by all the constitutional means in their power.

Adopted Citizens.

The evening of the 16th in Boston was distinguished, among other things, by the meeting and expression of the sentiment of the adopted citizens of the State and country. Ireland, in America, could not be quiet in such a time. She, always renowned for her talk, would talk now. The spirit of Emmett, of Burke, of O'Connell, was burning in their veins, and they sprang to the rescue the moment that they saw treason to the flag arming itself for war. The history of the Old World taught them that the greatest sufferings of nations had been caused by internal strife and division, and it was our duty to profit by their example. Here we have a free press, religious toleration for all, educational advantages without a parallel in the Old World, and self-government; and, if these failed, there would be no more an asylum for the oppressed of Europe. Andrew Jackson and Richard Montgomery, with Irish blood in their veins, had fought upon American battle-fields, and in those battle-fields the sons of Ireland held an inheritance, which was sacred to them, and to the children of the Pilgrims. Though Democrats, in their resolutions they condemned the late President for his inaction, and all the acts of those traitors who had been long at work for the disruption of the Union. Every peaceful offer of President Lincoln had been interpreted into imbecility; and now was the time to teach such traitors that the Union was capable of the virtue of self-preservation, and of the virtue of defence, when forbearance was no longer a virtue. They believed it the duty of every adopted citizen of Irish birth or parentage, who enjoyed the inestimable privileges of our free government, to cast aside all past distinctions, and unite as one man for the support of the national administration. They called upon all of Irish birth to stand true to the country which had become the home of so many millions of their race, and of the oppressed people of the Old World, and not to permit the liberties, for which Washington fought and Montgomery died, to be trampled under foot by the slave oligarchy of the South. This was the feeling of Ireland in America. She came here to find liberty, law, bread, education, life, and she was enamored of our State, and that State she would defend to the last.

Bank Action.

The State must have means; it must have money; and no sooner had the sound of the guns of Sumter reached the merchants and brokers of Boston, than they felt that they had been attacked in their pockets, in their bank-vaults, in their granite warehouses, in their mercantile career and prosperity. They replied in columbiads of gold, which sent their heavy shot and calibre into the very heart of rebellion, and made it tremble. On the 17th of April the Directors of the Suffolk Bank held a meeting and voted an advance to the Governor of the Commonwealth—a loan of \$100,000—to be used in the present emergency, and subject to the future approval of the Legislature. They also voted to take the treasury notes of the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States, at 6 per cent., to the amount of \$100,000, at par. These gentlemen knew what peace was worth, what law was worth, and they intended to pay for it. The Webster Bank also upon the same day voted a loan of \$50,000 to the State.

This was not sufficient; a call was issued to the managers of the Boston banks, and a meeting was held in answer to that call, at the Clearing House, on the 18th of April, with Daniel Dewey, President of the Hamilton Bank, in the chair. The object of the meeting was stated to be such tender of money to the State Government as the public exigencies may require. A resolution was immediately presented that the banks of Boston loan to the State Government *ten per cent. on their capital*, in such sums as might be demanded by the Commonwealth. They deemed that the quickest way to suppress this rebellion was to assure the government of the hearty support of the monied interest. This resolution, after an opportunity for the expression of such patriotic sentiments as the members entertained, passed *unanimously*. This placed nearly the sum of \$4,000,000 at the disposal of the State. The following is a list of the banks, with their presidents, and the note they sent to the Governor, and their capital.

The Boston Banks unite to aid the Commonwealth.

To his Excellency, John A. Andrew, Governor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts:—

Sir,—The present emergency may require of the Treasury of Massachusetts sum or sums of money beyond its cash means. To meet such requirements, the following named banks in this city will answer the call of the Treasurer, under your authority, for any sum or sums of money, to the extent of ten per centum of the amount of their capitals, respectively:—

Treasurer's Office, April 18, 1861.

This patriotism of the banks was not monopolized by those of Boston. There was other virtue in Massachusetts. Among those reported as tendering loans to the State at the same time, was the Randolph Bank, \$25,000; the Massasoit Bank, of Fall River, \$30,000; Columbian Bank, \$50,000; Revere Bank, \$50,000; Mount Wollaston Bank, \$25,000; and the banks of Worcester, \$300,000. \$850,000 had been tendered to the State, for meeting the exigencies of war, almost before the President's proclamation had been read by the people; and this, too, exclusive of the amount tendered by the Boston Association of Banks. In addition to these, the Lynn Mechanics' Bank voted \$25,000; the Bunker Hill Bank, Charlestown, \$30,000; the Newton Bank, \$25,000; and the New England Mutual Life Insurance Company unanimously voted a loan of \$100,000 to the State.

And so the capital flowed into the hands of the authorities from all parts of the State. The Western counties were not behind in their substantial testimonials of patriotism and confidence. Money was not a want of the authorities. The enterprise and thrift of the State had not laid up its store in vain; the day of trial came, and it was used.

The Boston Board of Trade.

On the 18th, the Boston Board of Trade met at the Merchants' Exchange, to express their sentiments upon the crisis. In their opinion, in the present crisis of the national affairs, all good citizens and all associations, especially those connected with commercial affairs, should let their views be known to the government in some public manner. As members of the Board of Trade in the City of Boston, individually and collectively, they tendered the government of the United States their entire sympathy in the measures now being taken for the suppression of the rebellion, and they also recommended the most vigorous and effective means to restore authority where the standard of revolt had been raised. They looked upon the recent proclamation of Jefferson Davis, inviting persons to fit out vessels to cruise against the peaceful commerce of the citizens of the United States, as inviting to piracy, and meriting the stern rebuke of every honest man, and invited the government to protect commerce by most vigorous means. They believed that the prompt response of the citizen soldiers of this and other States, and the patriotic action of the banks, merit the thanks of the whole country, and showed that the community had entire confidence in the ability and power of both the State and national governments. These views were unanimously adopted. The merchants of Boston were found where honor and justice commended the cause.

Nineteenth of April in Boston.

The 19th of April, 1861, will not soon be forgotten. It has become one of the sacred days of American history, we may say of the history of liberty, and of the race. It was celebrated here as the anniversary of the memorable battle of Lexington, by salutes, the display of flags, ringing of bells, and speeches. There was a drill upon the Common of one of the light artillery companies; and, at 12 o'clock, 100 guns were fired as a salute. They subsequently were received by speeches, &c., at the State House, from the Governor. At Lexington appropriate recognition was made of the day. At

Worcester there was a celebration by the dedication services of the raising of a monument to Col. Timothy Bigelow, at which the city government, the fire companies, the temperance societies, and the German Turners assisted, with a large concourse of citizens.

But the great feature of the day was the reception of the news of the attack upon the 6th Regiment in Baltimore, and its successful passage through the city. The news came of the attack, and men gathered thick in the streets, devouring the bullet-boards with their eyes. The crowds grew excited, uneasy, turbulent. They felt that they all stood at the door of battle in this attack upon their brothers who had left them but a few hours before. Men bit their lips in their anger, and set their teeth together, and showed front which would have been terror to Baltimore. The news came that the glorious 6th had fought their way through, when the shout of exultation ran along the street which told that Massachusetts honored Massachusetts steel. It was the first blood shed, the first victory, and she had the honor, as in the first Revolution. The stars and stripes never looked more glorious than on that night, in the eyes of the sons of the Old Bay State.

The Coast Guard.

At the recommendation of Hon. R. B. Forbes, the merchants met in the Merchants' Exchange, on April 19th, to see to the organization of a coast defence. Mr. Forbes stated that they feared no danger of an invasion of the harbor, but that the object was to drill a class of men, not acquainted with the military, in the use of large guns. He did not know how soon their services might be wanted in the navy, or some scientific defence of our merchant vessels from the lawless invaders of the seas. The Governor, too, had been consulted, and he sympathized deeply with the project; and so, also, did the Board of Trade. Gentlemen testified their willingness to enter into the project, and their judgment as to its efficiency, by the amount that they subscribed. Mr. Forbes would give his time in getting up the enterprise, and accept a subordinate position among the officers. Messrs. Lombard, Snow and Upton then subscribed \$1,000 each. In their resolutions passed upon the occasion, they viewed the present crisis with overwhelming anxiety, and believed that the merchants and seamen of Massachusetts should respond heartily to the proposed plan of Mr. Forbes. This was but one circumstance to show how the "solid men of Boston" looked upon the war of the South upon the Union.

April 22d in Boston and Vicinity.

On the 22d of April, a large meeting of the ladies was held in Charlestown, to be called "The Soldiers' Relief Society," and to hold communication with the families of the soldiers, and tender them sympathy, counsel and aid. The wife of Mayor Hutchins was president, and others were chosen to complete the organization, comprising names honorable in the records of the city. The Mayor then stated that the city government had appropriated \$10,000 for the relief of the families of volunteers, and ex-Mayor Sawyer stated that he had received a check from a citizen for the same purpose, on the Bunker Hill Bank, and also a note was read stating that ten physicians of the city had offered to attend to the families of volunteers, free of charge, during their absence.

The City of Boston, on the 22d, also took other action than offering of money. The Board of Aldermen passed a series of resolutions pledging the moral and material support of the City of Boston, with all its power and ability, to the Government of the United States. They also put partisanship under their feet, by calling upon the people of Boston for an oblivion of party differences, and an alliance of all good citizens in vindication of the violated laws. They said that the revolted States stood before the civilized world defenceless and convicted of an assault upon the common polity of nations. To the loyal brethren of the revolted States, they renewed their assurances of fidelity to all the compacts and compromises of the Constitution; and, at the same time, respectfully urged upon the President to pursue such a constitutional policy as shall best conduce to the union and harmony of the several States. The resolutions were passed by a unanimous vote, and transmitted to the President.

In the evening, the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company met in their armory, in Faneuil Hall. One hundred and eighty members attended, and offered their services to the government; and also voted that the families of those of the company who might fall in the service of their country should be taken care of by the company, as a company.

On the same evening, the Massachusetts Homœopathic Medical Society met, and tendered their gratuitous services to families of those gone to the war. They also passed a series of resolutions sympathizing with the government, and pledging their support in this her hour of trial.

Among the offers of assistance reported this day, \$2000 were raised in Plymouth; \$5,000 in Marblehead; \$10,000 in Quincy; \$5,000 in Abington; \$1,000 in Malden; \$5,000 in Weymouth; \$4,000 in Jamaica Plain. The Barnstable Bank, of Yarmouth, voted to loan to the State \$33,000; \$10,000 was appropriated at Cambridge; \$1,700 in Waltham; \$3,000 in Pawtucket; \$15,000 in Brookline, and \$2,425 in Newton. Andrew Carney gave \$500 to the Irish volunteers; and throughout the vicinity of Boston, where anything was done, the patriotism of the people was substantially sustained by offerings of material aid.

The 24th of April.

The record of this day, like that of the rest, is good for Massachusetts. Enlistments, drilling of recruits, formation of home defence companies, the filling of vacancies in regular military organizations, all proceeded with an unabated enthusiasm. A petition was in circulation asking the Governor to employ the School Ship Massachusetts and her tender, to be fitted up and proceed to sea, for the protection of the Bay and its ports. Flag raisings were extemporized, and the stars and stripes went out to the breeze, with speech, cheer, and music discoursing national airs. In Union Park one was flung from a staff 134 feet in height, and Union Park enjoyed a day of festivity in the indulgence of its patriotism, — happy, though sad the occasion. Major Cobb, the late commander of the Boston Light Artillery, having received the authority to enroll a new company to man a battery, opened his recruiting room for two hours, and in that time 107 names were put down. This was not slow to battle.

The presidents of the various insurance companies met in State street, to consider the subject of sending out a steamer to the Gulf of Mexico, to cruise for and capture such vessels as might be found carrying the Confederate flag, and seeking to prey upon our commerce. The plan was to send out a large steamer, carrying 300 men and 10 guns. A committee visited the executive authorities, at the State House, and they were cordially recommended to the authorities at Washington. The steamer was to sail under the authority and commission of the United States, but the expenses were to be paid by State street, — that street which has no bottom to its vaults.

Another significant fact, or indication of public sentiment, was that ex-Governor Banks was to have lectured before the Mercantile Library Association in the evening; but, in a letter to the committee, he declined lecturing, stating that the change of public affairs seemed to him to forbid the discussion of ordinary topics at this time; and stating that there should be but one subject in the mind of any citizen of the United States at this time, and that the preservation of the government of his country.

The Webster Regiment, which Fletcher Webster commenced raising on Sunday, was reported as quite full, and even overflowing; and aid of money came in from many and honorable men to see that it was immediately put into fighting condition.

The United States Steam-Frigate Niagara heaved its great hulk into our harbor on this day, and absurd rumors were in circulation that the officers and men sympathized with secession, and that she was to be turned over to the rebels. The oath of allegiance was administered anew to both officers and men. Several of the officers were sworn, hailing from Virginia, Maryland and the District of Columbia, and four only were found to serve Mammon.

Roxbury followed upon her patriotic resolutions, by a meeting to organize a home-guard (not one of the guards "not to leave town, save in case of invasion").

An adjourned meeting of the British residents of Boston and vicinity was held at Chapman Hall, in the evening, when they decided to form a rifle company for home protection. So also the Scotchmen of Boston, animated by the same spirit, met and commenced the organization of a volunteer company.

The New England Guards, seeing the exposed condition of our harbor, and the fort with few guns and no men, offered their services to do duty at Fort Independence, and it was accepted, when the order was issued to the members to report themselves.

Not men alone, but boys felt their duties to their country. The boys of the Quiney School brought in \$200 to their teacher to present suitable testimonials to such past members of the school as might enlist for the defence of the Union.

Framingham reported a new drill-club, \$3,000 given for outfits for a volunteer company, and a loan of \$25,000 tendered by her bank to the State. This was 12½ per cent. of her capital.

April 25th.

April 25th came in big with preparation for war. The people were up and working. The number of officers in the Niagara appeared to-day to be twelve, instead of four, who declined to take the oath of allegiance. They were all from Southern States. Lieut. Brown, of the Niagara, was, by order of the Governor, arrested for uttering treasonable sentiments, and for supposed treasonable proclivities; but subsequently he was discharged, and permitted to depart. The Navy Yard, yesterday, was aroused by orders to put everything in the yard, that could be made available, in readiness for sea. This required labor on the Mississippi, Minnesota, Colorado, the Massachusetts and South Carolina, the Vincennes, Preble and Bainbridge. This required a great addition to the labor force of the yard.

Among the military items of the day, a messenger left for Washington to get consent for Major Gordon to raise a regiment to serve through the war. Twenty companies had already been accepted by the Governor; and a fine company of 64 men, selected from our merchants and tradesmen, had been enlisted for the defence of the city. The sub-committee of the city government appropriated \$10,000 for rations of the volunteer troops of the city. The merchants of Franklin street raised a flag from a new flag staff 125 feet high, with prayer, speech and music. The New England Guards went to Fort Independence, and were cheered along their march. The Tigers met in the evening at the armory in Boylston Hall, to consider what action was necessary from them in the present condition of the country. A Tiger of 1812, Mr. Timothy Dodd, called the meeting to order. Speeches were made by the talking members; letters were read from absent members, and a committee appointed to draft a plan of organization. The Coast Guard met and completed its organization. The

amount subscribed thus far was \$9,800; and amount of goods ordered for equipment, \$10,776. The projector, Hon. R. B. Forbes, was elected commander; and from 150 who had subscribed themselves, 100 were selected to form the company.

One of the most patriotic donations of the day was the gift of the teachers of the public schools of Boston, who volunteered a material deduction in their salaries, discounting 10, 12½, 15, 25 per cent., to be appropriated for the relief of volunteers and their families. This gave the generous sum of \$13,000 for this purpose. This was to continue during the existence of the war.

April 26th.

The towns were no less alive and stirring than the great cities. Patriotism is not local; it warms hearts in the mountains and the vales, as well as those dungeoned within brick walls. A large and enthusiastic meeting of the citizens of Holliston was reported, where \$2,500 was subscribed, and 86 names obtained for a company of volunteers. It was also voted, at this meeting, to instruct the town, at a town meeting, to raise sufficient money to support the families of the volunteers while they were absent. In Haverhill a new company had been formed, and attached to the Seventh Regiment. On the evening of the 26th, the citizens of Chelsea assembled around the City Hall to testify their fealty to the government by unfurling a beautiful flag from the top of the building, which was the gift of the ladies of the city. After the invocation of a blessing upon that flag and the dear country, the children welcomed it by the Star Spangled Banner in hearty music. It appeared that Watertown had held a town meeting, the largest ever known there, and resolutions had been adopted, unanimously, declaring that the town pledge itself to adopt the families of those who had enlisted for the war, and of those who might join the company. \$5,000 were appropriated for this purpose, and a bounty of \$30 to each soldier whose company was accepted by the government within 30 days. A private subscription was started for the purpose of equipping town volunteers, and \$1,600 was raised. In the town of Westboro' a loyal meeting was held; 60 names were added to the volunteer list, among which were a physician and the Methodist clergyman. \$5,000 were appropriated, to be expended in the purchase of uniforms, furnishing extra pay to the company, and for the support of the families of the needy. Voluntary contributions were also pledged to the amount of \$3,000. Not only large, but small towns, came up to the order.

On the evening of April 23, a large meeting was held at Lynnfield Centre, when addresses were made, and resolutions unanimously passed, to make all needful provision for the soldiers and their families. Among those who joined for the war were the chorister, sexton, and bell-ringer of the Congregational Church. The most noticeable call of this day was that made by the citizens of Cambridge and vicinity for a meeting to be held under the venerable elm on Cambridge Common, where Washington unsheathed his sword in taking command of the American Army. The call was signed by Jared Sparks, the professors of the university, and the most distinguished citizens Cambridge, the scene of some of the first acts of the American Revolution, must again show power under her time-honored elm.

Chester Park, Cambridge, and Suffolk Bar Meetings.

On the 27th, Chester Park threw out a flag to the breeze, when the Hon. Edward Everett, Hon. B. F. Hallett, and Rev. Mr. Hepworth, and others, took part on the occasion. The speech of Mr. Everett was characterized by his usual grace of delivery, and an unusual force and elegance; and Mr. Hallett spoke with true patriotism and fidelity to the country.

On the same day, the citizens of Cambridge and vicinity held the meeting called under the venerable elm on the Common in that city, where Washington unsheathed his sword on taking command of the American Army. Ex-presidents and members of the university were in attendance. Sparks, Longfellow, Palfrey, Dana, and Parker were present,—so also was ex-Governor Banks, and others equally prominent. Hon. John G. Palfrey offered resolutions, in which they said that they consecrated themselves to the service of freedom and the country, under the Washington Elm; that they, citizens of Middlesex, the first battle-field of the American Revolution, cherished the memory of their revolutionary champions and martyrs; that, living under their prosperity, under the benign shadow of charity and love, they would be dastards and recreants if they did not stand firmly by the government. The meeting was characterized by that dignity and ability which might be expected from the character of those present.

The members of the Bar in Boston could not be silent, according to their usual custom. A large attendance was present, and all seemed actuated by the same spirit that animated Otis, Quincy, Adams and Payne in other revolutionary times. Judge Thomas, of the Supreme Judicial Court, was chosen chairman, and made a close, nervous, logical and able speech upon the occasion. In speaking for the Bench, he said that we were a judiciary, and must conduct this contest according to the elements of constitutional law. There must be a force in Christianity, in civilization, in law, which the South cannot stand against. Patriotic speeches were made by other members of the Bar, and resolutions were read by Judge Abbott, stating that the rebellion existing in the South was a blind and selfish attempt to subvert the clearest rights of majorities, and the most sacred principles of constitutional law; that they would forget party distinctions, and unite to uphold the government; that they would do the business of the lawyers who went to jeopardize their lives for the country, and that of the families of those who had gone to the war. This gave the sanction of the most conservative

members of society to the war. There was not a dissenting voice among them; so that the movement of the North could not be considered as violent, passionate, and revolutionary. This meeting was held on the 29th of April.

May 1st.—The First Dead, the Old South, &c.

May 1st, the Adjutant-General issued an order to Major-General Andrews, of the First Division of M. V. M., to take command of Forts Warren and Independence in Boston Harbor, and take immediate measures to have them placed in condition to receive such new organizations as it might be deemed proper to place therein for drill and discipline. The companies organized to form what was called the "Webster Regiment" were ordered to quarters immediately in Fort Warren.

As another indication of the alacrity with which men flocked to the standard of their country, we mention the fact that the board of military examiners at the State House were busily employed every day in examining persons elected to office in the various military companies of volunteers, to ascertain their fitness to hold commissions. And an idea of the number may be formed when we state that more applied each day for examination than could be attended to. The medical staff also was compelled to designate physicians to examine the volunteers, purchase medical stores, and attend otherwise to the general health of the volunteers.

Ex-Governor Washburn, of the Cambridge Law School, sent one hundred flannel shirts and drawers, one hundred pocket-handkerchiefs, with the promise of a hundred hospital shirts, which were fitted and made by the ladies of Cambridge; and the Governor handsomely acknowledged the note by saying that "in glancing over their names I realized most completely how great a hold the cause, in relief of which these troops are mustered, has upon every social class in our community,—that there are no hands in Massachusetts too delicate to contribute something to the work;" and stated that the next letter opened was from a poor needle-woman, who had but little, but was desirous to give something of that little for her country.

May 1st, the remains of the three brave men who perished in the streets of Baltimore, as the first sacrifice of the war, arrived in the city at the Worcester Depot. They were received by the Governor, his aids, and the Independent Corps of Cadets, and escorted to King's Chapel, where they were temporarily placed in the vault, to remain until recognition. As soon as the news of their arrival came, many of the stores and flags along the streets where they were expected to pass, were draped in mourning. The bodies were placed in hearses, and then covered with black velvet, and the stars and stripes. The horses wore black plumes. The Cadets marched with unfixed bayonets and reversed arms, and the band played the slow music of the Dead March in Saul, as the procession moved through the streets. There was no levity in the thousands who thronged to witness the scene. Each man took it home to himself. As the bodies passed, all hats were removed; men did not speak to each other on the walk; they were silent, but felt war,—terrible war. That silence was ominous. It told where slept a power for retribution, if need be, upon the authors of our misfortune. The bodies of those slain were identified as those of Addison O. Whitney, and Luther C. Ladd of Lowell, and Sumner H. Needham of Lawrence. These were the first-fruits of fame plucked from the rebellion.

The Old South, May 1st, 1861, again threw forth the flag of the Union, as in 1776 and 1812. Then it was to beat back the foreign enemies of our country; this time to warn those domestic enemies in our midst, that the people of Massachusetts were true to the spirit of Christianity and the principles of liberty. The historic interest attached to the old church, and its location in the centre of the city, gave an unusual solemnity to the scene. The neighboring house-tops, and windows, and the streets, were filled with spectators. All were anxious to see consecrated anew those old walls, where gathered the fathers of the Revolution to take sage counsel in war,—where Warren and Hancock and the indomitable Adams used to meet to devise means of defence and attack, to encourage each other's hearts, and the hearts of the people. There Warren went, and climbed through the window to address the people, and move them to defence, in the face and defiance of the British soldiers thronging the aisles. Within a few feet of the spot was the immortal Franklin born, whose adroit cunning and sound common-sense philosophy fashioned itself so admirably into the work of independence and the formation of the republic. Hands consecrated to the labor of Christianity assisted in the work. The senior and junior pastors of the society, with prayer and speech, gave moral impressiveness and dignity to the occasion. Amid such scenes as the above, were the first lessons of the war given out.

May 2.—The New England Association of the Soldiers of 1812.

May 2d was signalized by the meeting of the New England Association of the Soldiers of 1812, at the residence of their President, Col. Thomas Aspinwall. The fire that once animated those patriotic hearts against England, in her aggressions half a century ago, was equally alive now to lay strong hands upon those domestic enemies that might plot to destroy that they might rise up to political power upon the ruins. They adopted an address to the veterans of the last war throughout the country. They said that the country was defended in 1812—nearly fifty years since—against a foreign foe, that it is now threatened by rebels within; that the Union founded by the heroic sacrifice of our fathers, and cemented by the blood of their children in the second war for independence, is now in extreme peril from conspirators within, who have been warmed into life by its beneficent protection; that they also, in 1812, gave

their youthful energies to their country; though now too old to encounter the hardships of a campaign, yet they might do something in the way of instruction and discipline; and that they should, without reference to party, give a firm support to the government, the Constitution, the Union, and the enforcement of the laws.

May 4th in Boston, Lawrence, &c.

May 4th witnessed the last obsequies of Sumner H. Needham, killed at Baltimore, at his home in Lawrence. Lawrence was proud of the honor which had fallen to her, and in this last observance of burial rites, she nobly and appropriately honored the dead. The city government took charge of the body, and buried it with military honors. The pastor preached a fine and characteristic sermon from the text, "He, being dead, yet speaketh." He stated one thing noticeable for its philosophic force—"Humanity is the central idea of Republicanism;" and so it should ever be, if we would honorably maintain our peculiarly American liberties.

Among the towns reported May 4 as having given assistance, Malden voted \$3,000 at one time, and at another \$10,000, for the assistance of the families of volunteers. Weymouth voted \$5,000 to uniform the Weymouth Guards. Marshfield, where repose the remains of Webster, among other liberal provisions for her volunteers, voted \$5,000; Sutton, \$6,000, and Georgetown, \$5,000. So we see that patriotism was not confined to Boston alone. The country towns were active to the full measure of their ability.

The love of the country penetrated through foreign birth and prison walls, so that an educated German, in the Charlestown State's Prison, said, after stating that he had been in all the hard-fought battles between Vera Cruz and Mexico, that "his heart's desire was to serve his adopted country once more." The inmates of the State's Prison were set to work manufacturing Minie rifle balls, tin dippers and canteens, crash towels and uniforms. In completing large portions of the work, the inmates were compelled to labor all night, but it was done by them with the most cheerful alacrity. They felt, though in prison under the laws, that those laws should be sustained for the benefit of the country.

Sunday at Fort Warren.

The soldiers had collected in considerable numbers in Fort Warren. On May 5th, the Sabbath, for the first time, divine services were held in the open air. With the implements and paraphernalia of war around, they became peculiarly impressive. An eloquent and appropriate sermon was preached by the Rev. Mr. Hepworth, to a large and distinguished crowd of spectators, and to the soldiers of the Webster Regiment, and the Fourth Battalion drawn up in parade. After the clergyman concluded his remarks, he requested the audience to sing "America;" and the noble and patriotic old tune never before seemed so sweet and voluble of music. After the benediction, there was a dress parade. The quietness of the scene and the deportment of the company was such as to make the occasion entirely in keeping with the day.

The Nurses.

To show that the ladies of Massachusetts were not to be outdone in kindly and useful offices of humanity, a hearty and full response was made to the call from the Medical Commission from the State House for nurses. This Commission communicated to the public a document from Secretary Cameron, accepting the services of Miss D. T. Dix, and authorizing her to act in the military hospitals. Miss Dix requested that persons who intended to give their services free, should not proceed to headquarters, but send in their names, age and residence, and take practical instruction in nursing, if not already qualified, and hold themselves in readiness to attend upon an hour's call. The daughters of Massachusetts nobly responded to this call, and a sufficient number were soon entered on the list to answer the ends proposed.

The Dead of Lowell.

May 6, 1861, the City of Lowell also paid due honors to the dead,—the first Massachusetts dead of the war. The obsequies were conducted under the direction of the city authorities. The city was appropriately dressed in mourning,—business was suspended, mills stopped, flags at half-mast, and a general gloom, deepened by a lowering sky, gave impressiveness to the occasion. The clergyman officiating, in a few neatly chosen words, paid a fitting tribute to the virtues and memories of the dead. All those present felt that war was upon them, and that to die in defence of their country was honorable indeed.

May 7.—Individual, Town, and City Action.

May 7, it was reported in the papers that the citizens of Fairhaven voted to authorize the selectmen to effect a loan of \$5,000, for the defence of the town and harbor from invasion, whenever in their discretion it became necessary, and also voted to pay each volunteer in active service a sum so that he should have the amount of \$25 a month.

The citizens of Leicester appropriated the sum of \$5,500 "to maintain the honor of the flag;" and also ten dollars a month in advance to every citizen actually serving in the war. Scituate voted to pay single men ten dollars, and married fifteen per month, as long as the government required their services. They were to be provided with uniforms, and paid one dollar per day while drilling; also a contingent fund was voted to pay their contingent expenses.

Among the donations from citizens of Boston, some are more worthy of commendation. The occupants of the market gave large donations of food to the soldiers. May

6, they increased their previous donations by the donation of 3,000 pounds of beef, and over 200 splendid hams; 1,200 pounds butter, and 1,600 pounds of cheese, were among the first liberal donations.

May 8th it was reported that Dorchester voted \$20,000 for the war; fifteen for single, and twenty for married men enlisting during the war. Middleton voted \$7,000; Mansfield, \$5,000; Woburn paid liberally; Dedham voted \$10,000; Melrose, \$3,000. All these were voted, besides other liberal provisions.

The citizens of Roxbury, on the evening of May 8th, held an enthusiastic meeting in Institute Hall, to enjoy an entertainment prepared for the families of the volunteers. Children gave the music; also Gilmore's Band added to the pleasure of the occasion. The Hon. Alexander H. Rice made a few elegant remarks, and then the Hon. Edward Everett gave one of his characteristically polished and eloquent addresses, saying that "Wide as the summons has gone forth, it has been obeyed, with an alacrity and unanimity that knew no parallel in our history; and the volunteers of Massachusetts have been the first in the field."

The Donation Committee.

This is one of the institutions of the city,—benevolent, useful, energetic, and skillful; it has work to do, and does it. The soul of this committee is its originator and agent, the indefatigable Mrs. Harrison Gray Otis. Immediately after the breaking out of the war, she set about to see what her hands could find to do; and it occurred to her that she could best assist the Old Bay State in the cause in which it had enlisted, by throwing open her own house, and making it a general depot for receiving and distributing conveniences and necessities to the soldiers of Massachusetts. This fact became known to the city government, and Mr. Evans, the proprietor of the Evans House on Tremont Street, opened his house gratuitously for this purpose. As soon as Mr. Evans signified his intention to give Mrs. Otis his house for this purpose, she entered it, about the last of April, and has been there every day since—not had one holiday, or day of rest, save the Sabbath. She receives anything and everything for the soldiers,—shirts, drawers, socks, sleeping-caps, blankets, pin-cushions, towels, groceries, teas, coffee, sugar, wines, &c. Articles are sent to her from all parts of the State, made and unmade, and by her distributed, to her order only, to all the soldiers who apply. They come in from the camps and get complete outfits. On their return from the seat of war, on furlough, they call, and give most hearty thanks for the things they have had to supply their necessities, and receive such things more as they may require. Every article is marked, no matter what, with the mark of the committee, as follows:—"Donation Committee, Mrs. Harrison Gray Otis, Agent, City of Boston;" so that any soldier can tell whence comes his donation. It is impossible to give an estimate of all that has been distributed in ten months of the operations of the committee. Among others may be stated, 20,000 pin-cushions, 30,000 rolled bandages, 30,000 books, tracts and Testaments; and, perhaps, 100,000 articles have been sent out; and all articles are of the best kind and pattern. Several thousand dollars have been donated in money; and the fame of the committee has extended so far that remittances have been received from London, Paris, China, Siam, Norway, Sweden and St. Petersburg. Mr. Ashton, of London, a native and property-holder of Boston, among liberal donations from other parties, gave \$500. Many of the merchants of whom flannel and material for under-clothing are bought make a liberal discount upon their prices. All who send in, leave it entirely to the judgment of Mrs. Otis as to the distribution, as nothing is sent without her order. The committee is entirely self-sustaining,—neither State or City have given it a copper. Mrs. Otis is not alone in her devotion to its purposes,—four young ladies of position have devoted their whole time to the enterprise, and one has cut all the shirts that have been made. Other wealthy ladies are constantly in attendance, and giving money, and purchasing material to supply special wants as they occur, and which cannot readily be otherwise supplied. Each person who makes a donation receives a printed certificate, with the signature of the agent, and an acknowledgment through the newspapers. In this way these ladies have given up dress, parties, social entertainments, where time and expense are necessary, and devoted themselves to this work of humanity and of defence of the good old Union of the fathers. Long live the ladies of the Old Bay State!

Massachusetts Soldiers' Fund Society.

April 23, a great movement was commenced by the leading merchants of Boston,—great, because it comprehended a wider field of action than had been hitherto attempted. They held a meeting at the rooms of the Board of Trade, and appointed a committee to effect an organization; and, on the 24th, that committee reported that, in view of the liberal contributions by towns, cities and individuals, in aid of soldiers called into active service, it was proper to leave the present wants of the soldiers to still continue to be supplied in this way. But, in view of the fact that the contest might be prolonged, and that their generosity might find itself incapable of giving further aid, they deemed it advisable to establish a more permanent fund. Hence, they recommended a committee of one hundred to raise and keep a fund, and to apply it for the soldiers and their families, at their discretion. They also reported a list of officers, commencing with the governor, the chief justice, and all the living ex-governors of the State, and continuing with the most prominent names of the citizens of the State.

On the 27th this Committee of One Hundred met, and adopted the following rules:—
The Committee of One Hundred who met on the 27th, to correct any public misapprehension as to the objects of this fund, published the following in the Boston

papers:—"Our object is, 'to receive contributions for the benefit of soldiers, and the families of soldiers, who have been or may be called into active service, *to be held in trust as a fund in reserve, to be applied at the discretion*' of the Executive Committee of Fifteen.

"No part of the fund can be used, just at this juncture, without departing from the original design, and, as it would seem, without a violation of faith to the contributors. The endeavor to provide means for the *future*, cannot, we think, but be approved by every thoughtful person. The exigencies of war are almost innumerable; and, while towns, cities, and neighborhoods meet the *immediate* necessities of those, and the families of those, who are called to the field in this hour of our country's awful emergency, we feel disposed to commend the wisdom of the gentlemen who look *beyond present needs*, and who, by the creation and care of this fund, hold out to the war-worn and the afflicted the promise of such pecuniary remembrance hereafter as the extent of the contributions will allow. That the 'Massachusetts Soldiers' Fund' is in the hands of citizens who are known for their integrity, financial skill, and deeds of benevolence, our readers need no assurance of ours. We may add, that, while the Executive Committee, as we are advised, decline to commit themselves to any course of action, as relates to the time of beginning to disburse the money placed at their disposal, as well as decline to define—what indeed is not possible now to do—the rules which may be adopted in appropriating the funds, yet they do intend to be alive to every passing event, and to take cognizance of such calls as shall be made from time to time, keeping steadily in view, however, the final amount of the fund, and the principles of organization of the Committee of One Hundred.

"It is also of moment to observe, that, since contributions have been solicited in all parts of our glorious old Commonwealth, so will distributions of the funds be made as universally by the Executive Committee; for, it is to be remembered that, in constituting this body, Boston has but six members, while other and different parts of the State have nine. Upon this point, we would speak with distinct emphasis;—for example, Boston—as bound to do—will doubtless contribute more than any other single place, but will still share in exact proportion only to the cases presented and disposed of under the rules recognized everywhere else, however near to or distant from that city. The towns and cities, then, not now doing to the extent of their ability in fitting off soldiers and caring for the wives and children of soldiers, may rest entirely content, that, if they do but transmit money to ROBERT M. MASON, the Treasurer, at Boston (No. 17 Milk Street, or 10 Pemberton Square), *they will provide for the future wants of the present objects of their duty and sympathy, in the precise sense of contributors in the metropolis itself.* We have purposely made no appeal to our citizens to aid this fund, because we deemed a single word on that subject quite unnecessary. So, too, we have refrained from dwelling upon the startling movements of the hour, for the reason, that, as remarked at the outset, we designed merely to correct existing, and, as circumstances induce us to believe, somewhat extensive misapprehensions as to the objects of the fund."

December 9th, a circular announced that a sub-committee had then addressed circulars to the various banks and savings institutions of the Commonwealth, to know if they would receive and disburse, without charge, such funds as might be sent to them by the soldiers. Most, or all, replied that they would.

From this we see the care of the "solid men" for the interests of the soldier. With such assistance, there need be little suffering in the families of those who are fighting the battles of their country.

New England Woman's Auxiliary Association; Authorized Branch of the United States Sanitary Commission.

The ladies and committee of this Commission, in Boston, issued a circular to the women of New England, of which the following is a production:—

"We appeal to you in behalf of the UNITED STATES SANITARY COMMISSION. This Commission has its head-quarters at Washington, and agencies in New York, Philadelphia, Boston, Cincinnati, Wheeling, St. Louis, and Louisville. It originated, at the beginning of the war, in the desire to meet and avoid, for our army, the terrible evils which decimated the Crimean army. Its duties are partly *preventive*—such as inspecting and reforming camp arrangements, where bad situation, bad drainage, and bad cooking are worse foes to the soldier than those met in battle. It makes good, in a measure, the deficiency of government supplies to the hospitals—those supplies being limited, in many cases, to bed and pillow—so that the men lie in the clothes in which they were wounded. It gives its aid whenever and wherever it is most needed; furnishing clothes to the naked, and decent comfort to the sick; getting pay for those unable to attend at official hours; following in the steps of the government—alleviating, where it cannot prevent; working in season and out of season, for humanity's and mercy's sake.

"The Commission appeals to the women of the country for its support. It is authorized, but not paid by government; it has not an article or a dollar supplied to it by government. Let us, in our fortunate and well-ordered New England, give freely to this agency, which works for the whole country. We are proud of sending our troops well provided; our governors and mayors go to Washington, to look after our sick and wounded; let us then work for the Commission, which is the friend of the sick and wounded from the whole Union, and give thankfully, if not for our own sons and brothers, for those who are sons of our country, and brethren of all loyal women."

The Auxiliary Association commenced work December 13, 1861. All packages made up in New England, and forwarded to No. 22 Summer Street, are opened by them, and repacked—each class of articles by itself—in boxes, marked, numbered, and kept in store until ordered from Washington. When ordered, they are readily selected and forwarded; so that no mistakes can occur. Before this association was formed, articles were continually sent by the friends of the soldiers; and, when opened, perhaps, would not contain a single article wanted. At the hospitals this caused much annoyance. For seven weeks up to February 1st, 788 packages had been forwarded, all of which have been opened and re-packed, save those which have been marked for some particular regiment. This shows the labor and the responsibility which the managers have taken upon themselves. We cannot give all the articles which have been forwarded, but mention, among others, 20 cases hospital stores,—food, such as farina, &c.; 27 cases of books, 24 cases of wine, 2,592 towels, 3,553 pairs of mittens, 2,574 pillows, 7,049 pairs woolen socks, 2,286 cotton shirts, 2,669 pillow-cases, 1,005 bed-sacks, 1,370 flannel shirts, 1,912 quilts, and so on, *ad infinitum*. The industrial department cuts and furnishes garments to parties that will make them, and also sends patterns to a distance, to those who will cut and make. The association is conducted exclusively by the ladies of Boston, who have associates all over New England. The receipts increase as its importance becomes known. All donations are thankfully received, and the donors can be assured that nothing will be wasted. All honor to the ladies of Boston!

Ladies' Industrial Aid Association.

This association was organized early upon the breaking out of the war, by the ladies of Boston. In July it was re-organized, with Mrs. C. R. Lowell for President, Miss Anna Lowell, Vice-President, and with a board of thirteen directors. The object of this association is to furnish work—the making of soldiers' shirts—to the wives of the soldiers in the field who need assistance. They stand between the contractors and the women; take the garments from the contractors to cut and make, receiving a certain sum for making, and paying a certain sum to the needlewomen for the sewing. The association has succeeded beyond expectation.

To obtain an idea of what they have accomplished, we gave the figures: From July 6th, 1861, to January 1st, 1862, they received, in donations, in sums varying from five cents to five hundred dollars, \$3,229.28; for shirts gratuitously made, \$300; and for work done by the needlewomen (paid for), \$3,044—making a total of \$6,573.28. They had disbursed to the workwomen, for sewing, \$3,705.94, and had on hand, Jan. 1st, \$767.89. The number of articles made are as follows:—

When they first commenced, they received eight cents for making shirts, and paid sixteen; after that they received ten cents from the contractors, and paid twenty to the needlewomen. The number of women employed is about 700—about one-third of whom are Americans. They accomplish another end than simply furnishing work to the women—they teach them to sew, and to do it well. If a garment is returned poorly made, a less number is given out next time; so that they must work well if they would obtain the employment.

We cannot give too much praise to the ladies who have carried forward this truly useful enterprise. It has received their constant attention, and that with an immense amount of vexatious and fatiguing labor. The object is good; it is to furnish labor to the unemployed wives and families of the volunteers, and to teach them how to labor. The ladies hope to make it a self-sustaining institution; and, if they succeed, they will have accomplished a noble work.

State Aid to Families of Volunteers.

In March, 1862, the Legislature perfected the law aiding the families of volunteers. As it is of general interest, we give it entire:—

A N A C T

In addition to an Act in Aid of the Families of Volunteers, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

SECT. 1. Any town or city may raise money by taxation, or otherwise, and (if necessary) apply the same, under the direction of its Selectmen, or Mayor and Aldermen, or City Council, for the aid of the wife, each child, parent, brother, and sister of, and dependent upon, any one of the inhabitants of said town or city, who, as a part of the quota of this Commonwealth, has been, or hereafter shall be, duly enlisted and mustered into the volunteer service of the United States.

SECT. 2. Any town or city may raise and apply money, as aforesaid, for the aid of such wife, child, parent, brother and sister, of any one of its inhabitants who had been duly enlisted and mustered into said volunteer service as a part of the quota of any other State, before the passage of this Act.

SECT. 3. Money raised, as aforesaid, may be applied, as aforesaid, from and after the time of such enlistment, and while such inhabitant has been, or shall hereafter be, actually in said volunteer service; and all appropriations and expenditures heretofore made, or which shall hereafter be made, by the Selectmen, or Mayor and Aldermen, or City Council, of any town or city, for any of the purposes expressed in the foregoing sections, for any persons who have been, or are now, in the said service, notwithstanding any actual or supposed irregularity in their original enlistment, are hereby declared valid.

SECT. 4. Of the sums applied, as aforesaid, there shall be annually reimbursed from the State treasury, to the town or city so applying the same, a sum not exceeding one dollar per week for the wife, and one dollar per week for each child and parent aforesaid: *provided*, that the whole sum so reimbursed shall not exceed twelve dollars per month for all persons named in this section, dependent upon any such inhabitant at the time he was, or shall be, duly enlisted and mustered into said volunteer service.

SECT. 5. On or before the fifth day of January, in each year, there shall be deposited in the office of the Auditor of the Commonwealth, by each town and city raising and applying money, as aforesaid, a full and particular report, setting forth the names of the inhabitants of such town or city, for the aid of whose families money has been applied, as aforesaid, the names and ages of the several persons for the aid of whom money has been applied, as aforesaid, the relation such persons severally bear to such inhabitants, the sums paid to each of such persons, and the time when the same were paid. And no reimbursement shall be made from the State treasury to such town or city, as provided in Section Four of this Act, until such report has been sworn to by a majority of the Selectmen of such town, or the Mayor and a majority of the Aldermen of such city, deposited as aforesaid, and carefully examined, scrutinized, and approved by said auditor.

SECT. 6. This Act shall not authorize reimbursing money applied for the aid of any wife, child, or parent aforesaid, of any commissioned officer in said volunteer service, nor for the aid of any person dependent upon any volunteers from this State, enlisted into regiments of any other State, who receive aid from such other State.

SECT. 7. All Acts, and parts of Acts, inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, are hereby repealed.

SECT. 8. This Act shall take effect upon its passage.

The Commissary-General's Department.

The Governor appointed a commissary-general, according to the Act of the Legislature in May. The Commissary-General, by consent of the Governor and Council, and aid of the military department of the State, commenced labor with the idea of economy, and not liberal expenditure. They organized a plan for subsisting the soldiers, in place of the more expensive one of commuting their rations. The contracts for stores were made on advantageous terms. Fifteen regiments of infantry, one regiment of cavalry, and three companies of artillery, together with numerous companies, have been subsisted by the department. The efforts of those connected with the department have been direct to the promotion of health, comfort, and satisfaction among the troops — all causes of complaint being removed as promptly as practicable. Now, the volunteer corps raised in this State are subsisted by the general government, through officers detailed for that purpose. The total expenditure of the department was \$103,146.25; liabilities, \$10,000.00. In this, as in the other administrative departments of the State, since preparations for the war, Massachusetts has shown practical ability, humanity, and true loyalty to the soldiers' interest, as well as to the Union.

Three Months' Volunteers.

It is an interesting item to see the counties which furnished the three months' men, who first rallied to meet the front of rebellion. Old Middlesex bears off the palm in numbers. She sent 939 commissioned officers and men — 882 privates, and 57 commissioned officers. Essex stands alone close by her side; for she sent 71 commissioned officers, and 857 privates — being 928 in all. Norfolk came next, sending 21 commissioned officers, and 391 privates — making 412 in all. Franklin County sent one private and no commissioned officers; still, no one can doubt the loyalty of that county, and that she will respond to her utmost capacity in the war. The total number of commissioned officers furnished by the State was 244; privates, 3492 — making an aggregate of 3736 men. These men went to Washington, many of them, through Baltimore, under Butler. They subdued that city, held the State of Maryland in check, and showed a wealth of mechanical skill, bravery, intelligence, and heroism, that makes one of the brightest pages in American history.

The Arming of the Troops.

To carry on war, men must have arms. The science of the day makes it necessary that the first-class arms should be used, in order to make anything of an equality in fighting. By the foresight of the authorities in power, \$25,000 had been expended for overcoats and the munitions of war. They had immediate command of 3,500 rifled muskets. 500,000 cartridges had just been completed at the Cambridge arsenal, and rifled cannon were expected soon to be ready, with plenty of ammunition. With these stores in the ordnance department, the authorities were enabled to arm and equip the three months' volunteers, and dispatch them immediately to the seat of war. To December 24th, the number of the United States' rifled and smooth-bore muskets on hand

and received was 19,636; and of these, 18,449 have been distributed to the troops of the State. In addition to these, 14,700 Enfield rifled muskets have been purchased, and 13,185 have been distributed to the troops. There have been 1,200,000 cartridges made at the State arsenal, and these, with the stock on hand, gives an aggregate of 1,722,000; and from this quantity there has been distributed 1,084,000. Among the amounts paid by the State authorities, during the summer and fall, are the following: \$223,715.56 for Enfield rifled muskets; \$23,617.83 for infantry equipments; \$30,642.28 for guns and munitions; \$27,624.00 for Enfield rifled muskets, with cases, &c.; to the aggregate amount of \$559,876.25; and, in addition to this, \$2,572.05 has been paid for office hire, clerk hire, and other necessary contingents. It appears that the State has 3,662 of the Springfield rifles, 7,690 of the Springfield smooth-bore, and 13,185 of the Enfield rifles in the field, distributed among the various regiments.

Boston City Aid to the Families of Volunteers.

The city of Boston is paying out from \$16,000 to \$18,000 per month, as aid to the families of volunteers. All this is in addition to the regular pay of the soldiers. The amount paid to each family varies from \$4 to \$8 and \$12 per month. This money is again reimbursed to the city by the State, with the exception of what extra aid the city extends to persons more than usually needy. The number of persons assisted is about 2,200. The applicants first go to the State House, get a certificate of the enlistment of the husband, father, or brother, and apply to the Relief Officer, in Court Square; from thence they are sent to the Ward Committee, and, if approved, their application is signed by the Alderman of the ward; it is then returned to the Relief Officer, and the draft is received for the money. It is the opinion of the agent in charge that this munificent assistance has added one-third to the enlistments of the city.

The Surgeon-General's Report.

From the 16th day of April to the 16th of June, the medical supervision of the volunteer regiments was under the direction of an informal medical board—gentlemen whose loyalty and patriotism moved them to render their services to the State. Under their supervision, the physical fitness and medical wants of the soldiers were well supplied. The cost of medicines and hospital stores, for all the camps in the State, was \$1,862.07; the cost of the same for three months' outfit, \$8,719.25; and the outfit for surgical instruments, dressings, and furniture, \$12,102.40—making an aggregate of \$22,441.60. The resident physician of the Massachusetts General Hospital, with his department, and the city of Boston, through the City Physician, gave great assistance in the sanitary and medical departments of the service. These were gratuitous and patriotic offerings—a cheerful sacrifice for the interest of the soldier and the country. The Medical Commission, also,—appointed by the Governor on the order of the Secretary of War, for the examination of candidates for the medical staff,—gave their services to the State without compensation. The physicians of Massachusetts have done themselves honor in their free-will offerings.

Town Action.

At the commencement of the war, the whole State of Massachusetts was nerved to patriotic action. Almost all the towns raised money, men, and supplies to aid the war. To give an idea of that labor, without attempting any unpleasant comparisons, we give the work of a few towns, as an index of all.

Acton.

In April, 1861, the citizens of Acton met, and voted the sum of \$5000, to aid the volunteers and their families. They sent out a volunteer company of fifty-six men, called the Davis Guards, in honor of Davis of Concord Bridge and Revolutionary memory. This company was attended by the care and the blessings of the citizens. It returned at the expiration of three and a half months. Subsequently they raised another company of seventy men, to serve for three years or during the war.

Ashfield.

This town, on May 4th, held a town meeting, and voted "that the town pay those persons who have enlisted, or who shall hereafter enlist (being inhabitants of this town) as volunteers in the military service of the United States, the sum of twenty-six dollars per month each, while in such service, inclusive of what the Government shall pay them."

Amherst.

This town voted that the Selectmen borrow \$5000 for the aid of all those who enlisted from the town. The Rev. Mr. Merrick gave five dollars to each man who enlisted from his parish. About two hundred dollars were also raised by subscription, and five dollars was given to each man who volunteered. A ladies' society was also formed to aid the families of the volunteers; and they also sent a box of clothing, valued at one hundred and thirty-one dollars, to the hospital at Washington. This was the practice of Andover theology.

Plymouth.

This good Old Colony town heard the guns of Sumter, and felt that her integrity and honor were attacked. She immediately raised and sent two companies to the seat

of war. The second one cost her \$1,045 to equip. She immediately organized two home guards, — one of infantry, and one of artillery, — to be ready for any emergency in the future. The three months' troops were the object of the utmost care and attention of the citizens, who supplied their wants, the wants of their families, and gave the volunteers a hearty God-speed as they started for the seat of war. She has raised three companies for the war; and a fourth was commenced there, and completed in Braintree. Besides these, men have enlisted in thirteen of the different regiments of the State; so that there are now 251 Plymouth men in the army. She has, also, 9 commissioned acting masters in the navy, 13 master's mates, and 20 sailors. The aggregate number now in the army and navy is 293; and all these in addition to the three months' men. A town meeting was held, and \$2,000 voted to aid the volunteers; also a bounty of \$6 to married men, and \$4 to single. Up to the first of January, 1862, they have spent, altogether, \$5,700 in aiding the war. By the promptness of Plymouth, and towns like her, in the language of one of her sons, "*Massachusetts set the pitch for the whole music of the war.*" Plymouth of 1862 is worthy of Plymouth of 1620.

Marblehead.

Marblehead has a quick ear, and, when South Carolina sounded the guns of treason, was on her feet. She immediately sent Companies C, B, and H to aid in suppressing the rebellion. They were among the first on Boston Common after the call of the President, and declared themselves "All ready." They performed valuable services at Washington, saved "Old Ironsides," the "Constitution," &c.

These men received the attention of the citizens, so that they had all the conveniences that the tented field would warrant, and their families were not left to want.

Marshfield.

This Old Colony town, where sleep the remains of the immortal Defender of the Constitution, on the 29th of April carried the following resolution: — "Whereas, the pay of soldiers in the service of the United States is insufficient for the support of the families of those who enlist, therefore, resolved, that the town of Marshfield appropriate a sum not exceeding \$5,000, to pay each inhabitant of this town, who may enlist, or who has enlisted, when called into service, fifteen dollars, and fifteen dollars a month while in service, and also present outfits for the service." These provisions were carried out. The town sent a company of eighty men to the war.

Holyoke.

This town early held a town meeting, and voted to raise \$10,000 to aid the volunteers and their families. \$5,000 were expended in a few months for this purpose by the patriotic citizens, besides \$300 more which was raised by private subscription. Although no full company went from the town, as a company, one hundred and twenty men from the town enlisted in other companies.

Lenox.

This town also came forward handsomely, and honored western Massachusetts. The citizens held a town meeting, and immediately voted five dollars per month additional pay to the volunteers enlisting from that town. But individual action was more honorable still, for private citizens raised, by subscription, the sum of \$2,250, to aid the volunteers and their families.

Springfield.

This city, besides such individual action as was prompted everywhere throughout the State, came forward with a vote of \$30,000 to aid the volunteers and their families. According to her ability, she was not behind the modern Athens of the commonwealth in substantial manifestations of her patriotism.

South Danvers.

This town appropriated \$7000, to be disbursed in accordance with the laws of the State. This was voted May 22, 1861. One company was organized in time and sent to the seat of war. \$3,500 was raised, by private subscription, for the equipment of volunteers, and aiding their families. The whole number of men belonging to Danvers who went to the war, was 306, including sixty three months' men.

Pittsfield.

This town voted the sum of \$5,000 for the support of volunteers and their families, and expended the sum of \$630 for this purpose. Mr. William Pollock gave the sum of \$1,000 to uniform the Pollock Guards, — a company named in honor of himself. This company was attached to the Tenth Regiment of M. V. M. In addition to this, the sum of \$2,000 was raised by private subscription.

Nantucket.

This island shows itself a part of the old commonwealth. On the breaking out of the war, a home guard was formed, and money raised to support it. A large number of the citizens enlisted in the army and navy. The ladies, unwilling to be idle, formed a society for attending to and supplying necessities to the citizens enlisting in the army and navy. When the national loan was called for, her citizens responded by taking \$75,000 as their share.

BIOGRAPHICAL.

Massachusetts has lost many of her brave sons in this war, and we give the following sketches as a faint tribute to the memory of the more distinguished.

Luther C. Ladd.

This heroic youth, of only seventeen years, was one of the earliest who offered their services to the government in defence of its insulted honor. He was a native of Alexandria, N. H., but had been residing in Lowell, Mass., about one year, where he was engaged in mechanical pursuits. He had won the esteem of his employer by his diligence in business. Prospects were opening before him which gave bright promise of success in his vocation, when he heard that the hand of the parricide had been raised to strike down the flag of his country. When, in this critical emergency, the government called for aid to repel the assaults upon her sacred rights, our young hero bravely responded. He gazed with a new pride upon the "stripes and stars," which were now beginning everywhere to stud the firmament, and his young heart catching the inspiration of a more ardent love for his country, he resolved to join issue with its foes. His friends sought to dissuade him from his purpose; but the pleadings of affection could not prevail, and he resolved to leave relations and friends, to assist in upholding that flag which he so passionately loved. Under the influence of such a spirit of devotion to the welfare of his bleeding country, our young hero went forth from those who were dearest to him on earth, to her defence. In one week from the day that Sumter fell, young Ladd, with his brave associates, stood in the streets of Baltimore, exposing himself to the deadly missiles of an infuriated mob. It was there, on the memorable 19th of April, 1861, — the anniversary of the first battle of the first American Revolution, — that he received the fatal wound which, in a few hours, terminated his life. It was there, while bleeding to death, that he uttered those memorable words, which shall cause the hearts of millions to thrill with grateful emotions as they shall recur to them: —

"ALL HAIL TO THE STARS AND STRIPES!"

These were the last words he is known to have uttered. Let them be treasured in the hearts of his countrymen, and act as a talisman, urging them on to conquest over the foes which may rise up against her in the future. Let the young men of this republic emulate the devotion to her welfare of this heroic youth, and she shall never want for friends to defend her, when foes — either *intestine* or *foreign* — shall rise up against her.

On the 7th of May, 1861, the body was brought to Boston and deposited in a tomb, and soon after it was removed to Lowell, — with that of Addison O. Whitney, who fell with him, — where appropriate and impressive funeral services were had, in which the municipal authorities of that city, and thousands of the populace of that and the adjacent towns, participated. The body of Ladd was subsequently removed to Alexandria, N. H. (his native place), where similar public demonstrations were made, the people turning out by thousands to evince their love for him who had so valiantly vindicated his country's honor in the hour of her imminent peril. His body has since been removed to Lowell, where it "sleeps its last sleep" in one of the cemeteries of that beautiful city, and where we hope, ere long, to see the spot marked by a suitable monument, which shall tell the passer-by where rests all that was mortal of the noble youth.

Sumner Henry Needham.

