May 31.—The commencement program for the 101st session of the University of Georgia has just been completed and is being set for publication by a cancellor Walter B. Hill.

The year's program bids fair to rival the exercises held here last year in the celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the foundation of this college. The interest manifested in all of the exercises has been keen and exciting; the greatest rivalry has existed in securing these honors, and a most entertaining program is assumed for each day of the exercises.
