Be it Remembred that on the Thirtieth day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty one I W. M. Brittain of the County of Buncombe in the State of North Carolina, knowing the certainty of death, and the uncertainty of life here being over of the reasonable health but very much and memory somewhat impaired by infirmity & old age,

But knowing that life is the time to prepare for death and eternity I this day make and declare this to be my last Will and Testimonial which is as follows First, 1<sup>st</sup> it is my will & desire that my body should be decently buried in my own burying ground, near my two children which is gone before me my body to the dust & my soul to God, is my desire and hope

2<sup>nd</sup> As to my debts thank God I owe none but good will & shall therefore give my executors no trouble on that account

3<sup>rd</sup> It is my will and desire that my daughter Jane Swain & my youngest son George W. Brittain have all my land where I now live containing three hundred acres more or less which they shall and may enjoy and occupy as joint tenants or divide at their pleasure so as to be equal with all my present stock of every kind consisting of Two head horse breds, Twenty five head cattle, Twenty one head of hogs, and thirtynine head of sheep with all the increase of each kind of stock, with all my stock of tools & furniture the right of all each shall be vested in the aforesaid Jane Swain and Geo. W. Brittain to do & dispose of at their own will and pleasure with all my house hold & kitchen furniture & all other of my property which I now possess not herein named to be equally divided between them as they may please.

Provided that my said daughter Jane Swain & my son Geo. W. Brittain doth maintain me and my wife decently & comfortably during our lifetime as would become dutiful children & further comply with all the requisitions of this my last will & Testament, or the same shall be void and of no effect.

4<sup>th</sup> It is my desire that my daughter Jane Swain & my son Geo. W. Brittain should have and possess from this time all of the Estate & property equal between them as mentioned in the will above by them paying to the rest of my children

The following sums of money, &c. wit.  
To the heirs of my son Josy. Brittain dec'd  
the sum of five dollars, & to Robt. Brittain  
five dollars, to the heirs of my son W.  
A. Brittain dec'd five dollars, & to my  
daughter Elizabeth Pickens, one hundred  
dollars which is to include what she  
has already rec'd from me by her husband  
John Pickens & to my daughter Rachel Roberts  
one hundred dollars including the sum she  
has already rec'd from me by her husband  
James Roberts.

5th It is my desire that the above sums of money  
should be paid to the persons therein named  
by my daughter Jane Swain & my son Geo. W. Brittain  
immediately to the different persons above named.  
It further my will & desire that my daughter Jane  
Swain & my son Geo. W. Brittain should have  
my wagon, blacksmith & farming tools of all sorts  
equally between them.

It is my will & desire that my children should  
live in peace and harmony with each other  
& that they would bear with each other even  
their maker to guide them  
respectfully in the paths of duty towards each  
other & all their fellow mortals on earth  
especially their duty to God in this unfriendly  
world so that they may all be fit subjects  
for his kingdom above. Amen.

8th It is my will & desire to hereby constitute  
and ordain my worthy friend Nehemiah  
Blackstock sole executor to this my last  
will & testament with full power & authority  
to execute the same according to law. in  
testimony whereof I have hereunto set my  
hand & seal.

the said William Brittain subscribed to said

the name of N. Blackstock subscribed is a  
witness thereto, are in the respective handwriting  
of the said William Brittain and N. Blackstock  
and genuine; and it is also proved by the  
oath and examination of A. J. Summey  
that he is well acquainted with the hand  
writing of the said Moses White and with the  
handwriting of the said N. Blackstock, having  
often seen them write, and that the names  
of the said Moses White and N. Blackstock  
subscribed as witnesses to the said last will  
and testament are in the respective hand  
writings of the said Moses White and N. Blackstock.