Sumner Henry Needham was born in Bethel, Me., March 2d, 1828, and resided at Lawrence for the last twelve years of his life. He had been a member of the Lawrence Light Infantry about five years, and was one of the corporals at the time of his death, and was held in much esteem by all who knew him. When the summons came to march for his country's defence, he cheerfully obeyed the call, and went forth with his comrades. He was one of the first martyrs who fell at Baltimore, mortally wounded, April 19th, 1861. He was then conveyed to the Infirmary in that city, where he lingered until April 27th, when death relieved him of his sufferings. He left a young wife at Lawrence, and other relatives in Bethel, to lament his untimely death. His remains, with the bodies of Ladd and Whitney, who also fell at Baltimore, were brought to Boston May 1, where they were publicly received by the city authorities, with appropriate and solemn ceremonies.

On the 3d of May his body, in charge of a Committee of the City Government of Lawrence, arrived at that city, and, the next day, was placed in the City Hall, where thousands flocked to view it. His funeral took place from the Universalist Church, on the afternoon of May 4th, and was attended by a large concourse of friends and citizens. Military and civic associations united on this occasion in paying the last token of respect to one who so nobly gave his life to his country. His name will ever be cherished by the "Gallant Sixth Regiment," as well as by every true citizen of the Old Bay State. "God bless the heroes!"

The day of his funeral was an occasion of great solemnity, — one seldom witnessed in Lawrence. Business was generally suspended — flags at half-mast; and emblems of mourning could be seen at almost every point. As the procession moved on, bearing the remains of this loved one, church and factory bells pealed forth the knell of death. Arriving at the city cemetery, the remains of one who had been so tenderly cared for were deposited with appropriate ceremonies.

Mr. Needham was a member of the Universalist Church of Lawrence, and the pastor, Rev. Mr. Weaver, delivered a very touching and appropriate discourse in regard to his character and death. The society also passed resolutions, expressive of their heartfelt sorrow, and in testimony of his worthy life.

Addison Otis Whitney.

Addison Otis Whitney was born in Waldo, Me., Oct. 30, 1839. For the last two years of his life he had resided in Lowell, and had been employed by the Middlesex Corporation, and had sustained an upright and irreproachable character, greatly endearing himself to all who here knew him, and especially to the family with whom he boarded, winning the espousal of one who had learned his worth, and could reciprocate his love. About eighteen months before his death, he enlisted with the City Guard. From a high sense of a soldier's duty, he promptly responded to the call of his commander-in-chief, and was cruelly cut down in Baltimore, while marching with the "Glorious Sixth" through that city, on the 19th of April, 1861.

His remains were brought to Boston, and from there conveyed to Lowell, where the city authorities, and the citizens generally, united in appropriate funeral ceremonies. Henceforth his memory will be cherished by his countrymen.

Elijah B. Gill, Jr.

Elijah B. Gill, Jr., was born in Hingham, Mass., April 24th, 1833, but had resided in Boston for several years. When the proclamation for troops was issued, he promptly came forward and enlisted in Company I, 1st Regiment of Massachusetts Volunteers, and was chosen a lieutenant of the company. He entered upon his duties with a patriotic pride and satisfaction—cheerfully sharing in the dangers and privations of a soldier's life.

A part of the regiment to which he belonged was engaged in the battle of Bull Run, in July, 1861, and his company was detailed, with others, for especial duty, on the 21st instant; and it was in the gallant discharge of this dangerous duty that young Gill heroically fell, mortally wounded by a bullet through the breast. His comrades tenderly bore his body from the field, and buried it that night at Centreville, with feelings of keen sorrow for their loss and regret that the body could not be conveyed to his native State.

Beneath a young tree, to shade the spot, and in the ground desecrated by the traitorous chivalry, they deposited the remains of this loyal son of Pilgrim descent—to repose until the restoration of peace shall permit his body to be gathered to his fathers in the good old colony town of Hingham.

One of the officers of the regiment writes, "My recollections of him are of a pleasant nature. He was one of my favorites. In scenes of anxiety and danger, I learned his fine qualities, and contracted a strong friendship for him."

His deportment was gentlemanly, his habits good, and, as an officer and soldier, he was kind and efficient. His men loved him, his officers esteemed him, and his memory will ever be cherished by his friends.

William H. Lawrence.

William H. Lawrence, sergeant of Company E, a standard-bearer of the 5th Regiment, fell, with his breast pierced with two balls, while waving the nation's flag in the face of the enemy, at the battle before Manassas.

His patriotic feelings were aroused at the breaking out of the rebellion. The mustering of troops, with the stirring strains of martial music, during the memorable days in April, were too much for his soul. The peaceful pursuits of life were forgotten, and, with thoughts only of country, he offered himself for service in this "hour of peril." The colonel of the regiment, seeing at once his determined zeal, had him provided with an outfit and presented him with a revolver, to guard well the name of Lawrence. Before leaving, he was appointed a sergeant; and the colonel, satisfied of his soldierly abilities, appointed him a color-bearer.

He revered his country's flag, and bore it to meet those who conspired against it. The outbursts of patriotism which he witnessed during the journey towards Washington, only increased his patriotism. At Annapolis, he wrote, "We are here, anxious for a fight, and in the finest spirits. I have sworn to bear the standard, even to the cannon's mouth. If I return, I will bear it safe into Boston."

At Washington, he says, "When the Union is in danger from traitors, I am a soldier as much as any other man; and the 5th shall say, Lawrence did his duty well."

Marching to battle, he "was eager for the fray." At Manassas, he bore a noble part, and fell, a hero in a martyr's cause. Near the field of battle, he wrote,—

"As it is possible that I may not live to write to-morrow, I will write a few lines this morning, to inform you how we are at the present time. During the last forty-eight hours we have been busy, I assure you. We have already heard the roar of cannon and musketry. The enemy have been in sight most of the time. I am sorry to say that many a brave Massachusetts man fell yesterday, and several that I knew. We are in expectation of having a regular engagement."

The engagement took place; and, with a devotion which does honor to his Massachusetts origin, he fought bravely, sustaining the honor of his State and country, and fell, holding in his devoted embrace the glorious flag, which will never be dishonored while his example is imitated. His memory is embalmed in the hearts of the 5th Regiment.

Succeeding generations, reaping rich rewards, will remember with the deepest gratitude all who have suffered in the cause of liberty.

Alois Babo.

Alois Babo was born in May, 1831, at Rastadt (Grand Duchy of Baden). In his eighteenth year he devoted himself to the study of law, and attended the courses of the universities of Fribourg and Heidelberg.

In 1853 he left for the United States, resided some months in New York, then went to Boston, where he was for some years Professor of Ancient Languages at Comer's College.

In the spring of 1861, he was one of the first to call and organize German volunteer corps, to crush treason and rebellion at the South.

He fell at the battle of Ball's Bluff, captain of Company G, 20th Regiment, Massachusetts Volunteers — a brave soldier, who did not want to surrender to the enemy.

He was a good, noble, and faithful man.

Reinhold Wesselhoeft.

Reinhold Wesselhoeft, born in the city of Weimar, the capital of the duchy of that name, April 10, 1838, was the son of Robert Wesselhoeft, well known for his love of liberty, for which he suffered many years before the revolution of 1848, and who, with his children, of whom Reinhold was the third, emigrated to the United States in 1840. Young Reinhold, therefore, received his earliest education in this country, at the public schools of Boston and Brattleboro', Vt., where his parents resided for many years, as also through private German tutors. Returning to Germany in his thirteenth year, and completing his school education at an institute in the neighborhood of his birth-place, he returned to America, after an absence of about three years, and applied himself to book-keeping and other mercantile branches; although it was his intention to devote himself to the study of natural sciences, wherein, however, the untimely death of his father thwarted him. By nature free from narrow prejudices of a religious or political kind, open to convictions, and ever ready to take a firm ground in defence of unfortunate or oppressed fellow-men, of whatever country or color, young Wesselhoeft's warm heart and scrupulous fidelity to the trusts committed to him won for him many friends. Up to the commencement of the rebellion of the Slave States against their government, Mr. Wesselhoeft had taken a lively interest in the political movements of the times. Though young in years, few could have evinced more distinctly than he the indignation of a patriot at what he recognized as the wrongs of the political condition of this country, the greatest of which he regarded the institution of slavery, whose decline he ardently hoped to see. When, therefore, the country's peril called for the volunteer soldiers of the North, Reinhold Wesselhoeft, relinquishing many a brightening prospect of personal success, with his friends, Alois Babo and Ferdinand Dreher, was among the first to enlist in a company of his German countrymen. Regiment after regiment was accepted and sent to the seat of war, while numerous complete volunteer companies, waiting in vain to be mustered into service, disbanded; but the German band of which Mr. Wesselhoeft was a member held out; while the duty of maintaining it fell chiefly upon him, and was performed throughout a period of two months, by collecting contributions of clothes and food, from meal to meal and from day to day — thus encouraging the men by his example, and inducing them to remain, until, at length, rations were allowed them. Finally, in the month of July, the company was joined to the 20th Regiment, Massachusetts Volunteers, encamped at Readville, and Mr. Wesselhoeft soon afterwards commissioned as second lieutenant of his company. He filled his place completely, as was proved by the degree of confidence bestowed upon him by the officers in command of the regiment, which, on the 21st of October, 1861, took so prominent a part in the battle of Ball's Bluff, on the Potomac river, where, after his gallant captain, F. Dreher, was disabled, Lieutenant Wesselhoeft took command of the remaining fragment of his company, which, no longer able to withstand the overwhelming force of the rebels, was dispersed. Thereupon Lieutenant Wesselhoeft, after expressing his firm resolve not to surrender, entered the river with his friend, Captain Babo, but perished, probably, in the struggle, with his comrade, who was wounded mortally while swimming, under the continued fire of the enemy. The remains of Lieutenant Wesselhoeft, found several days afterwards, were deposited in the Oakhill Cemetery, at Georgetown, D. C.

John W. Grout.

Lieutenant John W. Grout, who was killed at the battle of Ball's Bluff, Oct. 21st, 1861, was born in the summer of 1843, in Worcester. He early showed a little of the military genius of his ancestors, and especially when he entered the military department of Caleb B. Metcalf's Highland School, Boston. He evinced superiority, and was soon made captain of cadets. When the war broke out, he obtained the consent of his parents to join the army, and entered upon the labor with enthusiasm. His services were in great demand in drilling volunteers. In the organization of the 15th Regiment, Company D gave him the position of second lieutenant. Until their departure for the seat of war, the drilling of the company devolved mainly upon him. The first lieutenant was detailed for other service, which greatly increased the responsibilities of young Grout. He was distinguished for his attention to his duties, for his generosity, and for his fertility of resources. Ball's Bluff came with its disasters. His coolness and self-possession, his precision and courage, had great effect upon the

efficiency of his men. He fought like a tiger. Every blow of his sword told. The order came for each man to take care of himself. He crossed the river with the wounded, and returned. Again the boat filled, and he remained upon the shore. He asked the colonel, "Is there anything more that I can do?" and the reply was, "Nothing, but take care of yourself." He waited for the first light of the rising moon, plunged in, when the ball of the assassin left him only strength to exclaim, "Tell Company D that I should have escaped, but I am shot."

The heroism of this young man will be a perpetual inspiration to the young men of Worcester.

His body was conveyed to Worcester, where the funeral took place. The citizens generally united in honoring, in an appropriate manner, one who had so early in life fallen a martyr to his country's cause.

William Lowell Putnam.

William Lowell Putnam was born in Boston in 1840, and was a son of Samuel R. Putnam, Esq., of that city. Although receiving his education mainly in Europe, and residing there many years of his brief life, yet he lost not the love of his native land, nor the principles of liberty which his countrymen revere.

On the breaking out of the war in 1861, between oppression and freedom, he felt called to take an active part in it. While his patriotism was aroused, a stronger motive seemed to inspire him for the contest; in maintaining the supremacy of the government, he hoped to carry the glad tidings of liberty to all of his countrymen throughout the land.

He enlisted in Company E, 20th Regiment, Massachusetts Volunteers; was elected 2d lieutenant, and was in the battle at Edward's Ferry, Oct. 21. While bravely engaged in that fight, he was seriously wounded, and died the next day at Poolesville, Md. His body was brought to Boston, the funeral services took place at the West Church, Oct. 28, and it was buried at Mount Auburn, with military honors.

The following extract is taken from an address, delivered at the funeral, by the Rev. James Freeman Clarke:—

"The boy-soldier, whose remains are before us, came, by both parents, from the best New England races. His father is descended from the ancestor of old General Putnam; and his family, on this side, contains such statesmen and scholars as Timothy and John Pickering. On the other side, his mother's family has given to us statesmen, sages, patriots, poets, scholars, orators, economists, philanthropists, and now gives to us also a hero and martyr. His great-grandfather, Judge Lowell, inserted in the Bill of Rights, prefixed to the Constitution of this State, the clause declaring that 'all men are born free and equal,' for the purpose, as he avowed at the time, of abolishing slavery in Massachusetts; and he was appointed by President Washington Federal Judge of this district. His grandfather was minister of this church, honored and loved as few men have been, for more than half a century. Of others I need not speak—but to those who knew not personally our young friend, I may say that his native powers and scholarly habits indicated that he would fully keep the promise given in the traditions of his family.

"He was educated in Europe, where he went when eleven years old, and where, in France, Germany and Italy, he showed that he possessed the ancestral faculty of mastering easily all languages, and where he faithfully studied classic and Christian antiquity and art. Under the best and most loving guidance, he read with joy the vivid descriptions of Virgil, while looking down from the hill of Posillippo on the headland of Misenum and the ruins of Cumæ. He studied with diligence the remains of Etruscan art, of which, perhaps, no American scholar, though he was so young, knew more. And here, let me mention a distinguished French *savant*, Dr. Guépin, of Nantes, in Brittany, who took a peculiar interest in William Putnam, and devoted himself to his instruction as if he had been his parent. This excellent scholar and generous gentleman will hear of his death with pain, scarcely less than if William were his own child. Thus accomplished he returned to his native land, but, modest and earnest, he made no display of his acquisitions, and very few knew that he had acquired anything. When the war broke out, his conscience and heart urged him to go to the service of his country. His strong sense of duty overcame the reluctance of his parents, and they consented. A presentiment that he should not return alive was very strong in his mind and theirs. But he gave himself cheerfully, and said, in entire strength of purpose, that to die would be easy, in such a cause. And, in the full conviction of immortality, he added, 'What is death, mother? it is nothing but a step in our life.' His fidelity to every duty gained him the respect of his superior officers; and his generous, constant interest in his companions and soldiers brought to him an unexampled affection. He realized fully that this war must enlarge the area of freedom, if it was to attain its true end; and in one of his last letters, he expressed the earnest prayer that it might not cease till it opened the way for universal liberty.

"These earnest opinions were connected with a feeling of the wrong done to the African race, and an interest in its improvement. He took with him to the war, as a body-servant, a colored lad named George Brown, who repaid the kindness of Lieut. Putnam by gratitude and faithful service. George Brown followed his master across the Potomac into the battle, nursed him in his tent, and attended his remains back to Boston. Nor let the devoted courage of Lieut. Henry Sturgis be forgotten, who lifted his wounded friend and comrade from the ground, and carried him on his back a long

distance to the boat, and returned again into the fight. Such actions show that Boston boys retain the old spirit of their fathers.

"In the fatal battle a week ago, Lowell fell, as is reported, while endeavoring to save a wounded companion — fell, soiled with no ignoble dust — '*non indecoro pulvere sordidum*.' Brought to the hospital-tent, he said to the surgeon, who came to dress his wound, 'Go to some one else, to whom you can do more good; you cannot save me;' like Philip Sydney, giving the water to the soldiers who needed it more than himself.

"Brave and beautiful child! was it for this that you had inherited the best results of past culture, and had been so wisely educated and carefully trained? Was it for this! to be struck down by a ruffian's bullet, in a hopeless struggle against overwhelming numbers? How hard to consent to let these precious lives be thus wasted, apparently for nought, through the ignorance or the carelessness of those whose duty it was to make due preparation, before sending them to the field. How can we bear it?

"We could not bear it, unless we believed in God. But believing in God and Christ, we can bear even this. It is not any blind chance, not any human folly, which controls these events. All is as God wills, who knows what the world needs, and what we need, better than we can know it. He uses the folly and sin of man for great ends; and he does not allow any good and noble effort to be lost.

* * * * *

"And do we not see, in these great sacrifices, that the heroism itself is already a great gain? Is it not something to know that we do not belong to a degenerate race? Is it not a great blessing to know that we also, and our sons, are still as capable as our fathers were of great and noble sacrifices, — that Massachusetts, God bless her! still produces heroes! * * * * *

"Yes, we lose them, these precious children, but we gain them while we lose them! They go from us in their strength and beauty, but they go direct to God, and come to us again from Him, transfigured in the light and glory of his Heaven. We take them with us in our hearts wherever we go. We feel the exalted life which they have attained. There come to me at this time some singularly applicable lines of Schiller, in his Wallenstein, — singularly applicable, because this German play was one which William Lowell was very fond of reading, and in which the character and fate of Max seem so parallel to his own. When Max fell in a battle like that of last Monday, when he was attacked by overwhelming numbers, and no retreat was possible, these are the words of his friend: —

"He the more fortunate! Yea, he hath finished!

For him there is no longer any future.

His life is bright — bright without spot it was,

And cannot cease to be. No ominous hour

Knocks at his door, with tidings of mishap.

Far off is he, — above desire and fear;

O, 'tis well with him."

" 'Well with him,' and well also with the land which bears such sons. Their spirit deepens ours, — deepens the soul of courage throughout the land; calls out more valor, more devotion. When we hear of such deaths, we feel how happy we also should be to die so. We feel as Pulaski felt; I quote an anecdote told me in my youth. Pulaski, the Polish soldier, was gently rebuked by Washington for rash exposure of his life. He replied, 'General, my father died, killed in battle, when he was 22; my grandfather died in battle, fighting for his country, when he was 23. General, I am 25, and I am ashamed to be alive.' We feel almost ashamed to be alive when we hear of these sacrifices. Such deaths are not in vain, for they rouse the whole soul of the land; and the blood of the martyrs is again the seed of the church."

John M. Whittemore.

John M. Whittemore was born in September, 1835, and was a son of the Rev. Thos. Whittemore, D. D.

From his boyhood, Mr. Whittemore had an ardent love for mechanics, and especially for that of steam-engineery; and for several years he had been employed in the engineering department of the Vermont and Massachusetts Railroad.

In August, 1861, he entered the navy, and was ordered to join the U. S. sloop-of-war Mohican, at the Charlestown Navy Yard, and acted as an assistant engineer on board of that steamer.

In October, he sailed for the South, and arrived at Port Royal, S. C., in November, and, on the 7th of that month, engaged in the bombardment of the forts at Hilton Head; and, while in the discharge of his duty there, was killed by a piece of shell, which passed through his head.

His remains were brought from Port Royal, and the funeral services took place at Cambridgeport, and were attended by naval and military officers, besides a large concourse of friends.

Thus fell the first martyr upon South Carolinian soil, in maintaining the honor and integrity of the nation.

George Foster Hodges.

George Foster Hodges was born Jan. 12, 1837, in Providence, R. I., and was a son of Almon D. Hodges, Esq., of Roxbury, Mass. Mr. Hodges was one of the youngest members of the class of 1855 at Harvard, and had taken his degree at the Law School,

where he was distinguished for his high character, his ability, his untiring industry, and his acquirements. When the war broke out he was a member of the Cadets. Believing it to be his duty to volunteer, instead of waiting for a commission, he at once shouldered his musket, joined the Fifth Regiment, enlisted as a private in the Charlestown City Guards, and started on the 20th of April for Washington. He endured all the hardships of that memorable march from Annapolis. He was soon after made paymaster of the regiment. He was on the staff of Col. Lawrence in the battle of Bull Run, — was in the thickest of the fight, carried his colonel, when wounded, from the field, and stood by him in every danger. After the return of the Fifth, he was commissioned as adjutant of the Eighteenth Regiment, and was stationed at Camp Barnes, Hall's Hill, Va. He was an able and efficient officer, and while in the discharge of his duties was attacked with typhoid fever, and died in camp, at Hall's Hill, Va., near Washington, Jan. 31, 1862.

Few have gone to the war from purer or higher motives; and he will long be remembered for his unselfish devotion to duty by the many who knew him.

His death was noticed in an appropriate manner by the regiment to which he belonged, and resolutions were passed at a meeting of the officers, expressive of the high esteem in which he was held by them.

The classmates of young Hodges met in Boston, upon learning of his death, and expressed their feelings of sorrow and respect by resolutions, which gave evidence of their strong attachment, and their just appreciation of his noble character.

The funeral ceremonies took place in Roxbury, at the Rev. Dr. Putnam's Church, — a numerous concourse of friends, State officers, and the military, crowding the church, to pay their last respects to one who had so patriotically devoted himself to his country in the morning of life. His remains were carried to Providence, and now repose in the Old North Burying Ground in that city.

Dr. Luther V. Bell.

Dr. Luther V. Bell was born in 1806. His birthplace and early home were in hill towns of New Hampshire. He received a careful training in literature, morals and religion, and a wise preparation for the duties and honors of life. A distinguished parentage, a household of brothers, and a circle of relatives, filling the highest civil and judicial offices in State and national trusts, surrounded him in youth and fresh manhood with examples and influences to direct him to some prominent sphere and range of action. He graduated at Bowdoin College in 1823, and received a medical degree at Dartmouth College from the Hanover Medical School.

After a brief and uncongenial trial of mercantile life in New York, he established himself as a practising physician in Londonderry, New Hampshire, and found the calling suited to his tastes and gifts. While filling the round of his work as a country practitioner, he was the successful competitor for a prize offered for an essay on the treatment of the insane. This proves how early and to what good results he had become interested in that department of medical science, at the head of which he won his eminent fame. From 1836 to 1856 he had charge of the McLean Asylum for the Insane; a period of years during which many hundred patients were under his care; and he discharged the different duties with great success, and to the entire satisfaction of all. After years of valuable services to the institution, his health became seriously impaired, and he resigned the trust. In politics he took a strong interest, and served the State as a representative and an executive counsellor. Upon the breaking out of the rebellion, his devotion to his country was evinced by his offer of medical services to those whose physical ability and patriotism enabled them to grapple with the foe.

He prepared himself for the special exigencies of that service by a brief but earnest period of attention given to the principles of military surgery. He was already a proficient in hygienic and sanitary science. He was attached, as surgeon, to the 11th Massachusetts Regiment of Volunteers, and served in that regiment until he was appointed a brigade-surgeon in the Army of the United States. He died at Budd's Ferry, on the 12th of Feb., 1862.

While serving in the 11th Regiment, he wrote to a friend: — "I have seen a vast amount of malarial disease, and the whole volume of military surgery was opened before me on Sunday afternoon, July 21, with illustrations horrid and sanguinary. 'Sudley Church,' with its hundred wounded victims, will form a picture in my sick dreams so long as I live. I never have spent one night out of camp since I came into it, and a bed and myself have been practically strangers these seven months. Yet I never have had one beginning of a regret at my decision to devote what may be left of life and ability to the great cause. I have, as you know, four young, motherless children. Painful as it is to leave such a charge, even in the worst hands, I have forced myself into reconciliation by the reflection that the great issue under the stern arbitrament of arms is, whether or not our children are to have a country. My own health and strength have amazed me."

Dr. Bell was amiable and courteous, and was greatly beloved by all with whom he came in contact, and by none more so than the officers and soldiers of the 11th Massachusetts Volunteers, who experienced the pleasures and benefits of his generous liberality and eminent medical skill.

The funeral services over his remains took place at Charlestown, Mass., Feb. 17th. The State Legislature, then in session, adjourned to attend the funeral; and the city officers of Charlestown, with others, united in paying their last respects to the deceased patriot and philanthropist.

MILITARY ACTION.

"The Sword of the Lord and of Gideon."

In ancient days, when the Ark of the Lord was threatened, the chosen people of God girded on the sword and in the name of the Most High smote with great slaughter the heathen in their borders who had arrayed themselves against their cherished institutions. They fought for an idea, a sacred faith, which to them embraced all that was great and good in man.

During the Crusades, stimulated with a strong religious feeling, men rushed impetuously to the rescue of the Holy Sepulchre from the hands of the Infidel. They, too, were animated by a holy and undying faith.

So fought Cromwell and his psalm-singing legions, who smote down the proud house of Stuart and seized the power of England.

Impressed with a living faith and high purpose, the Pilgrims, led by the intrepid Standish and pious Brewster, grasped reverently and with firmer hand the Sacred Writ while wielding the sword to repel the merciless savages, and found a new empire for religion and liberty.

So fought the heroes of the revolutionary struggle of 1776 — men loyal to their faith in God and the dignity and equality of humanity. Inspired with this idea, they marshalled themselves in battle array against despotism, sacrificing ease to privation and suffering, that they might through the baptism of blood establish justice and liberty under a republican form of government. And so in 1861, when wicked men with sacrilegious hands attempted to destroy this government — the palladium of our liberties — devoted men sprang armed from the earth, and with earnest souls, pausing not to calculate the danger, and knowing the righteousness of their cause, cut their way through the hosts of rebellion, and saved the national capital from the tide of treason.

First in the contest, Massachusetts rendered prompt and invaluable aid. Ever watchful for the cause of the Union and liberty, she instinctively "scented the battle from afar," and bravely prepared to meet the enemy when its uplifted hand should strike the blow.

The Adjutant-General of the State, in his report to the Governor in 1860, observed the threatened storm, and wisely suggested proper precautionary measures; and Ex-Governor Banks, during the last year of his administration, gave to the military department of the State his especial attention, and revived somewhat the military spirit of the Commonwealth.

His Excellency, John A. Andrew, on assuming the duties of Governor of the State and Commander-in-Chief of the militia, at once understood the crisis and exhibited wisdom and sagacity to an extraordinary degree, which showed him to be the "man for the hour," and one fit to be trusted with the honor and patriotism of the State. With such a leader, and such a people and soldiery, distance was annihilated, and when the cry went up from Washington, Massachusetts troops rushed through seven States, leaving their dead and wounded on the way, and were the first to enter the capital.

To show the military action of the State in 1861 to put down rebellion, the following list of the regiments, with their movements, is given, which, together with extracts from the able report of Adjutant-General Schouler, will furnish matter of much interest to the reader. That report, dated Dec. 31, 1861, says —

"The storm of rebellion which broke upon our peaceful land in April last was fore-
"seen months before by your Excellency and by the Legislature of the Common-
"wealth, and wise and liberal provision was made to meet and if possible avert it."
"The worst fears of our people have been realized, and the evidence now afforded by
"the living and dead of our true, loyal and gallant sons of Massachusetts, at home"
"and on the battle-field, proves that the Commonwealth has been "true to her his-"
"tory, her tradition, and her fair fame." The report further states that the reasons
why Massachusetts so promptly responded were —

"1st. The excellent system for the organization and discipline of a militia force,"
"which has so long distinguished this Commonwealth, and has received the constant"
"attention and approval of the Legislature.

"2d. The promulgation of General Order No. 4, by your Excellency's direction, on"
"the 16th of January last, so that we ascertained with accuracy the number of officers"
"and men of the Volunteer Militia who would respond instantly to any call which"
"might be made upon them by the President of the United States. Opposition was"
"made to this order at first, but events soon proved the wisdom of issuing it. Those"
"who could not respond as required, received their discharges, and their places were"
"immediately filled by others ready for any emergency.

"3d. The sagacity and foresight which induced the Legislature to pass the bill approved by your Excellency on the 3d of April, appropriating \$25,000, and authorizing the Adjutant-General to contract for overcoats, blankets, knapsacks, 200,000 ball cartridges, &c., for two thousand troops. Our militia soldiers had uniforms of their own, and had in their several armories over three thousand Springfield rifled muskets of the best pattern.

"Thus when the attack upon the heroic band of Union patriots at Fort Sumter on the 12th of April extinguished the last hope of peace, and its fall aroused the mighty energy of our people to maintain their national existence, Massachusetts was ready to push forward her regiments, armed and equipped, to defend the flag and save Washington, in the hour of peril, from capture and spoliation.

"For three months previous, our Volunteer Militia, in anticipation of some great traitorous movement in the South, had been drilling almost nightly in their several armories, so that when the summons came from the President on the 15th of April, the 'Fiery Cross' was sent over the Commonwealth, and in obedience to the call the men came forth, as in the brave days of old, leaving the workshop and the plough, their nets and barges, homes and kindred, inspired by love of country and the rights of mankind."

On the day that Fort Sumter was attacked, the Governor made application to the Secretary of War for permission to draw two thousand rifled muskets from the U. S. Arsenal at Springfield, in advance of the annual quota becoming due, also to garrison the forts in Boston harbor; but the rifled muskets could not be procured, nor permission granted to garrison the forts. Afterwards, however, five thousand of the most improved smooth-bore muskets from Springfield, and four thousand Windsor rifles (without bayonets), were obtained from the U. S. Arsenal at Watertown. This statement is made, as some of the regiments have gone to the seat of war with smooth-bore muskets, but it was not the fault of the Executive of this State.

To quote again from the Adjutant-General's Report —

"The first call for troops was by a telegram from Senator Wilson, dated at Washington, April 15th, requesting twenty companies to be sent immediately to Washington and there mustered into service. In the course of the day were received formal requisitions by telegraph from the Secretary of War and Adjutant-General of the United States for two full regiments of the Massachusetts Militia. In compliance therewith, Special Order No. 14 was issued on the same day, directing Colonel Jones of the Sixth Regiment, Colonel Packard of the Fourth, Colonel Wardrop of the Third, and Colonel Munroe of the Eighth, to muster their respective commands on the Boston Common forthwith 'in compliance with a requisition made by the President of the United States.' This order was sent by mail and by special messengers to the Colonels, who severally resided at Lowell, Quincy, New Bedford, and Lynn. The companies were scattered through the cities and towns of Plymouth, Bristol, Norfolk, Essex and Middlesex Counties."

"In obedience to orders nearly every company in the above regiments arrived in Boston the next day."

"A dispatch from Senator Wilson, April 16th, stated that Massachusetts was to furnish immediately four regiments, making one brigade, with one Brigadier-General. Brigadier-Gen. Benj. F. Butler, Third Brigade, Second Division, M. V. M., was ordered on the 17th to take command of the troops."

To complete the proper number of companies for the regiments, companies were detached from other regiments.

By special order Gen. Butler was commanded on the 18th of April to proceed with the Eighth Regiment to Washington.

On the 19th of April, Col. Samuel C. Lawrence of the Fifth Regiment was ordered to report for active duty, which order was obeyed with dispatch.

On the 20th of April, Major Asa F. Cook was instructed to have his company of Light Artillery in readiness to proceed with Col. Lawrence's command.

The Third Battalion of Rifles, under command of Major Charles Devens, of Worcester, was also detailed at this time for service, and Capt. Albert Dodd's company, recently formed in Boston, was sent by steamer, May 1, to join the battalion.

Three Months' Volunteers.

The pressing emergency of the National Government for aid was fully appreciated by Massachusetts on the 15th of April, and so alive was she to the impending danger, that the first thought was to furnish the needed assistance without "standing upon the order of her going."

Companies without full ranks were speedily filled by volunteers, who crowded the armories anxious to go; and incomplete regiments were strengthened by detailing from other regiments such companies as were prepared to leave at such short notice. An hour then seemed to comprise an age, and the ordinary military orders of movement common to inspection and review in peaceful times, could not be as strictly observed, and hence the most available troops were forwarded without regard to regular numbers, and regiments left behind were immediately prepared and anxious to follow; but as the requisite number of three months' volunteers were soon furnished, the regiments next following were enlisted to serve for three years in the U. S. service.

A dispatch, received from Washington April 16th, stated that Massachusetts was to furnish immediately four regiments, making one brigade, with one Brigadier General.

Brig. Gen. Benj. F. Butler, Third Brigade, Second Division, M. V. M., was ordered on the 17th to take command of the troops. On the 18th he was ordered to proceed with the 8th Regiment to Washington; and May 20th, 1861, he was promoted for his gallant conduct to be a Major General in the U. S. Army. His staff, when acting as Brigadier General, consisted of Brigade Major, Wm. H. Clemence, of Lowell; Aide-de-Camp, Capt. Samuel E. Converse, of Lowell; Engineer, Capt. Peter Haggerty, of Lowell; Brig. Quartermaster, Capt. Thos. J. Porter, of Woburn.

On the 30th of May, Brigadier General Ebenezer W. Peirce, of Freetown, 2d Brigade, 1st Division M. V. M., was detailed for active duty in place of Brigadier General Butler, who, as stated above, had been promoted, and he proceeded at once to Fortress Monroe. His staff at the time he left consisted of *Brigade Major and Inspector*, Richard A. Peirce, of New Bedford; *Aide-de-Camp*, Captain Silas P. Richmond, of Freetown; *Quartermaster*, Capt. Wm. C. Lovering, of Taunton; *Engineer*, Capt. Augustus Chamberlin, of Brookline. The disastrous affair at Big Bethel has brought upon this brave and patriotic officer much obloquy, which was, doubtless, cruelly unjust.

Soon after this battle, Gen. Peirce returned to Massachusetts and raised two companies for the volunteer service, and on the 16th of December, 1861, was commissioned Col. of the 29th Regiment Massachusetts Volunteers.

In the Adjutant-General's report he says :

"It would far exceed the limits of this report to recount in detail the brave acts of " "our three months' troops during their term of service. I have given only a bare out- " "line. It is sufficient, perhaps, to say that they were the first to respond to the call " "of the President, the first to march through Baltimore to the defence of the capital, " "the first to shed their blood for the maintenance of our government, the first to open " "the new route to Washington by way of Annapolis, the first to land on the soil of " "Virginia, and hold possession of the most important fortress in the Union, the first to " "make the voyage of the Potomac and approach the Federal city by water, as they " "had been the first to reach it by land. They upheld the good name of the State " "during their entire term of service, as well by their good conduct and gentlemanly " "bearing, as by their courage and devotion to duty in the hour of peril. They proved " "the sterling worth of our volunteer militia. Their record is one which will ever " "redound to the honor of Massachusetts, and will be prized among her richest historic " "treasures. These men have added new splendor to our Revolutionary annals, and " "the brave sons who were shot down in the streets of Baltimore on the 19th of April, " "have rendered doubly sacred the day when the greensward of Lexington Common " "was drenched with the blood of their fathers."

In the following statement in regard to the troops from Massachusetts, the three months' Regiments are given first.

THREE MONTHS' VOLUNTEERS.

Third Regiment. Infantry.

Hastening to comply with orders received but a few hours before, the companies composing this regiment mustered in Boston, April 16th, 1861. The citizens welcomed them, and they went into quarters in the hall over the Old Colony depot. At 6, P. M., the 17th, they marched to the State House to receive equipments, and then to the steamer S. R. Spaulding. Throngs of citizens cheered them as they passed through the streets, and from Central Wharf salutes of cannon and small arms were fired. General Butler visited them, and was enthusiastically received. The hearty good-by was said at 7, P. M., when the steamer dropped off into the stream, where she remained until 11.30, A. M., of the 18th, when she sailed; bearing away a noble band, many of whom were the descendants of the Pilgrims who settled the Old Colony, and established the principles of an elevated civilization, which their sons were now going forth to maintain at the sacrifice, if need be, of their lives. "Nine miles at sea" the sealed orders were opened, and Fortress Monroe was found to be their destination. April 19th, the anniversary of the battle of Lexington, they were assembled on deck, the stars and stripes and regimental colors were saluted and thrown to the breeze, and the day duly commemorated. Arrived at Fortress Monroe at 11, A. M., April 20th, making the passage in 47½ hours from Boston. Regiment landed, stacked arms, and slept in the sun a few hours, on the parade ground. Had a very slight luncheon, and were ordered on board the U. S. Gunboat "Pawnee" at about 4, P. M., on the same day. "Pawnee" sailed about 5½, P. M., for Gosport Navy Yard, passing the obstructions in the channel, battery at Sewall's Point of seven guns, and Forts "Norfolk" and "Nelson," all in possession of the rebels, without molestation. Arrived at the Yard at 9, P. M., very narrowly escaping being fired upon by the entire broadside of the "Pennsylvania" and "Cumberland," having been mistaken for enemies.

Found the "Merrimac," "Germantown," and "Plymouth" already scuttled, and sinking. Whole force ordered ashore, and endeavored to save the vessels, but found it impossible, they were so far sunken. Had we been *five hours* earlier, the Merrimac would now have been in our Navy. All hands engaged in burning and destroying! Companies "A" and "B" held as a reserve under arms, to repel any attack. Twenty men detailed from Co. B to mine Dry-Dock.

Arrived back at the Fort at 6, A. M., Sunday, 21st, very tired and hungry, having been without food 18 hours. Short rations, hard fare, and hard work for the first three weeks.

May 6th, a terrific tempest and gale. No shelter for the men who were on guard, and so dark the sentries could not walk their beat. Not a murmur from a man.

May 9th, two companies of three years men, one under Captain J. K. Tyler, of Boston, and the other under Captain W. D. Chamberlain, of Lynn, left Boston for Fortress Monroe; also, May 18th, a three years company from Sandwich, under Capt. Charles Chipman, and another from Plymouth, under Captain Samuel H. Doten, were sent forward, and all four were temporarily attached to this regiment.

May 13th, picket at the bridge, one-fourth mile from the Fort, driven in. Bridge held to-day by two companies and a field piece. Secession picket guard ordered off from Hampton end of bridge, and withdrawn from our sight for the first time since occupying the Fort.

May 24th, Companies "B," of Plymouth, and "M," Captain Tyler, of Boston, sent out under command of Captain C. C. Doten, to protect General Butler in reconnaissance. Two rebels, in running away from us, taken by a small party on the other road.

May 27th, Massachusetts 4th, Vermont 1st, and a New York (German) regiment left Fortress, and commenced an entrenched camp at "Newport News," (*this was the first occupation of that point*). Regiment left off their ragged clothing to-day, for a light flannel uniform provided by the State of Massachusetts.

June 8th, Company B, of Plymouth, and C, of Cambridge, under command of Capt. C. C. Doten, were detailed for guard over the New York "Naval Brigade," which was in a disorganized condition; had quite a serious difficulty with "Brigade." Had to call out the entire guard with loaded muskets, and came very near firing upon them before the disturbance was quieted.

June 17th, Companies B and C were relieved from guard over "Brigade" by Company "E," of Plymouth.

July 1st, Regiment ordered to occupy Hampton village. Reached Hampton about 12, M., some of the troops taking Dr. G. Temple's house as quarters. An alarm from the advance guard during the afternoon; Company B sent out on Fox Hill road to meet the enemy. None to be found. Companies "A," "B," and "C" detailed for the main and picket guard this night; an attack hourly expected, but all remained quiet.

July 5th, whole garrison at Hampton marched to Camp Hamilton for review by Sec'y Cameron and Gen. Butler. Companies "L," "B," and "E," stationed at the picket, with Howitzer Battery, all night. Attack momentarily expected.

July 7, Company B went out about four miles, scouting. Thermometer 115° — an exhausting day.

July 8th, party at work in the trenches. Thermometer 114°.

July 9th, Companies "L," "B," and "C," out scouting all night.

July 14th, private Simeon Barrows, of Company E, of Plymouth, shot and beaten, but not killed, a few hundred yards outside No. 1 picket, while berrying.

July 16th, marched to Fortress Monroe, and started for Boston, on board steamer "Cambridge." A fine, pleasant passage.

July 19th, arrived and anchored off Long Wharf, Boston. Sent to Long Island, in Boston Harbor, to encamp.

July 22d, regiment mustered out of U. S. service to-day.

July 23d, regiment landed in the city, and, after a handsome reception by the citizens, were dismissed at noon on the Common.

At the Big Bethel fight, the 3d regiment was sent for as a reinforcement, but as the Fortress would have been left with but a small garrison, it was deemed prudent not to let them go.

Every soldier and officer of the three months companies of the 3d regiment returned — none having even been wounded, excepting two or three slightly by accident.

Company B (Standish Guards), Plymouth.—3d Reg.

A company bearing this name, and commanded by Capt. Coomer Weston, was organized in 1818, and made its first parade December 22d of that year. In 1851 it was re-organized under the same name and charter. At 3 A. M., April 16, 1861, Capt. Doten received his orders by a special courier from New Bedford, the superintendent of Fairhaven Branch R. R., Horace Scott, Esq., having run a special train from New Bedford to Tremont during the darkness and storm, solely for the purpose of affording him speedy transportation. At 9½ o'clock that morning, after an address by the Hon. Robert B. Hall, the company left Plymouth, being escorted to the depot by throngs of citizens. They arrived in Boston at noon, and were quartered at the Old Colony Depot, where other members joined them in the afternoon. A fund of nearly \$600 was contributed by Judge Thos. Russell, Hon. Geo. A. Shaw, D. N. Spooner, and other Old Colony residents in Boston, and Hon. Wm. T. Davis and others of Plymouth, and appropriated for the benefit of the Company previous to their departure from Boston. July 23, the Company returned to Plymouth, and were warmly received by their fellow-citizens. August 19, they were paid off by Major R. G. Usher, U. S. paymaster; and a massive gold medal, in richly chased silver setting, was presented to the Company by Hon. R. B. Hall, on which was inscribed,— "In commemoration of the patriotic services of the Standish Guards, Company B, 3d Regiment M. V. M." On the reverse—"Navy Yard, Gosport, Fortress Monroe, 1861."

Company C (Cambridge City Guards), Cambridge.—3d Reg.

Co. C was the first company raised for the war in Massachusetts. It was composed principally of members of the Company of Wide Awakes in Cambridgeport. At a meeting in Cambridge, in November, 1860, immediately after the Presidential election, Capt. Richardson made a speech in which he predicted war with the South as the result of the election, and pledged himself to volunteer; and called upon the Wide Awakes to back their ballots with their bayonets when the time came to do so. For this purpose the company was formed in January, 1861, and tendered to the Governor, who promised and gave them the earliest opportunity to go to the war.

They received their orders at 10½ o'clock in the evening of the 16th April, and reported themselves at the State House early next morn.,—where the officers were chosen and commissioned; they received their arms and equipments, joined the Third Regiment on the same day, and left for Fortress Monroe, where they arrived on the 20th April.

Although, during the three months service there, they had no opportunity to distinguish themselves in battle, they received high encomiums from the Commander of the Fortress, Col. Dimick, for the zeal, activity and cheerfulness with which they performed all their duties; duties which are particularly irksome to soldiers, such as mounting guns and putting the Fortress in a state of defence. They also, during the last month of their service, occupied the town of Hampton in Virginia—the outposts of our army, and the nearest to the enemy. Here, also, they performed their duty, not only to the satisfaction of their officers, but so as to secure the respect of the inhabitants.

Returning to Cambridge, July 23, they met with a hearty welcome. Members of the city government, military, firemen, and citizens escorted them to the City Hall, where they were addressed by Mayor Green and others, and a collation furnished them. Nearly all of them soon after re-enlisted in different companies.

The reception was one which must have afforded peculiar gratification to the gallant men, in whose honor almost the entire population turned out.

The four following companies of three years' men arriving at Fortress Monroe in May, and temporarily attached to the Third Regiment, were left at Fortress Monroe when the term of service of the three months' companies expired, and were afterwards incorporated in the Twenty-ninth Regiment as Companies B, D, E, I; and the rolls of these companies are given in connection with that regiment.

Fourth Regiment. Infantry.

(Three Months' Volunteers.)

The sketch prepared by the Adjutant of the regiment, Henry Walker, Esq., of Quincy.

Hardly had the echoes of the guns of Sumter died away, when the proclamation of the President, calling for volunteers, sounded through the North, and met a cordial, earnest response from the governments of the loyal States. Among the first regiments called into the field was the Fourth Massachusetts, composed of companies belonging to various towns along the Old Colony shore. The order for its appearance on Boston Common, at noon of Tuesday, April 16th, reached the hands of Col. Abner B. Packard late on the afternoon of the 15th. He immediately issued his orders, and dispatched them by a special messenger to the several companies under his command. The farthest point to be reached by the messenger was Taunton, where he arrived at two o'clock, Tuesday morning, amid a driving storm of rain. Within twelve hours every company had reported itself at Faneuil Hall, which had been made the place of rendezvous instead of the Common, on account of the storm. Later in the afternoon, in accordance with a telegram from Washington, the Sixth Regiment was ordered to proceed forthwith to Fortress Monroe, while it was understood that the remaining regiments — the Third, Fourth, and Eighth — would remain a day or two longer. On Wednesday, the 17th, however, the order of the preceding day was changed, and the Fourth Regiment

was notified to be in readiness, at three o'clock the same afternoon, to march. With the exception of muskets and cartridge-boxes, and the old State uniform, the men were almost wholly unprovided with arms and equipments. Most of them had expected to be able to send or go to their homes again before leaving. They were, however, soon fitted out with overcoats and blankets, which the provident foresight of Governor Andrew had provided,—knapsacks and haversacks, the latter of which were stored with rations for three days; the old guns were exchanged for new Springfield rifled muskets; and at three P. M. the regiment stood in Merchants' Row, four hundred and sixty-two men all told. It proceeded, amid the most intense enthusiasm of the crowds which thronged the streets, to the State House, where, after the companies had received further supplies of clothing and equipments of various kinds, they were addressed by Governor Andrew, who said: "It gives me unspeakable pleasure to witness this array from the good Old Colony. You have come from the shores of the sounding sea, where lie the ashes of Pilgrims, and you are bound on a high and noble pilgrimage for liberty, for the Union and Constitution of your country. Soldiers of the Old Bay State, sons of sires who never disgraced their flag in civil life or on the tented field, I thank you from the bottom of my heart for this noble response to the call of your State and your country. You cannot wait for words. I bid you God-speed and an affectionate farewell." Colonel Packard replied in brief and fitting terms, and the regiment took up its line of march for the Old Colony depot. The march through the city was a perfect ovation. The intense, earnest excitement of the time showed itself in cheers, in many a hearty God-speed, and in many a moistened eye. Quickly embarking on board a train in readiness to receive it, the regiment, at ten P. M., marched on board the steamer State of Maine, at Fall River. All along the route the depots were thronged with anxious crowds, whose cheers and salvos of artillery testified their sympathy and good wishes. Owing to the boat being crowded and badly trimmed, it did not reach New York until five o'clock, Thursday afternoon. Stopping only to coal and have her ballast rearranged, she started at four o'clock, Friday morning, for Fortress Monroe. While at New York, the officers of the regiment, by invitation, took supper at the Astor House. Not knowing who were in possession of Fortress Monroe, and expecting that he might be attacked by rebel steamers, Colonel Packard ordered a portion of the men to be supplied with ball cartridges, and the six-pounder, the only piece of artillery on board, to be made ready for action. At daybreak, April 20th, the long, low line of the walls of the fort were visible in the distance. Anxiously the regiment watched, as the boat lay off and on, until at sunrise they saw the old flag unfolding from the flag-staff. The men were quickly landed, and, amid the cheers of the little garrison, marched into the fort. They were warmly welcomed, for those within, from keeping watch and ward for many a day, were well-nigh exhausted. Hardly was the regiment well in quarters before their labors commenced. The fort was found to be almost unarmed on the land side, and illy supplied with material of war. For several weeks, the men were employed mounting heavy guns, unloading vessels, storing provisions, keeping guard, etc. Near the middle of May, General Butler arrived and took command of the Department of Virginia, and he having determined to occupy Newport News, a point of land commanding James River, on the 27th of May, the Fourth Regiment, in conjunction with a New York regiment under Colonel Bendix, and a Vermont regiment under Colonel, now General Phelps, took possession of that point, and proceeded to form an entrenched camp. The fortifications, near a half a mile in length, were laid out by Captain Stewart, U. S. A., and were formed as follows:—A palisade was made of logs cut and brought in from the adjacent forest, against which the earth was thrown up on the outside, forming a rampart twelve feet in width at the base, six feet at the summit, and six feet in height. In front was a ditch of similar dimensions. Along the line were mounted six pieces of artillery, while on the bluff was a battery of six heavy guns, including one rifled twenty-pounder for the Sawyer projectiles. One or more vessels-of-war always laid off the camp in a position to sweep the beach in either direction. Little occurred while the regiment was at Newport News to disturb the routine of camp life. Working at the entrenchments, doing guard duty, drill and scouting went on regularly and quietly. On the 9th day of June, however, five companies were detailed, with a portion of the Vermont and New York regiments, to make up a detachment, to join one from Hampton, to start at one o'clock the next morning, to attack Big Bethel, a position held by the enemy, about twelve miles from Newport News. With the detachment went the ever-lamented Lieutenant Greble, in charge of two pieces of artillery. Of the battle of Big Bethel it is needless to go into details. Its unfortunate result was owing to a variety of causes; but if the other troops engaged had done their duty as well, and gone as far, as those from Massachusetts and Vermont, the name of Big Bethel would not have headed a long list of Federal repulses. The Fourth Regiment remained at Newport News until the third day of July, when, in accordance to orders from General Butler, it moved to the village of Hampton, which it occupied, with the Third Massachusetts Regiment, during the remainder of its term of service. On its arrival there it found the quaint old town deserted. Hardly a score of its former white inhabitants remained, although many negroes, especially old and very young ones, were still there. The troops had quarters assigned them in the various houses, and there remained undisturbed until Wednesday, July 11th, when they marched over to Fortress Monroe, preparatory to embarking for home. There their Springfield muskets were exchanged for old altered flint-lock ones. The men were addressed by General Butler, and when on board the boat by Colonel Dimmick, the commandant of the fort. The latter said, "I never heard of complaints against Mas-

sachusetts men: next to regulars, let me command Massachusetts volunteers." At three P. M. of the 15th, the regiment embarked on board the steamer S. R. Spaulding, and after a pleasant passage of about fifty-six hours entered Boston Harbor. Owing to circumstances, it was deemed expedient to keep the regiment together until it could be mustered out. It landed, therefore, on Long Island, where it found the Third Regiment already encamped, and there remained until Tuesday, the 22d, when the two regiments struck their tents, and shortly after landed at Long Wharf, from whence they marched to the Common. The reception, somewhat dampened by the news of the battle of Bull Run, was yet most enthusiastic. Arriving on the Common, an order from Governor Andrew was read, thanking the troops for their services, and then the several companies were dismissed to their respective homes, where in most cases great preparations had been made to receive them. They had done their duty. First to leave Massachusetts at their country's call, they first of all stood on Virginian soil, ready to battle for the old flag. They never faltered when duty called them, and they merited and received the thanks of a grateful people. Very many of the members of the Fourth Regiment are to be found in the various regiments now in the field, where, when the time comes, they will nobly uphold the honor that regiment justly won of being the first, in their country's darkest hour, to leave their homes in her defence.

Organized November, 1855. Its first captain was Hiram C. Alden, Esq., who held the office until July, 1860. April 15, at 9 o'clock, P. M., orders were sent to the clerk of this company to report in Boston at 9 o'clock the next morning. The company, at this time, not having any commissioned officers, Sergt. Hiram F. Wales labored all that night to notify the company, so as to have them respond promptly to their country's call. The general indifference, in regard to military organizations, which has existed throughout the State for some time previous to this sudden call, was also fully shared by the inhabitants of this town. But when the sound went forth that our noble flag had been fired upon, this company, with the others, received a new impulse, and was ready the next morning to move onward. At $\frac{1}{2}$ before 9 o'clock on the morning of April 16, they were escorted to the depot by a band of music, with a large concourse of citizens, and arrived in Boston at 40 minutes past 9 o'clock, when they immediately marched to Faneuil Hall. This was one of the first companies which arrived in Boston on the morning of April 16, and, when the fact that they had no officers to the company is taken into consideration, none will hesitate to give the privates great credit. After their arrival in Boston, an election of officers was held. Upon the return of the company in July, they were received at the depot by the Relief, Independent, and Fire King Engine Companies and others, and escorted through the principal street to Stetson Hall, where they partook of a dinner, provided at the expense of the town. During the absence of the company, the town provided for the families of the soldiers, and paid the unmarried six dollars a month while away.

Company E (*Light Infantry*), South Abington.—4th Reg.

Organized in 1787. It received its charter under the name of the Abington Artillery, Co. A, in the 4th Regiment of Artillery. In 1852, this regiment was disbanded, and the company was annexed to the 2d Battalion of Infantry, and known as Company E, of the 4th Regiment of Infantry. It held that position on receiving orders to assist in putting down the rebellion of 1861. At 8 o'clock, on the evening of April 15, orders were received to report at Boston the next morning. Messengers were dispatched at once, and, during the night, preparations were made for their departure. At 7 o'clock the next morning, the company was ready to march. The citizens turned out in great numbers to escort them to the depot, where they took cars for Boston, and quartered at Faneuil Hall. They left the next day for Fortress Monroe. Before leaving South Abington, a subscription was raised, and two hundred and twenty-seven dollars presented to the company. On returning to Abington, July 23, they were met and addressed by prominent citizens, and, the next day, their fellow-townsmen gave them a grand reception. Wm. L. Reed, Esq., made the welcome speech, which was replied to by Capt. Allen. Addresses, suitable for the occasion, were then made by Rev. H. L. Edwards, Rev. Mr. Clark, and Rev. H. D. Walker, of South Abington; also by Hon. Mr. Harris, of East Bridgewater; which were replied to by Sergeant Peterson, of Co. E. At the close of which, they partook of a collation which had been provided by the citizens.

Company F (*Warren Light Guards*), Foxboro'.—4th Reg.

Company F, 4th Regt. M. V. M., was organized under an act of the General Court, Jan. 22, 1776, in which it was provided that "each Brigadier-General of the Colony should provide, at the expense of the same, two good Field Pieces, and cause a company of Mattresses to be enlisted for each Field Piece," &c. All the other companies organized under this act are disbanded, and Co. F holds the oldest charter in the State granted upon petition. In 1854, the designation of the company was changed from Artillery to Light Infantry, and in 1856 its location was changed from Norton to Foxboro'. The old charter still remains, and it is to be hoped that, as a memento of Revolutionary history, it will be supported by a full and prosperous company. On June 16, 1857, the company met to fill vacancies, and complete their organization in this town, by selecting a name for it, and

they adopted the name of "WARREN LIGHT GUARDS." On Monday evening, April 16, 1861, the captain received orders to report himself and command at Boston forthwith, and the next day, at 11 o'clock, they left Foxboro' for Boston; and, on leaving their armory, they were greeted with cheers from the assembled people. They were stationed at Fort Monroe and Newport News, and were engaged in the Great Bethel fight. They returned home in July, after having done their duty, all safe and well. Mr. E. P. Carpenter, of this town, who had been untiring in his efforts to have them want for nothing that would add to their comfort while at the seat of war, and who had been very liberal in putting his hands in his purse for their benefit, called a meeting of the citizens to make arrangements to receive them, and he was chosen to address the company on its return to this town, which he did with honor to himself and all concerned. The company was received at the depot, and escorted to the Centre by a procession, — the past members of the company, and an independent rifle company, under the command of Mr. E. P. Carpenter. The procession was headed by Carmi Richmond, Esq., as marshal of the day. On arriving at the Centre, the citizens had assembled on the right and left of the main street, through which the procession passed, amidst the ringing of bells and the cheers of the people, to the spacious Common, where Mr. E. P. Carpenter made the welcome address, which was briefly responded to by Capt. Shepard. The exercises closed by all joining in singing an original hymn, written for the occasion, to the tune of Auld Lang Syne.

Company I (Lincoln Light Infantry), Hingham.—4th Reg.

Named in honor of Major-General Benjamin Lincoln. To the kindness of the town clerk of Hingham, we are indebted for the following facts. On the 15th of April, at 8 o'clock, P.M., orders were received by the captain to report his company in Boston the next day, but, for some reason, the members were not notified until the afternoon of the 16th, in three hours from which time, the members were assembled and ready for duty. There being no means of conveyance to Boston at that hour, their departure was delayed until the next day, when they left the town. While at their armory, and just before starting, the Rev. Calvin Lincoln offered an impressive prayer. The company, numbering forty-two men, under the command of Lieut. Luther Stephenson, Jr. (the captain having resigned), took up their line of march for the cars. The streets were lined with people, who cheered them to the noble work; the church bells pealed forth their loud sound; school children met them with a patriotic song, and presented each member with a wreath, and addresses were made by Col. Charles W. Seymour, Rev. E. P. Dyer, James S. Lewis, Esq., and a parting prayer was offered by the venerable Rev. Joseph Richardson. On the 18th day of May, thirty-seven men were recruited in Hingham in a few hours, and sent to Fortress Monroe to fill up the company to the State standard. The company, with the regiment, arrived at Long Island, in Boston Harbor, July 19, where they remained till the 22d, when they were discharged with the regiment, and started for home the next day, accompanied by a band of music and a detachment from the Second Battalion of Infantry, in their unique Zouave uniform. Upon their arrival at Hingham, they were met by the citizens, and a hearty reception given them. A procession was formed, under the direction of Capt. John C. White, as chief marshal, consisting of the military, firemen, calvacade, and citizens generally, which marched through the streets to the square. They were here addressed by Henry E. Hersey, Esq., and prayer offered by Rev. C. Lincoln. They then proceeded to the Town Hall, where an excellent collation had been provided. Every member returned home safely. Many instances of true patriotism were displayed on the part of the people. A man living in a small house (a young bachelor) by himself, hearing of the attack upon Sumter, left his work, house, and in fact all he possessed in the world, and offered himself as a volunteer. Another, a married man, a box-maker, standing at his work, hearing the drums beating, said,—"I can't stand this any longer, wife; I'm off for the war; no more boxes to be made by me until this matter is settled;" threw down his apron, bade his family adieu, and started; he was a volunteer. Another, a member of the company, calling to see his friends, and bid them adieu, was offered, by an aunt, \$150 would he but stay at home, but money was no temptation, although he needed it as much as any man who left this town. His answer was,—"No, aunt, I'm a member of the Lincoln Light Infantry; they have been called by the Governor to aid in defending our country; where they go, I go."

