GIRLS' HIGH CLASS OF 227 MEMBERS TO GET DIPLOMAS

DRY SLEUTH SLAYS LAWYER, MISTAKEN FOR RUM RUNNER

RALEIGH, N. C., June 2.—Stephen S. Holt, prominent lawyer, of Smithfield, N. C., alleged to have been mistaken for a "rum runner," was shot and almost instantly killed by Jesse Wyatt, captain of the plainclothes department of the Raleigh police force, Monday afternoon. The shooting took place about one mile from Raleigh.

Following a coroner's inquest Monday afternoon Wyatt was remanded to jail without bail, the coroner's jury finding that Holt came to his death as the result of a pistol shot wound inflicted by Wyatt.

According to witnesses testifying at the inquest, Holt, who had been in attendance at federal court here Monday, was returning to his home at Smithfield in company with several friends, the party occupying two cars. When near the point where the shooting occurred they parked their cars beside the road and were overtaken by Wyatt and Chief of Police Winder Bryan, who were on an inspection tour.

Wyatt stated that he thought the cars were loaded with whisky and that when one of them started to move off he ordered it to halt. He said that the order was disobeyed and that he fired at a rear tire. It was his version of the affair that the bullet glanced off the hard surface road and struck Holt.

The bullet penetrated the rear curtain of the car in which Holt was riding, entered his neck and ranged upward to the base of the brain. He died en route to a local hospital.

Witnesses in the car with Holt stated that there was no order to halt and that the first intimation they had of the trouble was the pistol shot. They also testified that neither Wyatt nor Chief Bryan were in uniform. No whisky was found in the car, they testified, and in this they were corroborated by Chief Bryan.

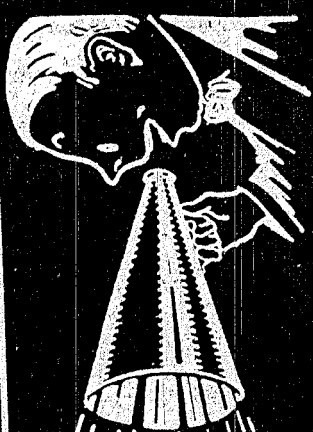
