GAINESVILLE, Ga., May 30.—Proud as she is of the magnificent musical festival which has just closed, Gainesville is happier, if possible, in the great honor which has just been won by Dr. G. Ferrata, musical director of Brenau conservatory. Last winter the musical section of the Georgia Federation of Woman's clubs offered two prizes, one for the best arrangement of Chopin's valse, op. 64. No. I, and the best original composition. Many of the south's most noted teachers entered the contest. The judges were three of the most distinguished musicians in the United States and their decision was made without even knowing the names of the contestants and therefore is absolutely impartial. One prize is a handsome gold medal, the other is one hundred dollars in cash.
