State North Carolina } In the name of God, Honour!
Brunswick County, I, Drury Allen, of the State and County aforesaid, being of sound and perfect mind and memory, blessed be God, do this 8th day of March in the year of our Lord One thousand, seven hundred and Ninety-seven, make & publish this my last Will and Testament in manner following:-
First, I will and bequeath to my wife Margaret Allen, my negro man named Dick, my negro woman named Venus, and a girl, her daughter named Sue, to her, my wife, during her natural life, then at her, my wife's death, to become the property of my son, Elkanah Allen, and my two grandsons James Randolph son, and Drury Allen Randolph, that is to say, the negro man Dick to be the property of my son Elkanah Allen and his heirs forever, and the widow Venus and her daughter Sue, to be equally divided between James Randolph and Drury Allen Randolph, that is to share and share alike, to them and their heirs forever. Item, I will and bequeath to my wife Margaret Allen all my stock of horses and hogs, to her, her heirs forever. I also will and bequeath to my wife Margaret Allen, one half of my stock of cattle during her life only, and at her death to be equally divided between my two children, my son Elkanah Allen and my daughter Mary Moore, to them and their heirs forever. Item, I also will my plantation and all my plantation tools to my wife Margaret Allen, during her life and no longer. Then I will and devise the said plantation and land thereunto belonging to my son Elkanah to him and his heirs forever. Item, I will and bequeath to my son, Elkanah Allen and his heirs forever the following negroes, to wit:- negro man Sam, negro man Jo, and negro man James. Item, I also, will and bequeath to my son Elkanah Allen, and my daughter, Mary Moore, the other half of my stock of cattle to be equally divided between them, that is to share and share alike to them and their heirs forever. Item, I will and bequeath to my granddaughter Nancy Moore, daughter to Mary and James Moore, a negro girl named Hagar to her and her heirs forever. Item, I will and bequeath to my two grandsons James Randolph and Drury Allen Randolph, the following negroes, to them and their heirs forever the following Negro woman Bella, negro man Gold, negro boy Billy, Jack, Cains, and Valentine, to be equally divided between them, that is to share & share alike. I do also, appoint my son Elkanah Allen sole executor to the property left to my grand children in this will. I will and bequeath to my son Elkanah Allen all the debt due me by General Benjamin Smith, which is by Bond,

Bonds or otherwise, and I hereby make and ordain my true friend John Gribble Scull and my son Elkanah Allen, Executors of this my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have said Drury Allen have to this my last will and testament my hand and seal the day and year first above written.

December the 3d, in the year of our Lord, 1781, I, being low in health and weak in body, and not able to write, but still being perfect and proper senses, I now call Sarah Roberson and Lucy Jones, as witnesses, that I, John Vernon, do make this my last will and testament, To William Jones, I give and bequeath unto my negro boy called Jacko, in the like manner I give and bequeath unto my friend Sarah Roberson a negro girl called Kate and twenty five bushels grain yearly, I give and bequeath unto William Jones, a negro boy called William and two hundred acres of land that is in dispute in Bladen County. I give and bequeath unto my aunt Henrietta White, a negro girl called Rachel, I give and bequeath unto my mother all the rest of negroes during her life and then to be equally divided between my brother William Vernon's children, his son William and Susannah, and the use of three of my land to my mother to raise and educate the said two children at her death, or at said Vernon's son William being of age it shall fall to the above mentioned Vernon's son William Vernon.

In the name of God. Amen! I, Henry Taylor, of Brunswick County our State of North Carolina, Planter, being very sick and weak of body, but of perfect mind and memory thank God for his grace unto me, and calling to mind the mortality of my body, and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make and ordain this my last will and testament - that is to say, first, I give and recommend my soul into the hands of Almighty God, who gave it, and my body I recommend to the Earth, to be buried in a decent and Christian like manner at the discretion of my Executors, nothing doubting but I shall receive the same again at the General Resurrection by the mighty power of God - and as touching such worldly goods as it hath pleased God to bless me with, I give, devise and dispose of the same in the following manner & form Sub nomine, I give to my dear beloved wife, Mary Taylor, all and singular my goods and chattels, lands and tenements, by law to be freely possessed and enjoyed during her natural life or widowhood and at the end of that period to be equally divided amongst all my children, male and female, and if my wife should chance to marry, then in that case for her to have an equal share with the children. And I do further constitute and ordain my friend John Gribble Executor, and my wife, Mary Taylor, sole Executrix to this my last will and testament and so further revoke and disannul all other Wills, Legacies, or Bequests whatever by me given or made.
