Second, I give and devise unto my son, Rufus Vance Williams, and his heirs, in fee simple, a one-half undivided interest in all my real estate, wherever located, which consists at the present time of my home and about fifty acres of wood land, subject to items Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth.

Third, I give and devise unto my daughter Clara Adel Powell and her heirs, in fee simple a building site of four acres to be selected by agreement between the said Clara, Rufus and David; and in the event that the said Clara may elect to accept the sum of \$400.00 in lieu of such building site, then the said Clara or her heirs are to have the sum of \$400.00 to be paid by the said Rufus and David. In the event that the said Clara shall die without surviving issue before my death, then in that event this bequest shall lapse and be void and of no effect.

Fourth, I give and devise to my daughter, May Williams White the sum of \$10.00.

Fifth, I give and devise unto the surviving children of Viola Jane Williams Bragdon, my daughter, the sum of \$5.00 each.

Sixth, I give and devise unto my son, Harvey B. Williams the sum of \$10.00.
