CONSTITUTION
OF THE
SOCIETY OF SONS OF THE REVOLUTION
IN THE
STATE OF MISSOURI.

PREAMBLE.

WHEREAS, It has become evident from the decline of proper celebration of such national holidays as the Fourth of July, Washington's Birthday, and the like, that popular interest in the events and men of the War of the Revolution is less than in the earlier days of the Republic; and—

WHEREAS, This lack of interest is to be attributed not so much to the lapse of time as to the neglect on the part of descendants of Revolutionary heroes to perform their duty of keeping before the public mind the memory of the services of their ancestors, and of the times in which they lived, and of the principles for which they contended—

Therefore, THE SOCIETY OF THE SONS OF THE REVOLUTION has been instituted to perpetuate the memory of the men who, in Military, Naval or Civil service, by their acts or counsel achieved American Independence; to promote and assist in the proper celebration of the anniversaries of Washington's Birthday, the Battles of Lexington and Bunker Hill, the Fourth of July, the Capitulations of Saratoga and Yorktown, the Formal Evacuation of New York by the British Army on the 3d of December, 1783, as a relinquishment of territorial sovereignty, and other prominent events relating to or connected with the War of the Revolution; to collect and secure for preservation the manuscript rolls, records and other documents and memorials relating to that war; to inspire among

Sons of the Revolution.

the members and descendants a patriotic spirit of their forefathers; to inculcate, in the community in general, sentiments of nationality, and respect for the principles for which the patriots of the Revolution contended; to assist in the commemorative celebration of other great historical events of national importance, and to promote social intercourse and the feeling of fellowship among its members.

ARTICLE I.

NAME OF SOCIETY.

The Society shall be known by the name, style and title of SOCIETY OF SONS OF THE REVOLUTION, IN THE STATE OF MISSOURI.

ARTICLE II.

OBJECTS.

The objects of the Society are social, educational and patriotic, and the Society is formed for the particular purpose of perpetuating the memory of the men, who in military, naval and civil service of the Colonies, and of the Continental Congress, by their acts or counsel achieved the independence of the country, and to further the proper celebration of the anniversaries of the birthday of Washington, and prominent events connected with the War of the Revolution; to collect and secure for preservation the manuscripts, records and other documents relating to that period; to inspire the members of the Society with the patriotic spirit of their forefathers, and to promote the feeling of fellowship among its members.

ARTICLE III.

MEMBERSHIP.

Any male person above the age of twenty-one years shall be eligible to membership in this Society, who is descendant from an ancestor as the *propositus*, who, either as a military, naval

or marine officer, soldier, sailor or marine, or official in the service of any one of the thirteen original Colonies or States, or of the National Government representing or composed of those Colonies or States, assisted in establishing American Independence, during the War of the Revolution, between the 19th day of April, 1775, when hostilities commenced, and the 19th day of April, 1783, when they were ordered to cease.

Provided, That when the claim of eligibility is based on the service of an ancestor in the Minutemen or Militia, it must be satisfactorily shown that such ancestor was actually called into the service of the State or United States, and performed garrison or field duty; and—

Provided further, That when the claim of eligibility is based on the service of an ancestor as a sailor or marine, it must in like manner be shown that such service was other than shore duty, and regularly performed in the Continental navy, or the navy of one of the thirteen original States, or on an armed vessel, other than a merchant ship, which sailed under letters of marque and reprisal, and that such ancestor of the applicant was duly enrolled in the ship's company, either as an officer, seaman, or otherwise than as a passenger; and—

Provided further, That when the claim of eligibility is based on the service of an ancestor as an official, such service must have been performed in the civil service of the United States, or of one of the thirteen original States, and must have been sufficiently important in character to have rendered the official specially liable to arrest and imprisonment, the same as a combatant, if captured by the enemy, as well as liable to conviction of treason against the Government of Great Britain.

In the construction of this article the volunteer Aides-de-Camp of General Officers in Continental service who were duly announced as such, and who actually served in the field during a campaign, shall be comprehended as having performed qualifying service.

The Civil Officials and Military forces of the State of Vermont during the War of the Revolution shall also be compre-

hended in the same manner as if they had belonged to one of the thirteen original States.

No service of an ancestor shall be deemed as qualifying service for membership in this Society where such ancestor, after assisting in the cause of American Independence, shall have subsequently either adhered to the enemy, or failed to maintain an honorable record throughout the War of the Revolution.

No person shall be admitted as a member of this Society unless he be eligible under one of the provisions of this article, and unless of good moral character, and adjudged worthy of becoming a member.

ARTICLE IV.

OFFICERS.

The officers of this Society shall be a President, and four Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, Assistant Secretary, a Registrar, a Treasurer and a Chaplain, who shall be chosen by ballot from among the members thereof, annually, to serve for the term of one year, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

ARTICLE V.

BOARD OF MANAGERS.

The Board of Managers of the Society shall be sixteen in number, namely, the President, the First Vice-President, the Treasurer and Secretary, *ex-officio*, and twelve others, who shall be chosen by ballot from among the members of the Society annually, to serve for the term of one year, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Board shall have power to fill vacancies occurring in their own number.

ARTICLE VI.

ADMISSION OF MEMBERS.

Every application for membership shall be made in writing, subscribed by the applicant, and approved by two members

over their signatures. Applications shall contain or be accompanied by proof of eligibility, and such application and proofs shall be submitted to the Board of Managers, who shall have full power to determine the qualifications of the applicant.

Payment of the initiation fees and subscription to the declaration required by the Constitution of this Society shall be prerequisites of membership.

ARTICLE VII.

DECLARATION.

Every member shall declare upon honor that he will endeavor to promote the purposes of this institution, and observe the Constitution and By-Laws of this Society, and if he be a citizen of the United States, shall declare that he will support the Constitution of the United States; such declaration shall be in writing, and subscribed by the member making it.

ARTICLE VIII.

INSTITUTION CONSIDERED AND SUBJECTS PROHIBITED.

At every meeting the purposes of the institution will be fully considered, and the best measures to promote them adopted, but no question involving religious doctrine, or the party politics of the day within the United States, shall ever be discussed or considered in any meeting of this Society.

ARTICLE IX.

COMMEMORATIONS.

It shall be a standing regulation that the members shall, when practicable, hold a commemorative celebration, and dine together at least once in every year.

ARTICLE X.

SEAL.

The seal of the Society of the SONS OF THE REVOLUTION shall be one and seven-eighths of an inch in diameter, and shall consist of the figure of a Minuteman in Continental uniform, standing on a ladder, leading to a belfry, and holding in his left hand a musket and an olive branch, and grasping in his right hand a bell rope; above the cracked Liberty Bell, issuing therefrom a ribbon, bearing the motto of the SONS OF THE REVOLUTION, "*Exegi Monumentum Aere Perennius*;" across the top of the ladder on the ribbon the figures "1776," and at the left of the Minuteman, and also on a ribbon, the figures "1883"—the year of the Centennial Commemoration of the permanent evacuation of the British Army of American territory; the whole encircled by a band three-eighths of an inch wide, thereon at the top thirteen stars of five points each, and at the bottom the legend "SONS OF THE REVOLUTION," the following being a fac-simile thereof:



The Secretary shall be the custodian of the seal, which shall be identical in every particular with this description.

ARTICLE XI.

INSIGNIA.

The insignia of the SONS OF THE REVOLUTION shall consist of a badge pendant from the ribbon by a ring of gold.

The badge shall be elliptical in form, with escaloped edges one and one-quarter inches in length, and one and one-eighth inches in width, the whole surmounted by a gold eagle with wings displayed inverted. On the obverse side a medallion of gold in the center, elliptical in form, bearing on its face the figure of a soldier in Continental uniform, with musket slung; beneath, the figures "1775"; the medallion surrounded by thirteen raised gold stars of five points each upon a border of dark blue enamel.

On the reverse side, in the center, a medallion corresponding in form to that on the obverse and also in gold, bearing on its face Houdon's Portrait of Washington in bas relief, encircled by the legend "SONS OF THE REVOLUTION." Beneath, the figures "1883," and upon the reverse of the eagle the number of the particular badge engraved; the medallion surrounded by a plain gold border conforming in dimensions to the obverse, upon which members may have their names engraved in script.

The ribbon shall be dark blue, ribbed and watered, edged with buff, one and one-half inches wide and one and one-half inches in displayed length.

The insignia shall be worn by the members conspicuously and only on the left breast on all occasions, when they shall assemble as such for any stated purpose or celebration. The badge shall never be worn as an article of jewelry.

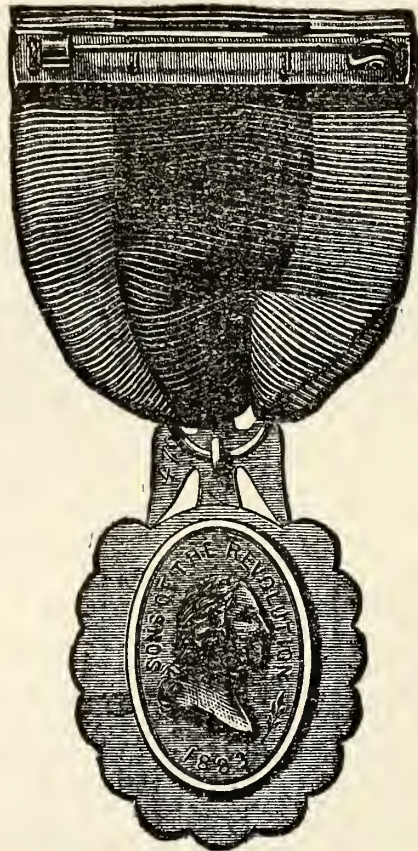
The Treasurer of the Society shall procure and issue the insignia to the members, and shall keep a record of all issued by him. Such insignia shall be returned to the Treasurer of the Society by any member who may formally withdraw, or resign, or be expelled, but otherwise it shall be deemed an heirloom.

Roll of Members.

No member shall receive more than one badge, unless to replace one, the loss or destruction of which shall first be satisfactorily established, the following being a fac-simile of such insignia :

On occasions other than the meetings for any stated purpose or celebration, members may wear a rosette of the prescribed ribbon and pattern in the upper button hole of the left lapel of the coat.

The Treasurer shall procure and issue the rosettes to members.

The following being a fac-simile of the same, which shall not exceed fifteen millimetres in diameter :

ARTICLE XII.

LOCAL CHAPTERS.

Whenever twelve or more members of the Society in any city in the State shall petition the Board of Managers for permission to organize a local Chapter, the Board may authorize the Secretary to organize the petitioners into a Chapter. The Chapter being auxiliary to the State Society, and to be at all times under its control, and to have the following officers: A President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and a Board of Managers of six.

Membership in a State Society shall first be necessary to membership in a Chapter. The Chapters shall have power to adopt By-Laws for their government, but these By-Laws shall be first approved by the Board of Managers of the State Society.

ARTICLE XIII.

ALTERATIONS AND AMENDMENTS.

No alteration or amendment of the Constitution of this Society shall be made unless notice thereof be duly given in writing, signed by the member proposing the same, at a meeting of the Society, and unless the same shall be adopted at a subsequent meeting held at least thirty days after such notice, by a vote of three-fourths of the members present, and in the notices issued for such meeting the fact shall be stated that a proposed amendment to the Constitution will be considered.

BY-LAWS
OF THE
SOCIETY OF SONS OF THE REVOLUTION
IN THE
STATE OF MISSOURI.

SECTION I.

FEES, DUES AND CONTRIBUTIONS.

The initiation fees shall be five (5) dollars; the annual dues, five (5) dollars, payable on or before the first day of January in every year, provided that any member who shall have been elected during the last three months of the fiscal year shall not be required to pay the annual dues for the current fiscal year. The payment at one time of one hundred (100) dollars shall constitute a life membership. The payment at one time of two hundred (200) dollars shall constitute a perpetual or endowed membership, and upon the death of the member so paying, the membership shall be held by his eldest son, or such other descendant from the ancestor from whom he claims as he may nominate; in failure of such nomination the Society may decide which one of the descendants shall hold the membership, provided always that the Society reserves to itself the privilege of rejecting any nomination that may not be acceptable to it. All those holding life or endowed memberships shall be exempt from the payment of the initiation fee and annual dues.

SECTION II.

ANNUAL MEETINGS.

The annual meeting of the Society shall be held in the City of St. Louis, on the 22d day of February (except when that

day is a Sunday, the meetings shall be held on the next ensuing day), at which a general election of Officers and Managers by ballot shall take place; in such elections a majority of the ballots given for any Officer or Manager shall constitute a choice, but if on the first ballot no person shall receive such a majority, then a further balloting shall take place, in which a plurality of votes given for any Officer or Manager shall determine the choice.

SECTION III.

QUORUM.

At all meetings of the Society five members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

SECTION IV.

PRESIDENT.

The President, or in his absence the First or Second Vice-Presidents, or in their absence a Chairman *pro tempore*, shall preside at all meetings of the Society, and of the Board of Managers, and shall exercise the usual functions of a presiding officer under general parliamentary rules, subject to an appeal to the Society in proper cases under those rules. The President shall be, *ex officio*, a member of all committees other than the Committee on Nominations. He shall have power to convene the Board of Managers and appoint the place of such meeting when called by him.

He shall also perform such other representative duties on behalf of the Society, either personally or by correspondence, as it or the Board of Managers may find desirable or necessary, or as customarily appertaining to his office, and he shall enforce a strict observance of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Society.

In case of his decease, resignation, neglect to serve or inability from any cause to act as President, the duties of the office shall devolve on the First Vice-President until the vacancy caused by such decease, resignation or neglect to serve shall be filled, or until the inability shall cease.

SECTION V.

SECRETARY.

The Secretary shall conduct the general correspondence of the Society, and keep a record thereof; he shall notify all qualified and accepted candidates of their admission; and perform such other duties as the Society or Board of Managers or his office may require of him; he shall have charge of the seal, certificates of incorporation, by-laws, historical and other documents and records of the Society, other than those required to be deposited with the Registrar, and shall affix the seal to all properly authenticated certificates of membership, and transmit the same without delay to the member for whom it shall be issued, or to his proper representative; he shall also notify the Registrar of all admissions to membership, and transmit to him the applications and proofs of eligibility of all persons so admitted; he, together with the presiding officer, shall, when necessary, certify all acts of the Society, and in proper cases authenticate them under seal; he shall have charge of all printing and publications directed by the Society, or by the Board of Managers; he shall give due notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Society and of the Board of Managers, and shall attend the same; he shall keep fair and accurate records of all the proceedings and orders of the Society and of the Board of Managers, and shall give notice to the several officers of all votes, orders, resolves and proceedings of the Society, or of the Board of Managers, affecting them, or appertaining to their respective duties, and at the annual meeting and oftener, if required, shall report to the Society the names of those candidates who have been admitted to membership, and also the names of those members whose resignations or voluntary withdrawals have been consented to

and accepted, and also the names of those members who have been expelled, or dropped for non-payment of dues, or for failure to substantiate claim of descent. In his absence from any meeting, a Secretary *pro tempore* may be designated therefor, unless the Assistant Secretary shall be present to act in such capacity.

SECTION VI.

ASSISTANT SECRETARY.

The Assistant Secretary shall perform such duties as may, from time to time, devolve upon him, and may in such cases give required notices, and certify and authenticate, when necessary, any acts, documents or records of the Society.

In case of the absence of the Secretary from any meeting of the Society or of the Board of Managers, or of his decease, resignation, neglect to serve, or inability from any cause to act in that capacity, the duties of the office shall devolve on the Assistant Secretary, until the Secretary shall return, or until the vacancy caused by such decease, resignation or neglect to serve shall be filled, or until the inability shall cease.

SECTION VII.

BOARD OF MANAGERS.

The Board of Managers shall judge of the qualifications of every candidate who shall make proper application for admission to the Society, and shall have power to admit him to membership therein, if found eligible under the Constitution of this Society. Three negative votes shall be a rejection of the applicant.

They may, through the Secretary, call special meetings of the Society at such times as they may see fit, and they may arrange for commemorative celebrations by the Society.

They shall recommend plans to the Society for promoting its purposes, and when practicable, may digest and prepare business for its meetings, and shall supervise all publications issued in its name, and decide whether copies of records or

other documents or papers may be furnished on request of any party in cases not pertaining directly to the business of the Society, and the proper conduct of its affairs.

They shall generally superintend the interest, and shall have control and management of the affairs and funds of the Society. They shall also perform such duties as may be prescribed by the Constitution and By-Laws, or required by any standing rule or resolve of the Society; *provided, however*, that they shall at no time be required to take any action, nor contract any debts, for which they shall be jointly or severally liable. They shall be competent to consent to, and to accept, the resignation or voluntary withdrawal from membership of any enrolled member of the Society.

They may require the attendance of any member of the Society, or any official or committee thereof, at any meeting for consultation and advice.

The Board of Managers shall meet as often as they may desire, or at the call of the President, or upon the written request of any three members of the same, addressed to the Secretary.

