And this deponent further saith, that at the said time when the said testator subscribed his name to the said last Will as aforesaid, and at the time of the deponents subscribing his name as an attesting witness thereto as aforesaid, the said John McKenzie was of sound mind and memory, of full age to execute a Will, and was not under any restraint, to the knowledge, information or belief of this deponent. I John McKenzie of the State and County aforesaid, being of sound mind and memory, but considering the uncertainty of my earthly existence, do make and declare this my last will and testament in manner and form following, that is to say: That my executor hereinafter named shall provide for my body a decent burial, suitable to the wish of my relatives and friends, and pay all funeral expenses together with my just debts, heretofore and to whomsoever owing and of the moneys that may first come into his hands as a result or part of my estate.

I give and devise to my beloved daughter Mary Tripp, all my real and personal estate, which I may be possessed or seized of at my death.

I give and devise to my beloved daughter Jane Tripp a lifetime right in the estate, provided she should ever leave her husband, and at her death the whole to revert to my beloved daughter Mary and her heirs.

The intent of the foregoing is, and my will is, that if my beloved daughter Jane Tripp should ever be separated from her said husband, that she shall find a place of refuge and a hand with means of support, but if she remains with her said husband, my will is that she has no part or interest in my estate over and above that which she is by law compelled to have (if any), to make this my will valid. And lastly I do hereby constitute and appoint my beloved son in law James F. Tripp my lawful executor to all intents and purposes, to execute this my last will and testament, according to the true intent and meaning of the same, and every part and clause thereof hereby reciting and declaring utterly void all other wills and testaments by me hitherto made. In witness whereof, I the said John McKenzie do hereunto set my hand and seal this 17th day of Feb. 1888.