Fifth Regiment. Infantry.

(Three Months' Volunteers.)

The early pages in the history of the rebellion of 1860 will show, amidst the darkest and most revolting instances of treason and national corruption, the most glowing examples of patriotism, and the sublimest heroism. For when the call of the government for 75,000 men was sounded over the land, the uprising of the people in response was so general and so sudden, that it stands as the most signal instance of the kind in all history. Among the few Massachusetts regiments who had the honor to be first in this movement, the Fifth is conspicuous. From the very soil whereon the Revolution saw its first and most glorious battles, and educated in and inspired with that love of freedom which was then so dearly bought, its members, of every vocation, cultivated and intelligent, and bred in the peaceful arts which have prospered New England uninterruptedly for upwards of half a century, rushed to arms in the support of their country's honor, and in the suppression of a wicked rebellion. The national call was for three months; but, as the record shows, when the three months expired (July 19), the regiment found itself on the soil of Virginia, before the enemy, and at a time when its services, enhanced tenfold by its discipline and acquaintance with the "situation," were invaluable to the country. In this critical hour there was no voice for returning home. Steadily they looked the enemy in the face, and it is to their honor that their most trying ordeal, their hard-fought battle, was a free offering upon the altar of their country. The men of Concord and Bunker Hill had struck a new blow to preserve the Union of their fathers, and it remains to place their deeds side by side with those which have come down from the days of the Revolution.

At a meeting held on the 15th of April, it was voted to tender the services of the regiment to the Commander-in-chief, and on the 17th the regiment was ordered to hold itself in readiness for duty. On the 19th orders were issued to report for duty, and the following companies were attached to the Fifth Regiment:—Company H, of the First Regiment, and Companies B, E, G, and H, of the Seventh Regiment. The order to meet in Boston was promptly responded to, and the troops began to arrive at Faneuil Hall as early as half past two o'clock in the afternoon of the same day (19th). The enthusiasm on the arrival of each company, attended by citizens from their native towns, was intense, and during the entire day and night of Saturday, the 20th, hundreds of persons were collected about the headquarters at Faneuil Hall. The preparations incident to equipping a regiment, called together in a few hours, were very great, yet they were completed with the utmost order, and, at four o'clock on the morn-

ing of Sunday, the 21st, breakfast was served, and preparation made for immediate departure. Daylight was streaming through the windows of the hall as the troops took up the line of march. After regimental line had been formed on South Market Street, at five o'clock, the troops marched to the Worcester Railway Station. The early hour of this quiet Sabbath morning did not restrain the enthusiasm of the citizens along the route, who, from their windows and from the street, gave many hearty cheers and many God-speeds as the regiment passed by. At a point where the troops crossed Washington Street, a detachment from the Boston Cadets was drawn up at present-arms. A large crowd was in waiting at the railway station, and the last interchanges of affection and last farewells were here given to many who had been called from their homes at an hour's notice. Maj. Cook's Battery of Light Artillery had been ordered to join Colonel Lawrence's command, and were already on the train. It was nearly seven o'clock when the long train left the station. Of the material of this regiment, the Boston Daily Advertiser, of April 22, says:—

"The Fifth Regiment is composed mainly of companies belonging in the vicinity of Boston, and are well known for their bravery and nobleness of character. Commanded by Colonel Lawrence, an experienced officer and noble-hearted man, this regiment will shed glory on the old Commonwealth, whose honor she is so ready to sustain. There is that peculiarly connected with this regiment which has been deeply impressed on the minds not only of the citizens, who have watched their movements so anxiously, but upon the minds of far-sighted and skilful officers. It is the fact that they are going to war, and are prepared accordingly. Following the example of their unassuming commander, the companies are arrayed in serviceable uniforms, fatigue caps, and freed from all the paraphernalia which are but the pride, pomp, and circumstance of war. In view of the stern reality of their mission, we can see only the brave hearts and noble souls of this gallant regiment."

As the cars passed rapidly through the centre of the old Bay State on this, the Sabbath day, its progress was viewed with favor by all, and no tithing-man attempted to arrest them. On the contrary, a member of the regiment writes:—

"We arrived in Springfield at one P. M., on the 21st, in the best of spirits. Our journey was a complete ovation. You would not have thought it could have been the Sabbath, to see the people in the different places we passed assembled at the depots, to hear the roaring of cannon, the ringing of bells, the bands of music, the cheering, &c. Old men grasped us in their arms, as we halted for a brief time at the railroad stations, while their streaming eyes and fervent 'God bless you,' told of the intensity of their feelings. At Springfield, the people completely overwhelmed the regiment with acts of kindness. They spread for them a substantial and bountiful repast; and when the troops left for Hartford, scenes occurred which will never be erased from the memory of those witnessing them. One little personal incident I cannot help mentioning: A charming young lady asked for my address, tied the tri-color in my button, and told me to wear it even unto death, if need be, which you know I will do."

At Worcester, as well as at Springfield, the people welcomed the troops with unbounded enthusiasm. At Meriden, Connecticut, where they arrived at three o'clock, the people had dispensed with the church services for the afternoon, and had busied themselves in preparing food for the troops—a marked evidence of their interest in, and their appreciation of, the prompt response of the regiment to the country's call. At New Haven, Bridgeport, and other places along the route, the ovations were of the most enthusiastic kind. The regiment arrived in New York at eight o'clock that evening, and was well entertained at the different hotels. Here Adjutant Thomas O. Barri, then a resident of New York, but formerly of Cambridge, assumed his duties. Late in the evening the troops embarked: four companies under Major Keyes, and Major Devens' Battalion of Rifles, on the steamer Ariel, and six companies under Col. Lawrence, with Major Cook's Battery, on the De Soto, and at 3 o'clock on the morning of the 22d started for Fortress Monroe, where they arrived at noon on the 23d, and thence proceeded that night to Annapolis. On the passage up the Chesapeake, the men slept on their arms, an attack from the shore being apprehended. Arrived at Annapolis early on the following morning, and disembarked late in the afternoon of the 24th, amidst a severe rain-storm. There were in port on their arrival several large steamers filled with troops, and a number of United States vessels, making a truly warlike appearance.

On the next day, the 25th, orders having been received to proceed to Washington, the regiment marched to the Annapolis Railway Station to take cars for Washington. The train could only accommodate four companies, and the remaining six companies, under command of Lieutenant Colonel Greene, followed on foot. From a letter written at this time we make the following extract:—

"We expected every moment to be pitched down some embankment; but we ran very slowly, and, it being moonlight, could see the road very well. We had to stop and repair the track several times; but finally arrived at the junction in safety. We got out, being then twenty-two miles from Washington, and started on the march over the Washington Branch of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad. We marched from ten to twelve miles, and sat down to take breakfast. While eating breakfast, a messenger came to our colonel, and told him that about one hundred mounted riflemen were going to attack us about five miles from where we were. We could see men on horseback in the woods reconnoitering, but should not have thought anything about it if we had not got this information. We marched six miles, and halted to rest. The sun was very hot, and our burdens heavy. The men threw themselves down, and no sooner were on their backs than they were asleep. Some would actually go to sleep while eating their lunch."

During the entire march it was evident that the inhabitants regarded the troops with disfavor. Mounted horsemen were often seen; at one time, about fifty together; but, being deceived as to the number of troops on the way, they deemed it best to offer no violence. By the arrival of the train, which had made but slow progress in consequence of damage to the road, the troops were conveyed to Washington, which was but a short distance, where they arrived about noon on the 26th of April. The remaining six companies arrived the next morning at eight o'clock, and joined the regiment, having had to march from Annapolis, about twenty miles, to the junction, and then proceed by cars to Washington. This march was necessitated by the destruction of a portion of the railroad track by the rebels, immediately after the first part of the regiment had passed over it, and upon the return of the locomotive for the remainder of the troops, it was thrown from the track and rendered unserviceable.

On their arrival in Washington, the regiment was immediately quartered in the Treasury Building. The following is a diary of events, connected with this regiment, from that period:—

April 29. The baggage arrived. The President visited the regiment during the day.

May 1st. Marched to Jackson Square and were mustered into the United States service, and then passed in review before the President. While in the Treasury Building the companies were re-lettered.

24th. For several weeks the mornings have been devoted to squad and company drills and target practice, and the afternoons to regimental drills conducted by Col. Lawrence and Lieut. Col. Greene, which soon brought the regiment to such a state of discipline as to win the highest encomiums on all sides.

25th. During the funeral services of Col. Ellsworth in Washington, it was rumored that an attack was expected in the direction of Alexandria, and at ten o'clock in the forenoon, the regiment was ordered by Gen. Mansfield to march at once in "fighting rig" across Long Bridge to repel the enemy who were reported to be approaching. The enthusiasm of the men was intense; all the men, including several who were excused from duty for the day by the surgeon's certificate, eagerly grasped their muskets, and in less than fifteen minutes the regiment, under command of Maj. Keyes, (Lieut. Col. Greene being absent in Boston on leave), was on the way at double-quick to meet the rebels. Gen. Mansfield highly complimented the regiment for its despatch, declaring that he had "never witnessed a similar order more speedily and promptly executed." Col. Lawrence, who, under orders, was attending the funeral ceremonies, as pall-bearer, joined his regiment without delay. After an hour's detention on the Virginia side, the colonel received orders to return, with directions to pack up and march for Alexandria, that night. At half-past ten o'clock that evening the regiment filed out of the Treasury Building and proceeded toward Alexandria. While on Long Bridge, a most pleasing episode occurred. When it was discovered that the regiment had only a State color, not having yet received their national ensign, several Massachusetts gentlemen in Washington procured a handsome flag, and following the regiment overtook it midway on Long Bridge. The regiment halted, and Col. Lawrence, having advanced toward the carriage, was surprised by the presentation of the beautiful ensign. After a happy acknowledgment of the gift, the regiment again moved forward, and encamped that night near the city.

26th. The regiment moved back about half a mile to grounds occupied in Revolutionary times by Gen. Washington, and where some of the earthworks are yet to be seen. A detachment from the several companies, left at Washington, to take charge of the remaining baggage, provisions, &c., arrived.

28th. The camp was named "Camp Andrew," in honor of His Excellency the Governor of Massachusetts. At this time, this regiment, together with the New York Fire Zouaves and the Michigan First, were engaged in building Fort Ellsworth, on Shuter's Hill. Three hundred men were detailed each day from the Fifth, for three hours' work on the fort. The utmost exertions were made for the speedy completion of the fortifications, and the share of the hard labor on the fort borne by this regiment will be a worthy memorial of their patriotic endeavors. The remainder of the regiment were employed on guard and in camp duty.

29th. Orders were received to be ready to march at a moment's warning.

June 3d. Camp was struck, and a new camp pitched one-quarter of a mile from Fort Ellsworth, named "Camp Massachusetts." Arrived there at six, p. m.

6th. For a few days, the heavy rains caused great inconvenience to the troops. Guards were detailed for different points in and about Alexandria, and frequent alarms occurred. A police force was detailed for patrol duty at Alexandria, under command of Lieut. Shepard, who was appointed Provost Marshal. After the removal to Camp Massachusetts, Col. Lawrence and Lieut. Col. Greene received from Elias Howe, Jr., Esq., of New York, formerly of Cambridge, two stallions fully equipped, which were placed at their service during the campaign. This generous gift, from a citizen of New York to Massachusetts officers, speaks nobly for the patriotic liberality of Mr. Howe.

14th. President Lincoln and Secretaries Chase and Cameron visited Camp Massachusetts. The former expressed his surprise and admiration at the rapidity with which the regimental line was formed. A letter under date of June 15, says:—

"We have had two quite exciting days. Yesterday President Lincoln and Secretaries Cameron and Chase honored Camp Massachusetts with their presence, and the President reviewed the regiment. He expressed himself highly gratified with the splendid appearance and drill of the Fifth, and said Massachusetts might well be proud of it

and its efficient commander. And, by the way, in speaking of Col. Lawrence as a drill officer, one of our best colonels in the Regular Army, after witnessing his drill yesterday, declared it the most perfect and effective drill he had seen in the Volunteer Militia, with particular reference to the double-quick movements and charge of column in mass.

"To-day, the Alexandria Brigade, with the Massachusetts Fifth on the right, paraded through the city, greatly to the dismay of the secessionists at the grand display. Some of the more timid retired to their homes, and tremblingly averred that they never saw so many soldiers before. The Fifth was praised at every point, and even citizens, at heart secessionists, smile upon the Fifth; for, by their gentlemanly conduct and soldierly bearing, they have won respect, and are called by them the 'Steady Fifth.'

"The Fifth are fully equipped, every man having forty rounds of cartridges, and daily expect orders to advance further into Virginia. The colonel and his entire command are in fine health and excellent spirits, and the people of Massachusetts may rest assured that the Fifth will give a noble account of itself in the approaching conflict."

17th. Routed at two o'clock in the morning and kept under arms several hours, then dismissed; the report that a large force was approaching proving false. The two Charlestown companies celebrated, in a grove near the camp, the anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill, by a parade and dinner, at which speeches were made; the field staff, and company officers of the regiment being invited guests.

25th. Lieut. Col. Greene, Major Keyes, and Adjutant Barri having received appointments, the former as lieut. colonel, and the last two as captains, in the Regular Army, deep regret was felt at the prospect of at once losing these officers, who had contributed their full share in promoting the credit and efficiency of the regiment, and the captains of the Fifth joined in the following request:—

"CAMP MASSACHUSETTS, June 25, 1861.

To Hon. Henry Wilson:—

Dear Sir:— The undersigned, captains of this regiment, entertaining a high opinion of the military knowledge and efficiency of Lieut. Colonel Greene, Major Keyes, and Adjutant Barri, and learning that they are about to leave us to assume positions in the United States Army, respectfully beg leave to express to you our deep regret that we are to be deprived of their valuable services before our term of enlistment expires; and we desire your influence to effect such arrangements that they may remain with us during the remainder of our term of service. There are many in this regiment, both officers and men, who are desirous of re-enlisting when the opportunity occurs, and are anxious to do so under these officers, consequently they are anxious to retain them till their present term expires, that they may have the opportunity of enlisting under their old favorites."

At dress parade, the retiring officers took formal leave of the regiment, expressing their regret at their departure, and trusting that to whatever field their colonel might lead them, they would well sustain their honor and their credit.

July 4th. The day was appropriately observed by the regiment. At twelve o'clock, m., the regiment formed under arms on the parade, while the national salute was firing, and afterward formed a hollow square, Col. Lawrence and staff in the centre. After a few preliminary remarks by the colonel, the hymn "America" was sung by the entire assembly. Chaplain De Costa then read the Declaration of Independence, and offered appropriate prayers for the President and Congress, and for the general welfare and perpetuity of the Union. Then followed the singing of the "Star Spangled Banner," which led the way for a speech from Colonel Lawrence, touching on various interests connected with the day and the regiment. His remarks elicited hearty applause, and at the close, three cheers were given for the "Stars and Stripes." In the evening there was a display of fireworks, got up in rather an original style.

5th. In consequence of an injury sustained by Lieut. Colonel Greene, before leaving Washington, the regiment had been since that time without the services of that officer, and both he and Major Keyes, having some time since received appointments in the regular army, thereby creating vacancies, an election was held, and George H. Pierson, Captain of Company A, — senior captain, — was elected lieutenant colonel, and John T. Boyd, Captain of Company K, was elected major; Lieut. John G. Chambers was appointed adjutant. Gov. Andrew visited the camp; and, after examining into the condition of the troops, their quarters, the quality of their rations, &c., — with which he expressed himself highly pleased, — and a hasty introduction to the line officers, the regiment was formed in mass on the parade, where the colonel introduced to the regiment Governor Andrew, who entertained the men with a few encouraging remarks, assuring them that although far away from her maternal eye, Massachusetts still had the interest and welfare of her sons at heart, and stood with open hand, and a heart overflowing with gratitude, to welcome their return home at the close of the duties required of them by the present distracted state of our beloved country. During his remarks the Governor asserted that all the three months' regiments would be ordered home at the expiration of their term of enlistment, and no more active service required of them, unless they saw fit to volunteer in new regiments; adding, that he regarded the 'material of the Fifth Regiment such as would make skilful officers in the contemplated three years' regiments. The Governor was enthusiastically cheered, and at the close of his remarks, immediately returned to Washington.

During the past week, Fort Ellsworth had been finished, and the daily drills of the regiment were resumed in earnest.

13th. The regiment received orders to pack personal baggage, and store it at Alexandria, in anticipation of a march.

16th. The knapsacks were packed and left in camp. With three days' rations and a blanket slung in a roll across the shoulder, the regiment, in "light marching order," crossed Shuter's Hill, and, with the other regiments of the division, took up the line of march for Centreville. The Fifth, in Col. Franklin's Brigade, having been honored with the right of the division, was at the head of the column, under Col. Heintzelman. Companies D and E were deployed as skirmishers during the day. At 7 o'clock the regiment halted, and prepared to bivouac during the night. At 8½ o'clock an alarm was given, and soon after three prisoners and two horses were brought in by the guard.

17th. The march was resumed at 7 o'clock, A.M., with Companies A and K deployed as skirmishers. Fifty from the Fifth Regiment, together with fifty from the First Minnesota Regiment, detailed at Alexandria as pioneers, with an axe apiece, and their guns slung across their backs, closely followed the skirmishers. The troops proceeded cautiously, the pioneers cutting away large trees which had been felled in the road to obstruct the progress of the troops, and in some instances opening an entire new road through the woods. At noon, Company C was sent in advance as skirmishers to relieve Company K. The skirmishers had a severe task in finding their way through swamps and dense woods. The men spread out in a line each side of the road, sometimes five, sometimes ten paces apart. Rebels were occasionally seen in advance, but mostly out of range. The people had had no notice of the approach, as the troops had come by a circuitous route. The secession pickets now spread the alarm, and the whole country was aroused. On every hand the scouts found evidence of the recent presence of the enemy, who, on the approach of the troops, ran like frightened sheep. The few genuine Union men, who had so long been oppressed by the reign of terror, found this 17th of July a regular 17th of June, and were rejoiced to find themselves once more under the protection of the glorious "stars and stripes." The roads became more obstructed by trees felled by them. At one point the advance guard was fired upon by the enemy, who immediately ran, leaving their knapsacks, blankets, &c., as mementoes for our men. Near by a battery of earthwork had been erected, but no movement was made in its defence. About two hundred rebels, encamped a short distance ahead, fled precipitately, leaving their camp equipage and a large amount of stores behind, together with their dinners half eaten. At 3 o'clock, P. M., the troops reached Sangster's Station on the Orange and Alexandria Railroad, where the regiment hoped to intercept the flight of the enemy from Fairfax; but the bird had flown about an hour before, burning two bridges to cover the retreat. An hour sooner and our column would have been able to cut them into pieces, and with trifling loss. Col. Lawrence rode all day at the head with the skirmishers and pioneers, as he did the day previous, gallantly conducting the advance. To-day's march was twelve miles. The regiment bivouacked in a mown field, on the edge of a magnificent wood, near the railroad, and enjoyed a sound sleep, which they much needed, for the march was quite exhausting.

18th. A scouting party of forty, under Capt. Messer, of Company D, left camp at half-past nine o'clock, A.M., and reconnoitered by a circuitous route in a southerly direction, toward the Occoquan River, on the opposite side of the railroad from Centreville. They engaged the enemy's pickets, fifteen in number, whose roll they captured at Wolf Run Shoals, eight miles from Sangster's Station. One of the rebels was killed. On their return, they overtook the regiment at Centreville at half-past nine o'clock in the evening. The regiment itself started for Centreville at 5 o'clock, P.M., with a thunder shower for a companion, where at about nine o'clock they halted in a grain field and bivouacked for the night. The lights of the different regiments of the grand army of thirty thousand were to be seen on every side. During the night a light rain fell.

19th. Many of the officers and soldiers erected brush tents. News of the disastrous result of the skirmish of yesterday, in which the Massachusetts First bore a prominent part, was the exciting topic, together with the probabilities of the morrow. At 8 o'clock, P.M., divine service was held.

20th. At half-past two o'clock, P.M., orders were received to prepare for an advance, and three days' rations were distributed. The order to march at six o'clock was changed into an order to start soon after midnight.

21st. At quarter-past one o'clock, A.M., the command came to "fall in lively," and the line was promptly formed. At half-past two the regiment, in its turn, started, but soon halted until half-past four o'clock, when the whole division took up its march for Bull Run, just three months to the day and hour since the regiment marched out of Faneuil Hall. The larger part of the route lay through the woods, whose shade mitigated the almost intolerable heat. The scarcity of water, however, was severely felt by the troops. The Fifth, after marching about ten miles, of which the last mile or two was at double-quick, halted at about eleven o'clock. The general engagement had already begun, and in a few minutes the order was given to cross the ford, and the regiment advanced for the scene of action on the double-quick, halting a moment on the way to deposit for a time their blankets, &c. Then came the order, "Fifth of Massachusetts, forward, double-quick, march!" Away they went past the dead and wounded, both friend and foe, who lay where they fell, and, in the midst of shot and bursting shell, took their position on the brow of a hill, directly in front of the rebel batteries, and fired at their retreating infantry. The enemy's artillery getting their range, the regiment was ordered in mass, and to fall flat on their faces, while a shot from the rebel batteries mostly passed just over their heads. "A Looker On" gives the following description of the Fifth on the field:—

"I saw the Massachusetts Fifth in their dark uniforms and their steady advance under the enemy's fire of shot and shell; I noticed them some distance off; they came into the field by a flank movement, and then into column, with as much coolness as if they had been on an ordinary muster-field. They then had to pass over an open field, exposed to the full force of the rebel batteries, but they did not waver in the least. They were ordered by Col. Franklin to take and hold a position on the brow of a hill, in front of the enemy's batteries. Here I first saw their Colonel (Lawrence) at their head. He is tall and slim, with dark hair. He is quite young, not more than twenty-five. [The roster says twenty-eight years.] They took their places in perfect order, and fought bravely."

Another says:—

"The boys were no way abashed by this hot reception, but took the whole thing very coolly, waiting patiently to 'pitch in' again. The firing was now perfectly terrific, and at times it seemed as if the heavens would burst asunder with the concussion. Colonel Lawrence, standing most of the time in the middle of the regiment, used his utmost efforts to keep the men calm, in their places, close to the ground out of the way of the shot, which went singing their peculiar death-song three or four feet above the ground."

Several of the men were wounded by the bursting of shell; and private Angier was struck by a six pound shot in his leg. This rest afforded great relief to the men, whose mouths were parched with thirst; the scarcity of water, the rapid marching, and double-quick movements having well-nigh exhausted them. A field officer rode up and inquired, "What regiment of regulars is this?" The men answered, "We are not regulars; we are the Fifth of Massachusetts." He replied, "Is it possible! I thought you were regulars, you are in such perfect order under fire."

The Massachusetts Eleventh took a position on the left. Another regiment advanced in line on the right, but broke with the utmost disorder, the men firing recklessly and flying, with injury to their friends and none to the enemy.

Col. Franklin, commanding the brigade, ordered the regiment to take a position forward to charge with the bayonet. The order was promptly obeyed, and away went the regiment, on the double-quick, towards the position designated. The shot and shell came thicker and faster, whizzing mostly just over their heads. A change of orders came to the Fifth; "The Zouaves are going to charge; support them!" The regiment, splashing through a brook, hastened towards the Zouaves. On the way, a battery of artillery drove at full speed through the centre of the regiment, completely breaking up the ranks of the color company and another. "Rally, rally," shouted the officers; and under that fierce fire the two companies rallied, and again came the command to the regiment, "Forward, double-quick." A position was taken on the left of the Zouaves and about one hundred feet to the rear, and the firing commenced on the right. A most murderous fire was here kept up by the rebels.

The United States Artillery was doing good execution on the left and front, but were obliged to retreat, over half their number being killed or wounded. The horses attached to the gun-carriages and caissons, rendered utterly unmanageable by some of the drivers being killed and themselves wounded, came thundering down the line of the Fifth, knocking down men and scattering the ranks of the left wing in every direction. The companies rallied again, promptly forward on the colors, the colonel and officers everywhere directing, and the men pouring a deadly fire into the enemy.

In the advance the color-bearer, Lawrence, bravely waving the national colors, was shot dead, by a musket ball in his breast. Sergeant Wallace, himself wounded, seized the national flag as it fell from Lawrence's hands, and raised it gallantly. Sergeant Major Quincy receiving from Sergeant Wallace the Massachusetts flag, bore it bravely. Col. Lawrence, wounded, was borne to the rear as the retreat commenced. The regiment retreated from the field in some confusion, mostly by companies, but was soon well together again, and, under command of Maj. Boyd, (Lieut. Col. Pierson at this time left to render assistance to Col. Lawrence), marched to their bivouac in Centreville, where the regimental line was formed, muskets stacked, and with a guard set the regiment lay down for a night's rest.

In about an hour, an order came to march to Washington. The regiment rising at half-past one o'clock, A. M., had marched a full day's journey before reaching the battle-field, had fought on the field about five hours, had retreated over the route marched in the morning, and were now ordered to march about twenty-five miles to Washington, — a truly hard day's task! A couple of the men, accidentally left behind at the bivouac in Centreville, slept soundly on the ground until nine o'clock the next morning, and then travelled leisurely to Alexandria, without seeing an enemy.

22d. Early in the forenoon it began to rain, and by noon it poured. About ten o'clock, the regiment arrived at Camp Massachusetts, and at half-past eleven o'clock, orders were received for the regiment to march to Washington; and packing their knapsacks, they started for the Capital, under Major Boyd, where, after a march of about nine miles through the mud and rain, they arrived at about four o'clock, P. M., hungry, wet to the skin, and covered with mud. Many being wounded, they presented a truly pitiable appearance. They bore the fatigue manfully, and not a murmur escaped them. They were quartered in several different buildings, while the sick and wounded were generously cared for by the citizens, who took them to their own houses and provided them with dry clothing, food, and good beds. Hundreds of troops arrived that night, many of them suffering from wounds, and, for want of accommodation, were obliged to lie on the sidewalk.

The Fifth remained in Washington the next five days.

28th. On Sunday, the 28th, at 9 o'clock, A.M., the regiment formed line on Pennsylvania Avenue, near Willard's Hotel, under command of Lieut. Col. Pierson, and were addressed by Col. Lawrence, who, though still suffering from his wounds, was determined to see his regiment safely home. The Fifth left Washington at 10½ o'clock, A. M., arrived at Baltimore at 2 o'clock, P. M., and left for Philadelphia at 6½ o'clock, P. M., where they arrived at 5½ o'clock on Monday morning, 29th.

29th. After a substantial collation, the regiment started for New York, arriving there at 4½ o'clock, P. M., and meeting with a most hearty and enthusiastic reception. The officers were entertained at the Astor House, and the rank and file were provided with a bountiful supply of refreshments at the Park Barracks. The regiment left New York at 7½ o'clock, P. M., arriving at Groton, Conn., at 6½ o'clock, A. M., the next morning.

30th. The regiment left Groton for Boston at 7½ o'clock, and arrived at the latter place at 1¼ o'clock, P. M.

The regiment was met at the railway station by the Second Battalion of Infantry, which volunteered an escort. An immense concourse of people thronged the railway buildings, and the neighboring streets. The regiment disembarked as soon as possible, and formed line. At half-past one o'clock the column moved into Boylston street, where the Second Battalion, with Gilmore's Band, were drawn up to receive them. After the usual formalities, the escort, with a carriage containing His Honor Mayor Wightman, and several members of the Governor's staff, took the lead, and the procession proceeded through Tremont, Court, and State streets, and returning, proceeded through Washington, School, and Beacon streets, to the Common. The streets through which the regiment passed were lined with people, and from sidewalk, from door, window, and house top, the plaudits of the assembled thousands welcomed back the gallant troops. The whole march was one continued ovation. The Boston Journal of that evening says of the scene on the Common:—

"People began to flock to the Common at an early hour, and on the arrival of the escort, an hour previous to the arrival of the regiment, the crowd had become very large. After several hours of anxious waiting, the commotion in the neighborhood of the Providence Railway Station plainly indicated the arrival of the train, and hundreds bent their steps in that direction. Most, however, remained on the Common, supposing, of course, that the troops, who had had nothing whatever to eat since their departure from New York on Monday evening, would first partake of the collation which had been spread for some hours on the Beacon Street mall. The regiment, however, proceeded through the streets of the city before arriving on the Common. Their approach was the signal for a grand rush. Fathers, mothers, brothers, sisters, and friends, seized the hands or clung about the necks of the soldiers as they came upon the parade ground. The strict order 'not to meddle with the boys on the march' was only partially heeded, and the detour of the parade ground was accomplished by the troops at the sound of familiar music, with their glorious colors still flying, and with numerous accessions to their ranks. No sooner had the regiment been formed in line parallel with the Charles Street mall, than from all quarters of the parade ground rushed throngs of people to greet them. The orders to stack arms, &c., were obeyed under great disadvantages, as at this time the ranks were much broken by the influx of innumerable friends. Then followed the greetings. The Colonel rode down the parade ground on his splendid horse, receiving the hearty congratulations of his friends on all sides. The civil and military authorities present, including several United States officers, repaired to the marquee at the north end of the ground, where a repast was laid, and where many friends had been gathered. In the scenes of welcome and heart-felt congratulation, the repast was at first well-nigh neglected.

"Many an affecting incident occurred, and many tears of welcome were shed within the tent and all along the ranks. The troops were conducted to their collation, and were for a couple of hours allowed the full enjoyment of the meeting. One never failed of interest in walking among them. Here a hardy young soldier was exhibiting a shattered musket, or a few clean bullet-holes in his garments; another was the centre of an eager crowd, who were listening intently to the last authentic account of the battle of Bull Run, from an 'eye witness.' Outside the lines, little knots of people listened to new incidents of the fight, and none enjoyed the scene better than the returned volunteers.

"To drink from a soldier's canteen that had been often filled from the puddles of Fairfax and Centreville, was the especial delight of many, while trophies of the field were liberally dispersed on all hands. In scenes like these two happy hours of the afternoon passed away, and we heard it from the lips of many of the regiment, that it was a source of especial delight that their first reception at home was beneath the green trees of Boston Common."

A special order was issued from head-quarters, dated July 30, substantially stating that after three months' service in the cause of government, the Fifth Regiment of Massachusetts Volunteer Militia, which Col. Lawrence had so well commanded, was returned to the old Commonwealth, whose good name and unsullied honor the regiment had so nobly upheld. The people of Massachusetts welcome the regiment, and will ever cherish, with gratitude, its patriotic services. The memories of the men of the Fifth who have fallen in the great cause, and whose bodies lie mouldering in the soil of Virginia, Massachusetts will ever hold in grateful remembrance. At ten minutes past four the regimental line was formed, when Capt. Amory commenced the formal proceeding of

mustering the troops out of the service of the United States. This ceremony occupied about an hour, and after the different companies were mustered out, their respective Captains assumed the command, and marched homeward. On their dismissal until further orders, Col. Lawrence addressed the regiment briefly, sincerely thanking both officers and men for their noble efforts and hearty support, wishing them much happiness at their homes, and remarking that he had never issued an order which had not been cheerfully responded to. He then bade them farewell until they should meet again.

Committees of citizens from the various towns were present, to welcome their respective companies; and in Charlestown, Medford, and other places, ovations, second in point of numbers only to that which marked the entry of the troops into Boston, welcomed them home. But the honors did not end here. Numerous company receptions took place on succeeding days, and countless marks of approval showed in some degree the public appreciation of the noble labors of the soldiers of the Fifth. On the evening of Saturday, August 31st, Col. Lawrence received from his college classmates (Harvard, 1855) an elegant sword, a fitting testimonial for services such as have been recorded. The occasion of the presentation, in view of the arduous campaign which had just closed for the Fifth, was one of peculiar interest.

Thus ended a campaign, begun in the hour of the nation's sorest trials, when her all was entrusted to brave and loyal hearts, and when she found her truest supporters in the ranks from Massachusetts. Among the few regiments, who, for three months, left their common callings, and girded on the armor for their country's defence, none can boast a fairer record than the Massachusetts Fifth. The varied and somewhat irregular duties incident to the opening of the war and to the imperfect organization of the volunteer army, found able hands and willing hearts among her number, while the mutual good feeling between officers and men, and between the men themselves, and the genuine and marked respect which was always shown the commanding officer, distinguished the Fifth Regiment. Its services in the trying times of the nation, and its well wrought deeds, will be its most enduring monument.

Company A (Mechanic Light Infantry), Salem.—5th Reg.

Organized Feb. 26, 1867, and made their first parade July 4, of the same year, Perley Putnam, Commander.

From the above date to the present time this company has never been re-organized, and the smallest number that ever paraded is twenty-five non-commissioned officers and privates.

Orders were received from Col. Lawrence, of the 5th Regiment, M. V. M., April 19, 1861, at 3 o'clock, P. M., to report at Faneuil Hall, Boston, on the 20th, at 10 o'clock, A. M. At 7 o'clock the next morning, (April 20), the company assembled at the armory, and one hundred and twenty men, including three commissioned officers, answered to roll-call; after which they were formed into line and marched to the city hall, where Col. Perley Putnam, the first commander, in behalf of the ladies, presented to them a beautiful silk "AMERICAN FLAG." The city did them honor; the citizens cheered them as they marched to the depot; friends gave them their kind farewell, and the whole community viewed their departure with a satisfactory pride.

At 10 o'clock precisely, they reported for duty at Faneuil Hall, Boston. There being one hundred and twenty men, the surplus over the number required were dismissed and sent home, much to their disappointment.

On their return to Salem, August 1, they were received by the old members, numbering over one hundred men, organized into a battalion, under command of past Commander Wm. R. Brown; also Salem Cadets, Major Marks; Union Drill Club, Capt. Whipple, and Zonave Drill Club, Capt. Woodbury, who tendered them an escort. They were received at the City Hall by the City Government, and welcomed home by His Honor Mayor Stephen P. Webb, in behalf of the citizens, after which they sat down at Mechanic Hall to a bountiful dinner, provided by the city. Thus ended the three and one-half months' campaign.

The company, previous to its being attached to the 5th Regiment, for the three months' service, was known as Company B, 7th Regiment, and since its return has again taken its old position in the M. V. M.

There are now fifty-eight members in this company who were at the battle of Bull Run, July 21.

Company B (Richardson Light Guard), South Reading. — 5th Reg.

Organized Oct. 2, 1851. This company, belonging to the 7th Regiment, M. V. M., as Company E, was attached to the 5th Regiment, and was known in the U. S. service as Company B.

Orders were received from Col. Lawrence April 19th, 1861, at 1 o'clock, to report at Boston. The company marched, at 3 o'clock, from their armory to the common, where they partook of a collation, provided by their townsmen, after which they were escorted to the depot by nearly the whole town, where speeches were made, and the company left for Boston, accompanied by the Malden Band, who volunteered their services.

On returning to South Reading, July 30, the company were welcomed by a speech from E. Mansfield, Esq., and escorted by several military companies, engine companies, and citizens generally, under the marshaling of Lieut. N. S. Dearborn, to the common, where a dinner was furnished, after which speeches were made by several gentlemen. Of the eighty members in this company, forty-two have re-enlisted. Every one of these, it is reported, has a position as good as that of sergeant.

Company C (Charlestown Artillery), Charlestown.—5th Reg.

The company is known as the Charlestown Artillery, and was formerly Co. D, 1st Reg. of Artillery; but, several years ago, was changed, with several other companies, into Infantry, and has since been known as Co. D, 5th Regt. Infantry M. V. M. While the 5th Regiment was in Washington, in May last, the companies were *re-lettered*, and the Charlestown Artillery became Co. C; but, since the return of the regiment, the old companies have received their former letters. The Charlestown Artillery was organized May 22, 1786, and was the first company to celebrate the anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill, June 17, 1786. Sometime in 1830, the company disbanded, but was re-organized Nov. 13, 1831, and has continued to prosper ever since.

William R. Swan, Captain of the Charlestown Artillery, received orders to assemble his command at their armory, at 12 o'clock, M., Wednesday, April 17, and by noon of the next day they were ready to march. But orders came for the company to hold themselves in readiness, at their armory, to march at any moment. On Friday, April 19, the Fifth Regiment was ordered to rendezvous at Faneuil Hall; and the Artillery, in company with the City Guards, of Charlestown, marched over to Boston to the hall, where they remained until the regiment departed for Washington, at 5 o'clock Sunday morning, April 21. This company, on leaving Charlestown, had abundant evidence of the affection and high esteem with which their fellow-citizens regard them; and, on their return from the war, another demonstration was made in honor of their patriotic devotion. [See notice on page 189, under Company K.]

In just three months from the day they left Boston, July 21, the Fifth Regiment, numbering between 700 and 800 fighting men, among whom were the Charlestown Artillery, left Centreville, Va., for Bull Run. On that day the Charlestown Artillery, Co. C, was ordered, with the regiment, to the brow of the eminence directly in front of the main battery of the enemy, and were there exposed to a galling fire from the battery for nearly thirty-five minutes, and but for the orders and coolness of Col. Lawrence, who commanded the company to fall flat on their faces, they would have been most terribly cut up by the shower of shot and shell that was poured upon them. Returning home at the expiration of their term of service, July 30, 1861, they were warmly welcomed, the people turning out *en masse* to receive them.

Organized 1853. Known as Company G in the 7th Regiment; detailed from it April 19th. and annexed to the 5th. Their orders were received at noon, April 19, 1861, and, as they had been drilling daily, preparatory to the call, they were ready to rush to the rescue of Washington and their country. The reception of the order fired the town with enthusiasm, and the citizens turned out *en masse*; a meeting was held, at which speeches were made; a purse and a flag were presented; also a Testament to each member of the company. The people then escorted them to the railroad station, and they left the same day at 5, P.M. Their return to Haverhill, in July, was the occasion for a similar demonstration as that which was given them at their departure in April. A large number of this company soon after re-enlisted. The town and the citizens contributed about \$2,400 in cash, clothing, and other articles for the company.

Organized Feb. 12, 1851. The call for this gallant corps to aid in the defence of the Union met a hearty response from all its members, and the inhabitants of Medford exhibited the deepest interest in their behalf and the glorious cause. Upon their leaving home, April 19, an impressive prayer was offered by Rev. Mr. Ames, in the Square, and several hundred citizens escorted them to Boston. At an enthusiastic meeting of the citizens, over six thousand dollars were quickly raised for the purpose of providing the soldiers with a new uniform, and for the relief of their families during their absence.

On the return of the 5th Regiment to Boston, July 30, 1861, the company was preceded home by an escort of the citizens of Medford; and, as they entered the town, the bells were rung, salutes fired, and music discoursed its welcome eloquently. At the Town Hall, an eloquent and patriotic speech of welcome was made by Thomas S. Harlow, Esq., and responded to by Capt. Hutchins. Loud cheers were given, and many a hearty greeting exchanged. The citizens of Medford, proud of their well-drilled corps, had for years given it their hearty support, and when it had been tried and found *not* wanting, they viewed with satisfactory pride their honorable return from the war.

When the 5th Regiment was nearly ready to leave for the seat of war, it was decided to add to their numbers this company, then known as the "Boston Volunteers."

Company G (Concord Artillery), Concord.—5th Reg.

Was Company A, Concord Artillery. The letter was changed while at Washington, but has always been known as Company A, even when it belonged to the First Regiment of Artillery. The company was incorporated, on petition of Charles Hammond and others, Feb. 28, 1864, and held their first public parade on the 4th of July following. The charter says,—"Whereas, Major John Buttrick and Capt. Isaac Davis, with a party of armed ycomantry, did, on the birth-day of our Revolution, attack and defeat a superior number of

the invaders of our country, who were most advantageously posted at the North Bridge of Concord, it is ordered that the prayer of the petition be granted, and that two brass field-pieces, with proper apparatus, be provided for said company, with suitable engravings, to commemorate and render honor to the action which led to the victory of the day, and to perpetuate the names of the gallant Buttrick and Hosmer, and also to animate, in future, the ardor and bravery of the defenders of our country." In the war of 1812, the artillery were ordered to South Boston, where they remained in camp three months. They marched to Boston with the Concord Light Infantry and the Acton Blues, "and, as they passed through Boston," as an observer said, "they were cheered through the town, and they crossed over to South Boston on scows." (South Boston Bridge then was not in existence.)

Orders were received long before light, on the 19th of April, 1861, to report on Boston Common, and at noon of that day, the anniversary of the Battle of Concord, they left Concord, under the command of Capt. Geo. L. Prescott. The whole people turned out to witness their departure, and they were addressed by Judge Hoar, and prayers were offered for their well-being and safe return. They left Boston on the 21st, and sailed the next morning from New York for Annapolis, and from thence marched to Washington, through a country filled with disloyalists. The company was in the Battle of Bull Run, where five of them were taken prisoners. On their return to Concord, the inhabitants turned out *en masse*, and gave them a most cordial reception. The company has always taken a high stand as a well-drilled company, and the most respectable citizens of the town have been members, and have always given the company their influence and assistance.

The Salem City Guards was organized Nov. 14, 1846. This company belongs to the 7th Regiment of the Mass. Volunteer Militia. A dispatch was received from Col. Lawrence, by telegraph, in the forenoon of the 19th of April, to see if they would like to be attached to the 5th Regiment, and if so, how many they could muster. An answer was immediately returned that they were ready to go, and would bring at least forty-five men. An order came at 1 P.M., for the company to report themselves on Boston Common at 4 P.M.; but, for some cause, they were unable to leave Salem until the next day—Saturday, the 20th, at 9 A.M.—when they left, with seventy-four men and officers, in company with the Salem Mechanic Light Infantry, and on arriving in Boston, went immediately to Faneuil Hall.

On their return from Washington, they arrived in Salem, in company with the Salem Mechanic Light Infantry, on the 31st of July, at about 10 o'clock, A.M. A salute was fired, the bells were rung, and they marched through the principal streets, escorted by the past members of each company, the Salem Divisionary Corps Independent Cadets, and the drill clubs of the city. When they arrived in front of the City Hall, they were welcomed home by the mayor, in behalf of the citizens, after which they partook of a substantial dinner at Mechanic Hall.

The members of this company answered with alacrity the summons of the government to meet and repel the traitors. April 20, 1861, the company left their armory, under an escort of nearly a thousand citizens, with a band of music, and marched to Boston, where they arrived about noon, and were quartered with their regiment in Faneuil Hall. Before leaving Somerville, a meeting was held by the citizens to aid the families of the company, and over four thousand dollars obtained; and on their leaving, a prayer was offered, and speeches made, and a Testament presented to every member of the company.

July 30, 1861, the company, having served its term, returned to Somerville, and their townsmen testified their appreciation of their patriotism and bravery by joining in large numbers to do escort duty, and giving the returned soldiers a warm welcome and a substantial collation. A bouquet was presented to each member of the company by the ladies; a prayer was offered by the Rev. G. G. Fairbanks, after which a speech of welcome was made by Joseph B. Proctor, Esq., and responded to by Capt. Brastow. The Home Guards and the firemen joined in the reception, and a salute of one hundred guns was fired on the occasion.

Company K (Charlestown City Guards), Charlestown.—5th Reg.

This body of citizen-soldiery was organized in 1850, and celebrated its first anniversary on the 17th of June, 1851. Its first commander was Hon. George P. Sanger, who was

followed successively by Captains W. W. Pierce, Chas. B. Rogers, Geo. P. Kettell, and John T. Boyd. The corps has always enjoyed a high state of prosperity, from its organization to the present time,—its rolls never numbering less than seventy-eight active, and three hundred and fifty civil members. At the call of the President of the United States for troops in April, 1861, the company immediately set about perfecting themselves in discipline and drill, and were ready to respond promptly to the call. April 17, they received orders, and left for Boston to join their regiment. Before leaving the armory, patriotic addresses were made by several prominent citizens, and an impressive prayer offered by the Rev. Mr. Kittredge, of Green Street Church. The same gentleman also presented a pocket Bible to each member of the company. They left the armory amid the cheers and "God-speeds" of a thousand anxious hearts, and were escorted to Boston by an immense concourse of citizens, where they remained until Sunday morning, the 21st, when they left for Washington.

The story of the camp-life of this company is similar to that of every company at the seat of war. Every attention was paid to the wants of the company by its friends at home, and every mail brought some memento to remind the members of the dear ones left behind. One particularly interesting feature of the campaign was the celebration of their anniversary on the soil of Virginia, by a parade and dinner on the 17th of June. The health of the company was exceedingly good, and the men bore with indomitable firmness the privations and hardships they were called upon to endure. Five members were left behind. Samuel E. Chandler, Henry A. Angier, and Converse A. Babcock, were wounded at the Battle of Manassas, and are prisoners, together with George T. Childs, at New Orleans. Sumner Fish is supposed to have been killed, as nothing has been heard from him since the day of the battle. They were brave and generous fellows, and have the warmest sympathies of their more fortunate companions in arms and a host of admiring friends.

July 30, the company returned home, and its reception, in common with the Charlestown Artillery, was one of the grandest demonstrations that has been witnessed in Charlestown for many years. Quite a number of the members have re-enlisted in other regiments.

Sixth Regiment. Infantry.

This regiment, though widely scattered in the counties of Middlesex and Essex, mustered in force at Lowell, April 16th, 1861, at nine o'clock in the morning, very few of them having had more than twelve hours' notice, and some a great deal less. Before leaving Lowell, they were addressed by the Mayor and others, and were cheered by crowds of enthusiastic citizens. Arriving in Boston at one o'clock the same day, they met with another warm reception, and were escorted by crowds of citizens to Faneuil Hall, and from thence to Boylston Hall.

April 17th, at eleven o'clock, the regiment marched to the State House, to exchange their old muskets for the rifled arms. Here the Governor addressed them in the most complimentary manner, giving utterance to sentiments of the highest patriotism, and expressing his confidence in their devotion, courage, and efficiency in the cause they had so nobly rallied to support. The Governor then presented the colors of the regiment to Colonel Jones, who responded with much feeling, pledging their determined support to them. Before leaving Boston, as a mark of respect to Colonel Jones, it was decided to adopt, as the "Daughter of the Regiment," his daughter, an intelligent and interesting girl of twelve years. She was presented by Major Watson, and received with the strongest demonstrations of joy. At seven in the evening the regiment marched to the Worcester depot, and took the cars for Washington. Along the route they were greeted by the people, and saluted by the discharge of cannon and the ringing of bells. At Worcester, an immense crowd met them with patriotic demonstrations, and at Springfield, where they arrived at a late hour, they were received by the military and fire departments, and by thousands who manifested a deep interest in them. Arriving at New York about sunrise, April 18th, they received a splendid ovation from the soldiers and citizens of that city. While passing down Broadway, a venerable gentleman, formerly of Ipswich, Mass., said, with much emotion, "These boys won't run: I commanded a regiment of them in the last war." At twelve o'clock, they left the city by the Jersey Ferry.

Crossing the river, the troops entered the spacious depot of the N. J. Railroad Co., which was crowded with patriotic Jerseymen and women. From the balcony around the building, the bright eyes of many a fair one looked down in sparkling delight at the prompt march of the brave Massachusetts boys to their country's defence. Flags were waved by hundreds of fair hands, and while the volunteers were waiting for the cars, not a few of the miniature copies of the national emblem were smilingly transferred to their keeping. After considerable delay, the cars moved on amidst a perfect avalanche of cheers.

The N. Y. Eve. Post said: "As the first detachment of the army which New England will speedily supply the government, the regiment made a highly creditable appearance, and was shown no more attention than its promptness and patriotism rightly deserved at the hands of the people of New York."

All along the route through New Jersey, the people gathered at every station to welcome them. They reached Philadelphia at seven P. M., and so densely filled were the streets with people who came forth to receive them, that it was with much difficulty the column could push its way through. A member of the regiment states: "So enthusiastic were our friends, that they rushed into our ranks, threw their arms about the necks of our soldiers, and emptying their own pockets for our benefit, seemed fairly beside themselves with joy. I doubt whether old Massachusetts ever before or since received such encomiums, or her sons such a generous welcome, as on that night in the city of brotherly love."

After partaking of supper at the Continental, the troops were quartered at the Girard House. But hardly had they sought the repose so much needed, after their hurried and exciting journey of the day and previous night, when they were aroused by the long roll calling them to arms, in consequence of information brought by Col. Phillips, of Worcester, to the effect that arrangements were being made to dispute their passage through Baltimore, and that, to save the capital, it was necessary to reach there before another night. Colonel Jones immediately resumed the march, and took the cars for Baltimore, at one o'clock on the morning of the 19th of April.

The following report by Colonel Jones, in regard to the passage through Baltimore, was made to General Butler's adjutant, April 22d, after the regiment had arrived in Washington:—

"Brigade Major WILLIAM H. CLEMENCE:—

"In accordance with Special Order No. 6, I proceeded with my command toward the city of Washington, leaving Boston on the evening of the 17th April, arrived in New York on the morning of the 18th, and proceeded to Philadelphia, reaching that place on the same evening. On our way John Brady, of Company H, Lowell, was taken insane, and deeming it unsafe to have him accompany the regiment, I left him at Delanco, New Jersey, with I. C. Buck, with directions that he should telegraph Mayor Sargeant, of Lowell, as to the disposition of him; and we proceeded thence to Baltimore, reaching that place at noon on the 19th. After leaving Philadelphia, I received intimation that our passage through the city of Baltimore would be resisted. I caused ammunition to be distributed and arms loaded, and went personally through the cars and issued the following order, viz.:—

"The regiment will march through Baltimore in column of sections, arms at will. You will undoubtedly be insulted, abused, and perhaps assaulted, to which you must pay no attention whatever, but march with your faces square to the front, and pay no attention to the mob, even if they throw stones, bricks, or other missiles; but if you are fired upon, and any one of you is hit, your officers will order you to fire. Do not fire into any promiscuous crowds, but select any man whom you may see aiming at you, and be sure you drop him."

"Reaching Baltimore, horses were attached the instant that the locomotive was detached, and the cars were driven at a rapid pace across the city. After the cars containing seven companies had reached the Washington depot, the track behind them was barricaded, and the cars containing band and the following companies, viz., Com-

pany C, of Lowell, Captain Follansbee; Company D, of Lowell, Captain Hart; Company I, of Lawrence, Captain Pickering; and Company C, of Stoneham, Captain Dike, were vacated by the band, and they proceeded to march in accordance with orders, and had proceeded but a short distance before they were furiously attacked by a shower of missiles, which came faster as they advanced. They increased their step to double-quick, which seemed to infuriate the mob, as it evidently impressed the mob with the idea that the soldiers dared not fire or had no ammunition, and pistol-shots were numerous fired into the ranks, and one soldier fell dead. The order, Fire, was given, and it was executed; in consequence, several of the mob fell, and the soldiers again advanced hastily. The Mayor of Baltimore placed himself at the head of the column, beside Captain Follansbee, and proceeded with them a short distance, assuring him that he would protect them, and begging him not to let the men fire; but the Mayor's patience was soon exhausted, and he seized a musket from the hands of one of the men and killed a man therewith, and a policeman who was in advance of the column also shot a man with a revolver.

"They at last reached the cars, and they started immediately for Washington. On going through the train, found there were about one hundred and thirty missing, including the band and field music. Our baggage was seized, and we have not as yet been able to recover any of it. I have found it very difficult to get reliable information in regard to the killed and wounded."

[*Then follows a list of the killed and wounded, as accurate as it could be made at the time.]

"As the men went into the cars, I caused the blinds of the cars to be closed, and took every precaution to prevent any shadow of offence to the people of Baltimore; but still the stones flew thick and fast into the train, and it was with the utmost difficulty that I could prevent the troops from leaving the cars and revenging the death of their comrades. After a volley of stones, some one of the soldiers fired and killed a Mr. Davis, who, I have since ascertained by reliable witnesses, threw a stone into the car. Yet that did not justify the firing at him, but the men were infuriated beyond control. On reaching Washington we were quartered at the Capitol in the Senate Chamber, and are all in good health and spirits.

"I have made every effort to get possession of the bodies of our comrades, but have not yet succeeded. Should I succeed, I shall forward them to Boston if practicable, otherwise shall avail myself of a kind offer of George Woods, Esq., who has offered me a prominent lot in the Congressional Burying Ground for the purpose of interment.

"We were this day mustered into the United States service, and will forward the rolls at first opportunity after verification.

Another statement, from a member of the regiment, gives some additional facts in reference to the order in which the regiment went "through Baltimore." It states:—

"When we left Philadelphia, which was about 1 o'clock on the morning of April 19th, it was made apparent to the regimental officers that difficulties would attend our passage through Baltimore, and orders were issued by the Colonel for the arms to be loaded. On arriving at the Susquehanna, our train was greatly augmented by the addition of cars containing an unarmed corps of young men, apparently from 16 to 22 years of age, numbering, as was said, about 1000, and calling themselves Small's Brigade. I am unaware that any official recognition took place between the two corps at any time. In re-arranging the train on the south side of the Susquehanna, it being night-time, some of the cars, in which were a portion of the Sixth Regiment, were misplaced, separating them from the other companies of the regiment, and breaking the order in which it was embarked in the cars at Philadelphia, namely, in regular order from right to left, each company occupying a single car, the last and 'left' company being Co. K, Capt. Sampson, from Boston. This disarrangement of the line was not discovered by the regimental officers, and was afterwards the occasion of unhappy results. The great length of the train so retarded its speed that we did not arrive in Baltimore until nearly noon. Just before arriving there, Col. Jones promulgated an order in the forward car, which contained the field and staff officers, that if interfered with in Baltimore, or insulted, or stoned, no notice should be taken of it. But if fired upon, the regiment was to defend itself. Also that the regiment would form in column of sections and march through the city. This order was probably promulgated through the entire regiment. The Colonel also ordered Major Watson, his second in command, to repair, upon the stopping of the train, to the left company, Capt. Sampson, to remain in the car with that company until ordered to file out into place in column, and charged him to see the rear of the battalion through the city. When the train arrived and stopped, Major Watson proceeded, in obedience to this order, through the gathering and excited crowd, from the forward car to that one containing Capt. Sampson's command. No orders came to file out, and in a few minutes' time all of the cars forward of the one occupied by Capt. Sampson's company, or the larger portion of that company, disappeared, and horses were being attached to that. We knew nothing of the movements of the balance of the regiment, as no intimation had been transmitted to us of a change in the orders. Our car was drawn by horses until it came to the first turn in the street, when, owing to obstructions, it was thrown from the track. Major Watson ordered Capt. Sampson to prevent his men from leaving the car, while he, with the aid of a passing team, suc

ceeded in replacing the car upon the track. At this time the mob were much excited, and many missiles were thrown at and into the car. We proceeded on to Pratt street, nearly opposite the dock, when the mob surrounded the car, and, detaching the horses, stopped the car in suspicious proximity to a large pile of paving stones. Here a most furious and determined attack was made with stones and other missiles and firearms, wounding several in the car, and making of it almost a complete wreck. After we were fired upon, the fire was returned from the car. Major Watson ordered the command to shelter themselves, so far as was possible, by lying upon the floor of the car, while he went out into the crowd and by threats, enforced by the formidable appearance of his revolver, compelled the driver to reattach the horses, and, amid a fresh volley, it went forward a short distance, when the horses were again detached. Here the crowd was less numerous, and Major Watson succeeded in again getting the horses replaced, and the car was drawn to the Washington depot without further difficulty, other than an occasional stray shot or brickbat and torrents of imprecations and threats. Arriving at the depot, we found Col. Jones and staff, and the entire portion of the regiment that had preceded us, and ascertained that they had made the passage without other molestation than insulting language from the rioters, and also learned that the order of march had not been carried out because the horses were attached to the front car so rapidly, and for the same reason, as the Colonel alleged, there was not time for him to countermand his order to march. We also then learned further that another portion of the regiment had not arrived, consisting of Company C, of Lowell, Capt. Follansbee, Company I, of Lawrence, Capt. Pickering, Company L, of Stoneham, Capt. Dike, and a part of Company D, of Lowell, Capt. Hart. These companies were the ones separated from the rest in the making up of the train at the crossing of the Susquehanna. The mob so tore up and obstructed the track, that they were compelled to march through the city, and it was their march which has been so generally described in the published accounts.