Three members of the Board of Managers shall be a quorum for the transaction of business.

At every annual meeting they shall submit to the Society a general report of their proceedings during the year then closing, and at such other times as may be required by the Society.

SECTION VIII.

TREASURER.

The Treasurer shall collect and keep the funds and securities of the Society, and shall deposit them in some bank or banking house, to be designated by the Board of Managers, to the credit of the SOCIETY OF SONS OF THE REVOLUTION in the State of Missouri, and shall be drawn thence on the check of the Treasurer for the purpose of the Society only. Out of these funds he shall pay such sums only as may be ordered by the Society or by the Board of Managers. He shall keep a true

account of his receipts and payments, and at each annual meeting render a statement of the same to the Society, and to the committee appointed to audit his accounts. He shall give such security as may from time to time be required by the Board of Managers.

SECTION IX.

REGISTRAR.

The Registrar shall keep a roll of members, and in his hands shall be lodged all the proofs of membership, qualification, and all the historical and other papers of which the Society may become possessed, and he, under the direction of the Board of Managers, shall make copies of such similar documents as the owners thereof may not be willing to leave permanently in the keeping of the Society.

SECTION X.

CHAPLAIN.

The Chaplain shall be a regularly ordained minister of a Christian denomination, and shall perform such duties as ordinarily appertain to such office.

SECTION XI.

HISTORIAN.

The Board of Managers shall have power annually to appoint an Historian, who shall keep a detailed record, to be deposited with the Registrar, of all the historical and commemorative celebrations of the Society, and he shall edit and prepare for publication such addresses, essays, papers and other documents of an historical character (other than a register of members) as the Secretary may be required to publish, and at every annual meeting, if there be a necrological list for the year then closing, he shall submit the same with carefully prepared biographies of the deceased members.

SECTION XII.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

At all meetings of the Society and of the Board of Managers the following order of business shall be observed so far as the same may be applicable :

1. Reading of minutes of prior meetings not previously acted upon.
2. Reports of Officers—
 - a. Secretary.
 - b. Treasurer.
 - c. Board of Managers.
 - d. Historian.
3. Reports of Committees.
4. Unfinished business.
5. New business.
6. Election of Officers and Managers.
7. Miscellaneous business.

SECTION XIII.

EXPULSION AND SUSPENSION.

The Board of Managers shall have power to expel any enrolled member of this Society who, by conduct unbecoming a gentleman and a man of honor, or by an opposition to the interest of the community in general or of this Society in particular, may render himself unworthy to continue a member, or who shall persistently transgress or, without good excuse, wilfully neglect or fail in the performance of any obligation enjoined by the Constitution, By-Laws or any standing rule of this Society, provided that such member shall have received at least ten days' notice in writing of the complaint preferred against him, and of the time and place for hearing the same, and have been thereby afforded an opportunity to be heard in person.

Whenever the cause of expulsion shall not have involved turpitude or moral unworthiness, any member thus expelled may, upon the unanimous recommendation of the Board of Managers, but not otherwise, be restored to membership by the Society at any meeting.

The Board of Managers shall drop from the roll the name of any enrolled member of the Society who shall be two years in arrears in the payment of dues, and who, on notice to pay the same, shall fail and neglect to do so within thirty days thereafter, and upon being thus dropped his membership shall cease and determine, but he may be restored to membership at any time by the Board of Managers, on his application therefor, and upon his payment of all such arrears and of the annual dues from the date when he was dropped to the date of his restoration. The Board of Managers may also suspend any officer from the performance of his duties for cause, which proceeding must be reported to the Society, and acted upon by it within thirty days, either by recision of the suspension or removal of the suspended officer from office, or otherwise the suspension shall cease.

SECTION XIV.

RESIGNATION.

No resignation or voluntary withdrawal from membership by any member enrolled in this Society shall become effective as a release from the obligations thereof, unless consented to and accepted by the Board of Managers.

SECTION XV.

DISQUALIFICATION.

No person who may be enrolled as a member of the Society shall be permitted to continue in membership when the proofs of claim of qualification by descent shall be found to be defective and insufficient to substantiate such claim, or not properly authenticated; the Society or the Board of Managers may at any time, after thirty days' notice to such person to properly substantiate or authenticate his claim, require the Secretary to erase his name from the list of members, and such person shall thereupon cease to be a member, provided he shall have failed to or neglected to comply satisfactorily with such notice.

Where the Board of Managers shall direct the erasure of a person's name for a cause comprehended under this section,

such person shall have a right of appeal to the next annual meeting of the Society, but he shall not be restored to membership, unless by a vote of three-fourths of the members present on that occasion, or at a subsequent meeting to which the consideration of the appeal may have been specifically postponed.

SECTION XVI.

SERVICE OF NOTICES.

It shall be the duty of every member to inform the Secretary, by written communication, of his place of residence, his post office address, and of any change thereof.

Service of any notice under the Constitution or By-Laws, upon any member of the Society addressed by him at his last recorded place of residence or post office address, and forwarded by mail, shall be deemed sufficient service of such notice.

SECTION XVII.

DECEASE OF MEMBERS.

Upon the decease of any member residing within the State of Missouri, notice thereof and of the time and place of the funeral shall be given by the Secretary by publication, and it shall thereupon become the duty of the members, when practicable, to attend the obsequies.

Any member upon being informed of the decease of a member shall make it his business to see that the Secretary is promptly notified of the fact by telegraph, which fact shall also in due time be communicated to the Society.

SECTION XVIII.

PRIZE ESSAYS AND MEDALS, AND COMMITTEE ON SAME.

For the purpose of stimulating a study and research into the history of the formative period of our nation by the young men and women of the State, this Society shall offer each year

a gold medal for the best original essay on a subject to be selected by the Society, and a silver medal for the second prize, and a bronze medal for the third prize.

The Society shall elect every year a committee of three who shall have charge and management of the award of the prizes, which shall be announced at the annual meeting.

SECTION XIX.

MARSHAL.

The President of the Society may, from time to time in his discretion, designate a member to act under his direction as Marshal for the Society in its commemorative celebrations, parades and other meetings, and to perform such duties as usually appertain to such a position.

SECTION XX.

CERTIFICATE OF MEMBERSHIP.

Every member shall be entitled to receive a certificate of membership, which shall be authenticated by the President and Secretary, and countersigned by the Registrar of the Society, and to which the seal of the SONS OF THE REVOLUTION shall be affixed. The certificate shall be in form following:

SECTION XXI.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE.

The President shall, sixty days previous to the annual meeting, appoint a committee of three, who, if practicable, should not be officers, to recommend to the Society a list of officers to be voted for; such recommendation, however, shall not prevent any member, present at the meeting, placing in nomination any other member for any office.

SECTION XXII.

AUDITING COMMITTEE.

The President shall, thirty days previous to the annual meeting, appoint an auditing committee of three, who shall audit the books of the Treasurer, and attest the correctness of the Treasurer's annual report.

SECTION XXIII.

DELEGATES TO THE GENERAL SOCIETY.

- There shall be chosen at every annual meeting six delegates and six alternates to the General Society.

SECTION XXIV.

AMENDMENTS.

No alteration of the By-Laws of the Society shall be made, unless such alteration shall have been proposed at a previous meeting, and shall be adopted by a majority of the members present at any meeting of the Society, five days' notice thereof having been given to each member.

INSTRUCTIONS TO APPLICANTS.

The application must be presented upon the forms issued by the Society.

The record of the ancestor's military service should be given fully, but concisely.

It is not necessary to show the pedigree any farther back than the ancestor who served in the war.

The Society does not accept Encyclopedias, Genealogical Works, or Town or County Histories, except such as contain *Rosters* as authorities for proofs of service.

In referring to printed works, the volume and page should be given.

Reference to authorities, in manuscript, must be accompanied by certified copies, and authentic family records must be submitted, if required.

Every application must be signed by the applicant, and sworn to by him, and it must be endorsed by two members of the Society.

When the applicant is not personally known to any member of the Society, whom he can ask to recommend his application, he must submit to the Secretary, when he files his papers, the names of two reputable citizens of the State to whom he refers by permission.

When an applicant claims descent from more than one Revolutionary ancestor, then "Supplementary" applications must be made for each ancestor.

Supplementary claims are to be treated in form and procedure precisely as original applications. No extra cost for filing supplementary claims.

The Secretary, having had considerable experience in assisting gentlemen in making researches to find proof of ancestors' service, would caution applicants that very little dependence can be placed on "family tradition" as to the rank held by the

ancestor. If family genealogies were to be taken as evidence, or the war stories handed down from one generation to another believed, it would demonstrate that the army of the Revolutionary War was composed of all Majors and Colonels. The soldiers of that struggle were held with such veneration by their neighbors and friends, that when they reached a good old age nearly all were dubbed, by courtesy, Major or Colonel, and family tradition has handed these courtesy titles down to posterity. Again, many were officers of Militia after the war and obtained titles that way. So, when the official records are examined they disclose an altogether different rank, or, as is often the case, no rank at all, and applicants are greatly disappointed.

To begin to make a search for proofs, the applicant must know the State the ancestor served from, and in writing officials simply ask "for the military service of A. B., said to have been a soldier in the Revolutionary War," and they will inform you what rank they find and any other data the records show. Also, give the name of town or county he served from, if you know. And correspond with the following officials and others named, in the various States, for certificates of military service, and the fees for same:

VERMONT. This State has published a Roster which is in the Library of the Missouri Society.

NEW HAMPSHIRE. This State has published a very complete Roster in four volumes, which are in the Library of the MISSOURI SOCIETY.

MASSACHUSETTS. This State has published a very complete Roster in seventeen volumes, which are in the Library of the MISSOURI SOCIETY.

RHODE ISLAND. This State has published "Civil and Military List of Rhode Island 1647-1800." Contains a list of the civil and military officers elected by the General Assembly from 1647 to 1800. It has no names of private soldiers. This vol-

ume is in the Library of the MISSOURI SOCIETY. For service of private soldiers, write to the Secretary of State at Providence. No charge for making search, but where name is found the charge is \$1.50 for furnishing certified record.

CONNECTICUT. This State has published a very complete Roster, containing 27,000 names, which volume is in the Library of the MISSOURI SOCIETY.

NEW YORK. This State has published a very complete Roster "New York in the Revolution as Colony and State." Second edition containing 51,972 names—which volume is in the Library of the Missouri Society.

NEW JERSEY. This State has published a roster, "Officers and Men of New Jersey in the Revolutionary War," which volume is in the Library of the MISSOURI SOCIETY.

PENNSYLVANIA. Write Hon. Luther R. Kelker, Custodian of Public Records, State Library, Harrisburg. No charge for making search or furnishing certificate of service.

DELAWARE. Write the Secretary of State, Dover. The charge for furnishing records is two cents per line and \$1.00 additional for certificate. The MISSOURI SOCIETY has a "History of the Delaware State Society of the Cincinnati." Contains a Roster of the Officers of the Delaware Continental Regiments. The United States Pension Roll of the Delaware soldiers who drew pensions after the war is also in the Library of the MISSOURI SOCIETY.

MARYLAND. This State has published a Roster, "Archives of Maryland," Vol. XVIII, which volume is in the Library of the MISSOURI SOCIETY.

VIRGINIA. The Revolutionary records of this State are very meager, and consist mainly of land bounty warrants which were issued by the State to soldiers who had served three years or more. Write to Mr. W. G. Stanard, 314 West Cary St., Richmond, who has given considerable attention to tracing Virginia genealogies. He will make search of everything available at the State capital at a cost of \$5.00 in advance, and for furnishing record if name is found. The United States

pension roll contains the names of many Virginia soldiers who drew pensions after the war, which roll is in the Library of the MISSOURI SOCIETY.

NORTH CAROLINA. The Revolutionary Rolls of this State are very meager. The MISSOURI SOCIETY SONS OF THE REVOLUTION has in its Library "History of the North Carolina Continental Line, and Society of the Cincinnati," containing a Roster of the officers of the ten North Carolina Continental Regiments.

Also the Library has the "United States Pension Roll of North Carolina," which has the list of pensioners.

Hon. Marshall De Lancey Haywood, Secretary of the North Carolina Society Sons of the Revolution, Raleigh, N. C., has prepared a valuable pamphlet "Designed to aid those who have occasion to search for records of the services of Revolutionary ancestors in North Carolina," which pamphlet he will supply to anyone on payment of postage.

SOUTH CAROLINA. Among the troops furnished by this State were ten regiments of Militia and four Continental Regiments, besides numerous bands of partisan rangers, as those composing the commands of Marion and Sumpter. But the State has no rosters of these troops, and the principal records preserved are those of officers. General W. G. De Sassure has published a pamphlet containing "The names, as far as can be ascertained, of the officers who served in the South Carolina regiments," reprinted in the Charleston Year Book of 1893, which is in the Library of the MISSOURI SOCIETY, and the following are also in the library: "Gregg's History of the Old Cheraws," and "Saffell's Records of the Revolutionary War," each containing some names of officers and privates from this State. Also, the United States pension roll, containing the names of many South Carolina soldiers who drew pensions.

GEORGIA. Write Wm. Harden, Secretary Georgia Historical Society, Savannah, for information of Georgia soldiers. That Society has books and manuscripts which contain much useful information relating to the Revolutionary period.

PENSIONS

There were no pension laws passed by Congress until the year 1818, excepting for the relief of those disabled in the service, so that all who were not disabled, and who died previous to the year 1818 drew no pensions. The first pension act of 1818 granted pensions to those only who had served nine months or more in the Continental Army or Navy (the "Continental Army" must not be confounded with the State troops, Militia or Minutemen). Under this act of 1818, about eight thousand men applied for pensions, which number so alarmed Congress that it passed, in 1820, what became known as the "Alarm" act, which required that before the beneficiaries of the act of 1818 could longer receive its benefits they must go before some court and make a schedule of their property, and affirm that they were in "need of the assistance of their country for a support." The effect of this "Alarm" act was that large numbers had their pride touched, after making so many sacrifices and enduring such hardships for the Nation, and they refused to exhibit to the world their estate, while others could not make oath that they were in need of their country's assistance, so we find in the pension records after many names "dropped under the act of 1820," and the survivors were not restored until several years after.

The number of pensioners having become so reduced by death, Congress, in 1832, passed an act granting pensions to all officers and soldiers, whether Continental, State or Militia, who had served for any period not less than six months. Even this act left out many who had served acceptably for a period of less than six months.

The widows of Revolutionary soldiers drew pensions, provided they were married prior to 1853, so that the military record of the soldier who did not draw a pension himself can be found through the papers filed by the widow.

The MISSOURI SOCIETY has procured the following rare and valuable Public Documents, giving lists of pensioners:

"Senate Documents, Twenty-Third Congress, First Session, Vols. 12, 13, 14," being the pension roll of 1835, and contains the names of all who had been placed on the roll to that date, about 90,000 names.

"Census of Revolutionary Pensioners of 1840," containing the list of the Pensioners that were alive in 1840, about 34,000 names.

If applicants have reason to believe their ancestors drew a pension under the acts of 1818 and 1832, if they will request the Secretary of the MISSOURI SOCIETY, he will make an examination of these pension rolls to see if he can find the name. But applicants must be particular to inform him where the supposed pensioner was living when he was drawing a pension between the years 1818 and 1840, also what State he served from during the war. These pension rolls are not arranged alphabetically, only by States, hence the necessity of knowing what State the pensioner lived in when drawing his pension.

If the Secretary finds the name he will inform the applicant, who can then write the Honorable Commissioner of Pensions, at Washington, asking for a copy of the ancestor's military history. There is no cost attached for obtaining this data from the Commissioner, and it usually takes about thirty days to get a reply.

A mistaken idea prevails that there is on file in the Adjutant-General's office, in Washington, complete Rosters of the soldiers of the Revolutionary War, and that it is only necessary to write to that department to obtain a record of the ancestor's service. There are no complete Rosters of the Revolutionary soldiers in any department of the Government, nor anywhere else. The Rosters that were on file in the War Department were lost by the destruction of the temporary building, in which they were stored, by fire, in 1800, and again by the burning of the public buildings, by the British, in 1814.

The records remaining in the different departments at Washington containing the names of Revolutionary soldiers have

been transferred to the office of the Adjutant General, War Department, who will furnish, free of charge, the record of any Revolutionary soldier on the rolls of his office. The Adjutant General requires an applicant for information to give the name of the State the ancestor served from, also to give the relationship of the ancestor to the applicant, and the purpose for which he desires the information.

The most complete Rosters are found in the Archives of the old original thirteen States, and these in some instances are only fragmentary, some States having lost their entire Rosters. So when the records of whole regiments are lost it is not strange that an individual name cannot always be found.

The fees should, in all cases, accompany the inquiry made of officials who will return the money where no charge is made for research.

The Secretary of the MISSOURI SOCIETY makes no charge for an examination of the volumes or documents in the Library of the Society, to assist applicants to become members of the Society.

