

MAYNARD TWIRLS IN SUPERB FORM

FOUR THOUSAND PEOPLE WIT- NESS CLOSING ROUND OF GREAT COLLEGE CONTEST.

MACON, Ga., May 14.—Mercer won the hardest and most exciting contest of the season and by landing the last of the Georgia college games, will fly the pennant offered by The Journal. Georgia and Tech are trailing in the rear of the proud orange and black colors, which wave triumphant over all Georgia collegedom.

The final contest pulled off Saturday afternoon was a nip and tuck battle, not a runner on either side crossing the coveted goal until the eighth, thought in the fourth and fifth Georgia pushed men as far as third but there they remained.

Mercer also got runners to the third corner in these innings.

The superb pitching of both Maynard and Sullivan put a check on all hopes of run getting so many times that the four thousand and odd fans looked for a no run game, called on account of darkness.

Sad fate, however, awaited the red and black followers as when the eighth rolled round with Stakley for Mercer handling the slugging furniture, it looked as if something was doing in the way of a continuous circle, but the second baseman cracked three fatal times at Mr. Sullivan's benders and retired. Stovall next up, had a fouling melee for a warm up before getting busy and then cracked one to little Fleischman, who, amid the excitement, muffed the ball and Stovall was safe. Quarles received a body blow and was sent to first, Stovall going to second. Munday dumps another to short and reaches first on an error. Stovall and Quarles moving up a peg. Little Awtry thinks Fleischman looks good for another error and sends him another which he receives with open arms but throws wild to Scott and Stovall and Quarles crossed the line with two runs to the good, and then there was mix up as the people flowed out into the grounds and it took the exertions of several officers, who themselves were overexcited, to get the crowd back to its proper place.

Georgia failed to make good in the ninth as Maynard struck out three of the four men coming up, a rare fact for a twirler after pitching eighteen consecutive innings, but the peerless Maynard is the man that did the work.

Georgia's defeat was due to their wildness at critical times as they out-hit Mercer two to one, but the Baptist boys were on hand with the goods whenever it came to fielding, and backed up Maynard in superb form. There is wailing in Athens tonight and possibly a few sad tears are flowing from the eyes of the once proud Helsmanites, but another noise is heard far into the night in the Central City, a great, glorious noise such as only the victors can make, and why, just over a few little figures that read like these:

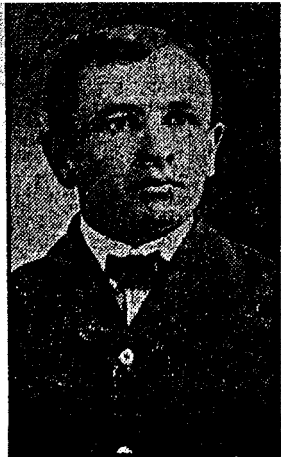
