James Boyd's Will.

In the name of God, amen! I, James Boyd of the County of Buncombe and State of North Carolina, being of sound mind and memory, but being advanced in age, and calling to mind that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make, ordain and establish this my last Will and Testament, in manner & form following:

First I command my soul to God who gave it, and my body to the earth to be buried in a Christian manner, at the discretion of my executors, nothing doubting but I shall receive it again at the General resurrection by the mighty power of God. And as touching such worldly substance, as it has pleased God to bless me with in this life, I dispose of the same as follows - to wit: First I will and bequeath to my beloved wife Rachael all my estate both real and personal, including all my household property, debts and moveable effects, for and during her natural life.

Secondly at the death of my beloved wife Rachael, I will and bequeath to my son Robert Boyd, his heirs and assigns forever, all that part of my land, which I purchased of Samuel W. Davidson, three Negroes, Henry, Lucia & Adolphus together with the increase of Lucia, and one half all my other property.

Thirdly I will and bequeath, at the death of my beloved wife Rachael, to the children, begotten in lawful wedlock of my son James B. Boyd which may then be living their heirs and assigns forever all the balance of my land consisting of two tracts; one purchased of John Robeson and the other of Peter Mason; four Negroes, Dorey, Martha, Anderson & Ben, with their increase, and one half of all my other property to be equally divided amongst them; and should any of the children of my son James B. Boyd die previous to the death of my wife Rachael, leaving issue of their bodies, such issue is to receive the portion which would have fallen to their deceased parents. Lastly I hereby nominate and appoint my Trusty friends James Leary and Alexander Robeson, executors of this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all former wills, by me made. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand that the 13th day of December 1850. Signed sealed and published in presence of us,

Codicil

I, James Boyd do make and ordain the following as a codicil to the foregoing will. I will and bequeath the negro woman Marcus, after the death of my wife Rachael, who by the third item in said will is bequeathed to the children of my son James B. Boyd, to my son Robert Boyd, his heirs and assigns, forever; and I do hereby desire and enjoin it on my said son Robert, in consideration of the faithfulness with which the said Marcus has served me and my family, to suffer and permit the said Marcus, after the death of my wife, to live on some part of the land bequeathed to the said Robert, and to enjoy the benefit of her own labor as a free woman, uninterupted by him, the said Robert or any other person, further than is necessary to prevent her from the aggression of others.

Buncombe County In the name of God, amen! I Jane Reed being weak
and failing in body, but thanks be to God, of perfect mind and memory, but
calling to mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed
to all men once to die, do make this, and no other, my last will
and Testament, that is to say, first I recommend my soul in to
the hands of almighty God, who gave it - Secondly I recommend my
body to the earth to be buried in a Christian manner, at the discretion of
my surviving friends, and as touching my worldly estate, wherewithal it
hath pleased God to bless me, I give and bequeath in the following manner &
form. First of all I will that my executors pay and satisfy all my just debts -
Secondly I give and bequeath unto James Reed, all of my personal property, consisting
of three head of cattle, my entire stock of sheep, one hog and all my bedding
household & kitchen furniture, together with my wearing apparel, with the exception
of one small drapery and one Bible & hymn book to Hannah Reed - Also the said
James Reed to have the further property to wit: one soon, one side saddle &
one watch together with all the apparatus belonging to the soon. I further
nominate, constitute and appoint Lawson H. Tanning the sole executor of the
my last will and Testament. I also hereby revoke, disannul & set aside, any other
will by me at any time heretofore made, and hereby ratifying and Confirming
and no other as my last will and Testament in testimony, whereof, I have
hereunto set my hand & seal the date above written, in presence of the
undersigned witnesses,
