FIRST: I give and bequeath to my beloved wife, Aletta T. Boyette, one (1) walnut dental cabinet, one (1) Atwater Ward Radio, and all attachments to make it complete; one (1) large hall mirror and hat rack with chest setting under mirror, two (2) dining chairs, seats of imitation leather bottoms.

SECOND: I give and bequeath to my beloved daughter Baby Ruth Boyette, one (1) walnut writing desk; one (1) walnut wardrobe; one (1) upholstered rocking chair; one (1) upholstered walnut lounge, or settee; two (2) upright oak chairs for Hall or porch; All the silverware in my possession, especially one half tea spoons with her mother's name chased on them; half dozen desert spoons old style, seems to be beaten silver, and all other silver or imitation of silver in my possession. This aforementioned furniture probably being handed down make it somewhat of an heirloom, and give to it sentimental value, beside Baby Ruth had it upholstered and polished, paying for same with her own money or coin, and has, therefore, a money value in it.

THIRD: To my beloved son, William L. Boyette, now living at Monroe, Ga., I give and bequeath all the furniture he has taken to his home at Monroe, Ga., consisting of writing desk, mission oak tables, one oval china closet, same not being in his possession.

FOURTH: I give and bequeath to my said beloved son, William L. Boyette and my said beloved daughter, Baby Ruth Boyette, share and share alike, all the china ware belonging to me, now in the possession of my son, William L. Boyette, of Monroe, Ga.

FIFTH: I also give and bequeath to my said son William L. Boyette, all my clothes, of whatever kind, consisting of overcoat, one silk coat, and all other clothing.

SIXTH: I give, devise and bequeath to my said beloved son, William L. Boyette, and my said beloved wife, Aletta T. Boyette my Executors and Executrices, to all intents and purposes, to execute this my last will and testament, according to the true intent and meaning of the same, and every part and clause thereof, without bond by them, or either of them hereby revoking and declaring void all other wills and testaments by me heretofore made.
