At a Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions opened and held for the County of Buncombe in the State of North Carolina at the Court house in Asheville on the thirteenth day after the fourth month in March Anno Domini one thousand eight hundred and thirty one. Be it Remembered that the following instrument purporting to be Last will and Testaments were duly proved in open Court and ordered to be Recorded (S. 10)
1st John Patten's last will and Testament.

in consideration of my life and certainty John Patten calling to mind the uncertainty of life and certainty of death and being of sound mind and disposing memory do make ordain and establish this my last will and Testament in manner and form following that is to say

First I will and bequeath unto my beloved wife Ann Patten one negro woman named D ready and her increase to be the property of the said Ann Patten for and her apizys for ever.

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2d I will and bequeath unto my beloved wife Ann Patten one negro boy named Will his wife wife and all their incusy, the tract of land on which I now live, all the house-hold and Kitchen furniture of every kind (except those pieces which he did take and furnish) four cows and Calves her choice out of my whole stock, two horses beasts to the stock at my decease one Waggon and gars and all the implements of every kind, all the Corn and provisions of every kind which may be on the Plantation at the time of my decease. during her natural life.

3rd I will and bequeath unto my daughter Elizabeth McClellan all the property heretofore given to her by me and now in her possession valued by me to twelve hundred dollars, and one share of Stock in the Buncombe Turnpike Company.

4th I will and bequeath unto my daughter Hannah White all the property of every kind heretofore given to her by me and now in her possession valued by me to twelve hundred dollars, and one share of Stock in the Buncombe Turnpike Company.

5th I will and bequeath unto my daughter Sarah Garrett all the property of every kind heretofore given to her by me and now in her possession valued by me to one thousand dollars, and one share in the Buncombe Turnpike Company.

6th I will and bequeath unto my son Maloy B. Patten all the land and property of every kind heretofore given to him by me, including one share in the Buncombe Turnpike Company, valued by me to three thousand dollars.

7th I will and bequeath unto my daughter Polly Smith all the property of every kind heretofore given to her by me and now in her possession valued by me to one thousand dollars and one share of Stock in the Buncombe Turnpike Company.

8th I will and bequeath unto my son Robert H. Patton all the property of every kind heretofore given to him by me, and now in his possession including one share in the Buncombe Turnpike Company valued by me at three thousand dollars.

9th I will and bequeath unto my daughter Harriet Bell all the property heretofore given to her by me and now in her possession valued by me at one thousand dollars and one share in the Buncombe Turnpike Company.

10th I will and bequeath unto my sons Tidilio Patton and Monteville Patton, the tract of land on which I now live and all the land joining and contiguous thereto, being six tracts and also two tracts of land on French broad River joining each other, and known by the name of the Stetlocks place to be equally divided between them and should they not agree upon the division of the said land, then my will is that my son Monteville choose therefrom to make an equitable and fair division of the same taking into consideration the quality as well as quantity and after it is so divided my son Tidilio shall have choice of lots. And after the areas of my wife Ann Patton I will and bequeath unto my sons Tidilio and Monteville Patton all the farming utensils of every kind to be divided in the manner above directed.

11th I will and bequeath unto my son Tidilio Patton four steers & two heifers, Sam Hulda Lanes wife, Cepa and Billa Bicks wife - perfect heretofore, has stock and furniture five Cows and Calves his choice out of my stock after the selection heretofore mentioned made by my wife Ann Patton, and after the death of my wife Ann Patton one table his choice of those about the house six chairs and my clock and case and one share of stock in the Buncombe Turnpike Company.

12th I will and bequeath unto my daughter Luanda Roberts all the property heretofore given of every kind heretofore given to her by me and now in her possession valued by me to one thousand dollars (or about of two hundred dollars in the estimation of a negro boy Jim who was taken given in consideration of the bond and instruction of my son Monteville during the time he has or may remain with Joshua Roberts studying his profession and therefore not to be taken into the estimation of her portion, and one share of stock in the Buncombe Turnpike Company.

13th I will and bequeath unto my son George J. Patton the tract of land known by the name of the Cash place, and all the land joining thereto being three tracts in all and supposed to contain three hundred and twenty acres valued at fifteen hundred dollars, one tract of land on the East side of French broad River at the mouth of Robert's branch below the mouth of the French broad River and another tract of land

Then tract of land lying on Sow's Creek contiguous to each other and supposed to contain seven hundred acres valued at five hundred dollars then negroes to wit, Jeff, Clary, and Agnella valued at nine hundred dollars, five cows and calves, one feather bed, brasted and furniture and one share in the Bemcombe Turn Pike Company and goeth the all of my beloved wife Ann Potter six chairs, the side, back chair and table and the new iron cupboard.

14th I will and bequeath unto my son Montrovile Potters one horse bridle, and saddle to be worth one hundred dollars, one feather bed brasted and furniture five cows and calves, three negroes named Harry, Campbell, and Martha and an share in the Bemcombe Turn Pike Company and after the death of my wife Ann Potter one table, six chairs, and my side board.

15th I will and bequeath unto my daughter Ann A. ^{Gilligan} all the property heretofore given to her by me and now in her possession valued by me at one thousand dollars and one share in the Bemcombe Turn Pike Company.

16th My will is that at my death my negro man Fiddle be emancipated and set at liberty he having performed many meritorious services and that my son Fiddle suffer him to settle on any part of the unoccupied land, hereinafore bequeathed to him and that he have liberty to clear and cultivate as much of said land as she should during his natural life free from any charges or claim of the said Fiddle or any person claiming under him, and should the laws of the state at the time of my decease be such as to prevent the said Negro man Fiddle from being set free my will is that he be the property of my son Fiddle Potters

17th I will and bequeath that all the rest of my property of every kind not herein specifically devised be sold by my executors on a credit of twelve months and that the proceeds of the sale after paying all my just debts at the time of my decease be divided amongst my seven daughters to wit, Elizabeth W. Clashy, Hannah M. Kee, Sarah Smith, Polly Smith, Harriet B. Lile, Lucia Roberts, and Ann A. Gilligan ~~as the heirs of~~ ~~their bodies~~ should any of them be dead before my decease in such manner as to make the portion of each one equal taking into consideration the amount of already used by each at the value hereinbefore set on it by me, and at the death of my wife it is my will that all of the personal property hereinbefore bequeathed to her during her natural life and not specifying bequeathed after her death be sold by my executors at public sale on a credit of twelve months and that each of my sons receive one hundred dollars of the proceeds of said sale and that the balance of the money arising from said

Weaver for the comfortable maintenance of my wife
Elizabeth during her life. At her decease

Fourthly I give and bequeath unto my son Monticello Weaver the
tract or parcel of land wherein I now live. Containing six hundred
and seventy two acres be the same more or less, with all the build
ings, Waps, Woods, and waters, therto belonging as in any wise
pertaining, to him and his assigns for ever

Fifthly I give and bequeath unto my six daughters Savannah
Christina, Mary Elizabeth, Matilda and Catharine all all my
house hold furniture to be equally divided at their mothers
discretion

Sixthly I give and bequeath the balance of my personal
property consisting of my slaves, and domestic articles
