

# TECH CLOSING EXERCISES WILL BE OF INTEREST

COMMENCEMENT WILL BE HELD TOMORROW AND AN EXCELLENT PROGRAM HAS BEEN ARRANGED—CAPTAIN JAMES W. ENGLISH WILL DELIVER AN ADDRESS—TRUSTS WILL BE DISCUSSED BY MANY STUDENTS.

The regular commencement exercises of the Georgia School of Technology will be tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock and extensive preparations have been made in order that all visitors may be accommodated and given an opportunity to see the student body at work in the various departments.

The textile department, which now rivals from a standpoint of up-to-dateness that of any institution in the country, will be one of the special features of interest to guests. President Lyman Hall has given a great deal of time and attention to the perfection of the department and its thorough equipment will enable visitors to witness the manufacture of cotton goods and observe every process from the time the raw staple is taken in hand until the time when it comes out into beautiful dyed and woven fabrics.

The foundry and machine shops have recently been overhauled and greatly added to, and the wood shops have likewise during the past year become a great factor in the school. The students will appear in all departments in their overalls and visitors will see the work of the Tech as it is done every day in the year.

The boys have been engaged for some time in manufacturing the furniture for the Daniel Swann building and this, together with hundreds of specimens of wood products of skill will be on exhibition.

After seeing the various shops the visi-

tors will have an opportunity of witnessing a magnificent gymnasium exhibition by the students. On Thursday another exhibition will be given at the shops, after which the two literary societies the Euphronian and the Phi Eta Sigma will engage in a joint debate on the subject: "Resolved, That trusts and combinations of capital should be prohibited in the United States." Mr. Felder Furlow will preside that the debaters are as follows: Affirmative: W. M. Fambro, Georgia; R. H. Lowndes, South Carolina. Negative: W. E. Klein, Georgia, and M. R. Berry, Georgia.

President Hall has extended through a letter to the mayor and general council an invitation for that body to be present on Wednesday and Thursday between the hours of 9 and 10:30 o'clock, and at a meeting of the council yesterday the invitation was unanimously accepted.

A meeting of the Alumni association will be held on the evening of June 19th at 8:30 o'clock and it is said that at that time steps will be taken toward raising an endowment fund.

A large number of graduates will be present and preparations for an elaborate banquet are being made during which a number of addresses will be listened to.

Captain James W. English and Hon. N. E. Harris, of Macon, will be guests of honor. Hon. Hal G. Nowell, mayor of Monroe, will act as toastmaster and speeches will be delivered by Captain J. W. English, Hon. N. E. Harris, Dr. Lyman Hall, Professor F. C. Furlow, Julius L. DeGivie, W. P. Walthal and J. T. Wickle.
