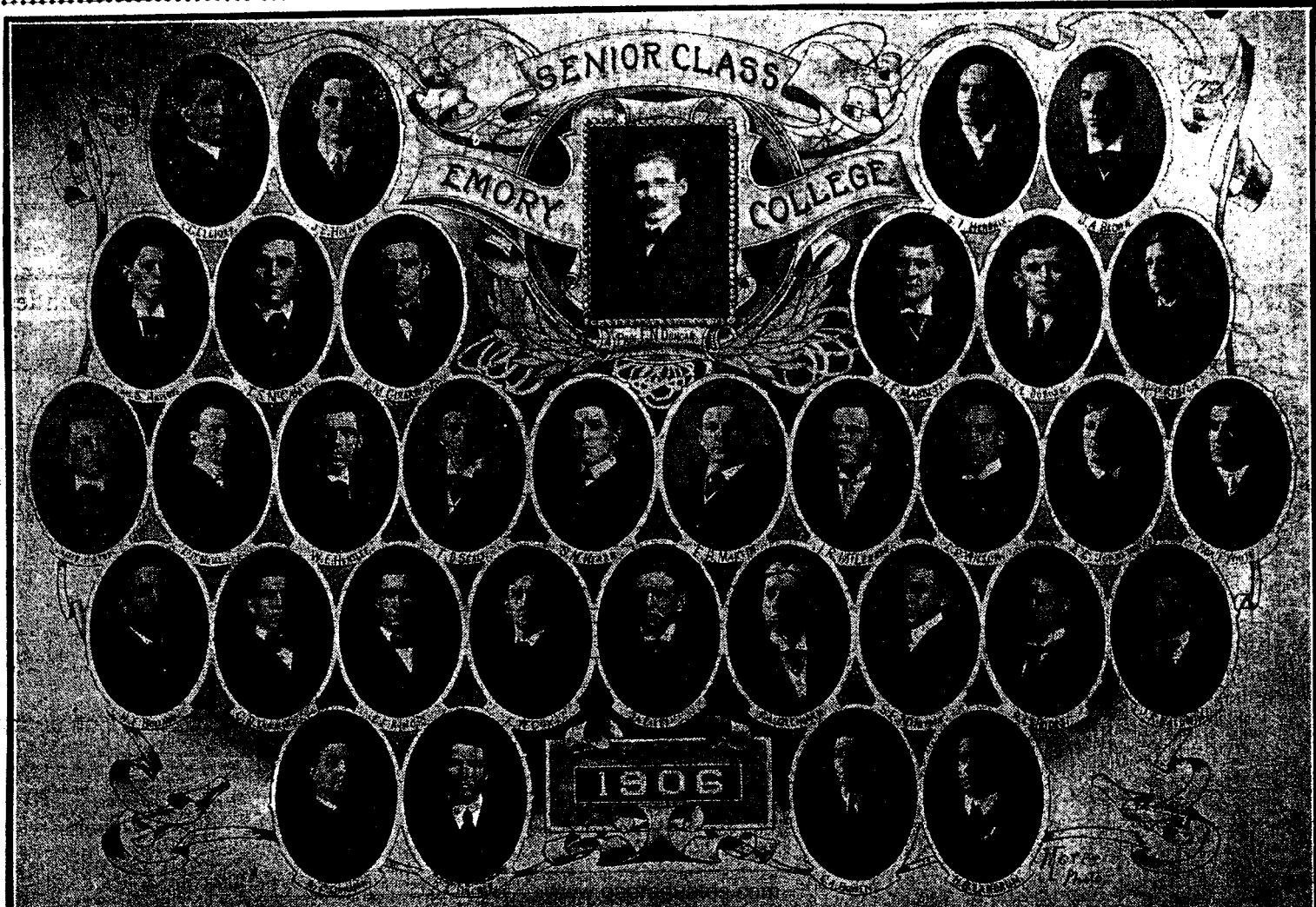

EMORY COLLEGE, ATLANTA, Ga., May 19.—The time is drawing near when Emory will send out another body of young men into the busy world to take their place in the active scenes of life. While not a very large class, it has some of as good men as ever went out from her famous halls and will do an honor to her in after years for the benefit they have received from their while under her jurisdiction.