OFFICERS AND MEN OF NEW JERSEY IN THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR.

This volume, compiled by Gen. Wm. S. Stryker, Adjutant-General, is a valuable Roster of the men of that State in the Revolutionary War.

ARCHIVES OF THE STATE OF MARYLAND.

Vol. XVIII contains the names of the men of that State in the Revolutionary War.

RECORDS OF THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR, BY W. T. R. SAFFELL.

Containing a number of the names of officers and privates that served in the war.

GREGG'S HISTORY OF THE OLD CHERAWS.

This is a History of the early settlers of the Cheraw District of South Carolina, and the part taken by them in the Revolutionary War.

HEITMAN'S HISTORICAL REGISTER OF THE OFFICERS OF THE CONTINENTAL ARMY.

Contains the names of about 10,000 officers, mostly of the Continental Army, and has very few names of officers of Militia or Minutemen.

HEITMAN'S HISTORICAL REGISTER OF THE UNITED STATES ARMY.

Contains the names of the officers of the United States Army from 1789 to 1889.

MACLAY'S HISTORY OF THE UNITED STATES NAVY.

A history of the United States Navy from 1775 to 1893, in two volumes.

LOSSING'S PICTORIAL FIELD BOOK OF THE REVOLUTION.

Two volumes.

BANCROFT'S HISTORY OF THE UNITED STATES.

Ten volumes.

A DAILY JOURNAL OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

Is a diary kept by Dr. James Thacher, a Surgeon in the Revolutionary War.

AMERICAN ARCHIVES.

These nine large volumes of the American Archives were prepared by order of Congress, in 1837, by the late Peter Force, and give a documentary history of the English Colonies in North America, from the King's Message to Parliament of March 7, 1774, to the Declaration of Independence, 1776. They contain the debates in the House of Lords and House of Commons on measures relating to the American Colonies, also the State Papers, debates and proceedings of the Committees of Safety and the Provincial Congress of the Colonies, and the Continental Congress, of the period 1774-1776.

CIVIL AND MILITARY LIST OF RHODE ISLAND, 1647-1800,
Being a list of all officers elected by the General Assembly from 1647 to 1800.

ALPHABETICAL LIST OF PRIVATE CLAIMS, FIRST TO THIRTY-FIRST CONGRESS.

These three volumes are a list of private claims made to Congress from the First to Thirty-first Congress, and include the claims arising from the Revolutionary War from miscellaneous causes, arranged alphabetically.

SENATE DOCUMENTS, TWENTY-THIRD CONGRESS FIRST SESSION, VOLS. 12, 13, 14.

These three volumes contain the pension roll of 1835, and include all who have been placed on the roll to that date under the several acts of Congress, about 90,000 names.

CENSUS OF PENSIONERS OF 1840

Is a list of all the Revolutionary pensioners of that date, giving their ages and place of residence, compiled from the sixth census, about 34,000 names.

THE SOCIETY OF THE CINCINNATI IN NEW YORK.

Contains a historical sketch of the Society, with extracts from the proceedings of the General Society, as well as the New York State Society, and biographical sketches of the original members. The Society of the Cincinnati was founded by officers of the Revolutionary War in 1783, and eligibility must be through descent in the eldest male line from an officer who was an original member of the Society.

A HISTORY OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONTINENTAL LINE,
AND SOCIETY OF THE CINCINNATI.

Contains a Roster of the officers of the North Carolina Continental Regiments.

A HISTORY OF THE DELAWARE STATE SOCIETY OF THE CINCINNATI.

The joint resolution of Congress is as follows:

I. Joint Resolution granting permission to officers and enlisted men of the Army and Navy of the United States to wear the badges adopted by Military Societies of Men who served in the War of the Revolution, War of 1812, the Mexican War, and the War of the Rebellion.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That the distinctive badges adopted by Military Societies of men who served in the armies and navies of the United States, in the War of the Revolution, the War of 1812, the Mexican War, and the War of the Rebellion, respectively, may be worn upon all occasions of ceremony by officers and enlisted men of the Army and Navy of the United States, who are members of said organization in their own right.

Approved, September 25, 1890.

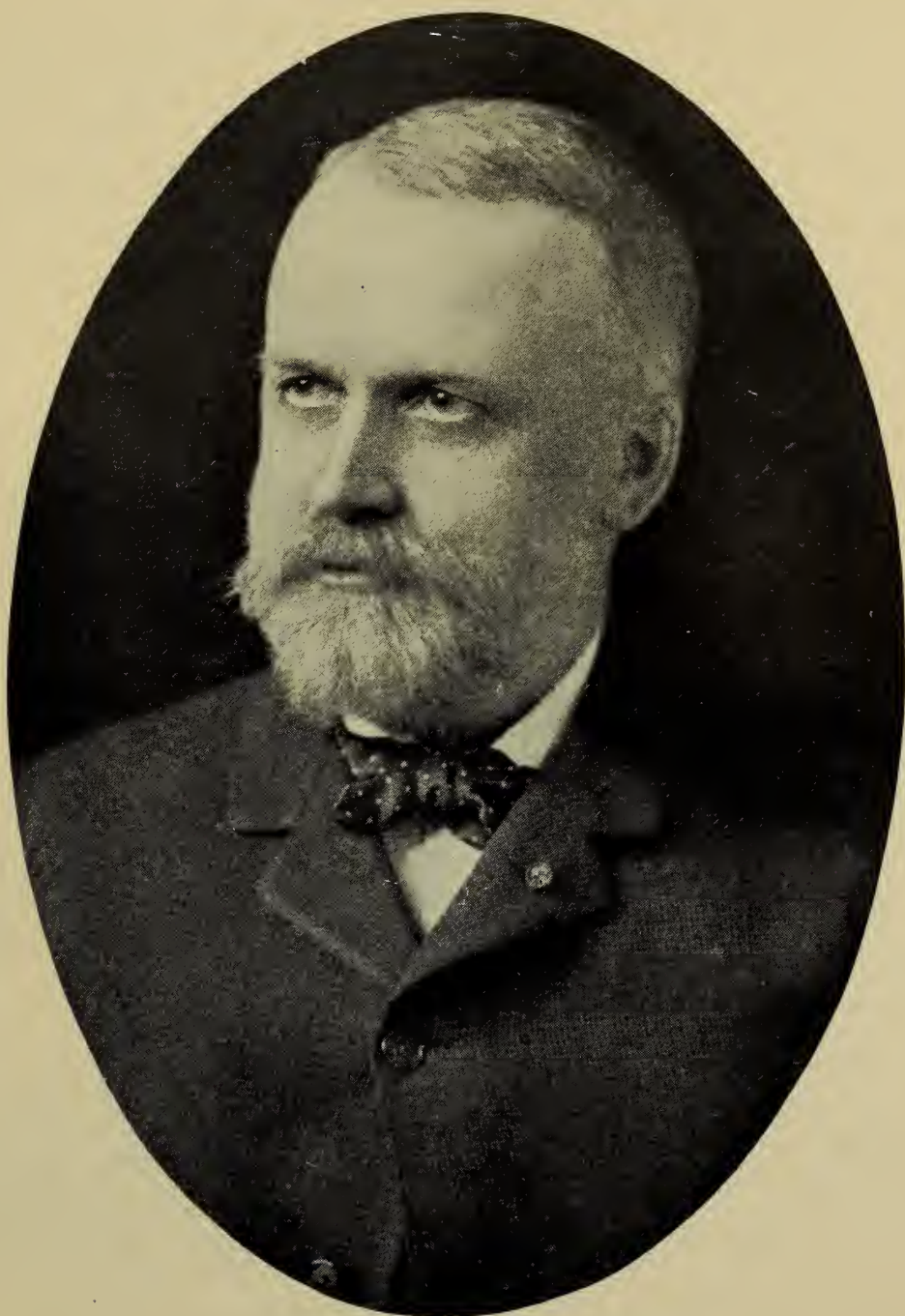
George Amos Newcomb.

BORN FEBRUARY 14, 1841.**DIED DECEMBER 12, 1906.**

George Amos Newcomb, born in Boston, February 14, 1841, was the son of Norton and Lydia (Christy) Newcomb. He married, in Medford, Massachusetts, February 3, 1869, Julia Augusta Floyd. And to them the following children were born: Norton, Charles Lawrence, George Amos, Jr., Chester (died in infancy), Harold Barnes, Floyd Turner, Dorothy Christy.

Mr. Newcomb was educated in the Boston public schools, the Medford, Massachusetts, High School, 1854-57. Graduated from the Wilbraham, Massachusetts, Academy, 1859, and from the Wesleyan University, Middletown, Connecticut, A. D. 1863. Taught school at Billerica, Massachusetts, 1862-63. He entered the U. S. Navy, January, 1864, as Admiral's Clerk of the North Atlantic Squadron—serving on the U. S. S. Minnesota, and the U. S. S. Malvern. Resigned from the Navy in the autumn of 1864, and went to St. Louis, entering the employ of his brother, Norton Newcomb, wholesale and retail dealers in wall papers. Became a partner, under the style of "Newcomb Brothers," September, 1866. On the death of his brother, in 1882, the business was incorporated as "Newcomb Brothers Wall Paper Company," of which he remained as president until his death.

The Newcomb family dates in America from 1639, and his ancestors have been represented in nearly all the wars of this

country, commencing with Captain Richard Brackett, a member of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company, of Boston, in 1636. And Isaac Newcomb, a Private of Massachusetts troops, in 1747. In the Revolution his great-grandfather, Thomas Newcomb, was Captain-Lieutenant in Colonel Paul Revere's Artillery, and serving in his Company were his three sons, one being only fourteen years old. Also his great-grandfather, William Brackett, served in Massachusetts troops from 1775 to 1781.

Mr. Newcomb was Vice-President of the Missouri Society Sons of the Revolution, Deputy Governor of the Missouri Society of Colonial Wars, President of the New England Society of St. Louis, Past-Commander of Ransom Post, G. A. R., Member of Tuscan Lodge of Masons, Member of the Royal Arcanum Legion of Honor, Electric (Phi Ne Theta) Fraternity of Wesleyan University, and Member of the Country Club. He was foreman of the Grand Jury of April, 1904, which returned so many indictments in the celebrated boodle cases. Was awarded a Commemorative Diploma and Medal for services pertaining to the Wall Paper Exhibits of this and foreign countries, at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition.

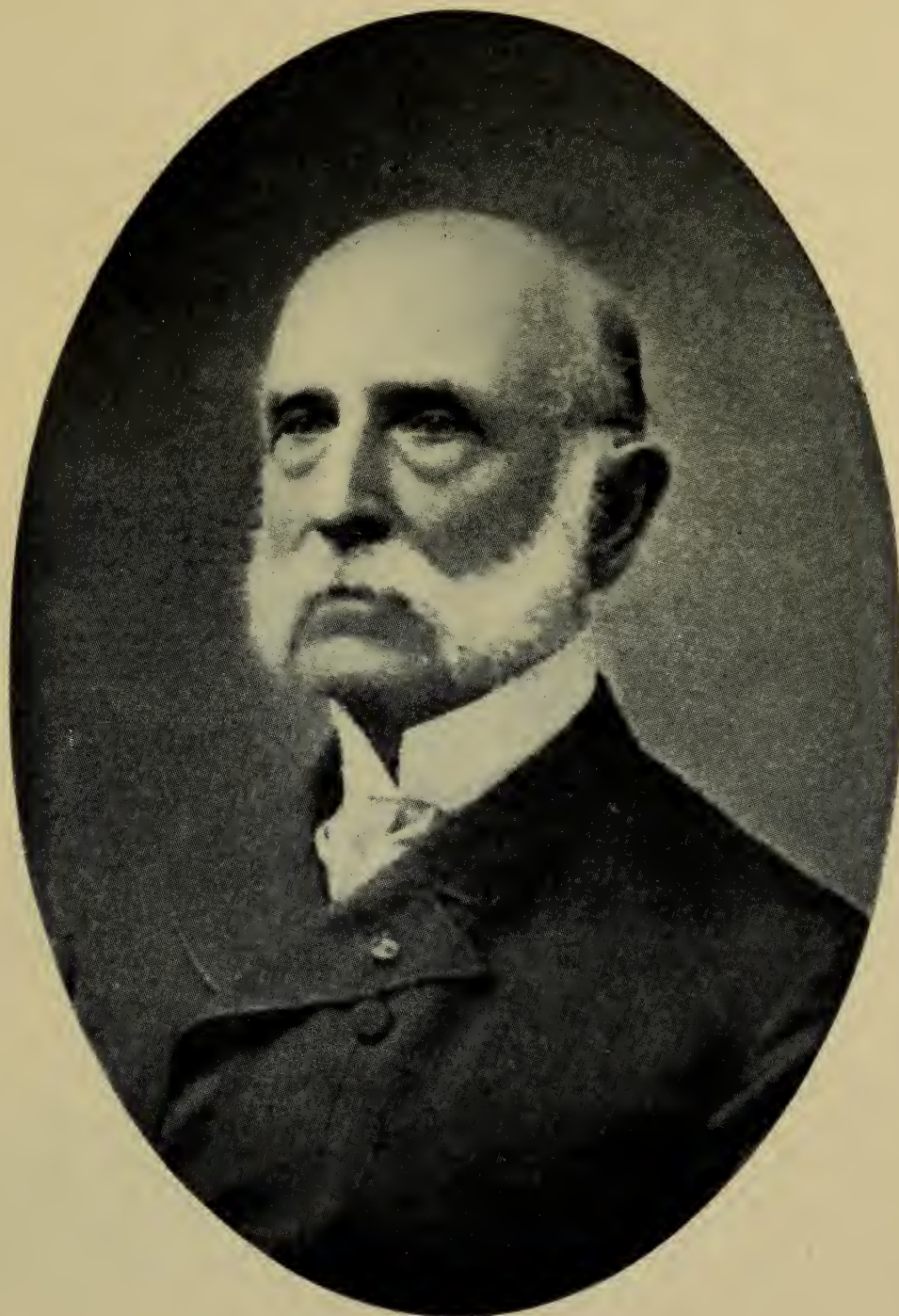
In the passing away of Mr. Newcomb, the Missouri Society Sons of the Revolution sustained an irreparable loss. In the formative period of the Society his zeal and activity was remarkable, and he personally added over one hundred members to the roll. Possessed of a genial and charming manner, he never let an opportunity pass whether at the club, on the street, or at his place of business, to present the claims of the Society to anyone whom he thought might be eligible.

Gen. Lewis Baldwin Parsons.

BORN APRIL 5, 1818.**DIED MARCH 16, 1907.**

Lewis Baldwin Parsons was born in Genesee County, New York, April 5, 1818. He entered Yale College from Gouverneur, New York, in 1836, graduating in 1840; and, after two years spent in teaching a classical school in Mississippi, entered Harvard Law School, graduating in 1844. He at once went West, locating at Alton, Illinois, where he acquired a large law practice, and was for several years City Attorney. In 1854 he removed to St. Louis, became Attorney for Page & Bacon, who were then engaged in building the Ohio & Mississippi Railroad, and was connected with that road for many years thereafter, being at various times, Director, Treasurer and President.

In 1861, he determined, as he wrote, "To give all aid in my power for the preservation of the Government, as my grandfather had given seven years of his life during the Revolutionary War," and, arranging his affairs so that they could be left, he went to Washington and offered his services to General McClellan, whom he had known as Vice-President of the Ohio & Mississippi Railroad. He entered the Army on McClellan's staff with the rank of Captain, but was soon sent West, at his own urgent request, reporting to General Allen, Chief Quartermaster at St. Louis, who, knowing of his previous railroad experience, ordered him to take charge of railroad transportation in the West, and reform the great abuses then existing in that department. His immediate and marked success in introducing system, where had been chaos, caused General Allen to appoint him Chief of Rail and River Transportation for the West, with headquarters at St. Louis. The tremendous responsibility of this position can only be properly estimated by recalling the immense distances to be covered, the great armies operating in this region, the

enormous quantities of supplies necessary and the great battles fought there, while ample testimony was borne by the generals in the field, as also by Secretary Stanton and President Lincoln, to Colonel Parsons' remarkable success in so organizing and managing the department, "that no military movement ever failed or faltered for lack of transportation." He greatly desired active service in the field, but his oft-repeated request for a transfer to the line, was not granted, and his only experience in field service was at Corinth, where he was on General Halleck's staff—at the Battle of Chickasaw Bayou and at the capture of Arkansas Post, where he received special mention for bravery. Colonel Parsons remained in the West until 1864, when he was given charge of all Rail and River Transportation of the Armies of the United States, and was ordered to Washington where he was stationed during the remainder of the War. In 1865, he was promoted to the rank of Brigadier-General on the autographic order of President Lincoln, and, on finally retiring from service in May, 1866, Secretary Stanton conferred on him the rank of Brevet Major-General.

