aforesaid, being over in my fifty seventh year,  
and knowing in the course of nature must soon  
leave the walls of men, I therefore make and ordain  
this to be my last will and testament, viz:

I will and desire that after my death my  
body be decently buried in the Turkey Creek  
Grave Yard near the place where my wife is  
buried, that is if I die in this part of the Country.  
I also will and desire that all my just debts be  
paid, and I desire that my effects or my  
property and estate be divided as follows: 1<sup>st</sup>  
The lands which I have bequeathed to my son John  
who is the son of my last wife, I desire that title  
shall stand. The lands which I have bequeathed to my  
daughter Alice, which is the daughter of my late  
wife, I desire that title shall stand. The lands  
which I have bequeathed to my son Thomas, who is the  
youngest son of my last wife, I desire that that  
title shall stand. I desire that my property  
and effects be disposed of as follows: I desire further  
that my wife, if she lives longer than I do, to  
have all my property, moves and effects with  
which to raise the children, to her heirs as long as she  
lives to make her comfortable. At her death, it is  
my will that whatever is left of my said estate  
is to be divided equally among my last wife's  
other children, which are minors, and to carry on  
this will I desire that Adolphus Hardin be my  
Executor of this my last will and testament, and  
that I desire because I fear that I have a feeble  
mind and after mature deliberation, and hope that  
all my children will be satisfied.

W. W. Young, of Buncombe County and State of North Carolina of sound mind do make and publish this my last will and testament, in manner and form following, to wit:

I do hereby give and bequeath to my friend Tom James Young that piece or lot of land lying and being in my upper tract, adjoining land of the late Peter Miller and Lewis Sniggleton, known as lot No. 1, containing 140 rods, beginning at a stake in the Peter Miller line and runs N 88° 10' poles to a stake, thence S 2° West 10 poles to a stake, thence S 88° 10' poles, thence North 2° West 10 poles, to the beginning.

I do hereby give and bequeath to the heirs of dead daughter Caroline Love the piece or lot of land adjoining the above known as lot No. 1, containing 140 rods. Beginning at a stake Jessie Young's corner and runs N 88° 10' poles to a stake, thence S 2° West 10 poles, thence S 88° 10' poles, thence N. 2° W 10 poles to the beginning. I do hereby give and bequeath to my daughter Violet Lowrance that piece or lot of land known as lot 3 containing 140 rods, Beginning at a stake near of Caroline Love's corner, and runs N 88° W 10 poles, thence S 2° W 10 poles, thence S 88° W 10 poles, thence N. 2° W 10 poles to the beginning corner.

I do hereby give and bequeath to my daughter Matilda, bearing the piece or parcel of land in my lower tract adjoining land of William Oteil, and known as No. 4, containing One hundred thirty seven (137) rods, beginning at a stake, Viola Evans, corner and S 88° N 13 1/2 poles to a stake on quarry, and thence with the quarry S 68° 13' poles, thence East 1/2 pole - thence S 84° E 1/2 pole to a stake, otherwise West 9 poles 7 links to a stake, thence N 20° W 14 poles 20 links to the beginning.

I do hereby give and bequeath to my son William Young the piece or lot of land known as lot 8, adjoining the above, containing 85 poles rods. Beginning at a stake Matilda Evans corner and runs East 9 poles 7 links to a stake, otherwise S 84° E 14 poles 6 links to the headward.
