ATLANTIAN PLEADS FOR ERECTION OF WILSON COLLEGE

VALDOSTA, Ga., June 6.—Speaking before 200 representative citizens from eighteen cities and three states who gathered here Friday to confer on plans for erecting a national memorial to Woodrow Wilson, E. Marvin Underwood, of Atlanta, former assistant attorney general under President Wilson's administration, sounded a ringing endorsement for the Woodrow Wilson college which is to be built in Georgia, the home state of Woodrow Wilson.

"I have two great passions in my life," said Mr. Underwood. "The first is the growth and development of Georgia. The second is the perpetuation of the lofty ideals of Woodrow Wilson. Woodrow Wilson college is destined to forward both of these supreme ambitions. The memorial college as planned will be a wonderful thing for Georgia, for it will awaken a most dramatic way in the life of the state a widespread desire for the cultural things in life. It will direct the attention of the state to the task of more fully developing our educational facilities and, above all, it will train Georgians for leadership. There is less competition in the field of leadership than in any other field and more than anything else, Georgia needs trained leaders, men who have inscribed in them a sincere desire to serve their state and country and who through thorough education, have adequate training to equip them to render such service.

"The great purpose upon which this memorial college is being built is the perpetuation of Woodrow Wilson's memory and influence by inspiring and fitting men to carry on his work. It will be no ordinary college. It will be a distinctive institution standing for the things Woodrow Wilson stood for and seeking to train young men to be just such unselfish leaders as he was. The building of a Woodrow Wilson college will be a real service to the nation. It is the most fitting thing a people could do and I am proud that the people of Georgia are taking the leadership in erecting this splendid and lasting memorial.

Pleasant A. Sizoo, of Savannah, former minister to Switzerland and now a chairman for the movement to build Woodrow Wilson college, told of his boyhood days with Woodrow Wilson in Augusta, and said that if Woodrow Wilson had the opportunity to choose a memorial to himself, he would have selected just such a college as Woodrow Wilson college as designed by Underwood.

Underwood, who is president of the Wilson College Commission, said that the purpose of the organization was to compose a memorial to the president of the United States.

COLUMBIA THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY TO ATLANTA MEETS ALUMNI'S APPROVAL

The removal of Columbia Theological seminary from Columbia, S. C., to Atlanta received the endorsement and support of the alumni and friends of the seminary at a dinner in the Lafayette hotel, Lexington, S. C., several days ago during the session of the general assembly of the Presbyterian church there, according to announcement from campaign headquarters.

The resolutions read and adopted were as follows:

1. We, the alumni of Columbia Theological seminary assembly at Lexington, Ky., do greatly rejoice in the progress and success of the movement to remove the seminary to Atlanta. We believe that the seminary in its new location near the center of its territory, with new buildings and equipment, and an enlarged program will be in position to render a larger and more useful service.

2. We commend the wisdom of the board and the controlling synods in their decision to remove the seminary to Atlanta, and we pledge to them and to our Alma Mater loyalty and cooperation in their effort to enlarge the scope of the seminary's influence and to broaden its field of service.

3. We heartily approve the policy of the board in its effort to render the largest possible service to the whole church and to our mission field at home and abroad.

4. We most heartily and unreservedly endorse and commend the selection made by the board of a president, Rev. Richard T. Gillespie, D. D., and believing that he has been sent to the kingdom for such a time as this we promise him our full cooperation in his work.

5. In view of the tremendous task before the seminary and the need of divine guidance and help in the accomplishment of the same we earnestly request the general assembly to unite with us in a special prayer that God may guide and direct those charged with the responsibility of bringing this movement to a successful completion and that our beloved moderator, the Rev. George Sumner, D. D., be requested to lead in this prayer.

An active campaign is now in progress in the Presbyterian churches of Georgia outside of Atlanta and Decatur for an endowment fund to sustain the seminary upon its removal to Atlanta, where a forty-acre site has been given by citizens of these two cities and a building fund of \$215,000 already has been subscribed. Successful campaigns have been completed in Albany, Waycross and Valdosta, and active campaigns are in progress in Bainbridge, Americus and Quitman. Other cities scheduled for immediate campaigns are Rome, June 12; Marietta, June 12; Columbus, June 18; Thomasville, June 19; Moultrie, June 26; Griffin, July 3. Other cities will announce campaign dates later.

Opening of Atlanta's Airplane Landing Field Is Set for July 3

Opening of Atlanta's municipal airplane landing field on Virginia avenue, near Hapeville, has been tentatively set for July 3, it was announced Saturday by Mayor Sims, who said, however, that a definite date could not be fixed until the county could determine when all grading work will be finished.

The new field will be triangular in shape, each side to be 2,000 feet in length. Air officials have declared that when completed, it will be one of the best in the country.

The city obtained the field from Asa G. Candler, Inc., for a period of five years, at an annual rental equal to the taxes assessed against the property. The city also holds an option to purchase the tract of land at any time within the term of the lease for \$100,000.

Pending the announcement of a definite date for opening the field, Mayor Sims said plans for an elaborate program to mark the occasion would be held up.

T. C. Dickson Heads Furniture Division Of Merchants' Body

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
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
