I and bequeath to my daughter Morning one pecker 13d of flamm - I give & bequeath to my son Jacob Padrick fifty cents - also I give to my daughter finias fifty cents - I give & bequeath to my son Jonathan my young horse - I give & bequeath to my son Aspha forty dollars after paying my just debts & legacies that is given away - I give & bequeath to my daughter Nancy my house & land and the balance of my property in debt - I hereby appoint & nominate my daughter Nancy Padrick my whole & sole executrix of this my last will & testament hereby revoking all other and former wills by me of any time heretofore made - In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 31st day 1828.

Well. Latimore Upton In the name of God Amen. I Latimore Upton of the County of Camden being weak in body but of sound and perfect mind and memory blessed be almighty God for the same do make and publish this my last will and testament in manner and form following (that is to say)

First I give unto my brother William Upton a certain piece of land lying near James Chappell which I bought of him -

Secondly I give and bequeath unto my sister Nancy Drafton and my brother John Upton my land that I own in Sumter to be equally divided between them -

Thirdly I give & bequeath my negr girl Cate to my sister Elizabeth Spence's children at the time they arrive to lawful age and until then I lend the negr girl to my sister Elizabeth Spence -

Fourthly - I give and bequeath to my brother Thomas Upton negr Boy Noah at the time he arrives to the age of twenty one years old and it is my desire that my executor hire out S. Noah until that time - and after paying all my just debts out of said hire the remainder to be paid to S. Thomas Upton - I likewise give to said Thomas Upton my right to a piece of swamp lying on North river near Edmund Chappell and I do also give S. Thomas Upton my chest - and I do hereby appoint my brother William Upton sole Executor to this my last will & testament - In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the 15th day of November in the year of our Lord 1828.
