 two sons Isaac & Bell William & Bell one negro child called
 Dismurvy - and also all the other negroes as was given in the former
 gift at my wife's death to them to be equally divided & all their
 increase shall & shall abide and also all the land which they respectively
 well claim & as settling all doubts aside at once I subscribe my name
 to this in full faith as it will be always understood all done by my
 own pen though in a trembling manner this weakness but in perfect
 mind & memory. S. Bell.

Now in the pregnant situation of my wife at this time I do fully & absolutely
 enact this as a codicil to the will with the above as firmly as if it had
 been written. I now take a young negro from the former stock one of
 by sent to the child, now not born
 but to be equally with it two brothers Isaac & William and every
 part mentioned to them & each of them this not seem to have just
 the same shall & all their completely to share & take in every thing as
 mentioned above as well as below - This done by my own hand & seal
 but in perfect mind & memory this September 7th Day 1825.
