

Will of Johnston Perkins

I Johnston Perkins of the County of Ashe and State of North Carolina do make and publish this my first and last will and testament in manner and form as follows - that is to say

1st It is my will that my funeral shall be conducted without any unnecessary parade and that my body have a plain decent burial and that the expenses thereof with my just debts be fully paid
 2nd I will to my son W. E. Perkins four hundred & two acres of land to be the same nine or ten including the home residence and mill. Bounded as follows beginning on a water oak walnut and licanore on the bank of big hillend a corner of William E. Perkins land south with said W. E. Perkins line 30 poles to a Hickory on the top of the ridge. South 81 West with said line 14 poles to Locust South 78 West with said line & the top of the ridge 118 poles to a Hickory South 36 west 58 poles with said line to tree dogwood then northward down the ridge to a branch at the mouth of the Mill branch where it turns up Mill race North 38 West 22 poles to a dead Chestnut & maple. South 48 W. 32 poles to a beach & birch on the south side of Hettin Creek North 20 poles to a chestnut on the north side of Hettin and near the mouth of Walin Creek South 28 West with the Wagon road 60 poles to a white oak sapling near said road South 35 West 38 poles to a large white oak at the fork of the road that leads to Walin Creek South 54 East 11 poles to a Hickory where the school house stands South 15 E. 14 poles to Oak North 45 E. 9 poles to a lynn near Walin Creek North 58 E. 14 poles to Black oak South 14 W. 10 poles to white oak North 52 E. 28 poles to White oak on top of knoll East 18 poles to white oak South 45 E. 64 poles to Cucumber South 28 E. 48 poles to two chestnuts down at Gicos Hunting Tom fence North 70 E. 25 poles to Chestnut South 27 E. 10 poles to Chestnut oak aceraded Hilly's corner on the top ridge South 28 poles to white oak Hilly's corner South 42 E. 32 poles to Hickory Hilly's and W. E. Perkins corner so with W. E. Perkins line 22 poles to a Stake South 8 E. 40 poles to Hickory South 41 E. 24 poles to Stake South 41 E. with said W. E. line 30 poles to Stake

South 48 E. 16 poles to Chestnut South 45 E. 16 poles to Chestnut South 48 E. 18 poles to Chestnut a dogwood South 55 E. 32 poles to black gum South 42 E. 28 poles to white oak South 27 W. 30 poles to White oak & larch South 21 N. 40 poles to white oak South 26 W. 32 poles to mulberry near the branch W. E. Perkins South 20 N. 26 poles to the beginning I price the above described 110 Acres of land to the said wife of W. E. Perkins at four thousand dollars. One thousand out of the four thousand I will to the said W. J. Perkins for the maintenance of my dear wife Catherine Perkins during her natural life so that the will not want for any thing that is necessary for her comfort the remaining three thousand dollars will be apportioned to Winfield J. Perkins in a small blank book with my name printed on the back wherein I keep my acts against my children each child will be found charged in that book with the amounts they have received

3rd I will to my wife Catherine Perkins one hundred dollars in cash also any of the live stock horses cows or any live stock she may wish to keep which shall be kept on the old home farm free of charge she is not to require more than two horses & two cows I also will to my dear wife all the household and kitchen furniture if the youngest R. H. Perkins my wife Catherine Perkins should become in any way disabled and should request it for her comfort she is at liberty by this to have a slave laid off out of the within described lands so as to include the old home place and certain it during her natural life then to return back to the said W. J. Perkins 4th The remainder of my estate and effects to be disposed of in such a manner as to make my five children all equal also my Grand daughter Bettie Carson to have an equal share with my five children her clothing and clothing decorated and should Bettie Carson die before the course of lawful age her portion of my estate to revert back and be paid by her Guardian to my five children so as to make all equal I appoint W. J. Perkins guardian for Bettie Carson he is not to be required to pay more than 2½ percent interest on the money from the time I come into his hands. I also appoint William E. Perkins & Wm. J. Perkins my executors of this my Will and testament whereas I have written etc my hand and seal