After two years of travel abroad, General Parsons returned to St. Louis, and, in 1875, removed to his large farm near Flora, Illinois, where he spent the remaining years of his life in comparative quiet, yet taking an active interest, to the last, in affairs of home, and state and nation. He passed away after a brief illness on March 16, 1907.

"General Parsons' right to membership in the Society of Sons of the Revolution was through the services of his grandfather, Charles Parsons, Second Lieutenant, Second New York, October, 1775; First Lieutenant, 21st February, 1776; First Lieutenant, First New York, 21st November, 1776, to rank from 21st February, 1776; Captain-Lieutenant, 1st September, 1778; Captain, 26th March, 1779; was with Washington at Valley Forge, wounded at the Battle of Monmouth, and was present at the surrender of Cornwallis; served to June, 1783; member of New York Society of the Cincinnati."

William Bridges Thayer.

BORN SEPTEMBER 11, 1852.**DIED MARCH 31, 1907.**

Mr. William Bridges Thayer, a member of the Kansas City Chapter, Sons of the Revolution.

Was born in Louisville, Kentucky, September 11th, 1852, and died in Kansas City, March 31, 1907.

His early life was passed in Danville, Kentucky, and he received his education at Centre College. Having an ardent desire to engage in commercial pursuits, he did not complete his college course, but came to Kansas City, in 1873, where he obtained employment with the Dry Goods Company of Bullene, Moores & Emery.

By close application he won the confidence and respect of his employers, who soon recognized his ability, and for many years prior to his death he had been a member of the Emery, Bird, Thayer Dry Goods Company.

He was by nature a gentleman, and his success was based upon the instincts of his inheritance and a firm belief in the Christian religion. He was successful in every walk of life, and when he passed away he was mourned by the whole city.

No greater tribute can be paid to any man than to have his business associates and employes pay respect to his memory; two days after his death the employers and employes of his business firm assembled in one of the large auditoriums of Kansas City, where, with suitable addresses and appropriate music, his fellow-workmen attested their love and friendship.

Mr. Thayer took an active interest in everything pertaining to the upbuilding of Kansas City; he served with distinction as President of The Commercial Club for the years 1901-1902.

He was a Thirty-third Degree Mason, and had occupied many positions of honor and responsibility with that society.

Mr. Thayer was imbued with a love of country, of his native State and of his adopted city in a high degree. He was justly proud of the part which his ancestors played in the struggle for human liberty and independence on the American continent.

Those of us who have had the good fortune to look in upon his home life, can bear witness to the wholesome atmosphere of love, devotion and respect with which he was surrounded there. His loftiest ambition was the welfare of the wife and son who were so dear to his heart.

We deeply mourn the loss of our beloved brother and friend. No more will he walk with us in this vale of tears, but the memory of his friendship and virtues will endure 'till the last expiring breath. He fell asleep in the twilight of an ideal Easter day, just at the hour when the beautiful flowers inclined their heads in slumber, made drowsy by their own perfume.

Mr. Thayer's right to membership in the Society of Sons of the Revolution was through the service of his great-great-grandfather, John Adair, Private in the Regiment of Colonel Winn, South Carolina troops, 1779. Was taken prisoner in 1780, and kept a long time in close confinement; was in fourteen battles, serving to the close of the war; and was afterwards Governor of Kentucky; and through the service of his great-grandfather, Isaac Thayer, Captain in Colonel Marshall's Massachusetts Regiment, 1776-1777; and through the service of his great-grandfather, John Bridges, Private in Colonel Martin's Virginia Regiment, 1776, serving till 1781.

Joseph Minter Gregory, Jr.

BORN OCTOBER 18, 1858.**DIED JUNE 2, 1907.**

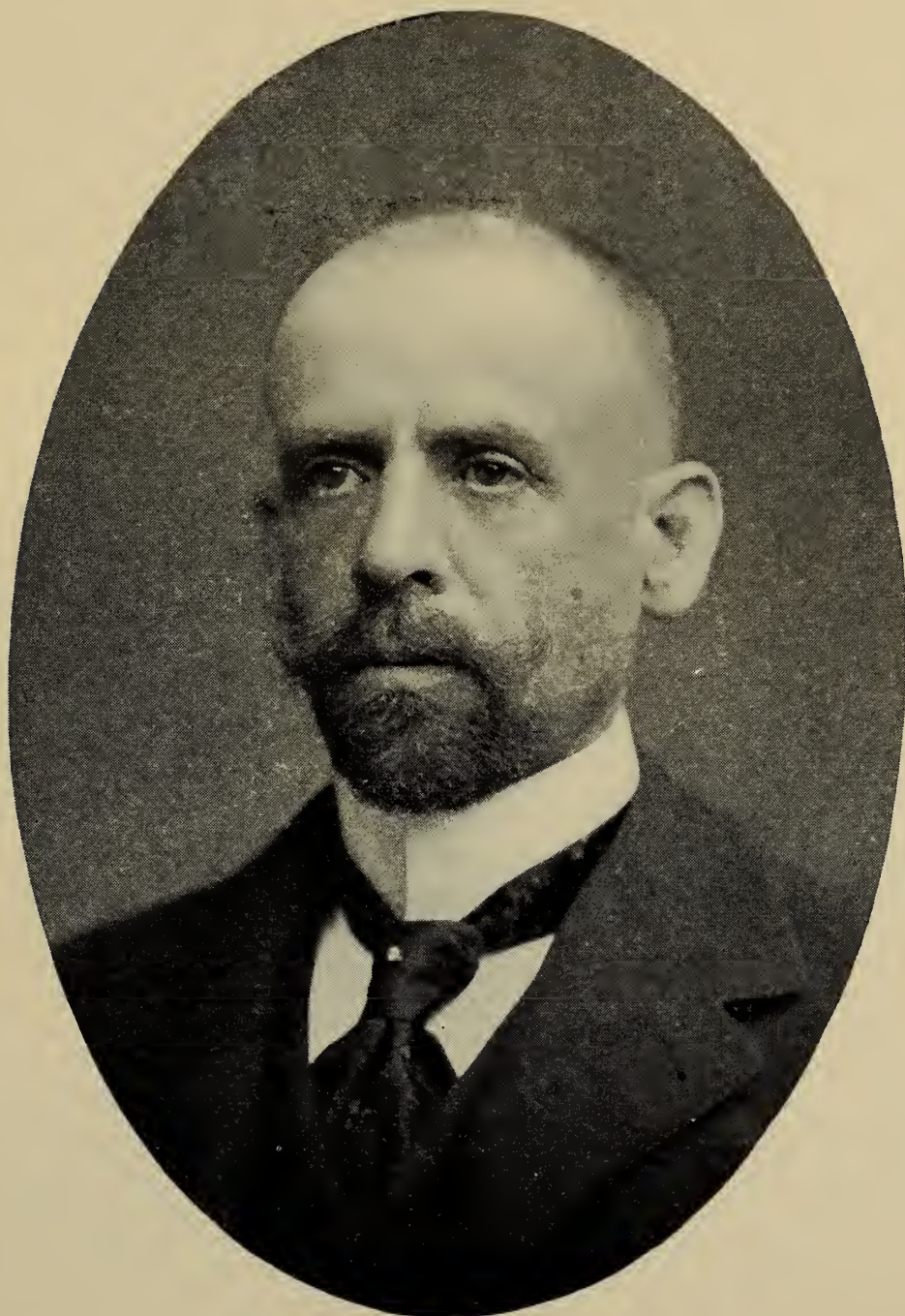
On the 2d of June, 1907, a dark wave of sorrow passed over Kansas City, tracing on many hearts a deep furrow of regret for "Joe Gregory," as he was familiarly called, had passed away in Chicago, having been ill with pneumonia only five days.

A Tennessean by birth and rearing, he came from one of the most prominent families of the State—his birth-place being Memphis, here he received his education, and at an early age entered the legal profession. In 1883 he moved to Kansas City, and soon identified himself with the commercial interests of that city—devoting his vigorous manhood to her general welfare and material prosperity. A few years found him at the head of the Bradstreet Company, whose interest he served with wonderful executive ability and zeal, both in the city of his adoption, and later as the Superintendent of the Chicago office.

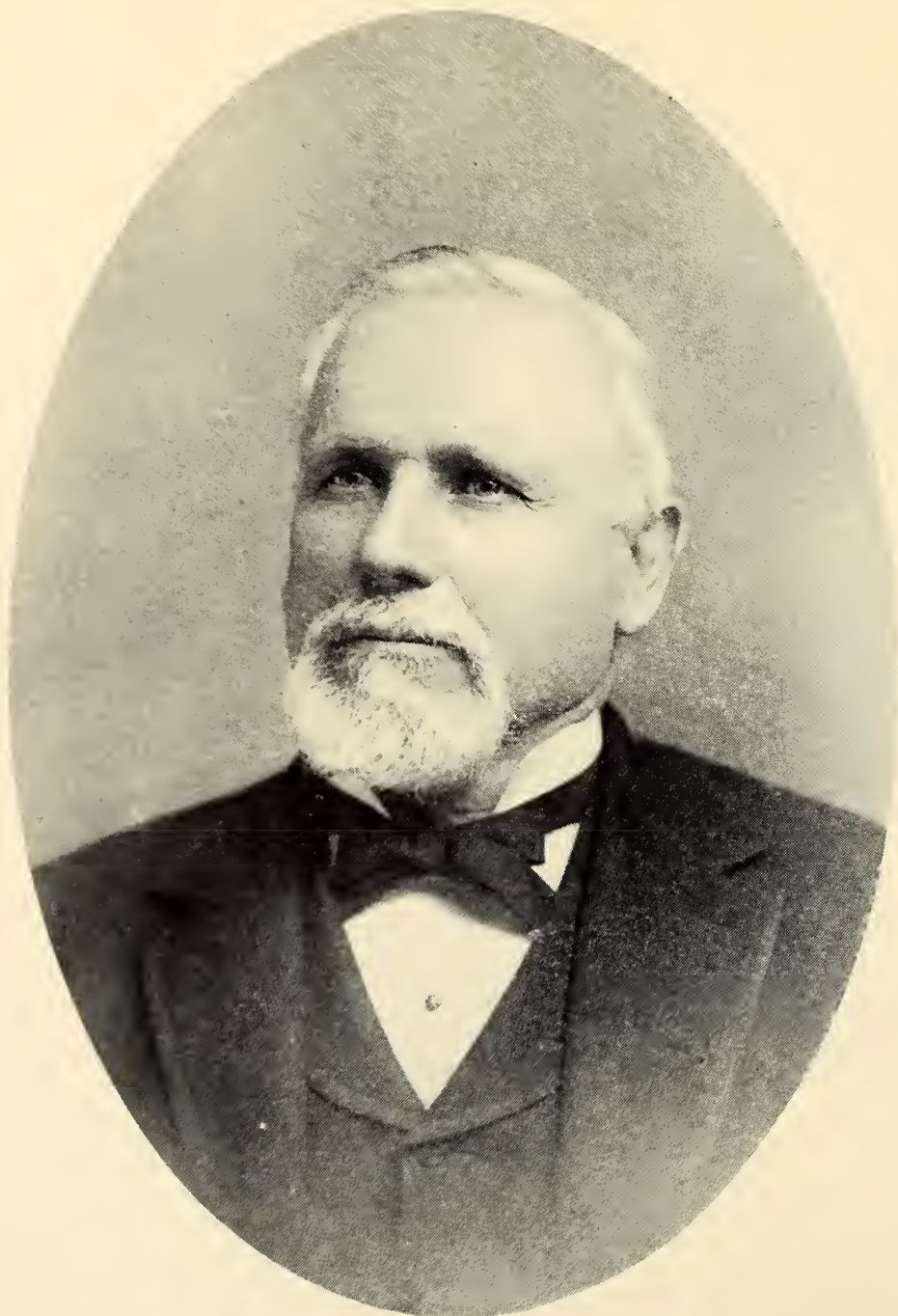
In 1885 he married Miss Martha Harris, of Lexington, Kentucky, who with two children await him on the Eternal Shore.

Mr. Gregory's membership in the Society of Sons of the Revolution was through the service of his great-great-grandfather, John Trabue, Lieutenant in the Virginia Continental Line, serving to the end of the war—and his great-great-grandfather, Charles Stewart Gregory, Sergeant, Virginia Infantry, killed at the battle of Trenton, New Jersey, December 26, 1776.

His life was one unbroken chain of beauty, about whose links of love never came the rust and canker of corroding envy nor malice. His nature was full of the noblest attributes; and in his heart "Mercy and truth had met together, righteousness and peace had kissed each other."

Hon. Chauncey Forward Shultz.

BORN MAY 29, 1824.**DIED AUGUST 19, 1907.**

Chauncey Forward Shultz, who has been prominent in St. Louis for many years as a business man and public official, was born at Salisbury, Somerset County, Pennsylvania, May 29, 1824. His father, Adam Shultz, married, 1818, Nancy Shockey, daughter of Christian Shockey, a Veteran of the Revolutionary War, who had enlisted in Captain Doyle's Company of the First Pennsylvania Regiment, in 1777, and served to the close of the war—witnessing the surrender of Lord Cornwallis. The son of a prosperous man of affairs, Chauncey F. Shultz, was carefully educated in his youth, and then served an apprenticeship to the tanner's trade. On several trips which he had made to the West, having convinced him that this was a good field in which to carry on the business of manufacturing leather, he sold out his Virginia interests and removed to St. Louis. He purchased the leather, hide and wool stock of Horace A. Conant, and later associating with himself Perry Shultz, Thomas Kerr, William Sample and J. A. J. Shultz as partners, established the business which he conducted successfully until 1874, when he retired from active participation. At a later date he was one of the organizers of the Shultz Belting Company, and acted as its purchasing agent from 1880 to 1887. Prominently identified with trade and commerce in St. Louis, he has been equally prominent in public life, having always taken an active interest in local and general Government affairs. In 1874 was elected Presiding Judge of the County Court of St. Louis County. He also served as one of the Commissioners of Forest Park, personally signing all of the two million-dollar issue of bonds for the improvement of Forest, O'Fallon and Carondelet Parks. In 1875 he was appointed

Assignee of the Western Savings Bank, his skillful winding up of its affairs resulted in the depositors being paid in full. In 1887 President Cleveland appointed him United States Sub-Treasurer for St. Louis; and at the end of his four years' service, when he turned over to his successor more than \$23,000,000, his cash balanced to a cent.

When he first came to St. Louis, Judge Shultz and his family united with the Central Presbyterian Church, and has since been a conspicuously helpful friend of the religious interests of the city. He helped to build the church at Garrison and Lucas Avenues, being a Deacon and Trustee. In the spring of 1877 he and his family united with the Lafayette Park Presbyterian Church. He assisted in building, and was one of the Trustees of that church. In 1890 he and his family transferred their membership to the Compton Hill Congregational Church, and when that church erected a new edifice at Compton and Lafayette Avenues, Judge Shultz was also Deacon and President of the Board of Trustees, and superintended the building of the church. He was President also of the Board of Trustees of the Central Mission Church. In 1848, at Hancock, Washington County, Maryland, he was married to Hadassah Chambers Brown. Mrs. Shultz was a great-granddaughter of Ben Chambers, the first white settler in Franklin County, Pennsylvania, and the founder of Chambersburg. This noted colonist served in Colonel William Thompson's Battalion during the Revolutionary War, and became a Lieutenant in the Pennsylvania Regiment. His descendant, Mrs. Shultz, was born in Paris, Tennessee, in 1827, where her father, Dr. William Maxwell Brown, died in 1836. Her mother then returned by stage to her father's home in Maryland, and there the daughter met and married Judge Shultz. She died in 1887. The children of Judge and Mrs. Shultz are: Maxwell W. Shultz, Mrs. Addie Allison, Llewellyn Brown Shultz and Mary Janet Shultz.

Charles Andrew Brockett.

