THE LAST WILL AND TESTAMENT of Redden Rutland
Made March 26th, 1833.

I, Redden Rutland, considering the uncertainty of life being now of sound mind and memory, do make and publish this my last will and testament, in manner & form following, that is to say, First, it is my desire that my beloved wife Martha, shall have and possess all my property, of every kind and description during her natural life, and after her death give and bequeath to my son Watson Rutland, now in South Carolina, three negroes, namely, Joney, Betty, & John (the son of Molly,) to have and possess during his life and then to his children or the survivors of them, not to be subject to his debts, nor is it intended that he shall have power to dispose of them in any way. I give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth four negroes, namely, Annette & her child Flora together with their issues, Penny and Brack to have and possess during her natural life and then to her children that she now has or may have after. I also give and bequeath to my said daughter Elizabeth all my cattle, my horse & house tools & kitchen furniture, bequeath to my grandson William Rutland ten dollars to be paid by my Executor out of any money that may be left or if no money then sell cattle or otherwise so he may stand proper to bequeath to my son John Rutland all my sheep, the same being in his keeping. And lastly as to all the rest, residue & remainder of my personal estate, goods & chattels of what kind and nature so ever I give bequeath the same to my beloved wife, Martha. And now I make a disposition of all my property in a very quiet & orderly manner, I hereby revoke all former wills and appoint John Rutland my sole Executor to stir my last will & testament. In witness whereof I hereunto set my hand and seal, or rather made my mark, and seal on Sterling B. Everett to witness the same, he being my mark. Signed, sealed, published & declared by me and witnessed this last will & testament in the presence of Sterling B. Everett who also signs in presence of the testator.

No. 163 I, Jonas Mints, of the State and County aforesaid, being of sound mind and memory, do make and ordain THIS my last Will & Testament.

Item 1. I give and bequeath to my beloved wife, Elizabeth Mints the plantation wherein I now live, and appurtenances, during her natural life, or until her second marriage, and at her death or marriage to my son Marsden C. Mints; and I, Jonas Mints, aforesaid, do also bequeath to my wife, Elizabeth, my stock of cattle, consisting of two cows, &c., one mare, and at her death or marriage to my daughter Emma.

Item 2. I, Jonas Mints, aforesaid, do give and bequeath to my son, John J. Mints one cow and yearling.

3. I give and bequeath to my son James T. Mints one hundred acres of land on Shallotte, my former residence.

4. I give and bequeath to my son Harry Mints fifty acres of land known by the name of the Grantham place, aforesaid.

5. I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary F. Rice, one dollar.

6. I give and bequeath to my daughter, Susan A. Morgan all the stock loaned her by me at her marriage.

7. I give and bequeath to my daughter Clara Rice, one dollar and I hereby request and authorize my son John J. Mints & my friend John Hescott my Executors of this my last will and testament. In witness whereof I hereby set my hand & seal this 12th day of November, A.D. 1833 - One thousand eight hundred and thirty.
