and appoint him to be my sole executor,
hereby authorizing directing, and empowering him
to grant bargain and sell any part or parts
of my estate, whether situated real or personal, be
the same situated in the state of Pennsylvania.

Salvage, North Carolina or elsewhere, and to make
good, and sufficient titles in the land therefor
to any purchase, or purchasers, of the same.

~~And~~ it is my will (after the debts aforesaid are duly
paid and discharged) and I do hereby bequeath and
bequeath, three fourths undivided part of all the remainder
or residue of my estate whether real or personal to my
dearly beloved sister Margaret Baltimore to her, her
heirs, and assigns forever, and the remaining fourth
part of my estate, I bequeath, and devise to my
dear sister Elizabeth Poe, wife of James Poe, Esq. of
Franklin County, and daughter of my dear deceased
sister Elizabeth Potter to her the said Elizabeth Poe,
her heirs, and assigns forever. In witness whereof I
have hereunto affixed my hand, and seal, this
fourteenth day of September in the Year of our Lord
one thousand eight hundred and, five, 1805.