BORN NOVEMBER 16, 1844.**DIED NOVEMBER 14, 1907.**

Charles Andrew Brockett, who died at Kansas City, November 14, 1907, was conspicuously identified with the development of Kansas City; was born November 16, 1844, at North Haven, New Haven County, Connecticut. His parents were George W. and Eliza Augusta (Barnes) Brockett, both natives of Connecticut. On the paternal side he was descended from John Brockett, son of Sir John Brockett (as the name formerly appeared), of Hertfordshire County, England. For the sake of his religious views John Brockett relinquished his heirship to the patrimonial estates, and emigrated to America, sailing in the good ship "Hector," in company with the eminent Rev. Davenport, and others, in 1638. After touching at Boston, the company landed in Connecticut and founded the New Haven Colony, John Brockett being among those who assented to the original covenant of the planters. He was a practical surveyor, and at their appointment he laid out the original nine squares of the town of New Haven, in 1641. In 1660 he surveyed the land and established the lines between the New Haven and Connecticut Colonies. In 1665 he laid out Elizabethtown, New Jersey, and then returned to New Haven. His descendants were useful citizens, filling honorable places in life, and to the seventh generation were reared in the same neighborhood, now known as Montowese, at the lower part of North Haven. Charles A. Brockett, brought up on his father's farm, was educated in near-by public and private schools. His studies were interrupted by the Civil War, in which

he engaged with patriotic enthusiasm. At the outbreak, when he was little more than seventeen years of age, he enlisted in the Fifteenth Regiment Connecticut Infantry Volunteers. With this command he took part in the campaign under General Burnside, in Virginia, including the Battle of Fredericksburg, and participated in the operations in North Carolina, including the engagements at Newburn, Kinston, Edenton Road, Plymouth and Little Washington, and the siege of Suffolk, Virginia. For a time he performed duty in the office of Provost Marshal, at Newburn, North Carolina. Soon after the war had ended he engaged in the hydraulic cement business and the manufacture of cement pipe in Pittsburg, Pennsylvania. From 1871 to 1873, at Woodbridge, Connecticut, he was senior member of the firm of Brockett & Newton, operating the William & Clark Match Works, the oldest match factory in the United States, established in 1834. In 1873 he took up his residence in Kansas City, Missouri, and organized the C. A. Brockett Cement Company, now the oldest company in this line of business in the city, of which he was president. Mr. Brockett was married in 1871 to Mrs. Henrietta McCutcheon, she was a sister of the Honorable Robert Mackey, then State Treasurer of Pennsylvania, a son, Robert Mackey Brockett, was born of this marriage, and is now Vice-President and Treasurer of the C. A. Brockett Cement Company. Mr. Brockett's first wife having died in 1888, he was married to Miss Hattie Barnes, of New Haven, a son, Donald, being born of this marriage.

Mr. Brockett's right to membership in the Sons of the Revolution was through the service of his great-great-grandfather, Isaiah Brockett, Private in the Company of Benjamin Trumbull, Connecticut troops, at the Battle of Long Island. Also through his great-grandfather, Joshua Barnes, Private in the Company of Captain Jacob Brockett, Connecticut troops.

William Axford Galentine.

BORN ———, 1862.**DIED FEBRUARY 7, 1908.**

William Axford Galentine, of St. Louis, died in Chicago, February 7, 1908. He was born in 1862, in Rush, Monroe County, New York. He graduated from the University of Rochester, in 1884, and later graduated from the Albany Law School. He was married in New Orleans, Louisiana, June 14, 1893, to Miss Mabel Smith, who died February 8, 1903. He was admitted to the bar in New York, in 1886, and practiced in Rochester one year before coming West. He settled in Kansas City, where he engaged in the real estate and loan business until 1890. In 1892 he went to St. Louis and entered the insurance business, as agent for the Travelers' Insurance Company. In February, 1900, he took charge as Manager and State Agent of the Prudential Insurance Company for Missouri. He was considered one of the most prominent insurance writers of his city. He retired from business about one year ago on account of health, and went to Chicago, where he died. During the years of his residence in St. Louis, after the death of his wife, he made his home at the St. Louis Club, of which he was a member. He also belonged to the Mercantile, St. Louis Field and Glen Echo Country Clubs, and the Delta Kappa Epsilon College Fraternity.

He was a member of the Sons of the Revolution through the service of his great-great-grandfather, Private Christopher Bergen, of the New Jersey Militia.

Major William Martin Abernathy.

BORN JUNE 5, 1860.**DIED FEBRUARY 17, 1908.**

Born at Leavenworth, Kansas, June 5, 1860; died February 17, 1908. His earliest recollections were associated with military life in the frontier posts, as his father, Col. J. L. Abernathy, was in active service during the Civil War; he was educated at Asbury University, where he received a thorough military as well as a classical training. Perhaps early associations were the occasion of more than usual interest in military affairs, as he was identified with the Missouri State Militia for many years, and was on the Governor's staff when war with Spain was declared. He responded to the call of his country with genuine patriotism, and received the commission of Major from President McKinley. He served with General Guy V. Henry, under General Miles, in Porto Rico, and was there able to render valuable service. At the expiration of the war he returned to his business interests in Kansas City, where he was prominently active in connection with the Abernathy Furniture Co., being secretary of this company from 1894 to 1903.

He was patient, loving and unselfishly thoughtful of his family, constantly and modestly considerate of others, even to the

point of self-sacrifice, and appreciative of the little amenities that make life brighter, never missing an opportunity for generosity. He possessed an unusual and refined appreciation of music, the kindred arts and literature, and in his business relations he was exact, industrious and of unswerving principle. His parents being staunch adherents to their highest sense of right, and his ancestry being a long line of God-loving, upright people, he came naturally by those characteristics of sterling worth so strongly emphasized in his individuality.

He gave up active life on account of failing health in 1902, and all through his long illness his natural disposition of patience and unselfishness was admirably apparent. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Fannie McClellan Abernathy, and his daughter, Mrs. Harry H. Holmes.

He was a member of the Loyal Legion, Sons of the Revolution, Military Order of Foreign Wars, the Beta Theta Pi Fraternity, the Kansas City Club and the Kansas City Country Club.

Major Abernathy's right to membership in the Sons of the Revolution was through the service of his great-great-great-grandfather, Major James Moore, of the 1st Pennsylvania; and through his great-great grandfather, Captain James Marshall, of the 13th Pennsylvania; and through his great-great-grandfather, William McPheeters, a soldier of the Augusta County, Virginia, Militia.

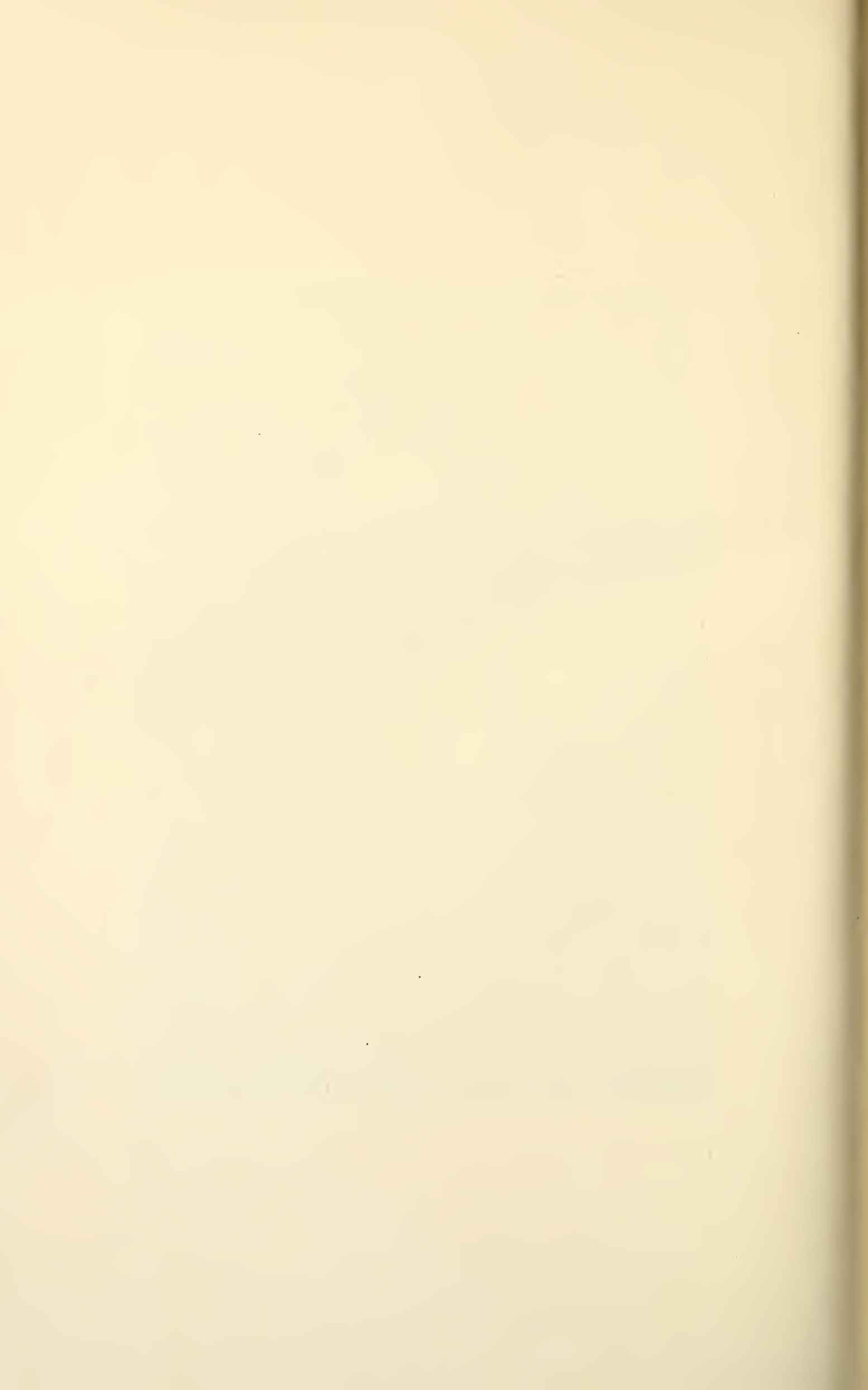
James Dun.

BORN SEPTEMBER 8, 1844.**DIED FEBRUARY 23, 1908.**

James Dun was born in Chillicothe, Ohio, September 8, 1844. His parents being James and Susan Virginia Walke Dun. His father's ancestors were Scotch, and his mother's English. He was educated in the public schools of Ohio, and in Miami University. In 1866 he began his railroad experience with an engineering party on the Indianapolis and Cincinnati Railway, the following year he entered the service of the Atlantic & Pacific Railway, and served with that company as an assistant engineer until 1871. The original purpose of the incorporators of this company was the construction of a line to the Pacific Coast. And Mr. Dun was engaged thus early in investigations and surveys with a trans-continental line. In 1871 he went to the Missouri Pacific Railway and stayed with that company until 1874, when he was engaged as engineer for the Union Depot Company, at St. Louis. In 1877 he became connected with the St. Louis & San Francisco Railway, which had meanwhile succeeded the Atlantic & Pacific Railway, as Superintendent of Bridges and Building, and the following year he was made Chief Engineer of that road. Twelve years thereafter this railway became part of the Atchison-Topeka & Santa Fe Railroad, and Mr. Dun was made Chief Engineer of the latter in August, 1890. He remained with this company up to the time of his death,

having been made Chief Engineer of the entire Santa Fe System with headquarters in Chicago, in 1900, and serving in this capacity until 1906, when he became its Consulting Engineer. While he was Chief Engineer of the Santa Fe System, the work of rehabilitation was carried out, by which practically every bridge was strengthened or renewed in order to modernize the road. Following close on the successful carrying out of this work, came the track elevation work in Chicago, and the many problems attached thereto, all of which bear the imprint of Mr. Dun's ability.

One of the most important works of Mr. Dun's life was the tabulating of drainage areas in the territory covered by the lines in which his experience had been gained.

In 1885 Mr. Dun married Mrs. Belle R. Otterson, and their daughter, Mary E. Dun, survived both parents.

Mr. Dun's second wife was Lucy J. Rucker, to whom he was married in 1899, survives him.

Mr. Dun's right to membership in the Sons of the Revolution was through the service of his great-great-grandfather, Cornelius Calvert, one of the "Sons of Liberty," organized at Norfolk, Virginia, March 31, 1776.

The subject of this memoir was an example of rugged, straight-forward manhood, combined with simplicity of character—a love of justice and fair dealing actuated his course through life:

“He scarce had need to doff his pride or slough the dross of earth—
E'en as he trod that day to God so walked he from his birth,
In simpleness and gentleness, and honor and clear mirth.”

Norton Holbrook Thayer.

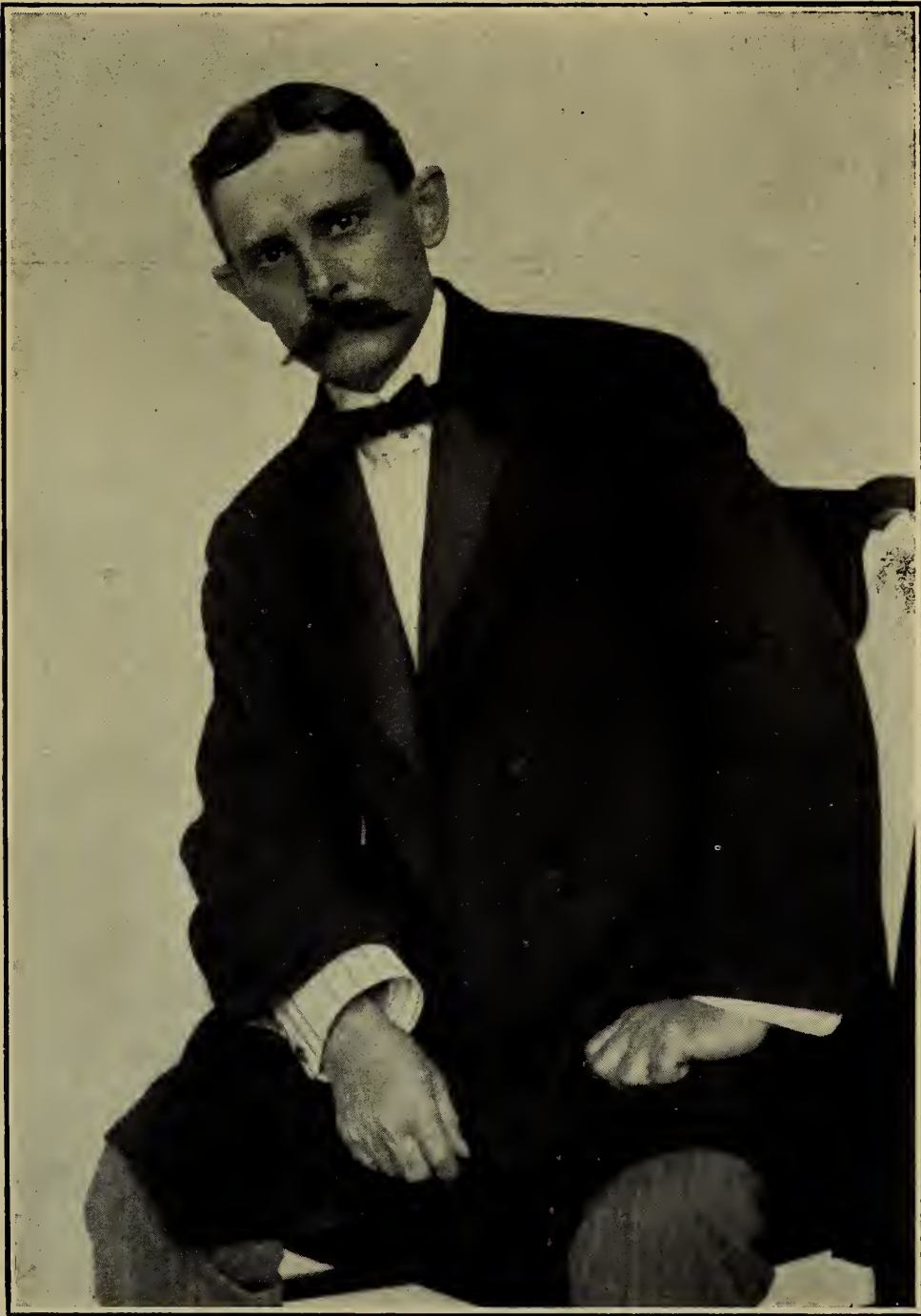
BORN DECEMBER 15, 1849.**DIED MARCH 22, 1908.**

Norton Holbrook Thayer was born in Louisville, Kentucky, December 15, 1849. He was the son of Dr. John Thayer, a well-known physician of that city, who shortly afterwards removed to Danville, Kentucky, where Norton Thayer's boyhood days were passed.

At the early age of seventeen, he decided to strike out for himself, and choosing Kansas City for his future home, he obtained a position with the Dry Goods House of Bullene Brothers, afterwards Bullene, Moore & Emery.

An interesting story of his connection with this firm is, that that during the entire first winter that he spent in their employ, he slept on a counter in the store in order to save money enough to bring his younger brother, William, to Kansas City from Kentucky.

William Bridges Thayer, the brother mentioned, duly arrived and became, in after years, one of the heads of the great Dry Goods firm of Emery, Bird & Thayer, which succeeded Bullene, Moore & Emery.

After some years Mr. Thayer resigned his position with this firm to enter into business for himself, which he did when the dry goods firm of "Roll, Thayer & Williams" was organized.

Some years later, when this firm went out of business, Mr. Thayer organized the "Thayer, Moore Brokerage Co.," which became one of the leading real estate firms of Kansas City.

Norton Thayer was a very public-spirited citizen, and was actively identified with many of the enterprises that has given to Kansas City its marvelous growth.

Norton Thayer was married March 4, 1876, to Mattie Payne, daughter of Dr. H. R. Payne, of Kansas City. Five children were born of this marriage, four of whom, and his widow, survive him.