"While Major W. and Capt. Sampson's company were engaged with the mob, as before related, it was not known to them that any of the regiment were left behind, nor was it known what had become of that portion of the regiment under immediate command of Col. Jones. After the entire regiment had arrived at the Washington depot, we were further delayed some time by obstructions upon the track. During all this time the cars were surrounded by the furious crowd, and occasional shots were exchanged between them and the soldiers. Here for the first time the police appeared, and seemed to work earnestly in keeping the crowd from contact with the regiment. The police force accompanied the train as far as the Relay House. The whole passage through Baltimore must have occupied over two hours."

Another member, who was with the first companies who passed safely through the city, says: "Unknown to the officers of the regiment, a change was made in the formation of our line, by which three companies, who should have been first through the city, were made to bear the brunt of the fight in Baltimore, a few hours later, and thus those companies to whom the fight justly belonged, much to their regret, passed through the city without sharing it."

From the foregoing statements it appears that most of the regimental officers, with the following companies,—A of Lowell, B of Groton, E of Acton, F of Lawrence, H of Lowell, and B of Worcester, with a part of Company K of Boston, passed through the streets to the Washington depot, without serious injury, but not without gross insults and danger from the assaults of the mob. The last car, however, conveying these companies and one containing a portion of Company K, with Capt. Sampson and Lieut.-Col. Watson, encountered a serious charge from the secessionists, who were, however, successfully repulsed, and the car passed on; only a few of the members receiving wounds or bruises from the stones and missiles which broke in the car windows.

As soon as these cars had passed, the rebels, some ten thousand strong, and composed mainly of the "roughs," which distinguish that city, made preparations to more effectually prevent the passage of the remaining troops. They barricaded the streets and removed the rails from the track, rendering the passage by the cars impossible, and Companies C and D of Lowell, I of Lawrence, and L of Stoneham, found that they should be compelled either to force their way on foot through the hostile ranks, or return. The latter alternative never occurred to these gallant men, for on to Washington was their inspiring thought. Knowing the righteousness of their cause, they believed that "the gates of hell could not prevail against them." Leaving the cars, they formed in order, and heroically breasted the storm which so fearfully raged around them. As they left the cars, their ears were saluted with cheers for Jeff. Davis and South Carolina, and their eyes were offended by the waving of secession flags, and they were told to "dig their graves," and informed that "thirty of us can whip the whole of you," "Massachusetts men are good for praying, but not for fighting," with other gross and insulting language. But the soldiers heeded it not; they were bound on a holy mission, and proceeded to execute it regardless of attacks or insults.

Capt. Follansbee, being the senior officer present, took the post of honor, and the companies started at once to rejoin the regiment. The rabble which had followed and assailed them, now increased rapidly; and perceiving the small number of troops—less than two hundred—they became emboldened, and increased their violence as the brave soldiers marshalled themselves for the contest, amidst the thousands who had surrounded them, and who were intent on their destruction. An eye-witness writes:—

"The Massachusetts men formed in line and wheeled into open column of sections and marched some distance at quick time and then at double-quick, all the while suf-

rounded by the mob—now swelled to the number of at least ten thousand—yelling and hooting. The military behaved admirably, and still abstained from firing upon their assailants. The mob now began throwing a perfect shower of missiles, occasionally varied by random shots from revolvers or muskets. The soldiers suffered severely from the immense quantity of stones, oysters, brickbats, paving-stones, &c. The shots fired also wounded several. When two of the soldiers had been killed, and the wounded had been conveyed to places of safety, the troops at last, exasperated and maddened by the treatment they had received, commenced returning the fire singly, killing several, and wounding a large number of the rioters; but at no one time did a single platoon fire in a volley. The volunteers, after a protracted and severe struggle, at last succeeded in reaching the station, bearing with them in triumph many of the wounded. The calm courage and heroic bearing of the troops spoke volumes for the sons of Massachusetts, who, though marching under a fire of the most embarrassing description, and opposed to overwhelming odds, nevertheless succeeded in accomplishing their purpose, and effected a passage through crowded streets a distance of over a mile and a half; a feat not easily accomplished by so small a body of men when opposed to such terrific odds.”

A member of one of the companies, after describing the first attack on landing from the cars, states:—

“Next came a salute of bullets, which whistled about our ears like hail—making music more pleasant at a distance than close at one’s ear. We did not fire even then, but waited until a second volley, which shot down two of Company D. Then Capt. Follansbee gave the order to fire on any one that was in any way resisting our passage. We did so, not promiscuously, however, but only on such as were seen in the act of firing on us, as we did not wish to injure innocent men. The story in the papers that we fired on them by platoons is a false statement, as is the one that the Mayor fired the first gun. Mayor Brown did shoot a man, however, under the following circumstances: While walking beside Capt. Follansbee, he saw one of the mob strike down one of the men with a brickbat; as he fell, the Mayor sprang, and taking the gun from the hand of the fallen man, shot the scoundrel on the spot. This was after several of the roughs had felt Massachusetts lead. They fired down on us from the windows, house-tops, and from almost every direction. A leader of the mob told us we should not leave the city alive. The fellow soon after fell, pierced by several bullets, which caused many of his comrades to leave with considerable haste.”

The scene of this terrific and murderous fight was on Pratt Street, a place ever infamous in history, unless the repentant tears of loyal Baltimoreans shall wash the damning stain from its pavements.

Many of the brave men, who here met the myrmidons of oppression, were the descendants of patriots, whose blood was the first shed in the Revolutionary cause on the ever memorable 19th of April, 1775, and now, on the anniversary of that glorious day, the sons of such “illustrious sires” were at the post of danger, and the first to shed their blood and consecrate a still nobler cause.

All honor to the glorious dead who here fell, the first martyrs to their country’s cause; their names will be remembered and cherished as household words, while their countrymen will eulogize their memory in speech and in song. And you “who still live,” and bear honorable marks and scars, gained on that eventful day, will remain objects of ceaseless interest, and, with your comrades who escaped unhurt, will ever be regarded with grateful affection by all who admire heroism and patriotic fidelity. Your manly bearing, your patient endurance, and forbearance in those trying hours, bespeak the majesty of your New England character. Gallantly you persevered in the path of duty, and bravely repulsed the foe, and victoriously entered and saved the Capital of your country. Proudly does Massachusetts point to the “Glorious Sixth,” and gather fresh laurels from new deeds achieved on the 19th of April.

But from the pleasing contemplations of such achievements we must turn and follow the noble troops through still other dangers.

Arriving at the Washington depot and placing themselves with the regiment, they shared with them the concentrated vengeance of traitors, who, maddened by defeat and death in their ranks, had here gathered in full force. The scene here, as before, was indescribably fearful.

Taunts, clothed in the most horrid language, were hurled at them by the panting crowd, who, almost breathless with running, passed up to the car windows, threatening the soldiers with knives and revolvers, and cursing up into their faces. The police were thrown in between the cars, and forming a barrier, the troops changed cars, many of them cocking their muskets as they stepped on the platform.

After embarking, the assemblage expected to see the train move off, but its departure was evidently delayed, in the vain hope that the crowd would disperse; but no, it swelled, and the troops expressed, to the officers of the road, their determination to go at once, or they would leave the cars and make their way to Washington.

While the delay was increasing the excitement, a wild cry was raised on the platform, and a dense crowd ran down the platform and out the railroad track towards the Spring Gardens, until the track for a mile was black with an excited rushing mass. The crowd, as it went, placed obstructions of every description on the track. Great logs and telegraph poles, requiring a dozen or more men to move them, were laid across the rails, and stones rolled from the embankment.

A body of police followed after the crowd, both in a full run, and removed the obstructions as fast as they were placed on the track. Various attempts were made to tear up the track with logs of wood and pieces of timber, and there was a great outcry

for pickaxes and handspikes, but only one or two could be found. Many of the police interfered on every occasion; but the crowd, growing larger and more excited, would dash off at a break-neck run for another position further on, until the county line was reached. The police followed, running, until forced to stop from exhaustion. At this point, many of the mob also gave it up from exhaustion; but a crowd, longer winded, dashed on for nearly a mile further, now and then pausing to attempt to force the rails, or place some obstruction upon them. They could be distinctly seen for a mile along the track, where it makes a bend at the Washington road bridge. When the train went out, the mass of people had almost returned to the depot. Shots and stones were exchanged between the military and citizens at several points, and the train, in its run to Washington, was stopped at the Jackson Bridge, near Chinquepin Hill, by the removal of several rails. Disembarking, the rails were relaid, under the protection of the troops. An occasional shot was fired at the troops from the hills and woods along the route, but the range was too long for any effect.

The news of this fight was at once flashed over the telegraphic wires, creating a most intense excitement throughout the country. In Massachusetts, especially, the feeling was not only strong and deep, but indignant towards the assailants, and sympathetic towards the victims, who had but a few hours before gone forth from pleasant homes and peaceful pursuits to defend their country. The Executive of the State keenly felt the blow, and the Governor, who had just before exchanged kind farewells with the regiment, immediately dispatched the following letter to the Mayor of Baltimore:—

"To His Honor the Mayor: I pray you to cause the bodies of our Massachusetts soldiers killed in Baltimore to be immediately laid out, preserved with ice, and tenderly sent forward by express to me. All expenses will be paid by this Commonwealth.

JOHN A. ANDREW,

Governor of Massachusetts."

A correspondence took place also between the Governor and Messrs. Gardner Brewer & Co. of Boston, which reflects honor on the intelligent benevolence of that firm. They sent the following dispatch to their correspondents in Baltimore:—

"Messrs. Mills, Mayhew, & Co., Baltimore:—

"We telegraph you at the request and in behalf of Governor Andrew of this State. Will you co-operate with the Mayor of Baltimore in securing respectful treatment to the corpses of our dead soldiers, and their being carefully forwarded, packed in ice? and particularly do we wish you to secure the very best medical attendance and careful nursing to our wounded. We will be responsible to you for all expenses. Nurses can be sent from here if desired.

GARDNER BREWER & Co."

The heartfelt sympathy here expressed, consoled and relieved the public mind. All saw that proper measures to honor the dead and comfort the wounded would not be neglected.

Arriving in Washington at 5 o'clock on the evening of the 19th, they were joyfully received by the loyal inhabitants, who viewed with great satisfaction and relief their presence, as an immediate attack from the rebels was apprehended. Soon after leaving the cars, the regiment marched to the Capitol, and were quartered in the Senate Chamber. Co. B, of Worcester, and Co. C, of Lowell, occupied the floor of the Senate, and the other companies were placed in the galleries and adjacent rooms, where the troops enjoyed the first night's sleep since leaving home. Besides a hurried journey of some five hundred miles, they had, for the last three days and three nights, been cheered on, caressed, and feasted by friends and patriots, as well as insulted, mobbed, and wounded by infamous rebels. Leaving their glorious dead behind, they had gallantly pressed on, giving no sleep to their eyes, nor slumber to their eyelids, until they were posted at the point of danger, to give their lives, if necessary, in the defence of the nation's capital.

Their orders were to hold the Capitol, and they remained in the building, as a close garrison, one week, not being allowed outside, except for special service.

For several days, all communication with loyal States was cut off, so that reinforcements could not reach them, and, as the enemy was thought to be within a few miles of Washington, their position was somewhat critical.

While stationed here, the troops were busily engaged in drilling, and other regular duties. They also built ovens, filled water-tanks, and stored 16,000 barrels of flour and other provisions in the vaults of the Capitol, in preparation for a siege.

May 3, Gen. Butler visited and addressed the regiment, and on the 5th they were also visited by the Hon. John A. Goodwin, of Lowell, and during their brief stay at Washington they were the special objects of interest and respect, not only from the government officials, but the residents, who experienced in their presence that feeling of protection which true heroism always inspires.

May 5, the urgent necessity for their continuance in the city no longer existing, they were ordered back to the Relay House—another dangerous post. They left in the afternoon, and bivouacked there on Elk Ridge Heights, 10 miles from Baltimore, regretting only that they could not go on to that city, "and fight their battles o'er again," and avenge the death of their comrades in arms.

In the midst of a cold rainstorm, the men (having no tents) constructed huts of boughs and leaves, and as each one built after his own design, the camp presented, the

next morning, some rare specimens of architecture. The huts afforded but little shelter from a two days' storm. Nothing of great interest occurred until May 13, when they left for Baltimore, at 5, P.M., in spite of the threats of her citizens that the Mass. 6th should not again enter that city. They reached the city in the evening, during a severe thunder-storm, and took possession of Federal Hill, and as they raised the flag in the intense darkness, an unusually brilliant flash of lightning revealed the stars and stripes to astonish an angry Baltimore. But they were up, and bound to stay, as well as the troops who stood under arms all night in a drenching rain. May 14, Co. B seized a lot of arms stored by the rebels; the tents of the regiment arrived, and were pitched. May 16, returned to the Relay House. May 24, flags placed at half-mast, having received the sad news of the death of Col. Ellsworth. May 25, while a train passed, bearing the body of Col. Ellsworth, the regiment was drawn up in line, with arms reversed, as a mark of respect. May 29, colors were presented the regiment by gentlemen from New Jersey.

June 5, at 10, P.M., received orders to be ready for an attack, as one was apprehended from Baltimore, but the alarm proved false. June 13, ordered to Baltimore to protect the polls and maintain order during the election; took a position on Mt. Clare, and were joined by the 13th N. Y. Regiment. The presence of this force, with Major Cook's Battery, held the lawless in check, who had declared that Union-loving people should not vote. The double-quick movement of the troops, and their great efficiency, seemed to overawe the traitors, and the next day they returned to the Relay House. June 17, reviewed by Major Morse, and marched to the depot to welcome the Mass. 1st Regiment as they passed to Washington. June 21, a banner was presented by ladies of New York. June 26, ordered to Baltimore, and encamped at Mt. Clare; afterwards encamped in a grove owned by a noted Secessionist. June 30, at 10 o'clock, P.M., they were ordered to be ready to fall into line at roll of the drum, and at 2 o'clock next morning, summoned, and took up line of march through the city. They halted at the residence of Charles Howard, President of the Board of Police Commissioners, and arrested and took him to Fort McHenry. Next day, returned to the Relay House without accident. As threats had been made to destroy the railroad track, a part of the regiment were detailed to guard the tracks.

July 4. Loyal citizens of Baltimore presented the regiment with a splendid silk banner, bearing the inscription,—"Loyal citizens of Baltimore to the Sixth Mass. U. S. V. Pratt Street, April 19, 1861."

July 20. After regimental drill, Col. Jones stated that, as no order had been received to return home, the regiment might be requested to remain a short time longer. 21st, they were informed that the regiment would leave for home on the 24th inst. July 22. An alarm at 1 o'clock in the morning; ammunition was served out, and the regiment was formed in line. A dispatch had been received from Gen. Banks, requiring them to be ready for instant action, news having been received that our forces were retreating from Manassas Junction.

July 23. A strong feeling to return home was manifested by a few, as the time of their enlistment had expired, but others felt that, in the threatening emergency, their services should be continued. To settle the matter, the principal officers went to Baltimore to consult with Gen. Banks, who immediately visited the regiment, and addressed the soldiers, exhorting them to remain, and stating that they would be needed but six days longer. The regiment then voted to remain. Col. Jones then gave notice or permission, to those who wished to return home immediately, that they might leave, but only twenty-one left. July 26th, ordered to pack up extra baggage, which was sent home the next day.

July 29th, broke camp at 6 o'clock in the morning, and started for Massachusetts. Arrived at Baltimore at nine, and left at five, P. M., for Philadelphia. Left that city at ten o'clock, the next day, and arriving in New York that afternoon, left for Boston at six o'clock the same evening. At Philadelphia, New York, and other places on the route, the regiment were honored with the most flattering demonstrations of public esteem and respect, showing that the gallant deeds of the "Glorious Sixth" were duly appreciated.

Arriving at Worcester, at ten o'clock A. M., Aug. 1, they met with another grand reception, worthy of the "heart of the commonwealth," and cheering to the hearts of the soldiers, who were filled with delight to again press the free soil of Massachusetts.

Leaving Worcester at three o'clock that afternoon, they arrived in Boston at about five o'clock, and were received with a most hearty welcome, and escorted to the Common, where they were addressed by Mayor Wightman, Colonel Jones replying. After partaking of a collation they marched to Faneuil Hall, where they were quartered over night, except Company K, which was quartered in their armory.

The regiment left their quarters the next morning, August 2, at 7 o'clock, and marched to the Common, where another collation had been provided for them by the city. At ten o'clock, Capt. Amory, of the United States Army, mustered them out of service, after which they formed and marched to the depot, and left for Lowell amid the cheers of the spectators.

They left Boston at noon, reaching Lowell at half-past one o'clock, where they were received with distinguished respect and esteem. The City Government, the Fire Department, military companies, societies, and citizens generally, formed into procession, and escorted them to the South Common, where, amidst the firing of cannon and the ringing of bells, they were welcomed by the mayor in an address of great cordiality and full appreciation of their heroic deeds and the signal services which they had rendered

the country during their absence. Colonel Jones responded to the address, and the procession then re-formed and marched to Huntington Hall, where a collation had been provided. After partaking of refreshments, parting speeches were made by members of the regiment, expressing strong fraternal feelings, and showing that friendships had been formed which would endure long after the separation then to take place.

Colonel Jones announced to his command the arrangements made for their transportation home, and that he would include his farewell in his last general order, of which a copy would be furnished every man.

About five o'clock, the companies began to leave for their homes; and before six only a few members remained. Thus ended their more than three months' service, and thus parted the noble men, who, loyal and brave, forsook home and its comforts to repel the traitorous foe. They patriotically breasted the storm raised by semi-barbarians, and stayed the tide of treason. Feeling inspired with ideas of liberty and intent on maintaining an enlightened civilization, they proved themselves worthy descendants of heroic men, who fought at Concord, at Lexington, and at Bunker Hill. The youthful Ladd, and the manly forms of Needham and Whitney, no longer appear in the ranks, but while their bodies "lay mouldering in the grave their souls are marching on;" and their names will ever stand out as in letters of gold on the page of history.

"As at Concord on the 19th of April, 1775, Massachusetts blood sealed the devotion of Massachusetts men to the cause of liberty, so at Baltimore, on the 19th of April, 1861, the blood of Massachusetts sealed her devotion to the cause of the Constitution and the liberties of the country."

Lowell Brigade Band.

This band accompanied the regiment as far as Baltimore, and there experienced the tender mercies of the traitors. It seems that the band was in the baggage car, and when the companies left in the other cars, this car was left behind at the depot, and no orders reaching them to march, they remained in it, receiving continual insults from the rabble, which at length ripened into a dastardly attack. The doors of the car were closed by the band, and everything done to prevent a fight, but of no avail, for a shower of stones and bricks were poured upon it, and the roughs at last succeeded in forcing an entrance into it. At length the band left it, and endeavored to make their escape, leaving behind music, instruments, coats, caps, and haversacks. In vain they called for aid from the police. These fellows regarded them with no favor, but seemed to sympathize with the mob. After running some distance, and partially escaping from the mob, they encountered a party of Irish and German women, with some Americans, who took them to their houses, removed the stripes from their clothes, and also furnished them with old clothes for disguise, treating them in the kindest manner. All offers of money to those noble women, in consideration of their kind acts, were refused. The name of Ann Manly, the kind hostess, under whose roof they first found shelter, will never be forgotten by the band. During the afternoon a message was sent to the city officers, and in the evening a body of police was sent, who placed the band on board of the cars, and they started for Philadelphia, where they arrived the next day, and from thence returned to Lowell, arriving in Lowell April 22, 1861. Company A (National Greys), Lowell.—6th Reg.

Organized 1855, and were formerly called the Lawrence Cadets, but took their present name in 1860. This company, with Company C, Capt. Follansbee, Company D, Capt. Hart, and Company H, Capt. Noyes, all of Lowell, had but a few hours' notice to prepare for their departure; but so well was the time occupied that they were ready for duty at the time required. They assembled at Huntington Hall on the morning of the 16th of April, where were gathered a large crowd of friends to bid them God-speed and good-by. Mayor

Sergeant addressed the companies, assuring them that their ready response was appreciated by all, and that the city fathers would watch with interest their families, whose comfort and necessities would be an object of their special care. Demonstrations of a general public interest in their welfare were manifested, and means tendered to contribute to the comfort of the members. The companies left with the regiment for Boston, about noon the same day.

August 1. The regiment arrived in Boston, on their return from the seat of war, and the next day, the 2d, took cars for Lowell, and met with a grand reception, in which the Lowell companies were an object of especial pride and interest. The regiment here disbanded, and the companies dispersed to their several localities.

Company B (*Groton Artillery*), Groton.—6th Reg.

Col. Walter Shattuck, of Groton, states as follows respecting this company: On the nineteenth day of October, 1778, the major part of the Council of Massachusetts Bay issued a commission to Amos Farnsworth, of Groton, as first lieutenant in a company of matrosses or artillery, of Groton, raised in the sixth regiment of militia. Said commission is signed by fifteen of said council. I have it in my possession. Yet this company was under drill from two to three years prior to the date of this commission. Therefore we claim it to be the oldest military company now in the State, which retains its original organization and location, and has always been known as the Groton Artillery, and has ever retained at its headquarters in town two fine brass field pieces and equipments thereto, until the present rebellion broke out, and the fall of Fort Sumter, since which they have been removed to the seat of war. Yet this company for several years past has been known and done duty as Company B, in the 6th Regiment of Infantry, M. V. M. In the war of 1812-14, this company served a campaign as artillery, commanded by William Farnsworth; was stationed, with their battery, on Dorchester heights; and, whether as artillery, or infantry, or both, have ever been armed and equipped, *loyally* at their *posts*, for the defence of theirs and their country's *rights*. On the 15th of April, 1861, at 5 o'clock, P. M., Capt. E. S. Clark, the commander, received notice from the Colonel of the 6th Regiment, by express, that he must report himself and command the next morning for duty, and at half past ten the same evening, a special messenger arrived with official orders for the company, and that part of the field and staff located in Groton, to report themselves, armed and equipped for service, at Lowell, the next morning, at 7 o'clock, to join their regiment, to proceed at once to Washington. The remainder of that night was spent in rallying the company, and preparing to leave; certainly no ordinary task, when it is considered that the company left by the first train next morning, and joined the regiment punctually, and performed well their part in the acts of the "glorious Sixth," on their way to and at Washington. In addition to Col. Shattuck's statement, we will add that he has ever manifested a noble interest in this corps, and by word and deed has spared no effort to continue its existence, and promote its prosperity, and when the company was called to leave at a few hours notice, he rendered important aid; and after the regiment left Lowell, he returned to Groton, and rallied forward recruits to the company. The return of the company to Groton, in July, was an event of considerable note to the people, who justly felt proud of the honor they had conferred upon the town, and the services they had rendered the country. Their reception was a grand demonstration; all gave them a welcome; and, to use the words of one of their townsmen, "every one felt about a head taller, for having a company so ready to go, and so brave to perform."

Company C (*Mechanic's Phalanx*), Lowell. — 6th Reg.

Organized July 4, 1825. Received summons at 8 o'clock, P. M., April 15, and arrived in Boston the next day, at 12 o'clock; were quartered at Boylston Hall for the night, and the next day marched to the State House, changed their old muskets for Minnie rifles, and then marched to Boston and Worcester Railroad, where, with the regiment, they took the cars for Washington. Frank Calvert, whose name will be found in the list of privates, joined the company at Federal Hill, in the city of Baltimore, May 16, 1861. He had formerly been a resident of Lowell, and also a member of this company; but for three years had resided in Montgomery, Ala. When the news reached him that his old company (the Phalanx) had been attacked by a mob in Baltimore, he immediately left his business and property, amounting to about \$3,000, to join them. He reached Washington by the aid of a "rebel pass and seecesh badge." On entering the camp at Baltimore, his first remark was: "I have been a member of the Mechanic's Phalanx, but have never had the opportunity of doing real service for the country with you. I have come from Alabama for this express purpose, and wish to be called upon to assist in the hardest duty you may have to perform." For further particulars, see Co. A, page 196.

Company E (*Davis Guards*), Acton.—8th Reg.

Organized in 1857, and named in honor of Capt. Isaac Davis, who fell at Concord North Bridge, in 1775. The company was formed the same year that the monument was erected in Acton to commemorate the services of her gallant sons who fell at the opening of the Revolution. News of the capture of Fort Sumter was received in Acton on the morning of the 15th of April, and at 6 o'clock, P. M., the same day, orders were received by the Guards to join their regiment, to march for Washington immediately. They had met for drill, and held themselves in readiness for weeks, and the summons, though unexpected, did not find them wholly unprepared. Notice was immediately dispatched to the several members of the company, many of whom resided at a distance of several miles, to meet at their armory in the town hall, at 4 o'clock the next morning, prepared to go to Washington. Many of the members were engaged all night long, either in rallying their comrades, or in making hasty preparations for their departure. At length morning dawned, cold and rainy. The bells were rung long before daylight, and soon after the appointed hour the company assembled, to the number of about forty. After a little delay, a few parting words, and a brief but patriotic speech from Capt. Tuttle, they took their departure (in open wagons) for Lowell, in a drenching rain, amid the hearty cheers of all present. They started a little after daylight, and reached Lowell at 7½ A. M.

August 3. The company returned home, and their reception was spirited and grand. The town, at a meeting held for the purpose, had voted a liberal sum, to be expended in suitably celebrating the day. Refreshments and music were provided, and speakers addressed them; and three volunteer military companies, organized, drilled, and equipped with special reference to the occasion, performed escort duty, and, with Capt. Prescott's company, from Concord (of Bull Run fame), contributed much to the interest and pleasure of the day.

Since the return of the Davis Guards, another company of the same name, and including many of the members of the old company, has been formed and mustered into service for three years. This company rendezvoused, first at Camp Cameron, North Cambridge, and afterwards at Camp Chase, at Lowell, which they left about the nineteenth of November, to take passage for the South, in the steamer Constitution, and form a part of Gen. Butler's Brigade.

Company F (*Warren Light Guard*), Lawrence.—6th Reg.

Organized 1855. Named in honor of Gen. Joseph Warren, of Revolutionary fame. The breaking out of the rebellion found the military of Lawrence willing and anxious to do their part in the conflict. Late in the afternoon of April 15, 1861, Capt. Chadbourne, of Company F, and Capt. Pickering, of Company I, received orders to report themselves, with their companies, in Boston, at the earliest moment. They at once, with their clerks, commenced notifying their members, and the next morning their companies were ready to leave Lawrence, to join the Lowell companies, who composed a part of the regiment, to which they were attached. After bidding adieu to their friends and the thousands of citi-

zens who had thronged the streets and gathered about the depot, at 8 o'clock, A. M., all being in readiness, the train started amid the cheers and huzzas from the gathered multitude. At their arrival in Lowell, a great crowd was in attendance to welcome them. At 11 o'clock, A. M., they left, with the regiment, for Boston, where they were again met by thousands, who gave them a hearty reception. They at once proceeded to Faneuil Hall, made a short stay, then left for Boylston Hall, stayed there over night, next morning visited the State House for equipments, then left the city on the evening of the 17th of April, at 8 o'clock, for New York. On their return from the seat of war, they again visited Lowell, where the regiment was disbanded. On their arrival back to Lawrence, thousands again turned out to welcome them; a salute was fired; a procession was formed, composed of the Home Guards, Zouaves, Firemen, Mayor, Aldermen, and City Officers, and a cavalcade of citizens. Two beautiful floral cars, drawn by horses, and decorated with flags, evergreens, &c., formed a very attractive feature in the procession, — one containing thirty-four young ladies, dressed in red, white, and blue, representing the thirty-four States, the other containing thirteen young ladies, dressed in white, with black caps, white plumes, and black velvet sashes. Among these ladies rode Mrs. Needham, dressed in black, and Mr. Needham's two sisters. The whole affair was truly magnificent, and one never before seen in Lawrence. When the procession came to the residence of Corporal Needham, Col. Watson gave the orders to halt. The military then reversed arms, and the band played the dead march in respect to their brave comrade, who fell at the riot in Baltimore. The procession then continued its line of march to the common, where triumphal arches, beautifully decorated with appropriate mottoes, were erected at the entrance. Arriving at the common, Daniel Saunders, Jr., Esq., Ex-Mayor and Chief Marshal of the day, made a very elaborate introductory speech. Mayor Barker then welcomed them home again, to which Lieut.-Col. Watson replied. The companies were then escorted to their armories, which had been beautifully decorated by the citizens of Lawrence. Here a sumptuous collation awaited them, provided by the city and the citizens of Lawrence. Great credit is due to the city of Lawrence for the liberal manner in which they have provided for the volunteers, — having spent \$5,000 for the benefit of the three months' men, \$25,000 additional for other regiments, less \$5,000 for equipments; has now about 700 men in service; paid all expenses on reception of three months' men, — music, floral cars, &c. Capt. Chadbourne, of the Warren Light Guard, after being in Washington nineteen days, applied for his discharge, on account of sickness, and came home. Lieut. Melvin Beal was promoted to captain, receiving his commission the 8th day of May. A large part of the members of these two companies have re-enlisted in other regiments.

Company G (Worcester Light Infantry,) Worcester.—6th Reg.

Organized in 1803 by Hon. Levi Lincoln and a few associates. It was in the war of 1812 and '14 under the command of Captain John W. Lincoln, brother of its founder. Formerly Company B, 3d Battalion of Rifles, M. V. M., it was known in the three months' service as Company G, 6th Regiment. At 11 o'clock, P. M., April 16, 1861, the company received orders to report in Boston at noon the following day, to start for Washington. At the time of receiving orders, a severe storm was raging; and though its members were scattered in four towns, yet at 7 o'clock the next morning, ninety-seven men, including officers, had answered the summons, and were ready for duty. At 9 1-2 o'clock took up the line of march for the cars, escorted by other military organizations of the city, and attended by thousands of their friends, who had come out to bid them God-speed and a hasty God-bless-you! and to witness the departure of that old company, which had so promptly responded to the call, and which, for the second time in its history, was marching to the defence of an imperilled land. Reported at the State House, and were attached to the 6th Regiment, and left with them in the evening of the same day.

August 3. Returned to Worcester, and received a public reception the following day, together with a banquet, given by their fellow-citizens.

Company L (Stoneham Light Infantry), Stoneham.—6th Reg.

Organized 1851. This company, in April, 1861, belonged to the 7th Regiment as Company C. To complete the required number of troops for the 6th Regiment, it was detached, and annexed to the 6th, letter L. Captain Dike received orders at 2 o'clock on the morning of April 17 to appear in Boston that morning with his company at 11 o'clock. At an early hour the bells in Stoneham were rung, and the order was announced to the inhabitants, who united their efforts with the company, and in a few hours they left the town, a large

number of citizens of both sexes having assembled to witness their departure and exchange kind assurance. Prompt to the hour, he reported his company at the State House, and left with the regiment in the forenoon. The citizens of Stoneham made up a purse of \$500, and presented it to Captain Dike, just before he left home, for the benefit of the company. This amount was raised in about one hour. Two days afterwards, on the 19th, he was shot down in Baltimore while gallantly leading his company through the mob, receiving a wound in the leg, which will render him a cripple for life. In the regiment they, like the other companies, acted well their part; and for their prompt response in April, as well as subsequent acts, their townsmen hailed their return home not only with affectionate hearts, but a just pride. As they neared their homes, the people came out in crowds, with music and banners, to receive them, in carriages, on horseback, and on foot. They escorted them to the town, then feasted and addressed them, making it a truly festive occasion.

Eighth Regiment of Infantry.

(Three Months' Volunteers.)

We are indebted to Capt. George T. Newhall, of Company D, Lynn, for the following well written and highly interesting sketch of the movements and gallant deeds of the Eighth Regiment, during its three and a half months' campaign. It can be relied on as entirely correct, having been prepared with great care, the author having himself participated in most of the events herein narrated, and all of his facts having been substantiated by the most diligent and thorough inquiry. This record does especial honor to old Essex, and can be perused with patriotic pride, not only by the members of the Eighth, but by every son of Massachusetts.

The orders for the mustering of this regiment were issued on Monday, the 15th of April, 1861. The companies composing it received notice late in the afternoon of that day, causing intense excitement, not only in military circles, but among all classes. Great activity immediately prevailed, on the part of the soldiers and their friends, to promptly and efficiently answer the sudden requisition of the President. Flags were flung to the breeze, and the startling news was the theme of discussion at every street corner, and in every house. The men were hurriedly warned, and in the evening the several armories were crowded with citizens as well as soldiers, some of the former volunteering, while the men of property and business men contributed material aid in the most liberal and patriotic manner.

The morning of the 16th opened with a violent storm of sleet and snow. The companies rallied with the greatest promptness. Those from Marblehead were among the first to reach Boston, and immediately marched to Faneuil Hall. As the various companies arrived in the city they were surrounded by enthusiastic crowds, who followed them with cheers to the old "Cradle of Liberty." Notwithstanding the severe storm, the streets were crowded with people, who, with one accord, evinced their appreciation of the patriotic alacrity manifested by the troops. The soldiers expected to leave

Boston on the afternoon of that day; but all things not being in readiness, they slept in the hall during the night.

On the morning of the 17th, an election of regimental officers was held. Lieut. Col. Timothy Munroe, of Lynn, was elected Colonel, and, the office of Major being vacant, Adjutant E. W. Hinks, of Lynn, Lieut. Col.; Lieut. Andrew Elwell, of Co. G (Gloucester), was chosen Major. The men were furnished with overcoats, and, as far as possible, with knapsacks and haversacks.

During the forenoon of the 18th, the regiment were busily engaged in preparing for their departure. Company A, of the 7th Regiment, from Salem, arrived, and was attached to the regiment, to act as a right flank company of skirmishers,—to be known as Company J, and it was understood that Company A, of the 1st Battalion of Infantry, from Pittsfield, was to be joined, to act in the same capacity on the left flank, and to be known as Company K. At about one o'clock, P. M., the regiment was ordered to march to the State House. Upon their arrival there, supplies were furnished, and a standard presented by Governor Andrew, who addressed them as follows:

"Mr. Commander and Soldiers: Yesterday you were citizens; to-day you are heroes! Summoned by the sudden call of your country, true to the fortunes of your flag, to the inspiration of your own hearts, and to the mighty example of your fathers, you have hurried from the thronged towns of Essex, and all along the shore, from Boston to Cape Ann, famed through all Massachusetts for noble men, brave soldiers and heroic women. You have come to be cradled anew one night in Faneuil Hall, there breathing once more the inspiration of historic American liberty, and standing beneath the folds of the American banner. (Applause.)

"From the bottom of my heart of hearts, as the official representative of Massachusetts, I pay to you, soldiers, citizens and heroes, the homage of my most profound gratitude, and the heart of all Massachusetts beats with full sympathy to every word I utter. There is but one pulsation beating through all this beautiful domain of liberty, from the shores of Cape Cod to the hills of Berkshire; and the mountain waves and mountain peaks answer to each other. Soldiers, go forth, bearing that flag, and as our fathers fought, so, if need be, strike you the blow!

'Where breathes the foe but falls before us,
With freedom's soil beneath our feet,
And freedom's banner waving o'er us?'

"We stay behind to guard the hearthstones you have left, and whatever may be the future, we will protect the wives and children you may leave; and as you will be faithful to the country, so we will be faithful to them. (Applause.)

"I speak to you as citizens and soldiers, not of Massachusetts, but of the American Confederate Union. While we live, that Union shall last (applause), and until these countless thousands and all their posterity have tasted death. The Union of the American people, the heritage of Washington, shall be eternal. (Applause.)

"Soldiers! go forth, bearing with you the blessings of your country; bearing the confidence of your fellow-citizens, and, under the blessing of God, with stout hearts and stalwart frames, go forth to victory. On your shields be returned, or bring them with you. Yours it is to be among the advanced guard of Massachusetts soldiers; as such I bid you God-speed, and fare you well!"

At the close of the Governor's address, repeated and hearty cheers were given for the regiment and for Gen. Butler, who spoke as follows:—

"Soldiers! we stand upon that spot to which the good pleasure of the Commander-in-Chief and our own dearest wishes have assigned us. To lead the advanced guard of freedom, of constitutional liberty, and of perpetuity to the Union, is the honor we claim, and which, under God, we will maintain. (Applause.)

"Sons of Puritans, who believe in the Providence of Almighty God; as he was with our Fathers, so may he be with us in this strife for the right, for the good of all, for the great missionary country of liberty. (Applause.) And if we prove recreant to our trust, may the God of battles prove our enemy in the hour of our utmost need.

"Soldiers! we march to-night; and let me say for you all to the good people of the Commonwealth, that we will not turn back till we show those who have laid their hands upon the fabric of the Union, there is but one thought in the North,—'the union of these States, now and forever, one and inseparable.'"

The regiment returned to their headquarters, and, after partaking of a collation, re-formed, and proceeded to the Worcester depot, and embarked for New York, accompanied by Gen. Butler, who was to command the expedition. The excitement, as the cars emerged from the depot, beggars description. Thousands of people surrounded it, choking every avenue to its approach. Windows, fences, wagons, house-tops, lumber yards, and every place affording a possible foothold, were crowded with men, women, and children, cheering, shouting, and waving handkerchiefs, hats, &c., until the train had passed out of sight.

As they paused at Worcester they were loudly welcomed, and in answer to the calls of the multitude, Gen. Butler said: "Let us swear as we love our mothers, as we cherish our sisters, and honor our fathers, as we hope for heaven hereafter, to maintain inviolate the union of these States. It matters not whether the traitors be North or South, their manifest wickedness appears. I hold him for my personal enemy who strikes for the Union against such traitors, and he is a personal enemy who whispers aught against it. In this contest we banish party differences. We are all Americans who

love our country and its flag. And it is only by the sword we can have peace, and only in the Union liberty."

At Springfield ample preparations had been made to receive them. A correspondent says:—

"At a little after ten o'clock we arrived at Springfield. The reception here was a grand ovation. I make the number low when I say that five thousand people, including five or six military companies, and as many fire companies, turned out to receive us. Indeed, it seemed as though we were war-worn veterans returning from victorious battle-fields, covered with glory, rather than untried recruits and volunteer militia, on the way to duty for the protection of our common flag. We were ushered into the city amid the ringing of bells, the blazing of bonfires, firing of cannon, and inspiring music of military bands. It made our hearts bound with joy, to find so many warm and truly patriotic hearts in Western Massachusetts."

Here the Pittsfield company, before-mentioned, joined the regiment, which now consisted of ten companies,—a total of more than 700 men. As the troops proceeded through Connecticut, although it was past midnight, they found crowds of people at all the stations, ready to welcome them, and bid them God-speed.

At six o'clock next morning the train arrived in New York, and the regiment immediately took up the line of march. A portion of the companies halted at the La Farge House, while the others proceeded to the Astor House, at which places they partook of a bountiful breakfast. At 11 o'clock they proceeded to the Park, and were received by an impromptu gathering of thousands, who cheered them to the echo. They remained here but a short time, and then marched to Jersey Ferry, attended by an increasing throng of spectators.

Before leaving Jersey City, Col. Munroe, being loudly called for, appeared, surrounded by his staff, when A. W. Griswold, Esq., a member of the New York bar, and formerly of Boston, stepped forward, holding a magnificent silk flag, mounted on a massive hickory staff. He addressed the commander of the regiment as follows:—

"Col. Munroe. Sir: You are from Massachusetts; 'God bless her!' Her sons everywhere are proud of her history, and while her armies are commanded by such officers as are now at their head, we have faith in her future. As a son of Massachusetts I beg to present this standard as a token of my appreciation of the cause in which you are engaged. I confide it to your keeping,—'stand by it.'"

Col. Munroe responded with the following appropriate and eloquent remark:—

"As a son of Massachusetts I receive it from a son of her soil, and I will defend it; 'God help me.'"

The cheering which followed was deafening. Nine cheers were proposed and given for the flag, and three more for the "Old Bay State."

Their progress through New Jersey was but a repetition—so far as the people were concerned—of what they had witnessed since leaving home. At about six o'clock in the evening they reached Philadelphia, where they received the first authentic information of the attack on the Sixth Regiment in Baltimore. The news had just been announced in extras; the streets were thronged with people, and the reception of the troops was of a more exciting nature than anything they had yet experienced. The crowd was so dense that it was with the greatest difficulty that the regiment could march, even in file, through the broad streets. After partaking of an excellent supper at the "Continental," the troops were quartered for the night at the Girard House, opposite, which had been untenanted for some time. During the night the New York Seventh Regiment arrived.

*Early next morning active preparations were commenced for pushing on to Baltimore. General Butler called for volunteers to form a corps of about forty sappers and miners. Nearly a hundred immediately stepped forward. Out of these he selected the desired number, who were supplied with axes, picks, crowbars, shovels, &c., for the purpose of removing barricades or other obstructions in the streets of Baltimore. Lieut. Col. Hinks volunteered to take command of this corps, and appointed Lieut. Berry, of Company D (Lynn), to act as his lieutenant. General Butler had requested the New York regiment to accompany his command to Washington, and up to this time the men of the Eighth had supposed that such was the understanding. But the commander of the Seventh had declined this proposal, and the General decided to proceed without them. About noon, the arrangements being completed, the regiment marched to the depot, and took the cars (as they supposed) for Baltimore. They fully expected to find, long before reaching there, the track torn up, and their progress opposed, at least, by an armed mob, if not by organized troops.

A word of explanation in regard to the sudden change of route may not be improper in this connection. The position of affairs cannot be better explained than in the language of General Butler, in his statement written during the night of April 19th. The whole of the report in question may be found on the 22d page of the Adjutant-General's Report.

* The Adjutant-General's Report contains a statement, the effect of which, though without design, is to mislead the reader. On the 21st page of that document, under the caption "*Memorial of plan and reasons for proceeding to Annapolis*," Gen. Butler, in a dispatch to Gov. Andrew, said: "I have detailed Captain Devereux and Captain Briggs, with their commands, supplied with one day's rations and twenty rounds of ammunition, to take possession of the ferry-boat at Havre-de-Grace, for the benefit of this expedition," &c. In the absence of any further evidence, the natural inference is that these companies proceeded to Havre-de-Grace and took possession of the boat. Such, however, is not the fact. In pursuance of the above plan, these companies, about half-past one Saturday morning, were directed to march to the depot, there to await further orders. They did so; but for good reasons no further orders were sent, and the companies remained at the depot, where the regiment subsequently joined them.

* * * "The citizens of Baltimore," says Gen. Butler, "at a large meeting this evening, denounced the passage of Northern troops. They have exacted a promise from the President of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Company not to send troops over that road through Baltimore; so that any attempt to throw troops into Baltimore entails a march of forty miles, and an attack upon a city of two hundred thousand inhabitants at the beginning of the march. The only way, therefore, of getting communication with Washington for troops from the North, is over the Baltimore & Ohio Railway or marching from the West. * * * My proposition is to join with Col. Lefferts of the Seventh Regiment of New York. I propose to take the fifteen hundred troops to Annapolis, arriving there to-morrow about four o'clock, and occupy the capital of Maryland, and thus call the State to account for the death of Massachusetts men, my friends and neighbors. If Col. Lefferts thinks it more in accordance with the tenor of his instructions to wait rather than go through Baltimore, I still propose to march with this regiment. I propose to occupy the town, and hold it open as a means of communication," &c., &c.

The excitement of the people of Baltimore at this date, and for several days following, amounted almost to frenzy. Many of the people believed that, in retaliation for the assault on the Sixth Regiment, their city would be attacked and destroyed, and its citizens indiscriminately slaughtered. And even these fears were less than their "horrible imaginings." It was a city divided against itself; the secession element was predominant and rampant; and the considerable number of Union men in the city took their lives in their hands if they ventured to express themselves in opposition to the will of the supposed majority. To have expected with seven hundred infantry to pass through such a city in such a humor, would have been madness. But, without further digression, we resume the narrative.

The same correspondent before quoted, says:—

"When we arrived at a small station about thirty miles from Perryville, the report came that 1600 Baltimoreans were in position at the latter place, to dispute our passage to the Capital; and it was also reported that they had taken possession of the ferry boat, and had her anchored in the stream. The regiment was supplied with ball cartridges, ten rounds to a man; and, as almost every man had a "six-shooter," we could give the mob sixteen rounds of lead, and the balance in steel!

"As the train continued on its way towards the ferry, the men commenced to load their muskets and revolvers. The report came so direct, and being confirmed, as we thought, by a subsequent messenger, we made up our minds that a fight must come off in half an hour's time."

On arriving within about half a mile of Perryville, opposite Havre-de-Grace, the cars stopped, the regiment disembarked and formed, and prepared to repel an attack. Company J (of Salem), Capt. Devereux, was thrown forward, the sappers and miners immediately in their rear, and these in turn were covered by Company K (of Pittsfield,) Capt. Briggs. The main body of the regiment followed closely. There proved to be no armed organization to dispute the passage of the troops; but a number of men had assembled, doubtless with the intention of obstructing the progress of any body of men unprovided with arms, as was the case with General Small's Brigade, of Pennsylvania, which was driven back from Baltimore, on their way to Washington (where they were to be armed), the day before. The regiment moved forward, and at the execution of the "double-quick," the crowd rapidly dispersed. The steamer, a very large ferry-boat, called the Maryland, being in its slip, was instantly taken, without firing a shot.

After the necessary delay caused by getting the baggage aboard, which occupied two hours, the boat started at about sunset. An hour later the men were served with rations, and still later, the boat being in the wide waters of the Chesapeake Bay, and to prevent accident, the muskets were discharged into the water. A correspondent says:—

"And now began our discomforts, which soon enough became sufferings of the severest kind. More than seven hundred men were crowded upon the lower deck of this ferry-boat, with nothing but the floor for our bed. The men were stowed so closely that it was with difficulty that the officers of the guard, in their round of duty, could find floor enough to tread upon. Many of the men were obliged to lie near the engine where the heat was intolerable. Notwithstanding this, worn down by the labors, the privations and the excitement of the past week, we 'slept well.' Not long after midnight, all were aroused by the beating of the drums, and leaped to their feet. A boat had approached near to the steamer, and those on board gave no satisfactory response when challenged by the sentinel. They proved however to be friends, and our men addressed themselves to the business before them—the finishing of their naps.

"Bright and early we awoke to find ourselves in the harbor of Annapolis, the capital of Maryland. It was Sunday morning, April 21st. Here we found the frigate Constitution, the most famous ship in the navy, —

'Old Ironsides at anchor laid,'

serving as a school-ship for the 'middies' of the naval academy situated at this place."

General Butler immediately proceeded to anticipate the treasonable designs of the secessionists by taking possession of the old frigate. Companies J and K, with the sappers and miners, were ordered on board, and arrangements were made to tow her over the bar at the entrance of the harbor. The commandant of the Constitution, Capt. Rogers, not having crew enough to work her, or defend her in case of attack, had made preparation to blow her up if necessary to prevent her falling into the hands of the enemy. There were sixty thousand pounds of powder on board, and a sailor was still

stationed at the magazine (not having been relieved), with a slow match, ready to light and apply at the proper time.

It was found necessary to lighten her so as to lessen her draft of water. A number of her heaviest guns having been removed to the upper deck of the Maryland, the latter attempted to tow her out of the harbor into deep water, but both got aground and were unable to move. Great efforts were made to float them, but without effect. It was rumored that the rebels were assembling in the surrounding country, and an attack from the shore or from some steamer was hourly expected. The rising tide, which was looked forward to as likely to float the vessels, had no effect, and they still remained motionless. It was generally believed on board the Maryland that the pilots were treacherous, and had purposely run the vessels on to the bar, hoping, by the delay thus caused, that the whole regiment as well as the Constitution would be captured by secession steamers from Baltimore. It is more probable, however, that the grounding was accidental. In the midst of the efforts to "keep moving," the cable by which the Constitution was being towed parted, which naturally caused the Maryland to lurch heavily in an unexpected direction. To guard against the possibility of treachery, members of the regiment who understood the running of a steam engine were detailed to assist and perhaps to watch the engineers of the boat; but it is certain that the engineers and pilots remained at their respective posts until the regiment landed.

Before sunrise on Monday morning the men were aroused from their slumbers and mustered on the upper deck. A steamer was discerned in the offing, but at such a distance that it was impossible even with a powerful glass to distinguish her flag. It proved to be the steamer Boston, from Philadelphia, having on board the New York 7th Regiment, Col. Lefferts.

She promptly came to the assistance of the Maryland. A cable was rigged, and the most determined efforts made for several hours to start her, but in vain. The Boston then proceeded to the wharf and landed her troops.

Meanwhile, in fact on Sunday evening, the commander of the Constitution having given up all hopes of being towed off the bar, had ordered his temporary crew — the companies before mentioned — to "kedge" the vessel, — a very laborious process, — which was continued from that time till Tuesday morning almost without intermission, to get her into deep water, and with sea-room enough to enable him to train her guns in case of attack. At length the Boston came to his assistance, and towed the frigate out a sufficient distance to enable her to "go alone."

Company K now received orders to proceed to fort McHenry, Baltimore, there being but a small garrison there, and fears of an attack on it being entertained. They took passage in a tug-boat, and, when within a few miles of the fort, they were informed that a small government steamer had been seized by the secessionists in that vicinity. They immediately went in search of her, and found the United States steamer Alleghany lying at her moorings, without any sufficient crew to prevent capture. The statement that she had already been seized thus proved to be premature. Company K took possession of the steamer, and anchored her under the guns of fort McHenry. They remained here about three weeks.

On board the Constitution two days were spent in bending sails and making ready, and at length the old ship started on her voyage to New York, where she arrived safely on the 28th of April. The soldiers, who had thus worked their passage, remained at the Astor House six days awaiting transportation by water, receiving the hospitalities and congratulations of the citizens, and on the 4th of May took passage in the steamer Roanoke for Washington, where they arrived on Wednesday, May 8th, and rejoined the regiment.

But to return to the Maryland. A letter thus speaks of the sufferings of the men on board this steamer: —

"On Monday our rations, which at best were mere chips and scraps, had for some time been exhausted, and their place supplied with pilot-bread from the Constitution, stamped '1848,'* the year it was made, and salt pork bearing the same brand, which as there was no means of cooking, we were obliged to eat raw or not at all. The bread seemed about as hard as a brick, and many of our men could not bite it unless it was soaked in water. Such had been our diet for twenty-four hours. Many preferred to fast. Shortly after this our water gave out, and the salt pork which the men had eaten caused intense thirst. Salt water only could be procured, but this was eagerly drank by some, making them more thirsty than ever. These hardships, and a lack of sleep, had almost crazed some of the men. In fact, one of them was entirely overcome, and on our landing at Annapolis he was placed in the hospital. But on the afternoon of Monday, a boat was procured and a detachment of men rowed to an island in the harbor, on which a light-house stands, where they obtained a good supply of water."

About two o'clock on Tuesday morning, the "launch" of the Constitution, a boat capable of carrying about fifty men, having been procured, the Maryland being still aground, the transportation of the troops to the wharf was begun, and, the Boston presently coming to the rescue, was soon accomplished. The men, being completely worn down, slept soundly till sunrise.

* Improbable as this statement may seem, it is nevertheless true. It should be remarked that the Constitution had not been cruising for a number of years, but had for a large part of the time been used for the purpose of a school-ship. It appears that the provision in question had been stored years before, and, but for the extraordinary events of last April, would probably never have been cut up into rations, for which it was so ill adapted. All supplies for the government, whether for the army or navy, are stamped with the date of their purchase; and this sea-bread and pork was in barrels, or other original packages, bearing the date before mentioned. It is, perhaps, unnecessary to add that the pork was in a miserable condition.

In the meantime, General Butler, having learned that the Annapolis and Elkridge railroad, which leads from Annapolis to Washington, had been seized by the enemy, prepared to take possession of it. Company C (of Marblehead), Capt. Martin, and D (of Lynn), Capt. Newhall, under Lieut. Col. Hinks, also a number of men who understood steam engines, were detailed for this purpose. On arriving at the depot, which is situated about a mile and a half from the naval academy, they found the gates locked — the buildings of the corporation, occupying perhaps an acre of ground, being surrounded by a very high and close fence. Resistance being useless, the few men inside the enclosure opened the gates, and the companies passed in. They found the engines had been damaged, and were, for any immediate purpose, useless. Major Winthrop, in the *Atlantic Monthly*, thus speaks of this matter: —

"The engine — a frowzy machine at best — had been purposely disabled. Here appeared the *deus ex machina*, Charles Homans, Beverly Light Infantry, Company E, Eighth Massachusetts Regiment. That is the man, name and titles in full, and he deserves well of his country. He took a quiet squint at the engine, — it was helpless as a boned turkey, — and he found "Charles Homans, his mark," written all over it. The old rattletrap was an old friend. He had a share in building it. The machine and the man said "How d'y' do?" at once. Homans called for a gang of engine-builders. Of course they swarmed out of the ranks. They passed their hands over the locomotive a few times, and presently it was ready to whistle and wheeze and rumble and gallop, as if no traitor had ever tried to steal the go and the music out of it."

On the afternoon of the same day, Company C pushed out on the line of the railroad several miles, on a scouting expedition. They found the rails torn up in many places, and had abundant other evidence that they were in the enemy's country. They occupied, during the night, a cornfield about a mile from town.

Company D held possession of the depot grounds during the latter part of the day, undisturbed, save by an evil-disposed crowd who indulged in malicious remarks and occasional threats. About dark, a relief detachment from various companies, under command of Lieut. Low of Company G (Gloucester), arrived, and although the occasional reports of a musket or pistol were heard in the neighborhood, the night passed without an attack or alarm. In the morning General Butler ordered this company and the detailed men back to Annapolis.

The six other companies of the regiment bivouacked at the academy grounds, and were aroused a little before midnight by the appearance of suspicious vessels in the offing. These proved to be quite a fleet of steamers bearing a number of regiments from Massachusetts, New York, Rhode Island, &c.

At sunrise next morning, April 24th, these companies, after a very light repast, started on their celebrated "march to the junction," a distance of about twenty-two miles, accompanied by the New York Seventh. They took the line of the railroad. The Eighth on the right. The Seventh took with them their two howitzers, which were propelled at first by an engine on a platform car, but afterwards drawn by the men. Company C, about the same hour, left their quarters, "down in the cornfield," and, preceding the column, about a mile or two in advance, busied themselves by re-laying the track. The laborers who had last worked on this road had not done their job very thoroughly, for the displaced rails were generally found by the side of the track, or in the neighboring bushes. One, however, was positively among the missing, until private Frank Pierce suggested that it might be in a small creek which ran by the side of the road-bed; without hesitation he plunged in, and found the needed rail. In the afternoon this company returned to Annapolis upon a car.

The main column gradually advanced, bringing with them a carload of rails, for the purpose of filling any vacancies which might occur, — of which they soon found a plenty. In one place, part of a bridge which spanned a small stream was so badly charred that it was unsafe for the engine to attempt to cross it. Sergeant Scott, of the Seventh, cut down a tall tree, and, with the aid of several comrades, hewed it into shape, and soon made the bridge as good as ever it was, if not better. Thus this self-constituted "committee of ways and means" journeyed forward, showing by their works that they were in favor of "internal improvements."

During the day, the men saw a large number of horsemen, — although, generally, not more than two were together. They would occasionally ride up to the column and make various inquiries. The point upon which they were most inquisitive, was, which was the Massachusetts, and which the New York regiment. Sometimes twenty or thirty could be seen in the fields and woods that skirted the track. In the course of the afternoon, a violent thunder shower burst upon the troops, from which they sought shelter among the trees. The shower was soon over, and the slow and laborious advance was resumed.

At five o'clock, no rations for the Eighth had arrived; those of the Seventh, however, were on hand; but though these were scarcely enough for themselves, they immediately, in the most generous manner, offered to share them with the men of the Eighth; an offer which an abstinence of twelve hours of hardship rendered it impossible to decline. Night was closing in, and not more than half the journey had been accomplished. The day had been hot, and the men sorely needed rest. But the order was to push on to the junction; and on pushed the weary brigade.

They had reason to expect a night attack. The country was wild; — sometimes their route lay through an open and level region, which afforded an excellent opportunity for the wandering horsemen, who had accosted them during the day, to ride up near them, fire, and then scamper away; and sometimes through deep and long cuts, from

the tops of which a murderous shower of stones might have been rained down upon heads unprotected by any bucklers, classic or otherwise. Had they paused to rest, it is doubtful if the men could have kept awake. As it was, some of them went to sleep, but still kept "marching on." Fortunately the night was pleasant, and the moon just at its full. The grey light of the morning found them at the never-to-be-forgotten "Annapolis Junction." Of course, the men dropped — to sleep — almost as though they had been shot.

