

Will Docket Sept 1863

Know all men by these presents that I J.T. Weaver of the County of Buncombe & State of Carolina and now an officer in the service of the Confederate States of America, Being of sound mind and memory, do now proceed to make the following disposition of what goods and property, & this Providence has permitted me to have the legal right to command.

I will that my wife Hester Anne have control of all my property both real and personal during her widowhood or until my eldest son Rufus arrives at the age of Majority. At which period I will that all my property that may be left after raising and educating my heirs Rufus, Betty Trotter, and Ellen Caroline, be divided into four equal parts by three people appointed by the County Court of Buncombe, and appraised Rightfully (and paid out) to my wife and my three heirs (viz. Rufus, Betty Trotter, & Ellen Caroline). But in the event that my wife Hester Anne, marries again then I will that my perishable property be at sale by my Executors at public Auction on a credit of twelve months with Interest from date And that my negroes be hired. And my lands rented annually to the highest Bidder in cash and that the proceeds be as often divided into four equal parts and given at once to my wife Hester Anne, And to the guardian of my three heirs Rufus, Betty Trotter & Ellen. Said guardian to be appointed immediately on the marriage of my wife Hester Anne. And that said guardian be other than the future husband of my wife, and the money be put in interest or otherwise appropriated for the benefit of my said heirs above named. And that the said living and renting of my land and negroes shall continue until my son Rufus shall arrive at the age of Twenty one years, when the division of my property as aforesaid may take place.

In any case I wish my children to be as thoroughly educated as my means will allow, In the event that either of my heirs above mentioned die without issue that the portion or portions of such be given to the surviving ones.

I will that my Rifle guns that I captured from our Enemies at the Battle of Murfreesboro be left by them as long as they live as an heirloom, and as oft as they look upon them, they may remember the hard fought contest for freedom And Thirdly remember that it is my injunction to be ever vigilant in guarding the same, and that they hand them down to future generations as a family relic. In the event that my wife Hester Anne remains a widow, I then will and desire that if there be any of the negroes that she desires to hire, that through the advice of my Executors she be allowed to do so.

I will that my well tried friend R. Coleman & my brother John T. Weaver be the executors of this my last will and testament. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this the 21st day of April A.D. 1863