Mr. Thayer's membership in the Society of Sons of the Revolution was derived from three different ancestors:

First—Major John Adair, of Colonel Thomas Sumpter's Regiment, South Carolina troops, 1780. Afterwards Governor of Kentucky.

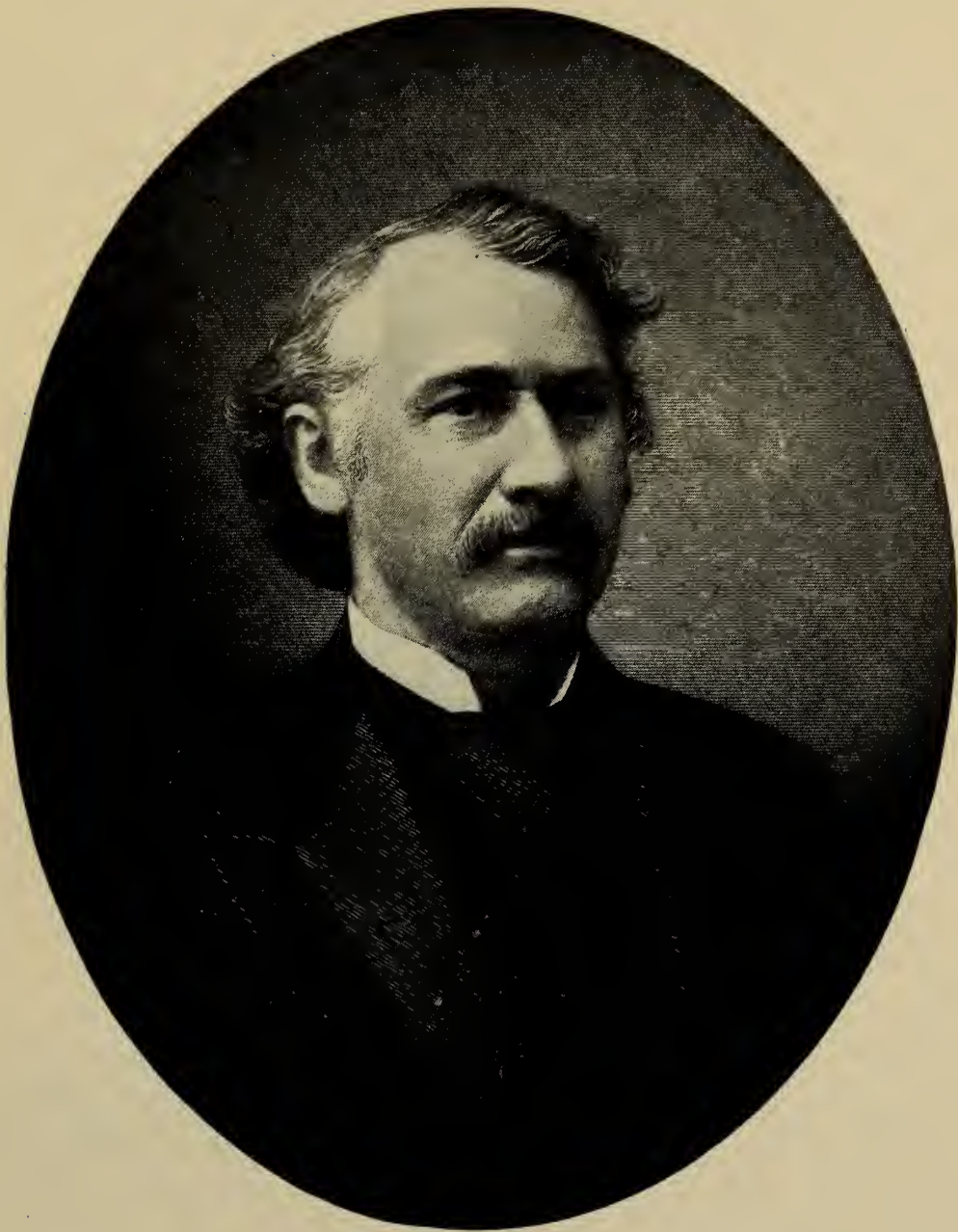
Second—Captain Isaac Thayer, of Colonel Thomas Marshall's Regiment, Massachusetts troops, 1776-77.

Third—John Bridges, of Colonel Reed's Regiment, Virginia troops, 1780-81.

Richard Aylett Barret.

BORN JUNE 21, 1834.**DIED APRIL 6, 1908.**

Richard Aylett Barret, was the son of Dr. Richard Ferral Barret and Maria Louisa Barret. He was related both on his paternal and maternal sides to some of the most illustrious families of the Old Dominion. On his father's side to the Lees, Fitzhughs, Winstons, Paynes, Overtons and others. On his mother's side to the Buckners, Madisons, Ayletts, Thorntons, Taylors and others. He was born in Greensburg, Kentucky, at "Cliffland," the seat of his grandfather, Judge Richard A. Buckner. At the age of six, Mr. Barret came to St. Louis with his parents from Springfield, Illinois. He attended the school of Judge Samuel Treat and Edward Wyman. Also the St. Louis University. He was tutored by General Chester Harding, afterwards entered Phillip's Academy, Exeter, New Hampshire, where he prepared for Harvard College, which he entered in 1852, but left before he completed the course. He returned to St. Louis and studied medicine, receiving his degree of M. D. from the Missouri Medical College. In 1854 he went to Europe and continued his studies at the Universities of Bonn, Munich and Heidelberg, and obtained the additional degree of Ph. D. For a short time he acted as Secretary of Legation at Paris, under John G. Mason, Minister to the Court of Napoleon III, returning to the United States he studied law, and in 1859 was admitted to the Bar. During the Civil War he was the Attorney for the Government in the offices, respectively, of General B. G. Farrar, Colonel James O. Broadhead, City Provost Marshal, and General C. B. Alexander, United States Army Provost Marshal General for Missouri. He also acted as Chief Clerk and Private Secretary to the latter until 1866. He then went to Burlington, Iowa,

and there purchased and edited the *Gazette and Argus*, the oldest newspaper in the State; returning to his old home, St. Louis, at a later date, he was for a time editor-in-chief of the *Evening Dispatch*. And still later editor and part owner of the *St. Louis Times*. He served as private secretary to his brother, Arthur Buckner Barret, during his short term as Mayor, and continued with James H. Britton. He then retired from active business.

Mr. Barret married, February 27, 1862, Mary Finney, daughter of the late William Finney, an early settler and prominent citizen and merchant of St. Louis. One daughter, Mary Lee, who died at the age of seven years, blessed the union.

Mr. Barret's illness was prolonged, but borne with remarkable fortitude. Death was met bravely and peacefully on the morning of April 6, 1908.

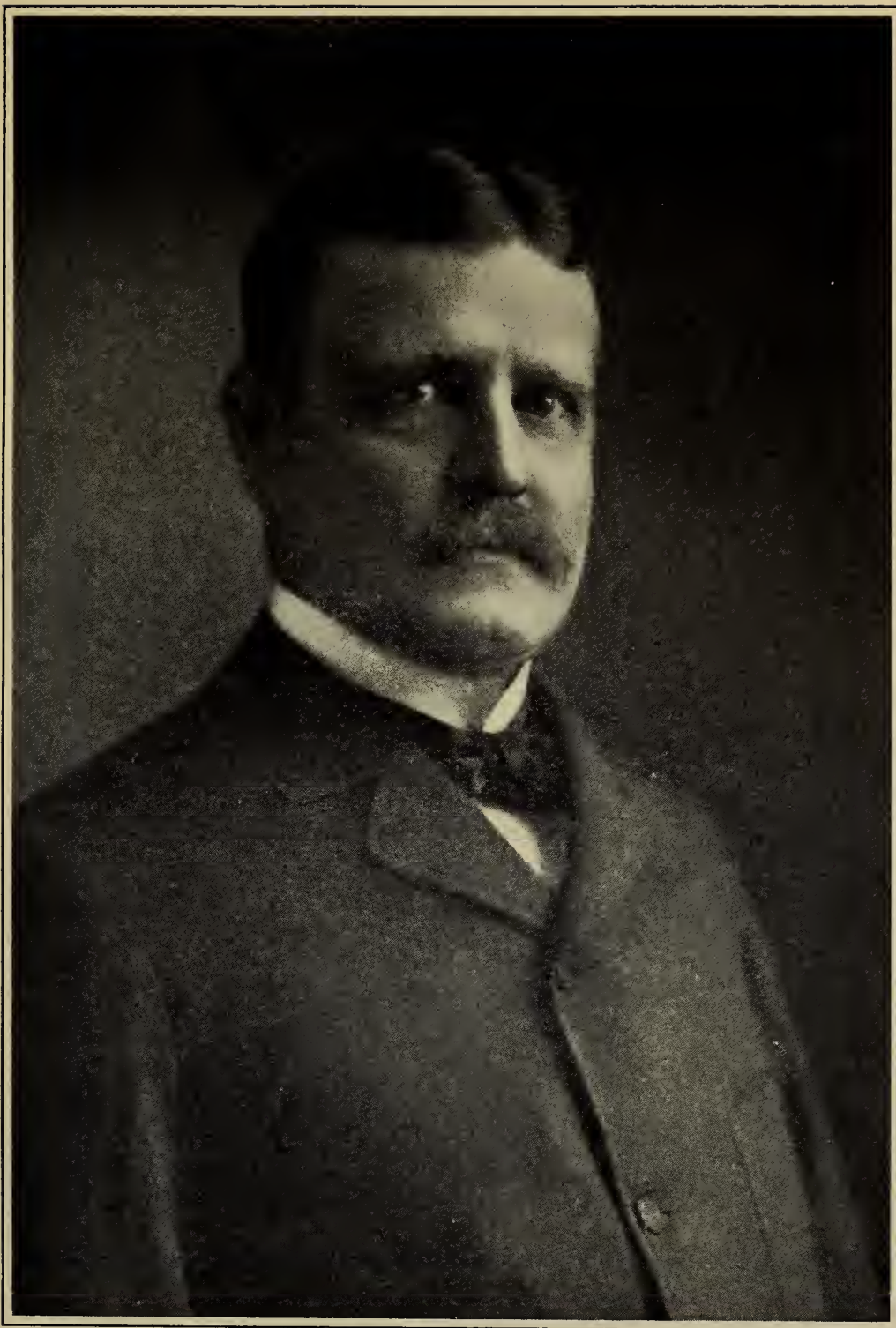
Mr. Barret had a brilliant mind, a phenomenal memory, a facile pen. He was a student of history and his greatest pleasure was in his books. He was a man of innate refinement, of courtly manners. Had a high sense of honor, was sincere and brave and modest and unassuming. One prominent trait of his character was his deference to those whose lot in life was less favorable than his own. He was a true friend and a devoted husband.

Mr. Barret's right to membership in the Society of Sons of the Revolution was through the service of his grandfather, Lieutenant William Barret, original member of the Virginia Society of the Cincinnati; and of his great-grandfather, Captain Chiswell Barret; and his great-grandfather, Lieutenant William Winston; and his great-great-grandfather, Captain George Robards; and his great-great-grandfather, Colonel Anthony Thornton; and his great-grandfather, Major Aylett Buckner; and his great-grandfather, William Buckner, Master of Virginia Navy; and his great-great-grandfather, Colonel William Daingerfield; and his great-great-great-grandfather, Colonel William Aylett; and his great-great-great-grandfather, Captain John Willis.

Jacob Craig Van Blarcom.

BORN JUNE 1, 1849.**DIED AUGUST 24, 1908.**

It is with the deepest regret that we record the death of Jacob Craig Van Blarcom, late President of the National Bank of Commerce, in St. Louis. He was born June 1, 1849, in Bergen County, New Jersey, and passed his earlier life attending private and public schools. He graduated from the Patterson, New Jersey, High School, from which he went to a preparatory school in Jersey City, and later attended Rutger College at New Brunswick, New Jersey, quitting college in his sophomore year at the age of seventeen. He came to St. Louis in 1866, and was in the employ of Peterson, Hawthorne & Co., a wholesale saddlery, hardware and leather house as a traveling man. In those early days the facilities for travel were not such as they are now, and Mr. Van Blarcom's traveling was chiefly on horseback. He thus traveled over a large section of this Western country, from Omaha, Nebraska, to Corpus Christi, Texas, and over the State of Iowa, and a large part of the State of Missouri. He became an accountant in the Bank of Commerce, in St. Louis, in July, 1870. In February, 1877, he was elected Vice-President, which position he retained until the death of the President, William H. Thompson, when Mr. Van Blarcom was elected President of the National Bank of Commerce, then one of the largest banks in the West, and continued as such until his death on the 24th day of August, 1908. In 1871, on January 19th, he was

married in Chicago, Ill., to Mary Fairfax Gamble. He had two children, Leslie Craig, born January 12, 1873, and Frederick, born June 26, 1885. His wife and one son, Frederick, survive him. The father of J. C. Van Blarcom was Jacob Van Riper Van Blarcom, and his mother was Euphemia Dixon. His father was a member of the Legislature in New Jersey, and his grandfather, Brant Van Blarcom, was at one time Mayor of Paterson, New Jersey, and his great-grandfather, Hendrick Van Blarcom, was a Captain in the War of the Revolution, and commanded a Company of New Jersey troops, at Valley Forge.

Jacob Craig Van Blarcom was an unusually clear-headed and successful business man. He was emphatically an executive man, and managed the great interests submitted to his care with singular fidelity and discrimination. He was President of the American Red Cross, Missouri Branch, during the great San Francisco earthquake disaster, and through his devotion and ability large sums were collected for the San Francisco sufferers, and sent through the American Red Cross. He was a public-spirited man, and took active interest in all movements for the betterment of his home city, St. Louis, and was found ever in the forefront of those who were battling for the development of the resources of the West, and the building up of St. Louis as a great commercial center. As a man in his social relations he was kind, genial and ever ready to assist his fellow-men. In his home life he was an affectionate father and a loving, attentive husband, ever ready to sacrifice himself for the good of others. His social great-heartedness and *bon homme* made him one of the most beloved members of the Sons of the Revolution.

Hon. Christopher Pegues Ellerbe.

BORN MARCH 1, 1846.**DIED SEPTEMBER 17, 1908.**

Christopher Pegues Ellerbe, son of Alexander William and Katherine (Pegues) Ellerbe, was born on his father's plantation, in Dallas County, Alabama, on the 1st day of March, 1846.

His parents came to Alabama from South Carolina in 1834 or 1835. The history of the old Cheraws shows important public services rendered by the men of the Ellerbe and Pegues families from the earliest settlement of the district. They were patriots and church men, active in public as in private concerns, and by both civil and military service aided in the foundation of the American Republic.

At the age of twelve, Mr. Ellerbe went, as did his brothers, to the famous school at Green Springs, Alabama, where he remained about two years, when he entered the University of Alabama in the class of '64. Then came the war, his father and two brothers were in the Confederate service, and in his sixteenth year Mr. Ellerbe left the University without leave, for which he was promptly expelled by the University authorities, and enlisted in an Alabama Regiment of Infantry, in a company formed of sons of planters like himself. He served for a time as private and non-commissioned officer in his regiment, and afterwards became Captain of a troop of cavalry in Colonel Ball's regiment of General Wheeler's division. His father and one brother were killed in battle at the very close of the war, and another brother died as the result of injuries received in the course of military duties.

Mr. Ellerbe prepared for the Law Department at the University of Virginia, where he took his degree in law as a member of the Class of '68.

In after years he was restored to his standing in the University of Alabama, with others similarly situated, and given his degree in Arts as a member of his class.

In the fall of '68, Mr. Ellerbe came to St. Louis—here he became acquainted with the family of Judge Robert Wash, whose daughter, Miss Virginia Wash, became his wife in 1871. Her death occurred in May, 1885. Three sons were born to them, Robert Wash, Alexander William and Christopher P., Jr., who alone survives.

After the removal of the disability oath, Mr. Ellerbe was admitted to the practice of law—his special field was insurance law, in which he became an expert of national reputation. In 1889 he gave up the practice of law, and under Governor Francis' administration was made head of the State Department of Insurance. At the expiration of his term of office, he became President of the Union Casualty and Surety Company, later resuming his practice in St. Louis, in which he was actively engaged up to the time of his death. In 1891 he married Governor Francis' sister, Miss Mary Francis. At 9:30 in the evening of Thursday, September 17, 1908, Mr. Ellerbe quietly and peacefully fell asleep. Simplicity was the key-note of his character, but the simplicity of greatness, honor, integrity, courage, justice, sincerity, gentleness, charity, fidelity were his attributes, and, above all, was he clothed with humility, the virtue of the children of God.

His right to membership in the Sons of the Revolution was through the service of his great-grandfather, Thomas Ellerbe, Captain in Colonel George Hick's South Carolina Regiment; and through his great-grandfather, Claudius Pegues, Jr., Captain in Colonel Lemuel Benton's South Carolina Regiment.

John Wesley Nute.

BORN DECEMBER 6, 1860.

