I give my son Joseph J. Bryan my rifle gun and my watch. I give my grand son Wm. J. L. Bryan my half stocked library all the balance of my Estate not heretofore disposed of to be divided among all my children share & share alike. I nominate and appoint Anthony St. Waite & Joseph J. Bryan Executors to stis my last Will & Testament. As witness my hand & seal this 22nd of May, 1833.

Item - I give & bequeath unto my sister Anne Natt one Guinea. Then I give & bequeath unto my sister Elizabeth all my right, title and interest to my house next doot the Lamb Inn in Topsham during her natural life and at her decease to descend to my brother Thomas Wilkinson of Exeter. Item - I give & bequeath to my sister Hannah one Guinea. Item - I give & bequeath to John Miles of Brookbury Church Town near great Torrington, Fifty pound Sterling. Item - I give & bequeath forty & four shillings unto Mrs. Anne Goldwin Sundry mentioned in a will of sale dated Sept 29th, 1772, and also further give & bequeath to said Anne Goldwin Sundry goods I expect by Capt. Alexander Bryan from Philadelphia. All the rest of my estate real & personal I give & bequeath to my brother Thomas Wilkinson, whom with my good friend William Hill I nominate and appoint my sole Executrix to this my last Will & Testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal this 2^d day of October, 1772.

I, John Wilkinson, of the County of Brunswick and State of North Carolina, do make and ordain THIS my last Will and Testament - Item - it is my will that all my just debts be paid. Item - I give and bequeath to Mrs. Hannah Locke all my negroes, during her life, as also one third part of my lands and houses to be disposed of after her death in the manner herein after mentioned Item - I give to Sam'l. Locke son of the above named Hannah Locke the other two-thirds of my lands, and also his mother's portion after her death, during his life and then to his children and their heirs, as also over half of my negroes after the death of his mother during his life and then to his children and their heirs - Item - I give to Betsy Robbins, daughter of the aforesaid Hannah Locke the other half of my negroes after the death of her mother, during her life and then to her children, and their heirs, and this my further will and intent that if either of the above named children of Hannah Locke should die without issue then and in that case the property herein given shall go to the children of the survivor I appoint and constitute the above named Hannah Locke, Samuel Locke, and Anthony Melaw as Executrix & Executors to this my last will and testament - In witness whereof I have to this set my hand and seal this 26th, day of July, 1830 signed, sealed & acknowledged John Wilkinson and in presence of Wm. Robbins, Henry Williams To the lands to Mrs. Locke during her life - To Samuel Locke during his life either moiety instead of portions to his lawful children and their heirs - To Betsy Robbins, Mrs. Locke's p^t of negroes during her life and then to all her children living at the time of her death above mentioned if either Betsy Robbins or Samuel Locke should die without leaving issue then the share of said property to go to the children of the survivor and he/she shall share alike - To myself to live and serve Mrs. Hannah Locke during her life but after the death of said Hannah, no wages or actual service whatever to be exacted further by any person whatsoever But she is to live and in the special protection of the Executrix.
