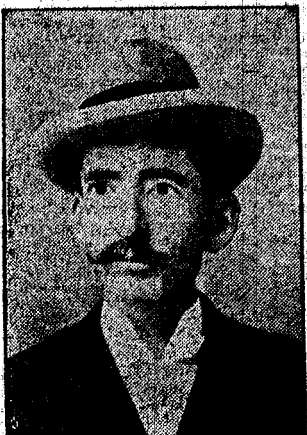

OLIN R. BAGGERLY IS CLAIMED BY DEATH

Was Well Known Newspaper Man. His Death Brings Sorrow to a Host of Friends

Olin R. Baggerly, 51 years of age, died Sunday night at 10 o'clock at his home, 227 Greensferry avenue. His death was the end of a remarkable devotion to his chosen work. Mr. Baggerly had been connected with the Atlanta Newspaper Union for twenty-eight years. In that time he had missed but one week from his office. For the past several years, however, he had been suffering from spinal trouble that kept him in continual agony. Despite this fact he kept at his work. Finally one day, a week before his death, he had to be carried home from his office by his associates. Though almost in a dying condition he had insisted on getting out nine columns of news before being taken away.

Funeral services were held Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock in the chapel of H. M. Patterson. The interment was at Westview cemetery.

Mr. Baggerly was the son of the late Rev. F. W. Baggerly, of Senola, Ga. He leaves a wife and five children, one an infant only four weeks old, three brothers and two sisters, W. B. Baggerly, W. F.