DIED OCTOBER 5, 1908.

John Wesley Nute, who died in Portland, Maine, where he had gone for his health, was born in Burlington, Maine, December 6, 1860. And was the son of George Henry and Eliza Ann Libby Scammon Nute. He was educated in the public schools of New Jersey, West Jersey Academy, Bridgeton, New Jersey, and Lafayette College, Easton, Pennsylvania; graduating a civil engineer in 1882. He was Tutor in Lafayette College, 1882-1883; Assistant Engineer in the Survey Department, Philadelphia, 1884-1885; Assistant Resident Engineer of the Wabash R. R., Moberly, Missouri, 1886-1887.

In 1887 he married Miss Annie B. Laubach, of Easton, Pa.

He began with the St. Louis Car Wheel Company as sales-agent, in 1892; became Secretary and General Manager in 1897, and was elected President of the company in 1902, which position he held at the time of his death. He was also Secretary and Treasurer of the Atlanta Car Wheel and Manufacturing Company, of Atlanta, Georgia; and Secretary of the Decatur Car Wheel and Manufacturing Company of Birmingham, Alabama. He was a member of Engineering Society of Philadelphia; was 32° Mason; Knight Templar and Shriner. Was a member of the Lawyers' Club, of New York, and the St. Louis University; Mercantile, Noonday and Glen Echo Country Clubs of St. Louis.

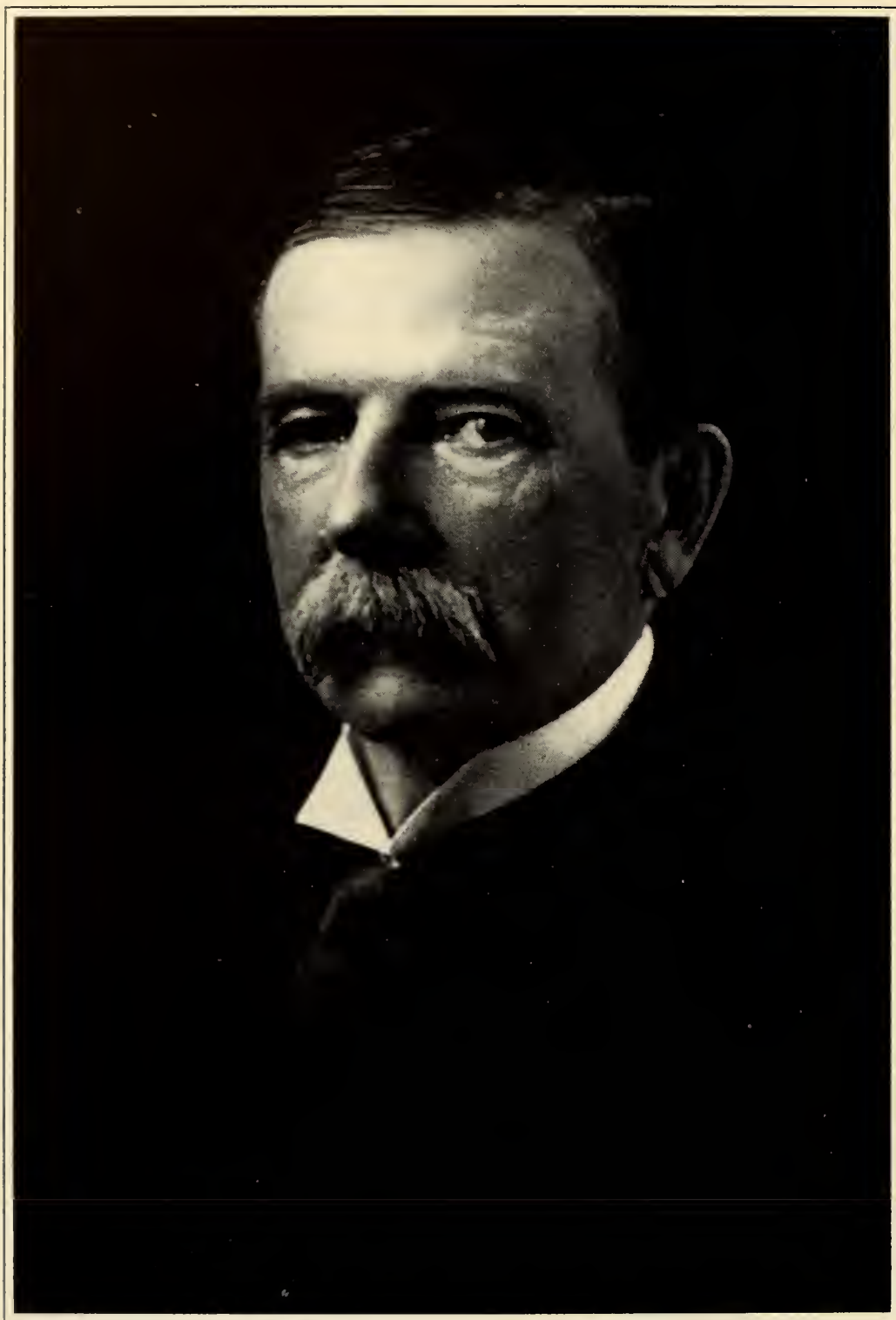
He was buried from the residence of his father-in-law, William Laubach, Easton, Pa.

Clinton Rowell.

BORN NOVEMBER 12, 1838.**DIED NOVEMBER 1, 1908.**

Among the men who have added luster to the bar of St. Louis, Clinton Rowell deserves a place among the first. Like all men who have impressed themselves upon the world, Mr. Rowell owes his success to two things: ability and environment. He was the son of Guy C. and Clarissa (Rankin) Rowell, and was born on November 12, 1838, at Concord, Essex County, Vermont. The Rowell family is well known in New England, and his mother's family, Rankin, can be traced through many honorable generations.

His early life was that of the New England boy of his time, when the first lesson taught was of self-denying application. He attended the public schools and later on acquired the advantages to be given by the academies, and finally completed his education at Dartmouth College, in 1863.

Satisfied that the growing West was the arena for a young man, he came to St. Louis. In 1866, shortly after his arrival, he formed a partnership with Daniel D. Fisher. This partnership continued under the name of Fisher & Rowell until January, 1889, when Mr. Fisher took his place upon the Circuit Bench. At the time of dissolution this was the oldest legal firm in the city. Immediately following the dissolution, Mr. Rowell entered into a partnership with his brother-in-law, Mr. Franklin Ferriss, under the firm name of Rowell & Ferriss, and this latter firm continued until Mr. Ferriss took his place upon the Circuit Bench.

Later Mr. Rowell formed a partnership with J. H. Zumbalm, which continued till the end, November 1st, 1908.

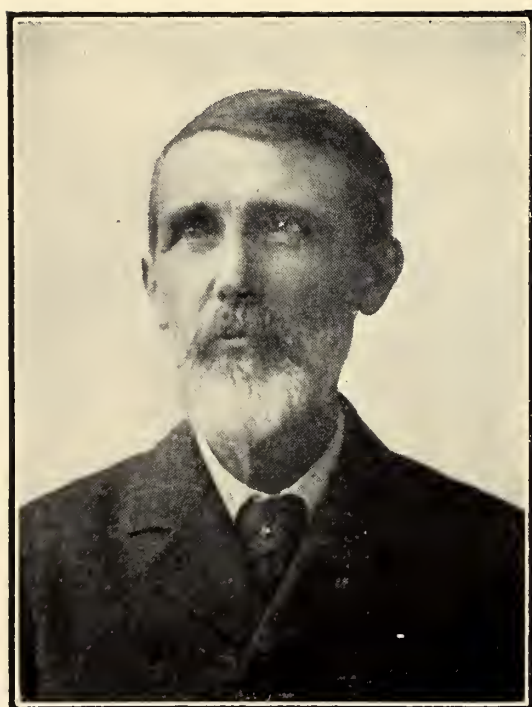
In 1866, St. Louis was entering upon a new era. It was an era of progress. The young firm of Fisher & Rowell plunged into the current. There was much business to be done, and the firm got its share. Mr. Rowell developed rapidly under these conditions. His reputation grew steadily from the start. He handled the involved and complex details of large estates, to the entire satisfaction of his clients, and was a recognized authority on many branches of the law.

Mr. Rowell, in a marked degree, represented the highest type of the profession. He had all the natural gifts of the great orator: a commanding presence, a massive head, impressive gray eyes, a ringing, sonorous voice, and a never-failing command of choice English. To these qualities was added a fervor and intensity of thought and feeling which were fundamental in his nature.

Mr. Rowell achieved success solely by the legitimate practice of his profession. His large following was due entirely to his ability as a lawyer and his integrity as a man. These qualities won him, as well the esteem of his professional brethren.

Socially, Mr. Rowell was a man of broad sympathies, well read and thoroughly intelligent on all current questions. He was a member of the Pilgrim Congregational Church.

Mr. Rowell's right to membership in the Sons of the Revolution was through the service of his great-grandfather, Daniel Rowell, Lieutenant in the Company of Captain Daniel McDuffee, Colonel Stephen Evans' New Hampshire Regiment. Was at the battle of Saratoga.

John Telfair Field.

BORN DECEMBER 8, 1838.**DIED DECEMBER 12, 1908.**

John Telfair Field was born in New York City, December 8, 1838. His mother was the daughter of John Telfair and Margaret Wool. His grandfather was the son of Major Adam Telfair, a British officer of the Revolutionary War, who was captured at Quebec by Captain Isaiah Wool, the father of Margaret Wool—and these two officers never met again till at the marriage of their son and daughter.

On his father's side, Jeremiah R. Field, his lineage is traced to John Field, the astronomer, who in 1556 published the first Astronomical Tables that ever appeared in England, calculated on the basis of the New Discoveries of Copernicus.

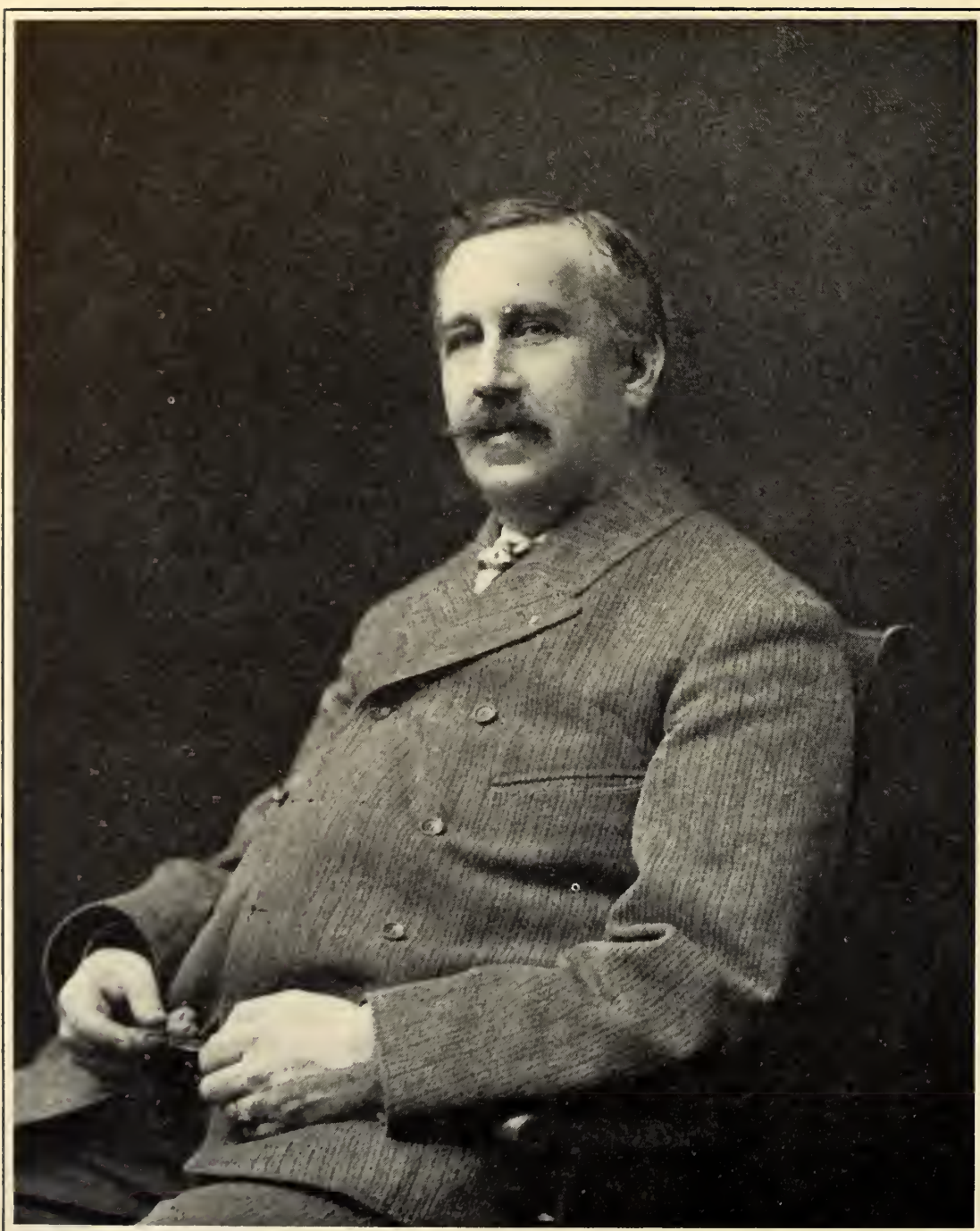
Mr. Field invented, in middle life, a system of Universal Time, and had his father's watch altered to twenty-four hours to suit it. At one time he hoped to see this adopted. His latest diary records the regret that his aspirations and desires for the ministry, which appears now to have been his real self, were not more encouraged by others. Business claimed him early. He arrived in St. Louis, in 1855, to be employed by his uncles in Field Brothers Wholesale Cloth House, as bookkeeper and cashier. During this time he joined the Polar Star Lodge, as a Mason. Was afterwards a charter member of Tuscan Lodge.

In 1863 he married Mary Adelaide Childs, who survives him. About 1877-8 he entered the employ of Mr. Samuel Gaty and assisted in the work of the Hope Mining Co., of Phillipsburg,

Montana; this prepared him for becoming the Secretary of the Granite Mountain Mining Co., from 1884 to 1889. He shared in its prosperity, planned and built a beautiful cottage in St. Louis suburb, Benton, in time to celebrate his Silver Wedding, enjoying his home there for twenty years. His note book bears the mark March 25, 1884, "Consecration," this coincided with the date of his wordly prosperity, and may account for the sacrifice of his fortune and position as Secretary of the Granite Mining Co., in 1889, when he felt called to work for Prohibition—when that cause was not yet popular.

For a short time he was in the real estate business, and has left his plans for the improvement of our Mississippi River front. Also invented the electric light post for the city, for which he took out patents. In May, 1894, he became Private Secretary for Mr. Charles Clark, remaining until pen paralysis closed his office labors, October 29, 1905. For three years he was an invalid—after three months' treatment for a fractured hip bone in the Deaconess Hospital, he was brought home and died there December 12, 1908. He passed triumphantly to the unseen world, consciously and happily—leaving his grief-stricken wife after forty-six years of married life, in which he was unfailingly a loving, tender, generous husband—a true gentleman and a saint of God.

His right to membership in the Sons of the Revolution was through his great-grandfather, Jeremiah Field, a Private in the 1st Regiment, New Jersey Militia; and of his great-grandfather, Captain Isaiah Wool, of Knox's Continental Artillery; and of his great-grandfather, Private Jacob Kline, of New Jersey Militia; and of his great-great-grandfather, Lieutenant Jacob Ten Eyck, of New Jersey Militia.

Frank Maynard Howe.

BORN JULY 20, 1849.**DIED JANUARY 4, 1909.**

Frank Maynard Howe was born in Arlington, Massachusetts, July 20, 1849. His father, Andrews Howe, of Townsend, Massachusetts, a descendant of the old line of Howes, conspicuous in the early history, and Revolutionary struggles of Massachusetts, and New Hampshire, died while he was a boy, leaving Clara B. Tucker, of Pepperell, Massachusetts, his mother as guardian. He attended the public schools, Cotting Academy, and later was a member of the first class in architecture at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

In 1868 he entered the office of Ware and Van Brunt, architects of Boston, where, as student, he remained several years. From their office he went to that of the Supervising Architect of the Treasury, but returned to Boston a year later to take charge of the office of Ware and Van Brunt, which position he occupied for several years.

