

The last will and testament of David  
Murdoch.

Know all men by these presents that  
I David Murdoch, at present a resident  
of Buncombe County and State of North  
Carolina, but a native of Ayrshire Scot-  
land do make, publish and declare this  
as my last will and testament.

I first direct that all my just debts be paid  
by my executors hereinafter named out of  
my personal effects, and by my debts I  
mean to include the no 17290 Debt of  
seven or eight hundred dollars due J. W.  
Ledford.

Second, I devise and bequeath ~~and demand~~  
to my beloved Lillie B. Murdoch the place which  
I lately purchased from J. W. Ledford and  
wife, known as the Jarrett place.

The above mentioned land to belong to my  
said wife for her life and assigns forever.

Third, I will, devise and bequeath to my two  
children Andrew Murdoch and Eliza  
W. Murdoch, residents of Ayrshire Scot-  
land the sum of one thousand dollars  
each, to be paid them by my executors out  
of my personal effects as soon as con-  
venient for her to do.

4th, All the residue of my property, which  
consists principally in notes for the  
purchase money of land by W. W. Gird-  
wood and J. P. Kerr I direct by executor  
to keep loaned out at interest for the  
benefit of my dear wife and her child  
and that he pay my said wife interest on  
said money semi-annually by investing  
and collecting the interest in that manner  
if possible and if he finds it impossible  
to collect the interest to pay her as directed  
then he is to pay her what would be equivalent  
to eight per cent interest, out of the princi-  
pal or said sum. The rate of interest always  
to be eight per cent.

The above provision is made to enable  
my wife to properly maintain herself

and child and to educate and child.  
If our child David S. Murdoch should  
die before he attains his majority then  
I direct my executor to collect all the money  
due my estate and pay one half of the  
same to my said wife to be hers abso-  
lutely, and the other half he will di-  
vide between my said children Andrew  
Murdoch and Eliza W. Murdoch, If  
my said wife should die before my  
son David S. Murdoch obtains his  
majority, it is my will that all the  
property in which I have willed her  
an interest, not absolutely, shall be  
collected together by my executor at  
once and divided as follows: one half  
to be given to my son David S. Murdoch  
and the other half to be divided equally  
between my children Andrew and  
Eliza.

If then my son David S. attains his  
majority I direct my executor to collect  
together all that may belong to my estate  
as to divide the same as follows:  
To my children Andrew and Eliza W.  
he will pay the sum of five hundred  
dollars each (this in addition to the  
\$1000, already mentioned) and the bal-  
ance that may be on hand he will divide  
between my son David S. and my  
beloved wife to be hers absolutely.  
Any household effects that my  
wife and I may have on hand at the  
time of my death I of course will to her  
and I direct that my executor turn all  
such property over to her as a devise.  
If any contingency not provided for  
by this will should happen then it is my  
desire that it be supplied by the law of  
the land with regard to inheritances and  
distributions.

To execute this will I hereby nominate  
constitute and appoint as my  
executor my brother John A. Mur-

docks, I do witness whereof I have here  
to set my hand and seal this 2<sup>nd</sup> day
