

COMMENCEMENT AT WALESKA IS A SUCCESS

RHEINHARDT NORMAL COLLEGE
COMPLETES A MOST SUCCESS-
FUL YEAR—GRADUATING
EXERCISES.

WALESKA, Ga., May 30.—The commencement exercises of the Rheinhardt Normal college began here last Sunday. At 11 o'clock the spacious chapel was well filled with attentive listeners, who were highly edified by an excellent sermon by Rev. S. B. Ledbetter on the text, "Show Thyself a Man." 1 Kings, 2:2. His subject was "The Ideal Man."

Sunday night Rev. W. H. Cooper, of Wilkes county, delivered an interesting sermon on the text, 1 Cor. 12:31. His subject was "The Better Way."

At 9:30 Monday, quite a large crowd assembled to listen to the freshman class exercises. No former class has ever surpassed it. This class was composed of Miss Nannie Bird and Miss Algeme Latham, of Orange; George Burty, Atlanta Heights; Misses Annie Carpenter, Vickir Carpenter, Alma Cline, Alberta Conner, Ettie Coward, Alma Kelly and Estelle Manning; Clarence Coward, of Waleska; Reynolds Hamrick, of Ludville; Miss Martha Latimer, of Woodstock; Miss Mary Power, of Power; Miss Azzie Satterfield, of Joe, and August Wischmeyer, of Stamp creek.

At 3:30 p. m. the sophomore class, composed of Misses Blanch and Rena Walker, of Cass Station; Miss Clara Bedelle, of Canton; Miss Mamie Peebles, of Henry county; Mac Barron and Sam Edwards, of Waleska, and James Rouch, of Holly Springs, held their exercises.

At 8 p. m. the primary and preparatory gave an entertainment which was a grand success. The children acquitted themselves well and reflected credit upon the untiring efforts of the teachers.

The doll and hoop drills were especially good, but that which elicited most praise was a little song by Miss Alma Weir, "What Would You Take for Me, Papa?" This and the doll drill were both called for Tuesday night.

Tuesday morning the Juniors entertained the large audience with a most impressive program of addresses and essays. The class consisted of Jessie Carpenter, Karl Carpenter and Miss Willie Manning of Waleska; Miss Pearl Christian, of Joe; Earnest Covington, of Cartersville; Guy Roberts, of Mica, and Harry Tolbert, of Atlanta.

These were followed by an address by Hon. Hiram P. Bell, of Cumming.

At 2:30 the two societies, the Haygood and Pierce, had their annual debate. The subject was: "Resolved, That the right of suffrage should be extended to the women of the United States." The affirmative was led by Henry Walker, Tom Edwards and Fred Kelly, for the Haygoods. The negative was led by Guy Roberts, Harry Tolbert and Hoyl Rheinhardt, for the Pierce. After one of the best debates that has ever been witnessed here, the committee decided in favor of the affirmative.

At 5 p. m. the large crowd witnessed, with much pleasure, a sham battle by the battalion.

On Wednesday, after listening to the essays and addresses by the senior class, Rev. R. C. Cleckler, of the North Georgia conference, made a fine address and delivered diplomas to Miss M. B. Adington, Miss Evie Fincher, Hoyl Rheinhardt, of Waleska; John Collins, of Siloam; Wiley Flanagan, of Canton; Henry Walker, Miss Ethel Walker, of Cass Station, and Roy Williams, of Alpharetta. These young people reflected great credit upon themselves and the institution.

Rheinhardt college has made the best record that it has ever made. The entire faculty was re-elected. It consists of R. C. Sharp, president; John W. Wason, commandant; Misses Robie M. Nease, May Sharp, Fredonia Blanton and Professor L. M. Moore, teachers.

Miss Ethel Walker took off the first honor.

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
