

no 22. In the name of God, Amen! I, James Bell, Senior, of the County of Brunswick and State of North Carolina, being of good health and perfect mind and memory, and knowing the vanity of human life, do make and ordain this to be my last Will and Testament in manner and form following; that is to say, I recommend my soul to Almighty God, who gave it, and my body to the Earth to be decently buried at the discretion of my Executors, hereinafter named. I enjoin, I will and require that all my debts and funeral expenses be first paid and satisfied; and as to my worldly estate I have pleased God to bless me with I give and bequeath in manner and form following:

I give unto my beloved wife, Sarah Bell, during her life, all my estate, real and personal, as well as mixed, and of every kind whatsoever, Except a negro wench, named Judy, which is my bond and surety, after my wife's decease, to be set free, also a negro man named Elzy, which is my desire shall be at my wife's own disposal and the remainder of my estate, after her death, to be divided among my children as follows:-

I give unto my son, James Bell, and his heirs, a negro fellow named Harry, one rifle gun, a chest and a bed with furniture.

I give unto my son, Samuel Bell, and his heirs, a negro woman named Amy.

I give unto my son, Nathaniel Bell, and his heirs, a negro fellow named Prince.

I give unto my grandson, commonly known by the name of Anderson and his heirs a negro wench named Gary.

I give unto my daughter, Sarah Galloway and grandchildren Alfred, Cornelius, Mary and Amelia and their heirs, a negro wench named Beck, with her increase from this date, with one portion to her. It is my will and desire that my daughter Sarah Galloway be the sole use of the negro wench named Beck with her increase; if any during her life.

I give unto my daughter, Rebecca Breward, one Shilling sterling more.

I give unto my granddaughter, Mary Caines, and her heirs, one wench named Muriel, but in case the said Mary, Caines should without issue, it is my will and desire that the wench Muriel and her increase be equally divided amongst my children, James, Samuel, Nathaniel and my daughter Sarah Galloway share & share alike.

I give unto my grandson, Joseph Bell, son of James Bell and his heirs, a negro boy named Joe.

It is my will and desire that the wench named Phyllis and her increase, if any, be equally divided with the residue of my estate amongst my other son and daughter, Sarah Galloway and

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and share alike. I do constitute, make and ordain, my beloved wife Sarah Bell, Testatrix, with my sons James and Samuel Bell, Executors to this my last Will and Testament, revoking and disannulling all former Wills by me heretofore made, ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my Last Will and Testament.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 27th day of June, 1793.

In the name of God, Amen! I, Thomas Neal, of the County of Brunswick, and State of North Carolina, Planter, being of sound and perfect mind and memory, blessed be God, do, this ninth day of September, in the year of our Lord One thousand, seven hundred and ninety six, make and publish this my Last Will and Testament in manner following: that is to say, First, that all my just debts and funeral charges be paid; Then first I will and bequeath to my beloved wife, Eleanor Neale, one third of all my personal estate, with all my household furniture, all my bed of every kind, also all my boats of every kind to her and her heirs forever; Then I will and bequeath to my said wife, Eleanor Neale, my plantation where I now live with the low lands on the opposite side of the River, during her life time only, and at her decease, I will and bequeath said plantation and land upon said, to my beloved grandson, Henry Neale, son to Thomas Neale deceased. Then I will and bequeath to my wife's son, Ephraim Johnson, a survey of land situated on Rock Creek, known by the name of the ricefield plantation, to him and his heirs forever. Then I will and bequeath to Elizabeth Vernon, daughter to my wife, Eleanor Neale, a survey of land situated on said creek to her and her heirs forever. The survey of land given to Ephraim Johnson contains three hundred acres, and that given to Elizabeth Vernon contains one hundred acres. Then I will and bequeath the other two shares of my personal estate to my three grand children, that is to say,