After a few hours rest, they awoke, to find themselves suffering terribly with hunger. But food was still only among the things hoped for. The few people who inhabited this rough and inhospitable region, and who, through ignorant fear, had fled to the woods at the approach of the troops, gradually ventured back when they found their buildings were not destroyed, and a few eatables were obtained from them, which were scrupulously paid for. But only enough food was found to sharpen the appetites of those who were so fortunate as to get any, and to exasperate those who were so unfortunate as to get none.

The companies before mentioned as detailed for special duty, after their share of rest, — part of a night's sleep, but without any breakfast, and they had gone almost supperless to bed, — proceeded to rejoin their comrades. Leaving the academy grounds about half-past four in the morning, they marched to the depot. Here a few negro venders of pies, coffee, etc., had convened. They had evidently got over their fright, and concluded that there was a chance to turn an honest penny. They were right. After an hour or two's delay, a train of platform and freight cars was made up, which slowly and cautiously felt its way along towards the junction. So persistent were the traitors who infested this region, that the track, which had been so carefully repaired but a few hours before, had again at intervals been torn up or obstructed. A number of rails were missing: in one place a tall tree had been felled across the track, and in another a large log was lashed to the rails. But all these obstacles were finally overcome. About noon the train arrived at its destination, and the regiment, excepting the companies on board the Constitution and at Fort McHenry, was together again. In the course of the day, a train of cars having arrived, the Seventh proceeded to Washington.

A little after sunset, a big ox, which General Butler had bought at Annapolis, arrived safely, together with bread and coffee. Large fires were built; and as soon as the volunteer cooks could conscientiously announce "roast-beef rare," there was a "forward movement," worthy of the occasion. In a few minutes, hundreds of half-starved men were strolling or running about, — their mouths and their hands full of hot beef. It was a sight to be remembered. The camp fires were replenished, and the men, excepting the pickets and the quarter guard, soon sunk to still much needed sleep.

The New York Seventy-First arrived during the night, and in the morning several other regiments. About ten o'clock in the morning, a long train of empty cars arrived from Washington, about twenty miles distant, and the Eighth, with some other troops, embarked for the Capital. After some little delay, but without impediment, they reached Washington, at one o'clock P. M., on Friday the 26th day of April, eight days after leaving Boston, having suffered more than some regiments that were in the Mexican war, according to the testimony of several members of this regiment who went through that war.

The day was excessively hot, and the men, encumbered with overcoats, knapsacks, haversacks, &c., suffered severely. The regiment marched to the White House, and passed in review before the President. They then proceeded to the Capitol, and took up their quarters in the rotunda and the old House of Representatives.

The *National Intelligencer*, of the next day, said: —

"We doubt whether any other single regiment in the country could furnish such a ready contingent to reconstruct a steam engine, lay a rail-track, and bend the sails of a man-of-war."

It was several days before the commissary department was in good working order, and the men were still on a short allowance. This matter was soon set right; but not until the New York Seventh, which was quartered in another part of the building, had availed themselves of the opportunity to again show their liberality by providing, at their private expense, a bounteous repast, which act of unexpected generosity was appropriately acknowledged by the Eighth.

It is proper to remark in this connection, that the lack of food, from which the men had suffered so long, was in no wise owing to the fault of the regimental Quartermaster. When the regiment left Philadelphia, a sufficient supply was taken to last forty-eight hours, within which time it was reasonable to suppose they would be in Washington. Instead of which, three days elapsed before they landed at Annapolis, and nearly four more before they reached the Capital. The people of Annapolis at this time were mainly secessionists, and the few Union men there were overawed and suppressed. There was a complete reign of terror in this little city; many of the citizens had fled, and those who remained, though influenced by opposite motives, had locked up their bowels of compassion as well as their stores, refusing to give or to sell anything. At most there could not have been much of a supply in the place. At Washington the "red-tape" war had to be fought through, and the question of jurisdiction settled. The Quartermaster was referred from one official to another, each one asserting that the regi-

ment did not belong in his department. Finally this knot was untied, and the days of the famine were ended.

On Saturday, April 27th, Colonel Munroe addressed a letter to the President, stating that the uniforms had become so damaged and defaced, that they were wholly unfit to appear on parade; and requesting him to cause to be furnished a fatigue dress, similar to that worn by the regular army. Half an hour after its delivery the following note was received:—

EXECUTIVE MANSION, April 27, 1861.

Col. T. Munroe, Commanding Eighth Regiment Massachusetts V. M.

SIR:—Yours of this day, in regard to fatigue dress for your command, has been received, and sent to the war department, with the expression of my wish that your request be complied with.

Allow me now to express to you, and through you to the officers and men under your command, my sincere thanks for the zeal, energy, and gallantry, and especially for the great efficiency in opening the communication between the North and this city, displayed by you and them.

Yours, truly,

ABRAHAM LINCOLN.

Several days later, the uniforms asked for were received and distributed. They consisted of a pair of blue pants, a blouse of the same color, with army buttons, and a blue forage cap. On Tuesday, April 30th, the regiment was mustered into the United States service for the term of three months, by Major, now Major-General, McDowell. A few days after this, Colonel Munroe, on account of his feeble health and advanced age, resigned his commission, and was honorably discharged.

On the evening of Saturday, May 11, orders were telegraphed directing companies A, C, D, and J, to report for duty forthwith at the Relay House, each man with forty rounds of ammunition, and one day's rations; but at midnight the order was countermanded. On the next Tuesday morning, however, the whole regiment was ordered to proceed to this same station, to supply the place of the New York 8th, which was ordered elsewhere,—and about noon they arrived there, where they found the Massachusetts 6th, and Cook's (Boston) Battery, encamped, making, with the 8th, a total of about sixteen hundred men. Their camp equipage not having arrived, they bivouacked on the hill-side, near the railroad, and within the limits of settlement known as ElkrIDGE Landing. The same night Ross Winans, of Baltimore, the famous steam-gun man, was arrested in the cars at the station. Next day the tents arrived about dusk, and were immediately pitched, and the encampment was designated "Camp Essex."

The importance of this post can hardly be overestimated. At this point, about nine miles from Baltimore, the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad branches off to Washington, the only direct northern connection with the Capital, and passes over a massive stone viaduct, the destruction of which, by blowing up, might be easily accomplished in the absence of a vigilant guard, and the loss of which would prove, to say the least, a serious inconvenience to the government, and obstruction to the cause. While the regiment remained here, scarcely a day passed but on an average from three to five thousand troops were carried over it to Washington.

For several nights there were frequent alarms; the "long roll" was beaten, and the men, aroused from their slumbers, were quickly on line, and ready for duty; but the alarms proved groundless. On the 16th, Co. K returned from Fort McHenry, and an election was held to fill the vacancy caused by Col. Munroe's resignation. Lieut.-Col. Hinks was chosen Colonel; Major Elwell, Lieut.-Colonel; and Major Ben: Perley Poore was chosen Major.

During the months of May and June, the men received from home large supplies of underclothing, together with towels, havelocks, books, and many other useful articles, which were fully appreciated. The 17th of June was celebrated by firing a Federal salute. The regiment was drawn up in line on the brow of the hill, and fired simultaneously.

On the 20th inst., the regiment received a magnificent silk standard from the lady friends of the New York 7th Regiment, accompanying which was a letter from General Butler, to whom the standard had been sent, on the supposition that he was still with the regiment,—and also a letter from the ladies aforesaid.

On the 27th of June, the right wing of the regiment was ordered to Baltimore. Various other regiments, among them the Massachusetts 6th, were at the same time ordered to that city. In the evening Marshal Kane was arrested by order of General Banks. The Board of Police published a protest against it; but the next day they, also, were quietly arrested. On the second of July, the right wing was sent on an expedition to the neighborhood of a place known as St. Michael, nearly a hundred miles from Baltimore, to arrest one "Capt. Tilghman," as he was called, a noted secessionist, and the commander of a mixed battalion of cavalry and infantry. They took passage in a tug-boat, and reached their destination about four o'clock next morning. This expedition proved to be a "surprise party" to the Captain, who, instead of being prepared to make a stout resistance, was asleep in his house, and there was no appearance of any of his command in the vicinity. He was taken in charge without delay. They had expected to find a large number of arms secreted on his premises, but a thorough search resulted in discovering only two or three muskets.

On the evening of July 2nd, — the 6th having just returned to the Relay Station, — the left wing of the 8th, which had held sole possession of this post during the interval, was directed to rejoin the right wing at Baltimore the following day. The reveille was sounded about three o'clock next morning, and, by the light of a waning moon, the men struck the camp and prepared for their departure. They reached their destination — a spot known as "Stewart's Wood," in the western suburbs of Baltimore — that forenoon, about 11 o'clock. The right wing did not get back from St. Michael till evening. The same day Company F, Captain Hudson, was detailed to take charge of a cargo of ammunition bound for Fortress Monroe, — a steamer not thus protected having been captured a few days before.

On the morning of the "Fourth," the Manchester (N. H.) Cornet Band arrived from Washington, whither they had accompanied the 2nd N. H. Regiment, and reported for duty; — arrangements having been made to secure their services for the remainder of the campaign. This anniversary was not celebrated at "Camp Andrew," — such was the name of the new camp, — except by the performance of a few patriotic airs by the band, and the omission of the usual drills.

The next day a large American flag, intended for the flag-staff, was received from the ladies of Lynn, and presented by Major Poore. Company H, Capt. Boardman, was despatched on a similar errand to that of Company F, before mentioned. On Monday, the 15th instant, the regiment marched to Fort McHenry, a distance of about six miles, where they were reviewed by General Banks. They manœuvred for an hour or two in presence of the General and Lieut.-Colonel Morris, the commander at the fort, both of whom privately expressed their satisfaction at the proficiency of the regiment.

The battle of Bull Run occurred on Sunday, the 21st inst. News that it was going on reached the camp in the early part of the evening, and two or three hours later, orders were received from General Banks that the men should be supplied with the full complement of ammunition, — forty rounds to each man, — and that the regiment should be ready for duty at a moment's warning. The disastrous result of the battle had probably been learned at the fort, and fears were entertained of a rising among the secessionists of Baltimore. Doubtless the number of troops in and around the city alone prevented this additional catastrophe. The day after, when the full extent of the defeat became known, the companies expressed a willingness, and some of them voted, to remain in service beyond their term of enlistment, now near its expiration, in case the government desired it.

A few days before leaving for home, another handsome silk banner was presented to the regiment, by the loyal citizens of Baltimore, making the fourth similar token it had received since starting from Boston. Company F, of Lynn, was also the recipient of a silk American flag, from some of its friends in the city.

On the afternoon of the 29th of July, the tents were struck for the last time, and, all things being in readiness, about midnight the regiment took up its line of march homeward-bound. As they proceeded through the city, they were cordially saluted by the people. Many a "Three cheers for the Massachusetts Eighth," a waving of handkerchiefs, and a hearty shaking of hands, with "Good-by, boys," and, "Come back again," attested the good feelings that existed.

Freight cars, with rough and narrow seats, afforded the only accommodations for sleeping during the night, and in fact the regiment rode in no others than these, and in what had been cattle cars, until they arrived at Fall River, Mass. During the next day, as they proceeded slowly homeward, they were patriotically greeted by all classes of people, many of whom had learned by the papers that the "Massachusetts Eighth," which they had not forgotten, was to pass through on that day. With frequent tedious delays of several hours, caused by waiting for other trains, &c., but without especial incident, they finally reached Jersey City at twelve o'clock on Tuesday night, twenty-four hours after leaving Baltimore; a distance which should have been accomplished in about one third that time. Being too tired to look for other lodgings, having rested but little the night previous, the men remained on the platform of the covered depot, seeking (and finding) repose, as they had done before, on the "soft side of a pine plank;" and probably they never slept better in their lives.

About seven o'clock in the morning, the regiment crossed the ferry, and were met at the foot of Courtlandt Street by a committee of the "Sons of Massachusetts," who escorted them to the Park Barracks, where the men partook of a substantial and bountiful repast. The officers, by invitation of the committee, proceeded to the Astor House, where they enjoyed a social breakfast.

At nine o'clock, the Seventh Regiment reached the Park, where they stacked arms, and were soon extensively fraternizing with their late fellow campaigners. After these "merry meetings," at about eleven o'clock the Eighth resumed their muskets, and, under escort of the Seventh, the First Chasseurs, and the Sons of Massachusetts, moved up Broadway to Madison Square. Here they again stacked arms and broke ranks. The soldiers of the Eighth were hospitably taken in charge by their companions of the Seventh, while the officers were invited to a collation at the Fifth Avenue Hotel. An agreeable hour was spent in the enjoyment of speeches and sentiments, when the column resumed its march to the East River, where, amid the hearty adieus of their companions, and the cheers of the crowd, the regiment embarked on board the steamer Bay State, bound for Fall River.

On reaching that city, they found a substantial breakfast, furnished by its generous inhabitants, awaiting them. John Westall, Esq., a prominent citizen of the place, in a brief and pertinent manner, welcomed them to the soil of Massachusetts, and — to the

enjoyment of their excellent appetites. They immediately after took the cars, and arrived in Boston a little before noon, on Thursday, the 1st of August. On alighting from the cars, the men were instantly surrounded by their friends from the various towns and cities to which the companies belonged, and the congratulations which ensued delayed the formation of the regimental line nearly half an hour, and made the military reception which awaited them to seem of but little importance. At length, under escort of the Second Battalion of Infantry, the regiment moved forward, and, after a circuitous march, amid the joyful greetings of all sorts of people, arrived at the Common. Having partaken of a frugal lunch, provided by the city, the order was given to unsling knapsacks, which being done, and the men divested of all incumbrance, Colonel Hinks manœuvred them in battalion movements for nearly two hours. The regiment having, during their term of service, undergone a thorough course of drill, had attained a high degree of proficiency; and their execution of these movements was greeted with loud cheers by the thousands of spectators assembled upon the Common. After passing in review before the Mayor, the regiment formed square in four ranks, facing inwards, and listened to the farewell address of their commander. Mayor Wightman then made a few appropriate remarks, when the square was reduced, and the companies, having wheeled into column, were respectively mustered out of service.

They immediately took passage for their several homes, where, amid the ringing of bells and firing of cannon, they were welcomed by the entire population with a heartiness and fervor of which these outward demonstrations afforded but a faint conception.

It is only justice to say that the various duties these men had performed were of great value to the country. They had, almost at a moment's warning, left their families and their affairs unprovided for and unarranged, trusting to the patriotic humanity of their fellow-citizens and of the State to make all needful provision for the immediate or the final contingency. They had started, in the midst of a pelting storm, for the first rendezvous, not even properly clad, and from thence, not fully equipped, had pushed forward on their perilous errand.

It is true they did not have, as they expected to, an opportunity of meeting the enemy, although they evinced every disposition to do so; but in the faithful performance of the many active and responsible duties required of them, they had done the cause efficient service, and worthy of an honorable page in their country's history. More than three months had passed, and they had now returned, with bronzed and sunburnt faces, and showing marks of arduous and faithful duty. Every heart prepared them room.

Congress had not been unmindful of their service. On the 30th of July the following resolution, offered by Mr. Lovejoy of Illinois, unanimously passed the House of Representatives:—

“Resolved: That the thanks of this House are hereby presented to the Eighth Regiment of Massachusetts Volunteer Militia for their alacrity in responding to the call of the President, and for the energy and patriotism displayed by them in surmounting obstacles, upon sea and land, which traitors had interposed to impede their progress to the defence of the National Capital.”

The Massachusetts men of April '75 rushed to Lexington to dispute the progress of the invader, and, if possible, to drive him from their soil. The Massachusetts men of April '61 left that soil, poorly equipped, and rushed forward, through a hostile State, to the relief of the distant, threatened, and beleaguered Capital. The work of the men of '75 established that Capital; the work of the men of '61 saved it when shadows, clouds, and darkness rested on it.

Company A (Cushing Guards), Newburyport. — 8th Reg.

As early as 1775, the Newburyport Artillery Company was organized, and mustered eighty members, and had one iron and one brass cannon, together with small arms. In the war of the Revolution, the company was ordered to Boston, and thence to Newport, R. I., to assist Gen. Sullivan in the defence of that State. The entire journey from Newburyport to Newport was made on foot. In 1801, the company being in a prosperous condition, erected a gun-house, and laid out grounds for drill and parade, and at that time changed their small arms for swords, and procured two brass field-pieces. In 1812 they were ordered, by detachments, to do guard duty at Plumb Island. In 1820, full camp equipage was procured, and for many years they regularly performed camp duty in army style. In 1824, when Lafayette visited Newburyport, many complimentary remarks were made respecting the superior manner in which escort duty was made and performed by them. In 1832 a stand of carbines was procured by subscription, which, together with the swords, were, upon most occasions, carried by them. In 1837 new field-pieces were received from the State, and the company had enrolled one hundred active members. In 1844, they changed their name to that of "Washington Light Guard," and a new stand of arms was procured, so that they could appear as an infantry or artillery company, as might be desired. In 1852, the company assumed the name they now bear.

April 15, 1861, at 4½ P. M., Capt. Bartlett receiving orders to report as soon as possible at headquarters in Boston, immediately commenced to notify the company, and at 12 o'clock that night had accomplished his task. The next day, at 12 o'clock, in a storm of snow and rain, his company, only numbering at that time four commissioned officers and sixteen privates, marched to the depot and took the cars for Boston. On their arrival there they marched to Faneuil Hall. Other detachments of the company continued to arrive on every train, until their full number of eighty members was complete. This company was one which performed very many important and arduous duties, especially on the Baltimore and Elkridge Railroad. Their 2d Lieut., Gamaliel Hodges, being a machinist by trade, was chosen as superintendent of the road, and soon had the disabled engines put in good running order, finding the missing pieces of the machinery stowed away in the attic of an old building. Corporal J. C. Batchelder was appointed as engineer of the train, to run nights, and Charles Homans, a member of another company, to run daytimes. These trains run from Annapolis to the junction of the Baltimore Railroad. Many other important acts were performed by the officers and members of this company, as they seemed to have a man in their ranks for almost every trade or calling. It was a common remark, when a person was wanted to fill this or that place, to take him from Company A.

On their arrival home, the veterans turned out to receive them, and do escort duty. A salute was fired, and a dinner provided for them by the citizens at City Hall. Most of this company have re-enlisted. The city appropriated \$1,000 for the relief of their families in their absence to the seat of war.

Company B (Lafayette Guards), Marblehead. — 8th Reg.

Organized 1825. Orders were received by the Marblehead companies, at 5 o'clock on the afternoon of April 15, 1861, to appear in Boston the next day. Notwithstanding the brief notice, and the perilous services required, the call met with a ready and willing response on the part of the soldiers, and liberal "material aid," from their townsmen, who pledged themselves, in generous sums, for the comfort of not only those who left, but also their families at home. The companies left the town early the next morning, and were the first companies which arrived in Boston, April 16, 1861. At the time of the Revolution, the first companies which marched to Cambridge were also from this town, and in the war of 1812, the first privateers were fitted out from this port.

* Nearly two-thirds of this regiment are now in the army or navy, many of them as officers.

Before leaving Marblehead, their friends and fellow-townsmen evinced their deep interest in them personally, and their patriotic feelings by various demonstrations; and their departure was witnessed with mingled feelings of pride, affection, and regret. Upon their arrival in Boston, and at their headquarters in Faneuil Hall, they were enthusiastically cheered by thousands who met them at every point.

The important services which these companies rendered is recorded, with others, in the account of the movements of the 8th Regiment. On the expiration of their term of enlistment, their return to Marblehead, in July, was the occasion of a great demonstration. The Home Guards, Firemen, teachers and scholars of the public schools, and citizens generally received them, and the firemen gave them an excellent collation. Jonathan H. Orne, Esq., made the reception speech at the town house, and Capt. Martin responded for the companies.

Company D (Lynn Light Infantry) Lynn. — 8th Reg.

This company was chartered in May, 1852. Capt. Timothy Munroe, afterwards colonel of the 8th Regiment, was its first commander, and it was first attached to what has since been known as the "Old Sixth Regiment" of Infantry, Col. Benjamin Brown, of Marblehead. All the companies composing this regiment belonged in Essex County, and all, with one exception, were transferred to the new Eighth, in the spring of 1855. The name "Lynn Light Infantry" will be familiar to many as an old acquaintance, previous to the date first mentioned; and it is proper to remark, in passing, that a company, bearing this title, was chartered in June, 1812, and was a well-known organization for many years.

* Re-enlisted.

Capt. Munroe was twice in command of this old organization, which experienced the usual lights and shadows of fortune, till 1846, when it was disbanded. The new company, besides having the commander of the old, contained a number of members of that organization.

In 1859, Capt. Munroe having been elected lieutenant-col. of the 8th Regiment, the company remained a year under command of its 1st lieutenant, who declined promotion. In February, 1860, it was ordered out by the Mayor of Lynn, to assist in preserving the peace in the time of the "strike." They remained at their armory two days, when, the excitement having subsided, they were dismissed by the authorities. About this time the project for a new and worthier monument, to commemorate the Battle of Lexington, had begun to engage general attention; and, in response to a circular issued by the Monument Association, this company, in the month of March, appropriated the sum of fifty dollars for that patriotic object. They had the honor of making the first cash contribution made by any organization in New England. In fact the only money which had been received by the treasurer of the association at that time, was the same amount from Senator Hammond, of South Carolina. In June of the same year, Lieut. George T. Newhall was promoted to captain, which position he still holds. This company was among the number who assisted at the reception of the Prince of Wales, in Boston, October 18, 1860. No other incidents are worthy of mention, in this connection, until the order of April 15 was received.

The warning of the members was begun about 4 o'clock, P. M., and they were ordered to appear at the armory that evening at 7 o'clock. Before that hour arrived it was filled, almost to the exclusion of members, by an enthusiastic crowd of people, quite a number of whom volunteered, and were accepted, as many more would have been but for a lack of uniforms and equipments. Several hundred dollars was immediately contributed by the liberal citizens present, and a patriotic unanimity was displayed by all classes. Next morning, in conformity with the order of Col. Munroe, the company did not leave the armory till a little after 10 o'clock; when, numbering seventy-three men, they marched to the depot, and, with Company F, took the cars for Boston. On arriving there, they proceeded directly to Faneuil Hall.

Organized 1814. First commander, Hon. William Thorndike. This succeeded to the old Beverly Light Infantry, of which the late Hon. Robert Rantoul, senior, was commander. Its first public parade was at the celebration of peace in 1815. It has always been a spirited and efficient corps. This was one of the Massachusetts companies which unanimously tendered its services to the State of Maine at the prospect of war upon her north-eastern boundary. Some of its members were in the Mexican war. Upon the call of the Governor of January 4, 1861, a full company immediately responded their readiness for active service; and upon his order of April 15, which was received on the evening of that day, at 6 1-4 o'clock, seventy-four men, ten more than a full company, met at their armory at 8 o'clock the next morning, in season to have reported in Boston at 10; but, under advice of Colonel Munroe, did not report there till 12 o'clock at noon. There was then no organized action of the citizens, only individual aid and comfort rendered. Immediately subsequent permanent organization was made (which is still in existence), and which has added much to the comfort of the Beverly soldiers, both of the three months' and three years' men, as well as to their families at home. Several thousand dollars have been in this way distributed, besides what the town has done in its corporate capacity. This company went under General Butler to Annapolis, where they rendered efficient service in the repairs upon the railroad; others aided in saving and sailing out the old Constitution, and all did their full share in that laborious and effective enterprise. 4th lieutenant, Moses S. Herrick.

a valued officer, lost his right foot by the upsetting of a stack of guns at Washington, the loss of which, so far as we can do it, has been patriotically supplied by the generosity of Palmer & Co., who have adapted to his wounded limb a most admirable substitute. On arriving home at Beverly, the "Old Guard" of ex-members, under Capt. Chas. Stephens, with the Drill Club of young men, united with the fire companies and other citizens in welcoming home, and escorting about town to headquarters, their faithful brethren and friends from the war. Flags and other joyous demonstrations were profusely displayed, and all the people participated in the welcome with a will. No member of this company was arrested for any offence, or in the guard house, during the entire campaign. No member died, and there was but little sickness in the company. About one half of the members have enlisted for the war, either in the army or navy.

Company F (City Guards), Lynn.—8th Reg.

The City Guards were first started as an independent company to do escort duty for the city of Lynn on the arrival of Kossuth, in May, 1852. For a time they styled themselves the Kossuth Guards, and were under the command of Captain Wm. T. Gale. They soon applied for and received their charter as the Lynn City Guards, thus becoming a regularly organized company. They were chartered as an artillery company, and attached to the 2d Regiment of Artillery, and had charge of two field-pieces. At that time the artillery companies also used muskets, and acted as infantry. In the spring of 1855, that system was abandoned in this State, and this company was changed to infantry, and united to the 8th Regiment, Colonel Coffin. August 14, 1852, Captain Gale resigned, and Thomas Herbert was chosen to fill the vacancy, and did so to the entire satisfaction of all, till May 15, 1857, when he resigned, and James Hudson, Jr., the present commander, was elected.

At 3 1-2 o'clock on the afternoon of April 15, 1861, Capt. Hudson received orders to appear with his company in Boston at 9 o'clock the next day. He at once, with his clerk, commenced to notify the members to meet that evening, and at 7 o'clock the armory was filled to the utmost with an eager and excited crowd, anxious to volunteer in the defence of their country, and to fight for our glorious Union. The next morning, at 9 o'clock, the company, numbering ninety-one members, were all ready to leave; but, owing to the cars being filled with the companies from Marblehead and other places, they decided not to leave till quarter of 11 o'clock. At that time, with Company D, Captain Newhall, they took their departure. Thousands of citizens gathered in and about the depot to bid them adieu; though a drenching storm raged at the time, yet their enthusiasm was not abated in the least; and as the cars left the depot, cheers for the Union rent the air far and near. On their arrival in Boston, they at once marched to Faneuil Hall.

About \$600 was collected and presented this company by the citizens of Lynn, before leaving for the seat of war, and the city soon after appropriated \$10,000 for the benefit of the families of both companies during their absence.

On Thursday, July 25th, while encamped at Baltimore, the company were presented with a beautiful silk flag by the loyal citizens of the twentieth ward.

On their arrival home, when the signal was given that the cars had left Boston, and the long-absent soldiers were on their way home, the bells were rung, and multitudes of friends and relatives were seen hurrying to the depot to greet some dear one. As the cars neared the city, their enthusiasm knew no bounds. The time for greetings was very short, as a large procession, composed of the Home Military, City Government, Committee of Arrangements, and engineers and members of the Fire Department, were in readiness to welcome the absent ones, and escort them throughout the city. As they commenced to move, all the city bells set up a joyous peal, while a salute was being fired from the Park, continuing during their whole march, which occupied about two hours. The city was beautifully

decorated with flags and evergreen, and as the procession marched on to the Common, the school teachers with their scholars formed to the right and left while the long line marched through. Each scholar was furnished with a handsome bouquet, which made a very pleasing feature. While they were passing Franklin Street, to their surprise there met them about one thousand men, in uniform, from the 17th and 19th Regiments, under the command of Colonel Dike, who were then encamped at Lynnfield, and came up to pay their respects to their returned comrades and to the city government of Lynn. At 7 o'clock the procession marched into Exchange Hall, where a sumptuous collation had been provided. Mayor Breed welcomed the returned soldiers home, after which prayer was offered by Rev. Mr. Owen, when all were invited to partake of the feast, at the close of which George H. Chase, Esq., President of the Common Council, was introduced, and made a very pithy speech, which was replied to by Captain Newhall, in his usual pleasing way. Colonel E. W. Hinks, George Foster, Esq., and Rev. Mr. Ellis, all welcomed the returned soldiers home with appropriate speeches, after which the troops formed into line once more, and companies D and F were escorted to their armory by the "Old Guard." Everything passed off in the happiest manner.

Company G (*American Guard*), Gloucester.—8th Reg.

The old Gloucester Artillery (organized in 1788, and disbanded, from lack of members, in 1849) sprang into existence again, August 7, 1852, by the formation of a new company under the same old name of "Gloucester Artillery," and formed, as Company E, part of the 2d Regiment of Artillery of 4th Brigade, M. V. M. Jeremiah R. Cook was chosen and commissioned, August 7, 1852, its commander. This company was changed, February 26, 1855, from artillery, and formed, as Company G, part of the 8th Regiment of Infantry in same brigade. In March following, the company changed its name to "American Guard," and adopted for its motto, "Our Country, and the enforcement of its Laws."

Captain Cook resigned in 1857, and Andrew Elwell was elected his successor, March 30, 1857, and resigned in 1859, when Captain Cook was again chosen as its commander, and so remained until the close of 1860, when he again resigned, and in January, 1861, Addison Center was chosen, and remained in command until commissioned Captain in the 23d Regiment, when the command devolved upon Lieutenant David W. Low. The military spirit of Gloucester for several years had been dying out, and like too many others in this country, its citizens discouraged their young men from joining its military company; but, however much disposed to extinguish the slumbering fire of military patriotism that still existed, it was impossible; and when the guns of Sumter reverberated along the coast in April, 1861, and the sound struck upon the rock-bound shores of Cape Ann, it sent a thrill into every heart, and caused its slumbering patriotism to rekindle and burst out anew.

It was much increased by the order (received at 5 o'clock, P. M., April 15) for the Guard to appear the next morning in Boston, and march for the national capital, then in danger from traitors. With only a few hours for preparation to leave family, business, and organize the company, required great activity, especially as the company was deficient in the necessary uniforms; but Company G was competent for the emergency. The night was spent by members hunting up uniforms and parts of uniforms from past members of the company; and morning when it dawned, so chilling with its snow, so discouraging to "fair-weather soldiers," found the "true of heart" at the post of duty. Their departure from their homes was an occasion of a strong manifestation of interest by the people in their behalf, and the cause they went to maintain.

At Philadelphia General Butler had sixty men detailed for sappers and miners, intending them as the "forlorn hope" to lead the regiment through the streets of Baltimore, they

being armed with implements to remove obstructions; but their work finally was lightening the ship Constitution, and manning her as sailors until she reached New York. Of the sixty men thus detailed, Company G had the honor to furnish twenty.

At Annapolis, Lieutenant Low, of this company, was conductor of the train which brought the first passengers from Washington after communication was cut off by the Maryland traitors, and Sergeant Tremain skillfully operated the telegraph between the junction and Washington.

It is also worthy of remark, that in Company G twenty-seven different "trades or professions" were represented.

During their term of service this company acted well their part, and rightly deserve a share of the glory gained by the noble 8th.

After the companies of the regiment were dismissed in Boston, August 1, 1861, the company was offered a public reception at Gloucester. Owing to the lateness of the hour and distance from home, they remained in the city, and took the cars for home the next morning. Long before they arrived at Gloucester the people had gathered at the depot to meet them, and welcome home their gallant townsmen. The scene was animated and interesting; the roar of cannon, mingled with the chime of bells, the military escort, the prancing steeds of the cavalcade, and the gayly-uniformed and efficient firemen bearing banners, and the stirring sound of music—all combined to excite and delight the admiring crowd. Not content to receive them with a grand demonstration, they were feasted and addressed, and the day given up to festivities. Among those who addressed them were J. J. Babson, Esq., Captain Center, Rev. Dr. Chapin, Colonel Elwell, Benjamin H. Corliss, Esq., Rev. Mr. McCurdy, B. H. Smith, Esq., and Rev. Mr. Woodruff. George W. Plumer, Esq., acted as chief Marshal.

Company J, formerly Company A, 7th Regiment (Salem Light Infantry or Salem Zouaves), Salem.—8th Reg.

Organized 1805, and made their first appearance July 4, that year. It may be proper to state that another company was formed in 1861, and attached to the 23d Regiment Massachusetts Volunteers, and known by the name of the Salem Zouaves, which name was first

applied to the Salem Light Infantry, Captain Devereux, whilst attached to the 8th Regiment. The Zouaves in the 23d Regiment are in no way connected with the Salem Light Infantry, and are a distinct organization.

The Salem Light Infantry were ordered to join the 8th Regiment, and received their notice at 10 o'clock on the evening of April 17. The next morning at 8 o'clock the roll was called, and before they left, speeches were made by the mayor and others, assuring them that though a sadness might oppress them by their departure, yet they felt a pride to witness so many ready to respond at a few hours' notice.

At the depot thousands assembled to bid them a farewell, and the scene there gave evidence that the corps was held in high esteem. They arrived in Boston at 10 1/2 o'clock on the morning of April 18, escorted by a detachment of a corps of the Salem Cadets. During the forenoon they visited the State House, and went through their drill in the Doric Hall in the presence of a large number of spectators, who were delighted with the precision of their movements. The company left with the regiment that evening, and was the first company that went up the Potomac River after the rebellion broke out. They were detailed to go aboard the Constitution at Annapolis, and went in her to New York City, from there to Fortress Monroe, thence up the Potomac, again to Washington, where they rejoined the regiment. This company being proficient in Hardee's tactics, having practised them for several years, a number of its best soldiers were detailed to drill the other companies of the regiment, and afterward of other regiments, in that manual of arms; it having been decided at headquarters to adopt these tactics.

August 1, 1861. The regiment returned to Massachusetts, and the companies were mustered out of service, Company J returning to Salem that afternoon. They were received by the old members of the company under the command of Captain E. S. Peabody, and a hearty welcome tendered them. Subsequently a grand civic and military demonstration was made in honor of their return, which was of a most flattering character, the details of which would be interesting, but would occupy too much space; suffice it to say, processions, music, salutes, addresses, cheers, decorations, feasting, dancing, and other festivities were only a part.

There are now in the army (for three years' service) one brigadier general, five lieutenant-colonels, one major, six captains, sixteen 1st lieutenants, six 2d lieutenants, twenty-one sergeants, and ten corporals, who have been formerly members of this company.

On their return to Pittsfield, in August, a public reception was given them, and speeches were made by Ex-Governor Briggs and Hon. Thomas Allen. Mr. Allen also presented a banner, and a company of Zouaves performed escort duty.

Third Battalion of Rifles.

(Three Months' Volunteers.)

The following facts, in regard to the movements of this battalion, have been kindly furnished by N. S. Liscomb, Sergeant-Major:—

Orders were issued to the companies of this battalion to report to Major Devens on the afternoon of April 20, 1861, at Worcester. At 5 o'clock, P. M., battalion line was formed in front of the City Hall, and from thence, under escort of the Highland Cadets and the "Old Guard," they marched to the Mechanics' Hall, where they were received by Mayor Davis, who made an address appropriate to the occasion; after which, prayer was offered by the Rev. Dr. Hill. Major Devens addressed the battalion, and the exercises were concluded with the singing of the "Red, White, and Blue," and the "Marseilles Hymn." The battalion then returned to company quarters. At 9.30, P. M., battalion line was formed; and, escorted by the Old Guard and citizens, marched to the Western Railroad Station, and left Worcester about 10.30, P. M., reaching New York at eight o'clock, Sunday morning of the 21st.

We were well received in New York. Major Anderson had been there the day before, and it seemed as though the stars and stripes were floating from every window. We breakfasted and dined at the Fifth Avenue Hotel, and marched from there to the armory of the Seventh Regiment. In passing through the city, we were cheered on every side; and our Springfield rifle, with the sabre-bayonet, attracted much attention. While at the armory, we were visited by the Hon. Charles Sumner, and other distinguished individuals. Mr. Sumner made a few remarks, complimenting us on our soldierly appearance and the promptness with which we had replied to the call of the President. After the most enthusiastic reception along the line of our march, at eight, P. M., we embarked on board the transport Ariel, for Annapolis.

April 23d. Arrived off Fortress Monroe at four, P. M. Found awaiting us transport De Soto, having on board the Boston Light Artillery, and a part of the Fifth Massachusetts Regiment, the other part of the latter being on board the Ariel. Both vessels immediately bore up for Annapolis. It being deemed possible that objections would be offered, either to our progress up the bay, or to our landing at Annapolis, ammunition was distributed, and stations assigned for each company, where they were ordered to immediately assemble, upon hearing the long roll of the drum. No opposition was offered, and we arrived off Annapolis on the morning of the 24th. Found the naval grounds and buildings in the hands of General Butler. The battalion were ordered to disembark, which was done at one, P. M., and were furnished with quarters on the piazza of the mess hall, and bivouacked for the night on the brick pavement.

25th. Were assigned quarters in the main building of the school, over the headquarters of General Butler, who immediately ordered from Co. A a detail for duty at headquarters, the detail to continue during the stay of the battalion at this post. We were all expecting to leave for Washington this morning, but General Butler thought he wanted us with him.

28th. Sunday; no drill to-day. It is a new thing for us to pass the Sabbath in this way. Most of us have been writing home.

29th. Hon. Dwight Foster came to-day, on his way to Washington, and brought the first news from home. We were all glad to see him, and what letters he brought were prized very highly. Commenced reading a chapter in the Bible and singing at eight, P. M. Capt. Sprague read this evening, to be followed by Lieutenants Fickett, Joslin, Moulton, and Harkness. We have some fine singers, and think this part of our daily exercises will afford us much pleasure.

30th. Quite a number of the men are sick from eating too much fresh meat; but as this is the first we have had, since leaving New York, it is not strange.

May 1st. Colonel Phillips came this afternoon, and brought letters, etc., from home. Just as we were reading our letters and having a sociable time, orders came to pack up and be ready to leave in the morning, at seven o'clock, for ———

2d. All ready; knapsacks packed and waiting to move. Orders came that we would not go till evening, but where we were going none could find out. At eight, P. M., embarked on board the transport Maryland, bound, as we learned after the steamer was under way, for Fort McHenry.

3d. Arrived at Fort McHenry at six, A. M., and landed in the midst of a cold rain-storm. As we had passed quite an uncomfortable night and found nothing in good shape, our feelings were not as pleasant as they otherwise would have been. After landing our stores, we marched to what were to be our quarters. Companies A and C were ordered to take charge of some old barracks which look as though they had been filled with rubbish, just after the war of 1812, and had so remained ever since. We soon had the doors open, and the floor was cleared up, and we saw what was to be our sleeping place for the night. We had tried the brick at Annapolis, and made up our minds if we could find anything softer we would have it. Were supplied with boards, and so had our choice of a pine board or a brick floor. We had not had much to eat that day; our rations were all gone, and raw pork and hard bread were not plenty. The first day at Fort McHenry was not exciting, but perhaps we will have something from Baltimore which will make it more interesting. Major Morris is in command here.

4th. Rain and snow this morning; we thought we were moving South, where it would be *warm*, — not only warm *work*, but warm *weather*. Governor Andrew's overcoats, which *some* thought a foolish purchase, are just what we need, and we should suffer without them.

5th, Sunday. No drill to-day; inspection and dress parade. Rev. Mr. Roberts, of Baltimore, preached in the chapel this afternoon.

7th. We have been at this post about a week, and have had rain, with some snow, all the time. We are anxious for a change. The soil sticks to our *patent leathers* in such quantities that if we could send them to Massachusetts we would be in possession of considerable *real estate*, and our names would be in the list of those who paid a tax of \$50 and upwards.

9th. Major Morris orders each company to be drilled by a member of the Fourth Regular Artillery. He thinks we will improve faster. We think our officers are not much behind the Regulars.

14th. General Butler seized a large lot of arms, etc., and we marched outside the gate to guard them. The order came at 9 P. M., just as the roll was being called, and we supposed we were bound for Baltimore — every man was in his place. This is the first time we have been outside the gates. We are hoping to go to Baltimore soon.

15th. Captain Dodd's company came to-day. They are nearly all from Boston. Captain Dodd belonged to the Tigers.

19th. General Cadwallader arrested one of our company for insulting Marshal Kane, as he said. Captain Sprague soon procured his release, or I think we would soon have been in trouble, for Massachusetts men do not think much of Kane, whether he be the *first murderer* or the one who lent his aid in murdering the Massachusetts men on the 19th of April, 1861. All hands took the oath this morning.

20th. We now drill six hours per day; and, with guard duty, we have not much time to spare. We are drilled by our own officers now.

26th. A choir came from Baltimore, to assist in the services, this afternoon. It made it quite interesting.

31st. Went through inspection in company with the Regulars to-day. Maj. Morris was much pleased, and thought we would compare very favorably with them.

June 1st. About half the battalion are on fatigue duty. We have all the cannon in the Water Battery to dismount, which are twenty-four pounders, and are putting in forty-two's in their place. It is hard work, and could be made much easier, if we were allowed to do it our own way.

5th. A sergeant and corporal, with seventeen privates, were ordered to proceed to Fort Carroll and relieve the recruits now there. Sergeant Johnson, of Co. A, took command of the detail.

21st. The fatigue duty still continues, and we have changed the looks of many things since we came. I should think Baltimore would have a poor time if Fort McHenry opened upon her.

26th. Capt. Sprague, with three men of Company A, was ordered to make a thorough examination of the bridges between Baltimore and Havre de Grace, which he did, and made his report to the Major, which received his approbation.

27th. Marshal Kane and the Police Commissioners were brought in this morning. Kane is a fine-looking man, but should have been here long ago.

30th. Adj. Goodhue left this afternoon, having been appointed captain in the regular army.

July 1st. Lieut. Harkness has been appointed acting quartermaster, Quartermaster Estabrooks being stationed at Fortress Monroe. Lieut. McCafferty appointed acting adjutant.

3d. Major Devens went to Washington this morning. Capt. Sprague is acting as major. All the boys are looking for the paymaster, and want him to come before the Fourth, as our funds need reinforcement.

4th. Each company has planned to have a grand time to-day. A *dinner*, such as is got up in New England, is to be provided. We have no drill, and each company is to

relieve the guard of the other, so we can all have our dinner together. The following order was read, which somewhat interfered with our plans, but we celebrated a *little*. "The commanding officer being officially informed that the Hon. Secretary of War would visit us to-day, arrangements will be made for his reception. Major Morris will proceed to the city at 9 1-4 o'clock for the purpose of receiving him and accompanying him to this post," &c. The Secretary did not arrive till 1 1-2 o'clock, so that our dinner came a little late. Company A, the City Guards, had their dinner about 4, P. M. Capt. Sprague presided at the table, and everything passed off to our entire satisfaction. This was the first time for two and a half months that we had seen a table with table-cloth and dishes. Some of us, perhaps, would have eaten more if we could, but when we got through we did not have much of an appetite. Companies B, C, and D had a nice time, and few who were there will forget the Fourth of July dinner, 1861. Company A were very quiet, owing to the sickness of one of their number, A. H. Gilbert, who joined us soon after our coming here. He had made himself very popular amongst us. His sickness was caused by taking cold while doing fatigue duty, which he had volunteered to do for one who was not very well. A national salute was fired at meridian.

5th. Gilbert died last night at 11 1-2 o'clock, of typhoid fever. This is the first death in the battalion, though we have had much sickness. The following resolutions were offered by the battalion: "*Whereas*, an all-wise Providence has called from our ranks and the active scenes of life our comrade and friend, Amos H. Gilbert, in the full strength of his early manhood and the vigor of his days, *Resolved*, that while we bow in submission to the decree of our Heavenly Father, whose ways are inscrutable and past finding out, our grateful hearts shall render thanks that in our daily duties we have been cheered by associations with one who has endeared himself to us by the exhibition of the qualities of the gentleman, the soldier, the affectionate friend.

'He, the young and strong, who cherished
Noble longings for the strife,
By the wayside fell and perished,
Weary with the march of life.'

Resolved, that while we would not invade the sanctity of private grief, and while words of consolation are of little avail while the heart is breaking, we bear our testimony to the noble qualities that inspired our comrade, and pray that 'He, without whose notice not a sparrow falls,' may comfort and sustain those who were bound to him by the strongest earthly ties.

'None knew him but to love him,
Or named him but to praise.'

Resolved, that we will wear the usual badge of mourning for thirty days in testimony of our affectionate regard and esteem." This afternoon drill was suspended, and, with arms reversed and muffled drums, we followed the remains to the depot in Baltimore, where we left them in charge of his parents.

6th. Col. Wetherell and one of Gov. Andrew's council came this morning;—the battalion went through drill and dress parade, and was reviewed by them.

9th. Last night, at about 11 o'clock, orders came for a captain, lieutenant, and sixty men to be ready to take a steamer which would be at the fort wharf at 1 o'clock. Capt. McConville, of Company C, and Lieut. Pickett, Company A, were in command, and each detachment reported to the Major in double-quick time. Some who were not detailed, finding out what was up, were anxious to be counted in, but no more could be taken. One young fellow, more anxious than the rest, at last bought off one of Company B for the sum of five dollars. At that time our paymaster had not made his appearance, and five dollars was a large sum, but as we had heard that we were bound for a vessel which had left Baltimore with arms and ammunition, and that a brush was expected, the money was of small account. After waiting till 4 A. M., and no steamer making its appearance, we were all dismissed to quarters, to be ready at a moment's notice. At 6 we were all called together again, but were informed that but forty could go. It was decided to draw lots, and as all were anxious and none volunteered to remain, fifteen slips of paper, with from 1 to 15 on them, were procured. Those who drew ten and under were to go. The young fellow who was to pay the five dollars drew no 15, and so was counted out. The old saying, "Where there is a will there is a way," was proved to be true. Before the troops were ready to leave, he had bought out another of Company B for the same amount, and formed in as one of that company. The Major smiled as he passed, but he had obtained his permission and so was all right. Some said that he had tried so hard to go that he would not come back. At 7 o'clock the steamer Chester touched at the wharf, and we all embarked amid the cheers and good wishes of our comrades. We found on board a company of Pennsylvanians, and were joined by a detachment of regulars, with two field-pieces. We had a pleasant sail down the Chesapeake, touched at Millstone Landing, and then proceeded up the Patuxent River. We soon came in sight of two schooners that seemed to be trying to steer clear of us. The steamer was soon on their track and was fast overhauling them, when each lowered a boat and made for the shore, leaving one man in charge of each vessel, who ran them into the sand. We lowered a boat, boarded them, and found them loaded with oysters. Supposing, by the haste in which the crews left, we had two prizes, sure, we were some disappointed; but oysters not being in our line, we were soon on our way again. They had violated the State law of Maryland in taking oysters at that time of the year, which was the reason they were in such haste to get on shore.

We had not proceeded far before we saw a black-looking vessel, which proved to be the U. S. gunboat *Yankee*, making for us. We ran up the stars and stripes, and continued on our course, and as the gunboat came up we could see several guns looking at us through her portholes, and a boat was lowered to board us. We slackened up, when an officer came on board, and we soon convinced him that we were Union men on legal business. We overhauled several vessels, but were obliged to return without accomplishing our object. On our way up the bay, we encountered a very heavy squall of wind and rain, accompanied by lightning and thunder. The *Chester* is a good boat, and we experienced no inconvenience from the storm. We arrived at the fort at about 11, P. M.

11th. Major Devens being about to leave us this morning for Worcester for a short time, the battalion were called together, and he made a short but happy speech. We like him very much, and should like to have him remain to go home with us. Capt. Sprague, of Company A, will act as major.

12th. Captain Gleason of Company B, with a detachment of men from each company, was sent to Queenstown to protect the *Chester*, it having been rumored that a plan had been laid to seize her as the *St. Nicholas* had been a few days before.

They accomplished their object, and also succeeded in bringing to Fort McHenry the schooner *Georgianna* of Baltimore, valued at \$2,000, which had been run ashore and deserted at the mouth of Chester River.

15th. Sergeant Major Goodell was appointed and commissioned as adjutant, and commenced his duties to-day. The *best-looking* man we ever saw came to-day; it was the paymaster. Each private received \$30.95, and the officers *several dollars more*, I think.

16th. A detail of twelve men went down on the *George Weams* to guard her. N. S. Liscomb was appointed acting sergeant major.

17th. A detail to guard the *Mary Washington* was made this morning.

18th. A detail of forty men, commanded by Lieutenant Pickett of Company A, and Lieutenant O'Neil of Company C, left about six P. M. with a steamtug and sloop, proceeded just below Fort Carroll, and anchored for the night. In the morning we proceeded to the mouth of the Patuxet, where we arrived about two P. M. The steamtug left the sloop, and proceeded across the bay in search of the tug *Resolute*, but did not succeed in finding her. While waiting for the tug, we went on shore and obtained a supply of potatoes, oysters, corncake, milk, berries, &c. On our return, we were followed by the gunboat *Yankee*, who seemed bound to find out what we were doing, supposing we were rebels. They lowered a boat and came on board, at the same time preparing for action. We were ordered to remain where we were till morning, when we would be taken to Annapolis. Lieutenant O'Neil having his commission with him, we finally convinced him we were *Yankees*, and all the way from Massachusetts. About half past eleven o'clock, in company with two boat loads of marines from the *Yankee*, we went on shore for the purpose of taking one Haden, who had been furnishing aid and comfort to the rebels; but the bird had flown; so we had nothing more to do. The next morning we left for Fort McHenry. Two men of Company B were accidentally shot by a pistol in the hands of one of Company D — one in the leg, and the other in the arm, both flesh wounds. This is the first wounded we have had since leaving Massachusetts.

19th. Our three months are up, and all hands are talking of going home. We can find out nothing about going. Major Morris says we must stay till the 19th of August, because we did not take the oath till May 19. Perhaps he knows. He likes the battalion, and will keep them as long as he can; but I think he has taken a poor way to do it. Some of us think we have seen enough of Fort McHenry, — if we could go south, we would be much better pleased.

24th. Our battalion have suffered much from sickness — a kind of slow fever — twenty leaving this morning for home in charge of Lieutenant O'Driscoll, who is unwell also.

25th. General Dix took command this morning. An order was issued to call the battalion together, and we were soon formed in front of the Major's quarters. General Dix came forward, and spoke as follows: "Gentlemen, your time of service expired on the 19th, and you are entitled to go home. If you say you wish to go, I will order your transportation to-morrow; but I had *rather* you would not ask it to-morrow, or for the next five days. I will order it within ten days. You have done your duty, and more." That is the way men like to be talked to, and every man must have made up his mind that General Dix was a *man*, a *soldier*, and a *gentleman*. We were then dismissed to quarters, as each *man* was to decide for himself whether he would go or stay. Now we know we were needed, we will see how each company voted. Co. A (*City Guards*), every man voted to remain till we should be ordered home; Company C (*Emmett Guards*) voted the same; Company B and D were not unanimous, and the next morning eleven from Company B and one from Company D left for home. We did not cheer them much, and thought if that was a specimen of their patriotism, it had grown small, or that they did not start with much.

29th. An order was issued this morning for the battalion to be ready to leave at six A. M. to-morrow for home. I will not try to tell how we who were off guard passed the last night at Fort McHenry; but morning came at last, and with all our luggage we took the steamer for Baltimore. We were in time for the seven o'clock train for Philadelphia; but, owing to an accident on the road, we must remain till seven P. M. at the depot. It was warm, it was hot, and such a day as I hope never to see again. At last we were off for Philadelphia, where we arrived at six A. M., 30th.

30th. After much delay in procuring cars, we started on our way again. *If possible* it is warmer than yesterday — and the dust! How we long to get on to a New England railroad! To-day we were from nine A. M. till five P. M. in going eighty miles; but we are travelling on a special train. Would it not be fine to try one of the regular trains on the Camden and Amboy? At last we took the steamer for New York, where we arrived, after a pleasant sail of thirty miles, at ten P. M.

August 1st. About six A. M. we formed the battalion line, and marched to the Park Barracks, and about four P. M. we took the steamer City of Boston for home via New London and Norwich. You can hardly imagine our feelings as we came on board. Everything looked better, and was better than we have seen for a long time. What a change it had made with us! — some were singing, some joking, and all seemed to be happy. After a delay of several hours in New London, so as not to arrive in Worcester before our friends were ready for us, we took the cars for the "Heart of the Commonwealth."

2d. Arrived in Worcester at half past nine o'clock A. M., and found the whole city with open arms ready to welcome us. Our friends were so eager to see us that it was some time before the battalion line could be formed. At last we were on the move; and, amid the cheers of the people and the showers of bouquets, we marched into the City Hall, where we were welcomed home again by Mayor Davis, who invited us to fall in and do justice to what had been prepared for us. There was food enough for a regiment, and we were only four companies; but if we had only met the rebels, and scattered them as we did the eatables in the City Hall, all would have delighted to do us honor. After a while we were again formed into line, and, escorted by the Home Guards of rifles and infantry, marched through Main Street, returning by the way of Court Hill. The streets were splendidly trimmed. The Sixth Regiment having passed through the day before, the display remained, and others were added. It seemed as though every one was trying to see what they could do to add to our happiness. We marched to the Common again. Mayor Davis made a short speech, welcoming us home again, which was responded to by Captain Sprague, acting major, who also read a letter from Major Devens, who was not able to be with us, being away on business connected with the Fifteenth Regiment, of which he was now the colonel. We again marched into the City Hall, after escorting Company D, Captain Dodd, of Boston, to the Foster Street Depot, where we bade them good-by. We were then dismissed till the morning, when, August 3, we formed in Brinley Hall, and were mustered out of service by Captain John M. Goodhue of the Eleventh United States Infantry, formerly adjutant of the Third Battalion Rifles.

Much credit is due our officers for the good order which was maintained by the battalion during our whole term of service.

December. In looking back, I find that of the three hundred and nineteen men which composed the battalion, more than one hundred have been sick. Of that number two have died — Amos H. Gilbert and — Eaton, of Boston.

Company A, City Guards, have re-enlisted for the war in the following order: Fourteen as commissioned officers, nineteen as non-commissioned, two as musicians, and five privates. Some of the others are all ready, and all can be counted in if needed.

During the three and a half months of their service, the battalion were under five generals; namely, Butler, Patterson, Cadwallader, Banks, and Dix.

Company D (*Dodd's Rifles or Dodd's Carvers*), Boston.—3d Battalion Rifles.

Capt. Dodd commenced to recruit this company on the morning of April 19, 1861, and at noon the next day had secured the requisite number of men; and the officers of the company were commissioned the same day. The city of Boston gave to the corps \$300, and other aid was also furnished by friends. Gov. Andrew publicly addressed the company at the State House a few days before their departure. They left Boston on the steamer Cambridge, on the second of May, for Fortress Monroe, where arriving, took on board arms, ammunition, &c., and proceeded up the Potomac River to Washington. In the instructions of Adj. Gen. Schouler to Capt. Dodd, he says: "It is the earnest desire of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, that the ship Cambridge shall reach Washington, and demonstrate that a Massachusetts ship, manned with Massachusetts men, shall be the first ship to arrive by that route, as our 6th Regiment was the first to arrive at Washington, through the hostile city of Baltimore."

The company remained some ten days at Washington, at the end of which time orders were received to join the 3d Battalion of Massachusetts Rifles, at Fort McHenry, Baltimore. Arrived there May 15, and remained until the three months' term of service had expired, when they left for Massachusetts with the 3d Battalion, arriving in Boston on the 3d of August. The company was escorted to the armory of the Boston Tigers, and after partaking of a collation, were dismissed. At the request of the commander, the company was disbanded, after receiving a communication from Gov. Andrew, thanking them, in behalf of the Commonwealth, for so nobly responding to their country's call, and the faithful manner in which they had performed their duties. All of the commissioned officers, and most of the members, of Company D, are still in the service of their country.

Boston Light Artillery (Cook's Battery), Boston.

(Three Months' Volunteers.)

Orders were received at 8½ o'clock on the morning of April 20, 1861, by Maj. Cook, to have his company in readiness to proceed to Washington with Col. Lawrence's Command, and at 10 o'clock in the evening he reported that his company was ready. During the day they were busily engaged in perfecting arrangements to leave. The company numbered over 120 men, and were each armed with a sabre and a revolver, and provided with heavy overcoats by the State. They supped at the Cornhill Hotel, the interior of which was beautifully decorated in their honor, and having sent forward, at 10 o'clock in the evening, their battery of six brass six-pounders, together with seventy horses selected mainly from the Metropolitan Railroad stables, and ten tons of cartridges, shot and grape, the corps marched to the Worcester depot between 1 and 2 o'clock. Here they remained until the arrival of the Fifth Regiment, and left with them early Sunday morning, the 21st. Stopping at Framingham, to wood and water, they were surrounded by crowds, who manifested the greatest excitement, and not only showered blessings upon them, but greeted them with music and salutes of cannon, and forced upon them eatables in great abundance. Indeed, at every stopping place the people left their houses and churches to show their approval of the cause, and their admiration of the troops who, forgetting everything but country, were ready to peril life for it.

They arrived at New York about dark, and embarked late that evening in the steamer *De Soto*, in which they sailed for Fortress Monroe. They arrived the 23d, at noon, and were ordered direct to Annapolis, and arrived there early the next morning. The patriotic and cordial feelings which met them at every station in Massachusetts, Connecticut and New York, as they passed along, were here chilled by the traitorous and hostile rebel atmosphere of Maryland; and preparations were made to gallantly meet and repulse any attack that might be made upon them.

