I William H. Stone of the County of Brunswick and State of North Carolina being weak in body, but of sound mind memory and understanding - praise be God for the same, do make this my last Will and Testament, in manner and form following, that is to say:-

First: That my executors (hereinafter named) shall provide for my body a decent burial, suitable to the wishes of my relatives and friends, and pay all funeral expenses, together with my just debts howsoever and whomssoever owing, out of the moneys that may first come into their hands as a part and parcel of my estate.

Item: My will and desire is that all my property both real and personal of which I may be possessed at my death, shall remain in possession and under the control of my beloved wife Jillah as long as she may live.

Item: My will and desire is, that as soon as may be practicable after the death of my beloved wife (and the settlement of all expenses connected therewith) that the real estate of which I may be possessed at my death shall be divided into four equal parts, and, together with the personal property of every description, be sold to the highest bidder.

Item: My further will and desire is, that after the sale of my real and personal as above

mentioned, money collected, and settlements made, that the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000) extra allowance, be set apart for my beloved daughter Amanda Hilbur, the same together with all the money derived from the sale of her equal share, be safely deposited on interest, under the care of a guardian of her own choice the remainder to be equally divided among my children, share and share alike, my daughter Amanda Hilbur included.

And lastly, I do nominate, constitute, and appoint Benjamin F. Stone, Robert R. Stone, and Bollie A. Stone, my lawful executors to all intents and purposes, to execute this my last Will and Testament according to the true intent and meaning of the same, and every part and clause thereof. hereby revoking and declaring utterly void all other wills and testaments heretofore made.
