After the general amnesty extended to the condemned anarchists and communists Charles and his father, who is now over 90 years old, came to Paris. For a time Charles Malatao collaborated with Henri Rocheforte, but they disagreed on the Dreyfus case, Malatao taking the side of the condemned captain.

Socialist journals have since then received his articles, which are considered remarkable for their polished literary style.

NEW ORLEANS, June 3.—News reached the city today that while passing the Red River valley bridge at Alexandria, La., the steamer H. M. Carter struck one of the piers and began to sink. She was headed for shore, where the passengers and crew were landed safely.

Mrs. Carter, wife of the captain, H. M. Carter, trying to save valuables, was forced to jump overboard when the boat began to turn on her side. She was rescued by men in skiffs.

No lives were lost. The Carter was built at Jeffersonville, Ind., in 1901. She was valued at \$15,000.