At Annapolis they were quartered at the Naval School building, and remained posted in this city as a safeguard for troops passing to Washington, until May 4th, when they marched to the Relay House and encamped. Here they remained for some time as a guard, and were daily exercised in drilling and in other military duties. May 18, the oath of allegiance to the United States was administered to the corps by Lieut. H. S. Putnam. June 13, went to Baltimore with the Sixth Regiment, to protect the polls, it being election day in that city,—returned soon after to the Relay Station, but were immediately again ordered to Baltimore, and encamped at Camp Clare. June 30, ordered to march from the camp into the heart of the city, two detachments being stationed in Monument Square, and the others at the Custom House. July 10th, returned to Camp Clare.

July 26, Major General Dix addressed a letter to Major Cook, stating that, though the term of service of the company had expired, yet it was the earnest desire of the Major-General Commanding that they should continue to hold their position until the 30th.

In accordance with this request the letter was read to the members of the corps, who voted to a man to accede to the wish of General Dix, for whom they gave three cheers and a "sky rocket."

August 3d, the Battery arrived in Boston once more, where they met with a most cordial reception, being escorted into the city by the 1st Battalion of Dragoons, Major White; the 2d Battalion of Infantry, Major Newton; and the Lancers, Captain Slade; and welcomed in a speech by Mayor Wightman.

Thus ended the three months' service of Cook's Battery.

THREE YEARS' VOLUNTEERS.

On the 3d of May the President of the United States issued a proclamation, calling for a force of volunteers to serve for three years, unless sooner discharged. At that time a great number of companies had been organized in the various cities and towns of this Commonwealth. On the 22d of May the following General Order was issued by command of the Governor:—

HEAD-QUARTERS, BOSTON, May 22, 1861.

GENERAL ORDERS No. 12.

The President of the United States, by his Proclamation of the third day of May current, having called into the service of the United States, to aid in the enforcement of the laws and the suppression of insurrection, a Force of Volunteers to serve for a period of three years, unless sooner discharged, and to be enrolled and organized in a manner to be made known through the Department of War; and the plan of organization adopted for this force, in accordance with the Proclamation of the President, having been published in General Orders No. 15 from the Adjutant-General's office, in Washington, of the fourth day of May current, and His Excellency the Governor and Commander-in-Chief having been this day notified that the quota of these Volunteers to be furnished by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts is fixed at Six Regiments of Infantry, to be organized as prescribed in said General Orders No. 15 from the War Department, so much of said Orders as relates to the Regiments of Infantry to be organized under them is directed to be printed for general information.

PLAN OF ORGANIZATION.

Each Regiment of Infantry will consist of ten Companies, and each Company will be organized as follows:—

The commissioned officers in each Company *will be appointed by the Governor of the State furnishing it*; the non-commissioned officers, until the Company shall be embodied in a Regiment, *will be appointed by the Captain*; afterwards by the Colonel, on recommendation of the Captain.

The field officers of each Regiment *will be appointed by the Governor of the State furnishing it*.

The Adjutant and Regimental Quartermaster will be selected from the Company officers of the Regiment by the Colonel, and may be re-assigned to companies at his pleasure.

The non-commissioned staff will be selected by the Colonel from the non-commissioned officers and privates of the Regiment, and the vacancies so created will be filled by appointment, as prescribed above.

This Force will be organized into three Divisions of from three to four Brigades.

Each Brigade will consist of four Regiments, and one Brigadier-General, one Aide-de-Camp, (a Lieutenant,) one Assistant Adjutant-General, (a Captain,) one Surgeon, one Assistant Quartermaster, (a Captain,) one Commissary of Subsistence, (a Captain.)

All of the above officers will be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, except the Aide-de-Camp, who will be selected by the Brigadier-General from the company officers, and who may be re-assigned to his company at the pleasure of the Brigadier-General.

Each Division will consist of three or more Brigades, and of one Major-General, two Aides-de-Camp, (Captains or Lieutenants,) one Assistant Adjutant-General, (a Major.)

The above officers will be appointed and selected as prescribed above, for the additional officers of a Brigade.

These volunteers will be subject to the laws and regulations governing the army of the United States.

The officers, non-commissioned officers, and privates, organized as above set forth, will, in all respects, be placed on the footing, as to pay and allowances, of similar corps of the regular army; PROVIDED, that their allowances for clothing shall be \$2.50 per month, for Infantry.

Every volunteer non-commissioned officer, private, musician and artificer, (excepting Cavalry volunteers,) who enters the service of the United States under this plan, shall be paid at the rate of fifty cents for every twenty miles of travel from his home to the place of muster—the distance to be measured by the shortest usually travelled route—and when honorably discharged, an allowance at the same rate, from the place of his discharge to his home; and in addition thereto, the sum of one hundred dollars.

The Bands of the Regiments will be paid as follows: one-fourth of each will receive the pay and allowances of Sergeants of Engineer soldiers; one-fourth, those of Corporals of Engineer soldiers; and the remaining half, those of privates of Engineer soldiers of the first class.

The wagoners will receive the pay and allowances of Corporals of Cavalry.

The Regimental Commissary-Sergeant will receive the pay and allowances of a Regimental Sergeant-Major.

There will be allowed to each Regiment one Chaplain, who will be appointed by the Regimental Commander on the vote of the Field Officers and Company Commanders, on duty with the Regiment at the time the appointment is to be made. The Chaplain so appointed must be a regularly ordained minister of some Christian denomination, and will receive the pay and allowances of Captain of Cavalry.

Two-thirds of the Company officers of the Regiments to be raised under this plan will be appointed at the commencement of the organization of each Regiment, and the remaining one-third, when the Regiment shall have its full complement of men, will be appointed from the ranks, to be taken from among the Sergeants on the recommendation of the Colonel of the Regiment approved by the General commanding the Brigade.

After the completion of the organization of a Regiment, one-half of all the vacancies which may occur in the lowest grade of commissioned officers, by promotion or otherwise, will be appointed, as above, from the ranks.

Corporals will be taken from the Privates; Sergeants from Corporals. The First Sergeant will be taken from the other Sergeants of the Company by the Captain.

The Regimental Non-Commissioned Staff will be appointed from the Sergeants of the Regiment by the Colonel.

The volunteers called for, and to be organized under the above Proclamation and General Orders, while serving under the same, *will form no part of the militia of the State*.

All Companies of the Massachusetts Volunteer Militia which may desire to volunteer to serve as part of the above force, will make immediate application in writing to the Commander-in-Chief, through the Adjutant-General. Such application must state the name of the city or town in which such Company is located; whether the Company is attached to any Regiment, Brigade, and Division, or not, and to what Regiment, Brigade, and Division it is attached, if any—the names and ranks of the present officers of the company—the number of its officers, non-commissioned officers, and privates, with their occupations—also, any particulars descriptive of the Company, or its condition, or which may be thought to give it a claim to be selected, which may be thought material.

From the Companies of the Massachusetts Volunteer Militia thus applying, a sufficient number will be selected to form the six Regiments assigned to this State, and the companies so selected will be designated in special orders.

Every Company selected for this service will be required to be filled up to the maximum strength prescribed in the above plan of organization, before it is mustered into the service of the United States; but no Company volunteering will be allowed to exceed in its aggregate the maximum strength established by the laws of the State for Companies of Infantry of the Volunteer Militia (viz., of seventy-nine officers, non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates) until it has been designated for this service by Orders. And as the number of companies of the Volunteer Militia far exceeds the number now assigned to this State as her quota, the Companies so selected and designated will be required to fill up their ranks to the maximum strength established in the above United States plan of organization, from the ranks of such other Companies volunteering as it may not be possible to accept—and the Companies from which they are to fill up their ranks will be designated in the Special Orders.

All Companies accepted for this service will receive with their Orders blank forms of an enlistment list, to be signed by every member volunteering, by which they will bind them-

selves to serve in the Volunteer Force called for by the President, for the time, and in the terms, and under the organization set forth in the above Proclamation and General Orders.

As soon as each Company selected and designated shall have been raised to its maximum strength of men thus enlisted, the Governor will appoint two-thirds of its commissioned officers; and as soon as ten such Companies, so filled up and officered, shall have been sent off to form a Regiment, the field officers and the remaining third of the Company officers will be appointed as above prescribed; and the Colonel will at once appoint the staff and non-commissioned staff, enlist his band, and call a meeting of the field officers and Company Commanders on duty with the Regiment to vote for a Chaplain.

The duty and responsibility of appointing the officers required for this Force having been imposed upon the Governor, he cannot be bound by commissions already issued to officers of Companies volunteering to re-appoint these officers, but must exercise his own discretion. The Governor will, however, give full weight to the fact that these officers have been elected to commissions in the Volunteer Militia, as indicative of the wishes of the men and their confidence in these officers.

As soon as the Regiment shall have been completely organized, it will be designated as one of the six to be mustered into the United States service.

This Order will be transmitted by the Adjutant-General direct to Commanders of Companies in the Volunteer Militia.

The demand upon Massachusetts at this time was for six regiments. These were soon organized, and five more were ordered into camp in the State, under the provisions of an act of the Legislature, by General Order No. 16, issued June 1. On the 17th of June, ten more regiments were requested by the General Government, and others were accepted from time to time; so that Massachusetts had Jan. 1, 1862, about thirty thousand men serving as three years' troops.

First Regiment of Infantry.

This regiment was founded upon an organization which had existed for a long period. Formerly known as the 2d M. V. M., it was, on the disbandment of the old 1st, a few years since, authorized to assume this designation. The services of the first were early tendered to the government, but the quota of three months' troops was otherwise filled. Immediately upon the issuing of the order requiring future volunteers to serve for three years, Col. Cowdin went personally to Washington, to tender the services of himself and his regiment for that period; and it is believed to be the first regiment in the United States, armed and equipped, which was so tendered. Containing at this time but five or six companies, others were detached from other regiments and added to it, and after many delays and disappointments, it was, on the 23d day of May, reorganized under the plan adopted by the war department for three years' volunteers. The regiment complete, ten hundred and forty-seven strong, formed line on Boston Common, June 1st, 1861, and thence marched to camp Ellsworth, near Fresh Pond. They remained at this place, waiting for wagons and other equipments, until June 13th, when they moved to the barracks just finished at camp Cameron, and started thence for the seat of war, June 15th. Crowds of citizens accompanied them through Boston to the Providence depot, where they took cars for New York. Jersey City was reached by steamer, June 16th. Here a hospitable reception awaited them, from a committee of Massachusetts gentlemen, resident in New York city. On the 17th of June, they marched through Baltimore—the first Massachusetts regiment which had passed through these streets to the seat of war since the massacre of April 19th. Reaching Washington the evening of the 17th, on the 19th they marched to a position upon the Potomac, just above Georgetown, where they located "Camp Banks." Here the regiment remained one month. During its stay, it was visited by many friends, and went through the usual trials and experiences of a new regiment. The anniversary of the 4th of July was duly celebrated, and a few days after, the regiment was greatly gratified in the presentation of a beautiful silk banner, by Boston residents of San Francisco. During the month of July, the regiment was brigaded with the 2d and 3d Michigan, and 12th New York, under Col. I. B. Richardson, commanding the brigade. Soon after, in preparation for the advance, all but four of its wagons were taken from it, and a battalion of skirmishers was organized in the brigade, consisting of forty men from each regiment, under command of Capt. Berkenstorf, of the 2d Michigan. To this battalion the 1st regiment contributed twenty men each from companies G and B, under Lieut. Johnston, of company E, and Sergeant Forrest, of company G. This battalion was first of all our forces to meet and engage the enemy, and Sergeant Forrest was the first

to fall in that disastrous campaign. July 16th, the regiment left camp Banks "in the direction of the enemy," in light marching order, without tents, overcoats, or knapsacks. It reached Vienna the same night, where the brigade rendezvoused with Gen. Tyler's division, to which it was attached. July 17th, the division marched by Fairfax, and bivouacked within two miles of Centreville. July 18th, the line of march was again taken up, Gen. Tyler's division leading the entire advance, and the 1st Massachusetts regiment being the advance of the division. With skirmishers thrown out, it felt its way, until it ascended the high hill on which Centreville is situated, and stopped for some hours in a grove on the further slope of the hill. Here a squadron of cavalry, and company G, under command of Capt. Snow, were sent forward to reconnoitre. They returned, after two hours' absence, with news of the enemy, and the order was given for Richardson's brigade to move on. The infantry had not proceeded far, when they were drawn aside that the artillery might pass. They marched behind, through a thick level piece of woodland, then into the open field, and were halted. A gentle ascent of about a hundred yards led from the edge of the woods to the crest of a hill, which thence sloped gradually down to Bull Run. Through the centre of the descent, the road ran down to the ford. From the hill to Bull Run was about a mile. On the left hand side of the road a piece of woods extended from Bull Run about half way up the hill. Beyond the Run, the land ascended pretty steeply for about two miles, to the crest of the hill, beyond which lay Manassas Junction. Our cannon were posted on the crest of the hill on our side. Beyond the Run, on the opposing hillside, were camps and bodies of the enemy. The artillery opened upon the enemy, and were soon answered by them, and our pieces withdrawn from range. The infantry were then moved forward, so as to occupy the open space on the sidehill between the crest of the hill and the woods — they advancing about half-way to the Run. The first Massachusetts was drawn up fronting the piece of woods already spoken of on the left of the road. This piece of woods was a dry ravine, extending with sloping and gradually expanding sides down to Bull Run. During this time, the battalion of skirmishers was in the woods, being at the time under command of Lieut. Johnston, company E, every now and then closely engaged by the enemy, who, by their firing, were evidently present in force. Company G, of the 1st regiment, was ordered to occupy a small house standing to the right of the woods, and between them and the road. They advanced, and found it already occupied by the skirmishers of the 1st regiment. While occupying the house, they were fired upon from the woods, and were ordered by Col. Richardson to advance into the woods, which they did under Lieut. Ward. About fifteen minutes after this order, the firing upon the first company being very heavy, companies H and F, Capt. Carruth and Capt. Adams, were ordered into the woods, under command of Lieut. Col. Wells. This detachment entered the woods, and advanced along the crest of the ravine under a heavy fire, until they reached a steep bank overhanging Bull Run. On the opposite side, and in the two sides of the ravine, the enemy were posted in force, with a battery of artillery. Fire from three different directions seemed to be concentrated upon them at this point, but they held their position some thirty minutes, when they retired, leaving five dead, and having seven wounded — two of them mortally. The wounded show the mark of grape-shot, rifle and musket balls. On retiring, they formed for a short time on the left of the 2d Michigan, but almost immediately joined their own regiment, which, in moving its position, came near them. While these companies were in the woods, the 1st Massachusetts had been moved up beyond the little house before spoken of, where they lay under a very heavy fire, without any opportunity of returning it. Their position was shifted two or three times, the firing upon the regiment being still kept up, and a new battery of two cannon approached towards the right flank. The regiment was then marched by the left flank, fronting the woods, looking down the ravine, in their first position, when they were joined by the three right companies. Ten men from each company were detailed as skirmishers to enter the woods, and Lieut. Henry, company F, was ordered to take command. They entered the wood, but were immediately recalled by order of Col. Richardson, without giving or receiving any fire. The intention of sending the regiment into the woods seems here to have been abandoned, as they were then ordered to about face, marched in line some two or three rods to the rear, and flanked back to the position first held by them behind the brow of the hill. All these movements were executed with as much regularity and precision as if upon parade. While the three companies G, H, and F, were alone in the woods, the New York 12th was ordered in to their support, but hardly entered the wood, when they suddenly turned and left the field. A field-piece was also brought in, which fired two or three rounds, and was then withdrawn. The cavalry was also brought down to the edge of the woods, but was unable to do much in charging through a thickly wooded, rocky ravine, and retired. After the brigade was withdrawn behind the crest of the hill, the artillery was planted in the position first occupied by it in the morning, and a furious cannonading ensued on both sides. The First lay behind the guns, sheltered as much as possible by the hill, and in position to sustain the batteries if attacked. The balls sung about two feet over their heads. It was here that Simpson, venturing only about ten feet from the hill after water, was struck by a twelve-pound shot. Many of the balls went far over into the woods in the rear, and some members of the New York 12th, and the 69th, who were there as a reserve, were hit. This lasted for an hour or two, when the cannon were withdrawn, the wounded gathered up, and our forces withdrew in good order to Centreville — the 1st Massachusetts bringing up the rear.

During the entire time — although the whole brigade was under fire of cannon and

musketry — yet none of the infantry were in any position to return fire, except the three companies sent into the woods, and the New York 12th. The 2d and 3d Michigan, and the remaining companies of the 1st Massachusetts, did not fire a shot, nor were they ever placed where they could fire. The New York 12th gave one or two scattering volleys before they retired. With this exception, the only rifles discharged on our side during the day were those of the skirmishers and of companies G, H, and F, of the 1st Massachusetts. It was harder, perhaps, to stand or lie inactive under such a fire, than to be in actual contest. The men were cool and perfectly courageous.

The day was full of incidents. Col. Cowdin's horse was struck by a spent musket ball, and the horse of Col. Wells had his leg neatly shaved by a twelve-pound rifle cannon shot. Neither officer was mounted however at the time. A ball passed over the man lying near Major Chandler, and struck within a foot of the Major, covering him with dirt. Many of the men have bullet holes through their clothing. One has two holes in his stocking where the ball went in and out without wounding the skin. The cannon ball which struck Simpson, first cut a piece from Capt. Baldwin's bat, and struck from the back of Corporal Miller his haversack, canteen and tin cup, making them a wreck, without injuring him. Private Huse, shot through the elbow, in the thick of the fight in the woods, showed the bullet hole to an officer standing near him, saying, "See here, I cannot use this gun any longer; take it, and use it for me."

Assistant Surgeon Green, with two of the band, and the driver of the ambulance, was over the field in the thickest of the fight, picking up the wounded as they were brought out of the woods.

Soon after entering the wood, the detachment under the Lieut. Col. saw a small body of the enemy, but withheld their fire, mistaking them, on account of their gray uniforms, for members of the Michigan regiment. Through the whole campaign many disasters occurred on account of some of our troops being dressed in gray uniforms.

From first to last the enemy did not show himself, keeping behind his entrenchments. The brigade lay that night at Centreville, and Friday morning marched down to the battle-field again, holding the wood and sending pickets upon the hill where the artillery was posted. They held this position through that and the succeeding day and nights, sleeping on their arms, and being kept constantly on the alert. On Friday, Companies I, Captain Rand, and K, Captain Chamberlain, were sent to hold a hill some quarter of a mile to the left, where they remained till after the battle of Sunday.

Saturday night, Company A, Captain Wild, and a detachment from Company B, under Lieutenant Smith, were sent forward as pickets on the right and left, while the remainder of the regiment was drawn up in line of battle behind the crest of the hill, and lay there on their arms till morning, within rifle shot of the enemy's lines. During the days Friday and Saturday the pickets were within light and easy rifle shot of each other, but neither fired, orders being apparently as strict on their side as they certainly were on ours.

Sunday morning the artillery occupied the position on the crest of the hill where they were first stationed on Thursday. Artillery was also stationed on the hill at the left, where were the two companies of the First. Two other companies, Company A, Capt. Wild, and Company D, Lieut. Jordan, were stationed on the right, and in advance, to watch that flank. The remainder were stationed in line beyond the battery. This position was occupied during the day of Sunday. At the right, some three or four miles distant in a direct line, the battle was raging, and from the hill-tops could be seen its advance and retreat by the smoke rising through the trees. In front, on the opposite hill-side, all day long could be seen the reinforcements for the enemy pouring over the hill-tops and spreading to join the battle on their left. All day our cannon were throwing shot and shell across the run at these columns as they poured on. Still no attack was made by us on the position in front, and not a single gun of the enemy replied to our constant fire. At length, near night, the position at the left was attacked by a column of infantry and cavalry. Almost at the instant of hearing the volleys, the artillery limbered up and dashed off the field, the infantry withdrew, and Col. Richardson, riding down to the First, which at the first sound had sprung to arms, gave the order "By the left flank, left face, forward, quick march." So the regiment left the field. All in the ranks supposed they were hurrying to the assistance of the companies on the left, and when the road was reached, cut through the woods to their station, the regiment halted, expecting orders to go down. It was immediately started again, however, and told to go to Centreville. There, after much changing of position, it was, with the regiments of the reserve, drawn up in line of battle, and then first learned that the great battle was lost. The First stood there for hours, while the retreat poured by with a tumult of sound and outcry impossible to describe, but which one hearing can never forget. Meanwhile, the two companies A and D were left behind without orders or notice of the retreat. Discovering almost by accident that the flag was down and the place deserted, and at the same time seeing a large force of the enemy approaching, Capt. Wild withdrew the companies in good order, stopping long enough in the woods to gather up their blankets and little baggage. Let it be remembered that in leaving the woods in the morning, the First Regiment had no idea of abandoning their camp. They went forward to fight, and the men took off their blankets, haversacks, and coats, and whatever else might impede them. These, in the hurried and precipitate manner in which the regiment was driven by the camp back to Centreville, were left behind and lost. Companies A and D, coming through the camp nearly half an hour after the retreat, found all quiet, and the men loaded themselves with all they could carry. They emerged from the woods, approaching our position at

Centreville, and were immediately saluted with a discharge of shell from our battery, which mistook them for the enemy. Very fortunately, no one was hit, and Capt. Wild, hoisting his white turban upon his bayonet point as a flag of truce, marched up the hill and joined the regiment, the last company from the field.

At Centreville was learned sad news of the left. It will be remembered that Companies I and K had been sent to hold a house situated on the left upon a hill divided from the regiments by a deep ravine and surrounded by ravines and woods. This position, in the midst of the enemy's ground, too far from the brigade for any effectual support in case of an attack these few men had held for two days and nights. On this Sunday artillery was posted there, and two regiments of infantry, all under command of Col. Davies. They, too, had been playing upon the reserve of the enemy all day without any return till toward night, when a strong column was seen approaching up the ravine. Col. Davies sent over the two companies to ascertain its character. They found it to consist of some two or three thousand infantry, supported by a large body of cavalry. Our companies challenged and then fired. After giving and receiving two or three volleys, the column turned to retreat, when the artillery was brought to bear upon them, ploughing through their ranks with fearful effect. The infantry remaining with the guns, reserved their fire in anticipation of an attack by the cavalry. The order to retreat then came to them as to us, the guns were withdrawn, and the two companies, the last to leave the spot, fell in the rear of the retreating infantry and joined the regiment at Centreville. Col. Davies is enthusiastic in his praises of the bravery and cheerful obedience to orders of those two companies and their officers. In this attack Lieut. Gill, of Company I, was instantly killed, and Corporal Baxter, of Company K, wounded. Lieut. Gill was buried that night at Centreville. The regiment now, for the first time since the fight of Thursday, was present in all its companies. The men lay upon their arms, expecting to hold the position, but at midnight were told that the retreat would continue to Fairfax C. H., and that the brigade would cover the retreat. When the wagons and artillery had all gone, the brigade marched down the hill, stood some three quarters of an hour while the reserve passed by, and then in column by platoons brought up the rear. At Fairfax, orders were given to go on to Washington, and so Camp Banks was reached about four o'clock that Monday afternoon, in a pouring rain. The next day the regiment was moved to a field near Arlington, the next to Fort Albany.

A list is given below of the casualties, and the place and order in which they occurred.

Companies H and F sent next into the woods under Lieutenant Col. Wells:—

Wounded and taken prisoner, Albert F. Wentworth.

These casualties all occurred in the woods.

Killed by a cannon shot after the brigade was withdrawn behind the batteries, Corporal Oliver E. Simpson, Company I.

Killed on Sunday, Lieutenant Elijah B. Gill, Jr., Company I.

Wounded, Company K, Corporal John F. Baxter.

Missing, Company A, since Sunday, private John R. Heywood.

The above constitutes the entire list of casualties on the two days. Three men, Sergeant Warren of Company D, and privates Eltraheer and Boag of Company K, were accidentally wounded in camp during the campaign. It will be seen by the above account that from the first the regiment was divided into detachments, at times only four companies being left together, and that these detachments were sent to the positions of the most exposure and danger. A large proportion of the entire casualties of the brigade fell upon this regiment, and of these nearly all occurred in Companies G and H. The members of the other companies, however, not permitted to engage in actual conflict, showed no less steadiness and courage. From first to last, there was no murmuring or flinching at the hardships and fatigue endured, and the men were always cheerful and ready. Whether ordered to wait or to act, to stand or advance, they were always in their place, prompt and alert to hear and obey every order.

The regiment remained at Fort Albany two weeks. During its stay there the men were mostly employed in guard duty, felling trees, and other detail duty. Two companies, D and I, were practised at the guns, and gained a good idea of siege artillery practice. August 13 the regiment marched to Bladensburg, where it was brigaded with the Eleventh Mass., Second N. H., and Twenty-Sixth Penn. regiments, under General Joseph Hooker. September 10 the regiment was ordered to proceed to Upper Marlboro'. It started for five days; but it was not until five weeks after that its members were greeted again with the sight of the old camps they had come to look upon as home. During this period they had traversed back and forth all Lower Maryland lying

between the Patuxent and the Chesapeake, marching some hundreds of miles, leaving their tents behind and bivouacking in the open air. They dug up some hundreds of muskets and sabres, and one large secession flag, which has been given in charge to the Mayor of Boston. Soon after their return on October 14, 1861, General Hooker was assigned to the command of a division consisting of his own and the "Sickles Brigade." Colonel Cowdin, being senior colonel of the brigade, was assigned to the command, leaving the command of the regiment to Lieutenant Colonel Wells. The night of October 20, at ten o'clock, the division received orders to move. At sunrise the next morning the brigade was astir, and before nine o'clock the camping ground which had known it for so many weeks was deserted. Three days' march brought the regiment into its present position at Camp Hooker, upon the banks of the Potomac, and in the direct front. While in its present position its members have saved some vessels anchored or becalmed within range of the enemy's batteries by bringing them out of danger; and on one occasion, under a very heavy fire from the enemy's cannon, rescued a schooner which had already been boarded and set on fire by the rebels. Their tents being poor, they early turned their attention to some other means of shelter, and starting, unlike the other regiments, upon a fixed plan, have nearly completed a village, systematic and regular, and which will afford every man a house and a fire. This labor has not led to any neglect of drill. In this, and in a ready, cheerful and willing submission to duty and discipline, they will bear comparison with any regiment in the field.

Second Regiment of Infantry.

The Second Regiment of Massachusetts Volunteers is especially worthy of commemoration. It was the first loyal regiment raised for the war, and it led the way in the new system of military organization which was afterwards adopted for the whole United States. As soon as the proclamation of the President, dated April 15th, 1861, calling out the militia to suppress the insurrection, had reached Boston, several gentlemen of that city, foreseeing the necessity which would require a more permanent army, conceived the idea of raising a regiment for the war. Major Gordon, who then commanded two or three battalions of infantry of Massachusetts militia, was selected by them to command it, and Mr. George L. Andrews, a graduate of West Point, and Mr. Wilder Dwight, a lawyer in Court Street, were associated with him in forming the plan of organization. These gentlemen proposed that the new regiment should be enlisted for the war, and should conform in discipline, drill and equipments to the standard of the regular army of the United States. Mr. Dwight drew up a subscription paper, to guarantee the expenses which would be necessarily incurred in the enterprise, and in a few days \$27,000 had been subscribed. Mr. Thomas Dwight was appointed treasurer of this fund, thirty-five per cent. of which was afterwards returned to the subscribers.

The history of this regiment furnishes a memorable instance of the patriotism and liberality of the merchants of Boston. As soon as the scheme of its organization was formed, gentlemen of all parties hastened to subscribe for its support. Messrs. David Sears, Robert M. Mason, James Lawrence, Samuel Hooper, Thomas Lee, George A. Hovey and Mrs. William Pratt, each gave one thousand dollars; Gardner Brewer, Charles Amory, G. Howland Shaw, John A. Lowell, Charles G. Loring, John E. Lodge, Nathaniel Thayer, J. B. & F. H. Bradlee, Josiah Quincy, T. G. Appleton, Chas. Merriam, Henry Sayles, James Parker, and Wm. F. Weld, each gave five hundred dollars; Chas. Francis Adams, R. S. Fay, E. R. Mudge, Samuel G. Ward, Joseph S. Fay, Wm. H. Swift, Augustus Lowell, Little, Brown & Co., James Savage, each gave two hundred dollars; Edward Austin, A. Heard, Jr., S. T. Farley, E. D. Peters & Co., Iasigi Goddard & Co., each contributed one hundred dollars.

The money thus raised enabled Col. Gordon and his associates to commence their important enterprise without delay.

To properly estimate the difficulty and magnitude of this enterprise, it should be borne in mind, that, at that time, there was no law, either of the United States or of the Commonwealth, under which it could be carried into operation. During the period which had been employed in obtaining the subscriptions and maturing the plan of organization, the Baltimore riot had taken place, and all communication with the government was cut off. While the painful solicitude which followed these events was at its height, Messrs. Dwight and Andrews left Boston for Washington, resolved at all hazards to make their way through, for the purpose of tendering their regiment to the President. They went by the way of Annapolis, and arrived at the Capital the day after the New York Seventh Regiment. The government, plunged in panic and alarm, gladly adopted their scheme, and they returned to Boston with full authority to enlist and equip a regiment, which was to be commanded by Colonel Gordon, and officered by gentlemen of his selection. The regiment when enlisted was to form part of the army of the United States, and was not to be called into active service before July. It was thus the first of the six hundred regiments now in the service of the United States.

The regiment was easily enlisted to its full number, and went into camp in West Roxbury, at Brook Farm, the well-known estate of the Rev. James Freeman Clarke, who offered it, without charge, to Colonel Gordon for that purpose. Mr. Andrews was appointed Lieut.-Colonel, and Mr. Dwight, Major; and under their care, the regiment was armed and equipped according to the standard prescribed for the United States Army. During its stay at the camp, which, in compliment to his Excellency Governor Andrew, was called Camp Andrew, it was thoroughly drilled by experienced officers, and its parades were daily attended by crowds from all parts of the neighboring country. The spectacle thus exhibited of neatness, soldierly bearing and skill, was the theme of much remark, and had the happiest effect in infusing a military spirit and sound military ideas into the public mind, as well as in furnishing a model of equipment and organization for the regiments since formed.

While at Camp Andrew, the regiment was presented with regimental colors by a party of ladies of Boston and its vicinity. The ceremony of presentation was witnessed by a vast concourse of people, and speeches were made by Hon. George S. Hillard and by Colonel Gordon. The religious exercises at camp were also attended by multitudes from all directions.

On the evening of the sixth of July, Colonel Gordon received a telegraphic order from General Scott, to report to General Patterson at Martinsburg, in Virginia. On the morning of the eighth, the regiment broke camp and came to Boston, where they dined on the Common, and shortly afterwards left for New York by the Providence Railroad. They were escorted on their march through Boston by the Cadets, and by the Fourth Battalion of Infantry, and were accompanied to the station by a great concourse of people. At New York they were received by the Sons of Massachusetts, and after breakfasting with them at the Astor House, proceeded south. On the 10th of July they reached Hagerstown, in Maryland, and thence marched to join General Patterson, arriving at Martinsburg on the 12th. On Monday the 15th, they started

with General Patterson on his advance towards Winchester, and bivouacked among the smoking fires which the enemy had just deserted. After Patterson withdrew to Charlestown, the regiment was sent to occupy Harper's Ferry, where it hoisted the American Flag, for the first time since the breaking out of the rebellion. In recognition of their service rendered to the loyal inhabitants of that region, it was presented with a handsome color by the ladies of Harper's Ferry. The ceremony of presentation was the first open and public act of loyalty which had been performed in any town of Eastern Virginia since the beginning of the insurrection.

After General Banks, who had superseded General Patterson, withdrew his troops across the river, three companies of the Massachusetts Second were left to hold the Ferry, while seven companies occupied the heights opposite, to support the batteries there thrown up. They remained in this advance service for three weeks, bivouacking in the open air. When General Banks moved his division to Hagerstown, he withdrew the regiment to Sandy Hook, where it was employed on picket duty along the canal. While engaged on this duty, companies C and G were fired upon, and had a brisk skirmish of half an hour. Shortly before the regiment went to Sandy Hook, a portion of it crossed the river and destroyed the mill of Herr & Welch, bringing away all the flour which they found there.

The regiment then went into camp at Darnestown, where it remained until October 21st. On the afternoon of the day of the battle of Ball's Bluff, it was assigned to the brigade of General Hamilton, and made a forced march on Conrad's Ferry, where it arrived at about three o'clock in the morning, and was at once put on picket duty, opposite Harrison's Island, at the Ferry, under the command of Major Dwight. On its return to Darnestown, it was assigned to General Abercrombie's Brigade. It is now (Jan. 1, 1862) encamped near Frederick, with General Banks.

The regiment has been frequently reviewed by General Banks, and has received high commendation from him. General McClellan has also spoken in high terms of its discipline and efficiency. A large number of its officers have been detailed for service in the staff of the generals and for signal duty.

This regiment was the first offered to the government in the hour of its extreme peril; it will be the last to desert the flag and the cause.

Seventh Regiment of Infantry.

This regiment was raised under the auspices of Colonel Couch, of Taunton, a West Point graduate. It is composed chiefly of Bristol County men, who are worthy of their military. It was ordered to camp Old Colony, Taunton, May 20, and sworn into the United States service June 15.

Previous to the final organization of the regiment, one of the Taunton companies, and one from Dighton and Somerset, were disbanded, and the men detailed to the other companies in order to bring them up to the maximum required. Two companies, one from Dorchester and another from Abington, took the places of those detailed.

Taunton, Fall River, and other towns in their immediate vicinity, nobly contributed tens of thousands of dollars to sustain the soldiers of the Seventh. They furnished them with uniforms, and paid to each man while drilling a bounty of fifteen dollars per month, and assisted their families when needed.

Lieutenant Colonel Greene was presented with a fine black horse, six years old, by his friends of Fall River, valued at \$300. The presentation was made in front of the City Hall, in presence of a great gathering of the citizens. The horse was purchased of Francis Stephens, of Swansea, who contributed fifty dollars towards the object. He was also presented with a sword by his former associates of the Police Department and Police Court.

While in the camp, they were drilling about eight hours per day. On the 4th of July, a flag was presented to the regiment by Edmund Baylies, Esq., and a dinner furnished them by the ladies of Taunton. July 12, the regiment left the camp for Washington via Providence, Stonington, and Groton, where they took steamer for New York, arriving there at seven the next morning, and at ten o'clock refreshments were furnished them by the Sons of Massachusetts, and at eleven took the steamer Kill Von Kull for Elizabethport, N. J., took the cars at this place for Harrisburg, where they arrived at five o'clock A. M., the 14th, and from this point proceeded to Cockeysville, about nine miles from Baltimore, where the troops left the cars for the purpose of loading their guns. After thus properly preparing themselves to pass "through Baltimore," they once more entered the cars, and started on. Arriving at that city about half past two o'clock P. M., they formed into line and marched to the Washington depot, and soon after left for the city of Washington, where they all arrived at eight o'clock in the evening, except Company F, Captain Bliss, which arrived the next morning at three o'clock. It seems that on arriving at Baltimore, Company F was detailed to guard the baggage cars while they were drawn through the city, and upon the arrival of these cars at the Washington depot, instead of being attached to the train conveying the regiment, the baggage cars with Company F were detained several hours by some misunderstanding, thus causing no small inconvenience to the troops, who therefore had to be quartered on and about the steps of the Capitol that night.

July 15, at four o'clock A. M., the regiment was ordered to fall into line and march to the depot to unload the baggage cars, and at ten o'clock they marched to Kalorama Heights, which are some two and a half miles from the Capitol, where they pitched their tents, called the roll, and found every man at his post. Their camp at this place was called camp Old Colony, and they remained here until August 13, during which time their principal duties were drilling and guarding Long Bridge. At this date they left camp Old Colony, and marched to Brightwood, where they assisted in building Forts Slocum and Massachusetts.

Ninth Regiment of Infantry.

"Faugh a Ballagh."

On the requisition of the United States government for troops, immediately after the fall of Fort Sumter, the Irish citizens were among the foremost to respond to the call. They were largely represented in every "three months" regiment; but the Ninth was the first composed entirely of the sons of Erin; and the well-earned repu-

tation which they have achieved since their arrival at the seat of war, shows that in future they are to constitute a powerful arm of our military.

It was first known as the Thirteenth; but, the system of numbering being changed, it was altered to the Ninth. About \$6000 was subscribed by the friends of the regiment for its wants while recruiting. It was first organized at Camp Wightman, on Long Island, in Boston Harbor, where it was quartered about seven weeks. On Monday, June 24, the regiment came up from its encampment for a visit to the city before starting to the seat of war. They were received at the wharf by an escort of nearly 800 Irishmen, and proceeded immediately to the State House, where the regiment was drawn up in line. The governor, attended by his staff, appeared, and in a brief speech presented to Colonel Cass the Ensign of the Commonwealth. He said they would bear in their ranks the stars and stripes of the glorious American banner; but he would have them recognized, when abroad, as from Massachusetts. He had the most perfect confidence in the regiment, and felt fully assured that the flag would never be disgraced by the countrymen of Daniel O'Connell.

Colonel Cass responded in a fitting reply. The regiment then proceeded to the Common, where a bountiful collation had been provided by the city. The line was again formed at three o'clock, and the regiment was reviewed by the mayor and several other city officials, after which it returned to Camp Wightman.

A stand of colors, costing \$150, was also presented by the Irish citizens, consisting of a beautiful silk American flag and an Irish flag made of green silk. On one side of the latter is the scroll; on top, in golden letters:—

"**THY SONS BY ADOPTION,**

Thy firm supporters and defenders, from duty, affection, and choice."

Beneath, also in golden letters:—

"**Presented to Colonel Thomas Cass, 9th Regiment Mass. Irish Volunteers."**

In the centre is the American coat of arms—eagle, shield, etc.; on the reverse side, the Irish Harp, whose strings, with ground color, denote the Red, White, and Blue, surmounted by the thirty-four stars, and surrounded by a beautiful wreath of shamrock; underneath are two wolf dogs, emblematic of Ireland, with the motto:—

"**Gentle when stroked,
But fierce when provoked."**

On the top, the motto in gold letters:—

"**As aliens and strangers thou didst us befriend,
As sons and true patriots, we do thee defend."**

And, underneath all, the declarative motto:—

"**The Union must be preserved."**

On the 25th of June it was ordered on to Washington. Before starting, every company had been recruited to its maximum standard. It was transported in the Ben Deford, and arrived on the 29th of June, after a passage of four days. It remained here in quarters until after the battle of Bull Run, when it was ordered to Arlington Heights, on the Virginia side of the Potomac.

While there, the regiment threw up a fortification, taking nearly two months for its erection, the whole work being carried through by this regiment alone. When first commenced, an advance was expected from the rebels, and the men worked with great ardor. It received the name of Fort Cass.

The regiment has been reviewed several times by General McClellan, and was in the grand review of 70,000 troops which took place near Washington. Up to the middle of December, not one man had died of sickness, and the general health of the regiment had been remarkable. Sixteen men had been wounded while on picket duty, but not one had been killed.

December 25 being Christmas, their camp was tastefully and profusely ornamented with evergreens, and the day commemorated in an appropriate manner.

Tenth Regiment of Infantry.

This regiment is made up almost exclusively of men living in the five western counties. Its colonel is a son of the late Ex-Governor Briggs. He has been active in our volunteer militia, and has held several commissions. When the rebellion broke out, Colonel Briggs commanded a company of infantry at Pittsfield, and was among the first to offer the services of himself and command. He was ordered, with his company, to Washington, and was attached to the Eighth, which did such gallant service. Before the expiration of his three months' term, he was appointed to the command of the regiment formed in the western counties for three years' service. The Tenth first went into camp at Springfield, and afterwards at Medford.

In addition to the above, the following statement is given by a person connected with the regiment:—

"On Thursday, July 25th, at 7 o'clock, P. M., the right wing of the regiment, on board the S. R. Spaulding, cast off from Central Wharf, Boston, bound for Washington.

"The left wing had embarked some two hours before on board the Ben Deford, which steamed down the bay, and awaited the coming up of the Spaulding.

"As the S. R. Spaulding cast off, three rousing cheers were given, at the instance of Quartermaster-General Reed, for the success of the Tenth Regiment.

"Lieut.-Col. Decker, having received his orders, went on board the Deford, and we started on our voyage.

"We had delightful weather all the time, with the exception of a slight fall of rain on Saturday evening, as we were entering the Chesapeake; but it soon cleared up, and we were repaid for our discomfort of the hour before by witnessing a most beautiful sunset. About 7 o'clock, we were hailed by the gunboat Quaker City, who, finding us all right, let us pass on, and in a little while we were in the broad waters of the Chesapeake.

"At 4 o'clock on Sunday morning we entered the Potomac, on our way up passing the rebel batteries at Mathias Point and Aquia Creek. At half past 10 o'clock, A. M., we were opposite Mount Vernon. The ship's bell was tolled, the band of the regiment played a dirge, and every head was uncovered. We passed several gunboats on the

way up the river, and in every case the rigging was manned, and three hearty cheers given for the regiment.

"We arrived off the arsenal at Washington about 12 o'clock, M., Sunday; but, owing to the crowded state of the wharf at the arsenal, only the Deford could land her part of the regiment, and the right wing landed at the navy yard, further up. The regiment were busy all the afternoon unloading the steamers, and at night the right wing were quartered in the lofts formerly occupied by the Seventy-first New York (three months).

"The next afternoon the regiment marched through the city to Kalorama Hill, which is north-east of the Capitol, and bivouacked for the night. The next morning changed our location to the old camping ground of the Thirty-fourth New York. The Seventh Massachusetts, Col. Couch, was encamped quite near us, on our right. We remained at Kalorama eight days, when we had orders to march to Brightwood, a distance of three miles, to be brigaded under the command of Brigadier-General Couch. We staid there two days, and then moved farther up the Seventh Street road to another camping ground. The change was necessary for the health of the men.

"The regiment was presented with a set of colors, viz., State colors and the American flag, by the ladies of Springfield, before we left to go into camp at Medford, Mass.

"The surgeon had, at various times, sent to him, for the benefit of the hospital, a total of \$144; and many things in the shape of bedding, shirts, drawers, stockings, and clothing of all descriptions for the sick, have been given through private sources, from our friends in Western Massachusetts.

"In addition to these gifts, every company has been supplied with extra blankets, collected and sent on from the towns where the companies composing the regiment were raised. A large quantity of two-fingered mittens we have also received from the same sources.

"We have been reviewed once as a regiment by General McClellan; once with the brigade, and twice in the division.

"Among the visitors to our camp have been Hon. Henry Wilson, Hon. H. L. Dawes, Hon. Charles Delano, Mayor Wightman, of Boston, Gov. Andrew, of Massachusetts, Hon. Frank P. Blair, Sen., the Postmaster General, Hon. Geo. F. Davis, of Massachusetts, Hon. George Ashmun, of Springfield, George Dwight, Esq., of the same place, Brig.-Gen. Buel, Gen. Keyes, John J. Astor, Jr., of McClellan's staff, Hon. James Buffinton, Col. Lee, of the Massachusetts Twentieth, Col. Hinks, Nineteenth Massachusetts, Hon. B. F. Mills, of Williamstown, Mass., Hon. Joseph D. Colby, of Pittsfield, Mass., Col. Lee, and Lieut.-Col. Lyman, Twenty-seventh Massachusetts.

"The regiment was addressed, previous to our embarking at Boston, by Ex-Gov. Briggs, of Pittsfield.

"The old Tenth Regiment formed the nucleus of the present Tenth Regiment, and was under the command of the present Lieut.-Col. Jefford M. Decker. New companies were recruited to fill up the regiment to the required standard, 1,045 men.

"The regiment rendezvoused at Springfield, Mass., in Hampden Park, June 14, 1861. The regiment was sworn into the service of United States, June 21, 1861, by Capt. Marshal, U. S. A.

"We are at present (Jan. 11, 1862) in Brig.-Gen. Keyes's division, Couch's brigade, which is encamped five miles out of Washington, on Seventh Street.

"Our brigade is composed of the Seventh and Tenth Massachusetts, Thirty-sixth New York, and Second Rhode Island. There are three brigades in our division, commanded respectively by Brig.-Gen'l's Couch, Graham, and Peck. The number of discharges have been 61; deaths, 15; desertions, 28. One hundred and seventeen have been enlisted, and the present strength is 1,010. We have three men in hospital. The health of the regiment is excellent.

"Barracks have been built of logs, covered with boards, and everything is provided to make our quarters for the winter comfortable. Our brigade have built two forts, named respectively Slocum, and Massachusetts.

"There is a band attached to the regiment, consisting of twenty-six pieces, formerly from Adams, Massachusetts.

"Our barracks were built by the regiment, and have not cost the government *one cent* for lumber or materials used in the building.

"One row of barracks serve for a company, and bunks are partitioned off for each mess. Every tent has a little sheet-iron stove."

Eleventh Regiment.

The booming of the last cannon directed against our gallant little garrison, starving in Fort Sumter, had hardly died away, and the sad intelligence that our glorious flag had been trailed in the dust before an overwhelming horde of traitors flashed over the telegraphic wires, when a little band of patriotic Bostonians, fired with indignation at the fratricidal blow our country — *our mother* — had received from her disloyal sons, were assembled together to take counsel and devise measures to assist in vindicating our national honor in its hour of peril. They resolved to organize a military force without delay, and tender their services to the President for immediate duty. The following

evening a meeting was held in the hall occupied by the Everett Association, in Hanover Street, where eloquent and patriotic appeals to enlist were made by Brig.-Maj. George Clark, Jr., Capts. Maclelland Moore and John H. Davis, Lieut. J. Frank Lakin, and others. But one sentiment pervaded the minds of those present, — that

“Where’er the foe’s arrayed, and war’s wild trumpet blown,
Cold is the heart that has not made his country’s cause his own.”

Before the close of the meeting, so intense was the patriotic zeal of the assembly, that a large number signed its enlistment papers. Many of the recruits were clerks and mechanics who had thrown aside their peaceful avocations at the first tap of the alarm-drum, and it was found necessary to set at once about procuring barracks sufficiently commodious for drilling the companies in the art of war, feeding and lodging the recruits, &c. The owner of the large building, No. 179 Court Street, generously tendered its free use; the water and gas were turned on free of charge; cooking utensils, food, mattresses, and furniture were speedily procured, a mammoth American flag was flung to the breeze, and the new organization, which had adopted the title of “Boston Volunteers,” was apparently enjoying the full tide of successful experiment. We say apparently, for there were yet many and serious obstacles to be surmounted before the organization might be called a regiment, and until it became a regiment it could receive no aid either from the City or State. As the recruits came flocking in, it was discovered that the “sinews of war,” in the shape of large sums of money, were required to purchase food and other necessities for daily consumption. Fortunately for them, the military experience, energy, and patriotism of Major Clark had suggested his name at the outset as eminently fitted to take the lead of its movement; and he secured the services of such officers as were indispensable to conduct the business until the regiment should be permanently organized by the State. He appointed George F. Tileston, Esq., Adjutant, J. Frank Lakin, Esq., Quartermaster, and E. P. Haskell, Esq., Paymaster. These gentlemen were all old members of the Boston newspaper press, and from their large acquaintance with patriotic and liberal citizens everywhere were peculiarly qualified for their respective positions. Adjutant Tileston and Paymaster Haskell were assiduous and successful in their efforts to obtain funds, while Quartermaster Lakin was zealous and untiring in the discharge of his most arduous duties. It may be truly said, without injustice to others, that to these officers, together with their chief, is the credit of the speedy and successful organization of the Eleventh Regiment mainly due.

Mrs. Capt. E. H. Sanford was among the first as well as the most liberal of the contributors to the funds of the regiment, and she has never yet ceased her efforts in its behalf. For the purpose of showing, in a degree, the thoughtful kindness of Mrs. Sanford, it may not be out of place to enumerate some of the articles sent to the soldiers from this lady’s private resources. Besides various donations in money, she has sent the following articles: — 800 linen towels (made by herself, and marked); 1600 combs; 400 hair brushes; 1600 cakes of soap; 23 long flannel night-shirts for the sick; 12 short flannel shirts for the sick; 125 pairs of woollen stockings; 40 pairs of shoes; 6000 cigars; 100 bundle handkerchiefs; 100 linen pocket-handkerchiefs; 200 needle-books; 200 pounds of tobacco; over *two thousand pounds* of cake; besides many kegs, boxes, and half barrels of crackers and soda biscuit; jars of pickles, jellies, and sweetmeats; pins, needles, thread, &c., &c., &c.

Col. Robert I. Burbank, Solomon Stebbins, Esq., of the Corn Exchange, and many others too numerous to be mentioned here, also rendered material aid. Colonel Burbank took deep interest in the success of the regiment; he made liberal donations to it, and used his influence to secure the comfort of the men and the success of the organization, and he is gratefully remembered by the officers and soldiers composing it.

Eight companies (all then required for a regiment by State regulation) were soon full, and their officers duly elected and commissioned. By a special order from the Governor, a meeting of the captains and lieutenants of the several companies was convened at the Parker House, on the first of May, 1861, when Major Clark was chosen Colonel, Mr. W. Blaisdell, Lieut.-Col., and Adjutant George F. Tileston, Major. Col. Clark then confirmed the staff appointments previously made. The regiment was now completely organized by the issuing of the following order from the colonel: —

ORDERS No. 1.

BOSTON, May 4, 1861. HEAD QUARTERS ELEVENTH REGIMENT, M. V. M.

The colonel of the regiment desires in this, his first Order, to congratulate the officers and men composing his command, upon the success that has thus far attended their efforts, — that their energy, perseverance, and patriotism has enabled them to organize the regiment *first* to respond to the call of the Commander-in-Chief for new troops. He trusts that each and every officer and soldier under his command will continue his endeavors for the future welfare of the regiment. In order to render efficient service in the cause of our country, the utmost attention must be paid to drill and discipline, to promote which will require, on the part of the instructor and recruits, diligence and patience. Captains of companies should exercise forbearance towards their subordinate officers and soldiers, for, by so doing, they will ensure their respect and confidence; always bearing in mind, however, that the efficiency of the regiment can only be secured by proper discipline. Officers and soldiers will be diligent in their endeavors to acquire a knowledge of every duty that may devolve upon them. No negligence will be overlooked.

Captains, in making returns for the appointment of non-commissioned officers, will examine each person returned, and be ready to certify as to their ability to discharge their several duties. The non-commissioned officers should be proper examples for the soldiers, as the discipline of the company, the conduct of the men, their exactness in obeying orders, and the regularity of their manners, will depend in a great measure upon their vigilance. First sergeants must be capable of keeping a record of the proceedings of their company, the rolls, &c.

Fellow-officers and soldiers, the time is not far distant when you will be called into the field for active service in support of our Government and in defence of our country’s flag; prepare yourselves, then, to perform that patriotic duty in a manner that will be creditable to yourselves, and reflect honor upon our glorious old Commonwealth.

May 9th. The regiment was ordered to Fort Warren, and was augmented to ten companies. While it remained at the fort it was officially visited by the Commander-in-Chief and by the City Governments of Boston and Charlestown. Their unofficial visitors, ladies and gentlemen, were numbered by thousands. The rigid drill and strict discipline the Eleventh was subjected to at Fort Warren caused them to be particularly scrutinized by their visitors, and they were always spoken of in terms of compliment.

June 13th. Captain Marshall, of the U. S. Army, accompanied by Adjutant General Schouler and other officials, visited the fort, for the purpose of mustering the Eleventh into the U. S. service for a term of three years.

On the 7th of June, the Eleventh came up from Fort Warren, and proceeded up State Street at half-past twelve o'clock, on their way to their new quarters at Camp Cameron, North Cambridge, vacated on Saturday by the First Regiment. The last night of the regiment at Fort Warren was signalized by a cordial and spontaneous interchange of parting ceremonies between the members of the Eleventh and Colonel Webster's regiment. Just at dark, and after the Webster regiment were in quarters, the regiment fell into line of their own accord, and proceeded across the parade to the quarters of their companions-in-arms, from whom, after a pleasant intercourse of several weeks, they were about to separate. At their approach the whole of the Twelfth Regiment came out and were received with round upon round of hearty cheers, which they returned with equal vigor. The band of the Twelfth came out, and the members of both regiments, fifteen hundred strong, united in singing a series of patriotic psalm-tunes, appropriate to the occasion, closing with "Auld Lang Syne," which was rendered with fine effect by the grand chorus, whose voices awoke thrilling echoes within the fort. The officers of the two regiments followed the example of their men, and their friendship, which had been cemented by their garrison life, was sealed with pledges to meet if possible on the battle-field, and fight shoulder to shoulder in the common cause. The quarters of the Eleventh were kept brilliantly illuminated until "tattoo." The regiment left Fort Warren about ten o'clock, in the steamers Nantasket and Nelly Baker, and arriving at Long Wharf were formed in column, and immediately marched up State Street, Court, and other streets, through Charlestown to North Cambridge. They were escorted from the fort to their new quarters by Companies A and B of the Webster Regiment, under command of Captain Murch, with the Milford and Gilmore's Brass Bands, and the band of the regiment. There was a large crowd of people on the sidewalks and streets to witness the passage through this city, and the soldiers were frequently and enthusiastically cheered. They made an excellent appearance, the knapsacks of the men being especially noticeable for their snug and uniform appearance. They packed their clothing, blankets, and overcoats, and the most critical observer failed to discover a single slouchy knapsack. On arriving in Charlestown, the regiment halted in Winthrop Square, where they were entertained by an acceptable collation at the expense of the city. The quantity of solids and fluids distributed among the men consisted of five barrels of crackers, three hundred pounds of cheese, two hundred and fifty gallons of lemonade, and about four thousand cigars. The men were overjoyed at this hospitable reception, and voted *nem con* that the Charlestown folks were a whole-souled and liberal set of people, deserving the thanks of the regiment. Meanwhile, the officers had been escorted, by a detachment of the Bunker Hill Cadets, to the residence of Mayor Hutchins, in Chestnut Street, where, in addition, were assembled a bright galaxy of the fair daughters of Charlestown, who greeted the gallant sons of Mars with their sweetest smiles. A number of navy officers and others were present. An elegant collation was spread, to which the guests were invited. The company of volunteers recruited in Charlestown, and commanded by Capt. Wright, left the square, and proceeded to the residence of Hon. Phineas J. Stone, by whom they were hospitably entertained. The next forward movement was made about three o'clock, when the regiment took up the line of march for Camp Cameron, passing the residence of Mayor Hutchins, and making the circuit of Monument Square, under escort of the Bunker Hill Cadets. Upon the arrival of the regiment at Camp Cameron they were placed upon army rations, and the lessons they there received in regard to the regular army manner of cooking and serving out rations proved of incalculable benefit to them when they arrived at the seat of war.

June 28th. A flag-staff of huge dimensions was erected on the camp ground. Speeches were made by R. S. Dana, Esq., and George Washburn, and patriotic odes were sung by the assembly, — soldiers, ladies, and gentlemen. The American flag was then raised by Col. Clark, and saluted with prolonged cheering. At the conclusion of these ceremonies Quartermaster-General Reed delivered the white banner of old Massachusetts into the keeping of the regiment. Gen. Reed said he was confident that the snowy standard of our commonwealth would never be dishonored by the Eleventh in the struggle in which they were about to engage, and he delivered it into their hands with feelings of pride and pleasure. Col. Clark received the flag with a few remarks pertinent to the occasion, and pledged his regiment to fulfil every demand made upon them.

The night before the departure of the Eleventh for Washington, Mrs. Captain E. H. Sanford presented them with an elegant flag, accompanied by the following patriotic letter:—

BOSTON, June 28th, 1861.

To Colonel George Clark, Jr., Eleventh Regiment Infantry, M. V., Camp Cameron, Cambridge.

Dear Sir:—By the hands of my son, I send you a color, of my own design; I wish you to present it to the Eleventh Regiment, under your command. It is my desire

that they bear it with them in the campaign upon which they are about to enter, as a souvenir, not only of the estimation in which you are individually held by me, but as a token of the deep interest I feel in the cause your brave men have taken up arms to defend on the battle-field.

I commit it to your keeping; and, whether it waves over you at the camp-fire, or is unfurled amid the *din* and carnage of battle, let the sight of it carry your minds homewards, to the trusting hearts of those for whose rights you are battling.

I need not charge you to guard it closer than your life, nor to bear it in the battle's front, for in the lusty arms and brave hearts of those under your command there is ample assurance that it will wave where glory and victory light the way.

