Fifth. I give and bequeath to my son, W. Murdick Sermons, all my farming utensils of every description which I may have at my death.

Sixth. I hereby constitute and appoint my trusted friend L. H. Phepps my lawful executor to all intents and purposes, to execute this my last will and testament, according to the true intent and meaning of the same, and every part and clause thereof-hereby revoking and declaring utterly void all other will and testaments by me heretofore made.
