## Atlanta Girl Takes Dramatic Arts Degree At Carnegie Tech

Miss Janet Millis, of 299 East Tenth street, will receive the degree of Bachelor of Arts in drama, Tuesday at the commencement exercises of the Carnegie Institute of Technology, at Pittsburgh, Pa.

Miss Millis was graduated from the Atlanta Girls' High school in 1920. She spent one year in Wellesley college, and entered Carnegie Tech in the fall of 1921. Although she specialized in costume designing and dramatic production, rather than in the art of acting, she has had leading parts in all the college plays given at Carnegie Tech since her entrance there four years ago. She had the principal role in the college commencement play this year.

She will spend this summer at a girls' camp in North Carolina, as dramatic coach. While her plans for next year have not been definitely formulated, she will continue her dramatic work, it is stated.

The senior class at Carnegie Tech this year numbers 350, one of the largest in the history of the institution. Dr. Michael Pupin, noted inventor and professor of electro-mechanics at Columbia university, will deliver the commencement address.

## WRECK IS CAUSED BY LOG ON TRACK; ROAD STARTS PROBE

An investigation was launched Monday by the Atlanta & West Point railway in an effort to learn the identity of the person who placed a piece of timber on the company's belt line at Glenwood avenue crossing, which is given as the cause of the injury to five persons and the derailment of an engine and thirteen freight cars Sunday at 5:30 p. m., according to railway officials. This is a capital offense, under the Georgia law.

Three members of the train crew—Engineer Dave Conley, of 315 Lake avenue; Fireman John Madrox, negro, and Will Ragland, negro brakeman—were slightly injured and bruised, and two others—James Carter, of Salem, Ala., and Onis Silyer, of Chattahoochee—were slightly injured. Carter is said to have had a finger cut off. Railroad officials said they were not members of the train crew.

The train—No. 205, running from Atlanta to Montgomery—was rounding the curve at the crossing when the pony trucks struck the piece of timber, then became entangled in a switch, thus causing the engine to overturn. Thirteen freight cars then were piled up in a fifty foot ditch alongside the track.

Railway officials stated that the timber might have been placed on the track by some mischievous youngster, who had no idea a train would be wrecked as a consequence. On a straight line, the log would have had no effect, but on a curve and near a switch, a slight obstacle will cause a wreck, it was pointed out.

Wrecking crews immediately were put to work clearing up the debris, but it was stated the track probably would not be open until Monday night. Meanwhile the freight trains are following another route.

The injured were taken to Grady hospital for treatment, after which they were taken to their homes.

## POSTAL REVENUES DECLINE AS RESULT OF RATE INCREASE

WASHINGTON, June 8.—(By the Associated Press.)—Postal revenues, instead of being boosted as contemplated in the increased postage rates which became effective April 15, are declining at the rate of more than \$12,000,000 a year, it was indicated Monday in a summary of receipts for May.

Receipts at 50 selected post offices for May totaled \$27,434,861, as compared with \$29,053,231 for April and \$29,085,000 for March. These offices, which turn in more than half of the country's postal receipts, reported a decrease of more than \$20,000 for each business day as compared with March when the old rates were in effect.

Postal officials are awaiting the June reports, which are expected to show whether the business decrease is temporary. A summary of the effects of the heavier postage rates than will be prepared for presentation to the joint congressional postal committee, which will open hearings here July 20 looking to a permanent revision of rates to meet the \$63,000,000 salary increase voted employees by the last congress.