When peace once more smiles upon our beautiful land — which God grant may soon be the case — and the sword again rests in its scabbard, and the report of the rifle and booming of the cannon give place to the heartfelt shouts and wild hurrahs of a united and happy people, throughout the length and breadth of our land, I am sure you will bring back this flag, torn and blackened, perhaps, by the storm of battle, but the renown you will achieve under the shadow of its folds will make it as bright, beautiful, and pure in the eyes and hearts of your countrymen, as it now is, when committed to your charge.

COL. CLARK'S LETTER OF ACKNOWLEDGMENT.

Headquarters Eleventh Regiment Infantry, M. V., Camp Sanford, Washington City, July 3, 1861.

Dear Madam:—I take the first opportunity that has presented itself since the receipt of your magnificent donation to the regiment under my command, to express to you feebly, but most sincerely, the grateful thanks that are in the hearts of every man in the regiment. Your stand of colors was first unfurled to the breeze of our native State on Saturday last, and now waves proudly in more Southern lands, by the side of the stars and stripes and the banner of our dear old Commonwealth. Side by side they there shall float while the Eleventh has a man to lift an arm in their defence; and as they wave, we can never cease to bear in most grateful remembrance the kindness you have so constantly shown to us in our days of trial, crowned now by this last act of munificent liberality.

Rest assured, dear madam, that as long as we remain a regiment, your name shall never be forgotten in our hearts, and the memory shall ever be an incentive to renewed efforts in the cause of the union of our common United States.

The flag was made of double silk, one side red, the other white. It was gorgeously trimmed with gold fringe and tassels, was inscribed with appropriate mottoes, and cost \$200.

June 29th. The regiment, accompanied by a train of twenty baggage wagons, hospital carriages, &c., left Camp Cameron, were enthusiastically received in Boston all along the route, and took the cars at the Old Colony Depot for New York, arriving there at about ten o'clock Sunday forenoon. They were met at the pier by a delegation of the Sons of Massachusetts, resident in New York, and escorted to the Park, where they were formally welcomed by Richard Warren, Esq.

Appropriate responses were made by Col. Clark and Surgeon L. V. Bell, who replied at length in behalf of the regiment. The regiment then filed into the Park barracks for refreshment, and the field and staff officers were entertained to a banquet at the Astor House. Col. Stetson presided at the table, and speeches were made by Colonel Clark, Col. Frank E. Howe, of the Massachusetts Quartermaster's Department, Major Tileston, Surgeon Bell, Quartermaster Lakin, Capt. Stone, and others.

In the afternoon, the regiment embarked on board of the steamer *Kil Von Kil*, for Elizabethport, and proceeded to Washington by way of Harrisburg, Pa. Upon their arrival in Baltimore, Col. Clark ordered his men to load with ball-cartridges, to be prepared for any emergency. Happily there was no occasion for violent measures, and Gilmore's Boston Band, which accompanied the regiment on their march through the Monumental City, awakened the sullen inhabitants with the strains of Yankee Doodle, Star Spangled Banner, Should Auld Acquaintance be Forgot (most appropriate), &c.

As soon as they arrived in Washington they were entertained to a substantial collation at the Casparis House, Capitol Hill, and then marched up Pennsylvania Avenue, greeted by the cheers of the thousands who throng that great thoroughfare. They passed in review before the President at the White House, and then encamped on the Treasury Grounds, adjoining the Presidential mansion. While they remained at this camp they were visited by some of the most distinguished men of the nation, and President Lincoln often stole away from the weighty cares of his office to their battalion drills and evening parades. One of the Washington papers thus announced the arrival of the "Glorious Eleventh:"—

"Unquestionably one of the finest regiments that have yet marched through the Avenue, arrived at noon on Tuesday, headed by Gilmore's celebrated band, and followed by twenty large, new, covered army wagons, each filled with camp equipments, &c., and drawn by four fat and sleek matched horses. The Eleventh, in their march up the Avenue, were pronounced a little in advance of the best A I regiment yet in the list of arrivals. Success to Colonel Clark and his noble regiment. May he be beaten, not on the battle-field, but by the arrival of another regiment even more magnificent — *if it can be done*. The Eleventh numbers 1,048 officers and men."

The principal event connected with their sojourn in Washington was the arrival of a new light blue uniform, complete, from Massachusetts, and a parade in it down the Avenue.

On the 13th of July, Col. Clark received orders from Gen. Mansfield to break camp and be in readiness to march to Alexandria, Va., on the morning following.

July 14th. Arrived in Alexandria, were attached to Gen. Franklin's brigade, and ordered to encamp on Shuter's Hill, near Fort Ellsworth.

July 15th. Received orders to be in readiness to march the next day, with three days' cooked rations in haversacks, and in "light marching order," *i. e.* without knapsacks or baggage. The blankets of the men were rolled up and tied over their shoulders, and forty rounds of ammunition served to each man.

July 16th. The morning was spent in cooking rations and making other preparations for the march. Capt. Stone, of Company K, being in feeble health, was left in charge of the camp with a guard of one hundred men, many of whom were sick or convalescent. It was now evident to all that a battle was forthcoming — the most important and most unfortunate event of the war. The following details of the part played by the Eleventh in the march and on the battle, and related by an intelligent officer who was present, we give in his own language: —

THE BATTLE.

As soon as the regiment was in line and everything in readiness for leaving Shuter's Hill, Col. Clark called his officers to the front and addressed them and their commands. He assured them that they were about to meet the enemies of their country, and urged them to behave in a manner creditable to themselves, to the regiment, and old Massachusetts. The men responded with deafening cheers, and when they marched out of camp they were greeted with joyous huzzas from the troops in Fort Ellsworth and the camps along the route. When the regiment arrived at the road leading to Fairfax, Companies A and G were left, under command of Capt. Davis, to escort a detachment having in charge a thirty-pound Parrott gun, which, on account of the bad road, they were unable to bring up until the next morning. The rebels had placed trees and other obstructions across the roads, so that the regiment pushed on with much difficulty, and arrived at the place selected for bivouac at three o'clock on the morning of the 17th. At four o'clock — after less than one hour's rest — the regiment was again on the march, which was continued, with occasional halts, until four o'clock, P. M., making a march of twenty-six hours' duration and only one hour's sleep. They then bivouacked at Sangster's Station, west of Fairfax, having gone over a long and circuitous route, in order to cut off the retreat of the enemy from that place. The rebels, however, had timely warning of our intention and retreated, burning the railroad bridge and destroying other property. The enemy's rear guard left the town about half an hour before the arrival of our advanced guard. The day was the hottest the regiment had encountered since leaving home, and many of the officers and men fell down, exhausted by the heat and over-exertion. The place selected for the regiment to bivouac that night was most uncomfortable; the men were so worn out that they lay down upon the ground and were soon asleep. The following day, the 18th, the usual routine of camp duty was pursued, notwithstanding they were hourly expecting an engagement. In the afternoon the cannonading in the first Bull Run battle was distinctly heard by the Eleventh, telling them that their brethren of the Union army were engaging the foe. The regiment was held in readiness to march at a moment's notice. At four o'clock marching orders were given and the brigade advanced in the following order: — Fourth Pennsylvania, Col. Hartstein, First Minnesota, Col. Gorman, Rickett's Battery, including the large Parrott gun alluded to above, the Eleventh Massachusetts, Colonel Clark, and the Fifth Massachusetts, Col. Lawrence. They had not proceeded far on the way when they met soldiers and spectators of the battle, of which they told the most exciting and extravagant stories. The regiment arrived at Centreville late in the evening, and bivouacked for the night. To those who had never seen large bodies of troops together, this bivouac was an interesting sight, and will long long be remembered. The troops were bivouacked in columns of regiments, with a distance between each regiment of one hundred paces, — the artillery and cavalry in the centre of the brigade to which they were attached. General McDowell's headquarters was near this portion of the army.

Among the interesting incidents of this place was the return of scouting parties, bringing in prisoners, — one of them brought in a rebel flag which they had captured, — and as each party arrived they were loudly cheered by the soldiers who crowded around them. A private in the Eleventh brought in a mail-bag belonging to Secessia, containing some hundreds of letters, which were opened at the headquarters of the regiment, to see if they contained any information that would be of service to the army. Nothing of importance was gleaned from them, but they afforded some amusement. A prevalent rumor that the veteran General Scott was present in person caused great

enthusiasm among the troops, who seemed overjoyed that they were to fight in the presence of their commander-in-chief.

At two o'clock the following Sunday morning (the 21st), the whole body of troops, some 30,000, quietly moved out through the village of Centreville, towards Manassas. A few minutes past six o'clock, four guns were fired by a battery in advance, but they were not answered by the enemy. Arriving at the point from whence the guns were fired, the troops turned off to the right and entered the woods, and continued to march for several hours over a road scarcely wide enough for a single team, and yet it was crowded with ambulances and carriages containing citizen spectators. The crowd on the road frequently caused the Eleventh to halt, and then move on at double-quick to regain their position in the column, much to the annoyance as well as fatigue of the troops. At eleven o'clock the troops emerged into the open country. Immediately the batteries in advance engaged the enemy, followed by volleys of musketry, which showed that the infantry had also got into action. Clouds of dust rising above the woods in the distance, indicated that large bodies of troops were either advancing or retreating, apparently the latter. At this moment the Eleventh, which had been suffering all the morning for want of water, were directed to fill their canteens at the "run," near the Stone Bridge. The water, though dirty and thick with mud, was like ambrosia to their parched lips. Orders were received here, to hurry forward the Eleventh to support the troops already engaged, and the order was promptly obeyed. For more than a mile the ground they passed over had been occupied by the enemy, and on every side the surgeons were at work on the wounded of the contending armies. Arriving at the scene of action, the men divested themselves of their blankets, that they might take more active part in the struggle. Turning from the main road, they entered into a field towards the enemy's batteries. Our batteries and the Fifth Massachusetts Regiment were hurrying in the same direction. The Eleventh was formed in close columns of platoons, and, by direction from General Franklin, marched round a piece of wood, which movement brought them under the fire of their own and the enemy's batteries. A small hill, however, on which they were afterwards ordered to lie down, partially protected them from the fire of the enemy. This position was occupied for some time, while the shots from both sides were hurled furiously over their heads. They were then ordered to advance to a road leading to a hill beyond, to support Rickett's Battery and the Fire Zouaves, who were about to charge the enemy's batteries. This road led to a fording place in Bull Run, which was swept by the enemy's guns, and it was at this point that the Eleventh suffered most. Col. Clark gallantly led his men up the hill, when the enemy opened a murderous fire, completely disabling our battery and compelling the Zouaves to retire. The Eleventh was compelled to leave the road to allow the remnants of Rickett's Battery to retreat. They then advanced upon the hill, as directed, which position they occupied until the general retreat commenced, when they were dispersed by a galling fire from the enemy, which killed or disabled a great many brave fellows. The Sanford banner, the State flag, and two United States colors were borne in the fight. One of the color-bearers was shot dead and one badly wounded. During the retreat, Col. Clark, who had been suffering severely from previous sickness and the fatigues of the day, fell from his horse, sun-struck, and was assisted from the field. The loss suffered by this regiment in the battle is as follows: Killed, 15; mortally wounded, 6; wounded, 37; missing, 30. Total, 88. Most of those wounded fell into the hands of the enemy, and several of them died before they were taken from the field.

The Eleventh returned to Shuter's Hill, Alexandria, on the 23d, where the first regimental line, after the battle, was formed. On the 27th, the first payment from the United States was made to the soldiers. On the 9th of August, the Eleventh received orders to march to Bladensburg, Maryland, where they were joined by the First Massachusetts, Twenty-Sixth Pennsylvania, Second New Hampshire, and First Michigan Volunteers, all under command of Brigadier-General Joseph Hooker. During the two months the regiment remained in this camp they were once reviewed by the President and twice by Major-General McClellan. They also assisted in building the forts which protect Washington on the eastern branch of the Potomac. Some deaths occurred by casualties and disease. The troops were several times under marching orders, and on two occasions the beating of the "long roll" at night called the men hastily to arms.

On the 11th of October, Col. Clark, who had been severely ill since the Bull Run battle, was advised by his physician to resign, and, much to the regret of both officers and men, he asked for and obtained an honorable discharge from the service. This result he made known to the regiment in the following letter:—

HARRISON SQUARE, DORCHESTER, MASS., Oct. 12th, 1861.

To the Officers and Soldiers of the Eleventh Regiment Massachusetts Volunteers:—

Having become fully satisfied that I shall be for some time physically unable to perform active duty in the field, in the responsible position I have had the honor to hold at the head of the regiment, and not wishing to occupy a post of so much importance without being able to take entire charge of its affairs, I have felt called upon to resign my commission; a step I am convinced the good of the regiment at this time demands. I confidently expected to have been with you until your services should be no longer required, and to have shared with you in all the glories that must attend your career, and in the praises that I have no doubt you will continue to deserve from your fellow-countrymen, but unfortunately for me that pleasure is denied me. I shall, however, take deep interest in your future welfare, individually and as a regiment. I shall watch your future career with the fullest confidence in your ability and patriotism, and if not again permitted to meet you in the field, I trust I shall join in welcoming you on your return, which, I have no doubt, will be characterized by that enthusiasm which your already distinguished services command. When the Governor of this Commonwealth appealed to our patriotic citizens to rally in defence of our nationality, you were the first to respond, and left your various business pursuits and your families, without any other inducement than the desire to serve your

country; you endured privations and inconveniences that would have discouraged any but the most determined, that you might be ready at any moment to respond to a call for your services from the General Government; you organized the first regiment added to the Massachusetts Volunteer Militia, and were one of the first to be mustered into the service of the United States; you were engaged in one of the first great battles, and up to the present time are the only three years' regiment from this Commonwealth, whose entire force has been actively engaged on the battle-field.

I will take this opportunity to state, that from the first moment that it became apparent that the difficulties that beset our Republic could only be settled by an appeal to arms, I have endeavored to do my duty to my country, and gave it the benefit of my military experience as an officer in the Massachusetts Volunteer Militia, for nearly fifteen years, during which time I made every exertion to prepare myself to perform correctly the duties of any office I might be called upon to fill. And, to the best of my humble ability, I have endeavored to make our regiment effective, and to promote your comfort and welfare. I can conscientiously say that there is no act of my official life that I desire to recall.

I cannot take this opportunity to say of you without thanking you, each and all, for your generous support in the affairs of the regiment; for the marks of confidence and good will that you have shown me on so many occasions; and I shall look back with pride upon our association together, our early trials, our pleasant encampments, our fatiguing marches, and our experience on the battle-field, affording, as they do respectively, evidence of your individual perseverance, your social qualities, your patient endurance, and your coolness, bravery, and efficiency, as a regiment. When our now distracted country becomes again united and prosperous, you will return to your firesides and receive the welcome from your fellow-citizens and friends to which you are so richly entitled for your courage in the field, your discipline in camp, and for your patriotism in leaving pleasant homes to risk your lives in defence of that Union upon which the prosperity and peace of our country now and hereafter depends, upon the perpetuation of which will decide the problem of self-government. The recollection that you stood by your country in its darkest hour and its greatest peril, will afford you the highest satisfaction when you shall once more return to enjoy the quiet and comforts of civil life.

Bidding you farewell, and wishing you individual health and prosperity, and as a regiment, success,

Late Colonel Eleventh Massachusetts Volunteers.

The Governor subsequently promoted the lieutenant-colonel to the command of the regiment and Major Tileston to the lieutenant-colonelcy.

About the last of October, the brigade received orders to march, and after struggling through the mud for three days the Eleventh encamped on the Maryland shore of the Potomac, near Budd's Ferry, and about forty-five miles from Washington. The rebels had erected powerful batteries on the Virginia shore opposite, and throw shot and shell at intervals into our lines, but without causing loss of life, and doing but little damage otherwise. The picket duty here, on account of the mud, the distance they were sent from camp, and frequent incursions of the enemy from the opposite shore, together with the fact that they were surrounded with enemies, open and disguised, was both irksome and hazardous.

A scouting expedition, consisting of Companies A, D, and K, and commanded by Lieut.-Col. Tileston, succeeded in capturing a cannon and other military stores, concealed in the wood near Port Tobacco. The expedition was absent from camp about three weeks, and the manner in which it was conducted was highly complimented by the Commanding General of the Division. At the time we go to press, the regiment is still occupying winter quarters in their camp, near Budd's Ferry, anxiously awaiting the order which will enable them once more to encounter their traitorous foe.

Twelfth Regiment.

Immediately after the cowardly attack made upon the Sixth Regiment of Massachusetts Volunteers by a lawless mob in the streets of Baltimore, an appeal having been made to the loyal sons of Massachusetts, Fletcher Webster, Esq., of Marshfield, published on Saturday, April 20, 1861, the following call, addressed to the patriotic men of Boston and vicinity:—

"Fellow-Citizens—I have been assured by the Executive Department that the State will accept at once an additional regiment of infantry. I therefore propose to meet to-morrow at ten o'clock, in front of the Merchants' Exchange, State Street, such of my fellow-citizens as will join in raising this new regiment. The muster-roll will be ready to be signed then and there. Respectfully, FLETCHER WEBSTER."

The call of Mr. Webster was seconded by the following notice, subscribed with the names of twenty-eight respectable gentlemen, and published at the same time:—

"There will be a public meeting to-morrow, Sunday, in front of the Exchange, State Street, at ten o'clock, A. M., to aid in the enrolment of the new regiment of volunteer militia called for by Fletcher Webster. Come all."

In consequence of this call a mass meeting was held in State Street at the appointed time. One of the morning journals, in describing the occurrence, says: "The appearance of this city yesterday was one of unusual excitement. The streets were, at an early hour, thronged with citizens, anxiously gleaning the extras for the latest news, and discussing the events of the hour with intense excitement. The enthusiasm of the old and the ardor of the young were roused to the highest pitch, and the patriotic spirit of '76 seemed to be fully aroused. The scene on State Street was one of unusual life and animation. Long before the departure of the Fifth Regiment, crowds were thronging into the street, and flocking to the steps of the Exchange. At ten o'clock, according to announcement in the daily papers, Fletcher Webster, Esq., appeared to announce himself in readiness to raise a regiment of militia. He attempted to address the vast crowd, but the inconvenience of the position rendered it utterly impossible for him to make his voice heard. Some one shouted, 'To the Old State House!' This was responded to with cheers, and cries of 'That's the place!' and a rush was immediately made for that spot. Soon Mr. Webster appeared on the balcony, and was greeted with hearty cheers. He uncovered, and bowing in acknowledgment for his greeting, addressed the assemblage of citizens. He said he could see no better use to which the day could be put than for us to take the opportunity to show our gratitude to Divine Providence for bestowing upon us the best government in the world, and to pledge ourselves to stand by and maintain it. He whose good name he bore, had the good

fortune to defend the Union and the Constitution in the forum. This he could not do, but he was ready to defend them in the field. This is no time for speeches, but for action. He then stated that he had received the proper papers from the Governor, authorizing him to raise a regiment of volunteers, and he read a letter stating that when such regiment was completed it would be accepted by the State. He had also received other papers, for signatures of persons wishing to volunteer. He then read General Order No. 6, calling for volunteers, and said that in consequence of this order, he offered his services to his fellow-citizens to join them anywhere in serving their country. Time presses; the enemy are approaching the Capital of the nation; it may be in their hands; (cries of 'never!' 'it never shall be!') Promptness is needed. Let us show the world that the patriotism of '61 is not less than that of the heroes of '76. The noble impulses of their patriotic hearts have descended to us."

"Mr. Webster closed his remarks with an allusion to his father's devotion to the country, and expressed a hope that we shall yet see the nation united and our flag remain without a star dimmed or a stripe obliterated. He then announced that all who desired to enlist would find the papers ready for signatures, at the Surveyor's office, at the Custom House. This announcement was received with loud applause. The remarks of Mr. Webster were received with the greatest enthusiasm, and at the close of his speech he was loudly cheered.

The meeting was likewise addressed by Wm. Dehon, Esq., Hon. Charles Levi Woodbury, Edward Riddle, Esq., and other gentlemen. Mr. Dehon, on being announced, stepped forward and was very cordially received. He commenced his spirited address by saying that the day was one for deeds, not words. He could not see the grandson of Captain Ebenezer Webster, that hero of the Revolution—he could not see the son of that later Webster, who slumbers in the shades of Marshfield, come here, (leaving wife and family) for the cause of that country to whose welfare they devoted their lives, without saying one word of encouragement. He goes to fight traitors, whose equal the world has never seen. Mr. Dehon said he was ready, as one of a committee of one hundred citizens, to join in raising money to equip a regiment of ten companies. His remarks were enthusiastically received.

Mr. Woodbury alluded very feelingly to the brother of Mr. Webster, who gallantly served his country in the Mexican war, and who fell a martyr to the maladies of a tropical climate while anxious to sustain his country's glory, and achieve for himself an honorable fame.

At nine o'clock, on Monday morning, Mr. Nathaniel B. Shurtleff, Jr., who had on the previous day tendered his services to Mr. Webster for the purpose, opened papers for the enlistment of the regiment in Merchants' Exchange, using for headquarters the rooms now occupied for the Post Office, which had been kindly granted to Mr. Webster for the purpose, by the proprietors of the building. So rapidly was the enlistment made for this regiment, that, on the succeeding Wednesday, in less than three days' time, the enlistment was completed and the lists closed, sixteen full companies having offered for the service.

On the same day, a committee of one hundred was organized to co-operate with Mr. Webster in forming and providing for his regiment. Wm. Dehon, Esq., was chosen President, George Eaton, Esq., Secretary, and John D. Bryant, Treasurer. Several committees were also appointed for carrying out the objects of the organization.

Col. John M. Fessenden, a distinguished graduate of West Point Military Academy, gave his valuable services for the instruction of the regiment.

The regiment was composed of five companies enlisted at Boston, one at North Bridgewater, one at Abington, one at Weymouth, one at Stoughton, and one at Gloucester, all having the full complement of rank and file, according to the Massachusetts Statutes.

These ten companies were organized by the choice of officers during the last week of April. The captains of the several companies were: Company A, Capt. Charles E. Grover, who subsequently resigned, and was succeeded in command by Lieut. Richard H. Kimball; Company B, Dehon Guard, Captain George W. Murch, who had seen service in the Mexican war; Company C, Capt. Charles R. Doane, who soon resigned, and Daniel G. Handy, a member of the Second Battalion, was appointed captain; Company D, Latin School Guard, Capt. Nathaniel B. Shurtleff, Jr., a member of the Independent Corps of Cadets; Company E, Emerson Guard, Capt. Edward C. Saltmarsh, late of Norwich Military Academy; Company F, Capt. Alexander Hichborn, of North Bridgewater; Company G, Capt. Ira Blanchard, of Abington; Company H, Capt. James L. Bates, of Weymouth; Company I, Capt. John Ripley, of Stoughton; Company K, Dale Guard, named in honor of Ebenezer Dale, Esq., its constant benefactor, Capt. David Allen, Jr., of Gloucester.

Attached to this regiment is an excellent band, which has proved to be of much value to the division, and particularly to the regiment. Since the encampment at Cantonment Hicks, it has given a grand vocal and instrumental concert at Frederick, which proved to be eminently successful.

The organization of the regiment, which was commenced on Monday morning, April 22, 1861, was completed in the short space of sixteen days; for, on the 7th of May following, the Webster Regiment (for by this name it will ever be remembered) was uniformed, armed, officered, and in camp.

The friends of the regiment were munificent in their gifts, and more than \$14,000 were subscribed for the regiment.

The class which graduated at Harvard College in 1833 gave their classmate, Mr. Webster, a horse and equipments throughout.

The young ladies of Mr. Emerson's school in Boston made liberal donations to Capt. Saltmarsh and his company, and in their honor Company E was named.

The pupils of the Boston Latin School adopted Capt. Shurtleff's company (he being a graduate of the school), and appropriated about four hundred dollars in furnishing each soldier of his command with a good flannel shirt, a pair of flannel drawers, a pair of good wool stockings, a large linen handkerchief, and other necessities, besides presenting \$75 in cash to the captain, and voting a splendid gold medal, bearing an appropriate inscription, to such private of the company as the commander shall report most deserving in *every* respect during the service, on his return from the war. The needlework was voluntarily performed by the young ladies of the Girls' High and Normal School. The Latin School boys have also pledged themselves to see that Capt. Shurtleff's company will be provided for in a manner in no respect inferior to any other that Massachusetts sends to suppress the treason. The school has recently sent to this company about twenty-five dozen pairs of good woollen stockings, two hundred and three pairs of mittens, and many other useful things.

When the companies were first formed in Boston, they were temporarily stationed and drilled in Faneuil Hall, in a hall in Clinton Street, and in another in Summer Street; but in the first week in May they were sent to Fort Warren, in Boston Harbor, by order of the Governor of the Commonwealth, and were there placed in camp, in accordance with special order No. 144, issued April 29th.

The field officers of this regiment were then chosen by the company officers, in accordance with the custom in Massachusetts, and were commissioned by the Governor; Fletcher Webster, Esq., being elected on May 4th to be Colonel, and Timothy M. Bryan, Jr., Lieut. Colonel; and Elisha M. Burbank, Major, on the 9th of May. A list of these will be found in its proper place.

Nearly three long and dull months to the soldiers, who were anxious for service, were spent at Fort Warren, and very few incidents worthy of record transpired there. Among the most notable were visits to Companies E and D, by the schools which had adopted them. Captain Saltmarsh's company received the young ladies of Mr. L. F. Emerson's school who had liberally supplied the soldiers' wants; and Capt. Shurtleff's company received with military honors the Latin School boys, who, on the occasion, presented the company with a standard, to be borne in their parades. The young gentlemen deemed it proper that the standard which they should give should take the classical form of that of the Roman maniples, being surmounted by a gilt eagle, below which is a very perfect medallion head of the great statesman whose honored name the regiment bears; below this the number of the regiment (xii.); and at the bottom the letter of the company (D); the whole supported upon a suitable staff. Speeches, of course, were made on both of these occasions, which proved episodes in camp life.

On the 21st of May official orders were issued to Colonel Webster to fill up his regiment to the maximum number by recruiting; and, on the 14th of June, at the request of Secretary Cameron, the regiment was accepted as part of the Massachusetts quota. On the 26th of June, 1861, 850 men of the Webster Regiment were mustered into service by Captain Marshall, of the United States Army; and in July the ranks were filled, and the new soldiers sworn in by Captains Marshall and Amory.

On the 18th of July, 1861, a splendid standard was presented to the regiment by Hon. Edward Everett, in behalf of the ladies of Boston. The regiment came up to the city from Fort Warren in the steamers *Argo* and *May Queen*, for this purpose, and also for being reviewed by the Governor. It arrived at Commercial Wharf at half-past two o'clock, and was received by the Second Battalion of Infantry, Major Newton, accompanied by Gilmore's Band. A large crowd was gathered on the wharf, and the regiment was heartily cheered upon landing.

After the usual military salutes, the battalion took the regiment under escort, and marched through Commercial and State Street. In the last-named street a very large crowd had assembled, and Sergeant Dunn was obliged to send forward numerous detachments of the Zouaves to clear the way. Looking down from the balcony of the Old State House, a splendid scene was presented—the brilliant Zouave uniform of the battalion contrasting finely with the army uniform of the regiment.

Col. Webster and his staff were mounted; and their appearance at the head of the column created great enthusiasm all along the route. From State Street the troops proceeded through Court, Tremont, and Beacon Streets, to the parade ground on the Common. Upon their arrival at this place, the regiment came to a halt, and the Second Battalion left the line and marched to the State House, where they received the Governor and his staff, the adjutant general, the officers of the Cadets, and several members of the State Government, and escorted them to the Common. The entire parade ground was roped off, and the friends of the regiment were admitted by tickets. Outside of the lines an immense crowd was gathered, and the movements of the soldiers were regarded with much interest. The regiment was drawn up for review shortly after four o'clock. Much to the comfort of all present, the sun was obscured by a threatening but well-meaning cloud; and a cool breeze, although it raised some dust, was kindly welcomed.

The regiment passed in review three times, with full company fronts,—first in common time, second in quick, and last in double-quick,—eliciting enthusiastic cheers from the spectators by the fine marching. It was the opinion of all who saw the regiment that it presented the most soldierly appearance of any which had been recruited in the State. It is a very difficult thing for a company to turn or wheel with a

full front of between forty and fifty men, especially in double-quick time; and this was performed very handsomely by all the companies in the regiment.

After the review, the commissioned officers and the color-bearer and guard were ordered to the front and centre, and the regimental colors were brought forward. Hon. Edward Everett then stepped forward and addressed Col. Webster, in a very felicitous manner, concluding with the following words:—

"And now, sir, on behalf of the friends of the regiment, on behalf of this favoring and sympathetic multitude, I bid you, with your officers and men, God-speed! The best wishes of those whom you leave behind will bear you company. The memories of Lexington, and Concord, and Bunker Hill, will hover round your march. The example of the Massachusetts troops who have preceded you will kindle your emulation. Let the fair banner which I now confide to you be seen in the front of the battle. When it returns, in God's good time, with the regiment, it may come back torn and faded, but it will not, it shall not, return disgraced. Dust and blood may stain it; the iron hail of battle may mar its beautiful blazonry; it may hang in honorable tatters from its staff, but loyalty and patriotism shall cling to the last shred, — treachery shall blast it NEVER, NEVER, NEVER!"

Col. Webster, on receiving the standard, made a speech in reply, which elicited much applause. The color-guard advancing, he committed the standard to their charge, and then, turning to his regiment, proposed three cheers to the friends of the Twelfth, which the gallant soldiers gave in true military style.

The standard is very beautiful, being made of a rich white silk, having a heavy gold band, and edged with blue. On one side the shield of the Union and the coat of arms of the State rest upon one another, to represent the mutual support each derives from the other. In a scroll is the Websterian motto — "Not a stripe erased or polluted, not a single star obscured." The motto — *E Pluribus Unum* — connects the insignia of the State and Union. The palm-leaf of victory, and the oak of sturdy strength, complete this side of the banner. On the opposite side is the simple inscription —

"The Webster Regiment, April 21, 1861."

A halo of light, above the inscription, is set off by a war-cloud at the bottom. An oak and laurel wreath runs nearly round the painting, connecting the first and last words of the motto. The staff is of lance-wood, and the handle is elegantly wrought, with the letter W carved in it. At the top of the staff a gilt eagle perches. Lower down depends a magnificent fold of satin, bordered with gold, and having an elegant fringe of the same material; this adds an element of gorgeousness to the banner. The painting was by Savory the well-known artist.

After the presentation exercises, the regiment proceeded to partake of an excellent collation, which had been spread under the trees on Beacon Street mall. About six o'clock the line was re-formed, and a dress parade was gone through with, after which the regiment started to return to Fort Warren, under escort of the Second Battalion. In State Street it halted for a short time, and when it resumed its march the band struck up a lively air, and the men took the route step, carrying their arms at will and singing, after the manner of the French soldiers. The Twelfth embarked for the fort, about eight o'clock, and the battalion returned to their armory.

No accident occurred in connection with this visit. The embarkation was conducted with the greatest skill and dispatch, and such was the discipline in the regiment that no soldier was left behind. Whatever may have been the opinion of the public in respect to the regiment, certainly, from this time, all acknowledged that no other regiment exceeded it in discipline and drill, and in the quality of the material of which it was composed.

On the afternoon of the 23d of July, 1861, the Webster Regiment left Fort Warren for the seat of war. The demonstrations of respect and affection which the regiment received on its passage through the city were of the most enthusiastic character. All along the route, long before the appearance of the volunteers, the streets, sidewalks, doors, and windows were crowded with persons anxious to give a parting cheer, or a hearty "God bless you," to the men who were on their way to the national capital.

The regiment came from Fort Warren and landed at Commercial Wharf, about half-past six o'clock, P. M. The men wore their white havelocks, which, contrasted with their tanned faces and dark blue coats, gave them a very peculiar appearance. Their knapsacks and gray blankets were packed tidily, and strapped on their backs. They were armed with the Enfield rifles. The Second Battalion of Infantry, Major Newton, accompanied by Gilmore's Band, received them at the wharf, and, after the usual military salutes, they marched through Commercial and up State Street, where an immense crowd had been waiting for several hours. The greatest enthusiasm prevailed, and the police found considerable difficulty in clearing the streets sufficiently to allow the soldiers to pass four abreast. From State Street they marched in double-quick time through Court, Tremont, Boylston, Washington, Beach, and South Streets to the Old Colony Depot. The train was in waiting, and the regiment, after taking leave of the escort, embarked as speedily as possible.

The doors and windows of the station-house were besieged by the crowd of friends, and notwithstanding the vigilance of the police, the place was soon filled. The disaster which occurred to the Union army on the previous Sunday was in the recollections of many wives, mothers, and sisters, and made the parting scenes very sad. Soon after eight o'clock, the signal was given, and the long train of twenty-one passenger cars moved slowly out of the city, drawn by two powerful engines. The baggage train, consisting of eight cars, followed, with the camp equipage, horses, baggage

wagons, ammunition, &c. The men were supplied with ten rounds of ammunition each, and fifty thousand rounds besides went in the baggage train.

The departure of the Twelfth will long be remembered in the community which witnessed its birth, growth, and education. The relation which the regiment maintains to the city, and the reputation which it had achieved, secured to these troops an ovation second to that of none who have gone before them. Previous to leaving the fortress the regiment was reviewed by Brig.-General Andrews, the commander of the garrison, and then the Fourteenth Regiment, Col. Greene, escorted it to the landing. Passing the school ship *Massachusetts*, a salute was fired, the boys manned the yards and cheered the soldiers, and as the boats arrived at Commercial Wharf, salutes were fired from the *Pembroke* and *Cambridge*.

The march of this regiment through the city was a grand ovation. State Street was packed with people, who cheered vociferously as the regiment passed up. At other points the people congregated in masses, and shouted God speed to the departing soldiers. The entire route swarmed with spectators, who, from window and balcony, doorway and sidewalk, waved adieus to the brave men.

The regiment was provided with twenty baggage wagons, five ambulances, two hospital wagons, one powder wagon, and ninety-six horses. The latter had been picketed on the old battle-ground of Lexington about a week, and had been trained by the teamsters. Not a man was sick or left behind; and all were in a condition to meet the enemy, at a moment's warning. So eager were the brave soldiers of this regiment to serve their country in this dreadful emergency, that they actually signed three sets of papers.

Throughout the whole route to Fall River the approach of the train bearing this noted regiment to its destination was greeted with the greatest applause. All along the way, during the night, crowds of enthusiastic persons were in waiting, enlivening the scene with fireworks, bonfires, and other illuminations, and hailing the approach of the train, which bore the regiment, with cheer upon cheer.

On arriving in New York City, at about one o'clock, in the steamer *Bay State*, and landing at the foot of Eleventh Street, East River, the regiment marched to Fourteenth Street, where the soldiers formed into line and listened to an address of welcome from the Rev. Dr. Adams, which was replied to by Col. Webster. A large number of the sons of *Massachusetts* residing in New York, and an immense number of excursionists, from the New England States, then in the city, accompanied by the famous New York Seventh Regiment Band, had previously proceeded to Fourteenth Street, at twelve o'clock, to act as an escort, and were in waiting. The regiment then, preceded by the escort, marched through Fourteenth Street to Broadway, and down Broadway to the Park Barracks, where it was provided with dinner, which had been amply arranged by Mr. Frank E. Howe, military agent for *Massachusetts*. On their way, the soldiers, who took the route step, amused themselves by singing camp songs. The dense throng of spectators, which was stationed all along the route, cheered the troops most enthusiastically. The officers of the regiment partook of a generous repast at the Astor House, by invitation of the "sons," and speeches of a patriotic character were made by Col. Webster, Rev. Dr. Adams, Frank E. Howe, Capt. Shurtleff, and Capt. Hichborn. At seven o'clock, the regiment left the Park Barracks and proceeded to Pier No. 2, where the soldiers embarked in the *Kill Von Kull* for Elizabethport, New Jersey, to take the cars for Washington, via Harrisburg, followed by prolonged cheers of old men and young stalwart youths and blushing girls, until the last bayonet of the last man disappeared on board the boat, and the boat itself was beyond the reach of voices.

On arriving at Lebanon in Pennsylvania, the regiment met with the greatest kindness; persons of every class, sex, and age striving, without recompense, to do most for the *Massachusetts* boys. With a few stoppages, the regiment arrived in Baltimore about noon on Friday, where an unexpected reception awaited them: for the people there vied with each other in their hospitalities. At midnight, Col. Webster and his command proceeded to Harper's Ferry, where they arrived in the forenoon of Saturday, July 27th, and pitched tents on the Maryland side of the Potomac, about a mile from the Ferry, calling their encampment Camp Banks. After tarrying here awhile, the regiment, which had been placed in Abercrombie's Brigade, in the division commanded by Gen. Banks, proceeded to Hyattstown, Maryland, thence in a fortnight to Darnestown, where it remained until it removed to Cantonment Hicks, about four miles to the east of Frederick City, in Maryland, arriving there on Thursday the 5th of December, 1861. At this place the regiment remained in camp until the 27th of February, 1862, when it marched into Virginia for more active service.

Too much gratitude cannot be given to Messrs. Dehon, Eaton, Butler, Hallett, and Bradford of the general committee, who assumed the whole pecuniary responsibility attending the raising of the regiment; to these is truly owing the admirable condition in which the regiment left the Old Bay State.

Although the Webster Regiment has not been, as yet, engaged in any battle with the rebels, it has, nevertheless, performed valuable service for the country by guarding the Upper Potomac, and assisting in preventing the enemy from crossing the river into Maryland, which would be attended with the most serious consequences. The suppression of rebellion in western Maryland has been effected by the position of the division of the army under Major General Banks, of which the command under Col. Webster forms a part. When this regiment is called into a more aggressive duty, it will, undoubtedly, like the others from the Commonwealth of *Massachusetts*, achieve for itself a reputation inferior to none of the others.

Thirteenth Regiment.

The Fourth Battalion of Rifles formed the basis of the Thirteenth Regiment, and, to complete the organization, six companies, part of which had previously composed the Second Battalion of Rifles M. V. M., were added.

The Rifle Battalion was formed in this way. The City Guard of Boston, one of the oldest volunteer companies of the State, having a history as far back as 1821, after going through various transitions, during all of which, however, it preserved its distinct character, was, during the winter of 1860-61, one of the companies of the First Massachusetts Volunteer Militia, under Col. Cowdin. A vacancy occurred in its command, and a project was broached to cut loose from the regiment, become a rifle company, and form the germ of a battalion organization. This scheme was entertained at headquarters, and Samuel H. Leonard, lately of Worcester (and proprietor of Leonard's Worcester Express), well known in the State as a thorough military man, having been Brigadier General of the Worcester Brigade, was chosen Captain. In March, 1861, a second company was raised, to which N. Walter Batchelder, a thorough soldier, formerly of the Boston Light Infantry, was elected Captain. Capt. Leonard was then chosen Major, and James N. Fox (an old "City Guard"), a lawyer of Boston, and a man of large estate and universally esteemed, succeeded to the command of Company A. The two companies were already full before the Fort Sumter affair ignited the flames of war. An impetus was then given to the military spirit of the community, so that in a few days the applications for recruiting were so numerous that, permission being given, two companies were organized under Capt. John Kurtz and Capt. Augustine Harlow, both well known as militia captains in Boston.

The four companies, thus organized, were composed of young men of Boston and the immediate vicinity, of education and business experience in the stores and counting-rooms of the city, and averaging less than twenty-three years of age. Though they carried into the service of their country intelligence and activity rather than strong arms and muscular frames, they afterwards accomplished the longest marches with unsurpassed endurance.

In May the battalion, numbering about 350 men, procured a neat rifle-gray uniform, costing about \$15 per man, paying for it themselves, and asked for service or camp duty. On the 25th of May they were sent to Fort Independence, in Boston harbor, to garrison that place, a company from Roxbury under Capt. Bartlett (who subsequently resigned, and was succeeded by Lieut. Pratt) being added to the garrison as "Company E." Here they remained until after the regiment was organized in July. Meanwhile their time was used in the most effective manner for acquiring the art of warfare under their skilful teachers, and their superior drill attracted thousands of visitors to the fort to witness their evolutions. So rapid was their advancement, that when, on the 4th of July, they went to Boston to assist in the celebration of the day, numbering nearly 300 men, the precision and ease of their movements excited much surprise and the greatest applause.

About the first of July five more companies were added to the garrison, preparatory to a regimental organization. Two of these were from Marlboro', one from Natick, one from Sudbury, and one from Westboro', — all more or less based on militia organizations in these places. The members were young men — mostly mechanics — who went forth from the confinement of the workshop with ardor in their new and stirring vocation. The Sudbury company was afterwards disbanded, its members joining other companies, and a company from Stoneham was added to the regiment, its captain being J. P. Gould.

On the 16th of July the regimental organization was announced, Maj. Leonard being Colonel; Capt. Batchelder, Lieut. Colonel; and Capt. Gould, Major.

When the time of the three months' troops had nearly expired, the "Thirteenth" received marching orders; and, on the 29th of July, left Fort Independence for the seat of war, escorted to the depot in Boston by the old members of the Boston City Guard. Although the weather was most inauspicious for the event, the streets were lined with multitudes to witness their departure; for, to the people of Boston, this seemed more like *their* regiment than almost any other which had left for the seat of war, and they felt that in the "Thirteenth" went forth the "flower of the Massachusetts troops."

Along the route of the railroad, until their arrival at Norwich at midnight, their passing was anticipated by crowds at the various stations, who cheered them on their way. At Worcester they disembarked and spent a portion of the evening partaking of a collation tendered by the government of that city.

On the following day, they arrived in New York city. Their appearance, as they marched down Broadway, elicited much applause. Arriving at the Park Barracks at ten, they were dismissed until dinner time, and were soon scattered about the city, viewing the sights of the metropolis.

An incident, which occurred while they were in New York, is worthy of record, as it shows the substantial character of the men composing the regiment. Colonel Leonard was advised to keep his men within the Park, if he wanted to find them there when the hour for departure arrived. "No," said he; "I can trust every one of them; they may go where they please, and I guarantee that every one will be in his place, sober, at the appointed time." His words proved true.

Ordered to the department of Harper's Ferry, they took passage by the Camden and Amboy Railroad, and, via Philadelphia and Harrisburg, arrived at Hagerstown, Maryland, August 1st. After resting here a day, they took up their line of march, and in twenty-two hours reached Pleasant Valley, two miles from Harper's Ferry, having, in that time, traversed twenty-six miles, over a mountainous country, and under a sultry sun.

Two days after, they took the same road back fifteen miles, and then crossed the mountains, being ordered to Sharpsburg, to guard the fords on the Potomac in that vicinity.

Companies D, F, G, and K, were stationed at headquarters in Sharpsburg. Companies A and B were detailed to "Antietam Ford," four miles down the river; Companies E and H to the ford opposite Shepardstown, Va., and C and I up the river several miles. They remained thus on duty until August 21st.

While opposite Shepardstown, Major Gould sent an expedition of sixty men across the river by night, which passed through the town unobserved, to the residence of A. R. Boteler, previously a member of Congress, then an active secessionist, whom they arrested. He was brought over without resistance, but was afterwards released.

While Boteler was a prisoner, about three hundred cavalry appeared on the opposite shore, and, firing a volley, retired to cover, behind some trees and underbrush.

Major Gould, anticipating that they would cross the river, set his men to digging rifle-pits, and sent to Antietam Ford for reinforcements. On arriving, as the enemy had, to all appearances, retired, the reinforcements returned in time to hear a volley fired across the river, at Antietam Ford, by the same party of cavalry, and to see them retreat, followed by the bullets of their comrades, who had been left to guard the camp.

August 21st, the regiment was gathered together at Sharpsburg, and started for Sandy Hook, opposite Harper's Ferry, arriving in the afternoon of the 23d, having traversed a round-about road, bivouacking at Boonsboro' and Broad Run. They remained here until September 3, Companies I and K guarding at the river, the remainder of the regiment encamped on the plain, east of the Maryland Heights.

Being ordered to General Banks's headquarters at Darnestown, the eight companies not on guard duty took passage on canal boats as far as Conrad's Ferry, then marched across the country sixteen miles, pitching their tents on the 5th of September at Darnestown, it having rained almost every hour during the journey.

While at Darnestown, Company C was sent to Monocacy Junction, to search the trains passing that point, the other seven companies remaining at headquarters five weeks, during which time the men improved their leisure in decorating the streets of their camp with arches and rows of evergreen trees; each street having a name tastefully painted on a sign, the whole named "Hamilton Park," in compliment to Brigadier-General Hamilton, of whose brigade the Thirteenth formed a part. The camp attracted a great many visitors from the neighboring regiments, who pronounced it the neatest and pleasantest to be found in the army.

October 10th, the seven companies were ordered to Williamsport, sixty miles distant, on the Upper Potomac. They arrived on the 14th, having bivouacked in the rain each night of the journey. On arriving here, Colonel Leonard was placed in command of the district between Harper's Ferry and Hancock, acting as Brigadier-General, with about three thousand five hundred troops under his command, including two pieces of the First Pennsylvania Artillery and a company of one hundred Pennsylvania cavalry.

On the 18th, the three companies, C, I, and K, on detached duty at Harper's Ferry, took part with the Wisconsin regiment, and three companies of the Pennsylvania 28th (the whole force being under the command of Colonel Geary), in a fight near Bolivar, against a greatly superior force of the enemy, defeating them, and capturing a thirty-two pound cannon. In this affair, Lieut. Jackson, in command of company C, displayed much skill and courage in the management of his men, who were deployed as skirmishers, receiving the commendation of Gov. Geary both on the field and by letter a few days after to the colonel at Williamsport. In this engagement privates Twichell and Stimpson, of Co. C, were severely wounded.

October 31st, the three companies from Harper's Ferry rejoined the regiment. Companies I and K had been on duty at that place over ten weeks, during which time they had raised defensive works of a permanent character, under the superintendence of Major Gould and Captain Sreiber. While at Harper's Ferry, Company I lost one of their men, private Spencer, who, while walking up between the canal and river with six others, was shot by a rebel picket, expiring instantly.

November 25th, a messenger arrived from Hancock, twenty-seven miles above Williamsport, asking for reinforcements, as six hundred rebels were encamped on, and occasionally firing from, the opposite shore. Companies A, B, E, and H, with one piece of artillery, were dispatched at once. Starting during the evening, they arrived the following afternoon at 3, but only to be disappointed. The field-piece reaching Hancock in advance, opened fire on the rebels, and the first shell, breaking in their midst, caused them to scatter and run in every direction for cover. On the arrival of the companies, not a rebel was to be seen.

On the following day, Company E, that was stationed at Sir John's Run, four miles above Hancock, exchanged fire with a rebel force in ambush, across the river, in which affair private Cheney received a ball in the calf of his leg.

December 7th, the rebels appeared on the Potomac, opposite Dam 5, for the purpose of destroying the dam, and thus stopping the canal navigation.

Company C was dispatched from headquarters, and a lively exchange of rifle shots followed, during which private Kenney was severely but not fatally wounded, being pierced by three bullets, one of which went through both legs. The enemy being over a thousand strong, with three pieces of artillery, Companies G and I, and a Parrott gun from the First Pennsylvania Artillery, were sent up. Firing was kept up on both sides, for a number of days, when the enemy retired without being able to accomplish their object.

A large stone mill, valued at \$50,000, from which the rebels had fired during the day-time, was fired and destroyed in the night by a boat-load of men from the Thirteenth.

From the foregoing sketch it will be seen that though the ranks of the Thirteenth have not been exposed in mass to the rebel fire, yet portions of it have been engaged in important skirmishes, those at Bolivar and Dam No. 5 being the principal ones. The duty of the regiment has been important and arduous. No regiment has probably done more marching, and it has been posted as guards along the bank of the Potomac for a distance of fifty miles, where only the most reliable and intelligent troops should be detailed. Its health has been most excellent, the deaths in seven months being but three, and its discipline complete. No court-martial has disturbed the equanimity of the camp, and an arrest for even minor offences is a remarkable event. And, withal, the officers are held by the men in the highest esteem, and regarded with the utmost confidence.

Feb. 10, 1862, the regiment was in quarters near Williamsport; Company B on provost duty in the town.

Company G (Grey Eagles), Stoneham. — 13th Reg.

Early in the struggle, the citizens of Stoneham took measures for raising a company, and on the 17th of April a company had been formed and recruited to its full number. J. P. Gould was chosen to the captaincy, which he retained till the departure of the regiment to the seat of war, when, being promoted to the rank of major of the regiment, Capt. Fiske was commissioned in his place. Although the company was ready thus early, such was the eagerness of the people to spring to their country's defence, that the different companies could not be accepted as fast as they were offered, and it was not till the last of July that this company was ordered into service. During the time that it was waiting to join some regiment the town liberally contributed to its support, appropriating nearly \$4,000 for that purpose. A uniform was also presented to each of the men, at a cost of \$12, and a full set of equipments to each of the officers, by the citizens. In July, orders having been received to report at Fort Independence, they left the town, to join the 13th Regiment, nearly three hundred of the citizens volunteering as an escort.

Company K (Westboro' Rifles), Westboro'.—13th Reg.

Organized April 27, 1861, as Massachusetts Volunteer Militia, under the call for three months' troops, and when the order was received to accept none but volunteers for three years or the war, the company immediately voted to serve for that period. After waiting impatiently for orders nearly three months, and being, at the end of this time, on the point of disbanding, they were at last attached (June 29) to the 13th Regiment.

The towns of Westboro', Southboro', Shrewsbury, and Upton, to which places the greater part of the members belong, furnished them with uniforms, fatigue suits, haversacks, toilet materials, &c., &c., and paid to each member three dollars per week from the time they were first organized until they were mustered into the United States service, with ten dollars additional to each member on the day they left home.

There were seven men in this company from the town of Hopkinton, but that town declining to uniform or aid them, they were uniformed by the town of Westboro'. The captain and lieutenants also were furnished with swords and all other necessary equipments by the town of Westboro'. On the 28th of June a bountiful collation was furnished for the company, by the citizens at the Town Hall, under the direction of the military committee. The hall was decorated with flags and portraits of officers who were in the Revolutionary War, among which was one of Col. Thomas Marshall (by Copley), who was at that time in command of Fort Independence, on Castle Island. Addresses were made by gentlemen of Westboro' and the adjoining towns, and the occasion was a very pleasant and memorable one.

The first commander, Capt. Blackmer, who was formerly pastor of the Methodist Church in Westboro', resigned his commission, Oct. 17, while the company was stationed at Harper's Ferry, Md., and its present commander, Capt. Hovey, was appointed Nov. 6, having previously held commission as 1st lieutenant. Company D.

Capt. Hovey has had many years' experience in our State militia, having formerly been a member of the "Boston Light Infantry," and afterward a lieutenant in the "*Lowell Mechanic Phalanx*." From all the accounts which we have received of him, we are fully persuaded that no better man commands a company in the volunteer service.

Fourteenth Regiment.

(Organized as Infantry but changed to Artillery.)

The Fourteenth Regiment Massachusetts Volunteers, often called the "Essex Regiment," is composed entirely of companies from Essex County. The material of this regiment is equalled by few, if any, in the service, most of the companies having been formed immediately after the departure of the three months' troops, when an ardent patriotism had induced many of the most respectable and intelligent citizens to enlist, and when, also, recruits were so numerous, in proportion to the supposed wants of the service, that it was practicable to adhere strictly to the highest standard of physical requirements.

After many weeks of fruitless efforts to obtain an acceptance of their services, the companies composing the Fourteenth Regiment were ordered, June 25th, to Fort Warren, and the organization immediately completed by the appointment of the regimental officers. The soldiers of this regiment deserved good officers, and, in the main, received them.

Wm. B. Greene, appointed colonel, not only possessed the advantages of a military education at West Point, and considerable active service in the United States Army in Florida and elsewhere, but, in addition, several years' residence in Paris had afforded him unusual opportunities for observing the best appointed and disciplined troops of the French army. The promptness with which Col. Greene, on learning of the cowardly attack on Fort Sumter, left his luxurious foreign home and a life of ease, and volunteered his services in defence of the constitution of his country, was but an earnest of the self-denying zeal and alacrity characterizing his subsequent conduct, and which his potent precept and example have impressed thoroughly upon the entire regiment.

Mustered into the service of the United States, July 5th, the regiment remained at Fort Warren until August 7th, when it left (in the darkness of a rainy midnight) for Harper's Ferry; but, on arriving at Baltimore, orders were found, changing the destination to Washington.

The first public display of the characteristic "pluck" and promptness of the Fourteenth Regiment, since their having become, in the language of a high officer of the Regulars, "a proverb in the army," was the evening after their arrival, marching in obedience to orders, by mistake not countermanded, through Pennsylvania Avenue, singing "John Brown," in the midst of a terrific rain storm; and then supperless but cheerfully, late at night, bivouacking on the wet ground, covered only by the wetter clouds. After the regiment was formed in line, preparatory to the march, Col. Greene, although an invalid at the time, sent away his horse, and placing himself at the head of his regiment, on foot, led them through the drenching rain a long and weary march to the place designated, and took neither rest nor refreshment until every soldier of his command had been as well provided for as the circumstances would allow.

A week afterwards, a reliable regiment was wanted to garrison Fort Albany on Arlington Heights, and though so recently arrived at the seat of war, the Fourteenth was selected for the responsible and honorable post; at that time an attack was considered imminent, and as Fort Albany completely commanded Washington, it was a position by no means free from danger. Shortly after, Fort Runyon, three-fourths of a mile nearer the Potomac, and the works defending the head of Long Bridge, as well as the Virginia half of the bridge itself, were added to the charge of the regiment.

Having the care of fortifications, the Fourteenth Regiment has, from its first arrival, acted more as artillery than infantry, and that its progress in drill and discipline, and the performance of its large and responsible guard and garrison duty, including much labor in constructing fortifications, have been to the highest satisfaction of its superior officers, is proved, not only by their verbal and written assurances to that effect, but also by the more substantial fact that the regiment has been changed permanently to artillery. The new organization is modeled after the Fifth United States Artillery, allowing twelve companies or batteries, each consisting of one hundred and fifty-six rank and file, with one captain, two first and two second lieutenants, and allowing one major to each four batteries. As thus constituted and recruited up to the full standard, the Fourteenth will more nearly resemble a brigade than an ordinary volunteer regiment, as it will consist of nearly two thousand men.

This company was organized May 14, 1861. A standard was presented to them June 22 by the students of Phillips Academy, the presentation speech being made by J. A. Bent, of the senior class, and responded to by Capt. Holt.

When the company left Andover, June 24, for Fort Warren, a collation was provided for them at the Town Hall. They were addressed by F. Cogswell, Esq., President of Citizen's Committee of twenty-five, and they were escorted to the ears by the "Havelock Guards," (a company formed by the theological students, for military drill), and by the "Phillips Cadets" (a company formed by the students in Phillips Academy, for military drill), and by a procession of citizens, calling together one of the largest collections of people ever seen in the town.

The town paid the members for about sixty days' drill, at 50 cts. each per day, and furnished each with a uniform and general outfit.

Fifteenth Regiment.

On the 28th day of June, 1861, ten companies, which had been recruited in different towns in Worcester County, were ordered by Governor Andrew into camp, two miles from the city of Worcester, which was named "Camp Scott," and Brigadier-General George H. Ward, and Staff, of the State Militia, was placed in command of the troops, which were designated as the "Fifteenth Regiment Massachusetts Three Years Volunteers." On the first of July, Major Charles Devens, Jr., of the "Third Battalion of Rifles Three Months Massachusetts Volunteers," then stationed at Fort McHenry, was offered, by the Governor, the command of the Regiment.

On account of his then position, and the arduous duties devolving upon him at the post, Major Devens did not feel justified in making immediate acceptance, or of obtaining leave of absence from his duties.

On the 20th of July, however, he returned to Worcester, when he visited Camp Scott, and was most favorably impressed by the appearance of the regiment, and the proficiency in drill attained by the troops under the admirable instructions of General Ward.

Major Devens accepted the position proffered him, and on the 26th of July received the commission of Colonel of the "Fifteenth Regiment Massachusetts Volunteers," and General George H. Ward that of Lieutenant-Colonel. Captain John W. Kimball was commissioned as Major.

It was intended to retain this regiment in camp for the period of one month to perfect the soldiers in drill, but the battle of Bull Run and its disastrous results hastened the departure of all the troops in readiness, in this region, to the seat of war. On the 7th of August, an elegant flag was presented to the regiment by the ladies of Worcester, and duly recognized by Colonel Devens, in an appropriate compliment to the ladies who have liberally contributed to the comforts and necessities of the true defenders of their liberties. The regiment departed the next morning, by rail, for Washington.

No important incidents occurred *en route* to the Capital. On the arrival of the regiment at Baltimore, on the afternoon of the 10th, they proceeded with loaded muskets along the streets of the city, anticipating an attack from the mob, but happily no interference was had. At an early hour the following morning (Sabbath), the regiment arrived at Washington, and was quartered in appropriate buildings erected by the Government.

