

Buncombe County. } b.s. In the Superior Court.

A. Paper purporting to be the Last Will and Testament of Caroline F. Ballard deceased, is exhibited before me, the undersigned Clerk of Court for said County, by Waldo H. Ballard, the Executor therein mentioned, and the due execution thereof by the said Caroline F. Ballard, by her oath and examination of Geo F. Scott; and John T. Young, the subscribing witnesses thereto, who being duly sworn, doth depose and say, and each for himself affirms and saith, that he is subscribing witness to the paper writing now shown him, purporting to be the last will and testament of Caroline F. Ballard, that the said Caroline F. Ballard, in the presence of this deponent, subscribed her name at the end of said paper writing which now shown as aforesaid, and which bears date of the 15 day of August 1891. And the deponent further saith, that the said Caroline F. Ballard, the testatrix aforesaid, did at the same time of subscribing her name as aforesaid, declare the said paper writing so subscribed by her and exhibited, to be her Last Will and Testament, and this deponent did thereupon subscribe their names at the end of said will as an attesting witness thereto, and at the request, and in the presence of the said testatrix and this deponent, further saith, that at the said time when the said testatrix subscribed their names to the said last will as aforesaid, and at the time of deponents subscribing their names as an attesting witness thereto, as aforesaid, the said Caroline F. Ballard, was of sound mind and memory, of full age to execute a will, and was not under any restraint to the knowledge, information or belief of these deponents, other than those deponents say not.

Ballard, of the town of Asheville, County of Buncombe, State of North Carolina, considering the uncertainty of life, and being of sound mind and memory, make and declare this my will and testament, and dispose of my property in the following manner, appointing Waldo H. Ballard, as Executor without bonds and trustee to the

property, during the life of my husband, Albert Ballard, his having a comfortable support, out of the income and at his decease after the payment of all bills, on his account, the remainder to be divided among my three sons, Franklin F. Ballard, Albert W. Ballard, and Waldo H. Ballard.

In witness whereof I have set my hand and seal this the fourth day of Aug. in the year of our Lord eighteen hundred and ninety one.
