Receipts at 50 selected post offices for May totaled \$27,454,861, as compared with \$29,083,231 for April and \$29,085,090 for March. These offices, which turn in more than half of the country's postal receipts, reported a decrease of more than \$20,000 fpr each business day as compared with March when the old rates were in ef-
