(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) MERCER UNIVERSITY, Macon, Ga., June 2.—The Mercer commencement for '06 promises to be one of the most interesting in its history. Carnegie has promised \$20,-000 to build a well-equipped library on condition that an equal sum be raised by the friends of the institution. There is a strong possibility that the supplementary fund will be raised among the alumni luring commencement day. A new impetus will be given to the dormitory. At he last state Baptist convention it was lecided to build a \$50,000 dormitory. Plans for this building will be presented and discussed among the trustees, and the work for materializing their plans will be immediately begun.