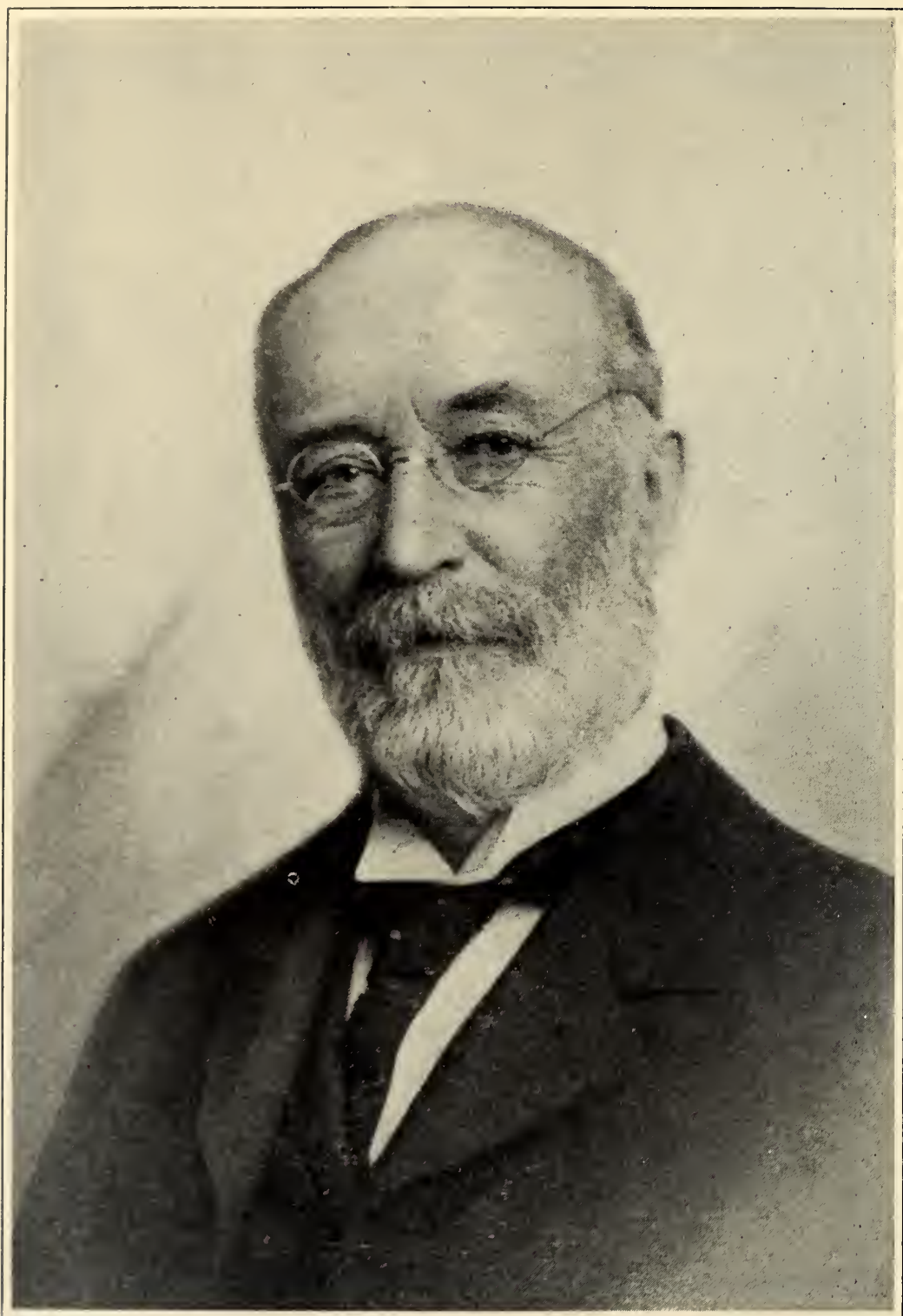
He married Elizabeth Wyman, his boyhood sweetheart, of Arlington, September 6, 1872, and went abroad for travel and study in 1878. Returning home, Mr. Howe formed a partnership with Henry Van Brunt, of Ware and Van Brunt, which lasted nearly twenty-five years. In 1885 the firm opened a branch office at Kansas City, Missouri. And Mr. Howe moved there from Cambridge, Massachusetts, to act as resident partner. This office became so important that Mr. Van Brunt also moved to Kansas City. On his death, in 1903, Mr. Howe continued alone for a

year. Then he admitted Henry F. Hoit and William Cutler, graduates of the Institute of Technology, into partnership. The firm name became Howe, Hoit and Cutler. But on the death of Mr. Cutler, January 7, 1907, this name was changed to Howe and Hoit.

Mr. Howe's work in Chronological Order is a record of the most important architectural work of his time. And there are monuments of his skill from Boston to Portland, Oregon, and South to the Gulf of Mexico. Some of his best known buildings include the Electricity Building at the Columbian Exposition, Chicago, 1893. The Varied Industries Building, at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, at St. Louis, 1904. And Kansas City's first steel sky scraper, the R. A. Long Building. The new Jewish Synagogue, also at Kansas City, is considered the purest and most perfect architecture of its kind in the West.

He was an active clubman, both in the East and West. Was a member of the American Institute of Architects, belonged to the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Boston. And was a Thirty-second Degree Mason. Acting, at one time, as the youngest Master of the Blue Lodge. He was active in civic affairs, unobtrusively busy in charitable concerns, and was close to the intellectual and musical side of the community—having been President of the Kansas City Symphony Orchestra for years. The last months of his life he spent in traveling abroad for his health, but he died January 4, 1909, shortly after his return home. He left a widow, two daughters, Katherine Howe Munger and Dorothy, and a name loved and revered by his friends and honored in his profession.

Mr. Howe's right to membership in the Sons of the Revolution was through the service of his great-grand-father, Isaac Howe, Sergeant at Lexington Alarm, and Adjutant of Colonel Enoch Hale's New Hampshire Regiment, 1778.



JOHN SUBLETTE LOGAN, M. D.

John Sublette Logan, M. D.

BORN JUNE 25, 1836.**DIED JANUARY 18, 1909.**

John S. Logan, M. D., of St. Joseph, Mo., son of Thomas, who was born August 7th, 1801, in Donegal County, Ireland; son of John and Jane Shannon; son of John, a lineal descendant of Sir Robert Logan, of Restalrig, Scotland. Thomas Logan was of Scotch-Irish parentage, and was a successful dry goods merchant, of Shelbyville, Kentucky; married Frances Sublette, of Woodford County, Kentucky, March 18, 1834, died April 18, 1840.

Frances Sublette, Dr. Logan's mother, was a daughter of Louis Sublette, IV., a soldier of the war of 1812, who married Susan Coleman, daughter of Thomas Coleman, of Orange County, Virginia, a soldier of the Revolutionary War; received four hundred acres of land from Virginia, in payment for service in the Continental Lines; died August 28, 1828, in Woodford County, Kentucky.

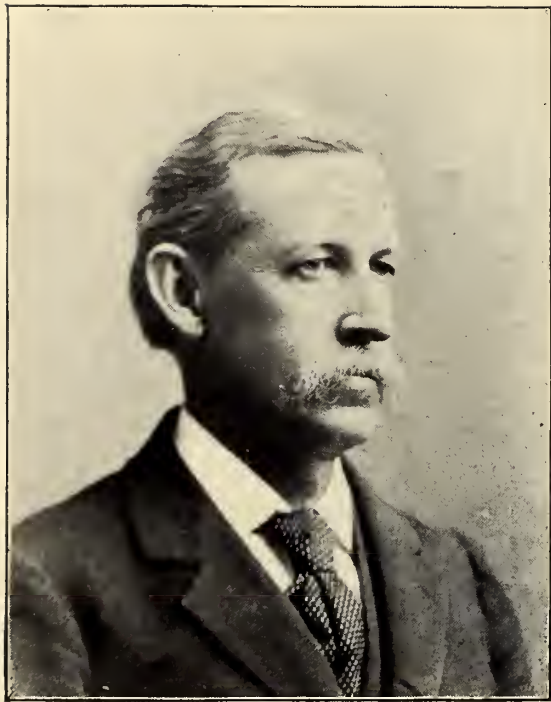
John Sublette Logan was born June 25, 1836, in Shelbyville, Kentucky, and died January 18, 1909; was educated in Shelby College, Shelbyville, and the Kentucky Military Institute in Franklin County, Kentucky; studied medicine and graduated in the class of 1859 from the Kentucky School of Medicine. At Madison, Wisconsin, he read medicine with Dr. Alexander Schue, formerly of Kentucky, who was a pupil of the famous German chemist Leibig, with whom he read until entering the Jefferson Medical College, at Philadelphia. In 1857 Dr. Logan, with his

mother and sister, Mary, and step-father, James L. O'Neill and family, removed from Kentucky to St. Joseph, Missouri.

In 1862, Dr. Logan entered the United States Army as Surgeon, and served at different hospitals of Louisville, St. Louis, Jeffersonville (Ind.), Camp Joe Holt, near New Albany (Ind.), and Camp Gamble, St. Louis. While an army surgeon, Dr. Logan made a valuable discovery in the treatment of hospital gangrene, the bromine treatment, which was afterwards used extensively in the treatment of hospital gangrene.

Dr. Logan was one of the administrators of the Milton Tootle estate, his associates being John S. Lemon and Isaac T. Hosea. He was one of the Board of Directors in the Buell Woolen Mill Manufacturing Company, and handled a large amount of real estate in Missouri and Texas. Politically, Dr. Logan was a Democrat, and served as a Delegate to the State Conventions which nominated Governor Crittenden and Governor Woodson. He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church. Had a fine collection of Indian relics and geological specimens. Dr. Logan served for several years on the Board of Geology, appointed by Governor Lon V. Stevens.

November 20, 1862, Dr. Logan was married to Miss Emma Puryear Cotton, born February 26, 1841, daughter of Charles Cotton, of Woodford County, Kentucky, who was born October 3, 1781, in Loudoun County, Virginia, son of William and Frances (Taylor) Cotton, with whom he removed, in 1787, from Virginia to Fayette County, Kentucky, where his parents died in 1826. The union of Dr. and Mrs. Logan was blessed with six sons: Charles Cotton, M. D., of Los Angeles, California; Thomas Trabue, St. Joseph; John Sublette, Jr., St. Joseph; Frank Puryear, Kansas City; Louis Sublette, Kansas City, and Milton Tootle Logan, St. Joseph, Mo.

John Frederic Randall.

BORN APRIL 13, 1839.**DIED APRIL 10, 1909.**

John Frederic Randall was born in Mystic, Connecticut, April 13, 1839. He was prepared for college at the Connecticut Literary Institute, at Suffield, and was a member of the Class of '64 Yale until his junior year, when he enlisted in the United States Army as First Lieutenant, 21st Connecticut Volunteers. He came to St. Louis, in 1864, and continued in the insurance business there for over forty years, being distinguished for his absolute integrity. For nearly thirty years he lived in Alton, Illinois, and died there on the 10th day of April, 1909. He was married in 1870, and leaves a wife and two daughters.

Mr. Randall was a many-sided man, and his keen interest in things lasted as long as his life. He was a member of the Missouri and Illinois Historical Societies, the Mayflower and Colonial War Societies, the Sons of the Revolution, the Military Order of the Loyal Legion, and the Ransom Post, G. A. R. He was interested in the Municipal affairs of his home town, and served long on the Alton School Board; and as a Trustee of Shurtleff College, finding opportunities to help many young people who were starting out in life. He had an appreciative understanding of choral music, and was for twenty years chorister of his church. He loved all out-of-door things, and hunted and fished every year in the Ozark Country, and along the Mississippi. The ills of the last ten years of his life did not diminish his enthusiasm for all philanthropic and Christian work, nor cloud his rare and quaint sense of humor, and his hopeful views of life.

Mr. Randall's right to membership in the Sons of the Revolution was through the service of his great-grandfather, Lieutenant Ebenezer Avery, of the Connecticut State troops, killed in the defense of Fort Griswold, Connecticut, September 6, 1781.

Frank Simpson.

BORN JANUARY 26, 1859.**DIED APRIL 29, 1909.**

Frank Simpson, who died at Yonkers, New York, April 29, 1909, was a Missourian by birth, and an Eastern man by education and training. He was born at Independence, Missouri, January 26, 1859, and went East with his parents while still a child.

After careful training at his father's home, in Orange, New Jersey, and in the East Orange Military Academy, he went to the College of New Jersey, and graduated with honor in the class of 1882.

His early business training was in his father's banking house in New York, and later in the American Exchange Bank in London, England.

In the early 80's he returned to Missouri and established, in Kansas City, the real estate and loan business, long known under

the firm name of Simpson and Groves. In 1883 (?) Mr. Simpson married Miss Fanny B. Combe, of Linneus, Missouri, who survives him.

Mr. Simpson was a man of high ideals and noble purposes in life, and eminently successful in carrying his ideals to completion. Of a warm and genial disposition he bound to himself many true and cherished friends, who knew that they could count upon him in every emergency of life.

His success in business enabled him to gratify his love for art and travel, and his rare taste was often consulted by those who could not trust themselves. Music, pictures and books were a delight to him, and he loved their atmosphere.

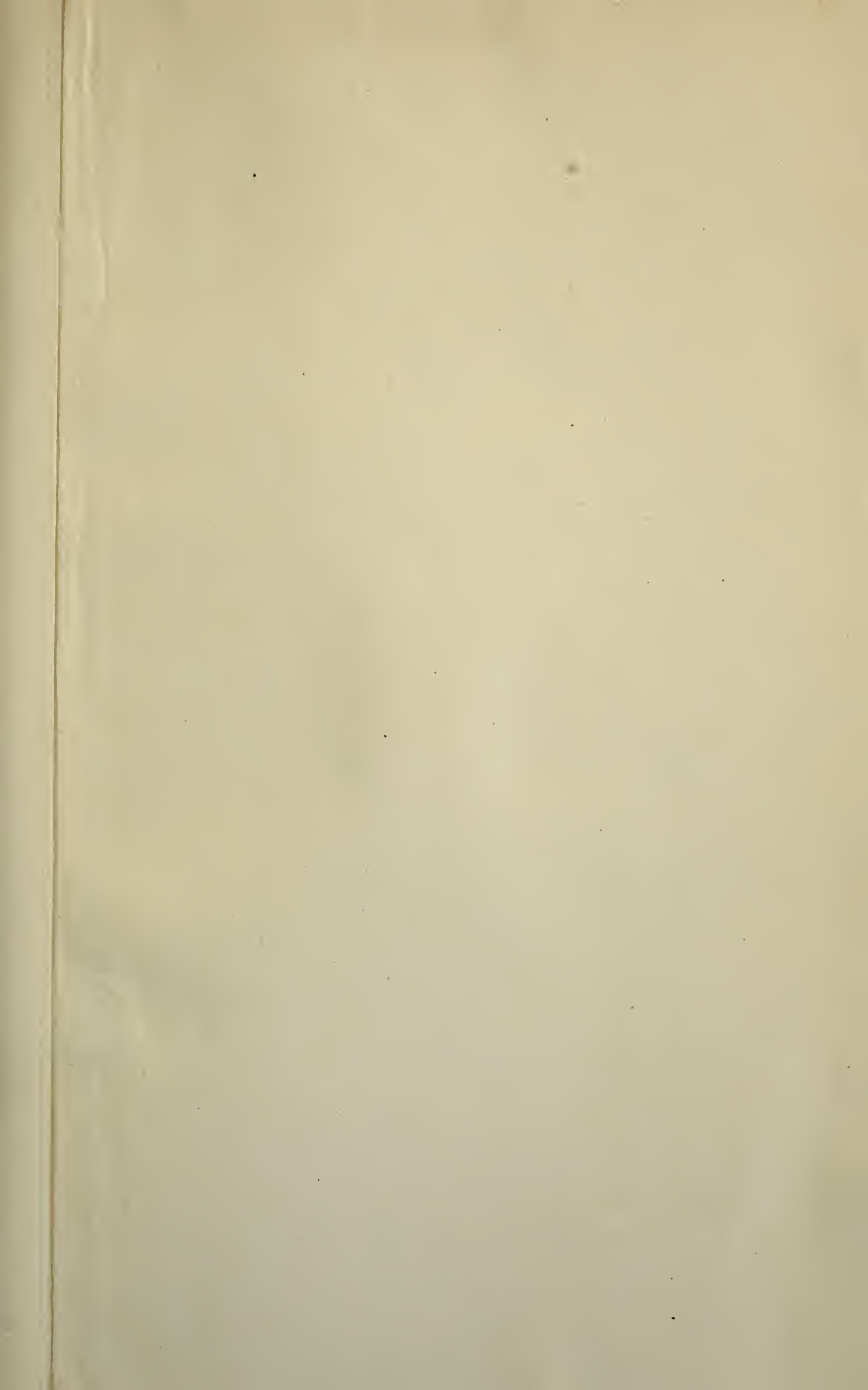
Religion to him was a very sacred matter, and its practical expression was a joy to him, yet his many unrecorded charities were known only to his most intimate friends.

Mr. Simpson's membership in the Sons of the Revolution was through the services of his great-great-grandfather, John Williams, member of the Provincial Congress of North Carolina, 1775; Lieutenant-Colonel of a Battalion of Minute Men, and Colonel of the 9th Continental Regiment of North Carolina, 1776.