The 9th and 10th days of August were days of intense heat and sultriness, and many of the men were prostrated in consequence.

On Monday, August 11th, the regiment marched during a drenching rain to their camping ground at "Meridian Hill," near the beautiful residence "Kalorama," which name was adopted for the camp where the regiment (unbrigaded) was quartered under the command of General Rufus King.

On the 25th August orders were received for marching, and the troops were in a few hours en route for Poolsville, Md., distant thirty-five miles from Washington. Two nights were spent in bivouac, and on the 27th the tents of the Fifteenth were pitched upon an elevated plain in the confines of Poolsville, the site commanding a fine view of Leesburg and the mountain ranges of Virginia. The camp is distant seven miles from Conrad's Ferry, and five miles from Edwards' Ferry, on the famous Potomac river.

The encampment was named "Camp Foster," in honor of Hon. Dwight Foster, Attorney-General of Massachusetts.

In a few days, two companies were ordered on picket duty along the banks of the Potomac, and subsequently the number of companies was increased to five, who were posted between the two ferries. For many days frequent exchanges of shots were made between the federal and rebel pickets, resulting in no serious injury to either, but finally ceased by mutual consent. The soldiers of the opposing forces frequently indulged in friendly colloquies across the river, and in the interchange of papers and various articles of little value, as tobacco, pocket-knives, military buttons, etc.

The regiment (still unbrigaded) was placed under the immediate command of Brigadier-General Stone, whose position was entitled "Corps of Observation."

During the evening of the 20th October, Capt. Chase Philbrick, Co. H, who with his company for some days held possession of "Harrison's Island" (situated between the two ferries, in the river), crossed to the Virginia shore, and discovered what was supposed a camp of the rebel forces. This intelligence was immediately communicated to General Stone in camp, and by his order Colonel Devens, with Quartermaster Church Howe and the five companies on picket, crossed on the same night by way of Harrison's Island to the Virginia shore, for the purpose of attacking and destroying the supposed encampment of the enemy.

Colonel Devens was followed by Colonel Lee of the Twentieth Massachusetts Regiment, with one hundred men, who were to remain upon the bank of the river and cover the retreat, if found necessary, while Colonel Devens pushed forward in the reconnaissance.

Orders were at the same time sent to Lieutenant-Colonel Ward to proceed with the remaining five companies of the Fifteenth Regiment to the Island. The "long roll" was heard at midnight, and Lieutenant-Colonel Ward, Major Kimball, Chaplain Scanlan, with Adjutant Hicks and Assistant-Surgeon S. F. Haven, Jr., marched with alacrity to the river, which was reached between the hours of three and four o'clock, A. M.

At seven o'clock a skirmish ensued between Captain Philbrick's company and a company of the rebel Mississippi riflemen, when Lieutenant-Colonel Ward with his troops began to cross to the Virginia shore, followed by Captain Candy with ten cavalry men. In the course of the morning more companies of the Twentieth Regiment, and companies of the California regiments under Colonel Baker, with companies of the Tammany Regiment New York Volunteers, and two howitzers mounted, together with one or two pieces of the Rhode Island Battery, crossed the river. A portion of the Nineteenth Regiment were stationed still later in the day upon the island.

Near the middle of the day, another skirmish took place between a portion of the Fifteenth and the rebel forces, when fifteen or twenty men of the regiment were killed or wounded. Reinforcements not arriving, the troops fell back half a mile to the place long to be remembered as "Ball's Bluff," where Col. Lee's detachment was stationed. Near the hour of three o'clock, P. M., a general engagement of the opposing forces commenced, in which Col. Baker commanded the federal forces. The Fifteenth Regiment held the right of the line of battle. The contest was bravely maintained from two to three hours, when the loss of many of our brave heroes, and the greatly superior force of the enemy, compelled a retreat. At this juncture, the only boat remaining for the conveyance of the wounded and helpless soldiers across the river was swamped, and many went down in her. Those who preferred the last hope of escape from death or imprisonment threw aside their arms, and many their clothing, and plunged into the river. Colonel Devens and Major Kimball, with other officers, threw their swords and side arms into the river, and, followed by many of the men, swam to the island and Maryland shore, while repeated and continuous volleys were poured down upon the devoted heads of all who presented a mark for the murderous shots of the rebels. Many entered the river without divesting themselves of clothing, and many retained their guns, and escaped to the opposite shore. How many of our brave comrades lost their lives in the turbulent stream of the Potomac will forever remain unknown. Great difficulty was experienced in conveying the wounded soldiers from the island to the Maryland shore. Throughout the day the worthy Chaplain was indefatigable in his attentions to the wounded and helpless soldiers. The house upon the island used as a hospital for the wounded was fired upon by the rebels for some time after the retreat of the federal troops. The brave Colonel Ward was seriously wounded in the left leg, and suffered amputation upon the island before his arrival at camp. Surgeon Hayward of the Twentieth, and Assistant-Surgeon Haven of the Fifteenth, were untiring in their exertions for the care of the devoted men wounded in the engagement; and at early dawn of

the following morning left the island with the last of the wounded men who had been enabled to reach that shelter. Surgeon Bates of the Fifteenth was confined to his bed with sickness. On learning the departure of the troops from camp he followed them in a carriage to the place of crossing at the river, and remained there in discharge of his duties during the day, and assisted in the disposition of the wounded who were able to reach him, and in conducting the ambulances for their removal.

Of 621 men of the Fifteenth Regiment who went forth to battle, 310 were killed, wounded, and missing.

The remainder of the troops returned to camp and to their duties, and after the lapse of a few days two companies were again detailed for duty on picket.

The officers and men of the regiment were highly complimented by the lamented Col. Baker, for their soldierly bearing and gallant deeds on the field, and, with the other regiments engaged in the battle, received marked encomiums in a general order from their most worthy Commander-in-chief, General McClellan.

Company A, Leominster.—15th Reg.

This company was organized in 1787, as artillery, and was known as the Leominster Artillery until a few years ago, when it was attached to the 9th Regiment of Infantry as Company A. Recruits were added to their number during the spring and summer of 1861. The town appropriated the sum of \$5,000 for the outfit of the soldiers, and to furnish necessary aid to their families. In addition to the above amount, Messrs. Johnson C. Burrage, Alvah A. Burrage, and Charles H. Burrage, of Boston, presented to this, their native town, \$810, with the request that it be expended for the proper outfit and equipments of this company. A public meeting of the citizens was held at the Town Hall, on the day of the departure of the company, at which addresses were made to them, and swords and equipments were presented to Capt. Rockwood and Lieut. Wood. A liberal supply of refreshments were furnished to the soldiers. The occasion was one of grand interest.

We copy the following from the "Boston Journal":—

"Lieut. Leonard Wood was confined to his bed in the hospital at the time his regiment left their quarters at Poolsville, previous to the battle of Ball's Bluff. He had been thus confined three days, being threatened with the typhoid fever; but hearing the tramp of his comrades, as they were taking their departure to that terrible field of death, he questioned the attendant physician in regard to their destination, but receiving no satisfactory answer, after waiting some time, exclaimed: 'Doctor, I feel it my duty to go with the boys; for if there is a fight, and I am not in it, I shall never forgive myself.' The doctor expostulated with him upon the folly of his taking part in an engagement in his present condition, and, for a short time, prevailed upon him to remain quiet, assuring him that he would be unable to endure the fatigue of a march, much less the excitement of a battle. About an hour elapsed, when the doctor was greatly astonished to hear his patient exclaim, as he jumped from his bed: 'Doctor, I can't stand it any longer, I must go.' The doctor entreated, but of no avail; his patient dressed himself, girded on his sword, and ran after his regiment, which he finally succeeded in overtaking. He was in the thickest of the fight, and swam across the Potomac at its conclusion, and is now as well and hearty as any man in camp, greatly to the surprise of his physician, and the admiration of his colonel."

The clergyman of the town presented each member with a New Testament, and a flag was presented the company, from the ladies of Fitchburg.

Organized subsequent to the nineteenth of April, 1861, in Grafton, and, after the battle of Ball's Bluff, recruited in part by the efforts of citizens, and at the expense of that town. The company was furnished with uniforms and other clothing, and a variety of useful articles, also each commissioned officer with a sword, belt, sash, and epaulets, at the expense of the town, the garments being made up by the patriotic ladies of that place.

Each member of the company was also presented with a pocket edition of the New Testament and Psalms, by the Sabbath School connected with Rev. Mr. Biscoe's church. On

the 28th of June, when they left Grafton, to join their regiment at Camp Scott, Worcester; there was a great public demonstration commenced in the Town Hall, but adjourned, on account of the crowd, to the common, where addresses were made by the several clergymen of the place, and the garments and other articles made up for them by the ladies were presented to them. Escort duty was performed by the engine companies and a large course of citizens.

The company went into the action at Ball's Bluff only three men short of a full complement.

Sixteenth Regiment.

Was formed July 2d, 1861, and ordered into Camp Cameron, in North Cambridge, where it was mustered, by companies, into the United States service, by Capt. J. C. Amory, of the Seventh Infantry, United States Army.

The regiment remained at that camp until Aug. 17, when it was ordered to the seat of war. At eight o'clock in the morning, of the day of their departure, the troops were drawn up in line on the parade ground, and their arms and equipments carefully inspected, after which they left the camp shortly before noon, in heavy marching order. Each soldier had forty rounds of cartridges in his cartridge-box, and two days' rations in his haversack; altogether they took seven days' cooked rations and 60,000 cartridges. The Brigade Band accompanied the regiment on the route, and alternated with the band of the regiment. There were crowded streets to greet them in Boston and Cambridge. Three o'clock was the hour fixed for their departure, and with a punctuality that augured well for the future, they were at the Old Colony station at the appointed time. The baggage train, escorted by Company F, came into town in the forenoon, and was loaded upon the cars. Soon after three o'clock, the train of twenty-one cars started, leaving Boston and home behind, and conveyed them to Fall River, where they embarked on board the steamer.

The following extract is taken from a statement made by one of the officers of this regiment:—

"No accident happened to mar the pleasure of the journey from Boston, and the regiment arrived safely at Baltimore, Maryland, on the 19th of August, just four months from that memorable day when the Massachusetts Sixth met with such hostile demonstrations while marching through the streets of the monumental city, on their way to the defence of their country's capital. Our reception was very different from this, however, as we marched unmolested through the same streets that had so lately

been stained with their blood. Our further progress was here arrested by an order for the regiment to go into camp on the McKim estate at Baltimore, which was christened Camp McClellan. During our stay here, two painful accidents happened which cast a gloom over the regiment. On the 20th of August, E. R. Wingate and Jerry Cokeley, two privates of Company A, were badly wounded by the accidental discharge of a loaded rifle; but both recovered and went on duty again. The other occurred on the 29th of August, when private Andrew J. Sproule, of Company I, was shot while on duty as sentinel, by a man named Scott, who had previously threatened his life. This shooting was regarded by some as accidental, by others as the carrying out of his threat. Sproule lived but a few days.

"The regiment remained encamped here till the first of September, when it was thrown into a joyful state of excitement by an order to proceed at once to Fortress Monroe, Va. The order to pack was given at three o'clock, P. M., and at half-past four the regiment was in line, ready for marching; and at nine o'clock, P. M., we embarked on board the steamer Louisiana en route for Fortress Monroe. We arrived on the afternoon of the 2d of September, and proceeded to Camp Hamilton, which is located in the vicinity of Hampton, a short distance from the Fortress, where we found the Twentieth New York Volunteers, Col. Max Weber, and the Union Coast Guard, Col. Wardrop, already encamped. Our regiment was very hospitably provided for when we arrived at this camp, by the Twentieth New York Regiment, which proved most providential, as our tents and baggage were detained for three days, and the night air was already quite chilly, and our haversacks empty.

"Our stay at Camp Hamilton, up to the present time, Jan. 1, 1862, has been marked by nothing of special interest. The proficiency in drill shown by the Sixteenth entitles them to high rank and credit. An especial desire has been felt and shown on the part of the regiment to be sent to a scene of more active operations; to have gone with the great naval expedition to Beaufort, or even followed in its wake, would have given universal satisfaction to the Sixteenth. The general health of the regiment has been very good since we arrived at this camp, owing to its healthful and pleasant location, and there has been but one death since our arrival, — that of private Wm. Stewart, of Boston, Company I, who died October 1st, of typhus fever."

"We have a little excitement occasionally in camp by reports that reach us of intended attacks on our camp by the rebels, and we have been under arms several times all night, and have been under marching orders two or three times, but in each instance we have met disappointment. Several of our men have had narrow escapes while on picket duty at night, — one man of Company K received a bullet through the top of his hat, and the orderly sergeant of Company I felt a bullet whiz past his ear in closer proximity than was deemed agreeable; both shots being fired by some skulking, prowling 'secesh,' screened by the woods outside the picket lines. The boys enjoy this sport, however, and are always ready to go on picket duty."

Seventeenth Regiment.

While this regiment was being organized, Col. Dike, of the Seventh M. V. M., was detailed to take the command, no colonel having been commissioned. The camp — named Camp Schouler — was formed on the 10th of July at Lynnfield, where the regiment remained till the 23d of August.

The regiment was recruited mostly in Essex County, and is composed largely of shoemakers, tanners, &c.

On the 23d of August, the regiment was ordered to report immediately at Washington, under the command of Lieut.-Col. Fellows. Accordingly, on that day, the regiment having been drawn up in line, Col. Dike, after making a few remarks to the men, relinquished his command to Col. Fellows, who, after reading the order for him to take command of the regiment, and to proceed to Washington, addressed the troops in a brief but telling speech. A prayer was then made by the Rev. Dr. Putnam, of Roxbury, after which Gen. Schouler and Gen. Oliver addressed them, exhorting them to do their duty to their country in this its time of peril.

At eight o'clock, P. M., of that day, the regiment started, passing through Boston in the night, and arriving in New York the next afternoon. At Baltimore, they were ordered to stop, under the command of General Duryea, — the order to report at Washington having been countermanded.

It being the time when Washington was threatened by the rebels, the regiment had been ordered on before it had received its full complement of men. About a month after its arrival, Col. Amory, who still holds the rank of captain in the United States service, having obtained a furlough of three years, was commissioned colonel of the Seventeenth, and he immediately proceeded to Baltimore and assumed the command.

In November, Companies C, E, F, G, H, and K, under the command of Col. Amory, were attached to the forces under command of Gen. Lockwood, for the purpose of making an advance into Northampton and Accomac Counties, Va.; on which expedition they were gone about a month, having in that time succeeded in driving the rebels from the peninsula, taking all the forts, capturing several guns and a large quantity of arms and munitions of war, and thoroughly establishing the authority of the United States.

Company C (Danvers Light Infantry), Danvers.—17th Reg.

The formation of this corps was commenced in April, 1861, and the number so rapidly increased that the full number were soon obtained. At the same time the ladies were zealously affected in the good work of providing an outfit, which was completed in the most generous style, the citizens aiding by large contributions, amounting in all, for both companies from the town, to \$3,000.

The outfit for each soldier embraced a cap, jacket, pants, two pairs of drawers, two pairs of flannel shirts, two pairs of stockings, handkerchiefs, one pair of shoes, and two havelocks.

Capt. Fuller was furnished with a sword, sash, dressing-case, and an elegant copy of the Bible, the gifts of Miss Catharine Putnam, of Peterboro', N. H., a native of the town, also with a pistol, the gift of Augustus Mudge, Esq. The other officers, also, were amply equipped. Each soldier received a copy of the New Testament and Psalms, neatly bound together, a gift from the Sabbath Schools. A fine national flag, richly mounted, was presented to the company in behalf of the town.

For nearly two months previous to their being incorporated as Company C, in the 17th Massachusetts Regiment, they occupied their time in daily drill, under pay from the town. While waiting to be designated for service in the army, they went into a private camp in the town of Gloucester, and thus became accomplished to a rare degree in the tactics of military science. They have held the post of honor in the regiment, on the left, and afterwards on the right.

Company D (Wallace Guards), Salisbury.—17th Reg.

Organized May 7. Having received muskets from the State arsenal, commenced drill in good earnest, under the efficient instruction of Mr. E. P. Stanwood, of West Newbury. For four or five weeks the members performed no other labor than that which pertained to the perfecting of the company in the manual of arms, military evolutions, and the march.

The uniform of the company consisted of a dark gray frock-coat, pants, and cap. The ladies made up the uniforms from cloth purchased by the towns and committee of citizens. Ready as it now was for the field, a disappointment awaited it, for the Governor had not assigned this company to either of the camp regiments ordered by the Legislature. Some of the members, however, determined not to be diverted from their original purpose of going to war, scattered among other companies already ordered into regiments. Twenty-five members, with the 1st, 3d, and 4th lieuts., united with the National Guards, of Newburyport, which joined the Mozart Regiment, then stationed at Youkers, N. Y., and others connected themselves with the West Newbury Rifle Company, and West Amesbury Mechanic Infantry, until the members were reduced to about thirty. Yet these thirty continued the organization, when, on the 11th of July, the company was ordered into camp at Lynnfield, as Company D, Essex County Regiment,—17th. Again it recruited to the army standard.

The company derives its name, "Wallace Guards," from Mr. E. P. Wallace, of Salisbury, a young mechanic of limited means, but generous patriotism, who gave the company, at the time of its organization, *one hundred dollars*. Mr. W. also sent the following note to the Secretary of the Treasury, and "its tone of earnest, hearty patriotism makes it worthy of being printed in letters of gold."

"I am a shoemaker of limited means, but I want to lend the government this *hundred dollars*, to assist a little in maintenance of its authority,—its existence.

"The reason I send it to you rather than invest it here is, I want to give 'Uncle Sam' all the profit; so I don't want any interest on it. All I want is that you should send me a government note, promising to pay me or bearer \$100 on demand, any time after the 28th of August, without interest. If times are hard with the government then, I will make a goodly abatement from this. If you are not empowered to invest the money in this way, invest it in the next way that will be most profitable to the government.

LONG LIFE TO UNCLE SAM.

"May the blessings of God make your efforts to save our beloved country successful.

"P. S. An early return will prevent apprehension that this did not reach you. Physical disability alone prevents my assisting as a volunteer."

As the government could not receive the money on the terms of the letter, it issued to the author the first 7 3-10 per centum treasury note.

The town of Salisbury expended \$1,100, and the citizens \$700, for the outfit and comfort of the company in the preparations for field service. This expenditure does not include what the town has paid for monthly bounty and the maintenance of the families of volunteers.

Immediately upon the call of government for three years volunteers, the patriotic citizens of Rockport raised a company composed of the best material, who tendered their services to the State. Not being immediately accepted, the town and spirited individuals liberally contributed to the support of the soldiers and their families, to an amount exceeding three thousand dollars, till they were enrolled as Company G, and ordered into camp at Lynnfield, where they reported fifty-two guns. Upon the morning of their departure from town a meeting of the citizens was holden to bid them farewell, at which, after a prayer and speeches from prominent individuals, a superb and richly-mounted silk ensign, which cost upwards of seventy-five dollars, was presented to the company by Hon. Moses Kimball, of Boston, in compliment to whom the company had been named. On the day before they left for the seat of war a company from South Danvers, raised by Capt. Geo. W. Kenney, was merged with them, and the command given to that gentleman.

Eighteenth Regiment.

Soon after the alarm of war rang over our country, military companies were formed in the towns of Middleboro', Duxbury, Dedham, Hanover, and Wrentham, the members of which, — strong, hardy sons of New England, — from an urgent sense of duty, devoted their property and time to their country. The inhabitants of the several towns, unwilling to see their fellow-townsmen alone endure such sacrifices for the common cause, generously furnished them with uniforms, and appropriated to their use the choicest viands of their tables — while the towns paid to each member of these companies an average of one dollar and twenty-five cents per day for drilling. These companies were ordered into camp at Dedham, Massachusetts, by the Governor, in July, 1861, thus forming the nucleus of this regiment. To these were afterwards added, on the 15th of July, the "Mason Invincibles," of Taunton. Capt. Ruby, the Plymouth company, Capt. Collingwood, August 5th, 1861, and the Quincy company, Capt. J. L. Spalding, August 20th, 1861.

These companies, not having the maximum number of men, were further recruited at Camp Brigham, in Dedham. On the 24th day of August, 1861, the regiment was ordered to Washington, D. C., and took up their line of march on the 26th inst., via New York, Harrisburg, Pa., Baltimore, Md., to Washington, where the regiment arrived, on the evening of August the 30th, safely, and without an accident to mar the pleasures of the journey. The next day the regiment were ordered to report to the late gallant Colonel E. D. Baker, and, having done so, they pitched their tents about one mile to the westward of the Capitol, and called their camp "Camp Massachusetts." Their stay with Colonel Baker was but brief, however — the regiment being ordered to join General Martindale's Brigade (General Fitz John Porter's Division), on this side of the Potomac, where they encamped on the ground formerly occupied by the gallant New York 69th, near Fort Corcoran. Whilst here, they were joined by Company A, recruited in Boston by Lieut. J. Cullen Ayer, who was detailed from the regiment for that purpose.

Whilst here, the regiment first began to see active duty, being frequently detailed upon picket. On the 26th of September the regiment again received marching orders for Hall's Hill, Virginia — at that time the extreme outpost of the "Army of the Potomac." On the occasion of the grand review at Bayley's Cross Roads, the regiment was singled out by General McClellan, for its drill, discipline, and soldierly appearance, for which characteristics it was presented by the Commander-in-Chief with a complete uniform and camp equipage — "Chasseur a' Pied's" — French Infantry of the Line.

On the last of November, the regiment again increased its numbers by the addition of Company C, of Carver — swelling the regimental rolls to nine hundred and ninety-six men. Though, previous to January, 1862, the regiment had found no opportunity to distinguish itself, still, should the occasion ever offer, judging by the able officers in command, and the material of which the line is composed, the glorious old Commonwealth will never have cause to blush for its actions.

Nineteenth Regiment.

The Nineteenth is largely composed of Essex County men, and was organized and recruited at Camp Schouler, Lynnfield. It left for Washington on the 28th of August, and was stationed on the Upper Potomac, forming part of General Lander's Brigade. It did good service in covering the retreat of our regiments after the battle of Ball's Bluff. Colonel Hinks had much experience in our militia service, and commanded the Eighth Regiment during the three months' service. Lieutenant Colonel Devereux was commander of the "Salem Zouaves" of the Eighth, which was one of the best-drilled companies in the Commonwealth.

The Nineteenth Regiment having left the Commonwealth with only from 800 to 900 men, arrangements were made to recruit a new company, and place was made for it by distributing the members of Company H amongst other companies. The new Company (H) was recruited in Salem, and joined the regiment about the first of December.

Twentieth Regiment.

When the news came that Fort Sumter had fallen into the hands of the rebels, joy mingled with our sorrow, because at last treason had thrown off its mask, and could be openly met. Inaction had been tried, and had failed, as it must against active treason. Would action fail as well? "No!" said the people, and very active the people became. Companies were raised in every town and almost every street; they were formed into regiments and sent to the war for three months' or three years' service. But not all were thus sent off at once—some remained. There were Germans who, knowing what war meant, and knowing also what freedom meant, formed themselves into two companies to wage war again for freedom. Unsuccessful in their native country in their opposition to long-established tyranny, they hoped for success here before oppression should gain solidity and strength to destroy the last stronghold of liberty. With these were joined other companies, which, through no fault on their part, had failed in their first efforts to serve their country. These and other companies were, early in the summer, designated as the 20th Regiment, under the command of Colonel William Raymond Lee.

On the 10th of July they were ordered to Camp Massasoit, at Readville, in Dedham, where their tents were pitched on an old Indian camping-ground, famous also as an old muster-field of our martial militia; but "Camp Massasoit" will henceforth be famous as the field of Mars, where the 18th, 20th, and 24th Infantry and 1st Cavalry of Massachusetts Volunteers first learned their rudiments of war, and "fought in effigy their future battles."

The 20th Regiment was fully organized towards the end of July, but its ranks were not one half filled, and many companies were composed of raw recruits. A month was passed in active drill, but the recruiting was not equally active; and when the order came from Washington to send forward at once all the regiments then accepted and in camp, the 20th scarcely numbered 500 men. It escorted its more fortunate comrades in arms and in camp, of the 18th Regiment, to the railroad station towards the end of August, but did not break up its own camp until September 4. It then numbered between 500 and 600 men, who had just received their equipments and exchanged smooth-bore muskets for the long-coveted Enfield rifles. A regimental band was to follow it in a few days, and two officers were left in Boston to recruit the regiment to the maximum. A fine American flag and the State colors were presented to the regiment by one of the aids of Governor Andrew in the name of the governor and State, and they were received by Colonel Lee in the name of the regiment, with a few earnest words of gratitude, hope, and promises.

September 4, late in the afternoon, the regiment left Readville for New York in a special train on the Providence Railroad. Although it was a Boston regiment, and one that Boston is now proud to claim as its own, it had not made the customary visit, marched through the streets thronged with admiring friends, and been "received" by the city on the Parade Grounds; but it had a farewell greeting from its friends on its own parade ground, to which it had so often welcomed them. Friends met it in New York, and gave a collation and dinner at the Park Barracks, at which Governor Andrew and others made eloquent speeches. The kindly Philadelphians received it with a hospitable breakfast, and a yet greater boon—with water to wash off the stains of railroad travel. It was greeted on its arrival in Baltimore, at 10 P. M., with an awkward attempt at a torch-light procession; but silence reigned in Baltimore as it marched through the deserted streets, prepared to resist any attack; but the only attack made upon it was conducted by friends of the Union with *hot coffee*, during a delay at the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad depot. This attack was continued until the assailed cried, "Hold! enough!" and "fell back slowly" upon Washington, which was gained about daybreak (September 7).

In the afternoon the regiment marched three miles to Camp Kalorama, where the tents were pitched, and appearances indicated a long stay. Colonel Lee was appointed acting brigadier general in a provisional brigade of General Burnside's provisiona

division. But on September 10th the regiment was transferred to Camp Burnside, and on the 12th the tents were again struck, and the regiment marched, as rumor said, to Chain Bridge; but evening found it well on the way towards the Upper Potomac. On the 14th, late in the evening, it reached Poolesville, the headquarters of General Stone, and was hospitably received by the 15th Massachusetts Volunteers, on whose parade ground it bivouacked. On September 15th the camp was pitched about two miles from Poolesville on the road to Edward's Ferry, which is one and a half miles distant. The 19th Regiment Massachusetts Volunteers, which had accompanied the 20th from Washington, encamped near. The 7th Michigan soon followed; and there was established Camp Benton, the quarters of General Lander's Brigade, in General Stone's Corps of Observation, on the Upper Potomac. The Andrew Sharp-Shooters had joined the 20th in New York, and were attached to the brigade.

During the first month, frequent alarms called the regiment to the Potomac at night, and drill occupied it by day. Companies were also detached occasionally to support batteries and for other special services near the river.

Four companies were thus detached on the afternoon of October 20th, when the companies present in the camp were ordered to fall into line with arms and knapsacks. Company K and the men who were on guard at the time were left in charge of the camp, under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel Palfrey. Colonel Lee and Major Revere, with a battalion of five companies, joined on the road by two of those on detached service, and thus increased to seven, numbering in all about 300 officers and enlisted men, marched rapidly to Edward's Ferry, and then up the left bank of the Potomac about five miles, when a halt was made, and the men were ordered to sleep on their arms. At 12 p. m. the battalion crossed in flat-boats to Harrison's Island. The 15th Massachusetts had preceded it, and had crossed during the night to the Virginia shore. Two companies (I and D) of the 20th followed the 15th, and held the headland near the river, now famous as Ball's Bluff.* The rest of the battalion crossed about 12½ p. m., and joined the first two companies, the whole forming a support to the 15th Regiment, which was advancing in the direction of Leesburg. About 1 p. m. firing was heard in the distance. Colonel Lee at once formed the battalion in line of battle, throwing forward companies I, D, and H, as skirmishers in the woods on the right and left flanks. After a while the 15th Regiment appeared in sight, slowly retiring, and took a position on the right flank, and Company I was recalled. About 2 o'clock Colonel Baker came upon the bluff and took the command. He rode along the line, and asked the boys whether they were ready to fight. He formed a new line of battle, placed his own regiment on the left, with their left flank covered by woods. The 15th Massachusetts still held the right, where they were somewhat covered by woods. Companies A and G of the 20th still held the centre of the open field (which sloped in such a way as to afford a slight protection, especially to those in the rear). Companies I, C, and E were held in reserve behind the right centre, and Companies H and D remained on the flanks as skirmishers. Captain Putnam of Company H was wounded severely in the right arm at the beginning of the fight, and had to submit to an amputation. About 3 p. m. the enemy opened a brisk fire from woods in front, distant about two hundred and fifty yards. An attack on the right flank was unsuccessful; but the rebels gained ground on the left, and opened a cross fire at our centre. The fire was answered as well as the nature of the ground permitted. Two small howitzers and a 12 lb. rifled cannon rendered some assistance, but, from their exposed position, they were soon crippled by the enemy's fire. About 4½ o'clock, Lieutenant Holmes was wounded in the breast. The reserve was ordered up about this time, and the fire from the left becoming very heavy, Captains Dreher and Schmitt, and Lieutenants Putnam and Lowell, were wounded in quick succession. After this, several rallies were made under a heavy fire; but soon after 5 o'clock, to save further slaughter, the men were ordered to retire under the bluff, and, throwing their guns into the river, to reach the island as they could. The only large ferry-boat was already swamped, and most of the men were forced to swim a swift, cold stream of two hundred feet in width, exposed to chance shots from the enemy. Here were lost the two lieutenants of Company C, Babo and Wesselhoeft. The former had been appointed captain of Company G, and his commission was looked for daily. He was one of the finest officers in the regiment. In Boston he had been a leader among the Germans. In every enterprise his fine intellect and attainments as a scholar, as well as his great physical powers, at once made themselves felt. The enthusiasm and manliness, frankness and firmness of young Wesselhoeft, visible to all in his open countenance, attracted the notice of strangers, and warmly attached to him all who knew him. These two young heroes were devoted friends, and there is little doubt that one died in the attempt to save the other. Their young companion in arms, William L. Putnam, who died on the 22d, after twenty-six hours of intense suffering, borne with the utmost fortitude, is fittingly described by the Rev. James F. Clarke, in the remarks made at Putnam's funeral.

Colonel Lee, after declining, for the benefit of the wounded ones, a boat offering to carry him safely over to the island, was taken prisoner, with Major Revere, Dr. Revere, Adjutant Peirson, and Lieutenant Perry, after they had proceeded some way up the river. Captain Tremlett proposed to the officers near him to try to find a boat and cross over, which was done, and so himself, Captain Bartlett, Lieutenants Abbott and Whittier, and a squad of 80 men, went over to the island in an old boat found at some

distance up the river. Though defeated, the 20th, both officers and men, displayed a coolness under fire which gives promise of success in a fair and open field. Company B and Company F, stationed below Edward's Ferry, when they heard of the fight, marched with all haste to the battle-field, but, much to their regret, only arrived in time to help the wounded, while the 19th Massachusetts, under Colonel Hinks, guarded the island.

At daybreak on the 22d, the long-roll was sounded in the camp, and Lieutenant-Colonel Palfrey, who had been left in command, led Company K and every other able-bodied soldier across the Potomac at Edward's Ferry. They had a brisk skirmish with the rebels in the afternoon, and on the next day, on account of the rough weather, were in danger of being cut off with all the other troops that had crossed; but they re-crossed in safety on the night of the 23d. The regiment was temporarily re-organized as a battalion of six companies, and has, since that time, had no work but drill and picket duty at the river. On Christmas Day a beautiful flag, in remembrance of Ball's Bluff, was presented to the regiment by the Hon. J. G. Palfrey, the father of the commanding officer, in behalf of friends in Massachusetts. Another beautiful standard was sent to the regiment by Mrs. Putnam, the mother of the late lamented Lieutenant Putnam, and some lady friends, just before the fight, and was to be presented by General Lander; but his continued absence has interfered with the ceremony. Lieutenant Putnam never saw this flag.

Boston may well be proud of the 20th Regiment, and claim it as its own, although it was but little noticed until it had shown its character in battle. Undismayed by defeat, and feeling that the failure was through no fault on their part, all were eager to meet the enemy again at once. There was no despondency or flinching, but a burning desire to be placed where they could see the rebels, and a calm assurance that they could be trusted by their leaders.

Twenty-First Regiment.

This regiment, recruited at Camp Lincoln, Worcester, is made up of companies from the central and western portions of this Commonwealth. On the 22d of August it left for Annapolis, Md., where it remained some time, having in charge the railroad from that city to the Baltimore and Washington Junction. Colonel Morse has long been prominent as an officer in the State militia. When appointed to the command of the Twenty-First, he was Major-General of the Third Division Massachusetts Volunteer Militia. Lieutenant-Colonel Maggi, of New Bedford, is an Italian by birth, and a thoroughly-educated officer. He served under Col. Wardrop in the Third Regiment, and took part in the destruction of the Norfolk Navy Yard.

This regiment was in Burnside's expedition to Roanoke, and there did excellent service against the rebel island. This was the fourth regiment landed in Ashley's Harbor, upon the island, the night of the fourth of February. They made a slight advance immediately upon landing. This regiment proceeded along a road leading diagonally across the island, and when about one quarter of a mile from the shore, fell in with the pickets of the enemy.

The approach of the enemy's position was through a swampy wood, with a dense undergrowth, rendering it almost impenetrable. An ordinary cart-road, leading through this wood from the shore to the field-work, a distance of about a mile, was the only mode of communication. The woods in front of the battery had been cut down a distance of three hundred yards, forming an open space to be played on by the rebel guns, about two hundred feet wide. The woods immediately in rear of the work were also cut down, to permit the manœuvring of their own forces.

Their battery consisted of an earth-work with three faces, covering the open space before and the woods at each side of the open space, but with a general direction of fire to the front. The guns were mounted in embrasures, and consisted of a fine twenty-four-pounder brass Dahlgren howitzer, a long eighteen-pounder brass field gun of the date of 1834, and a new twelve-pounder brass field-piece. In front of the work is a ditch, eight feet wide and about three feet deep, and filled with water. This earth-work is about thirty-five yards wide, and is erected across the road by which our men must advance. The ground in front of the work is a deep marsh, on which the trees which were felled still lay. The difficult nature of this ground was increased by the pits from which the turf and earth for the field-work had been taken. Branches were strewn over the front of the work, making it difficult to discover it from the wood in front.

The defending force consisted of about three hundred men within the breastwork, and about three thousand as a reserve, and deployed as skirmishers on the left of the battery. They relied chiefly for the defence of their flanks on the almost impenetrable nature of the wood on each side. Their entire force, with the exception of the force working the battery, was scattered in front and in the woods on the left as skirmishers.

Our army advanced from the bivouac ground of the night previous, where they had spent the night with nothing but thin overcoats to protect them from a cold, driving rain. They had left their knapsacks and blankets on the transports, each man carrying nothing but his haversack, with three days' provisions, and his cartridge-box, with forty rounds of ball cartridge.

The 21st Massachusetts led the second column in the advance. This column advanced through the woods upon the enemy's right, doing some sharp fighting with small arms as they advanced. But the rebels soon found their reliance upon the woods of little avail, and abandoned their batteries and took to flight. Three companies of the 51st New York first planted the stars and stripes in this battery, and they were soon followed by the Massachusetts 21st, when Lieutenant-Colonel Maggi planted the white flag of Massachusetts by its side. The men of the 21st followed along the line of retreat of the rebels to the east side of the island. Several rebel boats escaped, but two were compelled to return, when some thirty prisoners were taken, among whom was young Wise, mortally wounded. The 21st Massachusetts then advanced to the northward, in the direction of a large camp of the rebels, and after a little skirmishing, with three killed and five wounded, the rebels retired, and our men advanced. They were soon met by the rebel officer, bearing a white flag, asking for the terms of a surrender. The reply was, "unconditional," when they gave up their swords.

Twenty-Second Regiment.

This fine regiment is sometimes known as Gen. Wilson's Regiment, from the fact that it was recruited and marched to Washington under the command of Hon. Henry Wilson, Senator in Congress from Massachusetts.

Previous to the adjournment of the extra session of 1861, Senator Wilson had formed the plan of raising a regiment, and, immediately upon his return to Massachusetts, after consulting with, and obtaining the co-operation of, the Governor, he entered upon the work with characteristic zeal and earnestness.

Enlistment papers were furnished to numerous gentlemen possessing the necessary qualifications, and, although eleven full regiments of three years' volunteers had already marched from the State to the seat of war, and five more regiments were in camp and ready to march, such was the enthusiasm of the young men of the State to join this regiment, that nearly twenty companies were enlisted in a few days.

The first company went into camp at Lynnfield on the 2d day of September, and others followed from day to day. In obedience to a requisition from the War Department upon the Governor of the State, to send forward troops as rapidly as possible, it was

deemed advisable to organize a regiment at once, composed of the ten best and fullest companies, and to leave the remaining ones to be recruited to the maximum standard and organized afterwards.

Colonel Wilson received his commission from the Governor on the 2d day of September, and on the 8th of October, with full ranks, equipped in the most thorough manner, and armed with Enfield rifles of the best description, the regiment was on its way to Washington.

Previous to his departure, Colonel Wilson was presented by some of his friends and neighbors with a fine, thorough-bred Morgan stallion, with saddle and housings complete, as a slight testimonial of their personal regard, and appreciation of his valuable services.

Important duties in connection with his senatorial office seemed to render it necessary, towards the close of October, for Colonel Wilson to resign his command, and it having been ascertained that the War Department was willing to grant a furlough to Capt. Jesse D. Gove, of the 10th Infantry, U. S. A., that accomplished and skillful officer was appointed by the Governor to fill the vacancy occasioned by Colonel Wilson's resignation. Colonel Wilson resigned on the 28th of October, and on the same day Colonel Gove received a commission as his successor, and entered at once upon the duties of his command.

It is proper to state, in this connection, that the 3d Battery of Light Artillery was also recruited under Gen. Wilson's auspices, and marched to Washington, Oct. 8th, as part of his command.

Twenty-Third Regiment.

This fine regiment was recruited at Lynnfield, and left for Annapolis, November 11th. It forms a part of General Burnside's Division. Most of the officers have been prominent members of the volunteer militia. Colonel Kurtz was captain of one of the companies in the 13th, and was ordered home to take command of this regiment. Lieutenant-Colonel Merritt was a member of Brigadier-General Andrews' staff, and Major Elwell was Lieutenant-Colonel of the 8th Regiment Massachusetts Volunteer Militia, and served with it during the entire three months' term of service. Adjutant Chambers served as lieutenant in the Massachusetts 5th, and displayed much bravery at the battle of Bull Run.

At the battle of Roanoke, this regiment was in the centre, under the command of General Foster, and was finally thrown out on the right flank, to prevent a flank movement of the enemy. In advancing, they were met by strong bodies of the enemy's skirmishers, and, in going through the woods, soon came under the enemy's fire. They intercepted, with the 27th, a force of the enemy, thrown out to turn the flank of our centre column; and so, throughout the engagement, this regiment stood in the post of duty and danger.

This regiment was recruited under the immediate supervision of Colonel Stevenson, at Camp Massasoit, Readville. It left the State for Annapolis, December 9th. The 24th forms part of General Burnside's command, and is as well officered, equipped, and disciplined, as any regiment that has left the State.

At the attack on Roanoke Island, this regiment was not landed until after the battle had considerably advanced. They went forward, expecting battle, but soon after they got upon the ground the enemy surrendered.

Twenty-Fifth Regiment.

The 25th is essentially a Worcester County regiment. It was recruited at Camp Lincoln, and left Worcester for Annapolis, October 31st. It is attached to General Burnside's Division. The officers are, with scarcely an exception, gentlemen who have held high rank and been active in our volunteer militia. Lieutenant-Colonel Sprague commanded a company in the Rifle Battalion, under Major Devens, during the three months' term. Colonel Upton is a well-informed and capable officer.

At the battle of Roanoke Island, this regiment led the centre, under General Foster. They advanced, at the head of the first column, up the road, and bore the brunt of the fire of the rebel skirmishers. A battery of six 12-pound boat howitzers, under command of Lieut. Porter, from the vessels of the navy, were drawn by the soldiers of the 25th in their advance, and were placed in position at the curve of the road, so as to command the enemy's battery. The 25th opened fire and kept it up briskly for more than three hours, under a terrible fire from the enemy's battery, when the forty rounds of cartridge, distributed to the men, having been exhausted, they were relieved by the 10th Connecticut. They retired in such good order as to draw from General Foster an especial compliment, in his official report. This regiment did honor to the State.

Twenty-Seventh Regiment.

The 27th is known as the Second Western Regiment, having been recruited at Camp Reed, Springfield, from the four western counties. It left its camp for Annapolis on the 2d of November. It is officered by gentlemen who have received their military education in the school of the Massachusetts Volunteer Militia. The 27th makes the fifth regiment of Massachusetts men attached to General Burnside's Division, and, like the others, gained for itself a good name at the battle of Roanoke Island.

In that battle, when the advance was made up the road, after the landing, the 27th Massachusetts was thrown out on the left to prevent a flank movement of the enemy, and so continued their advance through the woods, encountering and fighting the enemy's skirmishers. This regiment, with the 23d Massachusetts, intercepted a body of the enemy in their attempt to turn our centre column. This regiment occupied advanced positions, and was in the wildest of the fight, until the enemy surrendered.

Twenty-Ninth Regiment.

Seven of the companies composing this regiment were the first three years' troops that entered the field from Massachusetts. They arrived at Fortress Monroe early in May, 1861, and were, for the time being, attached to the 3d and 4th Massachusetts Militia Regiments. These companies were then commanded by Captains Barnes, Chipman, Chamberlain, Clarke, Doten, Leach, and Tyler. Captains Barnes and Chipman were promoted when the regiment was organized. Captain Tyler resigned in July, '61, and his place was filled by Captain I. N. Wilson. Captains Barnes' and Clarke's companies were engaged in the battle of Big Bethel, and performed good service, one man in each company being killed. Upon the departure of the 3d and 4th Massachusetts Militia Regiments from the seat of war, July 16th, 1861, the seven three years' companies were placed under command of Captain Joseph H. Barnes, Company K, and were known as the Massachusetts Battalion. They were so commanded until Dec. 13th, 1861, when the 29th Regiment was formed in Massachusetts, with the Massachusetts Battalion as the basis.

During the time they were known as a battalion, they performed valuable services. Two companies — Captains Leach's and Wilson's — garrisoned the Rip Raps a long time, and had charge of the prisoners at that important post. The other five companies have been stationed at Hampton, Fort Monroe, Camp Hamilton, and, since August 18th, 1861, at Newport News, where they were joined by Colonel Peirce and three new companies — F, G, and H — on the 17th of January, 1862. The two companies which had been stationed at the Rip Raps rejoined the battalion, Nov. 5th, 1861. On the 21st of October, portions of Captains Barnes', Chipman's, Chamberlain's, Clarke's, and Doten's companies, under command of Captain Barnes, had a smart skirmish with a greatly superior force of the enemy, about six miles above Newport News. The enemy fled in confusion, and the battalion were highly complimented by General Phelps, commanding the post. The five companies were present at the burning of Hampton, and lay on their arms during the night, while their pickets were engaging the enemy. The seven companies have performed all the various duties which fall to the lot of a soldier — they have been in battle, skirmishes, scouting; mounted guns, dug trenches, thrown up breastworks, &c.

Were enlisted at Plymouth, Mass., on the sixth day of May, 1861, to serve for three years, unless sooner discharged. On the 18th day of May, they embarked at Boston for Fortress Monroe. On arriving at the Fortress, they were temporarily attached to the 3d Regiment, Massachusetts Volunteers, under command of Col. Wardrop. On the eve of the 10th of June, they took the field pieces out to Hampton, for the battle of Big Bethel. On the 14th they mounted the first gun on Fort Calhoun (Rip Raps). July 1, they were ordered to Hampton, and there encamped. In a skirmish, the 14th inst., on picket guard, they had one man badly wounded. On the 17th the company, by order of Gen. Butler, was placed in the Massachusetts Battalion, under command of Capt. Joseph H. Barnes. On the 19th, they were sent out on a scout for the body of Major Rawlins, who had been shot by the rebels a few hours previous, beyond New Market Bridge. They soon found the body, and returned. On the 27th, were ordered to Fortress Monroe, with the battalion, and there encamped till August 5, when they were then ordered to Camp Hamilton, till the 18th inst., when they left for Camp Butler, Newport News. On the 20th of October they left, with the battalion, under Capt. Barnes, had a sharp skirmish with the rebels, 1,200 in number, killing four, and wounding ten, driving them from their camp, with the loss of but one man from the battalion. Dec. 24, with the battalion, they went out six miles to engage the rebels, who were out in force; but they retreated back to their entrenchments. On the 17th of January, 1862, the 29th Regiment Massachusetts Volunteers arrived at Camp Butler, and this company, with the rest of the battalion, was attached to that regiment, under command of Col. E. W. Peirce.

This company was recruited by Capt. Chamberlain. Three hours after the recruiting commenced ninety names were obtained, and the election of officers took place the same day, April 19, 1861. This company was originally intended for the three months' service.

Immediately after the issue of the President's proclamation, calling for three years' volunteers, this company marched to Boston, and proceeding to the State House, unanimously voted to enlist for three years. This was May 8. The next day the captain received orders to report with his company, ready for departure, May 10, and sailed that day, with Company L, Capt. Tyler, in the steamer Pembroke, for Fortress Monroe, where they arrived, May 13, and were mustered into the United States service the next day, and attached to the 3d Regiment, Col. Wardrop. They remained with that regiment until July 16, when the three years' men of the 3d and 4th Regiments were organized as a battalion, under the command of Capt. Joseph H. Barnes, and remained in that condition until Dec. 13, when they were attached to the 29th Regiment.

Capt. Chamberlain holds the oldest commission of any of the three years' captains from Massachusetts. Before the company left Lynn the Empire Fire Association, No. 5, gave them sixty-six very fine frock-coats, valued at twelve dollars each.

There has been one death in this company, and thirteen of its men have been discharged. Ten of this number were examined out by the surgeon, and were sent home with the three months' troops. One was accidentally wounded in the hand, and two were discharged for disability. One of the above number, Samuel L. Eaton, proceeded towards home as far as Baltimore, since which time nothing has been heard from him. There have been added to the company eighteen men since the first of January, 1862.

First Company of Sharpshooters.

(*Andrew Sharpshooters.*)

This company was recruited at Lynnfield, in August last, and left for the seat of war, September 2d. They were ordered to report at headquarters, Washington, with a special request from Gov. Andrew that they be connected with some Massachusetts regiment in GEN. F. W. LANDER'S Brigade.

The company are all armed with telescopic rifles, varying in weight from twenty to seventy lbs. These arms were furnished by members of the company, and purchased of sharpshooters, in different parts of New England. There is no regular manufactory of these arms, but they were all made by different skilful gunsmiths, to the order and pattern of private individuals. It was estimated that there were less than three hundred of these rifles in the loyal States, and but few, if any, in the rebel States.

The peculiarity of this arm, independent of its weight, is the telescope attached to each rifle, from one-half to one inch in diameter, extending from near the muzzle to

the stock, and is adjusted by means of a screw, passing through the stock. Two fine threads, intersecting, are stretched across the glass at the end of the telescope, by which accuracy of aim is obtained.

The great weight of the barrel sustains a heavy charge of powder, and obviates the springing of the barrel, or recoil of the piece. The ball is conical, and flat at the base, and is used with a greased patch. The telescope, properly adjusted, brings the object within precise range.

Very great skill and judgment are required in firing at an object at a long distance, as the distance must be carefully estimated, and allowance made for the strength of the wind, which will vary considerably the direction of the projectile.

The fall of the projectile—or its attraction to the earth—is great, and increases with the distance fired. It has been calculated that this *fall* is from four to five feet in three hundred yards, and one foot in twenty to thirty feet in a distance of eight hundred yards. But, notwithstanding these difficulties, those experienced in the use of this arm become so expert that they are nearly sure of hitting an object the size of a man at one-half a mile distant, and an object the size of a horse at one mile. They are discharged at rest, and it requires about two minutes for an experienced person to load, aim, and fire. It is not known that this rifle has ever before been used in warfare. An opportunity to test its efficiency was offered at the skirmish at Edward's Ferry, Oct. 1st and 2d. On the first day, a rebel colonel was shot from his horse by a private, named Hatch, at a distance of one-half mile. Several privates were killed at longer distances. On the second day, about forty of the company, protected by a Virginia rail fence, met, unaided, the advance of a regiment of the enemy. The regiment emerged from woods distant about one-half mile, formed in line of battle, started towards them, yelling, and at double-quick—stopping only to load. As they were forming, the sharpshooters opened fire from their little battery. At this fire, the standard-bearer, and many others, fell. By the time the regiment had advanced to within about twenty rods of the left flank of the company, so deadly had been the fire of these rifles, that the whole regiment turned into a ravine and fled the field. The time occupied by the regiment in this advance was about twenty minutes, and during that time the sharpshooters had fired, on an average, about ten shots each. Three rebel standard-bearers, in succession, were shot down,—all, it has been reported, by the unerring aim of Sergeant Shattuck,—when no one dared rear the ensign again. Gen. Gorman reports seventy of the enemy killed in this skirmish; but it is believed this falls much under the actual number. No rebel account of their loss on this day has reached us.

When Gen. Lander was ordered to take command of Gen. Kelley's Division, at Romney, by his special request Gen. McClellan permitted him to take this corps with him, and they are now known as the body-guard of that heroic general, in whose success his native State—Massachusetts—takes such a just pride.

This company, also the second company, were, by authority of Gov. Andrew, raised by Hon. W. D. Northend, of Salem. This gentleman also had charge of the recruiting of Company D, 2d Regiment, Company C, 14th Regiment, Company H, 19th Regiment, and the 4th Massachusetts Battery, now at Ship Island, and rendered essential service in recruiting other companies in Essex County.

John Saunders, captain of this company, was born in England. He is six feet two inches high, very muscular and strong, and from his boyhood familiar with the use of the telescopic rifle. Lieut. William Gleason, formerly captain of an artillery company, has long enjoyed the reputation of being one of the best shots in the State. Second Lieut. George C. Gray was a member of Capt. Devereux's company, Salem Zouaves, in the 8th Regiment, and a well-instructed soldier.

Richardson Light Infantry, (Of Lowell.)

On the receipt of the news at Lowell of the attack on the Massachusetts 6th, in Baltimore, on the 19th of April, this company was at once recruited, and the officers were commissioned the next day. This company was the first to offer their services to the State of Massachusetts for three years' service, and was the seventh company sent from this State as three years' volunteers. They were mustered into the United States' service in Boston, May 21st, 1861, and sailed for Fortress Monroe the next day. On the 29th inst., they were assigned to the regular garrison of the fortress, — then under command of Col. Dimmick, — in which position they have remained till the present time. Maj.-Gen. Wool and Gov. Andrew have made a request to the War Department to change the organization of this company from infantry to light artillery, which will no doubt soon be granted, as they are an independent infantry company doing artillery service. Before leaving Lowell, through the exertions of Geo. F. Richardson, Esq., in whose honor the company is named, they received many presents — such as uniforms, &c. — from the citizens. The ladies, also, presented to them a splendid silk flag, on their departure.

First Massachusetts Light Battery,

Was organized for the war by Capt. Josiah Porter. They were quartered at Camp Cameron some six weeks. They left for the seat of war, Thursday afternoon, Oct. 3d, at three o'clock. The battery consists of six pieces of artillery, and as many caissons, one ammunition-wagon, one army forge, and three baggage-wagons. The guns and caissons are each drawn by six horses, and the others by four. Besides these, are the horses for the officers—making in all about one hundred and twenty-five horses and one hundred and fifty men. On the arrival of the battery in this city, on the day of their departure, they were enthusiastically received, and cheer after cheer rent the air as they passed through the streets to take the cars for Washington.

In the grand review of artillery, which took place near the Capitol about the first of November, Gen. McClellan complimented Capt. Porter and his command very highly. This battery is stationed near Washington.

Second Massachusetts Light Battery.

Major Cobb opened papers for enlistment for this company, April 20, 1861, and May 2d the organization was completed, under the name of "Cobb's Light Artillery." June 17th they made their first public parade. They went into Camp Adams, at Quincy, July 5th; the 31st were sworn into the United States' service; and, on the 8th of August, at 7½ p. m., they broke camp and proceeded to the seat of war. At 6 p. m. of the 10th, they arrived in New York. They soon found themselves enjoying the hospitalities of Philadelphia, where the people had erected convenient temporary barracks, and furnished them with everything to cleanse the outer and feed the inner man. At Wilmington, they loaded the guns with shell, to be prepared for any emergency. A telegraphic dispatch from Washington ordered them to go into camp at Baltimore. On the 12th, they camped on Mt. Clare, where Cook's Battery had been encamped. On the 14th they chose the grounds formerly occupied by Col. Stewart, of the Confederate army. They named the camp "Camp Andrew," in honor of the Governor. Occasional parade and camp duty occupied their time. They were once reviewed by Gens. Dix and Duryea.

At 11½ o'clock, p. m., September 12th, the bugle sounded the alarm, and in half an hour every gun, and man, and horse was ready for duty. It was a false alarm, but a healthy sensation.

Oct. 8th the patriotic people of the place presented them with a fine American flag. On the 11th they took twenty-four horses and twenty men, and went upon the wood-lot of a secessionist and cut down two trees for a staff, and, in spite of the protestations of the owner, took and worked out a staff of ninety feet in length from them, and raised the flag. Guns, drums, bugles, prayer, speeches, &c., with Yankee Doodle and Hail Columbia, consecrated the occasion.

Nov. 4th, at 12½, they received orders to march; prepared, and were soon at the Light-street wharf, where they met the 4th Wisconsin and one company of the Pennsylvania Cavalry. At noon of the 5th they were under way. They were then informed that their destination was Virginia. They first landed at Duckbill Landing, Wycomico River, in Somerset County, and soon arrived at Princess Anne, and stayed in the court-house that night. After hard marching through lonely roads, over swollen streams, with poor bridges that had to be repaired, and wading, where there were no bridges; and, also, after embarking again, running aground, and such difficulties, they arrived at Princess Anne when the town was in an excitement concerning election. After resting and feeding, they marched that night, through mud and rain, to Dividing Creek, separating Somerset and Worcester Counties, crossing it at 1 o'clock in the morning. The town was small, poorly provided with stores and provisions, and full of seces-

sion. The report of their coming had preceded them, when the people fled from what they supposed would be robbery and murder. After a short rest, they started on, building bridges as they went, and arrived at Pussy's Mill at daylight, where they had an hour's rest after their night of severe labor. They arrived at Snow Hill, Thursday, at 10 A. M.

On the morning of the 14th they packed and marched for Newton, Somerset County, Md., about one hundred and seventy-five miles from Baltimore. On the night after starting, they were visited with a snow-storm, and the cold made fires necessary in the tents. There were 4,500 troops at this place, and more men arrived; so that they numbered 6,000 for the expedition, which was under the command of Brig.-Gen. Lockwood. Among the troops comprising the expedition were the Wisconsin 4th Regiment, 1st Company Pennsylvania Cavalry, six companies Duryea's Zouaves, six companies of a Michigan Regiment, Pursell's Legion, of Maryland, containing infantry, artillery, and cavalry, — about 1,700 in all, — the 2d Delaware Regiment, six companies of the 21st Indiana Regiment, six companies of the 17th Massachusetts Regiment, and Nims' Battery.

Gen. Dix issued his proclamation to the people of Accomac and Northampton Counties, in Virginia, to lay down their arms, and resume their usual occupations, or they would be compelled to do so.

After leaving Newton, they went to Drummondtown, Va., on the 25th of November. The night before leaving that place they made an attempt to arrest Col. Phinney, about seven miles from town, but he escaped them by going from Drummondtown to Puncoteague. They picked up one six-pound brass howitzer, and possessed themselves of one rebel battery, pierced for five guns, commanding the road. Leaving the latter place on the 27th, at 10, they arrived at Belletown at 12, and from thence they went to Eastville, the last town but one on the peninsula, and staid there until Dec. 2d. Near there, at Camp Hoyer, they found the last stopping-place of the rebels, where they had made considerable preparations to oppose the Union forces. They found a sixteen-foot flag of the rebels in the deserted fortifications. From this place, without meeting any one to fight, they went to Bailey's Town, near the river, to await the arrival of boats. The next day they started on their return for Baltimore, — about seventeen hours' sail, — and arrived back at their old position without finding an enemy to fight a battle. The expedition saved these counties to the Union.

About March 1st, 1862, this battery left Baltimore for Ship Island.
