MISS PARHAM WINS JOURNAL CUP AS BEST HIGH STUDENT

Miss Mary Louise Parham was awarded The Journal loving cup as the best all-round student at the graduation exercises of the Commercial High school Tuesday night in the auditorium—the delivery of the diplomas to the 164 graduates, the largest in the history of the school, being witnessed by a crowd estimated at 5,000.

The exercises opened with a procession, led by the junior class, all dressed in white and wearing the school colors, who marched through the auditorium and were seated in the dress circle.

The graduating class followed, marching to the stage, all the girls wearing white tautou crepe dresses and white pumps and carrying a large bunch of pink roses. The boys wore blue coats with white trousers and white shoes.

W. A. Sutton, superintendent of schools, presided, and in his opening address, he paid high tribute to Mrs. Annie T. Wise, the principal, who was given an ovation by the students. Mr. Sutton also made mention of Miss Kate Williams, who won first prize in an essay contest sponsored by the U. D. C., and Miss Minnie Topham, editor of the Co-ed Leader, the school paper that won first prize in the contest conducted by Columbia university.

Miss Lorena Cheek, president of the student body, delivered the address of welcome, and was followed by Miss Minnie Topham, who read an address on "American Citizenship." An essay on "A New Factor of High School Life," written by Homer Mayfield, president of the student government, was read by Abraham Taranto.

W. C. Slate, a member of the board of education from the Second ward, presented the diplomas. John T. Hancock, president of the board, was scheduled to deliver the diplomas, but was absent from the city.

Delivery of The Journal cup to Miss Parham was made by Mr. Sutton, who praised her highly for her accomplishments at the school.
